ATIKA SABHARWAL PULLS IN A RECORD FIVE GOLD MEDALS ...

NINE-year-old Atika Sabharwal put up commendable performances to win five Gold Medals during the National Age Group Swimming Championships held at the Nyayo National Stadium in Nairobi last weekend writes Abdulrahman Sheriff.

Atika, a standard six pupil at Mombasa Academy, created history by winning the five gold medals in every event she participated. It was indeed a splendid achievement for Atika, her school and Coast as a whole.

She won medals in 50m breast stroke, 50m butterfly, backstroke, individual medley 4 x 50m and freestyle. She completed the 50m breast stroke in 51.44 seconds; clocked 47.82 secs in 50m butterfly; took 49.73 secs in backstroke; winning the individual medley 4 x 50m in four minutes 04.52 secs and finished first in freestyle in a time of 42.49 secs. Atika who had won several

swimming seriously by Mrs Freeman, a swimming teacher at Mombasa Academy.

The National Age Group Swimming Championships were held at the 50 metre pool at Nyayo National Stadium where Mombasa Academy took a select team of 11 children who brought back 42 certificates and 25 medals.

The girls came second overall only two points behind the winners "Otters". The boys finished third behind St. Mary's and Coast Swimming Club. Christopher Bass came second in every event he participated.

Tokyo Could Be A Winner

JAPANESE CONNECTION TO BOOST KENYA TOUR TRADE

KENYA'S TOURIST INDUSTRY - already the country's top earner of foreign exchange - could accelerate its growth tremendously by promotional efforts in Japan - a virtually untapped market with considerable potential.

While the Japanese government is encouraging its people to spend more money in travelling overseas - Kenya it appears is not taking advantage of this very lucrative market by beefing up its promotional effort.

Interviewed at Safari Beach Hotel he spoke enthusiastically about this potential market, the development of which was being hampered by lack of funds with which to run the Kenya Tourist Office and launch promotional campaigns.

He pointed out that more than eight million people a year from Japan now travel overseas and that this figure is expected to reach ten million very soon.

MORE FUNDS

Of the 8.4 million who travelled abroad during 1988 only 5,500 came to Kenya, and there has been very little growth since then.

Urgently needed is money to promote holidays in Kenya and, possibly, a direct KA flight Tokyo/Nairobi to make it easier for holidaymakers to get here.

Such is the market potential that it is visualised that any big promotional campaign might eventually result in the filling of two direct flights a week with Japanese tourists.

The only way of getting to Kenya at the moment is via Karachi or Bombay. High air fares should also be looked into, as well as why the fare from Tokyo to Nairobi is three times higher than from Nairobi to Tokyo.

There were also insufficient aircraft seats during peak holiday periods in Japan with all aircraft out of Tokyo being absolutely packed at these times.

Mr Niida suggested that Kenya Flamingo Airways (a wholly owned subsidiary of Kenya Airways) might also consider a joint venture with Japanese airlines as they had done with Air Holland.

TOURIST OFFICE

The current budget allocation for running the Kenya Tourist Office in Japan is Kshs 100,000/- which is considered inadequate to promote such a big potential market to a relatively new long-haul destination.

The JATA Congress and Travel Trade Show (held every second year) will be attracting around 1500 participants from 56 countries of the world.

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SPYROS KANDARAKIS AIMS AT A 'RENDEZVOUS IN KENYA ...'

A MAN who is in "love with Kenya" and is doing his utmost to promote it is Spyros C. Kandarakis, Kenya Airways Sales Manager, Greece.

He is presently organising a big promotional campaign entitled "Rendezvous in Kenya", named after the first song on a disc/cassette which has already been made and includes "Karibuni Kenya" sung in Greek.

Mr Kandarakis was recently in Kenya for one week bringing with him five tour operators and a three-strong TV team to make a video film of the places visited to be teamed with music from this cassette.

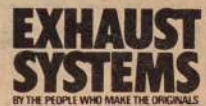

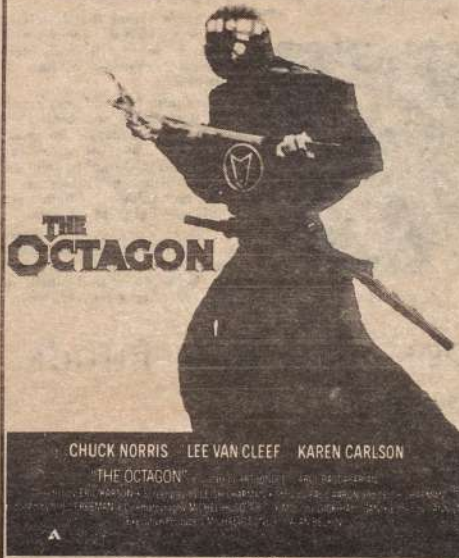

more realistic approach is needed to fully exploit this tremendous market in the way of promotional campaigns and more literature being made available.

Mr Niida is also the Kenya Airways Area Manager for Japan and Korea. He has had nearly 40 years experience in the airlines industry. For 19 years he was with Pan Am and Japanese airlines, and for over 20 years has been with EA/KA in Japan.

He was last in Kenya 11 years ago and has been visiting Amboseli and Maasai Mara with overnight stops at Amboseli Lodge and Intrepid's Camp, spending his last four days in Kenya at Safari Beach Hotel.

Endorsing his feelings about this big potential market in Japan is Chris Modigell, Group General Manager, Alliance Hotels (of which Safari Beach is part) who for some time has been calling for Kenya to explore new potential markets rather than continue to put their main reliance on traditional and highly competitive markets.

Some interesting statistics from Japan is that in 1964 only 128,000 Japanese travelled abroad. Between 1973 and 1988 the number increased from 2.3 million to 8.4 million.

