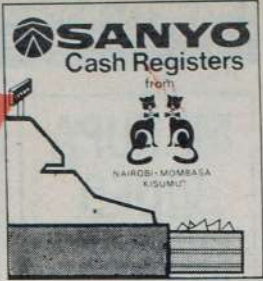

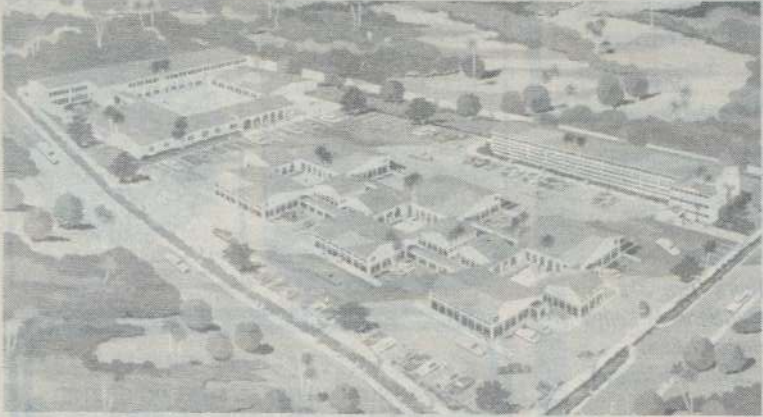

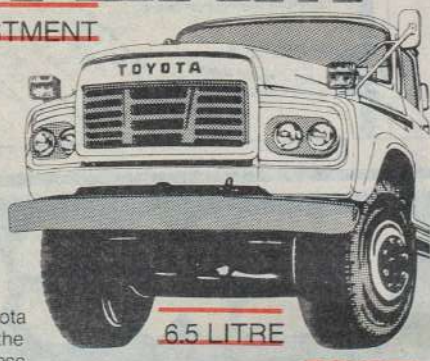

JADINI HOST CONFERENCE

A WORKSHOP on 'Designing and Writing Distance Education Materials for Basic Education and Development Training Programmes' is presently taking place in Jadini Beach Hotel's Conference Centre ending on March 15.

There are forty participants mainly from Teacher Training Colleges in Kenya, while two are from the Institute of In-Service Teacher Training in Somalia and two from the National Correspondence Institute, Tanzania.

It is the third in a series of workshops jointly organised by the College of Adult and Distance Education (CADE) of the University of Nairobi and the German Foundation for International Development (DSE) and is the second to take place at Jadini.

It is very 'intensive' and during their two weeks there participants have also to complete writing a small booklet of about 50-60 pages which relates to the needs of their institute or college. Materials developed at this workshop will be used for training teachers who are already working in primary and secondary schools, and being to help them obtain their Teacher's Certificate.

Said Mr. Kalfan, Workshop Co-ordinator and Lecturer 'they can study at home yet be tutored by Lecturers in this particular instance mainly from CADE'. 'Occasionally he expects they come into residential sessions during holidays. They have radio programmes to support printed study materials.

The Faculty includes members from CADE - Mazrui; B. Gitau; J. Kamau; Matiri; D. Gachuki; Odunde. The DSE is headed by Mr. A. Dietrich, additional expertise comes from Dr. W. Laaser from the Universitat, Hagen, Germany.

Indonesian 'Food Festival' Is A Big Draw At Shanzu

THE INDONESIAN Festival at Mombasa's Hotel Inter-Continental was magnificent - encapsulating in one evening something of the culture, cuisine, couture of ethnic and modern Indonesia.

The Republic of Indonesia, with a population of 170 million, boasts of having the largest archipelago in the world in which are more than 13,000 islands.

The Indonesian Festival, probably the first to be staged in Africa, was arranged by the Hotel Inter-Continental group in conjunction with the Indonesian Embassy and KLM.

A group of eleven artistes, craftsmen and chefs from Indonesia came to Kenya especially to help present this festival. Leading them was Mr. Soerjono who had been sent by his country's Department of Foreign Affairs.

The Festival which ran for ten days at Nairobi's Hotel Inter-Continental was a great success, followed by five equally successful days at Mombasa.

