'Big Daddy' Ruegg Sets Something Of A Kenya Record!

KENYA as a tourist destination for many nationals of the World is a well known fact. Also well known is its variety of wild game, panoramic view of its mountains and undulating plains.

To cap it all, the friendliness of its people is presumably the best on the continent of Africa.

Nobody is perhaps better informed about all these claims than Jacob Ruegg, a retired Swiss Air Cabin design engineer who together with his wife Marcelle have visited the country 27 times.

Big Daddy admits, 'I enjoy certain privileges personal to myself because I am treated as an honoured guest'.

Mayor Cuts Travel Costs

— NOW ONE OF MAYORAL MERCEDES BENZ MUST GO!

MAYOR AHMED MWIDANI is giving up the comfort of one of his posh cars - because the hard-up Municipal Council cannot afford the cost of repairs and maintenance of two Mercedes Benz for the holder of the highest office in Mombasa.

The move comes in the wake of the council's growing concern for its dwindling finances and at a time when its shaken refuse collection and fire-fighting capability has come under strong criticism.

Council elders recommended that the old car - registration No. KJW 219 - should be sold by tender and the proceeds utilised to buy a new small car for the

mayor.

Prompted by the Municipal Engineer's report that the total cost of repairs for the aging Mercedes 200 would amount to KShs. 161,453.60, the Councillors resolved that the Mayor should replace the white civic car with a car that is less costly to maintain.

"It's a junk car," said acting Town Clerk Maurice Mumba "the one that Councillors feel should be disposed of and replaced by a more efficient and less costly car."

Mr. Mumba pointed out that the decision is part of a major move by the Council to phase out all unserviceable vehicles and seek funds to replace them.

It is also linked to the Council's decision to improve its refuse collection services and fire-fighting equipment, currently immobilised, following complaints from Mombasa residents, and after the recent Reef Hotel fire which the Council fire department was unable to stop.

NEW REQUIREMENTS

The Council, facing growing disaffection for its failing services, also ordered its engineers and the treasurer to detail requirements for the two departments and seek sources of funds to improve their services.

Mr Mumba did not disclose what type of a car the Town Hall had in mind for the mayor, who has always been seen driven around town in his new sleek black Mercedes Benz and

Skin Problems

There are several skin conditions that may commonly trouble your pet. Here are some:

Eczema: Eczema is an inflammatory skin condition characterised by redness and formation of blisters on the skin which burst open and discharge pus or watery substances. This discharge moistens the skin and causes development of scales or crusts which mat in the hair, irritating the skin, and causing further infection. Eczema usually affects the root of the tail, the back, shoulders, neck and behind the ears. Eczema has many causes including the accumulation of dirt on the animal's skin and its irritation, over-feeding [probably the most serious forms of eczema occur in overfed, fat animals] or by allergies. It may well be inherited. Some animals are more susceptible than others. The most common signs of eczema are itching and scratching and the eventual formation of crusting blisters.

'BLOOD SUCKERS'
External parasites: Fleas. These are the hard-bodied, wingless, bloodsucking insects whose constant biting causes extreme irritation. In addition their saliva appears to contain a substance to which many small animals are highly sensitive.

In severe infestation the characteristic symptoms of loss of hair and inflammation of the skin may appear anywhere on the body. However, these signs are most common over the hind quarters during the early stages. Fleas can be involved in maintaining and spreading tapeworm infestations.

Lice: Small, wingless, flat insects, they irritate the skin and occasionally cause anaemia. Like fleas, they irritate the skin and lice may also be implicated in the spread of tapeworms in cats and dogs. Some lice

penetrate the skin and suck blood.

Others may irritate the skin and scrape it raw with their sharp claws. Itching and the resultant scratching by the animal may cause further inflammation and infection.

Mites: These are tiny parasites, often microscopic in size, that cause mange. Two common types are Sarcopites (scabies) mites, which cause crusty sores, and Demodex (follicular or red) mites which infect the follicles from which hair grows and cause reddening of the skin.

