NEWS BRIEFS

ALIENS ARRESTED
MOMBASA (KNA) Illegal Aliens in Mombasa are currently being interned. A police source disclosed that 25 Ugandans were sent home by train, while 66 Tanzanians were expected to be sent to their country in two lorries.

Meanwhile 30 more Aliens appeared before a Mombasa Court charged with being Kenya illegally contrary to the immigration act. They included Somalis, Ugandans, Mozambicans, and Zaireans. The majority of them however were Mozambicans.

FOREIGNERS FINED
MUMBAI (KNA) Five foreigners who were found in Kenya illegally were fined a total of Shs 1000 by the Lamu Court today. They included aliens from Britain, Denmark, and Australia. They all paid the fines but were given seven days to leave the country.

ILLEGAL ENTRY
KWALE (KNA) Several aliens appeared before Kwale District Magistrate, Mr H D Mwangi on charges of either entering Kenya illegally or failing to register. The aliens, who came from Burundi, Mozambique and Iran, were ordered to be repatriated to their mother countries on payment of the fines and completion of their bail terms.

REPATRIATION
MOMBASA (KNA) Seven Aliens from Somalia and Uganda have been ordered to Tana River District during the on-going crackdown on people staying in the country illegally. They were ordered to be repatriated to their countries after paying fines or serving jail terms.

"MAFIA" SLATED

MALINDI (KNA) The Italian Ambassador to Kenya, Mr Gian Luigi Valenza has described the recent European press reports of "Mafia activities in Mombasa and Malindi" as an unnecessary alarm and a scandal.

Interviewed by the press and get-together for the Italian community living in Malindi over the weekend, the Italian representative further dissociated his country from the negative publicity on Kenya on the dreaded disease "Aids".

He said that despite the support to dissidents against Kenya by some foreign countries, President Daniel arap Moi, his government and the ruling party KANU, remained very popular.

The reception was attended by the Malindi DO, Mr James Muhoro, Italian Consul in Mombasa, Mr Albreto Santagati and the chairman of the Italian community in Malindi, Mr Mimo Fazzini.

BRITISH ENVOY PRAISES 'CLOSE TIES TO KENYA'

MOMBASA (KNA) The British High Commissioner to Kenya Mr John Johnson has hailed the recent visit to his country by President Daniel arap Moi and said it made the nations of both countries closer and proud of each other.

He also said the continued inflow of British and other foreign tourists to Kenya was a clear demonstration of the faith with which the peace and good leadership of the country are held internationally.

Mr Johnson said this when he made a courtesy call on the coast PC Mr Simeon Mung'ala in Mombasa accompanied by the resident honorary British

Consul Mr John Walters. Mr Mung'ala was accompanied by the Mombasa DC Mr Paul Lang'at.

Mr Johnson said there was a large British community which has settled in the coast and were happily contributing to the faster development of the area.

He thanked the High Commissioner for his recent forthright denunciation of foreign press drumming of the Aids [Acquired Immunity Disease Syndrome] presence in Kenya.

Later the High Commissioner called on the Mayor of Mombasa Councillor Ahmed Mwandani who praised the good relations between the two countries as both nationals understood each other properly from an experienced standpoint.

Those who accompanied the mayor were his deputy councillor Samuel Ndoro and acting town clerk Mr Maurice Mumba.

DISTRICT CHAIRMAN

The Mombasa District Kanu branch chairman Mr Shariff Nassir, who also received Mr Johnson, said the Kenyan dissident in Europe are free to apply for those countries citizenship and stop covering themselves under the freedom of speech aimed at maligning the peaceful and stable government of Kenya.

He told the envoy that when President Moi was in London, Kenyans felt touched by the warmth with which he was received.

