Now Gennarino is a real cripple - his leg was amputated because of the burns he suffered when the Comandante set fire to his father's garage. The sight of the kid is pitiful and it makes Betti think, convincing him to continue his war against the Mafia.

'Cruise Seminar' Leads To New Ideas On Tour Traffic

THE two day Seminar on Cruise Ship Tourism ended at Mombasa's Bandari College on Tuesday with all 53 high powered participants agreeing to help with the development and promotion of this important sector of Kenya's tourist industry which, hitherto, has been neglected.

Among its nine recommendations to the Ministry of Tourism is the establishment, on a permanent basis, of a Committee for the purpose of facilitating services and supplies to cruise ships at the Port of Mombasa.

This Facilitation Committee, under the chairmanship of the Managing Director of the Kenya Ports Authority, will be based in Mombasa and have its first meeting in November.

It was proposed that members should include the Commissioner for Customs, Director of Tourism, Principal Immigration Officer, Chief Public Health Officer, Mombasa's Town Clerk, Chairman of Mombasa District Security Committee, Mombasa Shipping Agents Association, Mombasa and Coast Tourist Association and KATO, also Exchange Control, Central Bank, Mombasa, Kenya Airways, KPTC, Coast and Michael Dunford.

Another recommendation was the KPA, in conjunction with MCTA and Department of Tourism should work on the production of a special brochure to promote the Port of Mombasa for cruise ships.

It also recommended that a follow-up Seminar on Cruise Ship Tourism be convened in a year's time to review the progress made.

The general cleanliness of the town was also discussed resulting in a recommendation calling upon the Mombasa Municipal Council to provide adequate and reliable services to ensure the cleanliness of the town, as well as the provision of street lighting from the Port.

MINISTER NGALA

Another recommendation was for KPA to look seriously into the possibility of dedicating, preparing and providing the relevant services for Berths one and two for berthing visiting cruise ships and to undertake necessary improvements to the Old Port with a view to berthing the smaller home-based cruise ships there.

The seminar — the first to take place on Cruise Ship Tourism — was officially opened by the Minister for Tourism and Wildlife, Mr Noah Katana Ngala, chaired by the Director of Tourism, David Musila and hosted by Kenya Ports Authority.

Particularly delighted at the organisation and outcome of such a high powered seminar was Michael Dunford from Nairobi who, after several years, is seeing positive results from his vision, and many representations, concerning the development of cruise ship tourism for Kenya.

It was MCTA, concerned about the dwindling number of cruise ships calling at Mombasa which set up a sub-committee to investigate and make recommendations to the authorities concerned, Michael Dunford, with his great knowledge of the cruise ship industry, was co-opted on to it and has been giving enormous help.

During discussions at the seminar mention was made of a survey undertaken several years ago in which it was considered that the cruise ship potential in the Indian Ocean triangle was far greater than that of the Caribbean.

The Director of Tourism, Mr D. Musila, in his closing remarks said how very impressed his Ministry had been by the attendance and the presence of many senior officers.

On behalf of his Ministry he paid tribute to all who had attended which, he said, indicated

how important they considered this issue to be. He also paid tribute to the Managing Director of KPA, Mr P. Okundi for "providing such excellent facilities and for his personal involvement in it".

Declared Mr Musila "with the co-operation you have shown at this seminar I anticipate that

Mr D. Miller, from the Office of the President, speaking on behalf of participants asked the chairman to convey to his Minister the appreciation of everyone for convening such a meaningful seminar.

Mr Musila was also thanked for his very able chairmanship. Said Mr Miller "you have shown

In a special word of thanks to Philip Okundi he said "we very much appreciate the time you have spent with us and you

have shown by your remarks how dedicated you are in trying to see that Kenya gets a far greater share of cruise ship tourism".

Seminar participants came from the Ministries of Tourism and Wildlife and Health, Offices of the President and Vice President and Ministry of Finance, Kenya Association of Hotel-keepers and Caterers, Mombasa and Coast Tourist Association KPA, Immigration and Customs Departments, Police HQ Nairobi, Mombasa and Port, Kenya Utalii College, Central Bank of Kenya, Mombasa Municipal Council, tour operators and shipping companies.

'Mombasa Could Play A Pivotal Role'

THE Minister for Tourism and Wildlife, Mr Noah Katana Ngala, in declaring the first seminar on Cruise Ship Tourism formally open said "it is considered that Mombasa has the potential to play a pivotal role in cruise ship tourism in the Indian Ocean region," writes Neta Peal.

"But" he warned "this is only possible if Kenya takes an interest in this sector of the industry".

Declared the Minister "and why shouldn't we, for it will give a big boost to trade and Kenya's foreign exchange earnings from which many wananchi stand to benefit".