Among the VIP guests on Opening Night was the Mayor and Mayoress of Mombasa, Councillor Ahmed Mwidani and his wife, Zubeda, the Indonesian Ambassador to Kenya, who also represents the Seychelles, Mr. R. Kusumasmoro and his wife, Tati, several members of the Consular Corps and many leading personalities at the Coast, as well as hotel guests from many parts of the world.

The Festival was officially opened by the Mayor, who told the Ambassador and team from Indonesia 'we must emphasise how glad and happy we are to have you here, the basic aim of the Festival being to introduce Indonesian culture to Kenya while aiming to strengthen relations between the two countries'.

The Festival took place on the hotel's spacious Banquet Terrace, which now has a permanent stage, with the talented Simba Six entertaining.

Under a spotlight there, Mr. A.A. Raha Sutawaya from Indonesia could be seen busily engaged in sculpting a Goddess from wood as well as answering many questions from interested guests, while Ms. Musanati was completely engrossed in the delicate art of Batik painting - an ancient handicraft which originated in Java and an industry which Indonesia is bent on preserving and rejuvenating.

Demonstrations during the five day Festival were also given in the hotel lobby.

The Fashion Show revealed

how Batik designs are being incorporated into dashing 'with it' gear, thus helping expand this industry to meet the needs of today's fashion conscious women.

There was a spectacular and lavish buffet of Indonesian cuisine, while all waiters were wearing shirts with a batik design and "Peci" hats.

The fashion show was a great success, the models being from Kenya and Indonesia, this being interspersed with a feast of entertainment by Indonesian dancers and singers.

Particularly popular was the colourful, flirty, Gandrung dance by Abbi, Dewi and Yani depicting young girls who are falling in love and trying to attract a young man's attention.

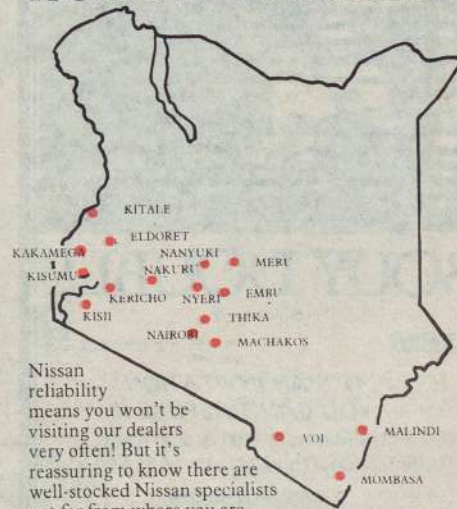

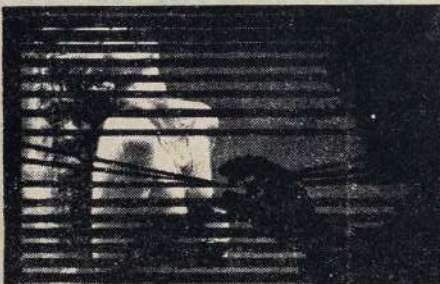

'Women Should Consider All Roles Open To Follow'

MOMBASA (KNA) Women should not consider themselves limited to certain roles, but should realize that there were many options open to them, the wife of American Consul in Mombasa Mrs Bonnie Schmiel has said.

She called on them to pursue every avenue of talent and interest regardless of past restrictions.

Mrs Schmiel was addressing the Mombasa business and professional womens club on the occasion of the candle lighting ceremony at the Hotel Inter-continental.

The ceremony was attended by among others the coast PC Mr Simeon Mungala, the American Consul Mr Schmeil, the Norwegian Consul in Mombasa Mrs Aase Sondhi.

Saying that there were many examples of success on the part of women, Mrs Schmiel observed that women were now pursuing careers formerly thought to be restricted to men, citing women business executives, doctors, lawyers, professors, diplomats and accountants who could be found allover the world.

She further cited more examples of womens' important role in the world: the American Ambassador to Kenya, the Indian High Commissioner in Nairobi and the Kenya High Commission to London were all women, she said.

She said a club like the Kenya Business and Professional Women was very useful in bringing women together in matters of development as it was a necessary forum for information

sharing.

