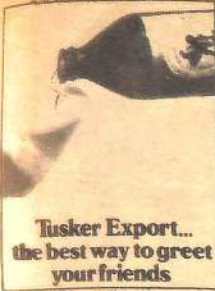

COAST WIN PEPSI PRIZE

MOMBASA (KNA) The Mombasa based Mvita Bottlers Limited and Eldoret based Western Kenya Bottlers Limited have won the 1983 Pepsicola Company International quality excellence awards.

For Mombasa and Coast, this was the third time this year when International Quality Production awards have been presented to manufacturing companies. The other two were Kensalt Limited and Kenya Cashewnuts Limited.

Presenting the award to the Mvita Bottlers general manager Mr Salim Shiraz, the Athens based Pepsi Cola International director of operations Mr Guy Libaghis said this was a great sign of technical capability and meaningful heavy investment in production making for the plant.

Saying that to achieve what the company did meant tremendous efforts in training and motivation to be able to make staff appreciate the importance of quality, the director hailed Kenya for doing very well for its soft drinks production.

He further hailed the winning feat for the Kenyan companies at Casablanca, Morocco, in a worldwide competition and called on the companies not to relax and be ready to win this years awards.

The manager of operations for Eastern Africa Mr Mirza being who accompanied the director said it was a marvellous effort by the two companies barely one year after becoming 100 per cent Kenyanised from Cadbury Schweppes, which was based in the United Kingdom.

'Top Rating' For 10 Coast Hotels

NEW CLASSIFICATION INTRODUCED BY KENYA MINISTRY OF TOURISM

TEN COAST Beach Hotels, dotted along the superb Indian Ocean shoreline, are ranked among top world hotels in a new classification list announced by the Ministry of Tourism and Wildlife in Nairobi.

According to the latest issue of the Kenya Gazette, Coast premier resort hotels top the list of 122 Kenyan hotels, sharing the five-star spot with six Nairobi hotels.

They are Reef Hotel, Serena

Beach Hotel, Plaza Hotel, Mombasa Beach Hotel, Nyali Beach Hotel on the North Coast, and Golden Beach Hotel, Leopard

Beach, Africana Sea Lodge, Diani Reef Hotel and Leisure Lodge, on the South Coast.

"This new classification of hotels places Mombasa and Coast hotels in the same group with the world's best hotels," commented the Coast Provincial Tourist Officer Mr. Henry Mulandi.

"It's also the first government-sponsored exercise to be undertaken by the Ministry of Tourism and Wildlife," he added.

Both groups of hotels are located on a wide stretch of soft sandy beaches backed by feathery palms and casuarinas along the east coast of the Indian Ocean.

In the same class were Nairobi's hotels Hilton International, Hotel Inter-Continental, Nairobi Serena Hotel, Norfolk Hotel, Utalii Hotel and New Stanley Hotel.

Mt. Kenya Safari Club was also grouped in the same class.

In the category of lodges, Taita Hills Lodge, Salt Lick Lodge and Ngulia Safari Lodge scooped five stars alongside such world famous lodges like Amboseli Serena, Keekorok Lodge, Treetops and the Ark.

Malindi's Crocodile Tented Camp was placed in class B, hot on the heels of such famed wildlife spots as Kichwa Tembo, Buffalo Springs, Governor's Camp and Nakuru's Island Camp both placed in class A.

Coast hotels also shone brightly in the four-star class with eight hotels sharing the same spot with Nairobi's three. They included Jadini Beach Hotel, Robinson Baobab Hotel, Two Fishes, Silver Beach Hotel, Whitesands and Malindi's Sindbad Hotel.

Nairobi had Pan Afric, Six Eighty and Sirkwa Hotel in the same class.

Out of 122 hotels, 17 were grouped in Class A (five stars), 12 in class B (four stars), 39 in class C (three stars), 24 in class D (two stars) and 30 grouped in class E (one star).

Five Stars (class A) went to 13 lodges, three stars (class B) to 7 and one star (class C) to five lodges.

Six tented camps were placed in class A while 5 were placed in class B.

The new classification list of hotels has been published by the Hotels and Restaurant Authority in accordance with the regulations provided in the Hotels and Restaurant Act.

