Particular attention is also being paid to the many men who have not yet been motivated by the Family Planning message.

great help in putting the family planning message across to a wider section of wananchi.

Also being introduced is a Youth Welfare Guidance Centre, as soon as suitable premises can be found on Mombasa Island.

Said Mary 'young people have a lot of problems these

days and have been writing to us for guidance. We ask them to come and see us.

Consequently, we feel there is a need for a centre to be established where young people can seek advice. A committee, on which they are also represented, has been formed and the centre will have a full-time co-ordinator.

It will also have an experienced Counsellor and possibly, a telephone service as well for counselling.

Programmes for young people will be organised, including camping.

Continuing Mary said 'we shall also need to have some access to parents as you cannot counsel young people without them, as some of their problems originate from the family'.

Another new programme starting next month is in the Kwale District where the association will be combining family planning with the Child Survival

In an interview Mrs Mary Mwamondo, Area Programme officer of FPAK, Coast, noted that while most women have had some contact with family planning through child welfare and maternity clinics, men generally remained very ignorant on this matter.

Consequently, she said we are going to organise about six 'Male Motivation' programmes. We have decided to concentrate on one district at a time, so that the impact will be greater, and four of these will be held in the Kilifi District and probably start in June.

GRASSROOTS

'This time' she went on 'we are going right into the villages to discuss, train and motivate leaders in family planning matters so that village committees can be formed'.

She explained 'when you involve people at grassroots level, it is easier for them to motivate others with whom they have daily contact.

We want men to be trained to do this, for it will be of

Kenya Contribution for 'Human Rights'

AMASSADOR DENIS D. AFANDE, Permanent Representative of Kenya to the United Nations Office at Geneva has presented a cheque for US\$ 500 to Assistant Secretary-General for Human Rights, Kurt Herndl, as Kenya's contribution to the United Nations Voluntary Fund for Victims of Torture.

Presenting the cheque, Ambassador Afande referred to Kenya's commitment to the promotion, protection and respect for human rights. Kenya subscribed to the Universal Declaration of Human Rights and was a State Party to the International Covenants on Human Rights. Torture in all forms was explicitly outlawed in the Kenyan Constitution and it was in that context that Kenya presented its second contribution to the Voluntary Fund.

Assistant Secretary-General Herndl on behalf of the Secretary-General and the Board of Trustees of the Voluntary Fund, thanked the Ambassador for his country's contribution to the Voluntary Fund. That Fund provided medical, psychological, social and economic assistance to victims of torture and their families and was a concrete expression of the desire of the Organization and its Members States to bring humanitarian relief to those suffering violations of human rights.

Programme being run by UNICEF.

This is being done, explained Mary 'because we feel that family planning is an important factor in Child Survival.

With smaller, planned families, there is a greater chance of every child surviving and being given a better chance in life.

Ten 'Lady Educators' - who are well known and respected in their communities - are being sought by the FPAK. They will be funded by UNICEF which is also giving a vehicle to run six family planning clinics in the Kwale District.

Said Mary 'UNICEF are going to give us funds for mobilising the community'

Seminars are planned to take place right in the villages where most of the rural women live so as to make contact with those who have never been reached before.

'Our aim is to work together with Village Committees so that

the community itself is involved'. Said Mary 'we want them to look upon the programme as theirs, for it is they who will benefit from it'.

Decision-making would be a joint affair between the village committee and FPAK.

Continued Mary 'the association is not only concerned with family planning, but with the total welfare of each individual in the community'.

Clinics they will be establishing will be much closer to the people, so that long journeys on foot are no longer entailed.

Here Mary mentioned that when opening a Family Planning Clinic 'we normally co-operate with the Ministry of Health so that they can offer services such as maternal and Child Welfare to those attending'.

MOTIVATION

In the 'Motivation and information' Seminars they will be holding, they hope to involve the Ministries of Health and Agriculture - 'for all are part and parcel in helping uplift the quality of life for wananchi'.

Said Mary we have already met local leaders in areas where we want to go, and have collected basic data so that the work we do can be evaluated in a few years time'.

Kwale was chosen because 'it is one of the districts in the Coast Province with a high infant mortality rate'.

