Ancient Islamic Centre Found

THE FIRST morning call for Islamic prayers rang out as early as 950 AD on the small island of Pate, near Lamu, archeologists now believe.

Five times a day, a small community of mostly indigenous blacks and a few Arab traders flocked to a small rectangular building with stone foundation, which archeologists now claim is the oldest known trace of Islamic culture in East Africa.

The mosque, dating from around that time, was discovered among the ruins of a small trading community on Pate Island by a team from London's Oxford University, led by Dr. Mark Horton.

"This is the most important discovery from the East African Coast for many years," Dr. Horton said.

The team also found pottery and coins items which strengthen their theory that the ruins represent the earliest known Islamic settlement in sub-Saharan Africa.

The mosque, discovered beneath another mosque of later construction, was fashioned in the structure of others found in the Persian Gulf.

Excavations work still continues at Shanga, the site of the new discovery.

Nyachae Praises Pakistan Surgeons At Free Eye Camp

A GROUP of Pakistani Eye Surgeons from the Spencer Eye Hospital, Karachi, have performed 120 Cataract operations at a "Free Eye Camp" organised at Mombasa on the New Year eve by the Medical Board of the Shia Ithna-asheri Community.

The "Free Eye Camp" was inaugurated by the outgoing Chief Secretary, Mr. Simeon Nyachae, who paid glowing tribute to the Pakistani medical team for their sense of mission to serve humanity in distant lands.

Screening Camps were held at Msambweni, Kinango and Kwale in the South Coast, and at Mackinon Road and Voi in the West, in addition to one at Mombasa to cater for the Island and the North Coast.

 Speaking on the occasion, Dr. M.N. Nasser, Chairman of the Ithna-asheri Medical Board stated that out of several hundred people screened, 50 patients from the South Coast, 40 from Voi and Mackinon Road area, and 30 from Mombasa and the North Coast "were selected for surgery, and transported to Mombasa at our cost, for relevant surgery and post operative care at a centralised place."

"There is no greater joy or happiness for an individual," said Dr. Nasser in his welcoming address, "than to see joy and happiness reflected in the eyes of others."

"What greater joy or happiness could there be for one than to see a blind man, having had his sight restored, looking at you squarely in the eye, with a smile lit up on his face."

Sad News For South Coast!

GOVERNMENT SHELVES PLANS FOR LIKONI CROSSING

THE KENYA Government has decided to shelve plans to put a permanent link across the strategic Likoni Channel - in favour of a major industrial development project around the port and the Port Reitz area.

The decision, made public this week by the provincial planning officer Mr. J.E.W. Echessa, brings to a temporary halt a four-year bid to replace the 50-year-old Likoni Ferry service, and gives top priority to the proposed development programme at Dongo Kundu to cost 104 million US dollars.

"Of immediate concern right now is the development of the industrial area in Port Reitz area," Mr. Echessa told Coastweek. "Consequently, the Likoni plan has been sent back to the drawing board," he said.

The Dongo Kundu development programme was part of a

US-financed study completed in 1984 on the expansion of the Mombasa port.

Spanning six years, it will involve establishing new port facilities, transportation links, and an export processing zone, together with an industrial park.

Both ventures are designed to increase exports, create additional employment and improve Kenya's balance of trade.

Industries earmarked for the area include processing plants for fruit and fish, fertiliser, flour milling, steel production, thermal power production and other industries identified by the ministry of Industry.

For the port, the project will

provide new and improved berths for both bulk grain and bulk mineral, a marginal wharf, and a rail connection between Dongo Kundu, south of Port Reitz and the West mainland.

The proposed railway alone is estimated to cost 7.8 million US dollars.

The development programme, expected to attain viable operation between 1990 and the year 2000, is scheduled to begin as soon as the government secures necessary aid from donors, Mr. Echessa said.

Other facilities will include two separate dry bulk facilities at Dongo Kundu, together with new container terminals to handle second generation and larger container ships, aided by additional transit storage facilities and the transainer system already in use at the port.