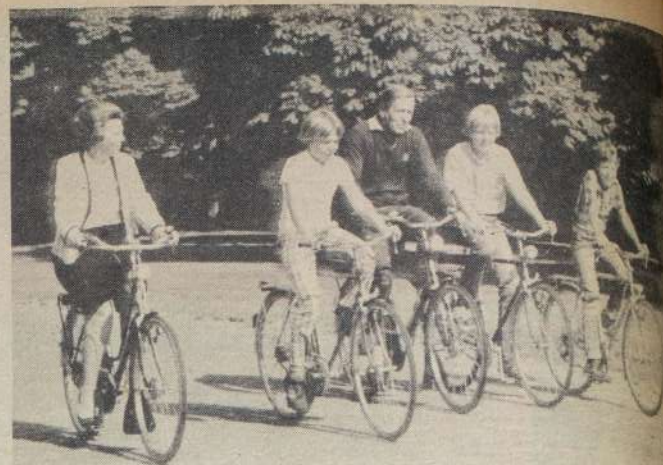

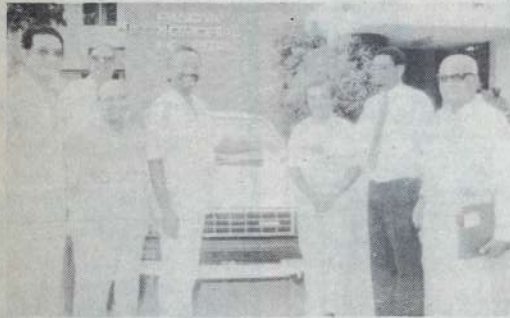

PANDYA MEMORIAL EXPANDS

AFTER SEVERAL years of successful effort at modernisation, the Pandya Memorial Hospital is now poised to embark on an ambitious new development programme.

The first priority is for a modern, state-of-the-art Intensive Care Unit. The launching of the Raffle is the second fund-raising effort for fulfilling the project requirements which will be close to six million shillings.

The first fund-raising exercise was the Charitable Walk which raised almost a quarter of a million shillings. The Raffle has attractive prizes including two Nissan motor vehicles topping the list and followed by British Airways tickets to London.

The ICU project comprises of four beds as the main unit. In the basement, however, there

will be additional facilities for an acute renal dialysis unit.

The remaining space in the basement will house the Physiotherapy Unit which is temporarily located elsewhere. Also attached to the ICU, forming an integral part of it will be a most modern operation Room with the latest in surgical equipment.

The ICU will also have up-to-date ancillary facilities like a side-room laboratory with blood gas analysis equipment etc.

The ICU itself, will, of course, have the latest equipment for the care of all types of emergencies including acute cardiac, respiratory and surgical cases.

Included in the ICU project is the modernisation of four Special Rooms which will be for the use of the patients discharged from the ICU but still requiring hospitalisation.

It is expected that groundbreaking will commence within a month from now. Tenders have already been invited for the construction work of the buildings.

Public enthusiasm has been good and it is expected that generous outright donations will be received by the Pandya Memorial Hospital for the project.

When completed (within one year) the unit will be one of the finest and most modern one in Kenya. The project is being executed by a Special ICU Committee chaired by Dr. Ramesh Desai and consisting of Mr. Bhanu Patel, Mr. Bharat Chhanyara, Mr. Shashi Patel, Mr. Dhru Shah and Mr. Dhanji Patel.

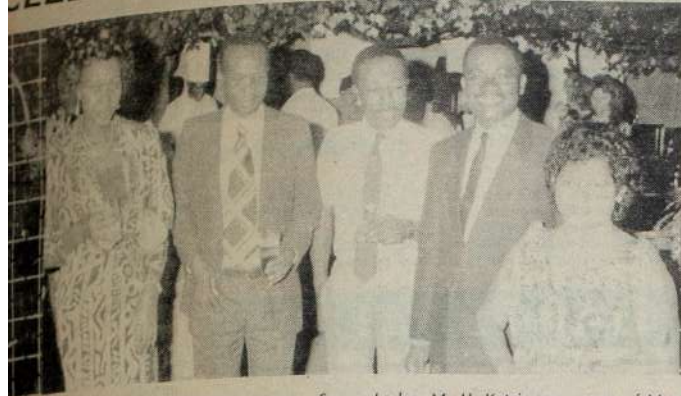

A Sheraton Saviour ?

SERIOUS DISCUSSIONS are presently being held on the viability of having two international hotel groups, the Sheraton of USA and the Accor from France to manage various hotels in the country presently being run by the Tanzania Tourist Corporation (TTC).

While negotiations are still at a rudimentary stage, the move is aimed towards obtaining finance for the rehabilitation of the hotels and also to raise standards through an increased capital outlay.

It is reported that financial institutions which were approached for funds have requested that the two transnational hotel groups manage the Tanzania hotels after the funds are disbursed.

However no agreement has been reached with these institutions which include the West Germany Development Bank (KFW), Swiss International Development Agency (SIFIDA) and the Commonwealth Development Corporation (CDC).

