'Difficult Times For Mombasa Passenger Transport Services'

THE HARD PRESSED Kenya Bus Service (Mombasa) is facing a timetable of financial problems, according to a report prepared by the director and general manager of the company Mr. L. Meherali.

The cost of new vehicles increased from Kshs. 772,000/- in 1981 to Kshs. 1,114,000/- in 1983 while operational costs increased from Kshs. 3,045,500/- to Kshs. 5,340,920/- representing an increase of 44 per cent and 75.4 per cent respectively.

Mr. Meherali said that the financing of new chassis have been covered by substantial foreign borrowing while local costs have largely been financed through increased borrowing facilities from local bankers.

These expenditures have included eight buses imported in 1981 at a cost of Kshs. 6,415,540/-, 15 buses in 1982 valued at Kshs. 13,525,400/- and 12 buses imported in 1983 at a cost of Kshs. 12,654,380/-.

Twelve more buses are on order for 1984 at a cost of Kshs. 13,200,000/-, Mr. Meherali said.

"These facilities are almost exhausted and additional revenue must be generated in order to continue to maintain the high standard of our services in Mombasa," he warned.

Vehicle operating costs rose by 97.2 per cent from 1981, vehicle maintenance by 30.9 per cent and depreciation by 128.8 per cent.

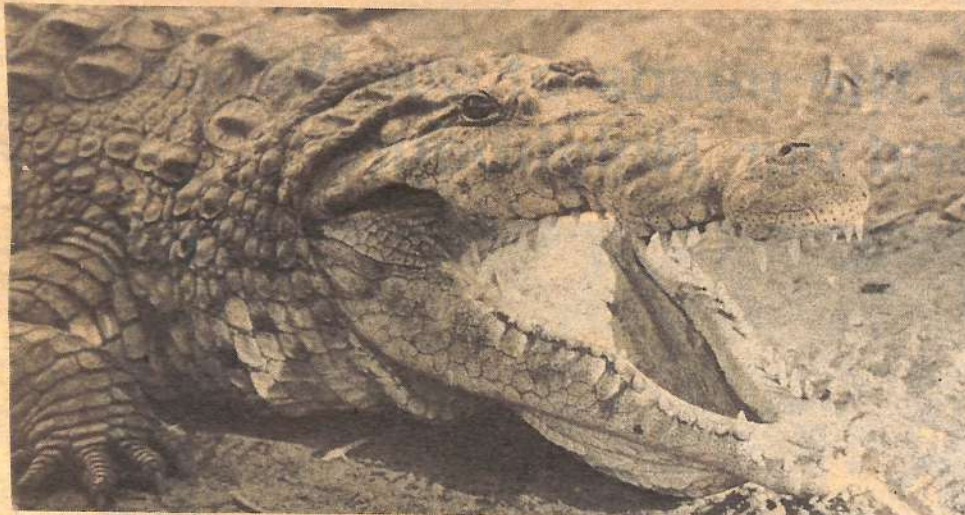
Mr. Meherali attributed the cost escalation to the increase in fuel and oil prices, wage increases, devaluation of the local currency leading to increase in the cost of spares, new vehicles and other imported inputs.

He warned that increasing costs for the current year are expected to shoot up between ten and fifteen per cent from the present levels.

Last month, the Municipal Council of Mombasa approved bus fare increases proposed by the Kenya Bus Company, averaging 13.9 per cent and expected to generate Kshs. 396,000/- per month with effect from May 1.

The fares increase, did not however, take into account last Friday's petrol price hikes announced by the Minister for Energy and Regional Development Mr. Nicholas Biwot.

The new prices for gasoline rose from Kshs. 8.00 per litre to 8.61, regular petrol from Kshs. 7.52 per litre to 8.13 and diesel from Kshs. 5.48 per litre to 5.94.

CROCODILE FARMING ...

MOMBASA SITE FOR WORLD'S LARGEST DEVELOPMENT

THE DREADED Tana Killer Crocodiles, responsible for at least 50 deaths in the Pokomoland last year, are being moved to a new sanctuary in Mombasa in a multi million shilling farming project designed to serve as a tourist attraction and a foreign exchange earner for Kenya.

The Kshs. 20 million farm, sited on a 20-acre old quarry plot next to Nyali Golf Club, will be the biggest crocodile farm in the world with a population of 20,000 crocodiles by 1988.

Some 650 crocodiles, trapped in a four month daring exercise filmed by the American ABC television network, have already found a new home at the Nyali Crocodile Tourism Centre run by the Kenya Crocodile Farm Ltd of Nairobi.

