U.S. NAVY VISITING MOMBASA



UNITED STATES NAVY guided-missile cruiser U.S.S. HALSEY, leading three ships on a seven-day Kenya call.

ON FIRST AFRICAN VOYAGE

THE USS Halsey, USS Stein and USS Willamette, U.S. naval ships deployed with the Seventh Fleet, have begun a seven-day visit.

During their stay, crew members will participate in a wide range of recreational and social activities, including sporting events and visits to the Kenyan countryside.

In addition, many crew members have volunteered their time and labor to work on special projects to benefit the people of the Mombasa area, including painting the Tudor Nursery School and the Baptist High School.

This is the first visit of these three ships to Mombasa. The home port of two of the ships, the Halsey and the Stein, is in San Diego, California.

The largest of the two, the Halsey is a 7,800-ton, 533-foot guided missile cruiser. It is under the command of Captain Dennis R. Conley.

The Stein is a 4,200-ton, 438-foot fast frigate under the command of Commander Howard K. Kline.

The third ship, the Willamette, which has its home port in Pearl Harbor, Hawaii, is the fleet oiler. This large ship displaces 26,100 tons and is 592 feet long. It is under the command of CDR David C. Lundahl.

Kenya Shipping Line Welcome

SUPPORT FROM CLEARING AND FORWARDING AGENTS

THE KENYA CLEARING, Forwarding and Warehousing Association has warmly welcome the newly formed Kenya National Shipping Line and has promised to give it every support, writes NETA PEAL.

This was revealed by the KCFWA chairman, Mark Radoli, in his welcome address to participants attending a one day seminar at Nyali Beach Hotel to help them have a 'better understanding of the policies which effect the clearing and forwarding industry.

He added whilst we are aware that there is excess shipping capacity worldwide, Kenya like every other developing country is entitled to a percentage of the cargo freight to and from this country under the UNCTAD policy.

KCFWA also hope that the 'management of XNSL will be prepared to compete for cargo with existing foreign shipping lines'.

Describing clearing and forwarding as a 'highly competitive industry', the chairman said 'whether we like it or not we must keep pace with commercial and industrial developments in order to survive.'

Adding 'needless to say, an efficient C and F industry ensures that goods move faster from producer to consumer to the benefit of all concerned'

PORTS AUTHORITY

It was the first seminar of its kind for the KCFWA to organise, the idea being to get managers and those who run clearing and forwarding agencies together to hear first hand from organisations with which they interact daily.

Speakers were from the Kenya Ports Authority, Ministry of Transport and Communication, Mombasa Ships Agents' Association, Internal Trade, Customs and Excise and Central Bank of Kenya. Ample time was given for questions and discussion.

Minister Meets 'Local Government' Officials

A WEEK-long seminar for Mayors and Chairmen of Local Authorities which took place in Jadini Beach Hotel's conference room was officially closed by the Minister for Local Government, Mr. Moses Mudavadi, on April 4.

The Minister was accompanied by the Provincial Commissioner, Coast, Mr. Simeon Mung'ala and the Ag. District Commissioner, Kwale, Mr. N. Ngatia.

It was the first seminar of its kind to be held in Kenya bringing together seventeen Mayors and five Chairmen of Town

Councils who, as political heads of local authorities were briefed in detail about their roles and what is required of them.

It was also attended by officials from the Minister of Local Government and Nairobi University.

KILINDINI PORT

The seminar covered their role as leaders of councils, as well as community leaders; institutional management of local authorities, i.e. revenue collection, budgets and personnel management, also the role of communities in development programmes combined with the District Focus, i.e. planning from grass roots level with wananchi deciding on development priorities.

During the week they toured Kilindini Port and visited development projects in Mombasa which included the new wholesale vegetable-fruit market presently being built at Kisauni, and housing programmes which included the up-grading of slum areas.

Government May Ease Up Over FOREX For Local Tourist Hotels

TANZANIA'S MINISTER for Lands, Natural Resources and Tourism, Getrude Mongella said this week that the Government will consider requests from tourist hotels to retain 50 percent of their foreign exchange earnings for importation of essential equipment required to improve amenities at their hotels.