Mite infestation sometimes results in pus-filled pimples on the skin. The most prominent signs of mite infestations are intense itching, dandruff, loss of hair, redness of the skin.

As their name suggest ear mites attach themselves to the tender lining of the ear canal and may multiply to such an extent that they block it completely. The signs first appear about the head, face and ears, they spread to other areas of the body.

Fatty acid deficiency: In dogs, cats, coarse hair, thickening of the skin and formation of horny tissue can result from the inadequate absorption of unsaturated fatty acids.

These symptoms are often observed in small animals that receive diets containing adequate numbers of calories but insufficient fatty acids.

A five per cent fat level in dog food is considered sufficient for many physiological functions, but a dietary level of 12 to 15 per cent fat is probably more realistic.

Cats may require a level as high as 25 per cent. The diet should include equal amounts of animal and vegetable fats in order to provide the necessary fatty acid content for skin and coat health.

HOSPITAL CAN NOW ARRANGE AIDS TEST

MOMBASA (KNA) The Coast Provincial General Hospital, is now capable of screening all blood received at the hospital for the killer virus AIDS before transfusion.

Receiving screening equipment for the acquired Immuned Deficiency Syndrome (AIDS) from the Kenya Red Cross Society the Provincial Medical Officer, Dr Aineah Oyoo noted that its presence would now prevent the possible transmission of the deadly disease through transfusion of blood to patients.

Dr Oyoo conceded that the previous method used by the hospital to screen Aids patients was time consuming and caused a lot of undue worry and pain to the patient before the results were received from Kenyatta National Hospital, Nairobi.

He noted that the equipment would, through tests on a select group, also be used for screening the population to adduce those prone to the disease and the extent of the spread. He added that the province was a major entry point of Aids virus and needed to have specific statistics on the disease.

The PMO, who was presented with the equipment by the deputy secretary general of the Kenya Red Cross Society, Mrs Leah Wanjama, was accompanied by the hospital chief administrator, Dr Mnjala and the provincial pathologist, Dr. K. Mandaliva.

The screening equipment, costing approximately Kshs. 220,000 comprises of an incubator, washing machine in which the blood is washed and dyed. The third machine, a photometric reading machine will also provide a print out of the information derived from the test.

Mrs Wanjama, thanked the Norwegian Agench for Development (NORAD) and the Norwegian Red Cross for their assistance in acquiring the machines and putting up the information campaign for the disease.

Also present was the development delegate from the league of Red Cross and Red Crescent International, Mr Nils Eklund and the Mombasa branch chairman Mr. A.A. Molu.

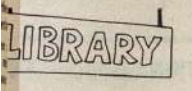



'Indefinite Postponement' For Plans To Expand Air Tanzania

AMBITIOUS PLANS announced in October last year by the national airline carrier, Air Tanzania, to commence inter-continental flights from April this year have now been put off and this was confirmed this week by the airline's Manager, Silva Rwebangira.

The manager said that the postponement was indefinite and had resulted due to lack of foreign and local funds to support the envisaged operations.

The Corporation had been liaising with some foreign firms to buy or lease a wide-bodied aircraft such as the Boeing 747, Boeing 767 or DC 10 and had also requested the Government to help it secure some 350 million shillings in foreign exchange and about 50 million shillings in local currency.

Rwebangira has said that Air Tanzania is now studying the possibility of cooperating with other airlines such as the Zambia Airways, British Airways and the Mozambican Airline LAM to cover the same routes.

Under that agreement, Caledonian Airlines leased two planes, a Boeing 728-B and a Boeing 707, to Air Tanzania for the latter to be operating inter-continental flights to Europe and Asia.

The planes were bought but the Government terminated the agreement in early 1981 after it was discovered that Tanzania was losing through the deal and that some of the equipment provided by the Caledonian Airlines was actually defective.

On the local circuit, the airline is also having problems with frequent suspensions and cancellations of flights and local travellers have repeatedly called for better services and

more punctual timetables. But the bitter fact is that while the air passengers traffic has been increasing year after year, the airline's capacity has been declining all along.