This has been attributed to Japan's dynamic economic growth, liberalisation of overseas travel restrictions, political stability, the high value of the Japanese yen and development of the air network.

Referring to the lack of convenient flight connections Mr Niida said "Air India and

Pakistan International Airline are the only ones operating to Kenya from Japan via Bombay and Karachi.

SEYCHELLES

He went on "a British Airways flight from Japan to Seychelles, was cancelled from January 1986." This he said had affected Japanese tourism to Kenya and

KA very badly.

Most of the tours to Kenya were organised via Seychelles, and KA was carrying more than 1000 passengers a year via the Seychelles.

The Japanese people take holidays at the same time, especially in the summer and during the New Year period and "Golden Week" months. This

said Mr Niida "puts severe pressure on airlines. As a result many tours to Kenya get wait listed or are forced to cancel tours during these periods."

Mr Niida revealed there are more than 50 foreign government tourist offices in Japan - all spending large sums of money in the promotion of tourism.

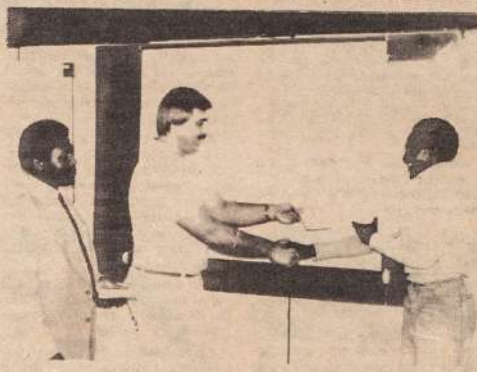
He went on "the Japanese people are looking for new destinations to visit. With adequate publicity I do not think it would be difficult to increase the number of visitors to Kenya to 80,000 which is only one per cent of the total Japanese overseas travellers. But to lure them here large sums of money need to be spent on promoting Kenya not only with brochures but with films, slides, video tapes, posters. They should be in the Japanese language to be most effective.

HONG KONG ROUTE

Seminars and receptions for the travel industry, as well as films shows and lectures for the general public were also suggested.

Mr Niida also suggested soliciting business executives to invest in Kenya, particularly in the tourism industry.

It is also felt that KA might extend its service to Hong Kong or approach the Japanese government to encourage Japanese air carriers to fly to Nairobi as a joint operation with KA or Kenya Flamingo Airways.

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Provincial Commissioner At MACTA Meeting

"TOURISM is a very crucial element in Kenya's economy and we must see that it is not only well promoted, but that those coming here will want to return".

So said the Provincial Commissioner, Coast, Mr Simeon Mung'ala, Guest of Honour at a dinner party hosted by the Mombasa and Coast Tourist Association to launch its new "MCTA Tourist Guide".

It took place in the spacious conference room of Whitesands Hotel with some 100 members and guests also enjoying a fashion show by Bombolulu - the first Workshop at the Coast for the Physically Handicapped.

The PC noted that according to figures from the Ministry of Finance, tourism had overtaken tea and coffee as an earner of foreign exchange. "The indications are" he said "that tourism is going to become an increasingly important foreign currency earner for this country".

During the "high season" more charter aircraft would be bringing thousands more holidaymakers here.

On November 6, Moi International Airport welcomed the inaugural flight of Air Holland from Amsterdam - a joint venture with Kenya Flamingo Airways (a wholly owned subsidiary of Kenya Airways) while on November 7 another inaugural charter flight was arriving from Helsinki, Finland, a joint venture between Seed Group Limited and Kenya Flamingo Airways.

Both will be operating once weekly flights into Mombasa throughout the high tourist season.

It is understood that as far as Air Holland is concerned, three tour operators have seat allocations - Holland International Neckermann and Hotelplan.

Said the PC "this shows that the Coast Province is an important area for the economy of the country generally, and all involved in the tourist industry should be aware of its potential and that this is one way of improving the national economy for the benefit of all".

He went on "Kenya is taking her tourist industry very seriously and our Director of Wildlife Conservation and Management is very determined about putting an end to the poaching of our wildlife, and that is why my Provincial Security Committee also the District Security Committee are so involved in making sure that Kenya's wildlife is preserved".

Declared the PC "that is why

we have to thank President Moi for taking the lead in making sure that poachers and other ill intentioned people no longer have the opportunity to carry on with their activities".

At the preceding fourth General Meeting of MCTA, a minute's silence was observed in memory of one of its members Najma

Mohdar, Managing Director of Launy Tours, who died in a road accident on the south coast.

Elected to the MCTA committee to represent "light aircraft" was Roy Ndisi, Executive Director of RDN Air Charter.

Roy is also chairman of the Coast Chapter of the Kenya Association of Air Operators as well as being its second national vice-chairman.

Also becoming a committee member to represent the newly formed Association of Kenya Games Fishing Boat Owners was its secretary, Bill Williams.

He told members that it is estimated there are about 80 deep sea fishing craft between Kiwayo and Shimoni of which, he alleged, a large number are operating illegally.

"The association came about because the safety aspect of such boats was getting almost out of control" he said.

The association aims to ensure that each boat is fully insured and has all the necessary licences.

It was suggested at the meeting that each boat, also goggling boats, be given an identification tag to be placed on the side to show they are licensed, as in the case of road vehicles.

SMALL BUSINESS

The problem of Beach Boys was again, discussed following complaints by tourists of harassment.

It was suggested there should be a joint meeting between MCTA, Kenya Association of Hotelkeepers' and Caterers', and KATO to try and find an answer to this problem and how some of their activities can be curtailed.

Declared the MCTA chairman Peter Mangnitz "they must be given alternative opportunities of earning a living, such as in the new handicraft markets being set up where they will find a place in which to operate a small business".

Allegations were made that some MCTA members were

involved in using the services of beach boys to boost their business. It was agreed that their membership should be terminated if such allegations are found correct.