It is projected that about 1.2 billion shillings is needed for the rehabilitation of the New

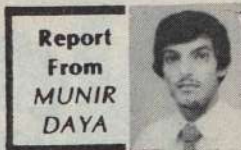
national groups will rent the hotel facilities from TTC and the fate of local staff, especially those in management, is as yet unclear.

Meanwhile the national airline carrier, Air Tanzania Corporation (ATC) has stopped transporting coffins containing human remains on scheduled Fokker Friendship flights because of the discomfort and anxiety being caused to passengers and crew.

The Fokker aircraft has the baggage hold (where coffins are normally kept) between the cockpit and the passenger cabin whilst the International Travel Association (IATA) rules stipulate that body carriages should be in the hold of aircraft.

IATA also prescribes that the inside of coffins should be coated with zinc which is presently not available in Tanzania.

Previously Air Tanzania made exceptions on humanitarian grounds to transport the dead bodies but no exceptions will now be made and an entire plane will have to be chartered for the purpose.

If the negotiations go through, the six hotels and lodges will be operated by Accor after the renovations, which will take about six months if implemented according to plans.

The financial projections are however subject to major variations depending on how soon the implementation will take and especially because of the declining value of the Tanzania shilling.

The further money requirement for the hotels follows an unsatisfactory completion of the 10 million dollars World Bank rehabilitation programme of the country's hotels. Work done was far short from what was originally envisaged when the feasibility study was executed in 1975.

The main shortcoming of the programme was that funds started flowing in 1982 which was seven years after the feasibility study was made and during this period the hotels deteriorated far beyond the original assessments. Moreover the general cost structure had also increased.

PROGRAMMES

There were also problems in implementing the programme. In 1983, the World Bank halted disbursements towards the project because certain conditions were not met whilst in 1984 a cement shortage in the country halted construction.

CLOVES FACING 'UNSTEADY MARKET'

ZANZIBAR may recruit foreign agents to market its cloves abroad in a move aimed to increase sales in the wake of the unstable market situation of the crop because of oversupplies and dwindling consumption levels.

At present, Zanzibar has clove outlets to Indonesia, Singapore, India and China and the new markets sought include the Gulf, Japan, Thailand, Hong Kong and the Soviet Union.

The clove trade on the isles has long been monopolised by the Zanzibar State Trading Corporation (ZSTC) and unconfirmed reports state that local businessmen may probably be invited to participate in the clove trade.

Meanwhile, the Zanzibar Government has activated high level contacts within the Kenya administration in an effort to retrieve 35 bags of cloves intercepted by the Kenyan Customs Department in Mombasa about 15 days ago.

Lions Club Detail 'Focus On Health'

22nd February, screening of eye patients, cataract operations and refraction for eye glasses was carried out.

A total of about 350 eye patients were screened and given medicines. Fourteen cataract operations were performed by eye surgeons Dr. Gupta and Dr. Mnjalla.

About 150 patients had refraction studies carried out by an optician and glasses were provided to them free of charge.

On 23rd February, a dental camp was carried out by two dentists, namely Dr. J.C. Patel

and Dr. Hanif of Coast Province General Hospital. About 250 dental patients were seen and about 200 dental extractions were carried out.

On 24th February 1987 the ear, nose and throat camp was

performed at the Msambweni Hospital. About 425 patients were screened for diseases of ear, nose and throat and appropriate medicines were given free of charge.

This camp was carried out with the help of two E.N.T. specialists - Dr. Satinder Sabherwal and Dr. Mukesh Shah of Coast Province General Hospital.

On 25th February 1987 the screening of patients for hypertension and diabetes was performed by two physicians - Dr. Ramesh Desai and Dr. Joel Pinto both members of Lions Club of Mombasa Central. They were assisted by other doctors from Lions Club of Mombasa Central.

About 200 patients were screened and were given medicines. Some patients were asked to report to Coast Province

General Hospital for further investigations pending treatment.

On 26th February the Msambweni Hospital was the venue for screening of children. This exercise was carried out by a Consultant Paediatrician Dr. Aziz Kasmani helped by some Lion Doctors.

About 300 children were screened and were given medicines and some were referred to the Coast Province General Hospital for investigation pending treatment.

This highly successful week ended on 28th February when the official closing ceremony was performed at the Msambweni Hospital.

On this occasion, all those patients who were operated for cataract were given glasses and were discharged from the Hospital.