The minister said this when opening the new 10 million shillings Bahari Beach Restaurant which was razed by fire in 1978.

The fire then gutted down the hotel's central palm thatched roof which served as a canopy to the public rooms including the bar, lounge and dining areas.

The burnt down thatched roof used to resemble the sail of a dhow and was a significant feature of the hotel. The new restaurant has been built on the same spot with a similar roofing hence rejuvenating the hotel's former aura of a thatched African village.

During the opening ceremony, the Minister also revisited the erosion problem threatening the city's beach hotels and said that negotiations are being made with some local and foreign companies to end this long problem.

At the Bahari Beach hotel, vital structures including the swimming pool face collapse in the next few months if something is not done soon. Two beach huts are also threatened.

The erosion problem is rapidly encroaching the building structures of most of the city's beach hotels with the beach being eroded at a reported rate of 50 metres in ten years (this figure is however not scientifically backed).

Certain remedial measures have been taken in the past but these have been of little or no benefit and hoteliers along the beach are now anxiously waiting (for Government intervention)

to see something done on their coastlines.

Meanwhile, Japan has given a big boost to the city's public health project with a donation to Tanzania of 126 trucks valued at over 300 million shillings.

JAPANESE AID

The trucks have been donated under a Japanese grant and include 47 cesspit emptiers, 76 garbage collectors, 30 garbage disposal units, 3 detachable refuse trucks and 3 pick-up ve-

hicles.

The trucks are to be distributed to seven urban centres in the country. These are Dar es Salaam, Dodoma, Tanga, Mbeya, Arusha and Moshi.

The vehicles are expected to greatly improve the sanitation situation which has been rather deplorable due to a shortage of refuse collectors and cesspit emptiers.

And on the currency scale, the Tanzania shilling continued to slide further against other major currencies of the world. The latest Central Bank release quotes one pound sterling at 90 Tanzania shillings and the US dollar at 57½. The Kenya shilling values at Shs. 3/60 Tanzania shillings.

The new rates follow a daily currency adjusting system being monitored by the Bank of Tanzania through which the shilling is linked to a currency basket, against which it is being adjusted by the percentage change in relative prices plus an additional one per cent per month.

HEALTH STATISTICS ARE 'IMPROVING ...'

THE ZANZIBAR Minister for Health and Social Welfare, Maulid Makame, has said that Zanzibar has recorded fine progress in its immunisation programme which was launched on the isles in 1984.

The Minister said that prior to 1984, about 65 per cent of children contracted measles of which about half died. In contrast, the 1986 figures show that only 31 children have contracted the disease of whom none have died.

He said that the number of children dying from the isles six children killer diseases has dropped substantially. The six diseases are measles, tuberculosis, polio, whooping cough, tetanus and diphtheria.

Meanwhile, the isles government plans to make adequate preparations for paddy growers before the next farming season so as to increase rice yields. The Zanzibar Chief Minister, Seif Shariff Hamad said that peasants will be provided with the necessary farm implements and other required inputs, on time.

The Ministry of Agriculture there has been directed to ensure that all tractors are serviced and that adequate stocks of diesel are maintained. The Chief Minister said that tractors had not been put to proper use this season and it is reported that peasants have complained

to the Government that tractors were not available when required for cultivation.

Increased yields can save Zanzibar its foreign exchange used for importing rice. At present the isles spends about 70 per cent of its foreign exchange

earnings to import food including wheat, flour, sugar and rice.

Zanzibar's rice requirements stands at about 55,000 tonnes per annum out of which only 15,000 tonnes are produced locally.

For the coming Holy Muslim month of Ramadhan, the Zanzibar Imports Board has earmarked about 100 million shillings to import foodstuff and khanga. This includes 4,000 tonnes of sugar from the Federal Republic of Germany, 6,000 tonnes of wheat flour from France and 300,000 pairs of Chinese made khanga.

Also to be ordered are dates from Saudi Arabia or Iran.



'ACTION' NEEDED ON ESSENTIAL SERVICES

MOMBASA (KNA) - The Ministry of Local Government has been urged by the Mombasa and Coast Tourist Association (MCTA) to provide prompt assistance for the provision of adequate essential services.