Beach Boys were not only operating on the beaches, but in the main thoroughfares of the town. Those arrested were usually back in "business" the next day.

It was also claimed that they hire vehicles to take tourists on safari and that some lodges were also supporting them by offering the same contract rate for rooms as that given to legal operators.

This was considered unfair when the latter have many overhead expenses to meet.

Speaking about the main objectives of the MCTA, the First Deputy Chairman, Mr Z. Harunani said they included ensuring that attractions are well looked after, as well as the town itself. He said "among other things we press the Municipal Council to repair roads, improve garbage collection and paint buildings".

The association works hand in hand with the Council. Citing one recent example he said that paint worth Shs 8,000/- to beautify the Tusk Arches had been donated by Crown Paints.

It had been MCTA which had initially approached this company with the suggestion of making such a donation. The paint had been handed over to the Mayor who had promised that the Tusk Arches would be repaired and repainted before Jamhuri Day.

MCTA has also suggested that the road from Port Reitz to

Kwale be repaired which could then be used as an alternative route to the south coast when there are any break downs and long delays at the Likoni Ferry.

Mr Harunani said he had been given to understand that a feasibility study was presently underway.

He had also been present at the handling over by KBS of the Likoni Ferry to Kenya Ferry Services Limited, during which the Kenya Ports Authority had promised to improve the service and ensure there are no more long queues.

FERRY SERVICE

A new ferry is in the pipeline, while that part of the ramp which had been undergoing repairs on the south coast side was expected to open on November 7, when work would start on the other part.

The cost of this repair work was in the region of Shs 2.3 million.

Declared Mr Harunani "I am sure that afterwards work will start on repairing the ramp on the Island side".

Mrs Lorna Hayes, gave a report on the Cruise Ship Seminar organised by the Ministry of Tourism and Wildlife which took place at Bandari College recently.

She described it as "excellent and very interesting, bringing together some very high powered participants".

It was the MCTA which had initiated the idea of promoting this sector of the tourist industry on finding that fewer cruise ships were calling here.

Declared the chairman "it has a lot of potential but has to be tapped properly, while Mrs Hayes felt there should be "a Concorde - like treatment of Cruise ships to make them feel more welcome".

Members heard that Ali Burhan and his Old Town team intend beautifying yet another traffic roundabout.

However, they are still seeking aid and assurance by the Mombasa Municipal Council that it will be responsible for their illumination at night and maintenance of the lights.

At the dinner party which followed Hussein Alwi was presented with a token of appreciation by MCTA for the beautiful Arab chest he had made from concrete which can be seen on the traffic roundabout by Treasury Square. The MCTA at its meeting considered that tourist attraction should be increased.

The Chairman suggested that more Swahili Festivals, with traditional food, music and handicraft market, as organised by Ali Burhan and his Old Town team outside Fort Jesus Museum should be developed upon to become a regular feature during the high tourist season.

These should take place both inside and outside the Fort.

Another suggestion was that there should be performances of mass ngomas to give tourists an insight into the many traditional dances from all over Kenya. An excellent venue it was thought would be the Mombasa ASK showground.

It was noted that this could become a big income earner for either the Mombasa Municipal Council or Ministry of Social Services, as they would need to be properly organised by experts in this field.

At the dinner party the MCTA took the opportunity of wishing Sebastian M Chege, Kenya Airways Manager, Coast, a very happy retirement. Mr Chege retires at the end of November after 25 years service with EAA/KA during which he has also worked in London.

The dinner was followed by a most enjoyable fashion show by Bombolulu featuring some very "dissy" models.

All garments are made from Kenyan cotton with many bearing delightful screen printing based on ancient African cave paintings.

Soon Bombolulu will be opening its new and more

spacious showroom outside of which will be a garden with seats, also a parking area for tour buses.

Its tailoring section has started exporting to Oxford, UK, which is particularly interested in its Khaki fashionwear for Spring and summer 1990, and is also being kept very busy with local orders.

T-shirts are now being adorned with bold abstract designs, while its jewellery workshop has just received a Shs half million order from the USA which will keep it very busy during January and February.

A.P.D.K. COAST

Bombolulu now employs 120 physically handicapped people while 15 trainees will be joining them in January. Such is its popularity that applications for employment continue to pour in.

The growth of Bombolulu since 1987 has been phenomenal, with the number of employees increasing from 27 to 120. It accommodates them all and more housing is to be built in January.

Four nights a week Bombolulu takes its jewellery to sell at beach hotels, and has a permanent exhibition at Ratna Square.

It plans to offer permanent jewellery exhibitions at hotels during the high tourist season and is already receiving many bookings for fashion shows.

Said Mr H.S. Hafidh, vice chairman of APDK Coast "Bombolulu has grown in popularity and size and is an interesting place for tourists to visit".

He went on "such fashion shows help project awareness of the welfare of the physically disabled and act as a reminder that it is a social and human duty to rehabilitate and make them useful members of our society".

This can be done by giving them the means to help themselves".

He appealed to hoteliers and MCTA to tell people about the project and that Bombolulu is always happy to welcome visitors.

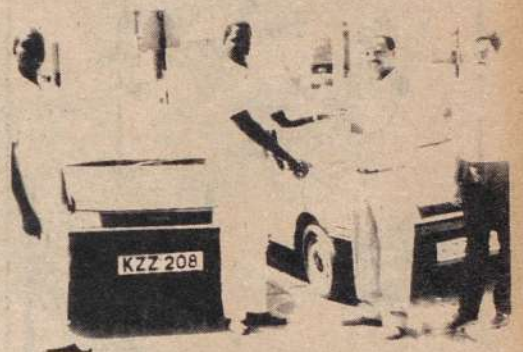

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British Minister Hands Over Port Equipment

BRITISH GOVERNMENT AID for rehabilitating nine quay cranes at berths Nos. 11 and 12 with the aim of rendering them more suitable and prolonged lives will go a long way in enhancing the existing good relationship between Kenya and Great Britain. This was said by the British Minister of State for Foreign and Commonwealth Affairs, Hon. William Waldegrave when he handed over the rehabilitated quay cranes to the Managing Director of Kenya Ports Authority, Eng. Philip Okundi at berth No. 12.

