BOOST FROM GUINNESS TO SAVE PARK ANIMALS

A MAJOR conservation initiative to help save the dwindling elephant herds of Kenya, is being launched by Guinness Brewing Worldwide Limited, the brewing division of Guinness PLC.

Its partner in the venture will be "Operation Raleigh", the youth venture and conservation organisation founded by the Prince of Wales and led by Colonel John Blashford Shell.

While announcing this, the Chairman and Managing Director of Guinness Brewing, Mr Brian Baldock, said:

"One of the noblest creatures walking on our Earth is being hunted to extinction. Africa's elephant herds have already been cut, probably by as much as two-thirds in the past 25 years.

"Guinness has a long history in Africa. We market Guinness products in 30 African countries. I believe our customers and employees in Africa and around the world are outraged by what is happening to the African elephant. So now I pledge the support of Guinness Brewing to help stop the tragedy".

An immediate first stage of the operation is already under way. Unserviceable vehicles, urgently needed by game wardens protecting elephants from poachers in Kenya's vast safari parks, will be put back on the road by a Kenyan repair team funded by Guinness Brewing and co-ordinated by staff from "Operation Raleigh". They will recover the vehicles from the game parks and repair and maintain them.

The initial Guinness donation will be used to buy and equip a truck to retrieve the damaged vehicles; to purchase a second vehicle to transport staff and equipment, and to repair a number of the damaged vehicles. The two purchased vehicles will be handed over to the Kenya Wildlife Conservation and Management Department in October.

Mr Baldock said: "Our aim will be to provide help to Kenya's game wardens who are the front line in the war

against the poachers."

He went on: "The scale of the damage to Kenya's magnificent elephant herds in the past few years is appalling to contemplate. If our contribution can help to stem the poaching then we shall have put back a small but worthwhile amount into a country that has been a good host to Guinness Brewing for many years."

CONTRIBUTIONS

One of Guinness Brewing's aims, said Mr Baldock, would be to generate funds in addition to its own direct contribution. "We believe many of our employees, customers and business friends might wish to join us in this endeavour," he said.

"I can see no reason why, at the end of the day, this initiative

should not provide the stimulus for generating substantial funds for this work."

In a special message to Guinness Brewing and "Operation Raleigh", Kenya's Director of Wildlife Conservation and Management, Dr Richard Leakey, said:

"I am pleased formally to confirm my approval of your proposed programme for donation and rehabilitation of vehicles sponsored by Guinness Brewing Worldwide. This assistance is very timely and I am indeed grateful for your willingness to help us at this time".

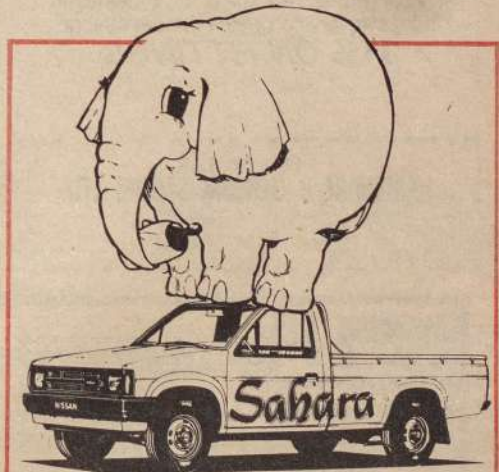

Hair Dressing At Studio Intercoiffure

WOULD you like to become a hairdresser? — a top-rate stylist? You must have heard of City and Guilds of London Institute—the most recognized body which is in England, acknowledged by the government there, and the organization which keeps up high levels in technical colleges throughout that country.

One of the subjects taken at the colleges is hairdressing, and out from the Reading College of Technology as an external examiner in hair care has been Ms Anne-Marie Dodson, who is a full-time lecturer at Reading, and who holds HDipBTh, BABTAC, CertEd.