Also at this ceremony quite a large stock of medicines which were left after the end of rural health week were donated to the Msambweni Hospital.

Eventually Afzal returned to the U.S.A. and majored in computers at the University of California in Berkeley, studying system design, application, software... It was this that led to the consultancy.

EDPI is basically in two parts, the consultancy, and the school, about which we shall talk later.

The consultancy, or Compuware Ltd. is run by people who know business as well as computers. Working with Afzal at Compuware Ltd is Mrs. Dina Shah, another computer science graduate, plus a management consultant, an accountant, two operators and a secretary.

The team can take a look at your business and evaluate your needs, by suggesting what you require.

After you get your computer system the consultancy, or Compuware, sets it up, training your staff and makes sure everything is going right.

'CUSTOMERIZED'

OVERSEAS STUDY

Now to the school: Our Saturday morning visit saw lots of school children there. Most of them were those who are likely to go overseas for further studies and university.

However, a look at institute's prospectus in conjunction with

the one from ABAC made us see that there are many courses from the short two weeks to full academic year (post 'O' or 'A' levels).

ABAC, by the way, is "The Association of Business and Administrative Computing" and EDPI is the recognized centre here in Mombasa. The ABAC course has been produced in response to the growing demand for initial computer qualifications leading to a career in the profession, more with the emphasis on business and administration rather than an engineering or mathematical orientation.

The broadly based practitioner training provided by a single professional body may also enable a student to obtain part exemptions from examinations of other professional bodies such as accountancy, banking or management.

EDPI is fully equipped in its

own right now, having started with COBOL which needed a main frame machine. That cost millions and was far too expensive, so Afzal's brother taught theory in those days, renting time from KPA or Bamburi for compilation.

Around the 1979-80s they started getting into micro computers, and the student changed over to BASIC which is included with most of the micro computers that you buy.

OPERATORS

The majority students in the 1979-84 era were from the middle east countries, and went back to implement what they learnt.

Kenya has caught up. Now the students finishing here are quickly absorbed by different firms in Mombasa in such capacities as junior programmers or operators.

MANY tourists keep returning year after year, some staying for several months regarding Kenya as their "second home".

Nilestar Tours International Ltd - which since its formation in 1961 has never stopped growing, has a very ambitious plan to attract such people into

either retiring to Kenya, or establishing a second home here.

Declared Mr. Madat Abraham, chairman Kenya stands to gain enormously through such a scheme.

He estimates that to set up home here a retired couple will need to, initially, bring into the country around US Dollars 20,000 after which they will be receiving monthly remittances

on which to live.

Said Mr. Abraham 'it will boost all aspects of the economy - the sale of property, the building industry, business sector, small traders as well as the Kenya Posts and Telecommunications and Kenya Airways, for those coming here will wish to keep in touch with their families either by telephone or by visiting one another.

It will also create many job opportunities for house servants, cooks and gardeners.

Mr. Abraham says he will be seeking Government blessing and full support for his scheme.

He points out that Kenya could become a popular retirement venue, as Spain and Portugal are. In addition, many have established a holiday home in those countries.

The Nilestar retirement sche-

me will be publicised in America, Canada, England, Western Europe, South East Asia, Japan and the Middle East.

Said Mr. Abraham 'I can foresee it becoming a huge undertaking, and we anticipate bringing to Kenya from 1991 to the end of the century, thousands of retired people as well as those wishing to establish a holiday home here'

The HQ for this 'Retirement to Kenya' scheme will be in London under the executive Management of Mr. Madat Abraham.

He pointed out that Kenya is a land of contrasts, and while some may wish to live on Kenya's hot tropical coast, others may prefer somewhere up-country where it is cooler.

Here Mr. Abraham noted that 'already Lamu is attracting many retired folk'.

He explained that while those coming to Kenya under this scheme are deciding where to

live, they will reside at the Nilestar Indian Ocean Club (information) which is planned to be built on the south coast.

PROPERTIES

Nilestar will introduce them to properties available on the market for purchase or renting. Said Mr. Abraham 'it will be NILESTAR's responsibility to see that they find suitable accommodation at a reasonable price'. These are also available Kenya residents.

NILESTAR will also be offering on the European 'low budget' holidays in at Malindi or in other parts of Kenya's north and south coast.