Dongo Kundu is regarded as an ideal place for the location of the export processing zone (EPZ) because of its proximity to both the port and Moi International Airport.

Foreign Exchange

The proposed zone is expected to increase exports and earn foreign exchange for Kenya. It will also provide direct and indirect employment opportunities, and encourage domestic industrial expansion in Mombasa, using local materials.

In the wake of this decision, the idea of a link across Likoni through private funding, also appears to have been shelved.

A giant consortium had proposed a Kshs. 950 million single tunnel with two lanes linking Mombasa with the south mainland and the south coast.

According to a 1983 Japanese-funded study, a bridge across the channel would have cost Kshs. 1 billion, and a tunnel four times as much.

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'Europe Walk' For Mike Werikhe

RARING to embark on his third ambitious walk - this time through Europe - is Mombasa's Michael Werikhe who has probably raised more than any other individual for the East African Wildlife Society's 'SAVE THE RHINO' fund.

Two previous walks boosted the fund by Shs. 800,000/-. One was from Mombasa to Nairobi in 1983 and the other through East Africa in 1985.

Michael's next walk, which he plans to start at the end of May, will take him through five countries of Europe covering 2100 kms - a similar distance to that undertaken through E. Africa.

It will start in Genoa, Italy, and end in London. En-route he will be passing through Lausanne, Lucerne and Zurich in Switzerland, and through Stuttgart, Mannheim, Frankfurt, Cologne and Dusseldorf in Germany, then through Amsterdam to London.

This time, Michael hopes to boost the 'Save The Rhino' fund by Shs. 1.5 million.

Again, he has the full support of The East African Wildlife Society.

Michael - a keen conservationist and environmentalist - was motivated into taking this position, impact-making action by the fact that Kenya's population of black rhino now stands at around 400-500. In the 1960s it was about 20,000.

While poaching has, thankfully, decreased, the remaining rhino need greater protection against any chance of unwanted killing.

Unfortunately, rhino horn remains in great demand fetching staggeringly high prices. It

goes into dagger handles in the mistaken belief that it gives added killing power, and is much sought after for its supposed healing and aphrodisiac properties.

Much of the money Michael has raised is going towards the establishment and running of Rhino Sanctuaries where they can be given greater protection. There are two in Kenya. The Nakuru Rhino Sanctuary received E4500 and the Laikipia Rhino Ranch E5000.

EMERGENCY PROJECTS

In addition E1,947 went to assisting emergency anti-poaching projects at Kibwezi, and E1,989 towards the study of Black Rhino in Nairobi National Park. The Lake Nakuru National Park received E1,104 for the study of feeding strategies of Black Rhino there.

Michael was recently away for nearly a month in England, Germany and Switzerland undertaking a 'pilot study' for his next project.

His European 'Save The Rhino'

Trek will take about four months and will be across five countries in Europe all having strong tourism ties with Kenya.

Michael hopes that before leaving he will be able to meet some of the tour operators here who will be able to give him information about the countries he will be visiting so that he can make contact with those concerned with tourism there.

Recently, the British High Commissioner in Nairobi, John Johnson, presented Michael with a 'Certificate of Appreciation' from the World Society for the Protection of Animals.

Michael had been unable to get to Luxembourg to receive it. It was most unfortunate, for he was among five recipients, the award being for 'distinguished service to the cause of animal protection'.

Other recipients were all members of the European Parliament.

The presentation had taken place at an Awards Banquet during the WSPA's World Con-

ference in the prestigious European Conference Centre - the Plateau de Kirchberg, Luxembourg.

Michael's citation read 'in recognition of his 800 km walk from Mombasa to Nairobi followed by a 2080 km walk through Kenya, Uganda and Tanzania to draw attention to East Africa's threatened wildlife, and rhinos in particular.

During his travels he faced much personal danger and inhospitable country. In undertaking these walks he not only raised money for rhino protection but in doing so highlighted the plight of this critically endangered species'.

In Kenya, Michael has also been honoured with awards and certificates from Boots, Guinness, East Africa Wildlife Society and the David Sheldrick Memorial Award.

