American Cyclist Wins 'Madaraka' Day 'Marathon'

KENYA'S 21st MADARAKA DAY was also celebrated by a Bicycle Race sponsored by Mombasa's Reef Hotel.

Overall winner was Dan Bourguen, an 18 year old American living in Kenya, who made it just a flash ahead of the second and third placed winners - George Njuki, (20), and Sila Nakunda (20). All were from Nairobi and riding 'geared' bicycles.

Tenth overall, and winning first prize for bicycles "without gears" was Rakesh Vagani, 17 a student at Burhaniya Secondary School, Mombasa.

Veteran coast cycling champion, Colin Aglae, the senior representative for East Africa, Seychelles and Mauritius

of WINCS - a UK tour operator, declared that the event had revived a flagging sport which had many supporters all over the country. He said that 'cycling needs a big boost in Kenya. Consequently, races such as this were most welcome.'

'EXCELLENT ENTRY'

There were thirty-one enthusiastic contestants of all ages, all togged out in special 'T' shirts and racing caps provided by the hotel. They were flagged off by the Coast Tourist Officer, Henry Mulandi, who commended the Reef for its enterprise and imagination in initiating an event which could boost local tourism to which his Ministry is committed.

He also took the opportunity of mentioning that the Minister of Tourism and Wildlife, Mr. Maina Wanjigi, had promised to present a trophy to the district sending the highest number of tourists to other parts of Kenya.

Declared Kuldip Sondhi, the hotel's Managing Director, "it was our intention to celebrate this great day with some particular event that would involve the youth of the country, and we are delighted with the response."

Environment Award For Bamburi Cement

HONOUR FOR QUARRY AFFORESTATION

BAMBURI Portland Cement Company has won a world environment award for its efforts to enhance the Kenyan environment. The award was presented to the Firm's Managing Director Mr. R. Brenneisen by the Minister for Environment Resources Mr. Eliud Mwangi during World Environment Day in Nairobi. Mr. Brenneisen was accompanied by the Managing Director of the Baobab Farm Ltd., Mr. Rene Haller.

Mr. Mwangi observed that the award was a reflection of the firm's "unique example and excellent success" in afforestation of reclaimed land and quarries.

The Baobab Farm Ltd., a subsidiary of the Bamburi Portland

Cement Company, has in the past won world acclaim as an ecological experiment in waste-land rehabilitation.

The afforestation programme has involved crocodile ranching, biogas production, earth-worm culture, a plant nursery and a highly profitable fish farm.

It has also provided a home for a multitude of wildlife, including 120 species of birds in the 35 hectares of forest on the quarry.

Agro-technical research for overseas institutions has been carried out in the farm and trials in pyrethres rice for IITA Ibadan Nigeria.

Baobab Farm has been appointed by FAO as consultants in Tilapia farming where the annual production of Tilapia runs into 30,000 kgs.

Research is being undertaken at the farm to integrate crocodiles, prawns and oysters into the eco-system.

The Rehabilitation scheme has included the introduction of goats and sheep, and a breeding programme which soared up the number to 2,000 animals, integrating dairy and beef production.

The famed Bamburi Quarry Nature Trail, open to the public, has become an acclaimed ecological marvel to tourists, scientists and the local people.

The complex ecosystem accommodates a balanced stocking of wildlife and plants in close harmony between man and animal.

Some of the attractions in the Nature Trail have been the 8-year-old 1.5 ton baby hippo called Sally, still sucking the bottle, and one of the largest species of tortoises in the world with an attainable age of 200 years.

HUNGER COUNCIL

Other recipients of the environmental awards were the Freedom From Hunger Council for its efforts in providing basic needs to Kenyans, and Maendeleo Ya Wanawake for improving the living conditions of women, particularly in the rural areas.

Others were the Wildlife Clubs of Kenya for creating environmental awareness among the youth, particularly in schools, and the Kanu newspaper Kenya Times for recognising the importance of the environment for the future well-being of Kenya.

Bamburi Portland Cement, the largest producer of cement in Black Africa, becomes the first plant at the Coast to

receive this coveted award, rewarding its ten years efforts of afforestation of reclaimed land and quarries.

Mary Mwamodo To Lead Womens' Group

RECENTLY appointed chairman of the Women's Development Committee, Mombasa District, is Mrs. Mary Mwamodo — one of the foremost women's leaders at the Coast.

She is also chairman of Maendeleo ya Wanawake — which is growing fast at the Coast, and for thirteen years has been Area Officer of the Family Planning Association.

