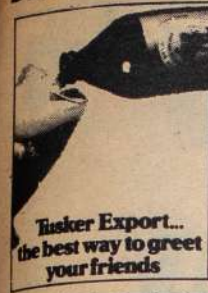

MARATHON WINNER

JUMA Ikangaa of Tanzania won the 20th New York City Marathon on Sunday in a course record of two hours, eight minutes and one second.

Ikangaa, whose three previous marathons resulted in second-place finishes, improved on the course mark of 2:08:13 established in 1981 by Alberto Salazar, the last American to win New York.

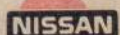

QURANIC BUILDING LATEST ...

CONSTRUCTION work on the Mombasa's nine-million-shilling harambee Quranic institute of learning is expected to be completed in the next few weeks and will become fully operational by February, next year. The Institute known as the Madrasahatul Munawarah is located amidst the Swahili-type homes of Majengo Msaji in Mvita constituency.

When completed, the Institute will have an intake of 1,000 students to attend a full-scale Arabic nursery, primary and secondary school curricula emphasising Quranic tuition and Islamic religion.

500 students currently studying in the original Madrasahatul Munawarah at Majengo's Big Road Location, will get automatic places in the Institute.

The same number of students will have to apply for vacant places. Forms for new applicants are expected to be out in the near future.

Applications for 25 posts have been invited by the Institute through advertisement in the local press including this issue of COASTWEEK. According to the Institute, applicants for the posts of teachers and non-teaching staff should all be Muslims.

The Institute invites applications for a female nursery secular teacher, two posts for nursery Islamic teachers (male and female), 12 posts for primary and eight posts for intermediate and secondary teachers.

For non-teaching staff, the Institute invites a post of office assistant (male and female) and a male messenger.

The Institute will teach Islamic studies from nursery to secondary level but will provide secular studies for nursery only.

The construction work for the Institute started last year at a cost of Shs 8,200,000 of which 80 per cent was raised locally through harambee spirit and the balance through aids from Muslim countries.

The Institute still needs Shs 1,000,000 for furnishing the Institute. The amount is expected to be raised locally on harambee basis.

The studies will be comprised of the essential Islamic subjects: the Holy Quran, the Sunna (way of life) of Prophet Muhammad (SAW), Fiqhi (Theology), History (consisting the lives of Caliphs and Imams) and Arabic Language.

In addition, secondary school leavers will be able to undertake Islamic Religious Education training to enable them to teach IRE in primary schools.

DIRECT FLIGHTS TO COPENHAGEN

The National carrier, Kenya Airways, has made history by being the first airline in East Africa to operate direct flights to the Scandinavia.

The inaugural flight to Copenhagen took off from the Jomo Kenyatta International Airport at 10.15 on Friday, November 3.

A newly leased modern DC.8 aircraft, which the airline is operating on this new route, has the capacity of 234 passengers and five tonnes of cargo on this inaugural flight.

Along with passengers, 4,456 kgs of cargo comprising of horticultural produce, fruits and flowers destined for Europe markets, was airfreighted.

A DELIGHTFUL surprise for the 48 residents of the Mombasa Municipal Council's Alms House at Tudor was to receive a wheelchair and 28 mosquito nets from the Rotary Club of Kilindini.

There have been no mosquito nets at the Home before and more were promised so that everyone can be protected against mosquitos.

The Rotary chairman, Giovanni Bonanno, promised that their help would continue, and explained that Rotary is a service club to help those in need.

The age range of residents is between 60-100 years and those who have difficulty in walking were very happy by this very meaningful gift of a wheelchair - the first to be received there.

It was one of the 12 wheelchairs to have been donated by the Rotary Club of Alpertown, UK.

On behalf of the Mombasa Municipal Council, Maggie Gona, Senior Social Welfare Officer, thanked Rotary for

such wonderful gifts. She said that the mosquito nets had come at the right time as there were many mosquitos around in Mombasa.

She assured Rotary that their gifts would be used properly.

She went on "I have a highly qualified staff at the Alms House and we know of Rotary's activities for it is the Rotary Club of Mombasa which provided us with this multi-purpose hall in which we are now sitting".

Said Mrs Gona "we are proud of your organisation and what it is doing and pray to God that it might grow from strength to strength to provide even more help to those in need".

The Rotary Club of Kilindini is also donating 1000 Panadol tablets and 1000 anti-malaria tablets to the Mwavivi Primary School, Kwale.