The first arrival included 700 crocodile eggs placed in the four of the fourteen ponds for hatching.

TOURIST COMPLEX

"We expect to trap thousands of crocodiles for the farm in the next four years", the managing director of Kenya Crocodile Farm Mr. Evi Feldman told Coastweek in Mombasa, "fifty more crocodiles would be soon joining the farm".

The tourist complex, providing recreational facilities for children, a restaurant, a pub and a research centre for the breeding of crocodiles, is

expected to be opened in September and would be fully operational for commercial purposes in 1988, Mr. Feldman said.

At a population level of 20,000 crocodiles, the farm would be able to skin 5,000 crocodiles a year for export, earning the country a million Kenya shillings in foreign exchange.

The exportation of crocodile meat, already popular in countries like America, will provide extra foreign exchange earning.

The project, sanctioned by the Ministry of Tourism and Wildlife, is also aimed at cropping the population of the Nile crocodiles in the Tana

River estimated to number 50,000, who have been a constant source of menace to the Pokomo tribesmen living along Kenya's longest river.

The Turkana crocodiles, belonging to the same Nile breed, provide a lesser quality skin because of the salty waters of Lake Turkana.

The feasibility study, costing Kshs. 500,000/-, was carried by international experts on crocodile farming as well as local biologists from the Ministry of Tourism and Wildlife.

The trapping of the crocodiles began in December led by a ten-man team using two boats. The crocodiles - the large ones weighing 80 - 100 kilos, were then drugged with gallamine compound using dart guns and transported in lorries to Mombasa.

CROCODILE EXPERT

There are similar projects in America, the Kretim Island Greece, Northern Israel and Zimbabwe.

The biggest crocodile farm is located in Thailand, with a population of 14,000 crocodiles.

Research work at the Mombasa project will be headed by an international crocodile expert Mr. Slomi Ranot who has done similar works in Greece and Israel.

In Mombasa, the Bamburi Portland Cement Company has been carrying out crocodile ranching where research is being undertaken to integrate crocodiles, prawns and oysters.

MOMBASA (KNA) A Kenya salt manufacturers plant based in Mombasa 'Kensalt' has been officially confirmed as winners of the prestigious 'Africa Award' for quality production.

The presentation of the trophy will take place at a London based Hilton International Hotel, where over 150 African and European businessmen will meet this evening for a gala dinner, thus creating a unique opportunity to open relations with industrialists from other countries.

Announcing this in Mombasa, the salt manufacturers Kenya Limited chairman Mr. W. K. A. Kettienya, highly commended the plants workers for their determination which he said had enabled the firm to achieve a trophy as a sign of competence in the Africa continent.

The chairman noted with appreciation that the workers at the Changamwe Plant in Mombasa West, mainland worked for longer hours which including Public Holidays last year to improve salt production when the commodity was in great demand in the country.

The chairman said that through the workers efforts the salt plant was going to save the country a total of over 14 million shillings in form of foreign exchange this year.