She came specially to examine students at Kenya's two registered centres of City and Guilds, one being Studio Intercoiffure's School of Hairdressing (and the other in Nairobi), so let's hear what she had to say:

"This is the first time the girls have sat a City and Guilds practical examination, and I am indeed impressed. In fact, the whole set-up", said she waving her arm to encompass the whole building of Studio Intercoiffure, "is compatible with the colleges in England"

During our visit the school was in the middle of the final, practical examination, and Ms Dodson had to make sure that the students work matched that of City and Guilds, England.

Practicals meant a two-day job of each girl passing in a day style, evening style, cocktail party style and fantasy.

Anne-Marie Dodson went on about the imagination that went into the fantasy, and she liked the way that clothes and costumes were in keeping with the hair-do.

As with any other international examination there is always the drudgery of theory. The inmates of Studio Intercoiffure School of Hairdressing had taken those in June, and they were sent to City and Guilds, London, to be marked. At this time too it must be known that the girls work safely, are hygienic and can handle clients.

It is only when the joint results

of the theory and the practical are passed put together that one is awarded a certificate. From now on Studio Intercoiffure School of Hairdressing will have a double intake. Each course

examination. Logically the July intake take their finals the following June.

When apprenticed to a hair-dressing business in town, the salon owner must assess the girl. The owner too is encouraged to help with training, and is not going to give the girls menial tasks. In fact the girls work on paying clients. They must also attend work regularly, and at the end of the on-the-job training period the salon proprietor must assess them.

On placement at a salon the girls are regularly monitored by the school.

Throughout we have been referring to "girls" meaning students, so let's take a cross-section and be specific as to who they are.

SHOPPING with ELAINE

will last a year, so that those commencing January will have six months in the school culminating in a theoretical examination, and six months in the field attached to a salon, followed by the practical

You get your 'O' or 'A' level school leaver, of course, but one this year already had a degree in an unrelated subject, and quite often you get the older, mature lady who has always wished she took up hairdressing in her youth but had no opportunity.

Studio Intercoiffure School of Hairdressing is now enrolling for the January 1990 intake, and, as so as to make the course thorough they limit numbers to ten only, so any aspiring hairdresser should ring now on 311257

The school itself is open to the public while the girls are learning, but only after they have reached a certain stage will they work on clients. This is only for a very nominal fee which covers costs of chemicals. Incidentally, fees at Studio Intercoiffure's School of Hairdressing are extremely low to use Anne Marie Dodson's words "minimal" compared to the U.K. colleges where they receive exactly the same training.

P.S. What a coincidence! At the time of writing we received a telephone call at home from the mother of a teenage daughter who was a model during the practicals. Both mother and daughter were enthralled, the mother telling us that she had no idea there was a hairdressing school of such a standard in Kenya, let alone in Mombasa.

This mother also added that she got such a warm welcome from owners, staff — in fact everyone in the school, and she now knows where to go for her hair!

Tribute To Business Computer Systems

A TRIBUTE to Business Computer Systems for their training programmes in the use and care of the IBM machines they sell, came from the MP for Kisauni, Said Hemed, who is also an Assistant Minister for Environment and Natural Resources.

IBM is the world leader in computers.

He was addressing 150 guests at a cocktail party at Nyali Beach Hotel before presenting "Certificates of Proficiency" to 17 students. It was also an opportunity for BCS to meet their clients, socially.

Declared the Assistant Minister "I am proud that this company is providing the up and coming Kenyan youth with facilities to be properly trained in the use of computers".

He was also pleased to note that the number of BCS technical staff had increased from three to seven indicating the growth of business for the Mombasa Branch which was not yet two years old.

He went on "as more and more computers are installed we need our own people to be able to operate, maintain and service them. We would not like to depend upon foreign manpower to come and to this work".

Therefore, I am delighted to see that Business Computer Systems is providing such comprehensive training facilities for Kenyans.

The Assistant Minister mentioned that at the beginning computers were regarded as a big threat to employment in the third world, with labour movements objecting to their introduction.

