'Excellent Turnover' By The Jubilee Insurance

JUBILEE Insurance Company increased its profit before tax by 8.4 per cent from Shs. 15.7 million in 1982 to Shs. 17.1 million in 1983.

Investment income went up by 35 per cent from Shs. 14.0 million in 1982 to Shs. 18.9 million in 1983.

Underwriting results, however, showed a loss of Shs. 1.2 million as compared to a profit of Shs. 1.0 million in 1982: This arose due to an intensely competitive environment caused by the establishment of several new insurance companies in Kenya at a time of limited economic growth, reports the chairman of the company, Mr. Abdul M. Jaffer in the 1983 annual report.

Net assets at book value per Shs. 5 share advanced from Shs. 31.18 to Shs. 33.09. Earning per Shs. 5 share increased

from Shs. 3.26 to 3.27. Despite a difficult underwriting trend, Mr. Jaffer sees continued growth and progress for the Jubilee in the years ahead.

He is particularly optimistic as it has now successfully made a break-through in the group life and pensions business, generally purchased by employers as an employee benefits programme.

The company's net assets stood at Shs. 278.4 million (262.7 million in 1982) and total assets stood at Shs. 397.2 million (363.1 million in 1982).

The shareholders' funds of Shs. 105.9 million are by far the highest amongst all the Insurance Companies in Kenya.

Mr. Jaffer reports that "the board of directors consciously believes in the maintenance of the health of the company on a long term basis and to serve the total needs of the clients effectively, justly and on a continuing basis".

The company over the past few years has made impressive progress: A sound underwriting philosophy coupled with aggressive marketing efforts has resulted in increased premium volumes both for life and general operations.

"The pragmatism and the realism of your board, the dedication and the professionalism of the management and above all, the underlying strengths of your company, all put together, hold out, in my opinion, possibilities of a future with satisfactory growth for the Jubilee in the coming years". Says Mr. Jaffer in the 1983 annual report.

The Jubilee Insurance company was established in 1937 and is today one of the leading local composite insurance companies.

'CALL TOWN HALL'

MOMBASA'S Town Clerk Mr. Nasser has invited citizens from associations, clubs and householders as well as the rubbish collection and cleanliness of the area can be improved.

Dar-Mombasa Bus Services'

FIRST PASSENGER SCHEDULES EXPECTED IN EARLY JUNE 1984

TRANS-NATIONAL buses, ferrying at least 1,000 passengers a day, are expected to begin shuttling across the Kenya-Tanzania border early next month following the agreement reached between the two neighbouring countries to revive passenger and freight transport.

This move comes in the wake of a new pact of co-operation signed Monday in Arusha by the three Presidents of Kenya, Tanzania and Uganda following November's historic Arusha Accord which led to the re-opening of the Tanzania-Kenya border, closed since 1977 after the collapse of the East African Community.

According to the chairman of the Tanzanian Central Licensing Board Mr. Phillip Ncigula, 12 buses will depart from Musoma, Dar and Arusha every day for Kisumu, Nairobi and Mombasa.

The State-run bus company Kamata has been assigned two buses from Dar-es-Salaam to Nairobi, and another one to Mombasa. Other ten buses will be operated by private owned bus companies in Tanzania.

The private companies include Levi Lubondije, Trans-Africa Roadways, both of

Musoma; Rombo Investment Ltd, Hood Bus Service, Langata Bus service, Kilimanjaro Bus Service, Star Bus Service, both from Kilimanjaro Region, and Ambiansi Bus Service of Tanga, Tamico Bus service and Jaffari Kidato.

The routes agreed between the two countries are Nairobi-Namanga-Arusha-Moshi-Dar-es-Salaam, Mombasa-Taveta-Moshi-Arusha, Kisumu-Tarime-Musoma and Mombasa-Hororo-Tanga-Dar-es-Salaam.

TRANSPORT LICENCES

In a press release mid-week, the Ministry of Transport and Communications invited application from Kenya transport operators for licences to operate on the new routes.

They are required to specify the routes and the number of buses they wish

to operate.

Ministry officials in Nairobi said that Kenyan bus operators would deploy a similar number of buses as proposed by Tanzania.

It was learnt in Mombasa that a number of bus companies have already applied for licences to operate on the cross-border routes.

The Kenya Bus Service (Msa), which began talks with their counterpart Kamata in November last year, have requested to operate daily buses from Mombasa to Tanga, Arusha and Dar-es-Salaam.