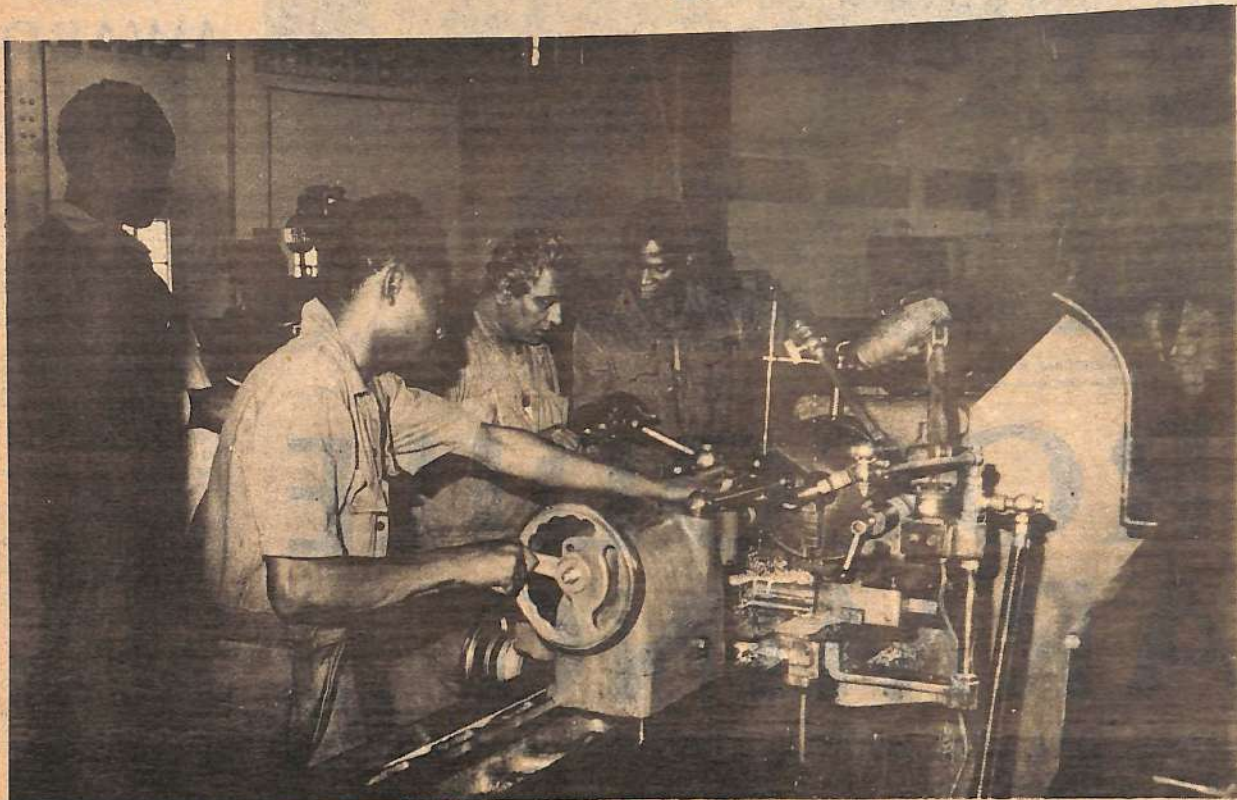

They also have their own football and netball teams.

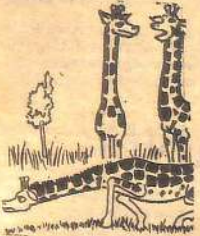

We cannot convince people to buy from Kenya if they can get cheaper and reasonably good quality goods from elsewhere.

Police Complete Investigations Into Fatal Sokoine Road Accident

ANALYSIS of the circumstances that led to the fatal accident which killed the country's late price Minister, Edward Moringe Sokoine were completed this week and two people are expected to be charged in court in relation to the incident. According to police reports on the accident, Sokoine died of head injuries sustained during the crash in which his Mercedes Benz Saloon was rammed by a Toyota Land Cruiser coming from the opposite direction. The report said that due to the sudden impact of the collision, late Prime Minister was thrown from the back seat onto the front seat and he sustained severe head injuries when his head hit the dashboard in the process.

The investigation report identified five factors which contributed towards the accident. First, that the driver of the land cruiser ignored signals flashed by the sweep car in the Prime Minister's motorcade, immediately before the crash.

Moreover the driver of the land cruiser did not hold a driving licence thereby indicating lack of driving experience and the stop signals flashed to him by the Prime Minister's escort car, seemed to have

confused him.

The report says that when the driver realised that the Prime Minister's motorcade was approaching, he did not try to stop and swerved to his right thereby causing the accident.

It said that because of the high speed of the motorcade, the Prime Minister's driver failed to brake on time when the oncoming cruiser was coming his way.

The report went on to say that despite a last minute effort by the driver to brake, the collision took place. Five people were injured with three being subsequently discharged from hospital while the remaining two are still hospitalised.

SOME LATEST news on Manta Line and ex Manta Line vessels involving the local Murri Freres Salvage organisation is that they have bought the *Sugar Trader* which entered port last Friday renamed *Turret* with a black funnel and the *Sisal Trader* arrived off the port on Monday morning in Manta colours under tow of the Murri tug *Bison* from the Comoros where she was salvaged after being damaged in a cyclone. The *Sugar Trader* was built in 1959 in Sweden whereas the "Sisal Trader" was built in the U.K. for the prestigious Cunard line as the *Scythia* in 1964 and subsequently changed hands in 1969 and became the *Merchant* and one of the fleet of the well known Harrison Line.

