Patrick Gitau Wins Madaraka Marathon

RECORD ENTRY FOR 'BEST-EVER' COAST CYCLING CLUB RACE

THE MADARAKA Day Bicycle Race from Mombasa's Reef Hotel is now the biggest cycle race in Kenya today, this year attracting a record entry of 156 participants from all over the country and including two from Uganda, with 13 out of 16 cycling clubs in Kenya being represented.

It is sponsored by Reef Hotels and Toyota Kenya.

Such is the enthusiasm it generates that plans are already afoot to make it a Pan-African event next year, and then to go 'international'.

It has already been decided that the 1990 Madaraka Day Bicycle Race will be held on Sunday, June 3, and that in keeping with other such competitive races in the world the route will cover 160 kms. There will also be a 100 kms race for 'up and coming cyclists' and 70 kms for youngsters.

It will start at 8.00 a.m. and finish at lunchtime, with the prize-giving co-inciding with afternoon tea.

The "Best Overall" cyclist in this year's 122 kms race was 19 year old Patrick Gitau from Nairobi's Etonic Cycling Club.

It was the second year running for him to win this race which he completed in 3 hours 38 minutes 2.3 seconds.

He also came first in the "Geared-Seniors" category at Mombasa.

Patrick, who is still a student, has won three big races in Nairobi

and is now probably Kenya's best cyclist.

His prizes included not only a very large handsome floating trophy, but a return ticket to the Seychelles donated by Kenya Airways, a wall clock, Shs 2,200/- and a cyclist's crash helmet.

This race attracted entries with the Etonic Cycling Club fielding a 20-strong team — the largest.

race — first being Winnie Gioko (Mombasa Cycling Club) and runner-up Tasnim Chakera. The favourite and last year's winner, Grazina Bockle had to retire due to muscle pull.

The youngest lady, Simone Huber (11) who came fourth is going to receive a consolation prize in appreciation of her great effort in finishing the 41 kms.

Flagging off the race which started at 2.15 p.m. was the Guest of Honour, Mr. J. Orende, Administrative Secretary, Kenya National Sports Council. It was at 7.30 p.m. that the last cyclist returned.

It was the Reef Hotel which initiated this event six years ago, and is delighted at its growing popularity.

There were prizes galore, plus over Shs 28,000/- being dispersed in cash — double last year's amount.

Other officials included Julius Mwangi, Chairman, Amateur Cycling Association of Kenya; Mr. Chebet, Department of Sports, Ministry of Culture & Social Services; Alex Mzererah, Provincial Sports Officer, while from Toyota Kenya were Dennis Awoory, Sales & Marketing

Said Martin "the competition was very fierce from up-country and the Mombasa team will have to pull up its socks if it is ever going to beat them".

He mentioned that the Etonic Cycling Club is holding a race in July to which he is hoping to enter six from Mombasa as to give them more exposure to national competitions.

There were 114 participants in the 41 km race. "Best Overall" was Amritpal Singh. First in the "geared seniors" was Aliasger Nadir, and in the "non-geared" Godfrey Aongo.

Infectious Drumbeats Of Adama Drame For Mombasa ...

WERE YOU one of the lucky ones who enjoyed a rhythm-filled, foot-tapping, hand-clapping evening in Adam Drame's company last March? If so, you will need no further encouragement to treat yourself to an extraordinary musical feast on June 16 and 17.

Yes! Adama Drame is visiting Mombasa again! Accompanied by his wife, dancer Sylla Mariam, Kouyate Bakary on balafon (a forerunner of the modern xylophone) and Traore Yacube on percussion, Drame will bring his infectious drumbeats to the Alliance Francaise (16th) and Le Pichet Restaurant (17th).

Drame is a "griot" from West Africa — a musician who is a blend of poet, sorcerer and storyteller, whose job it is to keep safe the myths and customs of his land and people.

Through the rhythm of his "djembe" — a wooden drum with stretched goatskin and hung with steel vibrators to enhance the sound — he makes the music come alive.

"Griots" traditionally play at weddings, births, baptisms — in fact

MOMBASA PRIMARY HEALTH CARE PROJECT UNDERWAY

AFTER SUCCESSFULLY implementing the Kisumu Primary Health Care Project the Aga Khan Health Services Kenya in 1987 started a one year planning Phase for another Community Based Health Care Project — The Mombasa Primary Health Care Project (P.H.C.). The Project being implemented in Kinango Division in the three locations of Mwavumbo, Kasemini and Mtaa, entered its implementation phase in the second half of 1988.