The airline's fleet is too small to even operate along domestic routes in a vast Tanzania that is as big as Kenya, Uganda and Malawi combined and the situation becomes even worse when the ageing and overworked fleet has to undergo repairs in or out of the country.

The airline is also operating regional flights to places as far away as Dubai and this presses the airline's operations even further.

Meanwhile the Central Motor Vehicles Permit Committee has warned that it will not consider applications for passenger vehicles brought into the country without a valid permit.

VEHICLE IMPORTS

The notice said that all those who had imported vehicles with a carrying capacity of not more than one tonne or with a seating capacity of not more than 16 persons would not have their applications considered.

The Motor Vehicle (Requisitions and Dispositions) Act of 1972 restricts the importation of cars to permit holders only.

ZANZIBAR PRESIDENT, Idris Abdul Wakil, this week warned Government leaders against discriminatory tendencies, individualism and nepotism at places of work. He also decried favouritism in employment which he said was being noted bitterly by the public in Zanzibar.

Wakil spoke at length on the negative effects of individualism which he said would tarnish Zanzibar's image if allowed to continue unabated. He also called upon leaders to enhance communications between themselves, saying that this is necessary in running government programmes effectively.

The Zanzibar president said that leaders should be congratulated on achievable performances but should be taken to task for any fallacy at their places of work.

Meanwhile the Brussel based Centre for Development of Industry (CDI) has agreed in principle to assist Zanzibar locate investment partners with whom to undertake joint ventures in small and medium industries or to rehabilitate ailing state run manufacturing enterprises.

The Centre is also reported to have endorsed the idea of co-financing studies to restructure the isles industrial sector particularly the units producing sugar, cigarettes and the small scale industrial estates.

The CDI was set up in 1977 under the Lome convention with a responsibility of assisting Africa, Caribbean and Pacific (ACP) countries to consolidate or establish manufacturing industries.

The Centre has advised the Zanzibar Government to identify feasible industrial projects for which the Centre could offer consultancy services and find sources to finance the projects.

The Centre showed special interest in ailing state run factories because their revival would create more employment and also exploit local resources rather than depending on imported raw materials.

The Managing Director introduced the General Manager (Operations), Mr. Aggrey Amon, the General Manager (Finance),

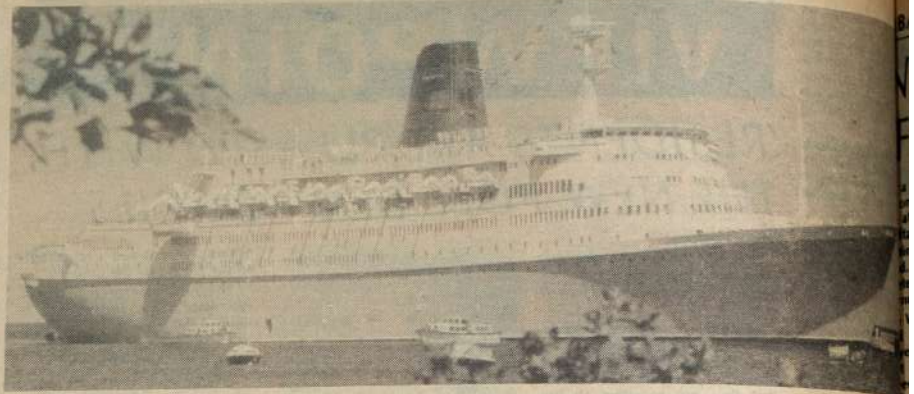

Bulk Loaders Waiting Off Po

AFTER A period of maize loaders arriving in quick succession it seems as if a much needed lull has occurred although in the earlier part of the week there were still five vessels in port due to load some 44000 tons; these vessels are indicated by the Kenya Ports Authority as waiting at ship's convenience or at their own convenience.

The longest waiting vessel is

SHIPPING with JOHN WALTERS

The North Korean *Mu Du Bong*; this 3 year old bulker due to load 8700 tons has now been waiting at the buoys for over 5 weeks.