Freighter Discharges Long Awaited Fertiliser Cargo

THE GRADUAL DECLINE of waiting vessels in Kilindini has continued during the past week. In fact the three white maize loaders may also find themselves at alongside berths this week including that veteran waiter the North Korean *Mu Du Bong* which will have been at the buoys for over nine weeks. She is expected to take the place of the *Seamaster II* which sailed on Tuesday morning with her 25000 tons for Iran.

The *Mu Du Bong* certainly deserves a quick despatch after the delay she has suffered.

The number of vessels waiting for berths on Monday, including the three maize loaders, totalled six only and, based on the number of vessels due over the next 11 days or so, waiting vessels should have disappeared from the Kilindini scene in the near future.

The 22000 deadweight ton bulk carrier *Europa Point* obtained a ready berth at No. 10 last Saturday after a wait of only a few days with her much needed cargo of 15000 tons fertiliser.

This 15 year old vessel is owned by a London company, flies the red ensign, and is registered in Gibraltar. She is expected to be in port close on 3 weeks.

I understand there was yet another stowaway incident last Saturday morning before the Mitsui OSK chartered vessel *Watergeus* sailed from the container berth for Tanga.

SHIPPING with JOHN WALTERS

Two stowaways were found just before sailing with no papers but almost certainly of Tanzanian origin so they were not allowed to disembark and had to remain on board the vessel in the hope that the Tanzanian Authorities at Tanga would take them.

TANZANIAN PORT

It was fortuitous she was bound for a Tanzanian port. If not what then?

The BEACON container consortium are putting on another vessel to meet the present demand for Northbound export cargoes.

Due on Thursday of this week after loading in Dar es Salaam is the 11 year old 33000 d.w ton Cyprian flag Greek owned *Elisa Dyo* on her first voyage to East

Africa. She will sail to Port Sudan thence non stop to Rotterdam and Felixstowe. She has a container (TEU) capacity of some 700 boxes.

Heavy tonnages are nowadays arriving from the Far East. Presently in port with 5000 tons of cargo mainly from Japan is a regular caller the 20,000 d.w ton *Continental Partner* operated by Mitsui OSK Lines Tokyo and wearing her distinctive colours of blue hull, stone coloured superstructure and red funnel.

Due today also from the Far East is another 4500 tons cargo on board the London owned Bank Line vessel *Tenchbank* on charter to the Japanese NYK Line. This is her second voyage on charter to these Japanese owners.

A further 8000 tons Far East cargo is also being discharged in the port from the Mitsui OSK charter *Sea Pioneer* at No. 1 berth and the NYK charter *Unique Alliance* at No. 7.

On her third or fourth visit to Kipevu Oil Jetty this week has been the Japanese crude tanker with the un-japanese name of *Victorio*.

Of 87300 deadweight she was built in 1980 and is owned by a Tokyo based company where she also has her port of registry. She is on a succession of voyage charters for Total Oil Company.

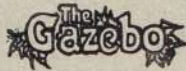

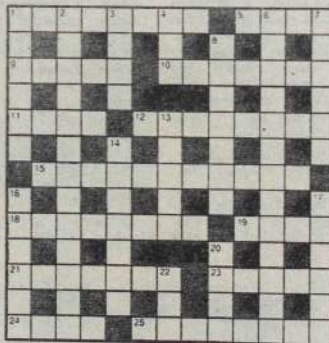

cely competitive tourism is becoming, with countries going all out and spending vast sums of money in its promotion there which had included 'super shows, beautiful brochures and posters'.

Said Mr Gubler 'I was left with the impression that, in comparison, Kenya was doing too little'.

This, he went on 'may be due to the fact that Kenya has enjoyed several good years of tourism and was confident that this would continue.'

Mr Gubler spoke of tourism trends, whereby a country remains popular for a while, then another takes over as the 'in' place for a vacation.

He feels that for several reasons Kenya is now not so much in trend, hence the need for increased promotion.

Consequently, he said 'it is up to the private sector of the tourist industry, in particular, to take action now'.

Adding 'it is our problem, and we should try and resolve it ourselves. Naturally, if government can help, then this would be most welcome'.

Both KAHC officers report that following adverse publicity on Aids and Malaria in the overseas press, and for other reasons, bookings for March and April had been badly affected.

Two charter operators had stopped flying to Mombasa before their licences for the high season had expired.