The Rotary chairman was accompanied by his Vice-chairman, Guldev Singh, who is also chairman of the Club's Community Services Committee.

Lions Clubs Host 'Medical Clinic'

ALL over the world, Lions have been known to render charitable services to the less fortunate members of the society.

In Kenya also, for over 30 years, they have rendered such services in various fields like education, rehabilitation of the handicapped, building bus shelters, road signs and various medical services.

At the Coast, for the last five years, Lions have extended their services to the rural areas as it was noticed that a good number of poor patients could not afford to come to Mombasa.

They have organised free medical clinics, Eye, E.N.T. and Dental Camps in Rural areas like Lamu, Malindi, Kilifi, Voi, Taita Taveta and Kinango where such specialists facilities are not available.

To add to the continued charitable work, the Lions Clubs of Mombasa Island and Pwani, this year under the conernorship of Dr Atul Shah (Island) and Kuldip Dang (Pwani) have joined hand to give combined and better services to the wananchi in rural areas.

The committees of both the clubs have decided to organise a Free Rural Eye, E.N.T. and Dental Camp in Msambweni (Kwale District) on November 25 and 26, 1989.

Msambweni, like many other areas, does not have specialists and many patients have to be referred to Mombasa for specialized treatment and surgery.

Members of both the clubs have visited the Hospital and its new complex recently. Detailed discussions were held with the Medical Officer incharge Dr Johnson Musembi, Hospital Secretary Mr Malava and other staff regarding screening of patients, provision of beds, Laboratory and Theatre facilities and arrangements for food and drugs.

At this Camp, all patients with Eye, Ear, Nose, Throat and Dental ailments will be examined and treated free of charge. Those requiring surgery will be admitted and operations carried out freely including post-operative care.

The Provincial Medical Officer has kindly given his permission to use Hospital facilities at Msambweni. Dr Musembi, the M.O.H. with his staff has promised to give all possible assistance.

Two prominent Eye surgeons of Mombasa; Dr Mnjalla and Dr Gupta have volunteered to accompany the organizers to perform various Eye operations.

The E.N.T. surgeons Drs Kuldip Dang and Mukesh Shah, the Dental surgeons Drs and Mrs Magon, Dr Ganiwalla and Dr Mrs Madhvi Shah, the anaesthetics Dr Atul Shah and Madhu Patel are all members of the Lions Club.

They will be assisted by Lion members, doctors and other nursing staff including the chairman of the two clubs Lions Chug and Yusuf Karim who too are doctors themselves.

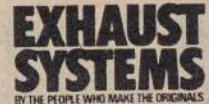
Eye, E.N.T. and Dental Diseases are quite prevalent at the coast due to the age, injury, excessive humidity and eating habits said Lion Dang.

Nose and throat the two natural openings for breathing and eating are quite exposed to various abuses and diseases. Infection in one can affect the other.

Continuing, Dr Dang explained that most of the diseases can be prevented by taking certain precautions. Many of the diseases can be treated by medicines but some cases require surgery.

These Lion Clubs at the Coast have been providing wonderful services to the community.

Instead of calling the patients to Mombasa, they have started going to these patients in rural areas paying heed to the call of our beloved President Hon. Daniel arap Moi to go to the Rural Areas and treat needy and poor people.

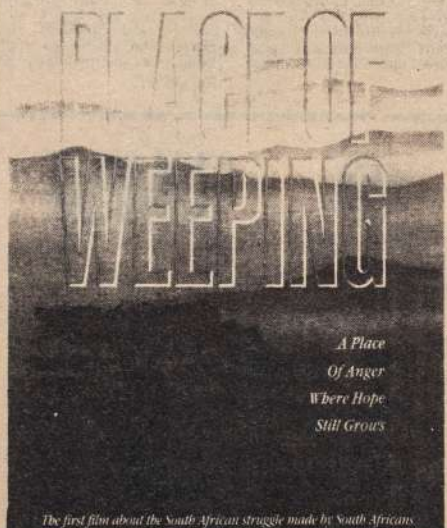

NOW showing at Lotus Cinema is *Red Headed Stranger*, a story of a man who gives up and violates the cloth due to the biggest betrayal in his life - his wife's elopement with another man. The movie is to be shown today and tomorrow only.

Profiles in courage are depicted by one or two characters as are greed and lust for power by a few others. The film has a strong sense of "an eye for an eye" and other biblical themes.

The values of the Reagan Era are much in evidence as the Reverend Shay loses his (shall we say uncommitted) wife and ends up with a woman whose "goodness" shines through her very pores - the excellent Laurie (Katherine Ross).