In some parts of the district where there has been development there are often 6-8 child-

HOTEL STAFF LEARN GERMAN AT JADINI

IT IS FROM Germany that Kenya receives the most tourists and to help ameliorate the 'communication problem' between guests and staff, Alliance Hotels have provided training facilities enabling employees to learn the German language 'free' of charge.

LIONS CLUB PWANI E.N.T. CAMP

LIONS CLUB of Mombasa Pwani have organised their first rural Ear, Nose and Throat camp at Kinango under the converynorship of Lion Kuldip Dang, himself an E.N.T. surgeon.

More than 350 patients were examined screened and treated. Medicines were distributed free and operative procedures pertaining to the Ear, Nose, and Throat were carried out under local anaesthesia.

Those requiring surgery under general anaesthetic were admitted and subsequently operated. A total of 39 operative procedures were carried out and Patients turned out in large numbers inspite of heavy rains.

Speaking at the camp, the Provincial Medical Officer, Dr Oyoo who graced the occasion, praised the Lions Club for the free voluntary service it is giving to the poor wananchi.

He also mentioned of the similar Free Eye Camp organised by the same club during December 1986 at Kilifi District Hospital.

He assured the chairman Dalip Dhanjal that the Government and the Health Ministry will do everything possible to assist such service clubs in car-

CHARLES BRONSON, in his traditional tough, poised stance, plays a detective who steps outside the law to solve the mass murder in *10 To Midnight* which is a repeat showing opening at Kenya Cinema from Monday.

Two grotesque events, the infamous 1966 slaying of eight student nurses in Chicago and the "towpath murders" in London, are rolled into one to provide a taut, tense motion picture *10 To Midnight* which has been brought back due to great public demand.

The clock is ticking and time is running out as two detectives tract down a psychotic killer whose elusive behaviour terrorizes a city while thwarting Police efforts to apprehend him.

In his obsession to bring the murder in, Charles Bronson (Leo Kessler) plants condemning evidence in his apartment and the murderer is arrested, tried but is set free.

Kessler is thrown out of the force when the falsified information is uncovered. But as the hunt goes on, and Kessler's obsession with the killer now becomes all-consuming as he follows him everywhere.

He is disgraced cop out to get his man, a killer at large described as a man in torment, sexually frustrated and taking his revenge on women, and the next victim in the line who happens to be Kessler's daughter.

NAIROBI MEETING FOR A.I.T.

THE 89TH General Assembly of the Alliance Internationale de Tourisme will be held in Nairobi from 25-29 May 1987. About 30 member countries from Africa, Australia, Europe, Asia, Canada, Japan, USA and Latin America will participate.

The International Touring Alliance is the world federation of automobile associations, touring clubs and tourism bodies which groups nearly 65 million individual members, representing some 250 million family members in 86 countries.

The Secretariat of this International organisation is based in Geneva and the Automobile Association of Kenya is an active member and has served as a Council member representing Africa in the Management Committee for six years, it has just been re-elected for a further two years in the last Management Committee meeting held in Zurich at the beginning of May.

The General Assembly of the International Touring Alliance was held in Nairobi for the first time in 1958, and it is considered a great honour to the AA and Kenya that Nairobi was chosen as the venue for the 89th General Assembly.

GULF STATES GIVE TRANSPORT HELP

ZANZIBAR Government has secured substantial grants from two Gulf States for expansion and repair of its airport and also to rehabilitate roads on the Isles. The Isles Government has secured about 335 million shillings from the two Gulf countries towards these projects.

of roads on the Isles with more assistance being offered for other projects in future.

Zanzibar is also to receive a soft loan of about 121 million shillings from the Saudi Fund for Development to co-finance major repairs at the Karume Airport in Pemba.

The funds will be released after the Government has raised 276 million shillings from other sources.

The pacts follow a tour of the Gulf by the Zanzibar Minister for Communications and Transport, Sheha Mohamed along with his Principal Secretary, Mohamed Salim and an official from the Tanzania embassy in Saudi Arabia.

It is reported that the delegation also had talks with the Kuwait Fund for Development on a 1.7 billion shillings loan previously requested by the Isles to refurbish its telecommunications network.

Zanzibar has also approached the Fund to co-finance the Pemba airport project.

