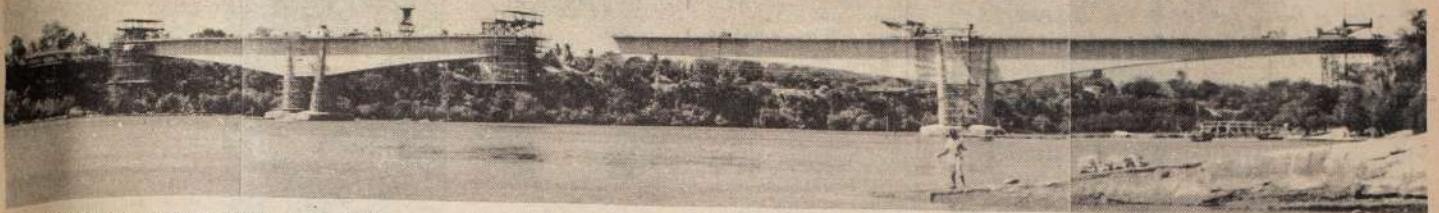

JUST INCHES AWAY FROM THE 'BIG KISS' ... ACROSS KILIFI CREEK ...



CONSTRUCTION WORK continues apace on the new multi-lane highway bridge that will soon span the Kilifi Creek, linking Mombasa and the Kenya North Coast with Kilifi and Malindi. Final completion date is set for mid-1991 when supplementary earth-works and approach roads have been finished by local contractors. In the meantime traffic must continue to suffer the inadequacies, delays, irritation and general confusion that appears to constantly afflict the over-burdened ferry services.

A 'Glass Coffin' For The Skeleton

FORT JESUS Museum's much photographed skeleton has now been enclosed in glass over which is makuti roof to give protection against sun and rain. Mystery continues to surround it while results of laboratory tests on small pieces (no larger than a match head) are awaited. Said Dr George Abungu, Head Coastal Archaeologist 'because of public interest we have left the skeleton exposed for the time being. It is well protected and people can have a good view of it'. Adding 'eventually we shall have to re-bury it for to maintain it on show will cost a lot of money'.

It has yet to be determined if the remains are that of a man or woman.

The body is thought to have received a Christian burial. At the moment it is not possible to give the exact date of when this took place.

However, from associated material which includes Chinese blue and white, also Indian red ceramics, it is possible to give a tentative date of between the late 16th or early 17th centuries.

Adjacent to the skull was found a double cross made of bronze which is thought to have been originally wrapped in cloth. It is too early to say if the two are associated. It is learned that such crosses were quite common in Spain and Portugal during the 16th and 17th century.

The skeleton was excavated at Fort Jesus Museum early January 1990 and work carried out to strengthen the fragile bones.

It was a worker at the museum who initially noticed a ring like concrete structure protruding from the eroding ground. It was excavated and found to be a skull. On further excavation an entire skeleton was revealed. It is the first complete skeleton to be found there.

SAM MWAURA has been elected Chairman of the Kenya Association of Tour Operators during its annual general meeting.

Other officials elected in the office include Wanguhu Ng'ang'o as Elected member, Gideon Kago as Elected member, Richard Hedges - Elected member, Steven Kamuyu - Elected member, Mia Dunford - Co-opted member and Nigam Aresen - Co-opted member.

Richard Hedges, Peter Muiruri, Joe Pereira, Mike Wylie, Shabudeen Pradhan and S.A. Hassan, were also elected to serve on the Ethics and Standards Sub-Committee, whose terms of reference are enshrined in the Association's Code of Conduct.

The Chairman called on the small and up-coming Tour Operators to take advantage of the existing new rules of the Association as a result of amendment of the Constitution to allow small tour operators to join the Association in the Associate category under reduced annual subscription fees.

All members of this Association are bound by the rigid rules of their own Code of Conduct. Currently, the Association membership stands at 170 strong and it is hoped that more Tour Operators will join the Association in order to make it even stronger.

With the various problems that Tourism suffers from time to time, up-coming Tour Operators are bound to benefit more by joining the Association and learning from the experience of more established members.

The smaller Tour Operators will also get a chance of addressing the Government on matters of concern through a forum which the Association currently enjoys.