Said the chairman 'Hapag Loyd which had originally intended operating into Mombasa until April had stopped doing so by the end of January. A charter from Austria had also not fully utilised its licence as originally planned.

This had resulted in a reduction of 1200 charter seats to Mombasa a week.

The chairman also noted that over the past year there had been a big increase in the number of hotel beds at the Coast. Such adverse publicity could not

have come at a worse time when the whole industry was geared to receiving many more tourists.

The vice-chairman noted that

'during the peak high season, hotels had been generally full. However, occupancies had started to subside at the end of February, when hoteliers had really started to feel it with less bookings than in previous years'.

It had also been a much shorter high season.

The chairman mentioned a compensating factor had been the boom in the Italian market resulting from the number of air charters being increased from two to six a week during the high season.

Mr Mwendwa, who is General Manager of Leopard Beach Hotel, Diani, which attracts mainly Italian tourists, said that in March it was recording a very high occupancy.

The vice-chairman felt that some tour operators and travel agents were using adverse publicity about Aids in Kenya as the sole excuse for this drop in hotel occupancy. 'Personally', he said 'I think that is wrong, and that apart from the Aids issue, Kenya is now not so much in trend'.

However, he anticipates the German market recovering for the next high season.

He went on 'after my recent visit to Germany I was left with the impression that people there now accept the fact that Aids is virtually present all over the world. They have been educated about it very well, also in Switzerland.

There was now a much more realistic approach to it'.

Added the chairman 'tourists still have confidence incoming here, and Kenya is attracting a more up-market tourist who is more educated and has been able to put the Aids issue in its right perspective.

In addition, they will have heard that hospitals in Mombasa and Nairobi have blood screening equipment, and that no transfusions take place without the blood first being screened for Aids'.

Declared the chairman 'the Kenya Government has taken a most positive approach to the whole problem'.

The vice-chairman mentioned another factor which he believes will attract more tourists here. He said 'through the strong German mark and Swiss franc, and other currencies in Europe,

Kenya has become a very reasonably priced long-haul destination, and very competitive on the world market'.

He noted that in the last three years tour operators had not increased their rates in Europe and that in countries like Germany and Switzerland there had been no inflation at all.

While Kenya could maintain the same rates, other destinations in Third World countries have had to increase theirs by between 10-20 per cent.

Said the Vice-Chairman 'I feel

that this might go a long way in putting Kenya back in 'Trend' again'.

In addition, food and drink were also very reasonably priced.

Kenya, however, was not a cheap, but a reasonably priced long-haul destination.

He feels that with stronger promotion, Kenya could be put back in 'trend' again.

The vice-chairman said that the meeting of the KAHC (Coast) had been very positive with members realising the importance of promotion.

He said 'I do not think hoteliers can do this alone, but need the co-operation of tour operators, travel agents, airlines, charter operators etc.

Educational Tours

He mentioned that many tour operators, together with hoteliers, sponsor 'Educational Tours' to Kenya by travel agents and journalists, which does much to promote the country.

It was reported that certain Swiss and German tour operators were already planning to bring more such groups here.

The vice-chairman also mentioned another tourism trend, and that is the demand for more active holidays.

He said 'whereas in the past a tourist was happy to lounge around in the sun all day, now they want sports and recreational facilities as well'.

It was up to hoteliers to keep abreast of these trends, and many, he noted, had already done so.

Joshua Mwendwa is also the National Chairman of the Kenya Association of Hotel-keepers' and Caterers'.

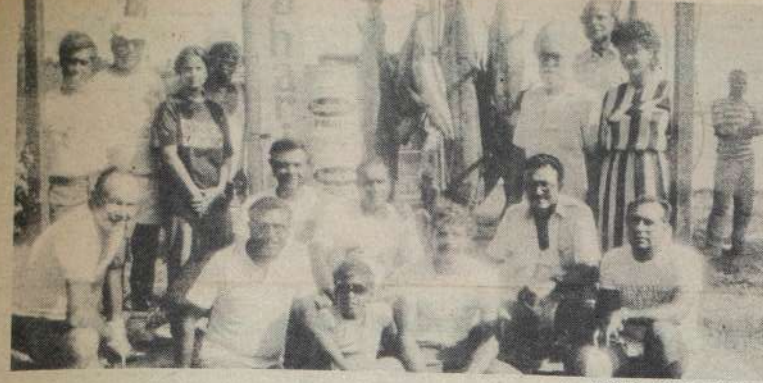