He went on "I am informed that according to current global estimates about four million tourists are likely to take a cruise vacation in 1990. Therefore, Kenya should now be poised to take full advantage of this lucrative tourism market".

Said the Minister "it is, therefore, my earnest hope that this seminar will see the beginning of a new chapter in the development of Cruise Ship Tourism to Kenya".

He noted that while Kenya tourist industry had performed extremely well, particularly over the last ten years during which

the number of visitors had doubled to nearly 700,000, there was no room for complacency".

Said the Minister "we must respond not only to the increasing competition in the tourism market by developing countries, but also to the need to identify and develop other tourism products in order to avert stagnation in the further growth of this very important industry".

Adding "the prospects of a backslide would of course be of very grave consequence, and the possibility of such an eventuality must therefore persuade all concerned to make a more concerted effort in the expansion and fortification of the base of our tourist industry".

INITIATIVES

Said the Minister "it is against this background that my Ministry has taken the initiative in organising this seminar to focus, for a start on the promotion of cruise ship tourism.

The seminar would also serve the useful purpose of enlightening all concerned on its importance".

The Minister noted that Kenya as a tourist destination is rightly famous for its game parks and beautiful beaches with the bulk

of visitors coming for beach and safari holidays. Consequently, he said "there has been a tendency to neglect the development and promotion of other tourist attractions including big game fishing, mountaineering and cruise ship tourism".

Referring to the latter he said "let me bring to your notice that recent studies reveal evidence to the effect that Mombasa is currently not a popular Port for cruise passengers and cruise operators. It has been suggested that more effort needs to be made by all concerned to correct this situation and for such ships to receive a friendly welcome".

During the seminar Mr A.A. Shah, from the office of the Vice President and Ministry of Finance, presented a paper.

It revealed that government will consider providing support to the development of Cruise Ship tourism by:

- facilitating immigration and customs clearance on board with the co-operation of cruise shipping lines
- organising duty free shopping facilities at the Port
- reviewing Visa requirements for crews and passengers for short stays
- encouraging private supplies and services to meet the needs of the visitors and, possibly, ensuring quality of such services.

It was also mentioned that "already steps are being taken by government to publish a legal notice soon exempting consumption of liquor from the customs duty and sales tax on board cruise ships".

The paper referred to the declining economic growth rate, rising inflation and depreciation of the Kenya shilling making it necessary to make some adjustments.

"The role of tourism" it was considered, "is set to increase and cruise ship tourism is expected to play a major part".

It was the contention of Michael Dunford, that the many problems facing cruise ship tourism in Kenya were the result of people's ignorance on what visiting cruise ships mean to the country.

During his discourse on "What is a Cruise Ship" he revealed that a new concept in cruises was the smaller luxury ship. He revealed that a Norwegian company is building eight new ships, one of which will be home-based in Mombasa from December 1, 1990.

Mr Dunford considered that the Old Port might be more suited to the berthing of the smaller cruise ship, rather than at the more commercial Kilindini Harbour.

He also revealed that six large cruise ships are expected to call

at Mombasa between February and December 1990.

Speaking on the challenges of the cruise ship industry, the Managing Director of Kenya Ports Authority, Philip Okundi, considered that the Indian Ocean and its archipelagos will become more attractive to cruise ships as the Caribbean becomes more overcrowded.

In this regard, he said, "proposals have already been made to home-base some ships in Mombasa for a period of five or more months".

He revealed that in recognition of the need for berths for cruise ships, KPA is looking into embarking Berths one and two for re-organisation so as to more efficiently handle cruise ships. It is also looking into the berthing of a smaller cruise ships at the Old Port to encourage the home-coming of such vessels which would attract conferences etc to Mombasa. An engineering study for this purpose is planned.

In presenting a paper entitled "Cruise Ship Tourism — a new element in Kenya's Tourism Industry", the Director of Tourism, David Musila, told participants that the object of his paper "is to ask you to seriously explore the possibilities of Kenya entering into the Cruise Tourism market as a new element in our tourism resource".

According to Asta news magazine, he said "the fastest growing holiday option in the tourist industry today is the "Cruise and Fly/Cruise holiday".

He considered that as far as Kenya is concerned new innovations are needed. Giving his reasons Mr Musila explained that "tourist arrivals to Kenya shot up in 1984 by 40 per cent from 1983 and since then the volume of visitors had risen

from 333,000 tourists a year to 677,000 in 1988 — the highest ever recorded.

This increase, he said "shows a sign of healthy growth between 1982/88 against the 1977/82 period. However, the last three years of 1986/88 show that the growth rate has declined from 36 per cent to 10 per cent. As well, Kenya still continues to suffer from a seasonality problem with a very low season period at certain times of the year.