The former chairman Lorna Hayes, said in her report for the association that the MCTA had contacted local government personnel secretary over the tourist industry grievances concerning garbage collection and services engines.

Mrs. Hayes pointed out the reduction of garbage collection vehicles from 20 within the last 25 years as a proportion with the services.

She noted that Mombasa Municipality had done great development within boundaries and needed the support of the government to purchase spare parts for machines and buy new replacement for unserviceable vehicles.

The former chairman also noted the recent fire disaster which totally destroyed the million north coast Reef and called for urgent measures to be taken to safeguard wananchi against any future disasters.

In her report, Mrs. Hayes also asked the government to make the public aware of immediate plans for the construction of alternative methods of crossing the Likoni Ferry pass serving the island to the mainland.

'BEACH KIOSKS'

The report also noted the Kenya Association of Hoteliers and Caterers would like to pursue a solution to the "problem" of beach kiosks that litter the south and north coast areas.

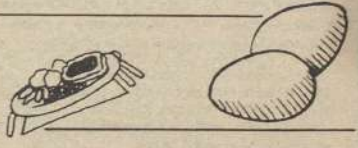
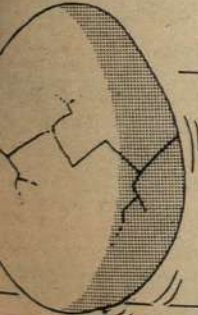

YUGOSLAV SHIP TO BERTH SOON

KILINDINI, after many months of vessels queuing for general cargo berths, had only one vessel waiting at the beginning of the week. This was the Yugoslav vessel *Promina* waiting "ship's convenience" at the buoys to load 12000 tons White Maize. She arrived on February 2nd and hopefully will be berthing in the near future as she is the last waiting maize loader.

There are only two maize loaders alongside, the *Mu Du Bong* at No.11 and the *Magdalena Mare* at No. 13. On Monday morning No. 12 berth was empty, having been vacated last Saturday by the Hungarian vessel *Csokonai* on completion of discharge of her fertiliser cargo.

The first BEACON vessel operated by P & O Containers Ltd. to be seen at Mombasa last week with her new funnel markings was the *Victoria Bay*.

Whilst the Brunswick green (dark green) remains the same, the letters "OCL" in white have now been removed and substituted by "P and O"; this change of livery has taken place as a result of Overseas Containers Ltd. becoming a wholly owned subsidiary of P and O.

CONTAINER SHIPS

I presume the two smaller vessels, namely, *Oyster Bay* and *Gerrans Bay* engaged on P and O Containers fortnightly Indian Ocean service will undergo a similar repainting operation on their funnels.

SHIPPING with JOHN WALTERS

In port this week on her second voyage to East Africa is the Philippine registered six year old *Kalantiao* of 20,000 d.w. tons on charter to Mediterranean Shipping Company operating on their independent liner service to and from Europe.

She has been discharging containers and general cargo and will be loading some 4500 tons containerised cargo. With her distinctive red hull she is a good example of a product from a Polish shipyard of handsome design and profile.

Whilst she flies the Philippine flag her owners are listed as Engineering Consulting and Management G.m.b.H., Hamburg.

I believe her present name is the fourth she has borne over the past four years - her last name was *Sulu Bay*.

The Royal Navy destroyer *HMS Gloucester* sailed from Mbaraki at 10 a.m. on Monday morning after her fortnight's stay. She will soon be followed by *HMS Hermione*, a Leander Class Frigate on April 20th.

This month looks to be a busy month for visiting Navies with the three American vessels presently in port, namely, *USS Halsey*, *USS Stein* and *USS Williamette* with the *USS Mars* due next Thursday.

I understand over Easter three units of the French Navy will be making a courtesy call.

Another cattle carrier, a newcomer to Mombasa, is the 25 year old *Charolais Express* due to arrive this week to load 1500 head for the Middle East. She is owned by the same Philippine Company who operate the regular caller *Guernsey Express*.