Another vessel the Panamanian *Leona* was expected to re-berth at the end of last week after the *Atlantic Mariner* had loaded her full maize cargo but instead of which the fertiliser discharger *Atlantic Confidence*, which arrived on the 20th Feb and had a relatively short wait, took the vacant berth. Meantime the *Leona*, half loaded after being removed from No. 12 berth to make way for the *Happy Valley*, patiently waits to load the other half.

The *New Diana* another fertiliser discharger also berthed relatively quickly on 28th Feb., at No. 10 after arriving 24th.

Up to mid month there is only maize loader due that is another North Korean vessel the 13000 d.w.ton *Hyok Sin* built in 1958 so quite an old lady alongside her fellow countryman at the buoys. The *Hyok Sin* is due to load 12000 tons yellow maize for the Far East and it remains to be seen how long she can expect to wait.

Hopefully however the number of waiting days for non-maize loaders and excluding vessels earmarked for the container terminal should gradually reduce.

JAPANESE VESSEL

The current Japanese NYK vessel on the coast and waiting to berth this weekend after her arrival last Saturday is the 9 year old 24000 d.w. ton *Wakatake Maru* which has 7000 tons to discharge at Mombasa from the Far East. She has already discharged at the container terminal leaving 100 motor vehicles and general cargo to discharge.

This vessel on her way to East Africa is fitted with heavy derrick capable of 350 tons. After her arrival on the coast she returns to Mombasa early April.

Due on Monday is the 25000 ton Chinese vessel *Sagafjord* for a call on arrival from the East on a world cruise stop Madagascar. She is as long ago as 1965 yet a modern sleek well built appearance.

She flies the Bahamian flag. Unfortunately I shall not see her as I will be out of town for the short time she is here.

D.O.A.L. FREIGHT

Also due on Monday is the 3 year old German M/V vessel *Wadai* of 17000 tons operating on the D.O.A.L. from the N.W. Coast on single outward voyage.

This vessel was on her West African Service for time and resulting in connection now flies the flag of Togo, a West African country where the vessel is registered with resultant cost benefit.

The *Wadai* has 100 general cargo to discharge at Hamburg and Antwerp already called at Durban and Tanga.

BUCH ÜBER DIE EISENBAHN AM ÄQUATOR

EIN NEUES Buch über die kenianische Eisenbahn ist in Kenia Ende Februar erschienen, drei Wochen, bevor es in Großbritannien publiziert worden ist.

Das Buch "RAILWAY ACROSS THE EQUATOR", geschrieben von Alastair Matheson, enthält 120 Farbfotos von Mohamed Amin und Duncan Willets sowie 45 historische Bilder aus dem Eisenbahnarchiv über den Bau der Bahnlinie und ihre frühen Tage.

Die deutsche Ausgabe dieses Buches erschien ebenfalls noch im Februar in der Schweiz und in der Bundesrepublik Deutschland unter dem Titel "UGANDABAHN".

Alastair Matheson erläutert in seinem Buch die umfassendste und spannendste Geschichte, die je über diese Eisenbahn erzählt worden ist - von der Vorgeschichte und den Gründen, die zum Bau geführt haben, über die Konstruktion und über die folgenden 91 Jahre bis in die heutige Zeit (1987).

Es war um die Jahrhundertwende, als die sogenannte "verrückte Eisenbahn" im Jahre 1900 den Äquator erreichte. Die ersten Schienenstränge waren weit weg am Ufer des Indischen Ozeans vier Jahre früher, am 30. Mai 1896, verlegt worden.

Als Winston Churchill mit der Bahn später die 581 Meilen bis zum Victoriasee, dem Binnenmeer im Herzen Afrikas, zurücklegte, nannte er sie "die romantischste Eisenbahn der Welt". Diese Bahnlinie führt von Meereshöhe am Ufer des Indischen Ozeans auf rund 3000 m bei Mau Summit und wieder hinunter zum Victoriasee auf 1200 m ü.M.