Kinango Divisional leaders headed by the Divisional Officer (D.O.) held a workshop at the Sun N' Sand Hotel from June 4 to June 7, 1989, to discuss the concept of Community Based Primary Health Care and how the various sectors in Kinango Division can collaborate to improve the health and socio-economic

position of the people in the project area in order to accomplish goals of the project.

The workshop was opened by the Provincial Medical Officer Coast Province — Dr. Geoffrey Obwanga. In his opening remarks Dr. Obwanga stressed the importance of inter-sectoral collaboration in health development.

He said that for a long time

health was looked upon as a responsibility of the Ministry of Health. Health, he said is the responsibility of the individual, the family and the community.

To be able to promote health community must take their own initiative. But again to be able to promote health communities need technical support from all sectors.

The answer to health then lies in intersectoral collaboration where several sectors work together to implement activities that support community initiatives that promote health.

The problem is that many Ministries and other sectors perhaps because of tradition and lack of understanding of the importance of inter-sectoral collaboration like to work alone without involving other sectors or being involved in other sectors and Ministries.

The Provincial Medical Officer commended the Aga Khan Health Services P.H.C. project for the initiative it has started in Kwale District to work with communities and involving other sectors in promoting health.

COMMUNITY

He stressed that if we are going to make an impact on promoting the community's health we have to understand and respect the community, create awareness, motivate the community to empower the community to take decisions in matters that affect their health. We have to respect and find out what they know, what they are doing and build on it.

He said that simple preventive measures prevent illness and lower high infant mortality rate. He quoted the example of Kwale District where the Aga Khan Health Services P.H.C. project is being implemented.

This is one of the Districts in Kenya that are leading in high infant Mortality rates. But these need not continue for simple community efforts as environmental sanitation, personal hygiene, immunisations, proper nutrition prevent deaths.

Farmers continue fight Against Ever-Increasing Cost Of Inputs

WHILST PRODUCER prices have been increased a number of times in the past few years after Tanzania signed a pact with the International Monetary Fund (IMF), these increases have been sifted away in real terms because of the high costs of inputs that farmers have to bear.

The costs of chemicals, fertilisers, herbicides and basic farming equipment have increased so much that one wonders how farmers can still grow their products with a profit.

The second leading export crop in Tanzania is cotton and this has also been hit by the high cost of inputs and according to authorities, a sharp production decline is imminent this year due to the prohibitive prices of

such a properly cared for acre would be about 600 kilograms.

First grade cotton fetches 2055 a kilogramme making a total earning of 12,330/- to a farmer who would hence remain with only a small surplus after toiling hours for the output.

The statistics are alarming and it is clear that farmers have no choice but to use less inputs or alternatively to sell the cotton at hiked prices to private individuals or exporters.

Agricultural experts in the country are also not pleased with the encouragement given by the Government to farmers to grow other crops like paddy and groundnuts alongside cotton because they fear that the farmers could be tempted to divert full time to these crops which are relatively easy to maintain and earn as much money as that earned from cotton which is more difficult to grow.

Last year cotton earned the country about 55 Million US dollars from the sale of 39,495 tonnes in the first nine months and this was second only to coffee which hauled 66.1 million dollars through 26,220 tonnes.

With such high earnings from cotton, it would be disastrous if the predicted fall in output this year actually takes place.

From workings and simple statistics it is clear that the present system is actually a financial disincentive to growers and the government would certainly be better off by giving subsidies on major inputs which may cost a few million shillings but will initiate a higher output which in turn will raise foreign exchange earnings.

Inputs are essential to get an optimum output per square area but because yield earnings often don't cover production costs, farmers are not using inputs appropriately simply because they want to save on production expenses.

The situation has been aggravated after the Government withdrew subsidies on pesticides and fertilisers in 1986/87 thereby leaving the farmers vulnerable to price increases which have escalated sharply due to the continuous devaluation of the local shilling.

CO-OPERATIVES

Important cotton growing areas in the country are now predicting a lower output and this includes Shinyanga where the Shinyanga Region Cooperative Union (Shirecu) has revealed that production has dropped this season to an extent of about 20,000 tonnes.