But as computers gained ground so fears were allayed as it was realised they were helping achieve greater efficiency in a much shorter space of time. Companies were able to handle a greater volume of business and expand which meant more job opportunities being created. Kenya could also not afford to lag behind the rest of the world.

"Today, declared Said Hemed "Kenya is computer conscious".

He was thanked by Ron Davey, a BSC Director.

BSC deals solely with IBM equipment which computer company is presently enjoying a 64 per cent share of the world market.

As far as Kenya is concerned Mr Davey revealed there are so far 60 IBM "mini" and "main" space frame installations in this country, the most recent being at Central Bank. In addition there were hundreds of micro installations.

Most government ministries use IBM equipment.

In an interview, he described Mombasa as a "growing market for computers".

He noted that the coast has more hotels than anywhere else in the country and that computerisation was a very popular requirement with them at the

you usually end up by having to engage more to cope with the growing volume of business".

Tanzanians Learn Up On Latest Technology On Vermin Control

A THREE day seminar on modern fumigation techniques and new products of the pest control industry has been held at the Kilimanjaro Hotel in Dar-es-salaam. The seminar, which was organised by the DSD Organisation of Germany in conjunction with their local representatives, Rentokil Tanzania and welcome Tanzania was attended by delegates from over 30 Government, public and private companies from around Tanzania.

Among the organisations that took part were the Ministry of Agriculture, various Coop unions, Marketing boards, Tanzania Railway Corporation, Tanzania Zambia Railway Authority, Air Tanzania, the Army, the FAO plus delegates from the Uganda produce and Coffee Marketing Boards.

The DDC which is one of the largest fumigant manufacturing companies in the world, sent two lecturers Joseph Billups and his assistant Stefan Burde, for the training session.

The lecturers had been to Sudan, Ethiopia and Kenya

before coming to Tanzania.

Delegates were given a practical warehouse demonstration done at a warehouse in the Port area and many fumigation techniques were elaborated upon.

These included the fumigation of export commodities in warehouses, the treatment of silos with the 'J' system invented by professor Jim Cooke, treatment of ships, aircraft, railway cars containers and also soil fumigation and the control of rodents and other burrowing animals.

Participants said at the end of the seminar that the session had helped to draw awareness to many fumigation methods not being observed and on the need to import right equipment for safe use of fumigants.

The danger of using inferior products was also noted and participants hoped that the Tanzania Pesticides Research Institute did not allow the registration of inferior products which could lead to under dosage.

SPORT EVENTS

On the sporting scene Tanzania retained the East and Central African Cricket title after romping over Malawi, Zambia and Uganda with easy six wicket victories.

The victory is the second consecutive one for Tanzania and came only a week after the country's men and women teams won the regional handball championship.

In other sports Tanzania has been faring very poorly and two titles within two weeks was a welcome sight to Tanzania.

In the cricket event the country has also got five players to represent the East African Squad in the mini world cup to be played in Holland next year.

In football, the mainland league was won by Dar young Africans with Mwanza's Pamba being runners up and Simba avoiding relegation by one point.

GUINNESS TO ASSIST ON ANTI-POACHING

"I am delighted that after the successful Operation Raleigh expedition to Kenya in 1988 — 89 they have come back with an initiative to help Kenya's National Parks.

"Generous funding by Guinness will now enable an Operation Raleigh Task Force to co-operate with the Parks in rehabilitating vehicles. These will be used in conservation campaign to ensure that Kenya's wildlife is not impaired".

Director General of "Operation Raleigh", Colonel John Blashford Snell explained that their organisation's role would be to plan, co-ordinate and manage the schemes to be tackled with Guinness Brewing.

He said "For example, the work of repairing the vehicles will be done almost entirely by a team of mechanics we shall recruit in Kenya".

Colonel Blashford-Snell said the first phase would be complete by April of next year. The first of the repaired vehicles is expected to be handed over to Dr. Leakey before Christmas.

Our Heritage of Faith...