Hon. Waldegrave, who was accompanied by the British High Commissioner to Kenya, Sir John Johnson and the first secretary in the High Commission, Ms. Sally Bull, added, however, that Great Britain was always ready to assist the port of Mombasa to achieve high economic development for the betterment of all the people in the country and those from the landlocked states which use the port.

He pointed out that he was aware the port of Mombasa served many countries in this region and it was therefore more fitting to have a deliberate programme of assisting Kenya

to develop the port for the benefit of all the port users.

The Minister thanked the engineers from the Stothert and Pitt Engineers Limited for their good work in rehabilitating the quay cranes thereby giving them a new lease of life for 15 more years.

He said the Stothert and Pitt Engineers Company was from Bath in England, the area he represents in the British Parliament.

Hon. Waldegrave expressed his gratitude for the manner

in which he was received at the Kenya Ports Authority. He was entertained by the Authority's choir and traditional dancers.

In fact, he had a chance of joining the traditional dancers who he said had highly entertained him during the official ceremony of handing over the cranes.

Thanking the British Minister for handing over the cranes to the Authority, Eng. Okundi said the ceremony of handing over the cranes signified the close relationship that exists between Great Britain and Kenya.

"This relationship can be correctly said to have started at the port of Mombasa," he added.

Eng. Okundi explained that Britain, being a maritime trading nation and her vessels calling at the port of Mombasa for trade purposes many centuries past. This continues to be so and the trade between the two countries continued to grow.

"The assistance and cooperation that British Government has given to our port is immense," Eng. Okundi said, adding that much equipment and cranes in the port have been obtained through British Aid.

Through the British Government Aid Programme, the Port has acquired tugboats, pilot boats, police boats, mooring boats, and various types of quay cranes and mobile cranes.

The Managing Director noted that apart from equipment, the British Government has assisted in other port projects and in our manpower development by providing training.

He stated that it was his hope that the future will see continued close association with and involvement in the port to the benefit of both countries.

REHABILITATED

The nine cranes which have been refurbished are in the tune of 22 years old since they were put in services in 1967. The project to refurbish them started in August, last year, with the immediate objective of extending their life by a further 15 years or so.

This was found necessary because the cranes were likely to deteriorate beyond economic usefulness within five years in view of the heavy corrosive nature of the atmosphere.

He pointed out that the rehabilitated cranes will serve three cargo berths and avoid the costly

alternative of investment in new cranes which would require more adequate electrical supply system, reinforcement of the berths to take larger capacity cranes, etcetera. "This is also the longer term objective of reducing the ships turnaround time by increased operational efficiency.

The work comprised renewal of the electrical installation and replacement of worn out mechanical parts, repainting of the cranes and a consignment of spare parts.

"In the recent past other equipment in this port have undergone similar exercise because of our belief in rehabilitation of existing equipment which has still useful life," he quipped, adding that these include prime movers

Three who had completed over 20 years service each received the handsome Platinum Certificate, which was framed,

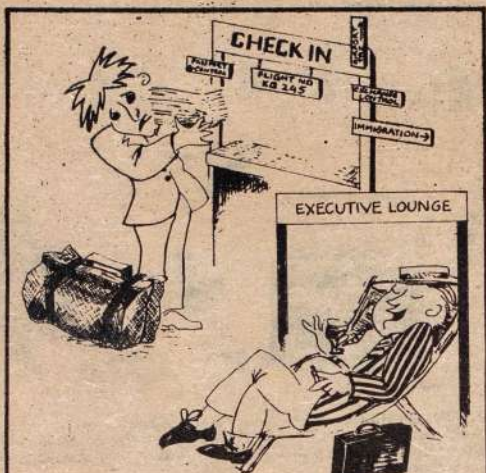

Adding "it is my belief that the greatest asset of a company is its people- for without them it cannot function".



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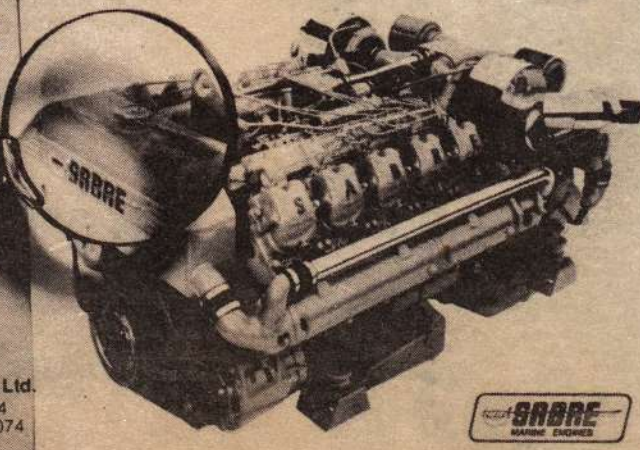

Summer 1990 is also expected to be better now that two LTU charters (instead of one) will be operating here.

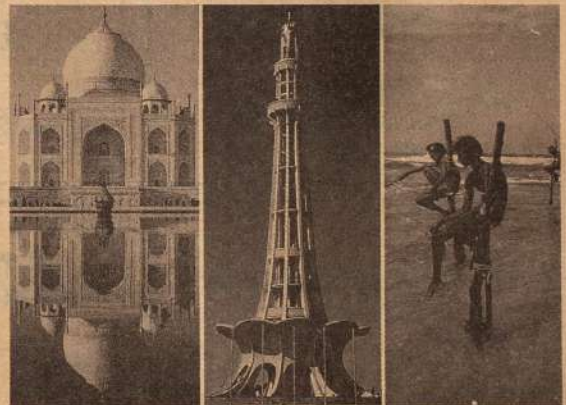

He described Kenya "as the best destination so far".

