Amidst my protestations he whipped out his newly won Highway Code of Kenya and flipped quickly through the pages and when he found the page he was looking for he ahemed loudly to attract attention and proceeded to read out the contents.

The Highway Code in Kenya surprisingly states that one Is Allowed to overtake on either side provided that the road is multi-laned and the lanes on the same side of the road are clearly divided by lines, bollards or other suitable means.

One cannot overtake on either side of a single lane road.

This led to a lot of lively discussion at the bar and it turned out that most people were not even aware that any provision for overtaking existed in the Code.

So all these limiting who like

Perhaps it is time that the Lawmakers sat down and had a long look at the code again.

Had the driver of the opposite vehicle not been alert they would have ended up as mince meat to add to the other hundreds of tonnes that have been created due to the carnage on the roads in this country.

As Kachumbari says, it is time we had a radical look at the driving laws, the enforcement of the laws and the behaviour of the people for whom the laws are made - that is Mr Average Driver.







The farm has a total of 8000 crocodiles that range in size from hatchlings to the infamous "big daddy".

"big daddy".

The crocs live in what closely resembles their natural habitat created out of a refuse dump. After mating in September, the females lay between 18 and 100 eggs each in December and January which are incubated under ideal conditions to achieve a hatching rate of 99 per cent of the fertile eggs after a further three months.

The hatchings are hard in

The hatchlings are bred in specially prepared ponds for fast growth. After two years they are slaughtered for their skin which is then exported as wet and salted hides to overseas markets.

The meat is not wasted and can be eaten as a delicacy at the restaurant.

Recently, by careful breeding, Mamba Village have scored another first by producing "white crocodiles". Far from being albinos, the whites are as a result of genetic matching.

The whites are still young and are being developed into breeding stock for the anticipated market for white crocodile skin.

It is of interest to know that the crocs at the village are fresh water Nile crocodiles and exposure to salt water would kill them in a space of one hour.

Feeding of the crocodiles takes place at 5.00 p.m. daily.

One can then feed on coordile meat at the restaurant of they so wish or at one of the leading restaurants in Kenya who now feature crocodile meat on their menus.