The movie ends on a happy note.

From Sunday, Lotus Cinema will start screening *Place of Weeping*, where Gracie, a courageous woman bent on seeing justice done.

She sees her brother die of injuries inflicted by the brutal Van Rebs Rensburg. She is further outraged when Joseph, another worker is beaten to death for stealing a chicken.

Produced by Anant Singh, the film is the first South African effort by a non-white South African. It has a powerful message.

It is a Vietnam film that is somewhat unusual. Far from raising the ideological rightness or wrongness of the whole war, it aspires to portray the actual conditions of the war.

To lend authenticity, a movie cameraman MoPic (Bryon Thames) is assigned to a specialised six-man reconnaissance unit of the fabled US Army 82 Airborne Division are sent on a mission deep into "Vietcong" territory.

'PRESSURE'

However, this violence seems more geared to maintain the impression of war. The focus is on the conditions, the intense pressure under which young American soldiers from different parts of their country were thrown together in "defending freedom" and how they had to cleave together for their sheer survival.

The most convincing portrayals were by Richard Brooks as "O.D." - the tough black unit sergeant - and Nicholas Cascone ("Easy"), the radioman whose frenetic sense of humour covers up a great fear of death.

A CHAMPAGNE RECEPTION

CHAMPAGNE and ice cold beer greeted VIP visitors from Finland at the Ukunda Airstrip who had arrived on Kenya's south coast to spend three days in the Director's Cottage at Africana Sea Lodge.

They flew from Nairobi on Boskovic's daily scheduled service to Ukunda. Waiting to greet them was Chris Modigell, Group General Manager of Alliance Hotels together with some of his management team, plus a "portable" bar.

nations. Consequently, Kenya will need much more promotion"

He went on "Kenya is an extremely attractive country for Scandinavians with beautiful hotels, scenery, wildlife, unpolluted sea and plenty of sun".

Declared Mr Kontala "you have everything that attracts Scandinavians. It is just a question of finding the right price level to attract them here".

He explained that his reason for bringing this group of influential people and personal friends to Kenya after a long break was to study their impressions and make some decisions.

Adding "I think all will be absolutely enchanted by Africana Sea Lodge".

Mr Kontala went on "considering that Finland has a very small population, it has a surprisingly strong economy. As a result we have a huge middle class and each and every person can

afford to travel to Kenya - hence we have a big potential market to be tapped".

While he had not himself been to Kenya for some time, the company had been sending two to four groups here each year.

Continuing, he said with a laugh "I think I must hold some sort of Finnish record for I have been to Kenya more than 70 times starting in the 60/70s when I was a tour leader bringing quite a number of tourists here".

nine years and covers three wholesale operations, all being resold by over 300 travel agencies all over the country.

The group enjoyed Alliance Hotel hospitality as well as its exclusive gourmet package which enables guests to enjoy a meal of their choice in any of the seven a la carte restaurants at Jadini/Safari Beach Hotels and Africana Sea Lodge including the famous Makaa and Island Grills.

THE SHILLING BEGINS TO SLIDE AGAINST FOREIGN CURRENCIES

THE TANZANIA SHILLING which has remained relatively stable at about 145/- to one US Dollar has now begun to slide again under a floating system recommended by the International Monetary Fund. The Shilling now compares at about 150/- to one US Dollar, while against the British Pound it stands at 234.8 units. The gradual devaluation of the Shilling, which comes after four months since the last devaluation in June is expected to take the Shilling down to 175/- per one US Dollar.

However the exact extent of devaluation has not been publicly revealed by the Central Bank and the 175/- is only a widely forecasted figure in public circles.

The devaluation of the local shilling is aimed towards arresting inflation which presently stands at 31 per cent officially but is actually much higher.

Cooperative Unions and some other Public Companies are owing Commercial Banks billions of shillings and with the reduced money supply banks have been forced to distribute more currency with no backhold to support the surplus.

The Cooperative Unions have been subject to massive pillage and every second day the local media carries disheartening reports on millions of shillings being stolen by unscrupulous officials who are eventually only "suspended" or "dismissed".

CO-OP UNIONS

Numerous Coop Unions have been involved in many rackets and donor agencies are reported to be displeased with their performance and have also been reported to have

asked for their dissolution. The evaluation of the shilling is going to raise the price of commodities locally and the Tanzania Government was not prepared to accept any further decline in the value of the local currency, but the IMF and donor agencies left the country with no option if further aid was to be forthcoming.

