Mr Johnson said this when he made a courtesy call on the coast PC Mr Simeon Mung'ala in Mombasa accompanied by the resident honourary British Consul Mr John Walters. Mung'ala was accompanied by the Mombasa DC Mr Paul

Included in the ICU project

Included in the ICU project is the modernisation of four Special Rooms which will be for the use of the patients discharged from the ICU but still requiring hospitalisation.

It is expected that groundbreaking will commence within a month from now. Tenders have already been invited for the construction work of the buildings.

Public entusiasm has been good and it is expected that generous outright donations will be received by the Pandya Memorial Hospital for the

When completed (within one year) the unit will be one of the finest and most modern one in Kenya. The project is being executed by a Special ICU Committee chaired by Dr. Ramesh Desai and consisting of Mr. Bhanu Patel, Mr. Bharat Chhanyara, Mr. Shashi Patel, Mr. Dhiru Shah and Mr. Dhanji Patel.



CLOVES FACING 'UNSTEADY MAR

At present, Zanzibar has clove outlets to Indonesia, Singapore, India and China and the new markets sought include the Gulf, Japan, Thailand, Hong Kong and the Soviet Union.

A Sheraton Saviour

SERIOUS DISCUSSIONS are presently being held on the viability of having two international hotel groups, the Sheraton of USA and the Accor from France to manage various hotels in the country presently being run by the Tanzania Tourist Corporation (TTC).

It is reported that financial institutions which were approached for funds have requested that the two transnational hotel

It is projected that about 1.2 billion shillings is needed for the rehabilitation of the New

Africa Hotel, Mount Meru hotel Lake Manyara Hotel, Ngoron-goro, Seronera and Lobo wild-life lodges.

If the negotiations go through, the six hotels and lodges will be operated by Accor after the renovations, which will take about six months if implemented according to plans.

Another 1.1 million shillings is required for the renovation of Mafia Island Lodge, Kunduchi Beach and Kilimanjaro hotels which will be taken over by the Sheraton group if negotiations work out.

The financial projections are however subject to major variations depending on how soon the implementation will take and especially because of the declining value of the Tanzania shilling

The further money require-ment for the hotels follows an ment for the hotels follows an unsatisfactory completion of the 10 million dollars World Bank rehabilitation programme of the country's hotels. Work done was far short from what was originally envisaged when the feasibility study was executed in 1975.

The main shortcoming of the programme was that funds started flowing in 1982 which was seven years after the feasibility study was made and during this period the hotels deteriorated far beyond the original assessments. Moreover the general cost structure had also increased.

PROGRAMMES

There were also problems in implementing the programme. In 1983, the World Bank halted In 1983, the World Bank halted disbursebents towards the project because certain condi-tions were not met whilst in 1984 a cement shortage in the country halted construction.

It is understood that some of these employees go to St Luke's when the Coast General Hospital is full.

It was after Solomon Musyoka, Shop Steward, had been approached by the Hospital Administrator, Patrick-Kalume, seeking help in acquiring blankets, that employees decided to make this hospital, which deals with 70,000 out-patients and around 6,000 in-patients a year, their first project.

St Luke's was established by CMS missionaries in 1929 and has maintained a high standard of medical and loving care to wananchi. Although now receiving a government subsidy they still have to rely on the local community for assistance and are presently seeking more beds, sheets, cutlery etc.

NEW SCHOOL

Opening soon is a new School of Nursing for 120 students, their training being geared to take the Kenya Enrolled Community Nurses government examination. Opening within the next year will be a children's ward with fifteen beds.

The hospital has a scheme whereby wananchi are offered an out-patient medical service for Shs. 15/- a month. The hospital charge for in-patients is Shs. 40/- a day, which does not include the cost of operations.

cely competitive tourism is becoming, with countries going all out and spending vast sums of money in its promotion there which had included 'super shows, beautiful brochures and posters'.

Said Mr Gubler 'I was left with the impression that, in comparison, Kenya was doing too little

This, he went on 'may be due to the fact that Kenya has enjoyed several good years of tourism and was confident that this would continue.'

Mr Gubler spoke of tourism trends, whereby a country re-mains popular for a while, then another takes over as the 'in' place for a vacation.

He feels that for several rea-sons Kenya is now not so much in trend, hence the need for increased promotion.

Consequently, he said 'it is up to the private sector of the tourist industry, in particular, to take action now'.

Adding 'it is our problem, and we should try and resolve it ourselves. Naturally, if government can help, then this would be most welcome'.

Both KAHC officers report that following adverse publicity on Aids and Malaria in the over-seas press, and for other reasons, bookings for March and April had been badly affected.

Two charter operators had stopped flying to Mombasa be-fore their licences for the high season had expired.

There was now a much more

There was now a much more realistic approach to it'.

Added the chairman 'tourists still have confidence incoming here, and Kenya is attracting a more up-market tourist who is more educated and has been able to put the Aids issue in its right perspective.

In addition, they will have heard that hospitals in Mombasa and Nairobi have blood screening equipment, and that no trasfusions take place without the blood first being screened for Aids. for Aids'

Declared the chairman 'the Kenya Govenment has taken a most positive approach to the whole problem'.

The vice-chairman mentioned another factor which he believes will attract more tourists here. He said 'through the strong German mark and Swiss franc, and other currencies in Europe

Kenya has become a very rea-sonably priced long-haul desti-nation, and very competitive on the world market.

He noted that in the last three

years tour operators had no increased their rates in Europe and that in countries like Cermany and Switzerland there had been no inflation at all.

While Kenya could maintain the same rates, other destinations in Third World countries have had to increase theirs by between 10-20 per cent.

Said the Vice-Chairman 'I feel

that this might go a long way in putting Kenya back in 'Trend' again'

In addition, food and drink

were also very reasonaly priced. Kenya, however, was not a cheap, but a reasonably priced long-haul destination.

He feels that with stronger promotion, Kenya could be put back in 'trend' again.

The vice-chairman said that the meeting of the KAHC (Coast) had been very positive with members realising the impor-tance of promotion.

He said 'I do not think hote-liers can do this alone, but need the co-operation of tour operators, travel agents, charter operators etc. airlines

Educational Tours

He mentioned that many tour operators, together with hoteliers, sponsor 'Educational Tours' to Kenya by travel agents and journalists, which does much to promote the country.

It was reported that certain Swiss and German tour operators were already planning to bring more such groups here.

The vice-chairman also mentioned another tourism trend, and that is the demand for more active holidays.

He said 'whereas in the past a tourist was happy to lounge around in the sun all day, now they want sports and recrea-tional facilities as well'.

It was up to hoteliers to keep abreast of these trends, and many, he noted, had already done so.

Joshua Mwendwa is also the National Chairman of the Kenya Association of Hotel-keepers' and Caterers'.