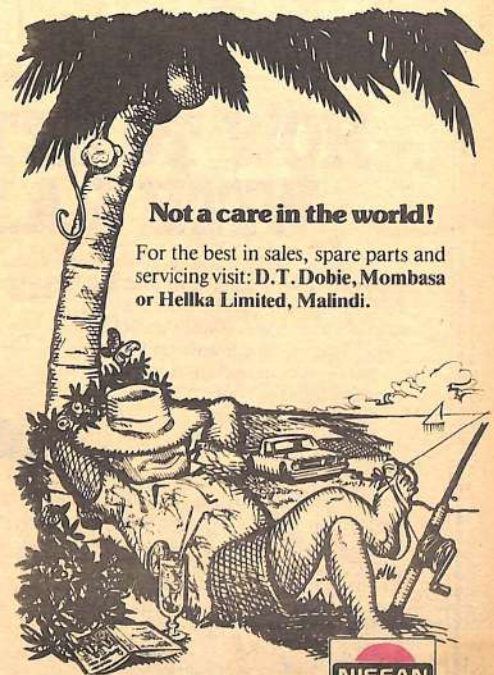

Nigerians Face Drive Against Corruption ...

WHEN the military took over in Nigeria on the last day of 1983 there seems to have been a general feeling of relief throughout the population as a whole.

The hopes which had been engendered when the military gave power back to the civilians four years ago had been dissipated.

Civilian politicians were seen to be back to their old tricks. Corruption was rife and an economy which had to support the consequences of a lower oil price due to reduced demand was staggering.

The new Nigerian head-of-state, His Excellency Maj. Gen. Muhammadu Buhari claims

that when the military took over the country was on the edge of an abyss.

Like previous Nigerian military leaders, Buhari claims he believes in democracy.

There is no reason to doubt his assertion that a return to democracy must be the aim of military rule in Nigeria.

But this time there must be adequate preparation.

If Nigeria is to avoid the pit of poverty into which so many once hopeful West African countries have sunk in recent years, then the economy must be put on a sound footing on a basis of discipline.

This means above all that corruption must be stamped out.

Nigeria as most visitors to that country know too well, has brought bribery and corruption to a fine art.

It has been the curse of the country since independence in 1960. General Buhari is convinced that there is no hope for Nigeria unless this can be changed.

And this needs a fundamental transformation in attitudes and above all a complete change in the personalities which have run the country under civilian rule since independence.

Democracy is one thing, gross mismanagement is another. The combination is impossible to live with.

This is a dilemma faced by more than one developing country with ostensibly democratic institutions which are vitiated by corruption or anarchy, creating an atmosphere in which real democratic choice cannot function.

Turkey is another outstanding example.

This is why General Buhari was not forthcoming recently when he was asked when Nigeria would return to democracy. The question seems less than relevant at the moment.

To Nigerians who hate corruption, the recent civilian government of Mr. Shagari was so tainted that it seemed that the whole society had lost its sanity.

"I am a firm believer in the right of a people to decide how they want to rule themselves," said Buhari in a recent interview.

"However, I do not see much value in treating the issue as a theoretical subject in a situation which demands all hands on deck to salvage an economy on the verge of collapse and to restore confidence to a society whose affairs have been so badly mismanaged".

Kenya Shell Boost Afforestation Project

HELPING bring 'tree seedlings' nearer to the people is Kenya Shell & BP Kenya Ltd. Last year in May it donated Shs. 10,000/- to the Forest Department, Ministry of Environment & Natural Resources, Mombasa, making it possible for a Tree Nursery to be developed near the District Officer's Office, Changamwe.

It now boasts 29,400 seedling trees ready for wananchi to buy. They cost Shs. 7/50 for a hundred, i.e. 25 cents each, and can be purchased from the Forest Department's Headquarters, Mvita House, Mombasa.

Only recently, President Moi led the nation in a Tree Planting Day, which is being emulated all over Kenya. It is the Ministry's target to have Tree Nurseries in all locations.

Cash Shortage

Mombasa has now reached its target of eight nurseries. They have some 68,000 trees between them, almost half of which are in the one donated by Kenya Shell & BP Kenya Ltd.

At the moment there is a great need to extend these nurseries to enable Mombasa's Forest Department to reach its target of 150,000 seedling trees for planting this year.

They would like to see existing tree nurseries more fully stocked, but cannot do so because of the shortage of cash.

A common source of energy in Kenya is fuel wood with 90% of the population, mainly in the rural areas, depending upon it.