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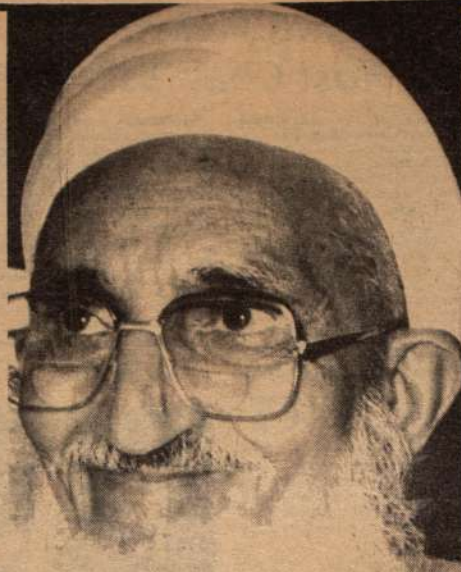

Focal point of this first issue is a survey about "Deutsch als Fremdsprache" (German as a foreign language) in Kenya. The next issue, planned to be published beginning of next year will focus on aspects of tourism in Kenya.

The guests of honour this evening will be: Mr Richard Cheruyot-Provincial Director for Social Services in the Ministry of Culture and Social Services, and Mr Gerhard Matthies-Honorary Consul of the Federal Republic of Germany.

Mr Christoph Ludszuweit, editor of Jambo Umlaut, has also agreed to come from Nairobi to witness the introduction of the magazine along the Kenyan Coast.

The "Sparrows Band" has been invited to entertain with traditional African and popular European tunes.

Also invited are all German language students at the Allidina Visram High School, Khamis Secondary, Shimo La Tewa, and Malindi High School, where the study of German forms part of the school syllabus.

'WE MUST PRESERVE OUR HISTORIC SITES'

ARAB historical sources made it clear that Mombasa was among the earliest towns of importance on the East African coast, therefore its varied culture should be preserved and maintained.

To worsen the condition, new buildings are threatening to destroy the special character of the historical town. Mombasa has always been the entry way to the interior of Eastern Africa. The town's history is thus relevant not only to its country but to other nations in the interior.

The most clear aspect of the old town is a collection of historical buildings, which combine African, Arab, Indian and European influences.

Many of the buildings still have

beautiful carved doors as well as elegantly styled balconies. The old port which is still used by the Arabs dhows to trade along the East African coast surrounds the town of Mombasa. The indigenous Mombasa community should strive to maintain its old cultural practises and to live within its cultural frame-work. Many people nowadays prefer the modern way of life, but this should not be the case because it will not preserve but destroy our culture.

Several rules could be evolved to promote the multiple aspects of Mombasa's culture.

Residents should be encouraged to promote the settlement's medieval-orient architecture by relying on local resources such as building materials.

Local craftsmanship stimulates economic growth, which involves carving and sailing in traditional boats and doing embroidery, which interests me. Traditional boat building adds colour to the culture in the area and carved furniture can be expected from Mombasa.

Tourists play a major role in the preservation of the Old Town as they like to see the town's beauty especially the monumental structures.

Therefore if the historical sites are to be preserved our country will earn more in terms of tourism. The community should also create a centre for socio-cultural activities in the town.

The way of dressing, men and wearing kanzus and women buibus (veils) gives the town a rich Islamic reflection. This is

also strengthened by the mosques some of which date many centuries back and quite a few religious schools in the area.

The greatest monument in town is the country's biggest fort-Fort Jesus which witnessed many historical events dating back to the 16th century. Fort Jesus is an added attraction to the tourists who come to Mombasa.

We should preserve our historical heritage by maintaining Mombasa Old Town's original flavour by making sure that there would be no development of new buildings in Old Town.

People should keep up their cultural and traditional character and behaviour. Spiritual culture should be followed and traditional activities should be encouraged at the Old Town and the whole of Mombasa.

My last word is that, I would like the Municipal Council of Mombasa to make sure that Old Town is being preserved with the help of the National Museums of Kenya.

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His was the vision that illuminated an emerging great nation. But more than that, he encouraged millions of people in every part of our globe towards a better, more tolerant understanding of each other. His influence lives on in all who knew him or knew of him.

Nehru strode the Indian firmament as few others did. Nehru was a people's man. His sheer magnetism, charm, warmth and sensitivity endeared him to the people of India.

He was the life of the nation and the soul of the people... ever concerned about them. Indians all over remember one of the greatest leaders of our country in this his centenary year.

NON-ALIGNMENT POLICY — SIGNAL CONTRIBUTION TO WORLD OF POLITICS

Non-alignment was a signal contribution of Jawaharlal Nehru, the first Prime Minister of the Republic of India, to world of politics. It was the genius of Nehru, which had conceived, nurtured and propogated this, adding a new dimension to international relations.

The concept had sprouted in the soil of India, drawing sustenance from traditions of peace, free thinking and freedom of action. An independent India, proud of its past and conscious of the wisdom of centuries, wanted to stand on its own feet and be counted in the world.

Five days after taking over as the Vice President of the Interim Government, Nehru spoke to the nation on September 7, 1946. He said, India desired friendship with all nations and peoples; she wanted to cooperate with all countries in the furtherance of world peace and freedom. India wanted to keep away from the power politics of groups which had led to world wars and could lead to greater disasters.