It is reported that the Fund has asked for time to scrutinise the project documents before coming up with a decision on the issue.

Meanwhile, the Zanzibar Government may invite private participation in the operation of the new 81 million shillings Ghee and margarine plant which was set up by the Government in 1985 through Italian assistance.

The joint venture suggestion between Government and private investors is meant to overcome foreign exchange constraints which have stalled the commissioning of the project.

Private investors will be expected to expend the foreign currency element.

DATELINE: DAR ES SALAAM

Port Prepares To Handle More Cargo From Ugandan Exporters

DAR ES SALAAM PORT, which is currently being modernised under a 4 billion shillings programme, will soon handle coffee exports from Uganda which is the second largest coffee exporter in Africa after the Ivory Coast. It is projected that about 2800 tonnes of coffee will be exported from Dar es salaam per week with the coffee being ferried from Uganda to Mwanza for onward rail transportation to Dar es salaam.

The Dar es salaam port is the main cargo contact for most neighbouring landlocked countries including Uganda, Zambia, Malawi, Zaire, Burundi and Rwanda and is now increasingly gaining importance in face of the political situation in South Africa on whose ports some of these countries have always depended on.

Recent political moves to impose mandatory sanctions against the South Africa regime is likely to lead to additional cargo coming into Tanzania from neighbouring landlocked countries.

Related bodies like the Tanzania Harbours Authority, the customs office, the central bank and various clearing and forwarding agents have been preparing themselves for any such eventuality.


ZAMBIAN FIRM

For instance, just one kilometre from the nearest berth in the port, a Zambian firm Zam-cargo has an in-transit bonded depot which offers export and import shipping facilities for any type of freight cargoes destined for Africa.

The depot is linked with the Tazara railway line hence providing an excellent link-up to the port since the Tazara railway station in Dar es Salaam is about 8 km from the port.

Foreign Navies Should Keep Away From Us!

I WOULD like to express my views regarding the frequent military and Navy visits to Mombasa being made by foreign troops such as the Americans and the British.

In one of your recent issues you had a front page photograph of the US Kitty Hawk which is one of the biggest battleships of the US.

This particular ship and five other ships form part of a 'Battle Force' of the United States Navy currently visiting Mombasa.

Coincidentally, just at about this time one of the other local dailies carried a report of a visit by a British navy ship called the HMS Hermione which itself has followed in the tracks of another British Navy ship called HMS Gloucester.

It certainly puzzled me as to why should we suddenly have a flurry of visits by foreign navies and not on a small scale either!

The US battleforce alone carries about 8,000 marines plus its military artillery.

Kenya like all African countries with a strategic coastline should, I feel, strive to maintain a 'de-militarized' zone to

safeguard ourselves against becoming a victim in case of a superpower conflict.

Knowing that the Indian Ocean area and the 'Horn of Africa' are politically sensitive areas, the US, British and the Soviet Union should not be allowed to use our sovereignty for their selfish purposes.

I urge the Kenya Government to make sure that there is the barest of minimum of foreign presence off our coast. **Sailesh Shah, NAIROBI.**

KENYA CALL FOR BRITISH NAVY

'CARDIFF' EXPECTED IN PORT

THE BRITISH Royal Navy Type 42 Destroyer HMS Cardiff will be visiting Mombasa from May 25 to June 8. She is due to arrive off the harbour at 8 am on Monday and will berth at Mbaraki jetty.

Although the main purpose of the visit is to carry out maintenance the 280 strong crew are eagerly looking forward to their two weeks in Mombasa and none more so than the Captain, Commander Cosby, whose last appointment was as the Naval Adviser at the Kenyan Defence College.

Inspired no doubt by their Captain's enthusiasm for the country many of the sailors will be getting away from the sea for a few days to climb Mt. Kenya, play sport in Nairobi, spend a few days under canvas helping in the Game Parks or just enjoying one of the many safarries on offer.

HMS Cardiff is the third British warship to bear the city's name but surprisingly the first to start life as Cardiff.

The first HMS Cardiff was originally HMS Tiger but renamed Cardiff to commemorate the

capture of Cardiff Castle in 1653.

The second HMS Cardiff was originally laid down as HMS Caprice in 1916 but was renamed Cardiff following strong representation from the City of Cardiff.