With the U.S. Navy in port and the U.S. Lykes Lines *Margorie Lykes* expected on Sunday to load and discharge to and from the U.S. Gulf, there will

be yet an additional stars and stripes to be seen in port when the 32,000 d.w. tons U.S. tanker *Richard C. Matthiesen* arrives in port to discharge a shipment of Marine Diesel Fuel at Shimanzi Oil Jetty from Khor Fakkan in the Arabian Gulf; her next discharge port is Diego Garcia.

Only one year old she is owned by Ocean Ships Inc., Houston, Texas; it is unusual to have a commercially owned U.S. tanker calling at Mombasa.

SWISSAIR REPORTS INCREASING AIRLINE TRAFFIC WITH KENYA

THE EVER growing flow of tourists and the attraction of Nairobi as a meeting place for international conference contributed to a sizeable increase in airline traffic to Kenya last year.

This has been reported by Mr Max Hauser, Swissair's Manager for Kenya, who said his airline's three weekly flights to and from Switzerland and Kenya carried a total of 28,000 passengers last year - an increase of approximately 20 per cent over 1985.

Mr Hauser said this increase was due to Swissair's own marketing efforts and the very active support of the Kenyan travel trade.

Commenting on conference and convention business, Mr Hauser said Kenya enjoyed a very favourable position in Africa and many worldwide organisations have and will in the future choose Nairobi as the ideal meeting place.

He said Swissair's charter subsidiary, Balair, once again played an important role in bringing tourists to Kenya, whether for beach holidays or in combination with a safari.

A total of 400,000 bednights was achieved and tourists spent an estimated four million Swiss Francs (Shs. 40 million) on hotel accommodation, food, personal expenses, excursions and souvenirs.

Balair operated 85 flights and a total of 23,000 one way passengers were carried, with a seat loadfactor of 91 per cent. A survey has shown that the average Swiss tourist stays 17 days in the country.

Mr Hauser pointed out that Balair was, of course, only part of the entire Swiss market and the approximate total number of Swiss tourists was close to 45,000.

He said Swissair was optimistic that Kenya would continue to be a major attraction to overseas tourists.

Among other highlights of the year, he said, was the successful introduction of the high-

speed document delivery service "SPEX", a Swissair feature with considerable growth potential.

On the cargo side, Swissair and Balair carried 1300 tonnes of export cargo, most of it in cultural products.

Mr Hauser also reported that Swissair paid a total of 800 Swiss Francs in handling charges, landing fees and airport taxes to Kenya authorities in 1986.

International Research Council Celebrates Kenya Anniversary

THE INTERNATIONAL Council for Research in Agroforestry, (ICRAF), with world headquarters in Nairobi, will celebrate its tenth anniversary in September this year.

This was announced by ICRAF's director, Dr Bjorn Lundgren, on behalf of the Board of

Trustees, following its annual meeting which was in Nairobi to approve plans for the anniversary celebration.

The highlight of this occasion will be the inauguration of the council's new headquarters in Gikiri Nairobi, as well as an international conference.

The Board also inspected construction work at the headquarters which is expected to be completed in July for occupation in July. A piece of land measuring 10 hectares was donated by Government of Kenya.

The council is an autonomous non-profit international organisation and is governed by an independent Board of Trustees with equal representation from both developed and developing countries.

Kenya as host country is represented on the Board by the Director of Agriculture, Stachys Muturi.

The council's objectives include the initiating, stimulating and supporting research to more sustainable and productive land use in developing countries through the introduction of better management systems in land use systems.

Chartered ten years ago the council was based in the Netherlands for a brief period, setting up its headquarters in Nairobi in 1978 under agreement with the Kenyan Government.

KENYA TEA EXPORTS UP ON LAST YEAR

KENYA EXPORTED a total of 27,116,974 kilograms of tea since the month of February this year and sold another 3,197,546 kilograms locally, the Tea Board of Kenya's monthly statistics on production has said. During the same period tea sold for export at the Mombasa auction amounted to 15,329,158 kgs. while the London auction and private sales totalled 11,787,816 kgs.