The general manager of the company Mr. L. Mehrali said that they intend to deploy four buses initially and increase the number according to passenger demand.

Mr. Ncigula confirmed in Dar-es-Salaam that the Coastline Bus Service has been granted a licence to operate in Tanzania.

The new passenger and freight transport agreement follows a two-day meeting held in Arusha on April 17 and 18 between officials of the two licensing boards from Kenya and Tanzania.

The final round of talks on the transport issue is scheduled to take place in Nairobi during the first week of June.

The Nairobi talks between the two boards are expected to centre on the issues of fares, foreign exchange, insurance cover and the possibility of

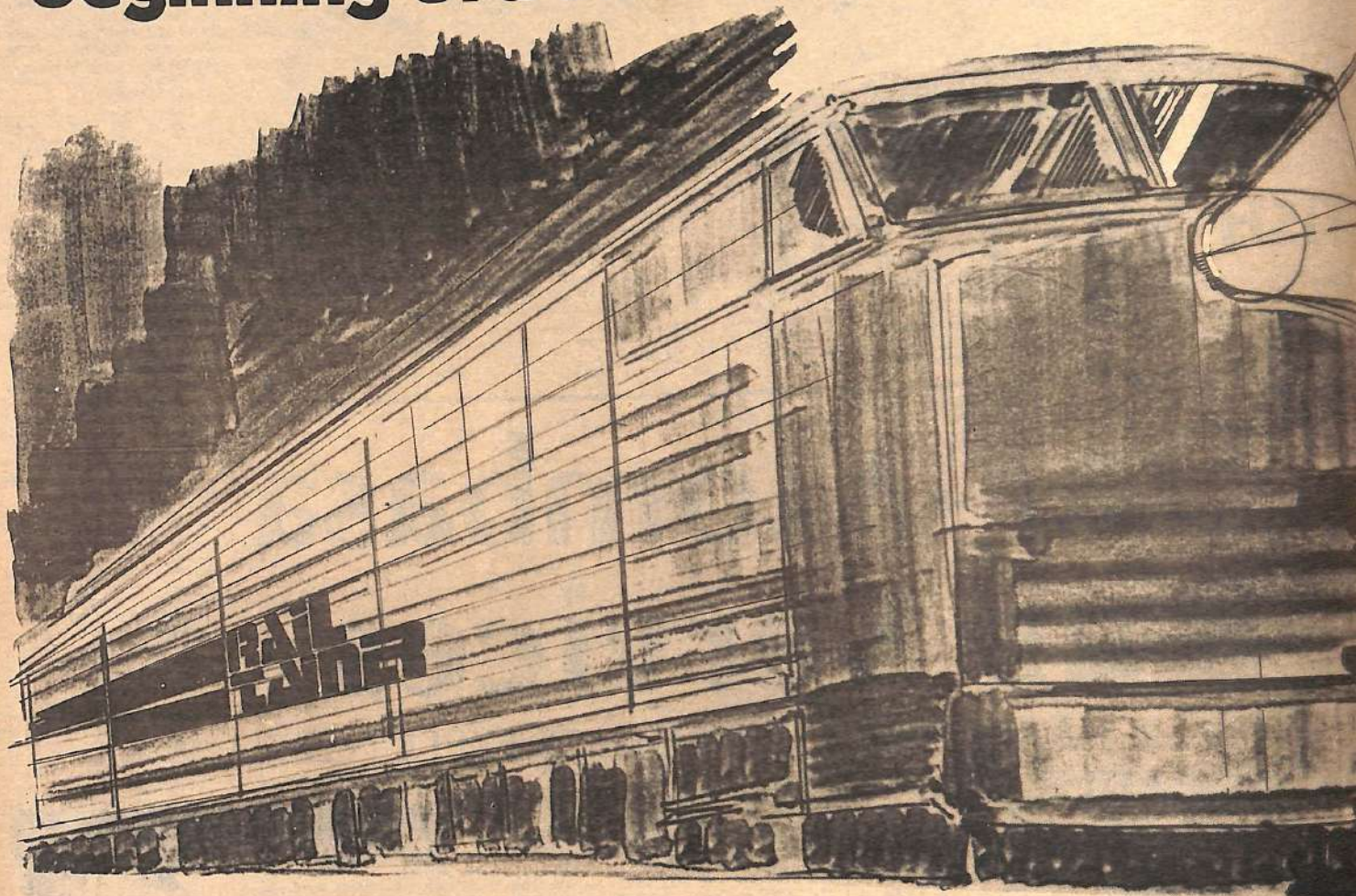

The Kenya Ports Authority's Inland Containers Depot (I.C.D.) at Embakasi, Nairobi is now operational, bringing dry port facilities to the nerve centre of Kenya's commercial, industrial and agricultural systems.