The Women's Development Committee was recently set up by the Ministry of Culture and Social Services, its main object being to review women's projects to decide where assistance is most required.

Secretary is Susan Kuria, Social Development Officer, Mombasa District.

There are 63 women's groups in Mombasa.

One of the recommendations made during International Women's Year, 1975, was for a Women's Bureau to be set up through which their activities could be channeled.

This was done, and the Bureau comes under the Ministry of Culture and Social Services, which is responsible for giving aid to women's groups.

NEW PROJECTS

The Women's Development Committee is to help the Ministry determine what groups are in most need of assistance. It also has the responsibility of scrutinising the applications they make for help.

Mrs. Mwamodo also mentioned that the committee can appoint responsible persons to

visit a women's group to see their project and to ascertain the assistance required.

The committee will also be assisted by 'experts' in various fields to give advice to women's groups embarking on income generating activities so that they do not start something which will not be viable — and so waste valuable money.

Said Mary 'some women are fiercely determined to start a project after seeing how successful it is elsewhere, not realising it might be completely wrong for their respective area.'

The committee will be in a position to offer advice.

It will also be looking into ways and means of how leaders can be helped to become more knowledgeable so as to better lead their groups, particularly in the field of income generating activities. This means knowing how to keep correct records and carry out market surveys.

Women's groups at Likoni

and Ngamanyi, near Jombu, are proving particularly successful in selling the eggs from the hundreds of chickens they keep.

Mary mentioned that as women see how successful a group can be in earning money and thus raising living standards by such activities, so many want to join such groups or form their own.

She noted, for example, that the Agricultural Department is working closely with women's groups to encourage and give them more expertise in the growing of vegetables.

Said Mary 'women also realise that working together as a group they are more likely to receive assistance from government for their projects.'

This year the Ministry of Culture and Social Services distributed K.Shs. 90,000/- to recommend women's groups in Mombasa.

Said Mary 'this money was disbursed based on applications received.'

SELF-RELIANCE

Speaking as chairman of Maendeleo ya Wanawake, Coast, Mary said that women are playing a much more significant role in development projects, including income generating activities.

They were also becoming more mature in leadership and decision making.

Said Mary 'it is not so many years ago that it was the husbands who made all the decisions. Now women are much more self-reliant and confident. Many are now taking the decision about Family Planning instead of leaving it entirely to their husbands, as before.'

Women have taken a big step forward and as more are educated, this in turn will accelerate development.

Meanwhile, many women in the Province are preparing a display for the International Women's Conference, which takes place in Nairobi during 1985. There will be one from each province by Maendeleo women's groups.

Speaking as Area Officer of the Family Planning Association Mary revealed details about a pilot project about to be started in Kenya.

It is a 'Demonstration Centre' to be set up on land belonging to the women of Chonyi Chatsimba, Kilifi District. The temporary buildings there are being renovated to become a Demonstration Centre covering family planning, nutrition, agriculture, social services and anything else to help improve the welfare of the people in an area which has a high population growth combined with malnutrition. Women marry very young and the idea is also to teach them more about child care.

Meanwhile, the women themselves have made a start on renovating the buildings, and will be assisted by the F.P.A.

Said Mrs. Mwamodo 'we hope to open in July.'

Disclosing this at the end of the fourth consecutive free medical camp, Jaycees Club Project director Mr. Parag Thacker said 15 of the patients treated were referred for further treatment. Two of them who had cataract, will have to undergo eye operation at the Panjia Memorial Clinic, Mombasa, at the club's expense. Mr. Thacker described the camp as the most successful.

Minister Calls For Improved Marketing Strategy

"WE CANNOT afford to be complacent in this competitive world market", warned Mr. J. K. Mutinda, Assistant Minister for Tourism and Wildlife, while addressing the Annual General Meeting of the Kenya Association of Travel Agents, held at Hilton International's Taita Hills Lodge.

"The present cut-through competition, calls for extremely professional and concerted approach in marketing strategy", continued the Assistant Minister.

Stressing the Government's target of one million tourists, within five years, Mr. Mutinda said there was a greater need for joint action in tourism promotion for Kenya, than ever before.

On the question of seasonality the Assistant Minister called on all members of KATA to embark on specific programmes aimed at attracting more tourists, particularly local tourists, during the low season.

Commending KATA for the immeasurable contribution they have rendered to the progress of Kenya's tourist industry, the Assistant Minister appealed to the members to continue taking steps in encouraging more travel agents to join "your fully constituted and represented body".