He further revealed that "bed occupancy rates had decreased from 54 per cent in 1986 to 53.1 per cent in 1988. One could argue, he said "that this was mainly due to the increase of bed capacity within the intervening period. Yet the country's tourism is still suffering from over-concentration of tourist traffic in certain areas such as the Maasai Mara, and this is likely to create congestion that is incompatible with the land use patterns in these areas".

"At the same time tourist earnings having surpassed those of coffee or tea is still debatable whether this has not come about as a result of falling consumer goods prices and the falling value of the Kenyan shilling against major world currencies."

Mr Musila then referred to comments made by the President of Cruise Lines International Association, James G. Godson, who opined "the potential for unprecedented growth in the cruise industry is the most significant among all the 1988 events taking place within the cruise business world that have made the industry the busiest and most exciting of all segments of the travel business".

It is understood that cruise sales of 60 billion US dollars per year are foreseeable with more than 30 million Americans interested in taking cruises.

Engineers Set To Repair Pontoon Serving Magogoni Creek Crossing

FOLLOWING ANOTHER TRAGIC ACCIDENT last month at the Magogoni Creek in Dar, in which about ten people died. A team of engineers is now repairing an old pontoon "M.V. Usiwe Kupe" at a cost of over 80 million shillings. President Mwinyi who paid a personal visit last week to see progress made, expressed satisfaction at the rate of work progressing and called on the task force supervising the work to expedite repairs.

The required pontoon is expected to be a stop-gap measure in solving the plight of Kigamboni residents who have been bedevilled with lack of adequate transport facilities over the creek for almost three years now — that is since the

controversial iniflote pontoon broke down.

While the long term measure is to build a tunnel across the creek and to otherwise have two boats operating at any one time, the question that Kigamboni residents are asking is that how long will it take before they actually have good transport ion across the creek.

President Hassan Mwinyi has personally intervened in the issue by seeking external assistance to obtain surveyors to assess the possibility of building the tunnel and to determine costs.

He has also formed a special task force to supervise repair to the "MV Kupe" pontoon.

Residents are now wondering if the repaired pontoon will sustain the seas for long.

They are also questioning why the repair work to the old pontoon was not done earlier if the pontoon was deemed repairable.

Last month's accident is the second fatal one to occur at the Creek in a span of five months. In March this year nine people died when a boat in which they were crossing in was drowned due to overloading.

Presently in the Amgeco dry dock, undergoing major repairs, is the livestock carrier *Charolais Express*. An old lady as far as ships are concerned, having been built in 1962 and originally christened the *Marie Therese Le Borgne* which she kept until 1972. She bears her age well, and is in remarkably good condition.

I was at the Nairobi Kindergarten when she was built. *Charolais Express* is expected out of the dock on the 11th.

The other vessel presently having major surgery at Amgeco, although not in the basin, is the Tanzania Coastal Shipping Lines *Lindi* she was built in 1974 and launched as the *Norad* changing name to the *Mwenge* becoming *Lindi* in 1975.

An odd looking vessel. Her bow, which lifts up to expose the bow ramp, has been removed and is ashore, being completely refabricated, rightly so too judging the state of it.

Amgeco will be kept very busy for some time, because more patients are lining up such as the *Antares Prima Antares*, *Seconda* both stern trawlers built at Viareggio in 1985 and 1986 respectively.

The 15134 DWT *Sila* duly

arrived and is busy discharging bagged fertilizer at No 4, although she is scheduled to haul astern to No 3, making way for the arrival of the ro-ro vessel *Cape Henry* belonging to the Transport Division of the USA Government.

She's 228.51 metres overall with angled stern door and ramp.

Jalajoyti of the Scindia Steam Navigation Co, will be arriving on the eighth to discharge 2500 tonnes gunnies for Uganda. *Jalajoyti*, I understand means to "put the light on" in Hindi.

The *Reliance* is scheduled to arrive on the 11th to discharge 5500 tonnes wheat for Uganda, then will load 5800 tonnes flour-spar destined for the Continent. Nice round-trip.

Due to its discharge 10000 tonnes bagged sugar for the local market will be the *Osman*.

91 Tata vehicles plus some containerized cargo will be arriving aboard the *Jurina* which will then load a number of Teu's for her outward leg.

Another of the Stolt chemical tankers due. This time the *Stolt Excellence* on the seventh, with luboil on account of Caltex followed on the eighth, by the arrival of the *Calluna* with Avgas and chemicals for both Shell and Caltex.

More railway wagon's for Uganda, with 25 plus other cargo scheduled on board the Eurafrica Lines vessel *Paola*.

18,000 tonnes of coal for B.P.C. Company will shortly be arriving aboard the Vernicos Maritime's, the 19106 DWT *Everhope*, she's coming up to her 21st birthday, having been launched in 1969.

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'Kilimanjaro Safari' Improve Roads In Amboseli Reserve

AN "Harambee" effort by several lodges in Amboseli National Park has resulted in the Park's roads becoming operational again to help improve bad roads.