According to Shirecu, the costs for cultivating, planting, weeding and harvesting one acre of cotton was about 11,000 shillings last year while the average yield from

POOR EXAM RESULTS

IN ZANZIBAR, the examination results for upper primary school students have been extremely poor and this issue was brought to the House presently sitting here.

The Isles Deputy Education Minister, Mbarouk Omar said that about 40 per cent of the teachers on the Isles secondary schools are not qualified whilst at primary school level about 30 per cent of the teaching staff are untrained.

The Deputy Minister said that despite this problem, his Ministry would continue to demand high pass marks before candidates are

selected to study in secondary schools.

Normally upper primary school students have to appear for an examination which enables selection of able candidates into Government secondary schools.

Meanwhile, the Health Ministry here has admitted that the anti-malaria chemical, Malathion, which it has dumped at Migombani, is polluting the environment and poses a serious risk to residents of this affluent residential area.

No word has, however, been made on what removal methods will be used.

Said Mr. Orendi "such is the interest being generated among the youth that the Madaraka Day Bicycle Race continues to grow in popularity and has become the biggest cycling race in Kenya today."

He went on "we want to give it all the support we can and to have shining stars in cycling as in other fields of sport."

To achieve this, continuous training is essential, and he thanked the Reef and Toyota for their continued involvement in the promotion of this sport.

He said that another big attraction was the many good prizes offered. He was also happy to note that many more local people were becoming interested in the race and stopping to cheer the cyclists.

Addressing the gathering, Kuldip Sondhi, Managing Director, Reef Hotels said "this is the sixth event of its kind and with each passing year it grows in size and excitement. The first race in 1984 attracted 31 participants and today there were 156 from all over Kenya and two from Uganda."

He also mentioned that bicycles are available on loan from his office which top cyclists could use for training purposes. He had noticed, he said, that some in the Madaraka Day Race had been riding "ordinary" bicycles.

MORE TRAINED OFFICIALS NEEDED TO ORGANISE?

LATER, in an interview, Martin Dias, Chairman of the Mombasa Cycling Club admitted that the organisation of the Madaraka Day Bicycle Race could have been better.

However, he felt it had now become too big for the club to handle alone. It also needed more trained officials.

Martin is presently the only one in Mombasa. He said "if the Madaraka Day Race is going to expand to become an All Africa

and international event, then more trained officials are urgently needed at Mombasa.

He revealed that the club had received an invitation from the coach of the German National Junior Cycling Team to participate in a race in Hannover in August, with all expenses paid, except for the return air fare.

While Mombasa cyclists were not yet ready for such competitions, he felt that if the club could afford to send three dedicated

officials to Germany they would learn much as four big races of international standard with ten top countries in the world competing are being held in August.

"The club is therefore, applying for a permit to try and raise Shs. 30,000/- to cover such air fares."

Said Martin "if this is possible, it means that Mombasa will have three trained officers ready for next year."

Continuing he noted that the

Madaraka Day Race had become too large to remain a one-man show and that more technical people were needed to supervise it.

Kenya, has twelve qualified officials — all in Nairobi, with the exception of Martin.

Said Martin "we can use all of them at the next Madaraka Day Race."

In the meantime he is submitting a report to Julius Mwangi, Chairman of the Amateur Cycling

Association of Kenya regarding future Madaraka Day Bicycle Races, together with his suggestions.

He mentioned that the club is also considering the question of board and lodging for cyclists coming to Mombasa from far afield.

Es wird geschätzt, daß ein gewöhnlicher Tourist durchschnittlich Shs 15.000 in Devisen während seines Aufenthaltes in Kenia für Unterkunft und andere Dienstleistungen ausgibt. Dies bedeutet, daß die Deviseneinnahmen von Touristen, die 1988 von Swissair und Balair nach Kenia gebracht wurden, rund US Dollar 26 Millionen betragen. Nicht eingerechnet sind die Ausgaben von Geschäftsleuten und anderen Passagieren.

1610 TONNEN FRACHT

Herr Kiener wies darauf hin, daß die beachtliche Zunahme ein Beweis ist für die steigende Beliebtheit Kenias als Ferienland, hauptsächlich der Erfolg des Marketing Programms von Swissair, Balair und Schweizer Reiseveranstalter.

Im vergangenen Jahr hat Swissair 1610 Tonnen Fracht aus Kenia transportiert, hauptsächlich Frischprodukte, Bohnen, Früchte, Blumen, Fische und Meeresfrüchte, aber auch kunsthandwerkliche Arbeiten.