Containers between the port of Mombasa and Embakasi ICD will be moved by a scheduled rail service **RAILTAINER** once a day each way i.e.

Container handling and shed operations will be carried out by KPA's main contractors: Kenya Cargo Handling Services Limited and the necessary handling equipment and storage facilities have been provided.

Import/export procedures will be exactly as at Kilindini. The current acceptance system by rail will still apply and consignors will be required to tender a consignment note to the Kenya Railways after containers are loaded.

Customs:
The ship's agents or owners will be required to lodge copies of manifests with the following:

- (a). K.P.A. two copies at both Kilindini and Embakasi.
- (b). Customs Authority - two copies both at Kilindini and Customs Long Room office on Ngong Road.

The manifest should be in two parts: one section will list all those containers going to Embakasi whereas the other section will detail those containers that will be destined for the port.

The authority will provide courier service between the depot and customs long room for the purpose of collecting "out of change notes".

There will be no customs transit bond required for moving containers by the **RAILTAINER** from Kipevu to Embakasi and vice versa. The assessment of duty and sales tax by customs authority at Ngong Road Customs Long Room on import containerised cargo coming to the Embakasi depot will be based on the Mombasa landed cost and freight (c and f) value.

International Law Institute Hosts Third-World Seminar

THE PROVINCIAL Commissioner, Coast, Luka Galgalo, has officially welcomed some thirty-five participants from Third World countries to a seminar organised by the International Law Institute in co-operation with the African Development Bank which is being held at Nyali Beach Hotel from May 13 to June 8, writes Neta Peal.

The International Law Institute, based in Washington, USA, regularly holds seminars in that capital, as well as two annually overseas.

This was the first to be held in Kenya, the venue being chosen on the basis that previous seminars had attracted many participants from Kenya.

Participants in the present seminar are either senior officials from developing countries or lawyers, economists, engineers.

It has between 20-25 lecturers from the USA, Europe and Africa who are from the World Bank, United Nations, international law firms and banks.

Two courses are running concurrently - one on Foreign Investment Negotiations, and the other on Project Procurement and Contract Negotiation.

The aim is to teach participants how to negotiate successfully with multi-national corporations.

At a welcome cocktail party, the PC said 'I am delighted to see such a distinguished gathering on the Kenya coast, and hope that your might find time to see more of Kenya while you are here.'

He hoped they would find their stay in Kenya 'most worthwhile and enjoyable.'

Said the PC 'I want you to feel at home here' and mentioned that Mombasa and the Coast are renowned for their friendliness.

There was also a welcome for participants and guests from Charles Adams, an international lawyer and lecturer from the USA.

Among the guests were the American Consul at Mombasa, Robert E. Gribbin, and his wife, Connie.

The International Law Institute was founded in 1955 at Georgetown University to promote better understanding of the legal problems of international trade.

Today, the Institute is devoted to research and practical solutions to complex international policy problems involving governments and

multinational corporations. For example, in economic development, foreign investment and loans, transfer of technology, trade, budgeting, management and procurement.

In 1983, the Institute became an independent non-profit entity, but continues to work in co-operation and association with Georgetown University for many of its programmes.

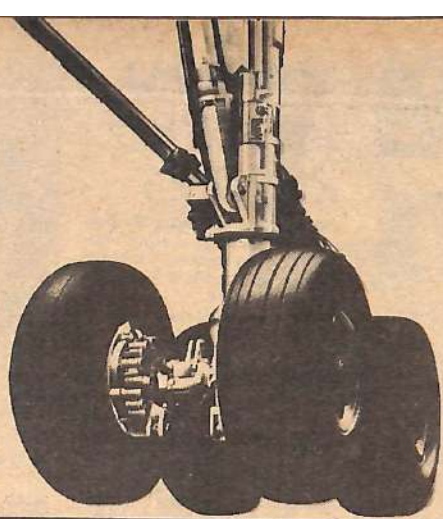

'Such Sparkling Entertainment ...'