The Government has been very supportive of the Association in its efforts to achieve its objectives which are:

- To provide a Forum for Government licensed Tour Operators in Kenya.
- To provide a voice for the Tour Operating sector of the Tourist trade in its dealings with Government Ministries and other professions and trades connected with travel and tourism.
- To encourage the advancement of tourism within Kenya and to improve the standard of service offered by Kenyan Tour Operators.
- To promote Kenya as prime destination in all travel markets worldwide, and
- To up-hold the business ethics of the Travel profession. It is hoped that this support will continue in future.

EXAMS SUCCESS FOR OSHWAL ACADEMY

OSHWAL ACADEMY entered 36 candidates in this year's University of London Overseas 'A' level examination and most of the students obtained excellent results.

Now 17 students have become eligible for university admission in the United Kingdom by getting grade 'C' and above in two or more subjects. The Academy obtained an overall result of 86 per cent pass.

The most outstanding students were Avani Manshukhlal Shah, Bhavesh Keshavji Shah, Dipen Shantilal Shah, Rashna Dodhia, all obtaining two 'A's and one 'B' each out of a possible three 'A's.

Excellent results were recorded in Maths (100 per cent), Physics (90 per cent), Chemistry (81.25 per cent), Biology (88.9 per cent), Accounts (100 per cent) and Economics (68.4 per cent). Qualitatively Mathematics outshone other subjects with nine 'A's, 11 'B's, two 'C's, five 'D's and six 'E's.

The headmaster Mr M.N. Joseph considered that the results were excellent considering that this was the first time that Oshwal Academy entered students for 'A' levels.

He congratulated the staff on their dedication to work and the students on their diligence and hardwork.

Well-Wishers Helping Lamu Fire Victims With Cash And Clothing

VICTIMS of the horrendous fire which damaged or destroyed 338 homes on Faza Island in the Lamu Archipelago at the end of June are slowly recovering.

With the help of families and friends some have been able to re-build their homes—but the majority continue to need help having lost most of their lifetime possessions and lack the financial means to rehabilitate themselves.

Ali Abubaker, Curator of Fort Jesus Museum who, together with the Muslim Education Welfare Association (MEWA) has been assisting the District Commissioner, Lamu, in the mammoth task of collecting the goods and money to help the people there, said that the DC Lamu had set up a Faza Fire Disaster Committee on which are represented prominent Lamu leaders. An appeal has been sent to many people in Kenya.

Mr Abubaker said they had received a lot of clothing through the MEWA office, as well as from other organisations, while some schools had donated books for children who had lost theirs in the fire.

He said that the Provincial Administration, Coast, and Muslim organisations are assisting in whatever way they can, but there still remains a great need for building materials and household goods.

Dr George Abungu, Head Coastal Archaeologist, said that

while the response to his illustrated talk on Faza had not been very good, a few days later ten Muslim girls from the Coast Girls High School had come along with two teachers to present money and clothes.

The first hotel to respond to an appeal for help was Nyal

Beach Hotel which gave MEWA 500 used bed sheets and 300 towels.

Said Mr Abubaker 'we understand that the DC Lamu and his team are planning to hold a very big Harambee to assist the people of Faza. We hope it will be a great success.

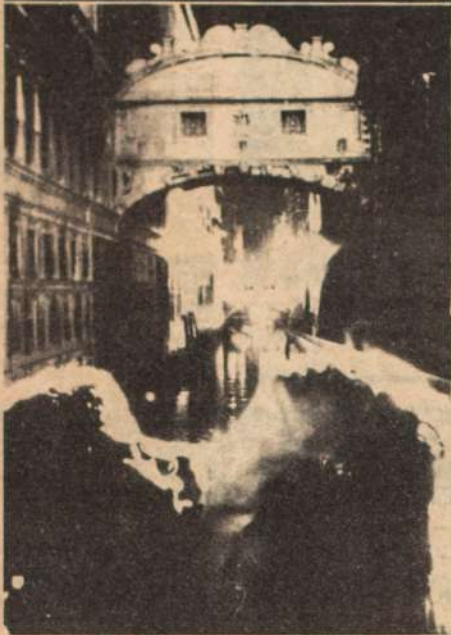

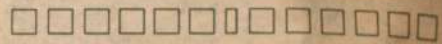

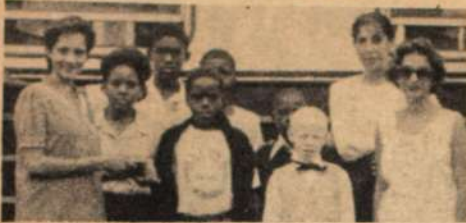

Mombasa To Host Regional Centre For 'Archeology'