She posed a challenge to the club to find out what they could do to the less educated who lived in rural areas so that they too could help build a better world for themselves.

Speaking at the same ceremony, Mr Mungalla praised the club for the good work they were doing to improve the welfare of women noting that most projects started, organised and run by women were in most cases successful. He cited Maendeleo Ya Wanawake as an example of womens organisations that have succeeded.

He also appealed to the Mombasa branch to strive to reach as many women in the rural areas who were struggling to survive by doing petty businesses such as selling charcoal, eggs among others.

CHAIRPERSON

In her message the national chairperson of the club Mrs Beth Mugo said that as they rededicate themselves by lighting the candles of solidarity and communion with other 70 clubs in the world, they should vow to promote and help all others and advance themselves.

She said every member of the club had a role in changing the world into a better place not only for women but for the whole mankind.

Also present was the Mombasa branch chairman Mrs Elvina Mutua.

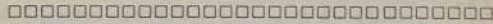

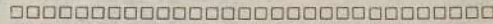

Kenyan Maize Shipments Continue Through Kilindini

THE SHIPMENT of Kenya maize through the port of Mombasa has entered its tenth week at Kilindini. At least 70,000 tons of Kenyan maize were handled in January and February this year - loaded onto 12 vessels heading for different destinations that have included parts of Southern Africa, the Horn of Africa, the Indian Ocean islands and the Far East.

The order for March still awaiting loading is now in the neighbourhood of 60,000 tons as six maize loaders wait for berth at the port this week.

As mentioned by Mombasa's shipping think tank John Walters last week, the North Korean *Mu Du Bong* remains the longest waiting maize loader since her arrival January 22 to load 8,700 tons for Assab, Ethiopia on charter by the United Nations World Food Programme (UNWFP).

PANAMA VESSEL

She was joined later by *Magdalena Mare* to load (6,500 tons), *Promina* (12,000 tons), and Panamanian *Leona* to load 6,333 tons.

Recent arrivals have been *Y. Jiang* (10,000 tons) and *Hyko Sin* which arrived March 3 to load 12,000 tons.

At the same time the number of vessels lodging at the port's mooring basin soared to a new high early this week.

Tourism Authority Moves To Improve Service From Its Hotels

THE TANZANIA Tourist Corporation (TTC) this week gave full autonomy to the various hotels under it, in a move aimed towards improving efficiency. Until now, hotels had to refer to the TTC on whatever little decisions they had to make and the new move is expected to alleviate interference of officials from the holding company who did not necessarily have the expertise to guide hotels.

The autonomy move will leave hotel managers with a responsibility of ensuring that their hotels do well and managers will be fully accountable for any failures.

Each of TTC's 15 hotels has now been registered as a subsidiary company and the holding company will no longer deal with the daily operations of the hotels.

It is however unclear as to what extent the managers can make their own decision and a clear cut policy to draw a line

upto which the hotel managers can make their own decisions has not been elaborated upon.

One hotel manager told *Coastweek* that he had not been advised on the extent of authority he had through this new move.

The TTC has also streamlined its head office with the directorates being scaled down to three from the previous five. The new directorates will be finance and administration, operations and planning and development.

These measures are based on the recommendations of the 1984 presidential commission on cost reduction

Employees Declared Redundant

Following the move, about 150 TTC staff are expected to lose their jobs. Previously the TTC had about 200 employees and the redundancy is expected to save costs and increase profits.

Meanwhile the 10 million dollars rehabilitation programme for the TTC hotels which was financed by the World Bank has been completed but work done is far short from what was originally envisaged when the feasibility study was executed in 1975.

The original plan included the repair of leaking roofs and pipes and to provide hot water, air conditioning and culinary equipment to boost the international standards of the deteriorated hotels.

The snag was that funds for the programme started flowing in 1982 which was seven years

'DEATH PENALTY BEING REPEALED FOR SMUGGLERS'

THE ISLE's death penalty on convicted cloves smugglers which has been in existence since 1969 will now be repealed and substituted with a law providing for lesser punishment for the offence.

The new law provides for no fine options for clove smugglers and is expected to impose jail terms of not less than three years but not exceeding five years for those convicted of stealing or smuggling the isles prime cash crop.