AS BRIGHT and sparkling as champagne that flows so freely on the stage — that's the Little Theatre Club's current production which opened on 15th May and is due to end on 19th May.

Now *Darling* bears all the hallmarks of Jennifer Walters' direction — attention to small details, a spanking pace and a comedy of manners which is necessary for a comedy of this kind, and a set which, thanks to the talents of Lesley Cornwell, must rank among the most attractive the LTC has ever seen.

This elegant background (a former cinema in Mayfair) makes a delightful showcase for a lively and comely young women who, in compliance with the rules which govern this type of drama, appear in various guises of undress throughout the performance.

Frances Cook's coolly elegant grace is a perfect contrast to Steven Hamilton's bubbly Sue, and what a pity we did not see more of 'Miss Whittington' played by a most decorative Lisa Jones.

These three young women are newcomers to the LTC stage and will undoubtedly be appreciated by audiences.

Home Edge, no novice in the theatre, is more used to musical roles but turns in a remarkable performance as a "betrayed" wife who more than capable of holding her own.

McGuinness, one would think, should be numbered among the young stars; in fact cast as a prissy secretary who eventually discovers the joys of — of course!

Clive Van Rensburg, as the handsome Harry who is not terribly keen on the idea of his wife doing the housework.

Rose bravely combines the role of stage manager with that of a suspicious husband, and does so well that we hope to see him in future productions.

'Air Tanzania' Takes A Look At New 'Computer Reservations'

IN A MOVE to enhance efficiency and reliability of bookings, the Air Tanzania Corporation (ATC) this week announced the installation of an automatic message switching centre, commissioning of which now awaits the arrival of display terminals. The new semi-computerised communications system has been hired from an International Communications Cooperative, Society International Telecommunications Aeronautiques (SITA) at an estimated cost of about six million shillings.

The SITA cooperative has a membership of 249 airlines in 154 countries including Tanzania, and runs its reservations and management operations from its computer systems in the United States the cost of this new installation is expected to be shared by Airlines operating from the country.

A recent test on an International Communications Circuit connecting Dar-es-Salaam to Amsterdam, the Netherlands via Nairobi yielded fruitful results which convinced the Airline Corporation to replace the current reservation systems whereby message between stations are communicated by telex or telegram.

In Zanzibar, the Revolutionary Government has decided to evacuate 37 families and to

close six schools as an emergency move aimed at arresting the problem of collapsing houses in old Zanzibar town.

The Government also plans to demolish all houses that are unfit for human habitations and to repair houses that are a hazard to the lives of people.

The Government statement came in the wake of last week's incident wherein an eight year old girl was stamped to death following a false alarm to the effect that the school building was collapsing four other people died within a period of one week when their houses collapsed due to heavy rains.

According to a survey carried out, sixty houses have been classified as being a threat to the lives of their occupants and to passers-by. Half of these have been declared totally unfit to live in while the rest need to be repaired.

Some buildings of historical significance will however be preserved.

In Dar-es-Salaam, the Minister of state for Communications and Works, Guntram Itatiro called on workers of the Tanzania Harbours Authority (THA) to handle cargo with care so as to win the confidence of importers, exporters and the public in general.

DAMAGED GOODS

He cautioned that while expeditious clearance of cargo from the port demonstrated efficiency, the efforts need to be supplemented with greater care of cargo to avoid unnecessary damage to goods.

The Minister also urged workers to increase productivity as a deliberate effort to improve the country's economy and emphasised on collective leadership to eliminate friction between the management and workers.

In a tragic incident, an upcoming International Athlete Richard Mbelwa was shot dead by an escaping policeman at a golf course in Iringa town. Mbelwa was gunned down while on his regular morning exercise when he joined town residents in a chase to arrest the fleeing policeman.

The policeman and three others had allegedly tried to solicit money from a business man and their plan was uncovered by a plain clothes detective.

The late Mbelwa was preparing for the forthcoming Olympic games to be held in the United States this August.

At the end of the week, the Tanzania Tumor Centre based in Dar-es-Salaam revealed plans of organising a programme to educate the public on early detection and prevention of cancer problems.

The centre is expected to collaborate with the information department of the Ministry of Health so as to overcome the overall problem of late case detection since late presentation of cancer palliation rather than cure.