This well attended meeting was also addressed by Mr. Laban Agala, Manager Schedules and Tariffs, Kenya Airways, who outlined the current objectives of Kenya Airways and gave guidelines on where to channel members queries within the new personnel lineup within Kenya Airways.

Or the question of charters, Mr. Agala said that if charter flights into Kenya were to create a new source of tourist business, then Kenya Airways would certainly consider them.

Mr. Bob Simpson, who was elected Chairman of the Association for a further term of office, said he was very gratified to see so many members at the meeting.

In his annual report, Mr. Simpson recalled the events of a busy year for the Association and he expressed the members appreciation of Mr. Agala's assurance that Kenya Airways would see to it, that the Liaison Committee between Kenya Airways and KATA would meet shortly to discuss pending problems between the two bodies.

Mr. Simpson congratulated Taita Hills Lodge for its fine facilities and service and he said it made an ideal venue, midway between Nairobi and Mombasa.

Government Drops Legal Action Against Six Returning Stowaways

THE TANZANIAN Government this week decided not to institute any legal suit against the stowaways who were thrown off two foreign ships in the high seas of the shark infested Indian Ocean. In the incident which took place in mid March, nine Tanzanians and two Kenyans were thrown overboard a Panamanian registered Greek vessel Galifalia at gun point, off the Somali Coast.

Only four Tanzanians survived from the Galifalia tragedy while two others survived after being tossed from another ship, MV Dimiratis Express. The other five Tanzanians are feared to have drowned in the incident.

The Government has strongly condemned the crews of the two ships for their ruthless treatment towards the stowaways and said it was a gross violation of human rights.

Plans are also underway to take legal action against the two foreign ships but the Government is first expected to liaise with the Kenyan Government and other relevant diplomatic official.

The six survivors who arrived in Dar-Es-Salaam aboard another Panamanian vessel, Rosa, from Mombasa are reported to have been put into damp small room, measuring two to three square metres, in which there were several carpentry tools.

During their ordeal they are said to have been served with a single piece of bread and four chunks of meat for the two days they spent in that room and chemicals are reported to have been sprayed to force them out of the room before being ditched into the Ocean.

They were given life jackets and under the order of the ship captain who was armed with a machine gun, they were forced to jump out.

Maintenance

The Government has in the meantime commended the Greek Government for deciding to take penal prosecution against the Galifalia captain.

In Dar-Es-Salaam, the Tanzania Posts and Telecommunications Corporation (IPTC) has embarked on a major maintenance and modernisation programme to uplift the state of the existing Telecommunications network in the city.

The project, which is being supported by Sweden, is aimed at improving the city's telephone links which are characterised by frequent breakdowns. At present half of over 20,000 telephone

subscribers in the city are connected to exchange lines which are some 25 years old and after rains it is not uncommon to have large sections of the city not accessible on Telephones.

It is reported that two Swedish transmission and switching engineers have just completed a pilot maintenance exercise in the city's Oysterbay area thereby reducing the rate of faults in that area from 2.5 per year per telephone to one fault per telephone per year, the lowest rate in countries with efficient telecommunication systems is about 0.75 faults per telephone per year.

At present the main problem in Dar-Es-Salaam is the limited capacity of the telephone exchange equipment which has had to cope with more telephones thereby leading to congestion and a vulnerability to breakdowns.

With the planned increase in the exchange capacity telephone users are likely to face lesser problems.

In the middle of the week the Tanzanian Minister for National Education revealed that the illiteracy rate in the country has been reduced from 21 per cent in 1981 to 15 per cent last year. This has raised the literacy rate in the country to 85 per cent which is the highest in Africa and one of the best in the world.

The News From Nairobi Written In Lucid Japanese

IT HAS BEEN rather providential. Last week there was to be some coverage of a Japanese hippy who prides himself on being the "first Japanese hippy in the world".

The hippy in question is Yoshiki Hoshino. Age 75. He is from Shizuoka province in Japan. For much of his life he has lived in Africa and is very much an Africa hand and an expert on African Affairs.

For the past five years he has been issuing a monthly bulletin which he cyclostyles and sends out to his friends and well wishers.

Almost everything in the newsletter is evocative of the thoughts, sentiments and the experiences of Hoshino who has many times had healthy or at time unhealthy, brushes with the law in the countries where he has worked in Africa for over two decades as a foreign correspondent for a Japanese provincial, as distinct from national newspaper.

