#### NOW FAMILY PLANNING TAKES AIM AT COAST MALES

NEW PROGRAMMES are constantly being introduced by the Family Planning Association of Kenya in the Coast area all to help wananchi improve the quality of life for themselves in every possible way.

Particular attention is also being paid to the many men who have not yet been motivated by the Family Planning message.

In an interview Mrs Mary Mwamodo, Area Programme officer of FPAK, Coast, noted that while most women have had some contact with family planning through child welfare lenya Contribution or 'Human Rights' and maternity clinics, men generally remained very igno-rant on this matter. HASSADOR DENIS D. AFANDE, Permanent Representa-of Kenya to the United Nations Office at Geneva has useded a cheque for US\$ 500 to Assistant Secretary-ized for Human Rights, Kurt Herndl, as Kenya's contri-on to the United Nations Voluntary Fund for Victims of lare.

Consequently, she said we are going to organise about six 'Male Motivation' programmes. We have decided to concentrate on one district at a time, so that the impact will be greater, and four of these will be held in the Kilifi District and probably start in June.

#### GRASSROOTS

'This time' she went on 'we are going right into the villages to discuss, train and motivate leaders in family planning matters so that village committees can be formed'

She explained 'when you involve people at grassroots level, it is easier for them to motivate others with whom they have daily contact.

Programme being run by UNICEF.

This is being done, explained Mary 'because we feel that family planning is an important factor in Child Survival.

With smaller, planned families, there is a greater chance of every child surviving and being given a better chance in life.

Ten 'Lady Educators' - who are well known and respected in their communities - are being sought by the FPAK. They will be funded by UNICEF which is also giving a vehicle to run six family planning clinics in the Kwale District.

Said Mary UNICEF are going to give us funds for mobilising the community'

Seminars are planned to take place right in the villages where most of the rural women live so as to make contact with those who have never been reached before.

Said Mary 'we want them to look upon the programme as theirs, for it is they who will benefit from it'.

Decision-making would be a joint affair between the village committee and FPAK.

Continued Mary 'the associa-tion is not only concerned with family planning, but with the total welfare of each individual in the community'

Clinics they will be establish-ing will be much closer to the people, so that long journeys on foot are no longer entailed.

Here Mary mentioned that when opening a Family Planning Clinic 'we normally co-operate with the Ministry of Health so that they can offer services such as maternal and Child Welfare to those attending'.

#### MOTIVATION

In the 'Motivation and information' Seminars they will be holding, they hope to involve the Ministries of Health and Agriculture - for all are part and parcel in helping uplift the quality of life for wananchi'.

Said Mary we have already met local leaders in areas where we want to go, and have collec-ted basic data so that the work we do can be evaluated in a few years time.

Kwale was chosen because t is one of the districts in the oast Province with a high in-ant mortality rate.

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## LIONS CLUB **PWANI** E.N.T. CAMP

LIONS CLUB of Mombasa Pwani have organised their first rural Ear, Nose and Throat camp at Kinango under the convernorship of Lion Kuldip Dang, himself an E.N.T. surgeon.

More than 350 patients were examined screened and treated. Medicines were distributed free and operative procedures pertaining to the Ear, Nose, and Throat were carried out under local anaesthia.

Those requiring surgery under general anaesthetic were admitted and subsequently operated. A total of 39 operative procedures were carried out and Patients turned out in large numbers inspite of heavy rains.

Speaking at the camp, the Provincial Medical Officer, Dr Oyoo who graced the occasion, praised the Lions Club for the free voluntary service it is giving to the poor wananchi.

He also mentioned of the similar Free Eye Camp organised by the same club during December 1986 at Kilifi District Hospital.

He assured the chairman Dalip Dhanjal that the Govern-ment and the Health Ministry will do everything possible to assist such service clubs in car-

## DUTCH **AGENTS** ON TOUR

TO BOOST bookings to Kenya, A. REIZEN — the largest tour operator in Holland, hosted an eight-dayeducational tour Kenya for sixteen of its travel agents.

Said Angelo Danko, tour leader wefind that bookings for safaris, ending with two days at the Coast, have doubled in the past year and have become more popular than beach holidays.

ZANZIBAR Government has secured substantial grants from two Gulf States for expansion and repair of its airport and also to rehabilitate roads on the Isles. The Isles Government has secured about 335 million shillings from the two Gulf countries towards these projects.

According to the Zanzibar Minister for Communications Minister for Communications and Transport, Sheha Mohamed Sheha, the Sultanate of Oman has pledged 310 million shillings for the proposed airport

The Omani Government will effect this grant after feasibility studies indicate the entire cost of the airport project.