While in Europe, Michael found great enthusiasm and response from companies and associations for his projected trek. One of the top shoe com-

panies in the UK - Clark's - has already offered to provide him with comfortable walking shoes.

In the UK Michael was interviewed by radio and TV, and in Germany by the press.

He said he would like to stop overnight at Youth Hostels so that he can meet young people from all over the world. Michael is hoping to find someone who can give him information about joining this association and of acquiring a map showing where such hostels are to be found.

Michael, 30, is a Security Supervisor with AVA, Mombasa, and has very understanding employers who are themselves great conservationists and release him for his spectacular and gruelling 'Save the Rhino' efforts.

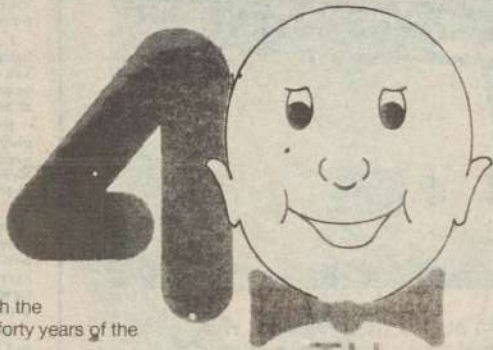

The Ministry of Health in conjunction with the United Nations Children's Fund are celebrating forty years of the formation of UNICEF.

"I believe that children are our most precious resource", said His Excellency President Daniel Arap Moi.

"Children are a family's and indeed a nation's most precious resource". Yet 125 of every 1,000 children born in Kenya die during the first year of life. Many more are repeatedly sick, or malnourished or disabled by disease which could be prevented. This tragic loss could be drastically reduced if new steps are taken in the improvement of health for much larger numbers of children. The new measures do not require highly specialized medical care based on sophisticated technology but on a system of primary health care which relies on active communities backed by well trained community health workers and a well organised health programme.

Accelerated Child Survival and Development can be achieved through a partnership between government workers and the community, voluntary contributions and involvement of trade unions, religious organizations, secular voluntary agencies, women's organizations and youth movements. Many of these are now adopting development as their goal.

The combined efforts of all the above could speed up the growth of communities' self reliance in organising for their own health and improving child nutrition by making better use of available resources.

The Ministry of Health, in conjunction with the United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF), is committed to work with these agencies to achieve such development for the improved welfare of mothers and children towards reduction of High Infant Mortality Rates. UNICEF and the World Health Organization (WHO) are promoting 4 simple technologies that could lead to drastic reductions in infant death if adopted by most families. The letters GOBI have been used to stand for the four practices recommended, i.e. Growth Monitoring, Oral Rehydration Therapy, Breast Feeding and Immunization.

It is in recognition of the importance of Primary Health Care that Kenya Posts and Telecommunications Corporation has issued a postage stamp to commemorate the 40th anniversary of UNICEF in Kenya.

DATELINE: DAR ES SALAAM

Improved Communication Plan To Boost Overall Economic Recovery

VARIOUS MEASURES are underway to improve transport facilities in the country under an economic recovery programme launched here last June with an aim to improve the country's Communication network by the year 1989. The Dar es Salaam transport company (UDA) and the national bus services (KAMATA) are soon expected to receive some 65 new buses to alleviate transport problems in the city. UDA will get 45 of the new buses whilst KAMATA, new plagued with serious financial problems, will get 20 buses.

Efforts are also being made to encourage private bus owners to provide bus services in the city. At present it is estimated that there are 365 such private buses in the city but from long queues witnessed at bus stations it is evident that a bigger fleet of buses is required in the city. Under the same recovery pro-

Meanwhile the country's president, Ali Hassan Mwinyi, called on Tanzanians to make 1987 a year of renewed strength and determination in tackling the country's current economic problems.

He pointed out that there were good signs of recovery last year and that this recovery should motivate people to increase agricultural and industrial production.