While serving the sentences, the offenders will also have to plant 100 clove seedlings.

The number of people presently convicted for previous clove smuggling is not clear but include eleven Kenyans sentenced to death in the early 1970s for the offence.

The Kenyans have however reportedly not been executed to date. If the new law applies re-

spectively, it is expected the arrested Kenyans will be released because they have not spent over five years in prison.

MASAI-MARA AREA REVEALS PASTORALIST ACTIVITY IN 800 B.C.'

Masai Mara region was settled by cattle-keeping pastoralists around 800 BC, the finds of Fort Jesus were told last week in a lecture given by Peter Robertshaw, the Assistant Director of British Institute Eastern Africa.

The Institute's travelling exhibition, "500 years ago in East Africa", has been visiting Mombasa. This exhibition highlights some of the archaeological remains both at the coast and in the interior which has been carried out by the Institute's staff over the last 25 years.

The exhibition has been travelling around East Africa and is now in Dares-Salaam. Many people have been visiting it while it is in Fort Jesus, and British Institute staff have been on hand to guide people through the exhibit and explain its contents.

In this lecture Dr. Robertshaw briefly reviewed what is known of the later prehistory of the interior from the first appearance of pastoral peoples in northern Kenya some 4500 years ago, to the arrival of Bantu speaking Iron Age Farmers in the first few centuries A.D., and the formation of states in the Serengeti region in more recent centuries.

Dr. Robertshaw spoke also about his work in the Masai Mara, which was occupied for more than a thousand years by pastoral people who herded

cattle, sheep and goats, and perhaps donkeys, and may also have grown a variety of agricultural crops.

A range of stone tools were made from volcanic glass (obsidian) obtained from sources over 100 kilometres away in the central Rift Valley, while earthenware pottery was made locally.

Excavations at one site in the region have revealed the remains of circular houses and livestock pens, while study of the animal bones has demonstrated that the cattle which were kept were large, humped animals.

As the site was occupied some 2000 years ago, this is the earliest evidence for humped cattle in Eastern Africa.

JUDY ALDRICK

Mrs. Judy Aldrick, Chairman of the Friends of Fort Jesus thanked Dr. Robertshaw for the presentation which revealed some most interesting aspects of work on upcountry archaeology.

Dr. Richard Wilding, Head of Coast Archaeology with the National Museums of Kenya said afterwards that the study of the development of pastoral communities and their stock is exciting scientifically and might also be of importance to our understanding of modern economic and ecological problems.

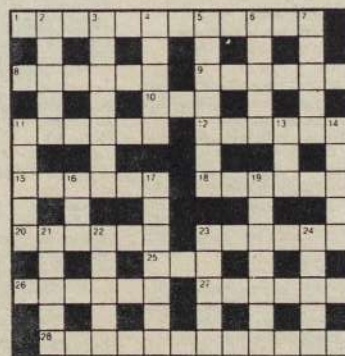

IT'S HARD to comprehend that Kenya Railways has yet to celebrate its centennial - an event which begins in August 1996 and ends after the turn of the century in 2001. More than five years in the making it stands, as this book records, as one of the great feats of Victorian civil engineering.

In the last decade of the 19th century the East African interior was largely uncharted. The ways inland were few and far between and only then the caravan trails that the traders and notorious slavers followed.

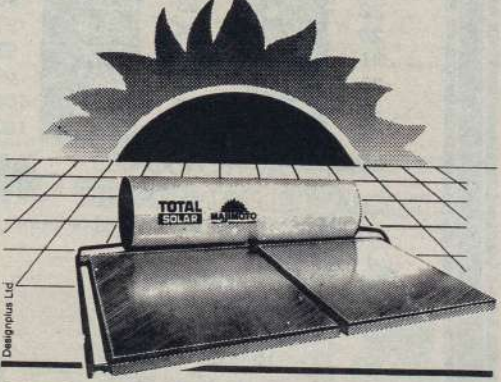

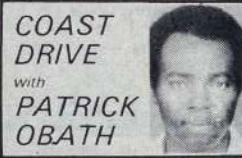