The report given by the weekly bulletin of the Africa Tea Brokers Limited for the Mombasa based East African Tea Export Auction noted that the figures for this period are higher than those of the same period last year. In 1986 period, total tea exported was 21,521,938 kgs. from both the Mombasa- and London-Sales Auctions. The same period's domestic sales amounted to 2,973,507 kgs.

able to be present due to commitments. Chairman explained that aim is to build up a professional clearing and forwarding association throughout the country. At the moment, he said 'only two companies out of 350 members'. This he described as 'ethic'. He noted, however, that those who are members are about 80 per cent 'trade'. He said those present 'in an effort which is so international like Clearing and Forwarding is very advantageous to KCFWA as it is a member of the International Federation of Freight Forwarders'. The chairman 'foreign agents usually like to appoint agents with good credentials membership of a professional association is one of the best recommendations'. 'In essence' he went on 'a clearing and forwarding agent works between importers and exporters in different countries. It requires knowledge of the legal restrictions and requirements, also a good understanding of numerous documents'. He told those present 'we are currently working on Standard Conditions, and this will be followed by a Code of Conduct, as well as training courses'. The chairman concluded by stating that the KCFWA had moved to the PC's office on several occasions, and last year had donated Shs. 10,000/- towards the building of the new KANU HQ at Mombasa.

The KCFWA was formed in 1980 to promote and protect the legitimate trade of C and F agents, warehousemen, transporters and allied trades. A Nairobi branch opened in 1986.

Addressing the seminar, the Personal Assistant to the PC, Mr David Nyasimi, congratulated the association for organising such an informative seminar 'not only for your own interests, but those of the nation'.

HIGH IMPORT DUTY

He went on 'as an association, the actions of individual members directly involves you, and your credibility. Consequently, if a crime is committed by a member it is important that he be disciplined.' Adding 'it is also important that you advise government of those agents whom you consider are not worth their salt'.

'Honesty in your business is the operative word, for you interact widely with international business people'.

Said Mr Nyasimi 'we sometimes hear of certain irregularities, such as the underpricing of goods to avoid high import duty'.

He pointed out that government thrives on what it receives from such duty and other levies.

The PA said how impressed he had been by the speakers invited to address the seminar. He commended the association for organising such a forum so that agents in the clearing and forwarding sector can become more knowledgeable about the industry in general, and its future plans.

Such action is, therefore, undermining or sabotaging our economy'.

Declared Mr Nyasimi 'it is high time that the association looks into such practices and

the black sheep be weeded out, or disciplined'.

He told Clearing and Forwarding Agents that in dealing with the international business community they are exposing the government image abroad.

He said 'if members know we are honest, they will trust us further which, in turn, will attract more business here. But if that image becomes tarnished, then they will not trust us so much as Kenyans'.

The chairman, Mark Radoli, in thanking the PA referred to his remarks about 'recommending agents who are crooks for discipline' and said that this will be kept in mind when the association is drafting its 'Code of Conduct'.

He assured the PA that the association will do everything possible to protect the good name of the Kenya government,

adding 'we are cognizant of the fact that without the peace and necessary economic environment provided by Government we cannot operate as businessmen'.

Large baskets dangling from the ceiling contain huge bunches of colourful bougainvillea, as well as choice Kenya fruit.

The lounge has a large wall mural depicting the flora and fauna of Kenya.

All rooms are air-conditioned and extremely spacious with two large high double Lamu-style beds with scalloped canopies.

No two beds in the Palm Tree Club are alike.

All rooms are equipped with a 'Frig Bar', built-in safe; also a spacious bathroom with shower, WC, bidet and large wall mirror.

There are large bedside table lamps and an electric vapouriser to deal with any mosquito that dares to enter.

Ceilings are all Lamu-style with boriti poles.

Outside each room is a large private terrace on which are two Swahili beds filled with plump kitenge-khanga covered cushions.

One room has a beautiful Lamu-style bed made from ebony with legs shaped after those of a lion.

It is said to be around 300 years old - its twin being in the Lamu Museum.

In fact, Palm Tree Club has been likened to a museum, for it is claimed it has more items of original antique furniture than are to be found in the Lamu Museum.

Explained Mr. Marini 'I took over two years to build this hotel and during that time I visited many places in search of antiques.'

Palm Tree Club is situated on four acres of land near the Malindi Golf and Country Club and has spacious gardens, a windmill to pump water and twelve horses to take guests, and others interested, for beach rides.

