This is the first visit of these three ships to Mombasa. The home port of two of the ships, the Halsey and the Stein, is in San Diego, California.

The largest of the two, the Halsey is a 7,800-ton, 533-foot guided missile cruiser. It is under the command of Captain Dennis R. Conley.

The Stein is a 4,200-ton, 438-foot fast frigate under the command of Commander Howard K. Kline.

The third ship, the Willamette, which has its home port in Pearl Harbor, Hawaii, is the fleet oiler.

This large ship displaces 26,100 tons and is 592 feet long. It is under the command of CDR David C. Lundahl.

Group A is for children of 7 years of age and under. Group B years 8-10, Group C years 11-13, and Group D years 14-16.



## Government May Ease Up Over **FOREX For Local Tourist Hotels**

TANZANIA'S MINISTER for Lands, Natural Resources and Tourism, Getrude Mongella said this week that the Government will consider requests from tourist hotels to retain 50 percent of their foreign exchange earnings for importation of essential equipment required to improve amenities at their hotels.

The minister said this when opening the new 10 million shillings Bahari Beach Restaurant which was razed by fire in 1978.

The fire then gutted down the hotel's central palm thatched roof which served as a canopy to the public rooms including the bar, lounge and dining areas.

The burnt down thatched roof used to resemble the sail of a dhow and was a significant feature of the hotel. The new restaurant has been built on the same spot with a similar roofing hence rejuvinating the hotel's former aura of a thatched African village. can village

During the opening ceremony, the Minister also revisited the erosion problem threatening the city's beach hotels and said that negotiations are being made with some local and foreign companies to and this reign companies to end this long problem

At the Bahari Beach hotel, At the balant beach note, vital structures including the swimming pool face collapse in the next few months if something is not done soon. Two beach huts are also threatened.

## HEALTH STATISTICS ARE 'IMPROVING ...

THE ZANZIBAR Minister for Health and Social Welfare, Maulid Makame, has said that Zanzibar has recorded fine progress in its immunisation pro-gramme which was launched on the isles in 1984.

The Minister said that prior to 1984, about 65 per cent of children contracted measles of which about half died. In contrast, the 1986 figures show that only 31 children have contracted the disease of whom none have died.

He said that the number of children dying from the isles six children killer diseases has dropped substantially. The six diseases are measles, tubercolosis, polio, whooping cough, tetanus and diptheria.

Meanwhile, the isles government plans to make adequate preparations for paddy growers before the next farming season so as to increase rice yields. 



## 'Millions Wasted Over Use

ONE HUNDRED thousand mil lion dollars are spent annually on the consumption of alcohol, while the cost of arms production runs into three hundred thousand million dollars a year in the developed world.

All that is required to reach the goal of clean water for all by 1990 is three per cent of the booze bill or one per cent of the arms bill, while to eradicate malaria - all we need to do is to stop arms production for two days."


The Club, which previously used to organise many rallies in Tanzania, was dissolved after Tanzania closed its routes to the former East African Safari rally which now only runs in