From her appearance the *Sisal Trader* still has cargo on board. Her future career in these waters will be watched with interest. She entered port late Tuesday to anchor. The Messina Line Roll on - Roll Off (RO - RO) vessel *Jolly Grigio* of 10660 d.w. tons which recently made one of her regular calls at Mombasa has changed her flag from Singapore to Liberia this re-registration as she entered Kilindini. Launched on January 31st and now I believe on her way to Mombasa is another new harbour tug for the Kenya Ports Authority. She is the 362 ton *Nyavu II* built at Troon, Scotland by Ferguson Ailsa Ltd. I am happy to see the KPA retaining their familiar tug names. A third tug is also building in Scotland and this one will

be equipped for deep sea salvage work so with the existing two private salvage companies based at Mombasa competition in this field will doubtless become more intense. Kilindini has been quiet this week with three or four empty berths most days. The charcoal loader *Nabeel* continues loading at No. 2 berth; this vessel has now been in port at least a fortnight. The two cattle carriers *Egeon* and *Lembu* completed and sailed the same day. "It was indeed fortunate that the fire in the bay in the forward hold of the *Egeon* was quickly contained and dealt with particularly as some cattle were already on board; I presume that spontaneous combustion was most likely the cause in view of the weather. I commented recently on the appearance of the *Majida* which discharged some 2000 tons salt on completion she has been placed "under restraint" by the Harbourmaster and at time of writing is at Mtongwe Anchorage. I wonder whether she will see the end of her seagoing days in Mombasa? The Polish Ocean Lines have reported on a 10 per cent increase in cargo carried in the first quarters of 1984 compared to 1983. P.O.L. now have a fleet of 146 vessels. Due to containerisation the frequency of their service to and from East Africa has been reduced over the past year. Presently they operate two multi purpose vessels in the trade the *Eugeniusz Kwiatkowski* and her sistership the *Tadeusz Ocioszynski* which are equally at home carrying containers or breakbulk cargo.

WHILE the Marlboro's Safari Rally was testing the suitability of various makes of high performance cars, another road test of, probably, greater significance was taking place between Nairobi/Mombasa/Malindi, writes Neta Peal. 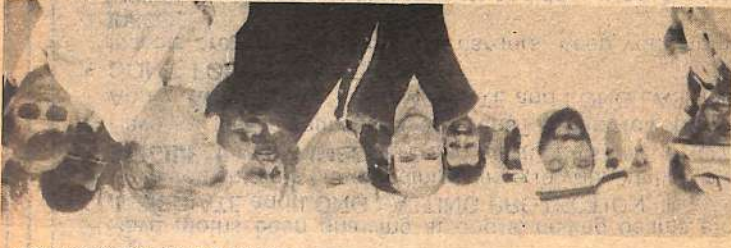

SECONDARY SCHOOL FOR DISABLED IN MOMBASA

FOLLOWING the declaration of 1980 as the National Year of the Disabled Persons in Kenya, one year ahead of the International year of the Disabled Persons — as proclaimed by the United Nations — Mombasa Round Table No. 3 embarked on a vigorous campaign to arouse public awareness of the plight of the Disabled Persons in our Society and promote efforts in the rehabilitation of those unfortunate members of our young Nation, a cause whose champion was and still is the President of Kenya H.E. Daniel arap Moi.

In taking up this challenge Mombasa Round Table No. 3 declared its dedication and determination to participate fully in this noble cause. In doing so ways and means were examined towards making a more realistic contribution in alleviating the problems facing Handicapped Persons. A longer term approach was adopted and all possible Avenues and areas of action were explored. The result was the concept of establishing a Secondary School for the Physically Handicapped in Mombasa.

That dream, a mere three years ago has now become reality. The school has now been constructed on an 8 acre plot on the Main Mombasa/Malindi Road in Bamburi between the Customs Training Centre and the SOS Childrens Village. Designed to look like an African Village it consists of: 9 Dormitories, 4 Classrooms, 1 Laboratory, 1 Workshop, 1 Headmaster's House, 3 Teachers' Houses, 1 Administration Block, 1 Kitchen Block, 1 Large Dining cum Social Hall and a Water Tower.

The first intake of 40 Students during April 1984 will eventually swell to 120 in 4 years time. The selection of Students - on a Nation-wide basis - is being done at present by the Ministry of Education. The aim of Mombasa Round Table No. 3 is not only to give pupils a good and solid secondary education but indeed to teach them technical and business skills which will enable them to adapt to the normal life of their social environment. The curriculum will consist of: English, Kiswahili, Mathematics, Geography, Technical Drawings, Woodworks, Metalworks, Technical Science and Social Studies.