In an interview at the Aero Show, Mr Rajni Desai, managing Director of Kilimanjaro Safari Club (the sponsors of the Aero Show) revealed that KSC lodges, Serena and Kilimanjaro Buffalo (the latter being just outside the park) had raised around Shs 300,000/- to make operational a grader which had not been functioning in Amboseli for about four years due to the lack of spares.

For a number of years the upkeep of roads in Amboseli had been neglected. Recent heavy rains had made certain sections virtually impassable.

As a result the Manager of the two KSC units there was spending more time towing vehicles out of the mud than on his normal duties. Their two tractors were kept fully engaged.

The grader was now at work on bad sections of roads.

Mr Desai also mentioned how heartening it was to see that even before the Kenya Wildlife Service becomes operational, developments are taking place. These included a new landrover for the game warden at Amboseli, with more on their way. In due course, he would also be receiving an aircraft for use in surveying the park as was done in older days.

Declared Mr Desai "I am exceedingly heartened by the general activity taking place to conserve wildlife".

As far as poaching is concerned, Mr Desai said "we have not heard of a single incident in Amboseli for some time". A dead elephant was found a little while ago but the cause of death was not immediately known. An attempt was made to capture her baby and take it to Daphne Sheldrick. Unfortunately, it could not fit the Toyota Land Cruiser. However, there was a happy ending, with the baby elephant being adopted by another herd and going off with them.

A lot of money is presently being spent by KSC on general improvements to their two units in Amboseli National Park (Amboseli and Kilimanjaro Safari lodges) which include new reception areas, entrances and car parks. Each are also being given attractive ponds with wooden bridges over them.

Kimana lodge, just outside Amboseli Park and the nearest to Mount Kilimanjaro, is enjoying increasing occupancy while

among the nightly visitors at its popular waterhole is a leopard.

Mr Desai then spoke of the nearby swamp area which is beautiful and has a large variety of wildlife, with the exception of rhino. He said that ornithologists are amazed at the tremendous number of birds to be seen there.

He intends approaching the Director of Wildlife to see if there is any possibility of the area becoming a small national park or game reserve.

As far as the KSC group is concerned, Mr Desai reported that it had enjoyed a better occupancy than the previous year.

Sheldrick's Blind at Nihalaka on the slopes of the Yatta Plateau is expected to open in October.

The late David Sheldrick built it in 1972 at the time he was warden of Tsavo East National Park from 1948-1978.

It is being restored by KSC as a living memorial to one of Kenya's greatest conservationists. The view from the Blind over Kitui District is absolutely breathtaking.

Daniel Takes On 'Ultimate Challenge'

MOMBASA born Daniel Haller, describes windsurfing across the green-blue Lake Turkana (Jade Sea) — rich in fish, bird life and photogenic scenery — as an "ultimate challenge".

He is planning to meet it on January 20, 1990, and will be the first to cross the lake by this method.

Daniel hopes to complete the 60 km return journey from Loyangalani to the West Shore, with a stop at South Island, in about four hours.

Sponsors are being sought not only to finance this daring event, but also a tree planting

Championships at Nyali Beach Hotel.

He also won the Scottish Universities windsurfing title and is hoping to win the British Students windsurfing event which will give him a chance of competing in the World Championships in Israel next year. The

qualifying event for this takes place in Plymouth, UK during October.

In windsurfing across Lake Turkana, Daniel will be faced by many hazards. They include a "guaranteed" wind for only about four hours a day, while the lake is said to hold the largest colonies of hippo, Nile perch of up to 500 lbs, tiger fish and turtles.

The water is brackish and "slippery" — making it easy to slide off the board.

Hot winds blow down on the lake from the surrounding hills at incredible speeds turning it into an angry foaming sea.

Said Daniel "there is either no wind, or one blowing at Force 7/8".

For him the big attraction is the incredible speeds which can be obtained with these winds.

His equipment will include an "unsinkable" board, also a larger one to handle the big waves and strong wind, a range of sails, sun-blocks to protect exposed skin and he is looking for a special Wet Suit which will reduce dehydration, as well as a hat which will stay on his head.

Several support boats will be accompanying him, and Daniel is hoping that among them might be some Zodiacs.

He is the son of Rene Haller, a Swiss Agronomist, who transformed an ugly derelict limestone quarry at Bamburi Portland Cement Company into a man-made Garden of Eden. Mombasa's Nature Trail has been acclaimed by conservationists worldwide.

The tree-planting project is the brainchild of Rene Haller with the enthusiastic support of his son.

Daniel has just returned to Stirling University, Scotland, to finish studying for Degrees in Biology and Economics. He then aims to go on for an MSc in Agriculture (fish farming).

