

In an interview, the Ambassador said that tourism in Indonesia is booming and that this year they hope to receive one million tourists.



Saying that there were many examples of success on the part of women, Mrs Schmiel observed that women were now pursuing careers formerly thought to be restricted to men, citing women business executives, doctors, lawers, professors, diplomats and accountants who could be found allover the world.

She further cited more examples of womens' important role in the world: the American Ambassador to Kenya, the Indian High Commissioner in Nairobi and the Kenya High Commission to London were all women, she said.

She said a club like the Kenya Business and Professional Women was very useful in bringing women together in matters of development as it was a necessary forum for information sharing

She posed a challenge to the club to find out what they could do to the less educated who lived in rural areas so that they too could help build a better world for themselves.

Speaking at the same ceremony, Mr Mungalla praised the club for the good work they were doing to improve the welfare of women noting that most projects started, organised and run by women were in most cases successful. He cited Maendeleo Ya Wanawake as an example of womens organisations that have succeeded.

He also appealed to the Mombasa branch to strive to reach as many women in the rural areas who were struggling to survive by doing petty businesses such as selling charcoal, eggs among others.

In her message the national chairperson of the club Mrs Beth Mugo said that as they rededicate themselves by lighting the candles of solidarily and communion with other 70 clubs in the world, they should vow to promote and help all others and advance themselves.


She said every member of the club had a role in changing the world into a better place not only for women but for the whole mankind.

Kenyan Maize Shipments **Continue Through Kilindini**

IHE SHIPMENT of Kenya maize through the port of Mombasa has entered its tenth week at Kilindini. At least 70,000 tons of Kenyan maize were handled in January and February this year - loaded onto 12 vessels heading for different destinations that have included parts of Southern Africa, the Horn of Africa, the Indian Ocean islands and the Far East.

The order for March still awaiting loading is now in the neighbourhood of 60,000 tons as six maize loaders wait for berth at the port this week.

As mentioned by Mombasa's shipping think tank John Walters last week, the North Korean Mu Du Bong remains the longest waiting matze loader since her arrival January 22 to load 8,700 tons for Assab, Ethiopia on charter by the United Nations World Food Programme (UNWFP).

DEATH PENAITY BEING REPEALED FOR SMUGGLERS

THE ISLE's death penalty on convicted cloves smugglers convicted cloves smugglers which has been in existence since 1969 will now be repealed and substituted with a law providing for lesser punishment for the offence.

for the offence.

The new law provides for no fine options for clove smugglers and is expected to impose jail terms of not less than three years but not exceeding five years for those convicted of stealing or smuggling the isles prime cash crop.

While serving the sentences, the offenders will also have to plant 100 clove seedlings.

The number of people pre-sently convicted for previous clove smuggling is not clear but include eleven Kenyans sen-tenced to death in the early 1970s for the offence.

The Kenyans have however reportedly not been executed to date. If the new law applies ret-

Tourism Authority Moves To Improve Service From Its Hotels after the feasibility study was made and during this period hotels deteriorated far beyond the original assessment.

THE TANZANIA Tourist Corporation (TTC) this week gave full autonomy to the various hotels under it, in a move aimed towards improving efficiency. Until now, hotels had to refer to the TTC on whatever little decisions they had to make and the new move is expected to alleviate interference of officials from the holding company who did not necessarily have the expertise to guide hotels.

The autonomy move will leave hotel managers with a responsibility of ensuring that their hotels do well and managers will be fully accountable for any failures.

Each of TTC's 15 hotels has now been registered as a subsi-diary company and the holding company will no longer deal company will no longer dea with the daily operations of the

It is however unclear as to what extent the managers can make their own decision and a clear cut policy to draw a line

Following the move, about 150 TTC staff are expected to lose their jobs. Previously the TTC had about 200 employees and the redundancy is expected to save costs and increase profits.

Meanwhile the 10 million dollars rehabilitation programme for the TTC hotels which was fiananced by the World Bank has been completed but work done is far short from what was originally envisaged when the feasibility study was executed in 1975.

A range of stone tools were made from volcanic glass (obsidian) obtained from sources over 100 kilometres away in the central Rift Valley, while earthenware pottery was made locally.

Excavations at one site in the region have revealed the remains of circular houses and livestock pens, while study of the animal bones has demonstrated that the cattle which were kept were large, humped animals.

As the site was occupied some 2000 years ago, this is the earliest evidence for humped cattle in Eastern Africa.