The beach is 5 kms away, and free transport is available to take guests there.

Another prominent member of the Italian community at Malindi is Armando Tanzini, owner of the beautiful 74-bed White Elephant Hotel which opened 18 months ago. It is full of Lamu-style decoratively carved furniture and doors, as well as antiques and Swahili-Lamu style beds.

He feels that Malindi has a great future.

When Malindi can be assured of a constant supply of water, he plans to build a 500-bed African-style hotel comprising villages following the architectural style of different tribes of Kenya, into which will be incorporated some of their arts and crafts.

Mr. Tanzini disclosed that five companies are interested in hotel development at Malindi-Watamu. One is American, while another is from Austria - both being for a very sophisticated market.

Mr. Tanzini is extremely talented. He is presently completely re-designing Safari Park Hotel, Nairobi, while at Malindi he will soon start exporting life-sized hand carved wooden animals being retained under the label 'Big Toys for Big Children'.

He considers there is a great future for such an industry, as Kenya has many talented woodworkers.

The first large 'toy' to be exported will be an elephant!

'DREAM VILLAGE'

Opening last year with 180 beds was African Dream Village - development by Julio Bargellini a manufacturer from ITALY.

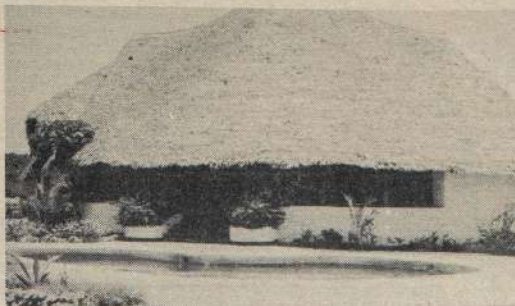
He said 'I travelled all over Africa looking for the right place which to build my hotel, and finally decided on Malindi'.

'Millions Wasted Over Use of Armaments ...'

ONE HUNDRED thousand million dollars are spent annually on the consumption of alcohol, while the cost of arms production runs into three hundred thousand million dollars a year in the developed world.

All that is required to reach the goal of clean water for all by 1990 is three per cent of the booze bill, while to eradicate malaria - all we need to do is to stop arms production for two days.

These impact-making statistics came from Rotarian Abdul Lakha (Rotary District 920 Governor Nominee for 1988-9) when addressing the Rotary Club of Mombasa Central which was celebrating its first Charter Anniversary at Nyali Beach Hotel.

Rotarian Lakha, who was Guest Speaker is a lawyer and a member of Nairobi South Rotary Club. He emphasised that 'as part of the international community we need to put service above self, also to press for the restructuring of our priorities in order to meet our mutual obligations'.

The period from 1981-1990, he said 'had been designated as the Intentional Water Supply and Sanitation Decade and the motto is clean water for all by 1990'.

Its cost, had been set at between three and four thousand million dollars a year for ten years.

Describing this as a 'staggering figure' he went on to compare it with what the developed world spends on booze, arms production etc.

His speech stemmed from the "Grace" said at all Rotary luncheon and dinner functions. The words are 'For food, friends and fellowship we thank thee O Lord. May we ever be heedful of the needs of others'.

Rotarian Lakha described them as 'meaningful and thought provoking'.

But, he asked 'I wonder how many of us ever stop to think just how demanding that prayer is? Are we really aware of just how important these three things are to a meaningful existence - an existence to be filled with joy and to be lived out in dignity'.

perpetual prerogative of a privileged minority'. Adding 'Our Rotary District 920 has areas where the need for food is the greatest. Consequently, we, of all people, should be most concerned'.

Said Rotarian Lakha 'last night over two billion of our world neighbours arrived at the end of another day hungry or malnourished.'

Right here within Rotary International's District 920 more than half of the people have no access to clean drinking water.'

One million people died at the end of the last decade from malaria.

here he noted that Rotary International had taken a step in the right direction and that its '3-H Programme' had been more than lip service and was proving a great success.

He also mentioned that 'only about 30 per cent of children in the region defined by United Nations as 'East Africa' have the possibility of enrolling in an educational institution.'