Obwohl sie von den englischen Politikern damals als "Lunatic Line" bezeichnet wurde, erwies sich die Kenianische Eisenbahn als einer der bewährtesten und dauerhaftesten Schienenwege der Welt.

FÜR EISENBAHNFREUNDE

Das Buch wurde vom Verlag Bodley Head in London herausgegeben. 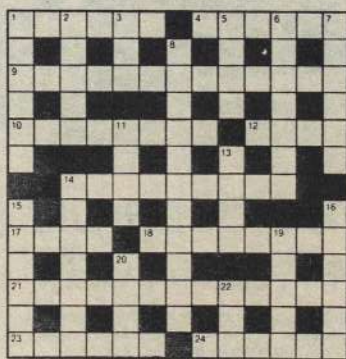

It's Time To Call An End To All This Vandalism!

ONE of the most common targets for vandals is the neighbourhood telephone booth. I can never understand why an instrument that has been located to serve the Mwananchi should be the object of so much hate.

One day it stands there, gleaming pillar box red complete with glass on three sides and a brand new push button phone.

A few weeks later, the glass is gone or broken, the paint is falling off and the hand set has been pulled from the box.

Kachumbari tries to explain this by saying that in most neighbourhoods one will always find a pack of misfits. The saying goes that boys will be boys.

So these misfits find they have plenty of time on their hands and hardly any money to spend. What precious little they have is occasionally used to make phone calls.

Somehow the coinbox seems to be very choosy about the kind of money it will accept. Bent coins (yes these exist) are swallowed with no reaction by the voice cut in feature in the telephone.

One shilling gone and no communication.

No wonder these people get frustrated and at some stage decide to 'do the booth in' in return for the lost shilling.

Sometimes the coinbox has nothing to do with it. One of the misfits inserts some object into the coin slot and coin after coin goes in without any effect.

Six attempts later one gives up and this misfit comes and retrieves the coins. What this type of treatment does to the innards of a telephone one hates to imagine but it happens!

Because of this, those who provide these and other essential services are at their wits end on what to do.

One person who comes out of this quandary with the most

The problem most of our councils in this country have is the foresight to plan that the amenities provided can be maintained to a reasonable standard once installed.

Kachumbari tells me of the many occasions he has rushed into public loos at various places in the country and ended up dancing on tip-toe round the room!

One has to have high capacity lungs to enable them to take a deep breath before entry, hold it for as long as they're in there and then take the next breath once back in fresh air.

The vandals also attack these buildings. Pipes are disconnected, taps removed, flush systems decimated and lighting ripped out. And they don't stop at that.

I remember being with Kachumbari somewhere in the nether regions of Nairobi and going round a shanty area to look up our roots relatives.

Whilst carefully walking through the narrow alleyways we came across this kiosk that looked like a City Council road sign dump.

This was a wooden structure with mabati walls. The sheeting on the walls consisted of new and old road signs whose origins were determinate. At different angles one could read "International Airport A 109", "Jeng-One", "reside dri", and so forth.

On enquiry from the grizzly occupant of the kiosk as to the origin of this building material he told us that on his daily tour of the City his grandson (for that read vandal) "collected" bits of metal sheeting from all sorts of places and brought them to him.

One imagines that most signposts knocked down in accidents would end up in this type of area but not the accident damaged ones get repaired but are not good enough.

The vandals look for brand new straight ones and remove them for their own use.

Kachumbari tells me that bus shelters also suffer the same fate. Various charitable and marketing organisations put up bus shelters for the wananchi. The bright people, the smooth way to go places, various soup mixes, hand lotions and so forth are advertised.

The quickest and cheapest way of putting up shelters is to prefabricate them and only bring them to site and install them.

Inevitably they are made in sheet metal - building material ready to be vandalised.

GOOD INTENTIONS

All this means that people with honourable intentions have to pour money into areas that most people appreciate the service and misguided few see as manna from heaven.

As Kachumbari says, if only these vandals could stop ripping amenities apart, perhaps the day will come when the various organisations would put up amenities for motorists at strategic locations on the Highways.