All indications are that he is following in the footsteps of his dad, for the Nature Trail with some 750,000 trees, also includes a fish farm producing around 220 Kgs of tilapia a day.

The tree planting project aims to achieve a reduction in desertification by planting a nucleus of trees and in so doing help the inhabitants of the region to realise the importance of trees to their survival.

It is hoped that the project will serve to trigger off many more of a similar nature.

'GREEN DESERTS'

According to the magazine "Green Deserts" — "the selective planting of trees helps to remove desertification by protecting the soil from erosion, improving the local climate and providing for peoples needs".

Said Daniel "the aim is not to do a Green Bell kind of a thing where you plant a forest. In the Turkana Project, trees will only be planted in special areas where there are people".

He revealed that a few had already gone in near the Mission Station at North Horr.

Said Daniel "the cost of this windsurfing expedition is quite outrageous, but we feel it might capture the imagination of millions of people all over the world who might also wish to help this tree-planting project".

Thomas Sollacher To Open A New Diving School At 'Golden Beach'

JUST opened at Golden Beach Hotel is a diving school run by the well-known master diver, Thomas Sollacher.

It is his brother, Peter, who runs the Sollacher Water Sports Centre there.

Both Thomas and Peter have on several occasions been Kenya's windsurfing champions, Peter being the present holder of the title. He is in Europe at the moment competing in the Windsurfing World Cup series taking place in Sylt and Scheveningen, Germany.

On several occasions Thomas has also been in this world cup series.

The new diving school - Diani Marine Limited - is situated on the beach and has the latest Mares diving equipment which will be changed annually, including regulators and masks.

From the school it is possible to obtain an internationally valid VII diving certificate the minimum requirement being three swimming pool and three theory lessons, also three open water dives. It usually takes about four to five days to obtain.

Said Thomas, "Diani Marine Limited has also the fastest and best equipped diving boats on the Kenya Coast, enabling divers to reach diving areas in about one-third of the time it takes other boats".

There are seven to eight different diving areas to explore and three times a week there are day long excursions to Chale Island which has some fantastic diving spots, also a restaurant offering BBQ meat and seafood.

Said Thomas "we are hoping Chale Island might become a marine park soon".

EQUIPMENT

It is also a fantastic place for snorkelling for which equipment is readily available on their boats.

Departure is from the hotel beach so no road transport is involved for guests staying there.

Thomas says that the best time for diving is from the middle of October until mid-March. They have two assistant diving instructors whom they trained themselves. Diving groups are limited to five per instructor.

Said Thomas "everything is

run at a high level of safety and such is our success that we are totally fully booked".

The Sollacher Water Sports Centre which is run by Peter offers equipment for beginners to professional board sailors.

From the hotel one can windsurf throughout the year. Said Thomas "it is also one of the best places in the world for those wishing to train for international competitions, including the Olympics".

The Sollacher Brothers are now planning to hold a Windsurfing Regatta at Golden Beach Hotel.

Jahazi Maritime Limited, das Projekt zweier unternehmungslustiger junger Leute – Andy und Claudia Stuart – ist gerade ein Jahr alt geworden und hat sich so gut entwickelt, daß am 1. Oktober die zweite Dau "Taktidry" zum Einsatz kommen soll.

Sie sind auch die Begründer des "schwimmenden Marktes", der von den Dorfbewohnern selbst aufgezogen wird. Dieser Markt ist so erfolgreich, daß er schon dreimal so groß ist wie am Anfang. Eine zweite Dau wird die Geschäfte weiter beleben.

Die Safari auf der Dau "Husna" ist ausführlicher als alle anderen Bootsausflüge und bietet den Passagieren aus einer ganz neuen Perspektive einen Einblick in das historische, moderne und ländliche Mombasa während der Fahrt entlang dem Kilindini-Kanal zum Alten Hafen, dann den wunderschönen Tudor Creek hinauf, an den Mangrovenwäldern vorbei bis zum "schwimmenden Markt" in Maugunja.

Bei der Ankunft werden die Passagiere mit einer Girlande aus Mlangi-Langi, leuchtendgelben Blumen, geschmückt und vom Dorfältesten Mzee Faki willkommen geheißen. Sie verlassen die Dau und begeben sich zum "schwimmenden Markt", der reich dekoriert ist und viele Schätze feilbietet.

Einige Frauen zeigen, wie sie auf traditionelle Art Mais mahlen und stampfen.

Während des Aufenthaltes in Maugunja gibt es am Ufer Vorführung von Stammestänzen und Akrobaten. An Bord der Dau zeigt ein Dorfmadchen die vielen Arten, wie man einen Khanga tragen kann. (Offenbar sind die Männer zu schüchtern, um vorzuführen, wie man einen Kikoi trägt?)