It is now generally accepted that Kenya cannot continue relying on wood fuel without making adequate arrangements to renew this energy source by planting more trees.

Dr George Luckett, Area Manager, Kenya Shell and BP Kenya Ltd, was invited along to see that their donation of Shs. 10,000/- had been put to good use.

This had also included clearing and fencing the site, as well as growing and caring for 29,400 seedling trees.

Being grown there are Senegal Kikwata - which are good for hedges. The Forest Departments say that this tree is in great demand, particularly in the Bamburi area, with demand, particularly in the Bamburi area, with demand exceeding supply. Another variety is Bamba Kofi, described as a 'shady timber tree'.

Inspecting the tree nursery at Changamwe were the District Officer (I) Mombasa District, John Gakuo, representing the Provincial Commissioner, Coast; an Assistant Director of Fisheries, Elias Mwakilenge; Provincial Forest Officer, A.D. Uvoo; District Forester, Itumo Muindi; DO, Mombasa District, Mrs Mercy Karanja; DO Changamwe, Kanyonyo Maina; DO Kisauni, C. I. Shakava; District Labour Officer Mohamed Bwanatumu and Dr George Luckett.

Tasting Cuisine In Switzerland

JULIUS Kamau, Executive Chef, Nyali Beach Hotel, has just returned from a 7-week advanced course in international cuisine in Switzerland.

This training, sponsored by Block Hotels, took place in Holiday Inns at Regensdorf, Zurich Airport also in their central kitchens which supply all thirty-five of their restaurants and two hotels in Switzerland.

The Holiday Inn at Regensdorf specialises in 'outside catering for up to 4,000 people a day.

Said Julius 'I gained a lot of experience, as well as many new recipes and operational ideas which I hope to put into practise in the restaurants here!

He feels that although Nyali is recognised as being the best 'outside catering' specialists on the Kenya coast, the expertise he has gained in Switzerland can only enhance its reputation.

Although Julius has holidayed abroad before, this was his first visit to Switzerland renowned throughout the world for its haute cuisine.

He feels it essential for Kenyan chefs to have the opportunity of going to Europe or England for advanced training, or refresher course, as there is so much more to learn.

He found that catering personnel, although less in number, are highly trained. Chefs he met in Switzerland regard catering not merely as a job, but a hobby. They were keenly interested in creating new dishes to please guests not only to enhance their own reputation, but also that of the hotel and restaurant.

He said that the kitchen equipment there was 'very sophisticated and labour saving, with infra-red cooking units able to cook a steak in two seconds flat'.

Consequently, chefs had more time for planning new menus and dishes.

Julius enjoyed using this very modern equipment. He said 'it made work so much easier, and results were very good indeed'.

He found that Nouvelle Cuisine is still the 'IN THING' with less fats and heavy sauces being used.

Julius also discovered that while Kenya uses almost everything that is fresh, in Switzerland many items used in catering were factory prepared. This helped reduce labour costs. However, the flavour and quality were retained.

Whilst in Switzerland, Julius had the opportunity of preparing some African dishes which included coastal specialities as well as salmon in coconut milk. They were very popular. A particular favourite was Irio.

Continuing Julius said 'it is a compliment to hotels in Kenya that they have been able to maintain such high standards despite their chefs not having the latest sophisticated equipment as in Europe and the UK'.

Julius' wife, Elizabeth, joined him in Switzerland and they went skiing together down the snow-clad mountains.

He describes Switzerland as a very beautiful country with very friendly, helpful, people. However, it had been extremely cold there, and he had found the cost of living 'very expensive'.

Julius who comes from Kiambu has been with Block Hotels for 8 years, and is the first African to hold the post of Executive Chef in the history of Nyali Beach Hotel.

For four years he was Head Chef at Nairobi's Bacchus Club.

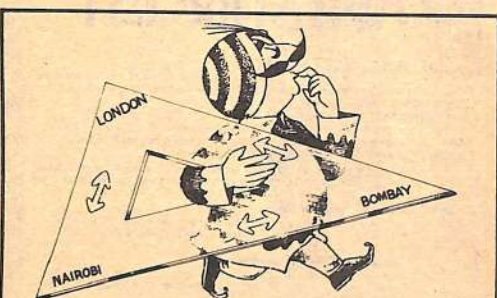

ZANZIBAR LEADER RESHUFFLES ISLAND CABINET MINISTERS

IN LINE WITH the recent cabinet reshuffle on the mainland, this week saw Zanzibar's newly elected leader Ali Hassan Mwinyi undertaking a similar exercise on the isles. Mwinyi reduced the number of ministries from sixteen to eleven while several ministries were merged or simply abrogated so as to alleviate costs and to increase efficiency.