This school will have cost a total of 5.6 million Shillings when it is fully furnished and equipped. A substantial part of this sum was raised by Mombasa Round Table No.3 here in Mombasa through their various Fund Raising Projects. In this connection Tablers would like to express their sincere appreciation to the very generous people of Mombasa.

However very early when the school was still in the planning stage, Mombasa Round Table No.3 realised that it might be problematic to raise such a large amount from local sources only. Therefore they decided to promote this project through the world-wide round Table Movement. This approach proved to be extremely successful, sincere gratitude goes to the Association of Kinsmen Clubs of Canada, who donated a substantial amount towards this project, as well as to Round Tables in West Germany, Sweden and Holland.

Not only did Mombasa Round Table No.3 receive generous donation locally, but they have been extremely fortunate in that all the Professional Companies which they employed such as the Architects (Waweru & Partners) Quantity Surveyors (L. Devin & Ass) Land Surveyors (Hime & Zimmerline) Quantity Surveyors (L. Devin & Ass) Land Surveyors (Hime & Zimmerline) Constructional Consultants (Beakim Consultants) Electrical Consultant (D. D. Patel & Ass.) have given their services free of charge.

Due to the escalating cost of Furnitures and especially Workshop Equipment the project has a deficit of some Kshs. 800,000/-. Mombasa Round Table No. 3 therefore sincerely appeal to the public of Mombasa for their help to fill this gap.

Within the Centre of the project a 'Memorial Wall' has been built. Individuals or companies are being asked to subscribe to a 'Brass Plaque', with their names engraved and to be placed prominently on the Memorial Wall. The size of the Brass Plaque will be determined by the amount donated. Tablers kindly ask for a minimum donation of Kshs. 5000/- in cash or materials. Mr. L. D. Galgalo, the Provincial Commissioner Coast, has kindly agreed to receive on behalf of Mombasa Round Table No. 3 such donations.

If anybody would wish to visit the School please contact the Project Convener Mr. K. D. Guenther of Telephone 315656/7, who will be only too pleased to explain the Project in more detail. Kindly also contact him for your donation of a Plaque.

Mombasa Round Table pleaded with the international movement that the problem of so many disabled persons is no longer a problem that can be swept under the Table and especially not so under the Round Table. They did not believe that this is a lost cause and never underestimated the difficulties in mobilising efforts for such a vast venture.

Today they can justly feel proud because their experience has shown that the defence of the Handicapped Persons is now part of the Agenda of our times. Round Tablers are not alone. The time has come to reduce the gap between the handicapped people and the world of the non-handicapped. We must create conditions which will foster better understanding between the two worlds and indeed help the Handicapped to make the best of his life.

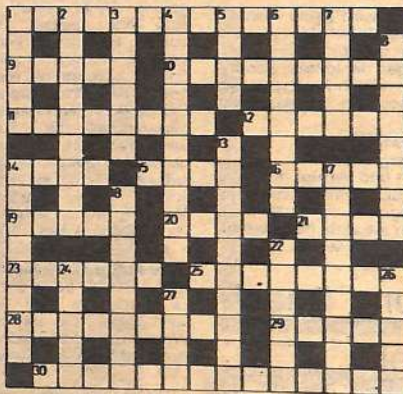

The Problems Facing African Rally Drivers

"NOW IS the winter of our discontent", the slogan for the disgruntled rally crews who don't qualify as finishers in the Safari Rally each year.

So far no one has complained that the event is too difficult; a hopeful sign as the challenge of the Safari particularly to private entrants who battle around without the massive service support laid on by the works team, is the fact that only a very small percentage of starters make the finish ramp.

One of the national newspapers set out a long list of complaints, the headline to the article went as far as suggesting that the odds were against African drivers.

Very true, but a careful examination of the allegations and some bare facts might suggest how those odds might be improved.

The main accusations appeared to be aimed at the companies and individuals who have sufficient funds to sponsor particular rally crews. A suggested solution was the raising of funds through Harambee meetings.

Surely African drivers have their own friends and business contacts who can assist financially; the number of privately owned Mercedes on the roads suggests that money is no longer confined to the European and Asian communities.

A crew alleged they were threatened by a control officer wielding a club after their car "had scraped against a table which nearly knocked down a woman nearby". An interesting interpretation of the incident, but how that caused their retirement before the end of the first leg is not explained.

The article continued to explain that the basic problem facing African Rally crews was the lack of service; and that the support arranged for overseas entrants was too expensive.

