

Student Success

OSHWAL ACADEMY entered 30 candidates in this years University of London Overseas 'O' Level examination and most of the students obtained excellent results.

The most outstanding student was Hiten Ratilal Shah who obtained nine 'A's, the best possible result in the examination. 

In 1988 the total area under In 1988 the total area under cultivation in Coast Province was approximately 280,000 hectares. We received good rainfall which was evenly distributed all over the year and this enabled our farmers to realize good harvests.

Maize is the predominant cereal crop grown in the Province with a production of 110,000 tons in 1988 compared with 83,000 tons in 1987. The other major cereals are Rice, Sorghum and millet in addition to pulses.

The main cash crops produced

The main cash crops produced in Coast Province are cashewnuts, cotton, coconuts and simsim and also horticultural crops. With the

formation of Coast Province Development Authority promised by H.E. the Preside sometime in 1988 we anticip that production from our tractops will double due to improved husbandry, process and marketing.

We are at the moment producing 25,000 tons of cashewnuts for domestic anticipied consumption.

Coast Province is largely a low potential area suitable for ranching. There are a total of 29 operational ranches with a population of 56,350 animal. The ranches have enjoyed the credit facilities in livestock development programme Phase I and II in which 25 ranches are participating with project capital outlay of over Ksh. 110 million in form of credit from the Agricultural Finance Corporation (AFC). Besides the ranches, the wananchi are also keeping a total of 2.34 million shoats and cattle to supplement their incomes.





COAST Province is endowed with a wide range of climatic conditions which facilitate production of a variety of food, industrial and horticultural crops.

A total of about 280,000 ha. were planted with various crops in 1988 with industrial crops, food crops and horticultural crops occupying 139,592 ha., 112,000 ha. and 24,500 ha. respectively.

About K£ 28 million was earned About Kt. 28 million was earned from production of 197,000 tonnes of industrial crops in 1988 while the production of major horticultural crops of about 254,000 tonnes fetched about Kf. 24 million during the same period.

Main food crops of maize, rice, pulses and cassava produced 293,500 tonnes valued at about Kf 20 million.

Production of coconuts and cashewnuts enjoy special domi-nance among the industrial crops as two crops which thrive well only in Coast Province. The Province is doing very well in cotton production contributing about 40 per cent of the national

COAST PROVINCE PROVIDES GREAT VARIETY OF FOOD, INDUSTRIAL AND HORTICULTURAL CROPS

The irrigated cotton in Bura Irrigation and Settlement Project and Hola Irrigation Scheme have performed very well in the past both in quality and production of about two tonnes per hectare.

Rainfed cotton production in all the six districts of Coast Province will be expanded from the current 10,000 ha. to 12,000

Emphasis will also be placed on increased production of sim-sim and bixa in Kwale, Lamu, Mombasa and Kilifi Districts.

Like farmers in other parts of

the country, Coast Province farmers are diversifying their production into farming of Arabica coffee in Taita and Taveta District and Robusta coffee in Kwale and Killfi Districts.

New Maize

In line with the National Food Policy of self-sufficiency in food emphasis in the Province is being laid not only on production of enough food but also on adequately balanced diet.

The news of the recent release of a new maize variety, the wani Hybrid I, has been received

with a lot of enthusiasm by Coast farmers and will encourage expansion of current hectarage of Coast Composite in the low areas, the hybrid maize in the higher areas of Taita Hills and local maize varieties.

In addition, cassava, Sorghum and millets production will be expanded in the drier areas of the Province while production of both small scale irrigated and

the Province while production of both small scale irrigated and rainfed rice will be increased through designing and construction of new small scale irrigation schemes in Kwale, Taita Taveta, Kilifi and Tana River Districts.

Inclusion of pulses in this production programme will ensure ready source of protein to provide well balanced diets.

A very high potential for pro-producion of horticultural crops exist in Coast Province. The area produces some of the best mangoes, citrus and pineapples, in the country.

Fruit tree crops nurseries have been established in all districts of Coast Province to provide suitable planting materials to farmers in the Province.

There are 18 such nurseries which produced some 150,000 seedling of various types (fruit trees and agroforestry trees) in 1988.

These nurseries will be regis-tered and expanded for production of higher quality seed materials in future.

Growing of vegetables is being encouraged in order to make the Province which has been dependent on outside supplies to be self-sufficient in these cross

these crops.

The viable production of spices has not been exploited and farmers have been asked to expand on the area under these crops which could be a good source of foreign exchange.

Nutrition

Matuga Research Station is collecting and bulking materials for multiplication in order to provide a good source of planing materials.

Post-harvest crop losses are attributed mainly to insect infestation, molds, birds, rodents and spillage and their economic, nutritional and physical values could at times be insurmountable

Farmers have been advised to protect their crops from insects damage by treating their produce with appropriate chemicals while at the same time good house-keeping and proper drying of grain has been equally emphasized.

grain has been equally emphasized.
Through the Rural Technology
Development Unit (RTDU) of
the Atinistry of Agriculture
sociable cribs which allow
proper drying of maize, thus
impraving on the grains storage
life have been developed and
actually the formers in all areas. impraying on the developed and life have been developed to farmers in all areas of the Province.

hr addition, close surveillance and monitoring of migratory posts have been conducted effectively and farmers advised on control measures at appropriate

in addition to increasing crop production, emphasis has also been claced on soil and water conservation. The concept of catchment approach has been implemented in all areas of the Province

These measures have included digging at bench terraces, cut-off drains, rehabilitation of over-gravet areas, river-banks pro-tection and practising agro-forestry.

irrigation projects have been started through the District Descriptment Committees, the Non-Covernmental Organisations

A total of 14,000 ha. is under and Settlement Project, Hola irrigation with the Bura Irrigation and Settlement Project, Hola irrigation Scheme, Lower Tana Deita and Taveta irrigation schmes being the major projects.

