WORLD RECORD' SEYCHELLES FLIGHT

THE FIRST BOEING 767 for "Air Seychelles" has set a new distance record across the Atlantic, Europe and Africa for commercial twinjets on a 16-hour 49-minute nonstop delivery flight from the United States to the Republic of Seychelles, an island ration in the Indian Ocean. The 767-200 extended-range aircraft departed Boeing facilities in Seattle, Washington and arrived the next day at the Air

Seychelles home base on the island of Mahe after flying a great-circle route of 8,893 statute miles (14,311 km). Passengers included President of the Republic of Seychelles France Albert Rene and members of his cabinet; the executive chairman of Air Seychelles, Conrad Benoiton, and other personnel from the airline; and representatives of Boeing, ILFC and General Electric.

Growing Inflation Begins To Hurt Tanzania Tour Industry

THE recent devaluation of the Tanzania shilling by 4.8 per cent would have served well for the tourist industry under normal circumstances because visitors holding foreign exchange would have stronger convertible currencies.

However the Government also raised the airport tax, petrol prices, drink prices and introduced once again the excise duty on some commodities, mainly luxurious which however have direct affect on tourism tariffs.

COMPLAINTS

Some tourists have complained that when they change the 50 dollars they get the convertible amount of shillings in packed envelopes barely giving them a chance to count the money and have doubted that the exchange rates used are at times incorrect.

The increase in local costs plus tariffs for visitors has put some tour operators, travel agents and hoteliers into a state of worry and those who have already given fixed fares to tourists for the coming season are certainly going to suffer losses because they cannot amend prices now.

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

Solferino has been chosen to to hold the Supercamp '89" to be held at Supercamp '89" to Solferino has been chosen to to hold the Supercamp '89 in celebration of 125 years of the founding of the Red Cross move-

ment and in the place where the idea of the Red Cross was conceived.

In 1989 two large European countries France and Austria were at war. Their armies were fighting in Italy near the village Solferino.

There were 300,000 soldiers in the battle. For 15 hours from dawn to dusk they fought. The French army was victorious. But the dead and wounded were counted. There were 42,000 wounded.

Throughout the night on the plain of Solferino their groans could be heard. Next day a Swiss man arrived at the scene of the battle, determined to help the wounded soldiers and to enlist the help of the peasents. That man was Henry Dunant.

man was Henry Dunant.

For several days efforts were made to heal the wounds and to save the lives of the wounded soldiers. But for many it was too late. They had been abandoned too long on the battlefield; they had lost too much blood and their wounds had become infected.

Henry Dunant said to himself:
"Things should not be like this.
Even if men have to fight, they
should be wise enough and
civilised enough to pick up the
victims and take care of them."

He came back to Geneva in Switzerland and wrote a book about what he had seen and done.





Asked why the programme was called "Polio-Plus" the DG explained that a feasibility study explained that a feasibility study on the eradication of polio had shown that Dollars 120 million were raquired. When Rotary called for funds they received Dollars 240 million from all over the world, including governments and private donors, Aid Agencies etc. They then had to decide what to do with this extra revenue.

VACCINATION

He went on "Polio is just one of the six childhood diseases which can be prevented by vac-cination. The others are diptheria, tefanus. whooning cough TR

and measles. Said the DG "50 we thought that once we had finished with polio we will use the excess funds to try and combat the other five diseases.

the other live diseases.

He explained that Rotary International is donating all the vaccines from its funds and will distribute them to government of all countries in which Polio exists. He said that Rotarians locally are expected to support the programme by arranging refrigeration and transport of the vaccines, as well as motivation and monitoring.



them today are consistent and enduring and its function has become better understood and more fully accepted and appreciated both in the private and public sector.

Challenging Kenyan Public Relations practitioners, Mr Kiplagat continued:

"As a result of Public Relations taking centre stage in human relations at various levels, Public Relations practitioners will increasingly find themselves in situations whereby they will be called upon to be accountable and to show that they do really contribute to the achievements of their employer's goals".

are looking upon Public Relations practitioners to contribute substantively to their objectives, cardial among them the building of positive public images".