Again very true but the comparison is pointless. There are scores of local non-African crews who are serviced by two or three cars driven by their friends.

Finally the newspaper arrived at the crux of the problem; not many African crews enter the National Championship rallies.

This denies them much needed experience, for crew and service team; the car does not receive the necessary testing to expose faults and weaknesses, and the crews to not win themselves seeding points that would pull them up the safari start order to a more advantageous position.

Hunting back through the records for last season produces the names of six African drivers, one of whom entered three of the nine national championship rallies. Why then, expect a miracle when

the safari comes round?

In the 1984-1985 motor sport season, of which the Safari was the first event there are again 9 champion-

ship rallies, all of which include portions of the Safari route.

Some rallies like the Coast 600 in January use only Safari route, thus attracting entrants who count the event towards their preparation for the Safari.

Rallying is time consuming, expensive and difficult, and this will not change. So the solution for those who want to achieve some measure of success is to become totally involved.

The adage "if you can't stand the heat, get out of the kitchen", rings very true.

A constant entry in the lower level of rallies will produce African names in the Safari result list, then that condescending trophy for the best African crew, whether they finish or not, can be dumped in the nearest waste bin.

THAT ROAD:

*Ashes to ashes, dust to dust,
We've had some rain, so the roads are bust.*

Anyone unlucky enough to have to drive daily to Miriftini, and hence forced to use that four kilometre long pot hole laughably termed the Magongo Road?

There are probably other main roads that are a pain, both to the spine and the cheque book, to travel on, but this particular stretch, may I remind you is the only available road link between Mombasa, Kenya's port and the rest of the country. In addition it carries the unlikely title of the Trans-Africa Highway.

Some financial expert might be able to calculate the cost to the country in delays, and to vehicle owners in vehicle repairs.

Would someone in the legal profession advise on the possibility of suing the appropriate authority for the damage caused to one car by their inability to maintain the road to a sensible standard?

Before anyone bleats about how the damage is caused by rain, remember that rainfall except for a few unfortunate areas in the Middle East, Arizona and the like is a world wide problem.

There are areas in the Far East where the average rainfall is 200 inches; one water-logged spot in Assam collects three

times that amount.

These figures make Mombasa's 40-50 inches of rainfall sound like a veritable drought, yet the locals in those water-logged areas pull up their collars and go about their business.

So can someone please find out what is wrong with our road making technique, send the road menders on a course if necessary and then raise all our main roads to a truly ALL WEATHER standard?

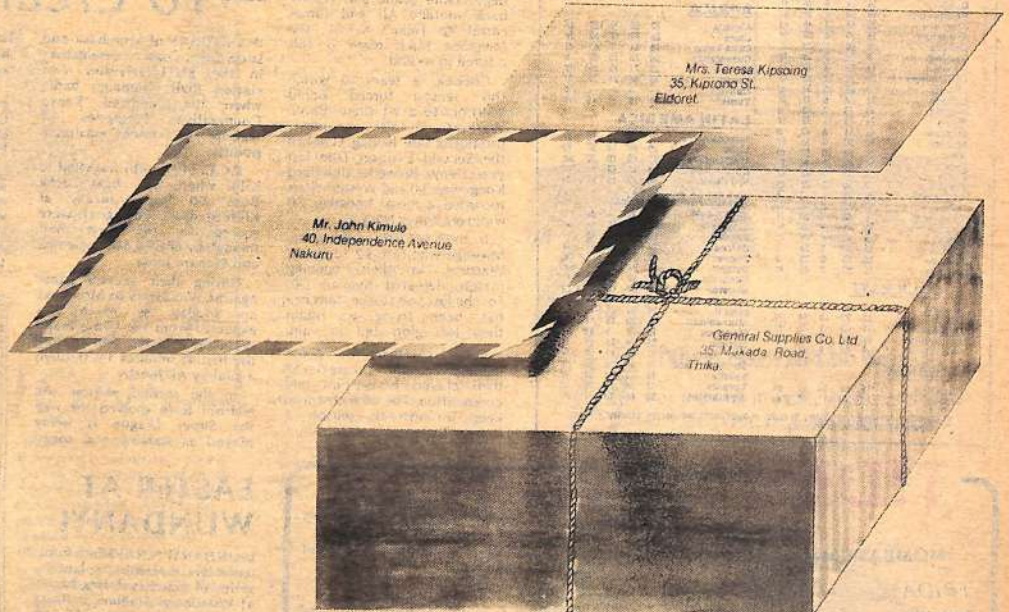