"GOD have mercy on me a sinner"

What kind of prayer is that, one may be tempted to wonder. We find it in Jesus' parable in Luke 18:9-14:

"Two men went up to the temple to pray, one a Pharisee and the other a tax collector. The Pharisee stood up and prayed about himself: "God, I thank you that I am not like other men—robbers, evildoers, adulterers—or even like this tax collector. I fast twice a week and give a tenth of all I get."

But the tax collector stood at a distance. He would not even look up to heaven, but beat his breast and said, "God, have mercy on me, a sinner I tell you that this man rather than the other, went home justified before God. For everyone who exalts himself will be humbled, and he who humbles himself will be exalted."

Do your prayers seem to stop at the ceiling of your room? This prayer shows how prayer that gets through to God needs right attitudes of heart.

Notice how this prayer is the very opposite of the Pharisee's prayer, which was simply an expression of his pride, praising himself and despising others

before God.

The Pharisee fell into the trap, as we often do, because he made himself the judge. He measured himself against others and pronounced himself not guilty: "I'm better than them so I'm not guilty".

But which judge ever convicts himself?

The tax collector on the other hand measured himself against the ultimate holiness of God. Seeing how far he fell short "he would not even look up to heaven" and so was ready to accept God's verdict.

To pray this way the tax collector needed four things. Firstly to have a humble attitude towards God. To see his real state of sinfulness.

Secondly he regretted his indulgence in a sinful life. "he beat his breast with sorrow".

Thirdly he had faith in a God who would forgive.

Fourthly he acknowledged his personal responsibility he "owned" his sin.

The result was not a good feeling that soon disappeared, but rather he had become a man whose prayers got through, a friend of God and he "went home justified before God".

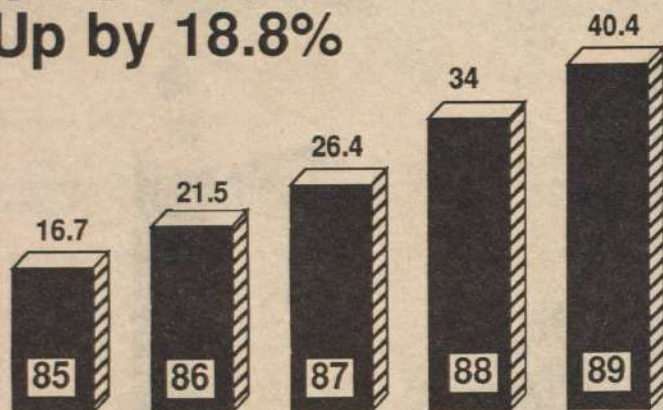

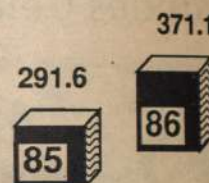

SAPHIR – der Glücksstein für September

EDELSTEIN DER SEELE und des Herbstes wird der Saphir genannt, der Glücksstein für im September Geborene, dem man nachsagt, daß er seinen Träger vor Neid und Mißgunst schützt.

In früheren Zeiten glaubte man an seine Kraft, zwischen Feinden Frieden zu stiften und seinen Besitzer vor Gefangenschaft zu bewahren. Die Singhalesen tragen den Saphir auch heute noch als Schutz gegen Zauberkräfte.

Der Name Saphir stammt aus der lateinischen Sprache und bedeutet "blau". Zu den Korund- Mineralien gehörend, werden die rosaroten, mittel- bis dunkelroten Steine Rubine genannt; in ALLEN anderen Farben gelten sie als Saphire. Es gibt sie in verschiedenen Farbönen, von rosa bis violett, gelb, hellgrün, von graublau über kornblumenblau bis tiefblau.

Die Kristallform der Saphire ist sechseckig (siehe Skizze). Mit dem Härtegrad 9 der Moh-Skala gehört der Saphir zur härtesten Mineraliengruppe nach dem Diamanten (10 Grad). Er setzt

sich zusammen aus einer Mischung von kristallisiertem Gas, Sauerstoff und Leichtmetall/Aluminium.