AFRICAN HISTORY

Hoshino and his wife now direct the Kenya-Japan Institute where they teach young Japanese people African history, culture and the national language, Swahili.

From the age of 55 to the age of 75 he has been a familiar face on the Nairobi scene. He is the oldest Japanese resident of Nairobi.

According to fellow journalist, Goro Tagawa from the *Yomiuri Shimbun*, a Japanese national newspaper, "there is strength in Hoshino's somewhat un-Japanese appearance that belies his years."

Hoshino discloses that most of his fellow Japanese friends

are amazed about his knowledge of Kenya and his personal contact with the principal African forces in politics and in business.

This he says is largely due to his being pragmatic and staying in the late fifties and early sixties, at a hotel known as the Garden Hotel at Jeevanjee Gardens in Nairobi.

He did not stay at the Norfolk Hotel or the New Stanley Hotel. Neither of these two hotels were establishments where people would meet the African politicians and the business leaders prior to Kenya's independence.

They were most likely to found at the Garden Hotel. Back to Goro Tagawa: "Yoshiki Hoshino was born in 1909 in Gumma-ken. While he was a student at Shizuoka High

School, he participated in left-wing movements and spent seven years in jail. In 1941 he established a school in Shanghai for Chinese boys and in 1947 he was elected to the House of Councillors.

He worked as the chief editor of the *Shizuoka Shimbun* and then in 1974 he moved to Nairobi.

His Nairobi language school takes in 14 Japanese students and each course lasts for a period of term of five months.

INFLATION

Even with the present inflation and the daily increases in the cost of living each student pays 65,000 for five months which is meant to cover fees, accommodation and meals at the Hoshino School.

The average if our calculations and conversions are correct is only ShS 800/- a month and this makes Hoshino a financial genius who is able to feed, look after and even teach 14 students in a batch during a term of five months.

Part of Hoshino's success may be his commitment to Gandhian principles and Gandhian ideals. He is simplicity personified and is a person who practices plain living and high thinking.

Hoshino is amazed at the number of young Japanese men who come to Africa and have married local African women.

"I know of at least 20 such couples," he says. "I was surprised the Japanese are so capable of assimilation, acculturation and adaptation. This was something I didn't expect."

Men like Yoshiki Hoshino are personalities who leave an impact and an influence which transcends that of wealth, affluence and unbridled power.

They are in the best sense of the word unheralded ambassadors of their countries who are not easy to come across in our world which is so seeped in quests for power, for position and for rapacious monetary gains.

Now 75 years old, Hoshino continues with a daily work schedule which will put many young business executives to shame.

HOSHINO SCHOOL

It is one of work and hard dedicated work. Most of this work is for the young Japanese men and women who come to study and learn about Africa at the Hoshino School.

He plans to stay in Kenya for the rest of his life and to work for Africa and for the young Japanese whom he wishes to teach something about African history, African culture, and the national language, Swahili.

Though belated, it is "Happy Birthday Hoshino San! And may you live till you are a merry 100 years old."

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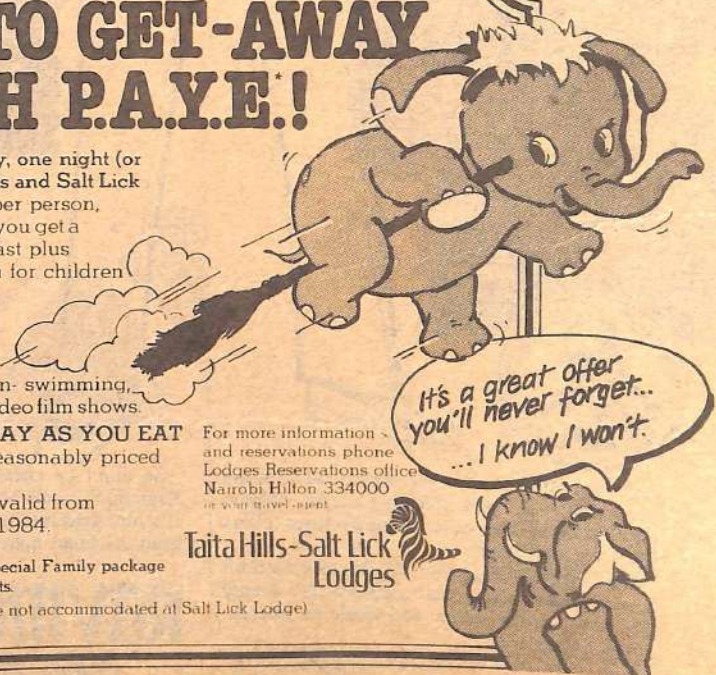

conference on Thursday night. Mr Rafsanjani is both the speaker of Iran's parliament and Ayatollah Khomeini's representative in military matters. said King Fahad had posed his question through Syria Vice President Abdel Halim Khaddam, who went to Tehran recently.