Seven members of the 28 member Revolutionary Council were replaced while the number of Deputy Ministers was brought down to three from the previous eleven. All the three Deputy Ministers will now serve the newly formed ministry dealing with Sea, Tourism and Natural Resources.

The isles reshuffle came exactly a week after 59 year old Mwinyi was sworn in as new Zanzibar President in succession of former leader Ali-Haj Aboud Jumbe who resigned earlier this year.

As his chief minister, Mwinyi re-appointed Seif Sharrif Hamad who had earlier held the post following the resignation of Ramadhani Haji Fak after Jumbe.

The swearing in ceremony took place at the Zanzibar State House and amongst the who attended was the country's new Prime Minister, Salim Ahmad Salim.

IN DODOMA, the new Prime Minister Salim Ahmed Salim strongly criticised public officials who dilly dallied in their services to the people and stressed that the sort of attitude where people were unnecessarily delayed in obtaining their requirements should be stopped.

Prime Minister

Salim, who was speaking to employees of the Prime Minister's office in Dodoma, was on his first visit there since being appointed as successor to the late Edward Moringe Sokoine who last month died in a car accident.

Salim also called for national emphasis on food self-sufficiency and said that a campaign for food sufficiency should be amongst the nation's top priorities since it was in pursuance of economic salvation.

Salim promised government support towards the efforts put in by peasants in production and said that all efforts would be made towards providing the peasants with essential inputs

like fertilisers and farming tools.

REPORTS from Zanzibar have it that thousands of clove and coconut trees were devastated in a recent cyclone that swept across central Zanzibar district.

The strong winds accompanied with heavy rains are said to have swept about five villages and destroyed a number of houses while in other areas coconut trees and banana plantations were completely flattened out by the winds which analysts have described as the most severe in the history of the area.

The Zanzibar Revolutionary Government gave Shs. 15,000/- to the most hit victims to assist them with their immediate needs.

IN DAR ES SALAAM the Eighth International Trade Fair to be held in July has so far attracted nine countries three liberation movements and six local organisations.

Kenya will be taking part for the first time and this appears to be in line with the recent border opening which has paved way for more trading between the two neighbouring East African countries.

Other countries who have confirmed participation are Zimbabwe, Zambia, Mozambique, Uganda, Britain, Finland, Bulgaria and the Soviet Union.

Last year thirteen countries three liberation movements and 134 local organisations took part in the fair.

IN A ONE DAY meeting of the National Agrometeorological Committee (NAC) in Dar es Salaam the Minister of State in the Ministry of

Agriculture and Livestock Development, Herman Kirighini, advised meteorologists to collaborate with plant pathologists, entomologists and veterinarians in the use of climatic information and knowledge in order to protect plant and animals.

He said that climatic variations had a pronounced impact on the intensity of pest attacks and other diseases and pointed out that early predictions and warnings on the occurrence of droughts, floods, strong winds and other adverse weather variations can enable the country to take action that would minimise damage on crops and livestock.

The minister also called upon meteorologists to use simple non-technical language when communicating with peasants on weather forecasts in order to avoid confusions.

Factory Blaze

IN ARUSHA the General Tyre (East Africa) Company faced an indefinite production stoppage after the factory's mixing unit was destroyed by fire.

The mixing unit - Banbury - is the first line of production where rubber is mixed with chemicals before going to other lines of production. Its destruction will therefore stop production completely for an indefinite period.

The company's management has already flashed an SOS message to manufacturers in England who are expected to fly in experts soon. It is only a month since the company resumed full-scale production because two months ago production at the factory had to stop on account of shortage of synthetic rubber.

General Tyre which is a subsidiary of the National Chemical Industries (NCI) has been experiencing frequent shut-downs due to lack of raw materials and the shortage of tyres has greatly affected transport all through the country.

The company started production in 1969 and has capacity to produce 850 tyres of different types daily. Last year it produced some 150,000 tyres which amounted to only half its production capacity.