Der "Phantasie-Saphir" (Fancy Sapphire) ist eine weniger bekannte Art der in verschiedenen Farben vorkommenden ostafrikanischen Korund-Kristalle, die fast ausschließlich aus dem mineralreichen Tal des Umbafusses in Tanzania stammen. Blaue Saphire guter Qualität wurden kürzlich auch in Kenia

in Lodwar und Garbatulla gefunden.

Viele rosa und violette "Phantasie Saphire" aus Ostafrika verändern ihre Farbe auf unterschiedliche Weise, wenn sie vom Sonnenlicht ins künstliche Licht kommen. Die schönsten ostafrikanischen Saphire sind in Violett-schattierungen. Die "Phantasie-Saphire" haben verhältnismäßig lange gebraucht, bis ihr Wert anerkannt wurde.

Der Saphir ist einer der belieb-

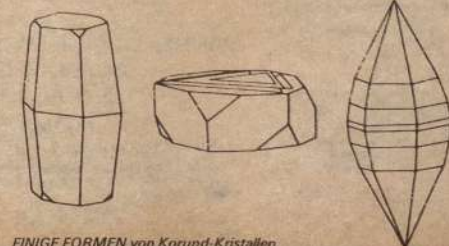
testen Edelsteine. Obwohl in Museen und in königlichen Kollektionen viele Steine von beachtlicher Größe sind, sind auf dem Markt fast nur kleine Exemplare erhältlich. Gute Saphire in reinem Blau über 5 Karat sind selten und teuer.

Die Britische Mission nach Burma entdeckte im Jahre 1929 einen Saphir von 951 Karat – wahrscheinlich der größte, der dort je gefunden worden ist.

IT'S A dhow safari with a difference and the only one to offer a unique "Floating Market" as well as "on board" entertainment which includes two traditional herbalists who hold passengers spellbound with their knowledge of plants and trees.

Jahazi Marine Limited — a one year old project by two adventurous young people — Andy and Claudia Stuart — is growing, and on October 1 will be adding a second dhow "Takidiry" to their fleet.

It was they who set up the "Floating Market" — the only one at the coast. It is run by the villagers themselves. Such has been its success that the market is now three times its original size. A second dhow will boost business considerably.

The safari on the dhow Husna is more extensive than any other giving passengers a glimpse of historic, modern and rural Mombasa as she sails along the

Kilindini Channel to Mombasa's Old Port then up the beautiful Tudor Creek passing mangrove forests to the "Floating Market" at Maugunja. Here villagers

offer a variety of handicrafts including clay pots, colourful mats and baskets, jewellery (including some from Bombolulu the first workshop for the physically handicapped at the coast) as well as colourful khangas and kikoi, also wood-carvings, spices and tea.

Villagers have enthusiastically

welcomed this "Floating Market" for it is helping uplift living standards, for their subsistence livelihood was mostly derived from fishing, and a little farming.

The 300 inhabitants are of the Wa Jomvu tribe, most of whom are Muslims. Many turn out to greet the Husna including traditional dancers and fishermen in their decorated canoes.

On arriving, passengers are garlanded with Miangi-Langi a bright yellow flower and welcomed by the Village Headman, Mzee Fakhi.

They disembark on to the "Floating market" which is fully decorated and bursting with all kinds of goodies, giving it a "Suk" like air.

There are also women demonstrating the art of grinding and pounding maize.

Throughout their stay at Maugunja traditional dancers and acrobats entertain on shore, while on board one of the villagers girls demonstrates the many ways of wearing a colourful Khanga. (Obviously the men were too shy to model kikoi's!)

In the last century small Arabian dhows used to call at Maugunja taking villagers to Mombasa's Old Port in exchange for food and water.

It gave them the opportunity of marketing the clay pots and mats they made.

Because of the lack of job opportunities and being so cut off, young people are moving away to live and work in Mombasa. Many are now involved in the "Floating Market".