Displacing some 4,000 tons, HMS Cardiff has an overall length of 412 ft. and a beam of 47 ft. She is propelled by gas turbine engines, the main propulsion being given by two marine Olympus engines, one on each shaft.

ROLLS ROYCE

Built by Rolls Royce, the Olympus used is a marine development of the engine used in Concorde.

For Cruising speeds Cardiff has two marine Rolls Royce Tyne engines developed from the engines fitted in the Vanguard aircraft.

Cardiff's main role is to defend forces at sea from aerial attack. Her main armament is the Seadart Guided Missile System and the semi-automatic MK 8 4.5 inch gun. The latter also provides a powerful anti-surface capability.

To counter the submarine threat she has two triple-tubed torpedo launchers, one on either beam.

To ensure maximum effectiveness all three weapon systems are linked to a computer which is able to correlate information from the radars and sonars and thus enable the quickest possible reaction to any threat.

Close range weapons include 30mm and 20mm guns.

Cardiff also carries a Lynx Helicopter. This is a fast and highly manoeuvrable aircraft which employs its own radar and is capable of carrying either torpedoes or anti-surface missiles.

Since entering service, amongst other duties, Cardiff has been the West Indies Guardship, on patrol in the Gulf and she was in action in the Falkland from 26 May till 7 July 1982.

She is currently deployed with HMS Active and HMS Broadsword which are also programmed to visit Mombasa before returning to the United Kingdom.

The recent increase of Naval activity in the Gulf may prevent H.M.S. Cardiff arriving as planned.

Re-Decoration For Kikambala

All will be air-conditioned with telephone, piped music,

This will then give the hotel a total of 336 beds.

To make way for this extension twelve of the old rooms were demolished.

The hotel's very spacious gardens are also being landscaped.

The Bush Baby Club on the opposite side of the road is also closed for re-decoration and re-opens on June 19. A new floor is also going in.

Two Fishes re-opens with a Breakaway holiday offer for Kenyan residents of Shs 425/- per person, full board.

The 220-bed Whispering Palms Hotel is having all its rooms renovated, in addition to which the hotel is being given a much more grander entrance.

Terrazo flooring is also going into the lounge, main bar and terrace, while other general improvements are being carried out.

The 206 bed Trade Winds Hotel remains open and has a new and more attractive Snack Bar near the swimming pool and sea, surrounded by tables with makuti sun umbrellas and chairs to seat around forty people.

The Snack bar which offers tasty inexpensive food, is open from midday until eleven in the evening.

Trade Winds is also presently re-decorating some of its rooms.

Other hotels involved in this massive renovations programme are the Tea Hotel; Buffalo Springs Lodge and Mountain Lodge.

BRITISH BUYERS REMAIN BIGGEST IN TEA AUCTIONS

MOMBASA (KNA) Tea exports to the United Kingdom between January and December last year amounted to 52.6 million KGS, while that of the second major importer, Pakistan amounted to 36 million KGS. U.K. import were valued at Kshs. 1,593 million and those of Pakistan at Kshs. 1,066 million, according to the latest figures given by the Africa Tea Brokers Limited which quoted customs department returns for the East African Tea Market auctions in Mombasa.

Sudan purchased 7.32 million kilos valued at Kshs. 170 million while the North American and European continents represented quantities in excess of three million kilos each with comparatively much smaller quantities to other markets. The report said that despite some restrictions of Kenyan tea imports, Pakistan still remains vital market and underline more than ever before the importance of the U.K. to the Tea Industry in Kenya.

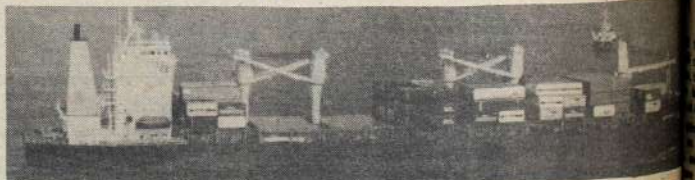

Addressing KATA's AGM, Mr Odera said 'as an association representing the majority of fifty-five travel agents in Kenya, with a total sales turnover of Shs. 1 billion per annum, the industry generate towards air travel and your potential for Kenya Airways is both considerable and commendable'.