BARVE WRITES ABOUT KENYA TRADE

TRANSFRICA have announced the publication of *The Foreign Trade of Kenya* by Arvind G. Barve, the former Director of the Kenya External Trade Authority (KETA).

Kenya's future economic growth and national prosperity is irrevocably bound up with her success in the export field. That success is arguably as dependent on government policy and incentives as it is on the efforts and initiative of individual exporters.

This book for the first time brilliantly analyzes the elements and effects of Kenya's foreign trade policies over the last forty years.

It outlines the gradual maturing of the export sector of the national economy from simple import-substitution to more complex export-orientated industries.

The book, which is liberally furnished with important statistical tables, firmly puts its analysis within a historical perspective and includes pertinent comments on the economic consequences of the rise and fall of the East African Community.

The author makes a strong case for the government to evolve a more comprehensive overall approach to trade policy.

He points out that entrepreneurs nurtured in a high-priced, monopoly-tending home market cannot be expected to survive in the lean, highly competitive export markets on which Kenya's further growth depends.

He concludes with some challenging new ideas and approaches for what promises to be an exciting and vital decade for Kenya's export trade.

Arvind Barve was educated in Nairobi, India and U.S.A.

He joined the Kenya government in 1959 and worked for two years in the Registrar General's Department before being appointed as a Trade Officer in the then Ministry of Commerce and Industry in early 1961.

Subsequently he was promoted as an Assistant Secretary in 1964, becoming an executive officer with the United Nations Conference on Trade and Development in 1973 and Executive Director of the Kenya External Trade Authority (KETA) in 1976.

He is currently the Director of the Department of External Trade in the Ministry of Commerce. He has travelled widely all over the world in Kenya's delegations to various major international economic and trade conferences.

He is married with two children. In his limited leisure time he plays tennis and badminton, and is a keen bird-watcher.

Christian Group Work Miracles With Distressed

AT THIKA School for the Blind, Mwanguzi Kai who comes from a poor family, is able to study with other blind students because his school fees have been paid for."

"Phillip Matheka, the son of a former patient who is now completely disabled, looks forward to doing his form six examinations in November at Kenyatta High School, Mwarate."

There is a ray of hope for Marthar Wanjiku, an epileptic case who, in a seizure, fell into fire and seriously burnt her face, as doctors and nurses tended to her at Nazareth Hospital, Limuru".

These cases and many others, represent the work of the Mombasa Christian Hospital Group which cater for the spiritual and physical needs of patients as a complimentary service to that offered by hospital authorities in Mombasa and around the Coast.

The inter-racial and inter-denominational group began its humanitarian work in 1974 by simply making routine rounds in hospital wards, visiting and consoling patients and praying with them.

Others like Moses Fundi, toppled when he fell from a coconut tree and broke his bones, were not so lucky. After his initial recovery and rehabilitation through the help of the group and Bishop Jenkins of the Methodist Church, he later died from pus collection that spread to his hip bone.

About the work of the group continues, guided by God's love for mankind and the spiritual need to care and comfort those in pain and suffering.

Being a voluntary private organization, the group has had to rely heavily on its members and well-wishers for funds to carry out its activities.

Among the major donors have been the Mombasa Round Tables, Lion Club, East African Relief Services (a Christian organization) and the Young Doctors who are treating the case of Marthar Wanjiku in Limuru.

A type of cases assisted by the Mombasa Christian Hospital Group have included payment

of school fees to needy students, providing wheel chairs and crutches to the disabled, securing places for patients at rehabilitation centres with the help of the department of social services and hiring lawyers to represent accident patients in civil suits for compensation.

The chairman of the group Miss M. Smith says that the organization has been appealing to the public for funds to put up a small building which will be used as an office and a residence for some of the patients.

"We find it a problem rehabilitating some of the patients once discharged and cannot for one reason or another, be accepted at government centres.

The organization also needs a permanent residence for its chairman, a former staff at the Mombasa Hospital.

"We trust members of the public will help us in prayers in kind and material to enable us to continue with our work", said Miss Smith.

The Mombasa Christian Hospital Group is run by seven Christian volunteers who include vice-chairman Francis Kiama, secretary Charles Muga treasure Bartholomew Aguoga and committee members David Mwakesi, John Ondeche and Richard Oyaro.