Nehru said: "We believe that peace and freedom are indivisible and the denial of freedom anywhere must endanger freedom elsewhere and lead to conflict and war. There was no reason why countries having different political or social or economic systems could not cooperate with each other".

Prime Minister Nehru told his biographer, Michael Brecher, that the Indian National Congress had, over the years — even though it formed no government in those days — developed a foreign policy for the country.

The November 4, 1921 Working Committee resolution declared that "the Congress should let it be known to the neighbouring

and other non-Indian states that India as a self-governing country can have nothing to fear from the neighbouring states or any state as her

people have no designs upon any of them

The Congress resolutions had outlined the guiding principles: India would cooperate with the other nations, especially the neighbouring countries; India would not become a party to an imperialist war; India would never join a war without the consent of her people; India would stand for "positive neutralism and non-alignment with major power blocs".

In 1925 the All India Congress Committee was authorised to open a Foreign Department. Three years later the Foreign Department was set up with Jawaharlal Nehru as its head. Since then Nehru continued to formulate, design and guide the Indian foreign policy. It was during the Korean crisis in 1950 that India's non-alignment was first put to test. Because of her independent policies, India was facing suspicion and hostility in some quarters. Nehru had talked of "ploughing a lonely furrow in the United Nations and at international conferences.

The efforts that India made to mediate in Korea were spurned by USA, USSR and China. But, by the end of 1952, there was a thaw. China accepted the terms of the Indian resolution which were finally adopted in June 1953, bringing the Korean war to an end. India was appointed the Chairman of the Neutral Nations Repatriation Commission in Korea.

A similar situation developed in the erstwhile states of Indo-China. In February 1954 India called for a cease fire and in April it put forward a six-point proposal which was ultimately accepted at the Geneva Conference. Again, India was appointed the Chairman of the Supervisory Commissions. It was noticed that the great powers had at first scorned and a little later tolerated,

then respected and, finally, adopted India's policy of non-alignment.

The world was eventually convinced of India's credentials. India's genuine impartiality as embodied in its policy of non-alignment was appreciated. It was found effective in obtaining international settlements.

When dealing with the Korean crisis, the three non-permanent members of the U.N. Security Council — India, Egypt and Yugoslavia — had come close to each other and became the main pillars of the non-aligned edifice as it was constructed. Prime Minister Nehru, President Gamal Abdel Nasser and Marshal Tito were the primary leaders of the non-aligned movement. Prime Minister U Nu of Burma and President Nkrumah of Ghana joined them.

WORLD-WIDE MOVEMENT

The climax was reached when Nehru, Tito and Nasser met at Brioni to launch a world-wide non-alignment movement. Tito came to India again in January 1959 and the first non-aligned Conference, with 28 nations participating, was held at Belgrade in September 1961.

A month before Nehru died, he spoke in the Lok Sabha — this was on April 13, 1964 — Nehru was ill and weak. He sought the permission of the Speaker: "May I speak sitting, Sir?" The Speaker agreed.

Prime Minister Nehru spoke slowly: "Non-alignment is a reaction to events, and more particularly, our desire to maintain our independence of thought and action a large number of newly independent countries have come into existence and most of them adhere to the policy of non-alignment. "From any point of view, it appears that non-alignment has not only succeeded in the past, but is even more desirable today".

games - certificates for which were given out at the evening diksko session.

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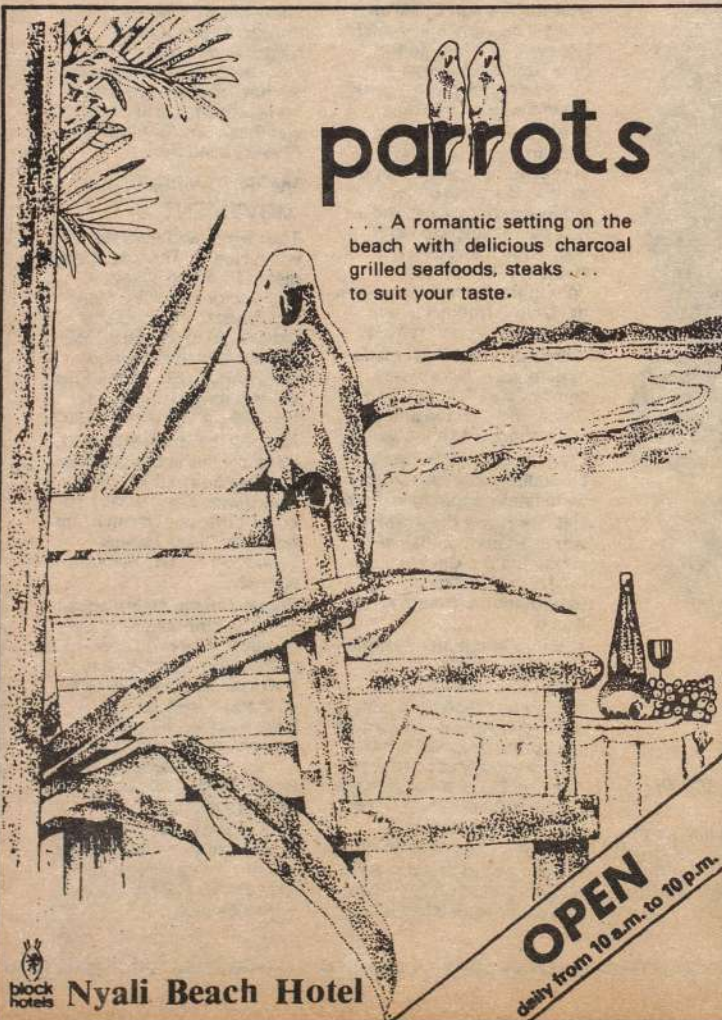
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ALS VOR 100 JAHREN DIE SKLAVEN BEFREIT WURDEN

MOMBASAS berühmte Emmauelkirche neben der Nyalibrücke, von befreiten Sklaven errichtet, die von der Kirchlichen Missionsgesellschaft in Freretown angesiedelt worden waren, feierte ihr 100jähriges Bestehen am 12. November 1989 mit einem Gedenkgottesdienst, einer neuen Orgel und in Anwesenheit mehrerer hoher kirchlicher Würdenträger aus der Küstenprovinz und aus dem Landesinnern.