'Last year' he said your sales on Kenya Airways increased tremendously compared with 1985. We are grateful to you all and are certain that with closer co-operation you will increase these figures progressively'.

He went on Kenya Airways on their part will endeavour to respond more quickly and positively to your needs and to improve operational efficiency'.

WARSHIPS TO MAKE USE OF KENYAN DRY-DOCK

THIS YEAR, two French ships will come to careen at Mombasa, taking advantage of the dock and excellent facilities of the African Marine.

The patrol ship Albatross will arrive on the 25th May at 8 a.m. and the ship Rhin will arrive on June and leave on the 10th.

Albatross, whose complement consists of 6 officers, 21

petty-officers and 20 seamen, provides the supervision and control of the economic zones adjoining the French southern lands in the south of the Indian Ocean as well as assistance to French fisheries in the zone.

Its commanding officer is Commander Patrick Stervinou.

The Rhin, whose company consists of 13 officers, 70 petty-officers and 85 seamen, provides mobile support for French ships in the Indian

Ocean. Commander Durand will take command of the Rhin on the very morning of its arrival in Mombasa.

Although they will be very busy with maintenance work on their ships, the sailors will however have the possibility of seeing the various touristic attractions of Mombasa and of Kenya

with its national parks which have for long been appreciated by the French navy.

Ein alter prophetischer Ausspruch lautet: "Faste und bleib gesund!"

Der Islam verlangt, daß zusammen mit dem Fasten auch die höchsten ethischen Grundsätze eingehalten werden. Enthaltensamkeit bedeutet: Verzicht auf Nahrung, Wasser, Tabak und Sex von Sonnenauf- bis Sonnenuntergang.

WÄHREND DES heiligen Monats Ramadan halten die gläubigen Muselmanen auf der ganzen Welt die strikte Fastenzeit ein, ein religiöses Gebot, das auch von vielen anderen Religionen in unterschiedlichen, mehr oder weniger strengen Formen vorgeschrieben und von den Gläubigen befolgt wird.

Ramadan ist der wichtigste Monat im islamischen Kalender, denn viele bedeutende historische Geschehnisse haben sich in diesem Monat ereignet. Der Koran wurde im Monat Ramadan dem Propheten Mohammed, als er in einer Höhle in der Nähe von Mekka meditierte, durch den Engel Gabriel offenbart mit dem Befehl: "Lies!" Für das islamische Bildungswesen ist Lesen und Schreiben seither unerlässlich und es gilt als Sünde, Analphabet zu sein.

Auf seine Anweisung hin feuerte die Kenya Navy am 29. April 1987 einen Schuß aus der Kanone beim Fort Jesus und die Fastenzeit begann am folgenden Tag.

Ramadan ist der neunte Monat des muslimischen Kalenders. Das Gebot des Fastens - eine Säule des islamischen Glaubens - erhielt der Prophet Mohammed am 13. Februar 624 n. Chr., im zweiten Jahr nach seiner Flucht von Mekka nach Medina.

Da der muslimische Kalender sich nach den "Mondmonaten" richtet, beginnt Ramadan jedes Jahr elf Tage früher. Nach dieser Zeitrechnung befinden wir uns 1987 im islamischen Jahr 1407.

Von der Bevölkerung von rund 20 Millionen Einwohnern in Kenia sind schätzungsweise ein Drittel Mohammedaner, ein Drittel Katholiken, ein Sechstel Protestanten; das restliche Sechstel setzt sich zusammen aus Hindus und Anhängern ähnlicher Glaubensgemeinschaften, anderen Sekten sowie Eingeborenen, die ganz oder teilweise noch dem altüberlieferten Glauben ihrer Vorfahren huldigen.

An der Küste gehört der Großteil der Bevölkerung dem islamischen Glauben an (dazu werden auch die orthodoxen Sunniten, Schiiten, Ahmadiiten und die Ismaeliten des Aga Khan gezählt), und in der Altstadt mit ihrem typischen arabischen Charakter findet man die meisten der rund 50 Moscheen Mombasas.