In the past year, the country's food situation has improved substantially thereby enabling a saving of foreign exchange. Cash crop production has also increased with cotton recording a bumper harvest not witnessed over the past few years.

programme, feasibility studies are soon to be carried out on the possibility of introducing train services and motor trolleys in the city in order to alleviate transport problems. Several countries are reported to have shown interest to assist, including Yugoslavia.

At the Dar es Salaam port, the Depth of the anchorage is to be increased from 6.5 to 12.1 metres. This will facilitate vessels of more than 60,000 tonnes to anchor instead of the present maximum weight capacity of 20,000 tonnes.

This work is to be carried out through a world bank soft loan as part of a programme to improve the handling capacity of the Dar es Salaam port for landlocked frontline states other countries in Southern Africa. The port work is due for completion in 1988.

'Getting Over An Eight-Year Paralysis ...'

Last year's performance was a contrast to the crisis eight years that prevailed, during which the country's economic activity was almost paralysed.

The economic sector was then starved of inputs and the little crop harvested could not be ferried from villages to export centres due to transportation snags.

The industrial sector, also starved of foreign exchange had its capacity utilisation cal down to as low as 20 per cent.

All in all it was a difficult task we all agree and while it was a good job over-all, there are just some of the things that may have escaped their scrutiny.

To the staff of the Council I wish to ask them to take their work even more seriously and especially considering that 1987 has been declared "the year of discipline" by His Excellency the President.

All should strive to render services adequately and in a dedicated manner.

In height of the problems we have had to face with regard to the roads, the Engineer has been requested to make adequate provisions in the next budget to ensure that the roads are kept in good condition.

We on our part are trying to keep the town clean and we here ask for the cooperation of the public in doing so.

The cleansing section has endeavoured to remove rubbish from places where it has been piling up.

At the same time I am led to understand that some businessmen are using the men from cleansing as if they were their employees. They pay them money to have their places kept clean.

If these people are found, they will be dealt with accordingly.

All in all, we hope to continue promoting services to the town residents and with the new year spirit, improve on these services!