Meanwhile Saudi Arabia's oil Minister Shaikh Ahmed Zaki Yamani has expressed fears that Lloyds of London could cancel insurance for tankers coming to the Gulf, a move which could amount to closing the strait of Hormuz.

Sheikh Yamani described the possible move as a hidden danger and more serious than Iran's threat to close the strait.

He said such a step by Lloyds would cause a shortage of around four million barrels a day, definitely increase oil prices and perhaps seriously affect the world's economic recovery.

"Without insurance the tanker owners will be reluctant to send in tankers to the Gulf. It looks like we are heading for real trouble," the Saudi Minister said.

A senior Lloyds official and underwriter Stephen Merret, told a press conference here that such a move was almost without precedent.

"I see no practical possibility of cancellation of that insurance would be unavailable for the Gulf ports," he said.

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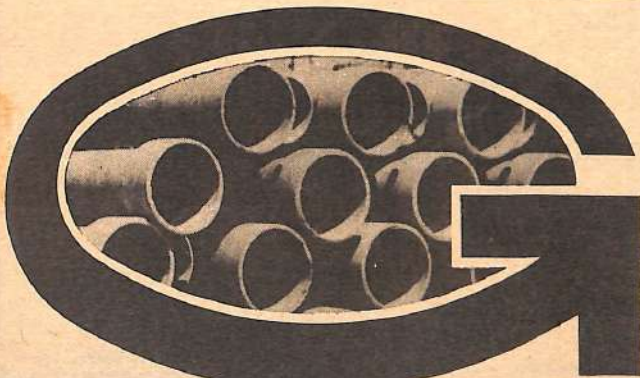

SOME 100 motor vehicles are scheduled to arrive tomorrow at Kilindini Port from Japan, in the face of a continuing controversy surrounding some other 800 Japanese cars impounded at the port.

As the fate of this sorry cargo lying at the port yard still hands on the balance, m.v. Sea Enterprise, chartered to the 111 automobiles together with

In other parts of the world shipment of Japanese cars is also hitting black headlines.

The US government is also reported to have asked the Japanese government to allow US shipping companies to participate in transporting Japanese automobiles to the States.

The annual value of car transport trade between Japan and the US is said to amount to some \$400 million.

Until now Japanese cars have been shipped on specially designed vessels

owned either by Japanese automobile manufacturers such as Toyota and Nissan, or by Japanese shipping companies, particularly Mitsui OSK Lines and Kawasaki Kisen Kaisha.

American shipping companies maintain that the Japanese share in the car transport trade is discriminatory, blocking the participation of other shipping companies.

Two BEACON lines vessels arrived in Mombasa on Wednesday. m.v. Ukena has been discharging 154 empty containers and 480 full containers carrying general cargo and steel rolls while City of Liverpool has been loading 400 TEUs, mainly coffee, tea, canned pineapple, sisal and other produce for UK, NWC and USA ports.

The latter was here two weeks ago and headed south to Tanga, Dar es Salaam and Nacala before returning to Mombasa on her northbound

voyage. The Greek flag ship on charter *Homerich Dawn* arrived on Thursday to discharge 16,000 tons of wheat for Kenya from UK.

Three vessels are scheduled to dock in Mombasa tomorrow. A small vessel m.v. *Homerstrand*, also on charter, will discharge 12 full containers of general cargo from Hamburg, West Germany.

m.v. *Agnes Venture*, chartered to NYK Lines, will discharge 2,730 tons of machinery, steel ware and coils from Japan.

The 10,607-ton MSC vessel *Francesca*, flying the Panama flag, is also arriving tomorrow to load full containers for UK and NWC ports.

Arriving on Sunday is the Lykes Line vessel *Nancy Lykes* to discharge 900 tons of general cargo and load, 3,400 tons of cargo, mainly coffee, for the States.

Two more MSC vessels, m.v. *Alexa II* and *IVOR*, are scheduled to dock at Kilindini next Tuesday.

The 9,154-ton *Alexa II* will load general cargo and containers for UK and NWC ports while the 7,232-ton *Ivor* is expected to load containers for the Mediterranean ports.