Berühmt ist die Baluchi-Moschee, gleich hinter dem Hauptpostamt; allerdings wurde der 1875 von den Baluchi-Vorfahren gestiftete Bau im Jahre 1964 ersetzt durch das sandfarbene und grüne Gebäude mit weißem Spitzenbesatz. Neben der Hauptpost, in die Digostraße hinausragend, ist die Khonzi-Moschee, eher unscheinbar, aber immer gut besucht.

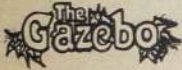

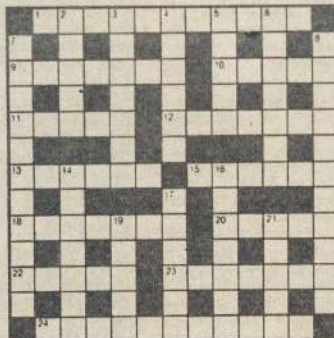

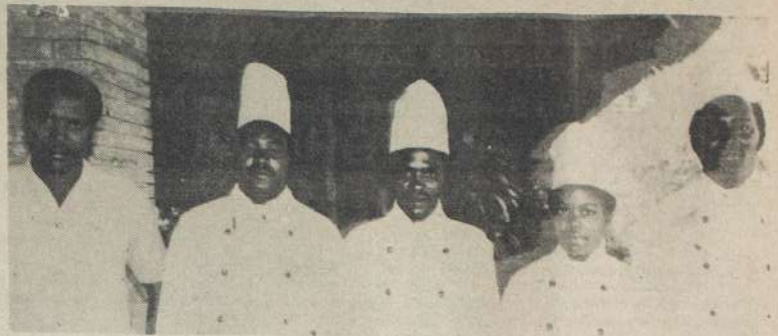

Road Safety Week Means All Of Us

OUR ANNUAL Road Safety Week is back with us again. At this time, we as drivers should concentrate on teaching ourselves and others the techniques of safe driving.

The pedestrians, cyclists, chickens, goats and dogs should also be revising their highway code and lapping up any new developments that have taken place in the interpretation and applications of this code.

The road engineers, traffic light boffs, signwriters, line painters and traffic cops should also be busy improving the information available to road users and should also be sorting out any problems that result from minor mis-interpretation of traffic laws.

It seems, however, that most of the impact of this week is lost since most drivers will only get to know about it when they see a small column in some newspaper announcing that Road Safety Week is here and X, Y and Z is going to happen at A, B and C.

Most of those things happen when mainly public transport is on the road and most other road users are comfortably tucked behind their desks pretending to be gainfully employed.

One of the efforts in Mombasa during this week may make us the laughing stock of the Nation.

Kachumbari tells me that the disease that has afflicted the roads in Nairobi - namely rumble strips or, put more bluntly, bumps, is about to hit Mombasa.

It is a well known fact that the man made (gene-spliced?) virus is very contagious, hitting the epidemic now hitting our Capital City. The naturally occurring virus tends to restrict its attack to very specific places. No matter how hard our local road doctors have tried, the natural bumps have always appeared.

The case in point is the Makupa Causeway. We have all experienced the nasty rumble strips that are present on the downhill section of road from the Changamwe roundabout towards town.

These are natural since their existence is dictated by the soil conditions under the tarmac surface. Maybe one day someone will correct that.

However, it seems that as an additional measure to improve safety by forcing people to cut down speed, some bright spark has a very good idea.

Over the last weekend three signs went up in this area. The first is the usual skull and crossbones with "Accident coloured spot" on it.

Then the next, and obvious, "Slow down". The third was, quite perplexingly, "Rumble strips ahead".

This third one is erected at a point, on the side of the road, where the natural rumble strips end. And, most confusing, a short distance after the natural rumble strips end, someone is erecting FIVE new man made rumble strips.

It would make sense about a kilometre away, and it would also save cops the duty of standing there with their Vascar radar guns nabbing speeding motorists.

One can only speculate but is this the beginning of another Argwings Kodhek road saga?

Is this major road into and out of Mombasa, the gateway to Kenya, going to have an acute attack of bumpsilitis?

It is agreed that some drivers are reckless and need to be forced to slow down to speeds at which they can handle their cars properly. But, surely there must be some other way.

It seems that additional hazards have been introduced for

people driving in the town.