Asked Rtn. Lakha 'but what about the rest of them?'

He then went on to speak of the meaning of 'true friendship'. Adding 'so often friendship is presented as a mutual relationship established to protect someone from someone else. The motivation is fear and the results are destructive.'

Declared Rtn. Lakha 'we need not protect ourselves from each other if we realise friendship could and should be able to exist apart from political ideologies or religious persuasions'.

'Isn't this what Rotary International is attempting to do? But what are the facts?'

'When friendship is defined as forces of resistance to common enemies then the results become most devastating. We are now spending over one million dollars a minute to produce implements of destruction.'

'EXPLOSIVES'

We have already produced enough explosives to kill every man, woman and child in the world, not once but ten times over. We are spending average

of over eight thousand dollars to arm each of our soldiers and we are spending less than one hundred dollars to educate a child. And the result?'

Eight and a half-million homeless refugees fleeing for their lives. Over five million arrived here in Africa of whom half are children.

As part of Rotary International we need to realise, amongst other things, that starvation and malnutrition in countries where we reside is not always a matter of lack of food or lack

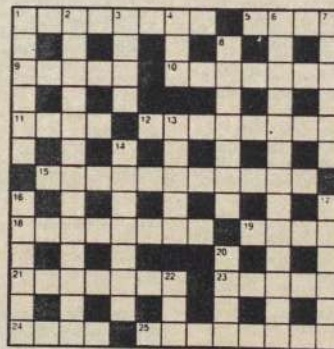

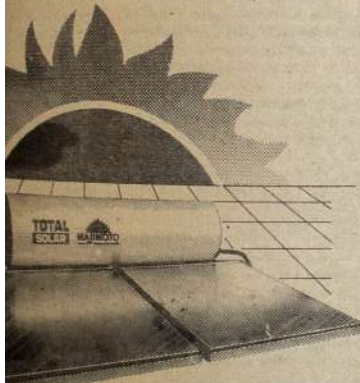

Most people are however apprehensive when stopped at road blocks, for double parking or parking on yellow lines. They become very rude and usually end up in worse trouble than necessary.

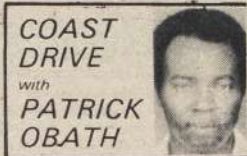
The "Do you know who I am?" or "Where did you go to school?" attack is the most common and instantly puts the lawman on the offensive - as it would most of us.

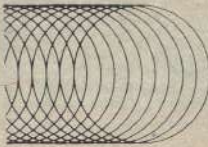

SAFARI RALLY COMES TO THE COAST LATE SUNDAY ON EVENING

THIS YEAR'S Marlboro Safari Rally starts on Thursday 16 April at 14.00 hrs from Kenya International Conference Centre. First cars are expected into Bura at 3.30 p.m. on Sunday - with a rest stop at Voi Safari Lodge from 5.15 p.m.

In a departure from the usual format, the cars will do the section to the north and west first before returning for the major rest halt in Nairobi.

The last section will bring the

cars as far down as Voi to the final rest halt before the return to Nairobi for the finish.

Traditionally, the Safari has had three legs run in a clover leaf pattern from Nairobi. This year, however, to keep up with the FISA requirements, the Safari is divided into seven sectors with a rest halt at the end of each sector.

On the first day the cars will head north via Saba Saba, Karatina and Embu arriving in Nan-

yuki, the first rest halt, at 20.05 hrs. They will rest till the next morning at 06.00 hrs when they leave Nanyuki for Kabarnet through Dol Dol, Larregai and Churo, writes Patrick O'ath.

After a brief rest, the cars then leave Kabarnet at 17.00 hrs through Nyaru, Cherangani, Kimilili, Malaba and Kodiaga arriving in Kisumu at 22.55 hrs on the Friday evening.

From Kisumu, the cars depart at 05.00 hrs on the Saturday

morning via Sotik, Kapsoit, Londiani and Enangipiri to arrive at Nakuru at 10.12 hrs. The cars will leave Nakuru at 15.30 hrs via Mau Narok, II Damat and Gatukuyu to arrive in Nairobi at 17.30 hrs.