Agricultoral mechanisation service is a major Government programme geared to making tractor services available to both large-scale and small-scale

The Mariakani and Garsen Agricultural Mechanisation Agricultural Mechanisation Stations have endeavoured to provide these services to Coast farmers. Where tractor services have not been readily available due to breakages of machinery, the Government is making neces-

sary arrangements to rehabilitate the machineries so that the farmers may benefit more.

Suffice it to mention that through this programme, some 43,570 ha. have been brought to production of maize to production of maize some 80,750 metres of terraces, cut-off drains, and canals have been constructed.

A further 1206 years.

A further 1,206 km. of fam roads and about 313,700 cubic metres of dams and water holes have been dug in various part of the Province using the Api-cultural Mechanisation Service.

cultural Mechanisation Service.

Development of suitable and simple technologies for the local farming communities will confine to be practised through the expansion and strengthesis of the Rural Technology Development Units (RTDU) particularly in areas of harnessing of animal power by training oxen and donkeys in ploughing oxen and donkeys in ploughing oxen and implements, rehabilitation of farm implement, and construction of improved storage structures.

These techniques will supplement services offered through the Agricultural Mechanisation Stations.

Utilisation of all available land is very important. Providing marketing facilities and available of farm credit would enhance intensification of agricultural production in the Province.

In 1988 the Agricultural finance
Corporation assisted 3,016 farmers
with a total of KSh. 185,687,736,00
for both crop and livestock
production. The Co-operative
Societies were the main channels
through which farmers received
agricultural inputs and marketed
their produce.

There was an increase of 310 per cent in the utilisation of improved seed by farmers indicating that the farmers were adopting the teachings by the extension service.

Through the National extension programme, farmers have been continuously trained and visited in their farms. The extension methods include scheduled visits, planned field days, barazas and above all, demonstrations and residential courses at our farmers training centres.

Good marketable prawns are brained after three months; naking it technically possible to reap three crops from each and within one year.

Time is needed enough, to dry, epair and fill the ponds to equired depths before new crops are stocked.

Although our yields at Ngomeni ave gradually improved since

project was started, reaching about 300 Kgs per pond harvest or, about 900 kgs per hiertare per year, these yields are still very low compared with similar farms in the Far East or South America; but have achieved under our conditions in Kenya both technical and economic viability.

TIGER PRAWNS

Of the three kinds of prawns found naturally in the wild here, the white and tiger prawns are commonly grown.

Although this pilot project has stressed on prawn growing; in its wider scope, it was intended to grow fish as well and indeed even now, milkfish which passes into the ponds through the screens in very young stages already form an important by — catch when the ponds are harvested. by — catc harvested.

Even the ubuquitous tilapia is being harvested as a weed! Thus in addition to projecting our prawn growing techniques there are many aims still to be achieved at the project.

achieved at the project.

Surveys already conducted along the entire coast for areas free of pollution and with suitable soils and salts reveal considerable potential resource for prawn farming under possible techniques of: extensive — simply changing water in wide areas; semi intensive—as we presently practice at Ngomeni; and intensive—large heavy stocking with frequent mechanical water changes feeding and fertilising. mechanical wa and fertilising.

INVESTMENTS

However, at present here in Kenya, there are two paths of applying the results so far obtained. Low scale simple embarkments or ponds owned by local individuals or groups requiring little investment to be supported by departmental extension services, and the big ponds requiring substantial investments to be run independently by private investors.

Naturally, the encouraging esults we have obtained at

Ngomeni have attracted several interested parties some of which have actually started. It is expected that such private farms because of their greater emphasis on production in con-trast to ours where research, training and demonstration are also persued. also persued.


Right now, experiments are being conducted towards cheaper and best methods of manuring to cut down costs and it is planned that a hatchery will be built to ensure sufficient quantities of desired types and sizes of young prawns to be stocked.

At Ngomeni our present harvests landed at least once a month are washed and delivered to one bulk buyer on site through an annual open tender system.





We should therefore redouble our efforts to enable us face the challenges ahead of us as we start the Second Decade of Nyayo Era.







TOYOTA LEADING VEHICLE SALES ...

WITH adequate stocks available for the first time in ten months Toyota has regained the number one position in the hoth contested battle for leadership in Kenya's velpicle market, with sales totalling 1458 units for the period January to July, 1989.

Toyota were the market leaders in 1987 but slipped back into second place in 1988, and later slipped back further into third place as at the end of the first quarter of this year. By the end of June Totota was in second place and with July sales totalling :311 units, Toyota was back in the number one position with Nissan in second place with 1420 units sold, Peugeot third with 1416 and Isuzu fourth with 14215 units.

With supplies at last available to meet demands, the four-valve Corolla 90 sold a total of 418 units, giving this much seculated. of 418 units, giving this much sought after model a 27.7 per cent share in its sector of the market.

In the one-ton pick-up sector the Toyota Hilux made dramatic gains selling 719 units, dethroning the long-time market leader, the Peugeot 504 pick-up for the first

time. Peugeot sold 697 unith and Nissan were in third place with sales of 314 units.

In the diesel minibus sector Totata also made significant progress with its Hisace mode now available with a limited sidifferential, selling 97 units. It diesel Hisace's only real rivathen Nissan Urvan, sold 87 units.

Commenting on its impression.

Commenting on its improva-sales performance, a Toyo Kenya spokesman said that bet availability of CKD kits, combin with the reduction in vehic prices resulting from the Just budget, had helped put Toyo back in the number one place the vehicle market.

However, he said, the loca motor industry as a whole was beginning to benefit from the tighter controls on the importation of vehicles which was now being exerted by government.