Anschließend wurde eine "Harambee-Sammlung" zugunsten der Kirche durchgeführt. Eines der wichtigsten Ziele des Kirchenrates ist die Beschaffung der nötigen Gelder, um in der Kirche Lampen zu installieren, damit dort auch Abendgottesdienste abgehalten werden können.

Die Kirche, ursprünglich aus am Kisaunstrand abgelagerten Lavasteinen gebaut, ist die zweitälteste in Kenia.

Da kein Geld vorhanden war, um Baumaterialien zu kaufen, schlug der damalige Bischof Peel vor, zu beten und Gott um Hilfe zu bitten.

Am folgenden Tag, zur größten Überraschung und Freude der Gläubigen, entdeckten sie am Strand von Kisauni angeschwemmte Lavasteine. Während der nächsten drei Monate schwemmte die Flut weitere Steine an, die von den Siedlern von Freretown auf ihren Köpfen zum Bauplatz der neuen Kirche getragen wurden.

Diese Lavasteine sollen von einem Vulkanausbruch auf Krakatau in der Sundastraße zwischen Java und Sumatra stammen.

Freretown wurde im Jahre 1875 von der Kirchlichen Missionsgesellschaft (Church Missionary Society) gegründet, nachdem die Sklaverei von der damaligen Regierung in Ostafrika 1873 offiziell abgeschafft worden war.

Es war die erste Siedlung befreiter Sklaven an der Ostküste Afrikas. Hier fanden Männer und Frauen aus Malawi, Simbabwe, Sambia und Südafrika ein Heim. Da zu jener Zeit in manchen Gebieten Stammesfehden und Hungersnot herrschten, suchten später auch viele Eingeborene aus Kenia, von Stammern der Giriama, Taita-Taveta, Ukambani und Duruma, Zuflucht in Freretown und vermischten sich durch Heirat mit den ursprünglichen Siedlern.

Die geschichtlichen Hintergründe von Freretown wurden erforscht von Elkanan Young Bajila, David Mwandia (ein Lehrer) und James Mbotela, ein bekannter Journalist in Kenia.

Alle drei sind Laienprediger in der Kirche, und der letztere hat ihre gemeinsam ermittelten Forschungsergebnisse zusammenverfaßt.

Gemäß ihrer Studie wurde Sir Bartle Frere, ein früherer britischer Gouverneur von Bombay, von der britischen Regierung nach Mombasa gesandt, um die Kirchliche Missionsgesellschaft in ihren Bemühungen zu unterstützen, ein Heim für rund 300

befreite Sklaven in der Nähe von Mombasa zu errichten. Die Siedlung wurde "Freretown" genannt.

Am dringlichsten benötigten die Leute einen Versammlungsort, wo sie Gott für die Befreiung aus der Sklaverei danken konnten. Sie bauten ein provisorisches Haus, das gleichzeitig als Schule und als Kirche diente.

Als der Bischof, der in einem schönen Haus in der Nähe wohnte, das primitive Gebäude sah, soll er ausgerufen haben: "Ich kann es nicht ertragen, in einem richtigen Haus zu wohnen, solange die Leute von Freretown in einer Lehmhütte zu Gott beten müssen!" Damit war der Plan für eine bessere Kirche entstanden.

Ungefähr zur selben Zeit traf eine Gruppe von über 150 befreiten Sklaven, die von der Kirchlichen Missionsgesellschaft zwecks Erlernung eines nützlichen Handwerks nach Bombay geschickt worden waren, in Freretown ein. Sie unterrichteten andere in dem Handwerk, das sie gelernt hatten, Schreiner-, Maurer- und Druckereiarbeiten sowie verschiedene Sprachen.

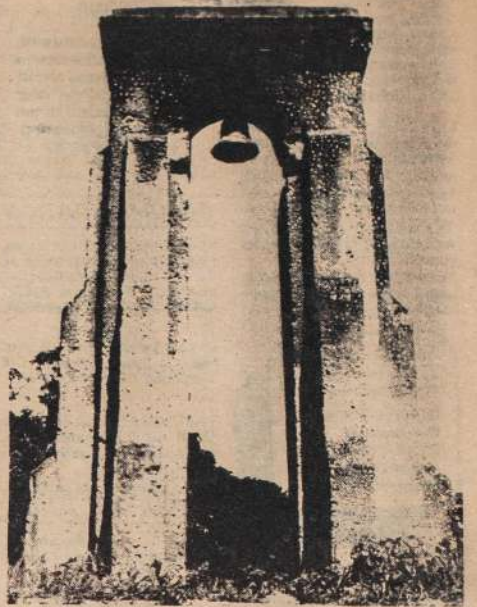
In der Emmauelkirche kann man heute noch die feinen Arbeiten dieser Pioniere sehen und bewundern. Ein interessantes Beispiel sind die Kirchenbänke und die Kanzel, die Ishmael Mochira angefertigt hat. Seine Kinder und Enkel gehen heute noch regelmäßig in diese Kirche.

HUNGERSNOT

Die Entwicklung von Freretown beschränkte sich aber nicht auf das kirchliche Gebiet. Es wurden Werkstätten errichtet zur Herstellung von Ziegeln, Backsteinen und Brettern, um auch nachbarliche Missionsstationen wie Rabai zu beliefern.

Die Kirchgemeinde hatte auch ihr eigenes Boot, die SS "Henry Wright", die monatliche Fahrten zwischen Freretown und Sansibar durchführte.