Im vorigen Jahrhundert kamen kleine arabische Daus nach Maugunja, um die Dorfbewohner gegen Lebensmittel und Trinkwasser zum Alten Hafen zu fahren. Auf diese Weise konnten sie in kleinem Rahmen mit ihren Tontöpfen und geflochtenen Matten Handel treiben.

Da es an diesem abgelegenen Ort an Arbeitsplätzen fehlt, ziehen die jungen Leute weg, um in Mombasa zu leben und zu arbeiten. Durch den "schwimmenden Markt" haben viele eine neue Existenz gefunden.

HARLEQUIN

Während der Dau-Safari, die den ganzen Tag dauert, gibt es eine Mittagspause an Land, und zwar im "Harlequin", dem bekannten Fischrestaurant in erhöhter Lage mit Ausblick über den Tudor Creek.

Als Vorspeise gibt es Avocado mit einer feinen Vinaigrette Sauce, gefolgt von einem riesigen, appetitlich präsentierten Meeresschnecken-Teller, bestehend aus mit Kokosnuß überbackenen

Austern, Garnelen Masala und Piri Piri, gegrilltem Hummer mit Knoblauch und Zitrone, gebackenem Tintenfisch, gratiniertem Krebsfleisch und verschiedenen Saucen.

hafte vegetarische Gerichte erhältlich.

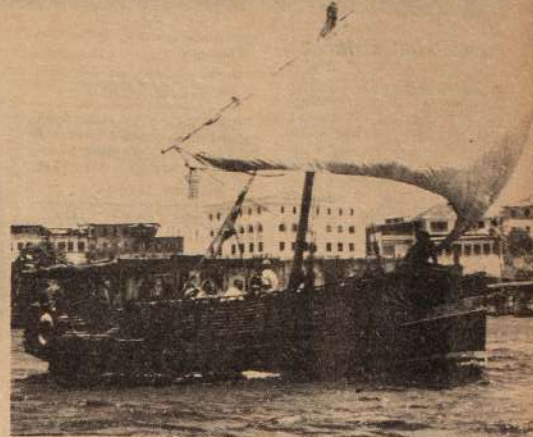

Mombasa kann auf eine 2000 jährige Geschichte zurückblicken und war lange Zeit die Landeshauptstadt von Kenia. Der berühmte Seefahrer Vasco da Gama ging hier 1498 vor Anker.

Hoch über der Altstadt und dem Alten Hafen wacht das 1593 von den Portugiesen erbaut wurde. Es war der Schauplatz vieler blutiger Kämpfe und wechselte im Laufe der Jahrhunderte mehrmals den Besitzer.

Heute ist es ein Museum, in dem viele interessante Gegenstände ausgestellt sind, Funde von historischen Stätten an der Küste, Kulturgegenstände aus der Altstadt von Mombasa und Relikte von der portugiesischen Herrschaft Santo Antonio de Tanna, die vor mehr als dreihundert Jahren vor dem Fort Jesus gesunken ist.

Daus aus Arabien haben schon immer eine wichtige Rolle in der Geschichte Ostafrikas gespielt; sie segelten der Küste entlang, um Güter zu tauschen, exotische arabische Truhen, Perserteppiche, getrocknete Haifische.

Der Alte Hafis von Mombasa war so gut besucht, daß in einer Saison mehr als vierhundert Daus aus dem Mittleren Osten und Indien dort verankert waren. Traditionelle Daus werden heute noch in Lamu gebaut.

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THREE OF the seven Little Sisters of the Poor who give loving care to 67 golden-agers at Nyumba ya Wazee, Tudor. They are Sister Anthony, Mother Superior (Sister Anselme) and Sister Mary.

URGENTLY needed at Nyumba ya Wazee, Tudor, are 16 wash basins, as well as some small tables, writes NETA PEAL.

The home, which is presently giving loving care to 67 old and destitute people (average age being 75) is extending and soon will be able to offer accommodation to nine more golden-agers, while all rooms (with colourful matching bedspread and curtains) are having wash-basins installed.

New communal "loos" have also gone in.

It is run by seven Little Sisters of the Poor and relies completely on charity to keep going.

It is a "home" in the true sense of the word with a "family atmosphere" and everyone being well cared for and loved.

All are good at handicrafts and with a little expert tuition from the Sisters produce a fantastic array of items to sell for Christmas including some most

appealing Humpty-Dumpties.

The home has a physiotherapy room, and taking pride of place is the Exercise Bike presented to them by students of Loreto Convent who had raised the money themselves by selling old newspapers.

Very popular are their singing lessons which has led to a choir being formed.

RESIDENTS

The age range of residents is between 65 to 100 years. All who can help with the chores including preparing vegetables and laying tables for meals.

Annually, they are the VIP guests of Jackie and Monique

Wainwiller at Le Pichet Restaurant, Mt. Wapa, enjoying a four course lunch and an afternoon full of fun and entertainment including a variety of traditional dance and a magician.

