

THE MALARIA CONTROL PROCRAMME in the country received a big financial shot in the arm this week following a 200 million shillings grant by the Japanese Government towards the project. The programme is based in Dar es Salaam and Tanga regions with an aim to reduce the prevalent malaria menance affecting the local population.

The Malaria programme is part of the National Malaria Control Programme planned by the Ministry of Health and Social Welfare and the grant money is expected to go towards buying of insecticides, spraying equipment and vehicles.

The Japanese have given a further 160 million shilling grant for an agricultural transporta tion project. These funds will be used by the National Trans-port Corporation (NTC) to buy trucks for regional transport companies

Meanwhile, the National Shipping Agencies Company (NA-SACO) has decrid the habit of some individuals and companies of converting containers into storage places, stores or even living houses.

The company has called upon its customers in Tanzania and other neighbouring countries to return the cargo containers be-cause they belong to overseas

CONTAINERS

The normal trend is for containers to be leased from the Rotterdam based Container Transport Institute (CTI) which charges between 2.5 to 7 US dollars per container per day, the charge depending on the size of the container.

It is reported that Tanzania is losing a lot of foreign currency by paying demurrage charges to ship owners in Europe and America who have com-

country has to pay in foreign currency for international ser-vice facilities used.

Along with the telephone and telex increase, the prices of soft drinks, beer and cigarettes have also been raised and the Government is also reviewing customs duty for products which local industries can satisfy the national demand. This is aimed at protecting the local industries from goods currently being imported under the trade liberalisation policy

The affected items will include cigarettes, beer, wines, soap, tooth paste, cooking oil, light bulbs, soft tinned drinks and ceramics amongst others.

And finally, the European Economic Community (EEC) will give 15 million dollars in EEC aid to finance a road link between Blantyre in Malawi and the port of Dar es Salaam.

The isles Government is still working out a loan request with Italy and if negotiations are fruitful then the ferry boats could be imported.

To this effect, a high ranking Tanzania Government team supposed to be led by the Ministep for Finance, Planning and Economic Affairs, Cleopa Msuya was to travel to Rome last month but the recent reshuffle in the minitries forced a postponement.

The boat project was set as a priority in the 1986-87 annual development plan and is intended to ease transportation problems between Zanzibar and Pemba islands so that Pemba produce can be made available in Zanzibar markets.



Last Of The Maize Loaders Preparing To Leave Port

AS THE LAST of the maize loaders prepare to sail, except for the Promina which is not likely to complete until early May, a wheat discharger is due today with 11,600 tons in bulk. The carrier is the 12 year old South Korean Wonsbon of 21,500 deadweight tons with her cargo loaded in Jeddah, Saudi Arabia; I have commented in earlier articles on the thriving export of wheat from Saudi Arabia, a part of the world one does not normally associate with the production of cereals. I understand that this shipment may be the forerunner of several more bulk wheat shipments in the near future whereas there is a definite lull in the export of maize.

Regular exports of Molasses are a part of the Kilindini scene. Due on Sunday is the two year old Japanese chemical tanker *Colden Sanwa* to load 4200 tons at No.9 berth from the

tanks of the East African Storage Company situated at Shimanzi High Level

Most of these molasses ship-Most of these molasses ship-ments are destined for Europe. An identical sister ship to the Golden Sanwa was the Global Venus which arrived and berthed last Sunday to discharge 800 last Sunday to discharge 800 tons chemicals. She was also built in 1985 and like most of the smaller class of chemical tanker was spotlessly clean and had a blue coloured hull - normally these tankers sport blue, red, yellow or green coloured hulls so they can be easily identified.

Due this week from the U.S.A. is another South Korean vessel, the 27,000 d.w. tons bulk carrier Doo Yang Frontier with 1415 tons of aid cargo for Uganda including powdered milk; the cargo is breakbulk and containerised. tainerised.

Kenya Shipping Agency are the Mombasa Agents for this "one off" caller. The owners of the vessel Doo Yang Line of Seoul are new to me although they have a large fleet of vessels mainly bulk carriers.

I understand the vessel is coming off hire at Mombasa and being re-delivered to owners.

A popular member of the Mombasa Shipping Community is Edward Bobrycki, the Resi-dent Representative of Polish Ocean Lines whose vessels have called at Mombasa for over 25 years.

Due to a considerable curtail-ment of their service, the Line will no longer be having an Owners Representative based in Mombasa, so as a result, Mr. Bobrycki and his family will sadly be returning to Poland.

This is his second tour of duty in East Africa so his total years spent in Kenya will have numbered almost ten.

The last vessel he will handle

is in port this week loading and discharging namely the Boleslaw Krzywousty, a caller of many years standing, better known in shipping circles as the "BK".