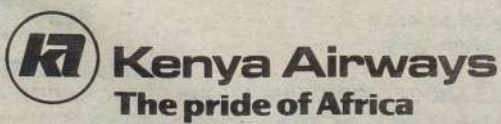

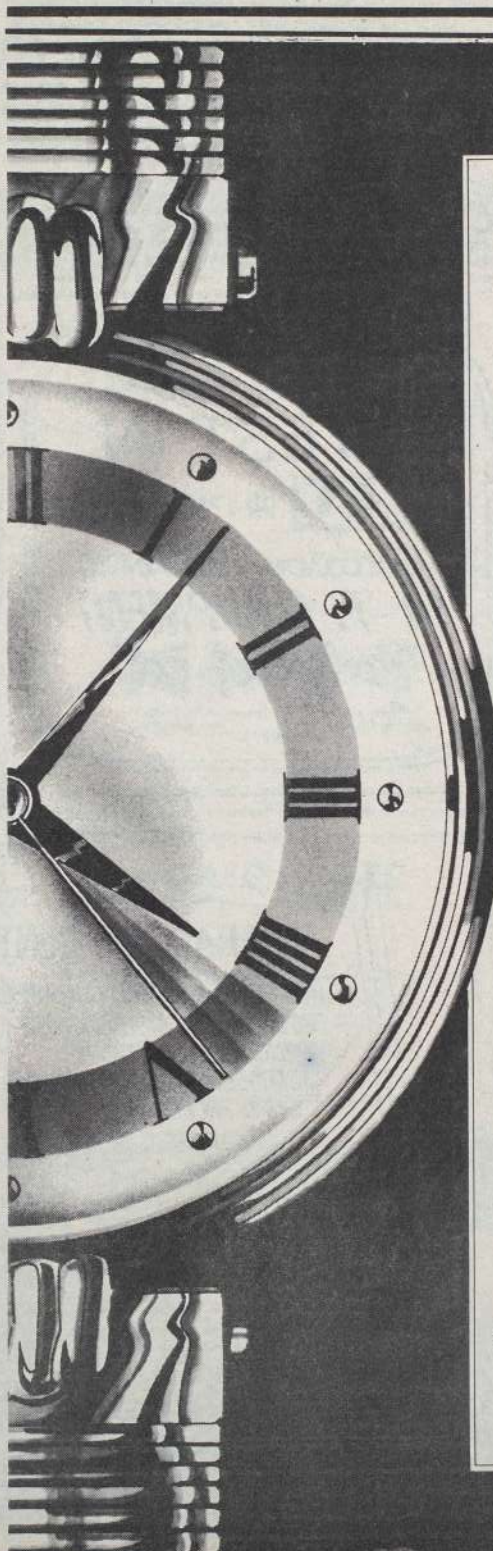

Port Workers' Go-Slow Has Kept Berths Occupied ...

THE AFTERMATH of the holidays coupled with the port workers' go-slow has tended to keep berths occupied for most of the time. This weekend three vessels are due to load some 4500 tons Kenya maize destined for countries as far apart as South Korea and Mozambique. The *Happy Valley* is due tomorrow to load 15000 tons for Inchon, S. Korea, the *Atlantic Mariner* back for a return visit, to load 15000 tons also for South Korea and finally the Panamanian registered bulker *Leona* to load 14000 tons for Maputo.

Meantime the poor old *Sphinx* remains at the buoys gathering barnacles whilst she awaits the go-ahead to load her 14000 ton cargo of Lobito bound Kenya Maize.

This vessel has now been moored at the buoys for over one month whilst loading-documentation problems are resolved which to date seem to show no such positive signs.

Amongst the seven vessels waiting to berth in the early part of the week, four of them for their own convenience, was a mixed sugar-fertiliser discharger, the 5 year old Bahamas registered *Merchant Pilot* with 17200 tons Sugar and 4800 tons Fertiliser, both parcels for Kenya consumption.

SUGAR DISCHARGER

Another sugar discharger due on Tuesday or Wednesday this week was the 14800 deadweight ton Greek vessel *Free Wave* with 13000 tons from Santos, Brazil. Apparently this is transit sugar probably destined for Uganda.

The first cruise vessel of 1987 arrived alongside Mbaraki jetty on Monday for a 3 day call

although hardly of "QE 2" proportions. She was the 3750 ton 24 year old *Illiria*, Greek owned, on an Indian Ocean cruise from the Mediterranean. Her previous port of call had been Kismayu and her next landfall on sailing Mombasa was Zanzibar.

A smart looking vessel with lines of a motor yacht and certainly not looking her age, she called here last year at about this time. Mackenzie Maritime Ltd. are the appointed agents.

The vessel is carrying only 91 passengers.

Mtongwe anchorage has gained a good reputation for fish transhipments and this week yet another operation has been taking place. The mother ship is the Japanese flag *Hikari Maru* which is loading 160 tons each from the Korean catchers boats *Tae Woong 501* and *Tae*

Woong 502; the mother ship will thereafter sail for Japan.

In my notes last week I mentioned the presence in port of the *Chang De* owned by China Ocean Shipping Co. (COSCO), the National Line of the Peoples Republic of China.

This vessel has been joined by the *Feng Huang Shan* which arrived at the buoys last Friday and has been waiting at her own convenience before berthing on Wednesday to discharge 3460 tons Jute Bags.

Yet another 50-50 Chinese-Tanzanian owned vessel has also been at buoys waiting to discharge 500 tons from the Far East. She is the 7 year old *Ruaha* which flies the Tanzanian flag and is registered in Dar es Salaam.

FLOATING 'LIBRARY' SHIP ARRIVES ON KENYA VISIT

THE "M.V. Doulos" was built in 1914 making her the world's oldest passenger ship afloat. Originally christened *Medina*, the ship was owned by Matsonia Steam Navigation Company and shipped onions from New York to Texas.

Later, based in Monrovia Liberia, she traded along the West

Coast of Africa. During the depression of the 1930s her name was changed to "River Medina" after the famous river in Texas, USA.

In World War II she was enlisted as part of Flotilla HX-84, where she was among the first to meet German naval units off the West Coast of Ireland.