She has also voluntarily chosen to retain her close links with humans. She does, however, mingle freely with wild elephants when the whim takes her.

Visiting the Sheldrick Wildlife Trust Orphanage in Nairobi recently were a 29-strong group from the USA comprising 19 outstanding American professionals awarded a three year Fellowship under the W.K. Kellogg Foundation Programme.

They were accompanied by their spouses, also advisers.

So far, the interest of the Kellogg Foundation (with more than three billion dollar assets) has been mainly in Latin America. It is understood that the group's visit here might possibly lead to it taking a long term interest in Kenya. in Kenya

in Kenya.

Their visit to the orphanage was arranged by Kim Morbey, Group General Manager of Kilimanjaro Safari Club which is a great supporter of conserving Kenya's wildlife.

Said Roy Smith, the group's co-ordinator "we have been most impressed by the very meaning-ful work being undertaken here". The group donated Shs 1,000/t to the Wildlife Trust to which was added many individual donations.

At the orphanage they were addressed by Lisa Ruben, who has known the Sheldrick family for many years and has been assisting for 18 months in Tsavo East and Nairobi National Park.

She told these Kellogg Fellows, who included doctors, lawyers, university professors and community leaders "to spread the word about banning the sale of ivory. Only if there is no market for it can the elephant and rhino survive".

Lisa continued "it is said that an elephant never forgets. I think this is absolutely true. When they arrive here they have to be persuaded to live. They go through an awful lot of trauma and stress and sometimes you really think they are not going to make it".

Said Lissa "elephants are incredibly sensitive and very intelligent". She said that: "Ndume was running after anything moving in the bush, thinking it was his

She explained that the little ones are fed every three hours during the day and night with the special premature milk donated by Wyeth Laboratories, UK. Said Lissa "we are most grateful to them".

Adding "during this period their keepers never leave them alone. They sleep with them, go out with them and are totally dedicated and wonderful people".

SIX BODYGUARDS

SIX BODYGUARDS
They have two rhino. One is Sam who came to them when he was six weeks old and is now just over three years. He was born in the Maasai Mara and was one of the two remaining rhinos near Governor's Camp.

All his mother's previous calves had fallen prey to lion, and despite a six strong body guard, Sam almost suffered the same fate. He and his mother were moved to what was considered a safer location after the first lion attack.

But his mother, Halima, wanted

But his mother, Halima, wanted to return to her former territory and so swam across the river leaving Sam unaftended. Hearing his wails, the lions swam the river from the other bank and got him.

But for the proximity of wild-life rangers who heard the com-motion he would undoubtedly have been killed.

have been killed.

He was severely mauled and in a very sorry state. "Boozie" helped comfort him at the Sheldrick orphanage.

The other rhino "Amboseli" born in Amboseli Park in April 1987, was orphaned after his mother was speared to death by a Maasai on September 25, that year. "Amboseli" gallantly protected the body of her mother from vultures and all other pre-

The David Sheldrick Wildlife
Trust was initially established
as a special project of the
African Wildlife Foundation in
memory of David Sheldrick,
founder Warden of Tsavo East
National Park.

A small territory Committee comprising David Sheldrick's closest colleagues assists the Trustees in defermining policy and projects to be supported or initiated by the Trust.

or initiated by the Trust.

Both Trustees and Committee members work on a purely voluntary basis with donations to the David Sheldrick Wildlife Trust going entirely to benefit animals and wilderness in the most practical and direct way possible.

The Trust's committee is probably the most experience in wildlife matters of any body in Africa; pince many members have's lifetime involvement with wildlife in Kenya and are well versed in the local conditions.

Among the ranks are two of

Among the ranks are two of e longest serving wardens in

Africa.

It has given help in many ways including providing finance for the protection and surveillance of rhino on private land and outside of national parks, also providing food for translocated animals to bridge the acclimatisation period to new conditions.

It has also supported and assisted wherever possible the creation of Kenya's first Special Rhino Sanctuary in Lake Nakuru National Park, as well as the establishment of the Tsavo Rhino Sanctuary, funding the day to day operation on an on-going basis.

It has hand-raised over the years seven orphaned rhino calv