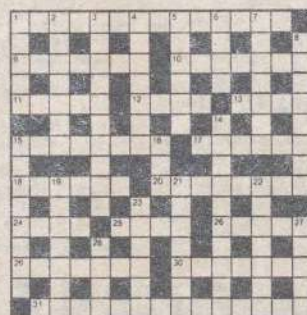

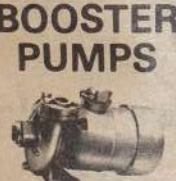

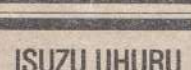

What one hopes is that with the new wind of hope that has been generated by the recent statements (and changes) will breathe some life into the methods and materials used in effecting permanent repairs to the roads of this town.

If done right once and for all then future subscriptions by the wananchi to the coffers of the Town Fathers can be released for investment in some sorely needed equipment and the provision of sadly lacking services and possibly development of additional facilities.

The motorists do not help much either. Kachumbari did a bit of what I consider unnecessary research but came up with some interesting findings.

We all know that most of the transporters in this country do not obey the axle load regulations as set by the authorities and still

manage to trade by payment of light "fines" that do not get anywhere near the exchequer.

Most of the ones breaking the law are obvious. The lorries are loaded sky high with goods and the rear end of the vehicle is sagging so low that it is nearly sitting on it's haunches.

There are others who are a bit more subtle. They are mainly



those involved in the carriage of bulk material.

The standard design of body for lorries ensures that within the realms of normality, the height of the side walls is such that when the lorry is full of bulk material e.g. sand, the load distribution on the vehicle's axle is acceptable.

So these clever ones increase the height of the side walls ever so slightly and in most cases it appears as though the wrought ironwork is decorative.

In fact what they have done is to increase the cubic capacity of the load bed. So no one will stop them on the suspicion of overloading.

Others go one step cleverer and don't even bother with spending any money. All they

do when carrying bulk material is to heap up the end nearest to the driver's cab.

If weighed, then the lorry is deemed to be legal and let to continue on it's way. They have learned the art of tactful weight distribution to fool the law.

The most brilliant that Kachumbari came across were the professional truck drivers. These are a rare commodity in Kenya but they exist.

They do not bother with trying any tricks to beat the weight limitations. They load their trucks to what they consider as their limit and set off on their journey.

To the common person these trucks are evidently overloaded. To the weighbridge cops the trucks are evidently overloaded.

Yet the trucks are driven onto the weighbridge with as much fan fare as is possible and they come out scot free!

No threat of a fine and no admonition as is typical from the cops (Chunga wakati hii lakini usiariibu wakati mwengine. Tume kuhurumia tu).

They have a simple way of defeating the weighbridge since they know how it works. The

whole method of cheating the weighbridge is to understand the mechanism used for weighing.

Once you know this, then it is very simple. You drive the truck onto the weighbridge in a particular manner and it will err in your favour.

There are many different ways of registering a load and I cannot claim to be an expert but some of the truck drivers who people seem to have written off are quite adept at working it all out.

I will leave the solution of that matter to the relevant authorities more versed in the mechanics of weighbridges.

Which brings me back to Mombasa. There are signs all over town stating the axle load limits for the various streets. These are being completely ignored by all drivers of heavy goods vehicles.

We find juggernauts trying to negotiate minute corners in the middle of town and noone in authority bats an eyelid when they come across them.

Apart from their nuisance value (which is quite high) they are chewing up the roads that our hard earned money is being used to maintain.

Perhaps the Town Fathers ought to get together with the relevant authorities and organise a blitz against this menace.

I am sure there must be a few who are far enough from the madding crowd to ensure that such an exercise does take place.

As Kachumbari says, finish work which you have set yourself.

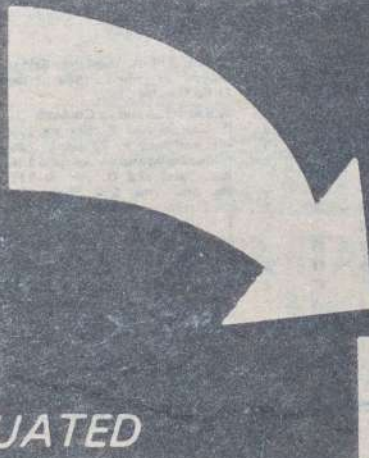