In 1941 having changed her name back to plain "Medina", the ship shot down a Junker 52 aeroplane just south of the Canary Islands.

Her war service spread worldwide and in 1946 after receiving an honourable discharge, she returned to the United States to await scrapping.

CARIBBEAN CRUISES

This might easily have been the end of the "Medina", but her old owners the Matsonia line re-purchased her, renamed her "Roma" and after many months of work getting her back into shape she was brought back to Monrovia taking passengers on Caribbean cruises.

Because of financial difficulties 15 of Matsonia's oldest ships had to be sold, the "Roma" was among these. At this time the scrapyard seemed to be the "Roma's" last destination.

But once again the "Roma"

was saved from scrapping, the Costa Line of Italy purchased her. Over a period of 18 months major changes were made.

The steam engine was replaced with a diesel motor and six passenger decks were built with two berth cabins.

For the following three years she sailed around the Mediterranean under the new name of "Franca C". In 1958 she underwent more changes, a swimming pool, cinema and small casino were also installed for greater comfort of her passengers.

The "Franca C" then sailed on a regular service from Naples, Italy to other Mediterranean ports. By 1977 the "Franca C" was definitely showing her age.

It was decided that the time had finally come to scrap her.

But on her last voyage representatives of the German company Gute Buecher Few All (Good Books For All) a charitable organisation which is part of an international Christian Mission, were investigating if she would be the suitable one they were looking for.

This was to be the second time she was rescued from destruction. Her name was changed to "Doulos", a Greek word used in the Bible meaning servant.

Once more changes were made the casino and swimming pool were replaced by conference facilities and the world's largest floating Book Shop.

Her volunteer crew and staff consists of 300 people coming from 40 different nations.

The "Doulos" has sailed twice around South America, visited Europe for 2 1/2 years and is currently on a circumnavigation of Africa before sailing to Asia.

Her sister ship the "M.A. Logos" which is three times smaller sailed along Africa coast twice and visited Mombasa in 1971 and 1977. The "Logos" is at present visiting Central America and is on its way to South America.

The book shop is open daily to the public, it has over 6000 titles covering topics such as science, dictionaries, teaching aids, cooking, hobbies, sports novels, children's books, Bibles and Christian Literature.

All these books are for sale in Kenyan Shilling.

The "Doulos" will also be having conferences and film shows on board in her large conference lounges.

Small teams will be involved in meetings, rallies and sharing on shore about their culture and life changing experiences.

The public have been invited to visit the world's largest Book Shop with her international crew which is visiting Mombasa for the first time from 15th January till 2nd February 1987.

The "Doulos" will be berthed at Mbaraki Wharf (Lilioni Ferry).

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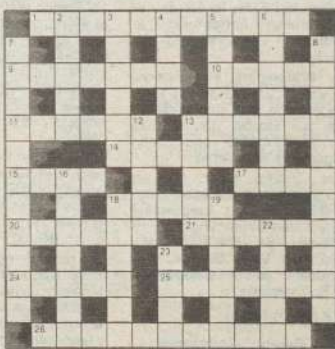

The presentation was witnessed by the chairman and members of the Works Committee.

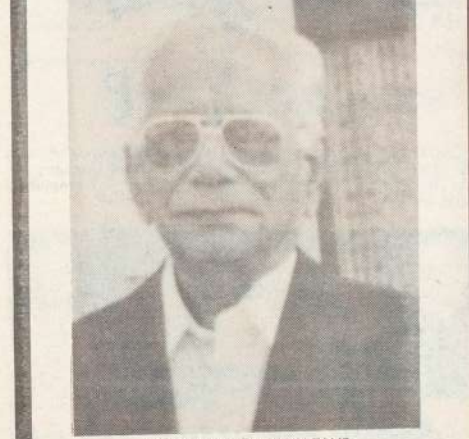

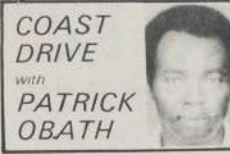
I was on my way to see him when I came across this mass of people enjoying their Sunday morning marathon.