During the day-long dhow safari there is an interval for lunch ashore. This is at one of Mombasa's top seafood restaurants, the "Harlequin", situated in an elevated position overlooking Tudor Creek.

SEAFOOD PLATTER

For "Starters" there is avocado with a sharp tangy vinaigrette sauce followed by a huge and attractively presented Seafood Platter which includes oysters baked in grated coconut, prawns (masala and piri piri), grilled lobster with garlic and lemon, deep Fried calamari, gratinated crab meat and several tasty sauce dips.

This is followed by a fresh fruit salad and Kenya coffee.

For those who do not like seafood there is steak, as well as some tasty cuisine for vegetarians.

When the journey resumes to the "Floating Market" in the afternoon (it takes about 45 minutes to cover the eight miles) one of the traditional herbalists on board "Doctor" Kibuyu Kifupi, adorned in skins, feathers and beads, makes a dramatic entrance by springing out from under a blanket blowing a horn.

The Husna is attractively decorated with branches of trees and while relaxing on cushioned seats passengers are introduced to a host of locally grown vegetables and fruits, as well as

plants and trees with medicinal properties by "Doctors" Fakhi and Panga. They speak Swahili which is translated into English and German by Husna's versatile crew.

When explaining the uses of coconut passengers are told "if you use its oil, you will have a brown skin just like me".

Some of the plants were used to enhance sexual performance to improve fertility, while others had healing powers and could kill pain. They heard that one can make your skin "white and cute" and were shown a traditional tooth brush which not only helps keep teeth white but cures gums that bleed.

On the return journey the two "Doctors" joined the Village Band which entertained throughout ending with everyone joining in a Conga Line and dancing around the deck.

SULTAN'S HOUSE

The Husna operates daily with the exception of Sundays and passengers from the North can embark at the Outrigger Inn and those from the south at Pelelea, a former Sultan's residence.

The dhow safari ends at Harlequin Restaurant.

Andy Stuart has been in Kenya for 17 years and is a builder by trade. He first came to Kenya when he was 11 years old.

His father, David Stuart, was born in Mombasa around 1914 and worked in Europe as an Orthopaedic Surgeon then working in Zambia. He returned to Kenya 17 years ago and continues to work in the country.

Andy's grandfather came to Kenya around 1914 and was a gold mine near Kakamega. He was declared a "Declarant" and "Declarated" Andy "did not do much there".

Mombasa has a history going back some 2,000 years and was once the capital of Kenya. The famous explorer Vasco da Gama called here in 1498.

Guarding its Old Town is the 396 year old Fort Jesus built by Portuguese in 1593, the site of many a bloody battle in which changed hands many times.

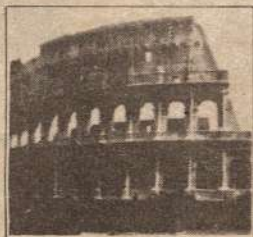
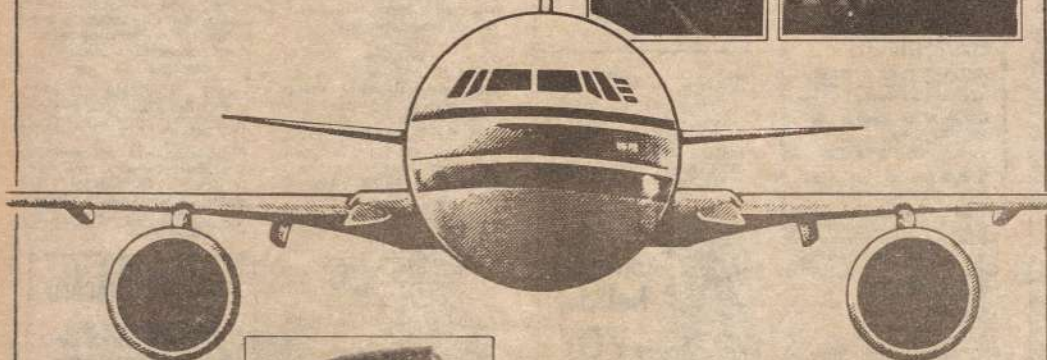
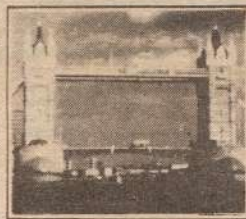
It is now a museum containing many well preserved artefacts from coastal sites, the main culture of the Old Town. Relics from the Portuguese include Santo Antonio de Lamea, which sank just outside Fort Jesus over 300 years ago.