Kenya Bus Service provides the transport, and the outing is eagerly looked forward to for it is the only restaurant to give them such a treat. Before departing all 43 received a parcel containing sweets, cakes and biscuits.

On sale at Le Pichet are some of the Humpty Dumpties they make, the proceeds of which go towards the upkeep of the home.

Word about this fine home for old and destitute people has spread far and wide and one 75 year old man was so determined to become a resident that he walked the 70 miles from Malindi.

It took five days and he was absolutely exhausted on arrival. Despite being given every care and attention he never recovered strength and later died.

Found outside the gate of the Home one morning was an old man who had been begging on the streets of Mombasa. He could not walk and his only possession was a little stool on which to sit. He had been given a lift to Nyumba ya Wazee. Although the home was full up, a place was found for him.

Said Mother Superior "we do get some beggars, but usually when they are well again they do not stay".

She went on "Old people are coming here all the time asking if we have a place for them. With a waiting list of 25 we have to say "no". That is why we are extending so that we can take nine more".

Sometimes Nyumba ya Wazee take men who have been working for many years at Mackinnon Market, and have become too old to continue carrying heavy sacks of fruit and vegetables. Said the Mother Superior "they ask if we can take them and as the market is so good to us, we do".

Since the home first opened, many stallholders have been helping in a very big way. Said Mother Superior "we go to the market, and on leaving find our vehicle full of fruit and vegetables. They see our car and without telling us just put produce in it. They are very kind and wonderful people who think of others less fortunate than themselves".

The home receives support

from people of all religions, but mostly Asian community. Christmas family anniversaries, Hindu and Hindus provide a dinner.

Said Mother Superior local community is very good to us for that is what they give us. We just keep it up for the home and completely on their continuing support for which everyone is sincerely grateful".

She also paid visits to visit residents who are sick, and undertake free, while hospital bills are looked after by public spirited persons.

The Little Sisters of the Poor is an Order started 170 years ago in France by Jeanne de Chantal. Its main purpose was to run a home for old and destitute people over 60 years of age.

Such has been the increasing need for this very much needed service that there are now 350 homes all over the world including one in Nairobi.

The first home started by the Little Sisters in Kenya was in Mombasa in 1965 when they had a small house just off the then Kilindini Road with accommodation for only ten people. It was their dream to have a decent place in which to care for Mombasa's old and destitute people, for which there is an increasing demand with the passing years of life breaking down.

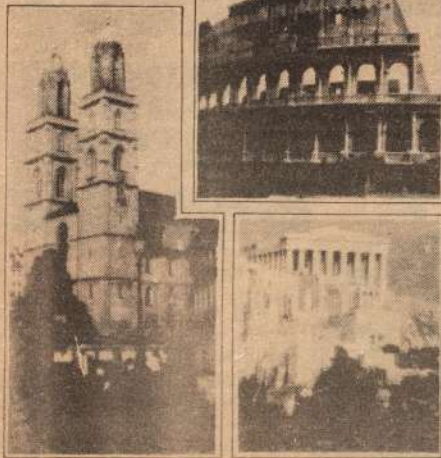
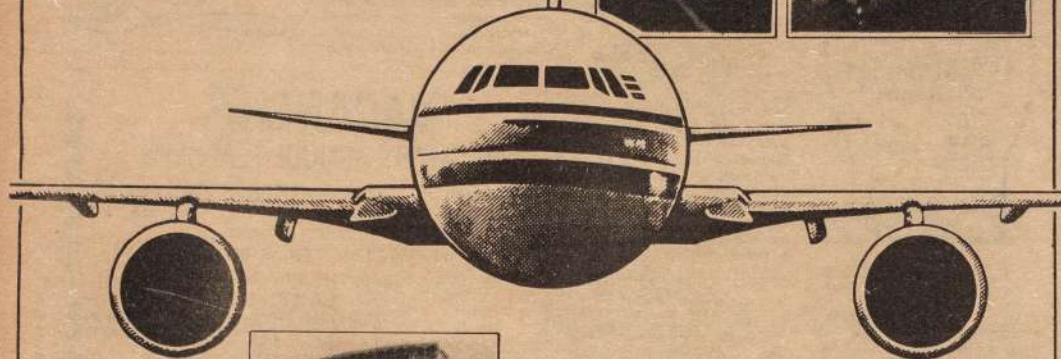
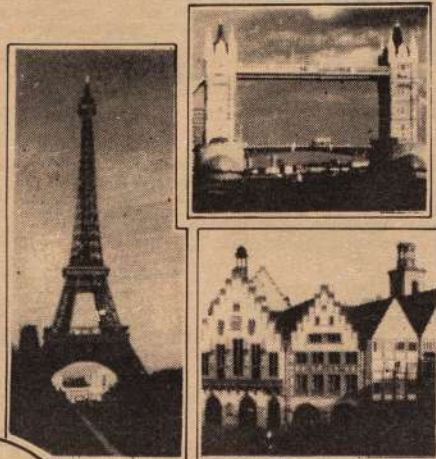
The Little Sisters, with transport at the time, were working the streets of Mombasa with donations. Such was their sincerity and worthwhile work that it attracted increasing support and the new home at Tudor emerged mainly due to donations from the local community augmented by help from overseas for its construction.