The project is expected to involve the lengthening of the runway, installation of new navigational aids and building of refuelling facilities.

In Sharjah, a donation of about 25 millions shillings was pledged for the rehabilitation

of roads on the Isles with more assistance being offered for other projects in future.

Zanzibar is also to receive a soft loan of about 121 million shillings from the Saudi Fund for Development to co-finance major repairs at the Karume Airport in Pemba.

The funds will be released after the Government has raised 276 million shillings from other

The pacts follow a tour of the Gulf by the Zanzibar Minister for Communications and Transport, Sheha Mohamed along with his Principal Secretary, Mohamed Salim and an official from the Tanzania embassy in Saudi Arabia.

It is reported that the delga-tion also had talks with the Ku-wait Fund for Development on a 1.7 billion shillings loan pre-viously requested by the Isles to refurbish its telecommunica-tions network tions network.

Zanzibar has also approached the Fund to co-finance the Pemba airport project.

It is reported that the Fund has asked for time to scrutinise the project documents before coming up with a decision on the issue.

Meanwhile, the Zanzibar Government may invite private participation in the operation of the new 81 million shillings Ghee and margarine plant which was set up by the Government n 1985 through Italian assis-

The joint venture suggestion between Government and pri-vate investors is meant to overcome foreign exchange const-raints which have stalled the commissioning of the project.

Private investors will be ex-pected to expend the foreign currency element.

## Port Prepares To Handle More Cargo From Ugandan Exporter

DAR ES SALAAM PORT, which is currently being modernised under a 4 billion shillings programme, will soon handle coffee exports from Uganda which is the second largest coffee exporter in Africa after the Ivory Coast. It is projected that about 2800 tonnes of coffee will be exported from Dar es salaam per week with the coffee being ferried from Uganda to Mwanza for onward rail transportation to Dar es salaam.

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
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## 'CARDIFF' EXPECTED IN PORT

THE BRITISH Royal Navy Type 42 Destroyer HMS Cardiff will be visiting Mombasa from May 25 to June 8. She is due to arrive off the harbour at 8 am on Monday and will berth at Mba-raki Jetty.

Although the main purpose of the visit is to carry out maintenance the 280 strong crew are eagerly looking forward to their two weeks in Mombasa and none more so than the Captain, Commander Cosby, whose last appointment was as the Naval Adviser at the Kenyan Defence College.

Inspired no doubt by their Captain's enthusiasm for the Captain's enthusiasm for the country many of the sailors will be getting away from the sea for a few days to climb Mt. Kenya, play sport in Nairobi, spend a few days under canvas helping in the Game Parks or just enjoying one of the many safaries on offer.

HMS Cardiff is the third Bris.

HMS Cardiff is the third British warship to bear the city's name but surprisingly the first to start life as Cardif.

The first HMS Cardiff was ori-ginally HMS Tiger but renamed Cardiff to commemorate the

capture of Cardiff Castle in 1653.

The second HMS Cardiff was originally laid down as HMS Caprice in 1916 but was renamed Cardiff following strong representation from the City of Cardiff.

Displacing some 4,000 tons, HMS Cardiff has an overall length of 412 ft. and a beam of 47 ft. She is propelled by gasturbine engines, the main propulsion being given by two marine Olympus engines, one on each shaft.

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Built by Rolls Royce, the Olympus used is a marine deve-lopment of the engine used in Concorde.

For Cruising speeds Cardiff has two marine Rolls Royce Tyne engines developed from the engines fitted in the Van-guard aircraft.

Cardiff's main role is to defend forces at sea from aerial attack. Her main armament is the Seadart Guided Missile System and the semi-automatic MK 8 4.5 inch gun. The latter also provides a powerful antisurface capability.

To counter the submarine threat she has two triple-tubed torpedo launchers, one on either beam.

To ensure maximum effectiveness all three weapon systems are linked to a computer which is able to correlate information from the radars and sonars and thus enable the quickest possible reaction to any threat.

Close range weapons include 30mm and 20mm guns.

Cardiff also carries a Lynx Helicopter. This is a fast and highly manoeuvrable aircraft which employs its own radar and is capable of carrying either torpedos or anti-surface missiles.

Since entering service, amongst other duties, Cardiff has been the West Indies Guardship, on patrol in the Gulf and she was in action in the Falkland from 26 May till 7 July 1982.

She is currently deployed with HMS Active and HMS Broad-sword which are also programmed to visit Mombasa before returning to the United Kingdom.





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