During the meeting of the National Executive Committee in Dodoma, the Government was allowed to renegotiate with the IMF on the obtaining of loans and the local "business times" reported that the fund may release 200 million US Dollars this year following the acceptance of the devaluation proposal.

Since 1983, when the shilling stood at 12.3 units to the Dollar the local currency has dropped far down in value.

In 1986 at the start of the Economic Recovery Programme (ERP) it rose to 40/- against the dollar and the downhill trend took it to 93/- against the Dollar in 1988 whilst at the beginning of this year it was pegged at 125/- to the Dollar before settling down to about 145/- in the middle of this year.

Jawaharlal Nehru Centenary Stamp Issue

Jawaharlal Nehru, the first Prime Minister of India was born on 14th November, 1889 at Allahabad, to Motilal Nehru, an eminent lawyer and one of India's great patriots. He received his early education at home and later on in the United Kingdom, where he was called to the Bar in 1912.

Inspired by Mahatma Gandhi, Nehru emerged from a sheltered childhood to become one of the greatest leaders in the world. He engaged in non-violent struggle against the British until India attained Independence in 1947. His work gained much recognition and many described him as a patriot, freedom fighter, visionary, world statesman, apostle of peace, literary genius, scientific rationalist and humanist par excellence. Based on the firm foundation of his ideals of democracy, socialism and secularism, he led an economically impoverished India into a modern era of industrial development and scientific growth without ever losing sight of his deeper commitment to the welfare of the entire human race.

"Where do hundreds of millions of Asians and Africans come into the world picture dominated by the Soviet Union and United States?"

This question agitated Jawaharlal Nehru long before India became free. Tirelessly, he fought to raise the status of the Afro-Asian world. The Indian war of Independence was an eye opener to other countries of

the world which were still colonies, Kenya being one of them. Nehru strove tirelessly for total disarmament and peaceful co-existence and against war. He gave to the world the doctrine of non-aligned movement, of which Kenya and India are members. Jawaharlal Nehru, India's first Prime Minister, for seventeen years, from 1947 to 1964, died peacefully on 27th May, 1964. India and the world lost a great son.

The centenary of Jawaharlal Nehru's birthday celebrations commenced on 14th November, 1988 and will culminate on 14th November, 1989.

To pay homage to one of India's greatest sons, Kenya Posts and Telecommunications Corporation will issue a set of postage stamps on 9th November, 1989 in the following denominations:

Our Heritage of Faith

'KQ' NOW OPERATE NEW CARGO SERVICE

FOLLOWING demand by the Kenyan farming and business community, Kenya Airways will this week be operating four weekly cargo freighter services in each direction between Kenya and Europe.

In addition, a once weekly return service will operate from Nairobi to Djibouti and Sharjah.

The all-cargo freighter services will be performed by Kenya Flamingo Airways Limited (KFAL) which is subsidiary company of Kenya Airways.

A leased Boeing 707 aircraft will be used to operate these services. Flights out of Nairobi will have a capacity of 30 tonnes while the inbound services will be 40 tonnes capacity. Because of the high altitude at Nairobi the carrying capacity is reduced.

Three of the European service will terminate in London while the fourth will terminate in Amsterdam in the Netherlands.

Three southbound flights from Europe will commence at Gatwick Airport while one will commence in Frankfurt. All of these services except one via Frankfurt, are direct to Nairobi. The north-bound flights are all direct.

With the introduction of these all cargo services, the airline will offer an additional 120 tonnes weekly in Europe to supplement 110 tonnes capacity available each week on the scheduled Airbus services.

The decision to operate the freighter services has been made in recognition of the economic importance of the horticultural industry in Kenya and to meet the needs of the farming community in Kenya. This will be particularly important during the forthcoming European winter season.