Said Mother Superior local community, including service clubs, continue to give good support with gifts of many items. They know that what they give goes to the old and consequently have no confidence in us".

The home is open to people of all races, tribes and religions as well as those with no religion at all.

Golden-agers presently there are mainly Christians.

The fellow with the mkokoteni decided he would use the road coming up to the Saba Saba junction since it was wider and he therefore had less chance of being squeezed onto the pavement.

All went right till he came to the traffic lights at the junction. The fellow stopped, looked right and left as he was supposed to and since there were no vehicles close by, he started to turn right towards town. A speeding lorry

came onto the junction and wasn't prepared for the slowly accelerating mkokoteni that came into its path.

The driver applied his brakes but he was too late to avoid a collision with the mkokoteni.

With a resounding crash a flood of beer bottles hit the tar, broke and started spreading on the road.

As is usual wananchi run onto the road under the pretext of helping out the guy and a few were seen leaving the scene with bottle tucked under their arms.

The owner of the mkokoteni was fortunately unhurt since the impact was at the front of the mkokoteni.

Kachumbari left the scene shortly afterwards when the police had arrived and restored some semblance of order and mercifully restored some of the

bottles that were on their way out.

Talking of wananchi, one of the things that always interests me is the way in which crowds form. Mankind is obviously a curious creature and anything that promised entertainment will always stop people in their tracks even at the risk of them suffering damage.

I say this because sometime in the not too distant past, Kachumbari invited me for a jar at some obscure place in Kisauni. As we were driving there, Kachumbari had to brake suddenly to avoid hitting some people who all of a sudden appeared on the road.

As the car stopped he rushed out and confronted this group of people. He started hurling expletives at them and all he got in reply was "praise the Lord".

He was rather flabbergasted by this response to his venom so went further into the crowd and found three very well dressed people in the middle.

In front of them was a portable amplifier and the fellow in the centre was holding a microphone and was about to start speaking.

Kachumbari looked closer and saw that two of the others were holding bibles with their index fingers marking some relevant section of text.

He realised that he had wormed his way into the middle of an open air crusade meeting and that at that instance the crusaders had taken a break from their "Bonkeing".

He slowly extricated himself from the crowd and returned to the car. We continued on our way to this watering hole that Kachumbari had discovered in the depths of Kisauni.

What this incident illustrated was that most of these open air crusades are set up without thought to the safety of the penitents who will hopefully stop to hear the good Word. There are always three people.

Kachumbari seems to think that figure is significant since the chief crusader will always speak English or some other language and will inevitably need a translator for those who speak only Swahili.

The third person is usually a budding evangelist but who on most occasions is a general factotum who carries the Holy Book, fetches drinking water and makes sure that the amplification equipment is working.

They will normally pick a place where a lot of people either pass or stop to wait for transport example bus stops at peak hours. They will then set up their equipment and start their crusade. People usually gather in a very short time (curiosity at work!)

If the delivery has enough fire, then the crowd can get so large that they spill onto the road. Unfortunately by this time the speaker is so carried away that he cannot notice that his activity is causing a dangerous set of circumstances for his "penitents". One of these days someone will get knocked down and the reason - they were listening to the word of God!

As Kachumbari says, perhaps the Word will save us!

with Jaffery 105/3 in 23 overs. Salim Khaku finished with 3/30 in 10 overs.

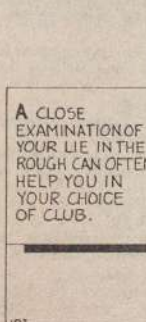

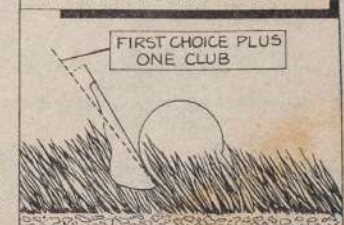
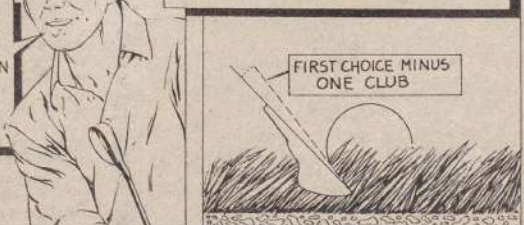