Alexa II is a Panama flag vessel while *Ivor* is flying the Cypriot flag.

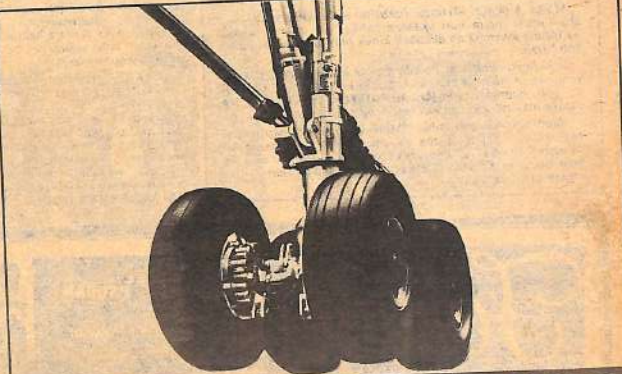

Facts on Sweden

Swedish Development Co-operation

International development co-operation is an essential part of Sweden's foreign policy. The Minister for Foreign Affairs is responsible for such co-operation. He is assisted by the Department for International Development Co-operation within the Ministry for Foreign Affairs. The Department prepares the annual aid programme and basic material for government decisions on multilateral as well as bilateral aid activities.

With regard to multilateral assistance, the responsibility of the Department covers not only the preparation and formulation of the policy but also its implementation. Sweden's programme for bilateral development co-operation, the major part of which is concentrated to eighteen countries, is the responsibility of a government agency, the Swedish International Development Authority (SIDA). Government decisions regarding bilateral assistance are normally based on proposals from SIDA.

Sweden's policy towards the developing world

The parliamentary decision made in October 1978, which provides a general framework for a comprehensive Swedish policy towards developing countries, was based on guidelines for international development co-operation as defined in the Government bill of March the same year. In addition to official development assistance one can also single out political decisions which have a direct bearing on the developing countries. This applies to parts of Swedish trade, shipping, monetary and other foreign economic policies.

When formulating policies in various fields, the Swedish authorities are always to keep in mind the interest of the Third World nations to acquire a larger share of world resources and to be given the opportunity to exert greater influence on decisions regarding international economic relations. These demands are to be weighed against our own national interests: economic growth, full employment, regional development, etc.

Appropriations

Budgetary appropriations for development co-operation amount to SEK 6,740 mill. in 1983/84 or 1% of the estimated gross national income for the calendar year 1983.

Multilateral assistance

Almost one third (SEK 1,875 mill.) of total Swedish development assistance is channelled through international organizations. Sweden is one of the largest contributors to the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP) and to the United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF). The regular contribution to the UNDP amounts to SEK 360 mill. for 1983/84. A special contribution of SEK 50 mill. has been earmarked for special activities of the UNDP in favour of the least developed countries. Sweden will also contribute SEK 32 mill. to the United Nations Capital Development Fund (UNCDF) and SEK 48 mill. to the United Nations Fund for Population Activities (UNFPA), both of which are administered by the governing council of the UNDP.

The budgeted contribution to the International Development Association (IDA), amounting to SEK 499 mill., constitutes an extraordinary payment between the sixth and the seventh replenishment.

The contributions to regional development banks will amount to SEK 182.5 mill. Of this amount SEK 105 mill. has been allocated to the African Development Fund, while SEK 14.5 mill. is a contribution to the Asian Development Bank and SEK 63 mill. to the Asian Development Fund.

A total of SEK 272 mill. has been allocated for international food aid. Of this amount SEK 81 mill. will go to the World Food Programme (WFP). In addition, Sweden has made a commitment to contribute 40,000 metric tons of wheat annually under the Food Aid Convention (FAC) of 1980 at an estimated cost of SEK 63 mill. Sweden has also committed itself to build up to 40,000 tons of wheat and other Swedish food products as an emergency reserve for international relief operations. SEK 98 mill. is estimated for this purpose.

Bilateral assistance

An appropriation of SEK 3,799.6 mill. has been set aside for 1983/84. This is an increase of SEK 121.9 mill. compared with 1982/83.

Terms of assistance: Swedish assistance is normally extended in the form of grants. The least developed or most seriously affected countries were written off in 1978.

Tied/un-tied aid: The major part of Swedish assistance is untied. In order to ensure the best possible use of the funds for the recipient country, procurement is, wherever practicable, to be effected through international competitive bidding or quotations.