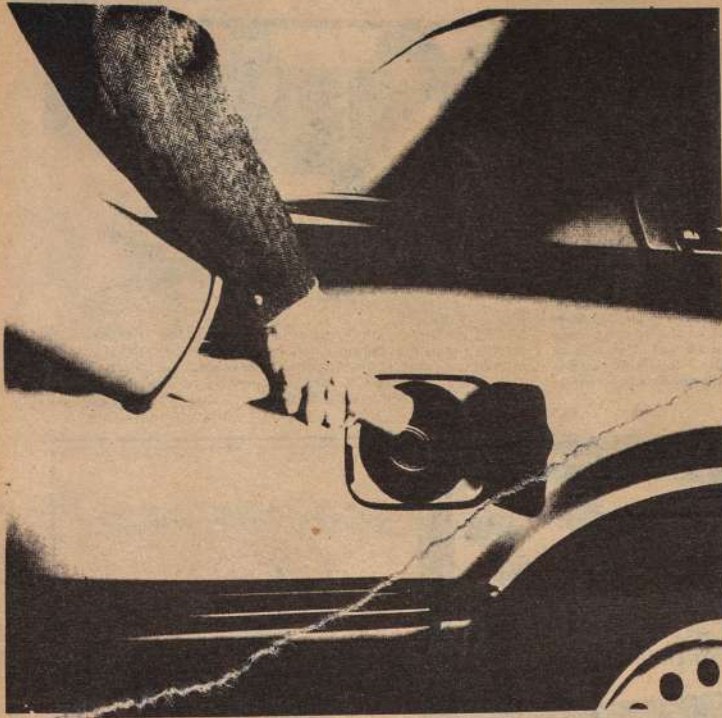

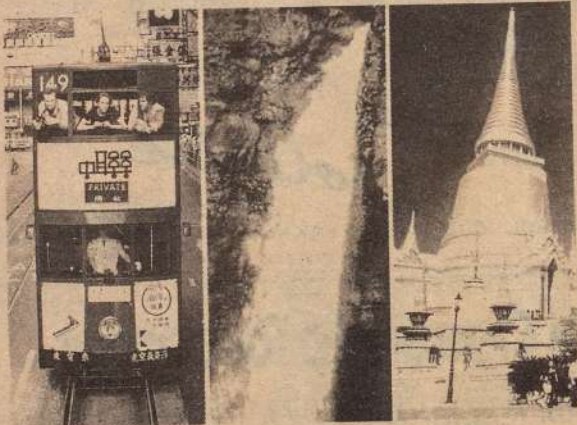

The school is open to children of all races and religions from two and a half years to primary school age and is situated adjacent to the hotel with large garden and its own private entrance.

It is being run on the lines of an English kindergarten and is well equipped with books and educational toys as well as a perspex topped see-through incubator enabling children to witness the birth process from an egg.

Headmistress is Mrs Ruth Winter who, for four years was a kindergarten teacher at the Mombasa Academy. Before then she was running the Pioneer Commercial College for several years.

This is the first time that Kenya Flamingo Airways is operating direct flights from Finland to Kenya and the passenger charter operations will play a major role in opening the Finnish tourist market to Kenya.

Later on in the year, Kenya Flamingo plans to operate further passenger charters from Europe to Kenya — four from Italy and two from France.

When the whole programme is implemented, around mid-December, Kenya Flamingo Airways will be bringing approximately 1500 tourists from Europe to Kenya each week.

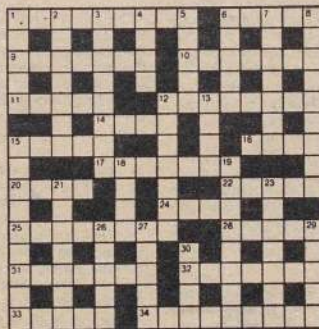

STATISTICS is a wide and varied subject. Mathematics set the basic rules and all other statisticians derive the use of the rules to suit their own circumstances.

MOHAMED SAID SALIM

COACH MOURNED

FORMER Kenya international soccer star, Mohammed Said Salim has died after a short illness at his Old Town home in Mombasa. The last Salim was buried at Ganjoni Muslim Cemetery.

Mr Salim, popularly known as "Badi Saidi" played for the national soccer team for many years before he turned coach to various clubs and the Mombasa Combined team.

Badi Saidi who died at the age of 62 years produced several ex-great players who played for the national team. They include Ali Kajo, Ahmed Breik, Ahmed Omar, Nassir Omar, Jabir Riziki and Amrani Shiba among others.

He started his soccer career at Shimo La Tewa school before joining Coast FC. He moved to Feisal where he appeared for the club and later trained the team.

He steered Feisal to a historic achievement - becoming the first Coast club to win the National League trophy in 1965. He later joined Mwenge as a coach and enabled the club to win several local trophies.

He was a founder member of Mwenge 'B' in 1973 and under his guidance, the team managed to win promotion from fourth to first division in a period of four seasons.

Badi Saidi was also a versatile artist who contributed enormously towards an idea of establishing the Swahili film industry. He had his own movie camera which he took a number of drama plays from his Kuze location and showed around to upcoming film enthusiasts.

He was a dedicated and popular taxi driver at Old Town.