When we Norwegians wish each other, we wish each other our common birthday. We say: 'Happiness for you'.

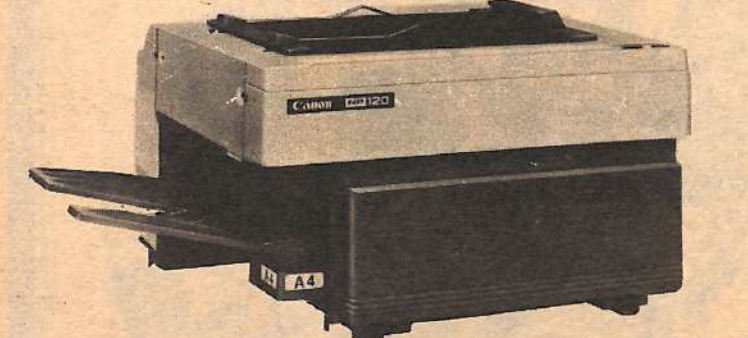

FRENCH-BUILT AIRPORT

THE FIRST Phase of the French-built international airport in Dar-es-Salaam has been handed over to the Tanzania government and is expected to be put to immediate use.

The construction and modernisation of the airport, considered to be the single largest project undertaken by France in Tanzania, is expected to be completed by mid-1984 to enable the airport to handle larger aircraft, including Boeing 747 jumbo jets.

The project covers extension of the runway from 2,400 metres to 3,000 metres construction of a new passenger terminal complex, radar installation and a modern lighting system.

It was originally estimated to cost \$60 million but inflation has increased the cost.

VIEWPOINT

'That Miritini Road'

JOHN GARDINER's comments on the state of Mombasa's roads (Coast Drive 4th May) prompt a response in defence of the "road designers" (may we call them engineers?) some of whom also have to traverse these moonscapes.

The two basic requirements of road construction are (firstly) to provide a smooth durable running surface and (secondly) to provide means of dispersing rainwater as quickly as possible not only from the road surface but also from the road margins.

Even modest rainfall will cause rapid break-up of conventional roadways if it is allowed to penetrate the sealed surface.

Use of either concrete or bitumen (or similar) surfacing satisfies both of the above requirements and these are the engineer's main surfacing materials.

In combination with proper foundation and drainage design they will each serve with differing degrees of longevity.

Unfortunately all systems are imperfect to some degree and

require maintenance to ensure a continuing sealed surface.

Bearing in mind the expected traffic on any road, the engineer tries to balance capital cost with anticipated repair costs and chooses his construction accordingly.

He trusts that maintenance will be carried out when required.

In the specific case of Miritini all the factors have combined against him to produce spectacular failure.

The drainage is inadequate, the road was never constructed for the diverted traffic volume and maintenance has been minimal.

In other areas of Mombasa lack of timely and properly supervised maintenance in the form of resealing results in a weakened and cracked surface which, as we see, fails overnight in wet conditions.

It is a classic example of where a stitch in time can save nine.

In view of the continuing difficulties which the authorities face in being able to carry out proper maintenance many engineers in Kenya are indeed diverting their attention to alternative forms of road construction in order that we can all save on unnecessary vehicle maintenance costs in the future.

This should have been brought to the notice of your reporter by the management of Kenya Crocodile Farm Limited.

Mr. Mwaniki, Warden, Tana River; Mr. Nyamongo, Warden, Malindi; Mr. Dada, Warden, Lamu; Mr. Opiata, Warden, Lake Turkana, our Departmental Officers and rangers and I, as Provincial Director of Wildlife Conservation and Management Department.

helped the personnel of Kenya Crocodile Farm Limited in:

- Doing ground and aerial survey of Tana River for estimating crocodile populations.

- Locating main crocodile concentration areas on the river.

- Providing protection and security to the Kenya Crocodile Farm. Company staff on the river.

- Locating crocodile nests and collecting eggs.

- Accompanying the Crocodile Company staff to Lake Turkana to view the crocodile habitats, collect eggs, etc.,

- Identifying a veterinarian for tranquilising and caring for the animals in captivity.

- Obtaining food for the captured animals.

- Transporting the crocodiles to Mombasa.

- Looking after the animals at Malindi Wildlife Department camp while enroute to Mombasa.

- Identifying and obtaining the crocodile farm site

- Contributing technical advice on health, care of the animals on the farm.