Während der Hungersnot zwischen 1880 und 1890 half die Kirche von Freretown tatkräftig

1885 begleitete Reverend William Jones, zusammen mit anderen, Bischof Hannington auf seiner Expedition nach Uganda, wo er ermordet wurde. Rev. William Jones führte die Überlebenden, die den Leichnam des Bischofs trugen, nach Freretown zurück.

Rev. William Jones war der erste Erzdiakon von Freretown, und seine Enkel und Urenkel stehen heute noch in Verbindung mit der Kirche und nehmen an ihren Aktivitäten teil.

Unter den Leuten, die den toten Bischof an die Küste zurück trugen, befand sich Mathew Wellington, ein befreiter Sklave, der aus Nyasaland stammte und sich am Ufer des Tanganjikasees angesiedelt hatte.

Wegen chronischer Geldknappheit konnte die Kirchliche Missionsgesellschaft Freretown nicht mehr weiter unterhalten.

Sie mußte das Land Anfangs der dreißiger Jahre an die Nyali Development Company verkaufen. Ein neuer Platz für die Bewohner von Freretown wurde von der kenianischen Regierung weiter nördlich von Mombasa zur Verfügung gestellt. Der Name Freretown wurde beibehalten. Jeder dieser ersten Siedler erhielt damals 1/4 Acre Land. Fast alle sind in der Zwischenzeit gestorben.

ÜBERFALL

Die Glocke, die geläutet wurde, um die Leute von Freretown vor einem bevorstehenden Überfall der nach Sklaven suchenden Araber zu warnen, hängt heute in der Kirche von Freretown, um Männer, Frauen und Kinder zum Gebet zu rufen.

Der Glockenturm wurde von den Nationalmuseen von Kenia unter Denkmalschutz gestellt und steht heute noch am ursprünglichen Platz auf der anderen Straßenseite gegenüber der Kirche, auf einer kleinen Anhöhe in der Nähe der Verkehrsampeln vor der Nyalibrücke.

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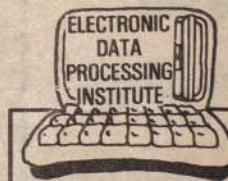
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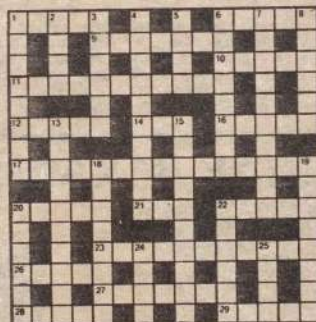

Discreet enquiries revealed that the matatu had run out of fuel about half a kilometre from the nearest petrol station.

The manamba decided to do what you and I would do if ever caught in the same predicament.

He took out a jerry can and exhorted his passengers to remain seated whilst he went to fetch some fuel. One passenger who must have been in a similar predicament before refused.

When asked why he told the other passengers of his experience in another matatu when the turnboy first took off, the driver then followed suit, ostensibly to go and look for the turnboy who was taking too long.

An hour later, the passengers now tired of waiting for this imaginary fuel had to take alternative means.

They had lost their money and had to pay again.

This story convinced the rest of the passengers and they unanimously agreed that the driver and turnboy had to remain with the matatu at all times. Other drivers would not stop to help (given the feelings most people have about matatus).

The driver and turnboy had no choice but to enlist the paid help of some passers by to push the fully loaded matatu to the nearest petrol station.

On his way back from the errand in town Kachumbari came across the matatu just turning into a petrol station to fill up. The whole journey - by matatu - took an excruciating one hour!

A similar case happened not so long ago when the rains were still in plenty. The matatu in question this time developed a puncture on a flooded main road in town.

The turnboy requested the passengers to get down so that he could change the tyre. They refused. For one it was raining heavily and secondly noone wanted to get their recently polished shoes wet.

Despite repeated pleas from the driver and turnboy the passengers stayed on board. The matatu waded down an empty matatu proceeding in the opposite direction and hoped that the passengers would agree to disembark and get into it.

They refused again since one of them had a previous experience where once they had boarded the other matatu, they were charged the full fare again.

The driver and conductor of the matatu had no option but to requisition another jack from a friendly matatu and use two jacks to lift the fully laden matatu up and change the spare tyre.

The passengers completely ignored the risks involved in changing wheels whilst they were in the vehicle although the feat was accomplished by the two kamikaze matatu guys.

As Kachumbari says, there is a certain amount of strength in numbers!

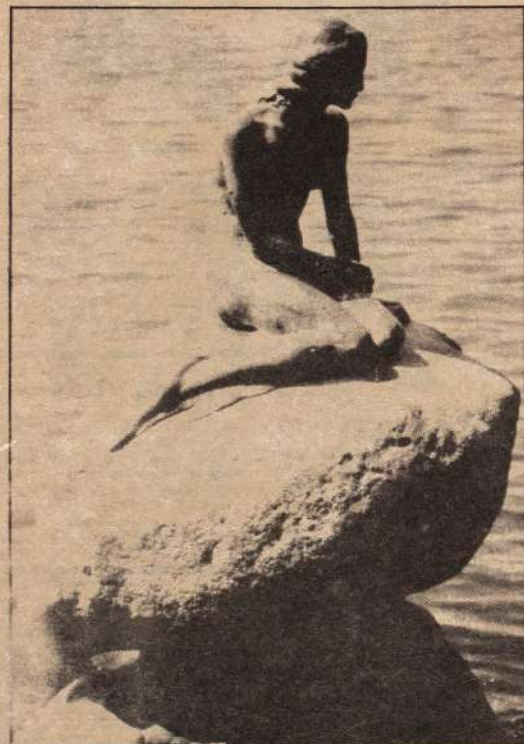