Dhows from Arabia are an integral part of the history of the East African Coast along which they used to sail to exchange goods including exotic Arab chests, Persian carpets, also dried. This goes back over 2,000 years. Such was the popularity of Mombasa at one time that during one season alone 400 dhows from the Middle East and India were anchored in Old Harbour. Traditional dhows continue to be built in Lamu.

The Husna is also available for hire on Sundays, offering a wonderful opportunity for clubs to have a very special day out together.

Those 'Mkokotenis' On Nyali Bridge ...

A COMMON sight now that the new market is open is the mkokotenis that ply the Nyali bridge especially in the morning.

I was talking to Kachumbari the other day and asked what his opinion was now that the market had been open for some time.

He told me that he could sum up in one word - impressive.

When the market opened, the Municipal Council put their own askaris to guide vehicles and generally control traffic coming into and going out of the market approach roads.

The traffic rules that were set applied to all modes of carriage, even bicycles had to obey the white clothed askaris.

That discipline has stayed and although a perfect nuisance for those that have to drive along the Kongwea approach road, the mkokotenis stick to the right hand lane and also hug the kerb.

Most of the people who drive along that road have come to accept it as a necessary evil and drive with due care and attention when they reach that portion of road.

The same cannot be said for the Nyali bridge users.

Some of the users come from as far afield as Lamu and they are not quite used to the idea of sharing a main road with mkokotenis.

I am however sure that they must know what to do about donkeys.

The problem that faces the bridge users is that as they come out of the toll station the road narrows from three lanes to two lanes.

There is enough of a problem with cars trying to crowd each other. It is made worse by the fact that one has mkokotenis to contend with as well.

Quite a few accidents occur in the early morning when some drivers who haven't fully woken up try and overtake and then come up against a slow moving mkokoteni laden with all manner of produce ranging from the ubiquitous potato to the under-estimated okra.

The first vehicle has to slow down rather rapidly.

As Murphy's Law would have it, there is always a second vehicle and this one usually ends up giving the rear end of the first vehicle a very close inspection since they always seem to assume that the road ahead is clear.

Kachumbari told me that he

had studied the problem for some time and the simplest solution which would not cost very much would be to remove one post from the end of the cyclists lane on the bridge.

This would mean that the mkokotenis could use the cyclists lane all the way down the bridge and then turn off onto the little used access road beside the bridge.

They would be able to use it in both directions - to and from the market.

This would avoid them coming into the main stream of traffic when fully laden and would

reduce the sudden upsurge in the sale of motor vehicle bumpers and tail lights.

I fully agree and hope that someone with the will to save does something about it.

Talking of close encounters, that which happened recently in the middle town takes first place among the encounters that Kachumbari has seen this year.

A land rover came onto the roundabout at the top of Nkrumah Avenue.

As it started going round, a matatu also decided to join in the race round the circle but at the wrong time.

The driver of the land rover had no warning of the matatu's intention and was caught completely by surprise.

He realized too late that a crash was inevitable but tried his best to avoid the matatu.

This however made matters worse. The land rover went up on two wheels and ended up on its roof crushing some of its occupants.

In the process the matatu was also stopped in its tracks by the now stationary land rover.

This encounter was fatal and I believe suitably illustrates the boy scouts motto "Be Prepared".

Defensive driving is difficult at most times but a small application of it could save lives.

As Kachumbari says, que sera sera!