- Providing information on ecology, behaviour, management techniques etc. from my detailed studies of the crocodile on Lake Turkana. This included temperature, humidity, sunshine, shade date, etc.,

- Informing and explaining the project to the local wananchi by holding meetings and through correspondence to obtain their sympathy, understanding, good will and co-operation.

- Providing the extremely useful local experience and knowledge of the area, ecology of the river, attitude and ways of local people, providing interpreting services etc.

And now some comments on Mr. Phombeah's article;

Nobody would hope/plan/wish to and it would not be advisable to - remove all the

crocodiles from the Tana River as your articles seems to imply.

Wildlife Conservation and Management Department plans to reduce the crocodile population drastically in areas of high human populations along the river.

Crocodiles in gazetted conservation areas on the river eg. Tana River Primate-Reserve, Arawale National Reserve, Kora National Reserve, Rahole National Reserve, Meru National Park, would naturally, and wisely so, in keeping with conservation policy, receive protection like all Parks/Reserves animals.

There is nothing "daring" about trapping crocodiles. Problem crocodiles are routinely trapped and shot by Wildlife Department rangers.

Of course TV, and film people like to glamorise these so called daring (trapping) operations.

'On-Again' And 'Off-Again' Cargo Ship Now Laid Up At Mtongwe

THE DUBAI registered *Majida* which I mentioned in my notes last week as having loaded 134 tons cement whilst "under restraint" by the Kenya Ports Authority is now at Mtongwe anchorage supposedly awaiting a decision as to her future having off loaded the cement - an unnecessary expenditure some party will have to bear.

The Manta line *Sisal Trader* at the buoys after her tow up from the Comores has now been arrested by her crew, thus another Manta unit joins the fleet in port.

Last weekend the *Copper Trader* at 'M' buoys had the Turkish vessel *Ugur Isik* move alongside her.

The *Ugur Isik* had earlier completed discharge of empty paper sacks and steel balls for Uganda, so doubtless she was considered a good opportunity to tranship some Black Sea cargo still aboard *Copper Trader*.

A sign indicative of Nedlloyd's revamping of their East African trade manifested itself last week with the arrival of the 16 year old 10700 ton gross *Waalekerk* one of a class of four sister-ships built in 1967/1968.

MID-EAST SERVICE
 These vessels have now dropped the "Nedlloyd" prefix having been transferred to the Mammoet Middle East Service, a Nedlloyd Group subsidiary, surprisingly operating a conventional outsider/service. I noticed the word Mammoet is written across the hull and the vessel's funnel colour has been changed to light yellow.

SHIPPING with JOHN WALTERS

The *Waalekerk* had made the passage light ship from the Arabian Gulf to commence loading at Dar es Salaam for the N.W. Continent. Nedlloyd will be adopting this itinerary when one of the class is in position otherwise the vessels would be proceeding home from the Gulf on the Mammoet service without cargo.

The *Waalekerk*, which had secured some 7000 tons Zambian copper in Dar es Salaam, was loading at No. 3 berth in Kiindini and due to sail last Sunday/Monday for Europe.

A discharger with some 5600 tons from the Far East is discharging this week at No. 2 berth. She is the Japanese built, Liberian flag, NYK chartered vessel *Lady Ulla* of 17800 d.w. tons.

She was only built this year and I believe this is her maiden voyage. She certainly looks in spanking new condition.

The container berths at 16/17 continue to be kept busy and to see one empty for more than a day or two is unusual unlike the general cargo berths. The BEACON vessels *Cranach* discharging and *Barrister* have been in together which caused the WEC vessel *Julia Del Mar*

to wait for a couple of days until *Cranach* sailed.

A chartered newcomer to Mediterranean Shipping operations is the 17000 ton 7 year old *Uganda* the Panamanian flag which due yesterday at the berth to load 300 tonnes Mediterranean, U.K. and Continent. Another MSC arrival will be the flag *Fratziis* due on discharge 2600 tons for U.K. & N.W. Continent.

I was glad to note Kenya Ports Authority quickly introduced facilities for vessels at Number 1 on reaching agreement Shell and other oil companies concerned. There is chance of there being facilities at all the berths including the container berths by the year's end.

UNUSUAL NAME

A Greek vessel with unusual name of *Farmis* was due on Wednesday week to discharge coaches and bogies for Kenya Railways. The vessel of 13300 dwt has her total Mombasa amounts only to 530 tonnes.