Swedish tied aid is defined by grant aid tied to procurement of Swedish goods and services. The tied aid component also in-

cludes disaster relief in the form of food products or other Swedish products as well as Swedish contributions in kind to international food programmes.

For the fiscal year 1983/84, the proportion of tied aid of the total aid budget is proposed to remain at some 22%.

The use of the tied aid extended under development co-operation agreements is decided upon by the recipient countries to enable them to procure Swedish products which are competitive on the world market.

Import financing: More than one third of Swedish bilateral aid is extended in the form of import financing. Agreements as to what goods and services are to be procured under the import support programmes are made following discussions between the recipient countries and SIDA.

Long-term co-operation: Sweden is engaged in long-term co-operation with eighteen countries of which twelve are to be found in Africa, five in Asia and one in Latin America. For most of these countries, bilateral agreements are signed, indicating the utilization of the funds to be provided by Sweden.

Africa: Sweden has long-term development co-operation with Angola, Botswana, Cape Verde, Ethiopia, Guinea-Bissau, Kenya, Lesotho, Mozambique, Swaziland, Tanzania, Zambia and Zimbabwe.

More than an amount of SEK 115 mill. has been pledged in support of regional economic co-operation in southern Africa for 1983/84. A small part of this sum is also included for account the East African Development Bank.

Swedish support to the liberation movements, refugees and victims of apartheid in southern Africa amounts to SEK 100 mill. The liberation movements, SWAPO of Namibia and ANC of South Africa, receive humanitarian assistance.

Sweden's contributions to educational programmes and legal aid are channelled through various international and national non-government organizations as well as through the UN system. Special assistance for humanitarian programmes in southern Africa has been given to UNHCR and to the International Red Cross.

Tanzania remains the largest single recipient of Swedish assistance to Africa. A major portion of the funds is used for programmes in health and education.

Aid to Asia: Sweden has long-term bilateral development co-operation with Bangladesh, India, Laos, Sri Lanka and Vietnam. Assistance to Bangladesh consists mainly

of import support. Project assistance which is increasing, is concentrated to health and family planning, rural extension programmes and vocational training.

A major part of the assistance to be used for import support. Project support is mainly directed to forestry and public health as well as water supply.

Project co-operation with Laos consists of forestry development, transport and communications with emphasis on maintenance as well as import support for raw materials, implements and consumer goods.

Most of the assistance to Sri Lanka is tied aid for import support in connection with a drip power project.

In the case of Vietnam, the government has proposed SEK 363 mill. for development co-operation in 1983/84. The major part of the resources are to go to paper and pulp factory. A children's hospital and a general hospital will also receive import support.

There here a consultancy fund will continue to be an important component of the Swedish assistance to Vietnam.

Latin America and the Caribbean: In fiscal year 1983/84 SEK 110 mill. is proposed for a programme for humanitarian assistance to political prisoners and refugees in the region, which was initiated after the military coup in Chile in 1973. A grant of SEK 700 mill. is proposed for Nicaragua. In addition, the programme for multilateral assistance contribution of around SEK 7.5 mill. supported for the Caribbean Development Bank.

Disaster relief: The resources for disaster relief are primarily available in the form of natural disaster or devastation relief and food aid.

The funds may be used for disaster relief in countries already receiving Swedish disaster relief assistance, when their development is threatened by unforeseen causes. They are also available for pre-disaster planning.

Non-governmental organizations: The assistance provided by non-governmental organizations represents a valuable complement to official programme for development co-operation. The voluntary organizations are, for instance, often able to reach the privileged groups.

Special programmes: Funds are available for a number of special programmes directed to family planning, rural development and industrial development, etc. such as support to individual countries, but are also directed to a global or regional project, such as satellite shares of the funds are used for projects or courses run by UN agencies.

Nordic co-operation in development assistance: The Nordic countries have a tradition of close co-operation in the field of development assistance. In connection with the formation of a bilateral development co-operation agreement, as far as co-operation with developing countries is concerned, collaboration is encouraged by jointly financed projects in development projects in Tanzania, Kenya and agricultural training, Kenya (Kortum).

Research co-operation: The Swedish Agency for Research Co-operation with Developing Countries (SARA) was established in 1971. It was given a permanent and independent status as a government agency in July 1979. Its purpose is to promote research that supports the development of countries in their efforts to achieve economic, social and cultural development and equality.

The proposed allocation for 1983/84 is SEK 160 mill.

