The Swinging Islanders Are Back With A Super Musical Entertainment

MOMBASA'S popular and evergreen youth choir, "The Swinging Islanders" under the slowing down baton of "Mzee", Fr. Eddie Corcoran, are all set for their next "Musical".

This will in fact be the 21st Birthday Show of the choir which, originally known as "The Swinging Stars", first took the stage in Mombasa in 1969.

The early Shows were of the Concert Variety Programme sort — the choir just stood and sang! As it gathered strength, momentum and confidence, Fr. Eddie took the plunge into the world of "Musicals" in 1976 with Joseph's Dreamcoat; this was followed by The Mikado Fiddler on the Root, Smike and Sound of Music.

After an absence of a few

After an absence of a few years behind a desk in Rome, the spiritually rejuvenated Father turned to producting Biblical Musicals Such productions as Its Cool in the Furnace, Holy Moses and Beautiful Esther, Little Big Lunch etc. proved to be very popular.

very popular.

They contained good stories and the music had a variety of modern beats which suited this particular choir who like to swing while they sing!

Last year the choir went back to Gilbert and Sullivan and produced a hilarious Pirates of Mtwapa Creek, based, of course on those of Penzance.

For their forthcoming show.

For their forthcoming show, the girls have gone back to the Bible and are producing a Double Bill.

The first is Dan 'n de Lion which is a "flowery" account of Daniel's ordeal waiting to be devoured in the Lion's Den. The main character-narrator is the Lion himself (or should it be herself?)

This role is played by Irene Komora who will bring to it the same deadpan facial expression she kept as the police-sergeant in The Pirates which caused COASTWER'S Theatre Critic to say that Irene "stole the show".

The music is beautifully reminiscent of Hebrew melodies at times, and at other times is funny or melancholic as the situation demands.

The second Musical is: A Story-Telling Man and can only be described as a brilliant retelling in modern music of some of our favourite stories from the mouth of Jesus in the Gospels.

We have the tormented house-wife turning her house upside down frantically searching for her lost coin while the choir chides her: "Coin, Coin, it's only a coin; why do you worry and why do you fret?

We have the troubled shep-herd who leaves the other 99 sheep to find the poor little one which is lost.

which is lost.

We have what has been described as the most perfect short story in literature - The Prodigal Son. This young upstart is played a la Elvis Presley by Joan Ndila, while her sister, Blandia plays the patient father ... and what a pair they make!

The tempo for the son's song is marked: "Hard Rock" - and that gives the choir plenty of scope for their gyrations.

The story of The Cood Samaritan is told with the striking title: Beaten Up on the Highway, and is told in modern language and style, starting off with strident music giving the effect of hearing a dozen matatus with horns blaring altogether!

After showing the "mugging" of a respectable citizen, we hear such words as: "Something must be done we must make it safe to walk the streets at night lighting, law and order, good crime fighting, law and order, good crime fighting let's get together, lend a helping hand ... we'll stamp out violence, make corruption cease, we will guarantee to all life and health and peace" and other such straight from the shoulder phrases.





Corrupt Foreigners Are Smuggling Out Minerals And Gemstones This involvement by non citizens deprives Tanzanians, wealth which should actually be attributed to them and the Chamber of Commerce suggested that businesses such as duty free shops, consultancy services,

WITH TANZANIA spending millions of shillings on expatriates and because foreigners are involved in sensitive areas of internal trade in some cases, the Government is losing its inborn wealth through smuggling of its resources.

In some cases the expatriates are really needed and the foreigners involved in internal trade actually help to promote the local economy but in many cases the outsiders are actually out to make some quick money through unscrupulous activities.

As a matter of fact the rule should be that all internal trade should be exclusively done by nationals except where the foreign party is providing economics of scale beneficient to the local economy.

The trend for citizens to run internal trade is worldwide and by restricting the home market from aliens, the govern-ment will actually be doing well to improving the welfare of indigenous traders.

In June this year, for the same reason, the Tanzania Chamber of Commerce, Industry and Agriculture requested the Government to come up with a list of non-national traders and description of their trade and to determine if their business ventures could be taken over by citizens.

The Chamber then particularly asked the Government to examine in detail whether the procedures followed in the issue of the operating rights to foreigners, serve the interest of the nation for now and for the future.

It is no secret that some foreign traders have invaded the home market and to some extent have even paralysed the national economy through evident involvement in the smuggling of minerals and the like.

Besides invading petty businesses the foreigners are involved in a number of local assignments which nationals could do.

SENEGALESE

For instance there are many Senagalese and Zaireans working in gold and gemstone mining, the minerals which are then subsequently smuggled out of the country.

There are others who make use of the country's trade liberalisation.

These bring in items from outside the country and sell them at sky high prices locally and eventually transfer the money out to their home countries.

transport, insurance agencies, essential goods importation under the liberalisation and the like should be left for Tanzanian nationals to control.

By involving citizens in the running of internal trade, the economy will be more stabilised and more employment opportunities will be created thereby raising morale amongst the people and will also help in controlling the unscrupulous outflow of natural resources

Actually in most countries foreigners are subject to rigorous scrutiny before being allowed to operate businesses and very often applications are rejected.

Certainly its time a similar set-up is incorporated here.