In order to achieve its main objective, SARA contributes to the building of research capacity in research and development in order to help strengthen the research potentials of developing countries. SARA

ries out programmes within four areas: research co-operation with developing countries, research co-operation between developing countries and special research projects, international research programmes and Swedish development research.

Technical co-operation and concessionary credits
A total amount of SEK 563 mill. has been allocated for the fiscal year 1983/84 for technical co-operation and concessionary credits. In addition SEK 30 mill. out of the balance from the fiscal year 1981/82 will be utilized for these purposes in 1983/84.

Technical co-operation The Swedish Commission for Technical Co-operation (BITS) administers technical co-operation programmes with a number of developing countries with which the Swedish Government has entered into agreements on co-operation. The Commission contributes to the financing of preparatory studies, training programmes, and co-operation between institutions in Sweden and corresponding institutions in the countries concerned. Financial contributions on a grant basis are provided for a few countries in support of already established technical co-operation. Certain scholarship programmes and programmes for cultural exchange with developing countries are also financed within the field of technical co-operation.

For the fiscal year 1983/84 the Swedish Government has allocated SEK 90 mill.—an increase of SEK 15 mill. from 1982/83—to technical co-operation. Out of this allocation, SEK 2.4 mill. is to be used for the administration of the programme. Programmes for scholarships and cultural exchange will receive a total of SEK 6.2 mill.

Concessionary credits Export credits linked with a grant element from the aid budget are offered to countries which pursue a development policy in line with the objectives of Swedish development co-operation. The credits are tied to the procurement of goods and services of Swedish origin.

So far an amount of SEK 350 mill. has been pledged or disbursed from the aid budget in support of credits on concessionary terms. The total credit volume, thus mobilized, is roughly SEK 1,500 mill. For 1983/84 SEK 500 mill. will be allocated. The total volume of credits will thus be maintained while the grant element will increase in accordance with internationally agreed terms.

The main recipients of concessionary credits are countries with which Sweden has bilateral aid programmes (65%) while another group of countries, with which a technical co-operation programme exists, have received around 25% of the resources committed.

Concessionary credits are to be guaranteed by the Swedish Export Credit Guarantee Board (*Exportkreditgarantifonden*) except for countries with which Sweden has a bilateral aid programme. For the latter group of countries the credits are to be guaranteed against the aid budget.

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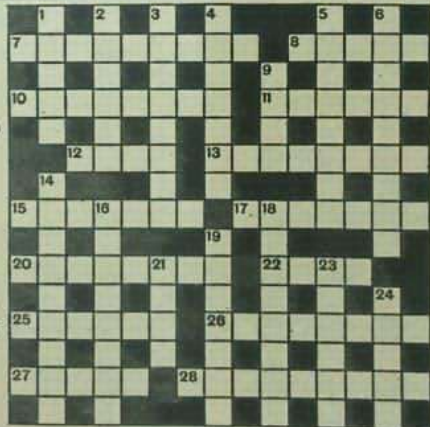

FIVE new records were established during the annual Mombasa District Athletics Championship held at Mombasa Municipal Stadium last week-end, writes Abdulrahman Sheriff.

New records were set in the 1,500 metres long jump and 4 x 400 metres relay (women) while men managed to establish new time in the 20 kilometres walk and threw the hammer far away.

Kenya Navy's Richard Ochola set a new record in the 20 km walk when he covered the distance in 1hr 42 min 30 secs. He shattered the previous record time of 1:44:01 set by Muniyao.

Another Kenya Navyman, J. Ngare managed to shatter his previous record by throwing the hammer at 36.59 battering his former distance of 32.20 metres.

Cargo showed their superiority when the women 4 x 400m relay team set a new record with a time of 4:06.2 secs beating the previous time of 4:06.9 secs.

Cargo clinched the overall title when they collected a total of 203 points. Kenya Navy clinched second spot with 75 points while third place went to Kenya Railways with 71 points. Kenya Posts and Telecommunications came fourth with 63 points.

LONG JUMP RECORD
Chepyator of Kenya Cargo Handling Services set a new record in the 1,500 metres when she clocked 4:47.3 secs. She bettered her old mark of 4:51.4 sec by 4.1 secs.

The long jump record was also established by a Cargo star Jacial Mutunga jumped 5.37 m to beat the former mark of 4.96 m.

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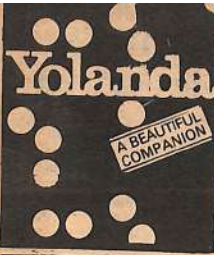