MOMBASA — the second largest town in Kenya — has been chosen as the venue for a Regional Centre on 'Urban Origins in Eastern and Southern Africa' which is being set up in the Old Law Courts next to Fort Jesus Museum.

The Old Law Courts were gazetted as a National Monument in 1985.

Dr George Abungu, Head of Coastal Archaeology, National Museums of Kenya, is now based there.

The two rooms set aside for this Regional Centre have already been painted, and furniture and equipment (including computers) are going in.

At the Centre special emphasis will be laid on Technician Training—especially in illustration, pottery, analysis, photography, survey, conservation of archaeological material, architectural conservation, coring, soil sampling and phosphate testing.

Swedish students will also be encouraged to participate as well as Swedish experts who can provide training and expertise.

Each country will be funding its own trainees.

To help start the centre SAREC (Swedish Agency for Research Co-operation with Developing Countries) has already approved a sum of Shs half million towards it.

The setting up of the Centre precedes the ending of a very successful four year project of inter-regional co-operation named 'Urban Origins in Eastern and Southern Africa'. It was sponsored by SAREC through the Swedish Central Board of Antiquities.

In 1986, scholars from the region covering Somalia, Kenya, Tanzania (mainland and

country have taken place where papers and thoughts were presented and discussed; and by monographs by the various scholars which are published in Sweden.

Mombasa is one of the oldest towns in the region dating to slightly over 1,000 years.

Fort Jesus is the second largest museum in Kenya and its facilities include departments of archaeology, conservation and education. All along the coast are ruined Swahili settlements, one of which (13th century Mtwapa) will be incorporated into the Centre as a field school for practical work.

Kenya received 43,000 Italians while during 1989 46,000 visitors came from the country.

Earlier a spokesman of the group Ms Novella Calligaris had thanked Kenyans for their hospitality. She singled out the police force which she said gave them all the assistance needed.

Present was the Italian ambassador to Kenya Mr Renato Volpini, Deputy Secretary Ministry of Tourism Mr Chomba the Managing Director, Agip Mr G. Carbone, and the Seychelles Consulate to Kenya Mr J. Antoine who is also with Agip.

Since 1981 the museum's Conservation and Archaeology Departments have been conducting regional training courses and workshops for Museum personnel not only in Kenya but other countries in Africa.

Dr George Abungu has done much travelling on the SAREC project. In an interview in his new office in Mombasa's Old Law Courts he said 'we have been having conferences each year in a member country to hear what the different scholars have done. Two have taken place in Kenya—one in Nairobi, and a small workshop at Mombasa.'

TANZANIA

The next conference takes place in Tanzania during January.

He said 'we have all gained much from this project and wanted to continue working together. We decided we could best do this by establishing a Regional Centre.'

Adding Dr Abungu with a laugh 'we managed to convince

everyone that Mombasa would be the ideal venue where we have one of the best conservation laboratories in Southern Sahara, as well as a good library which we plan to expand, also a well developed Department of Archaeology.

He anticipates the first intake of students to be in September.

Dr Abungu left recently to spend five days in Mozambique after which he will be flying to Venezuela to attend a conference. He will then be going on to the UK and probably to Sweden where he hopes to obtain some necessary equipment for the Regional Centre.

He declared 'we want it to start as soon as possible.'

His department is presently also heavily engaged on surveying and mapping archaeological excavations on the Kenya Coast. It has just finished this work on the south coast (from Vanga to Mombasa) and in September will be starting on the north coast right to the Somali border.

Said Dr Abungu the Kenya coast has hundreds of sites.

About 98 are listed in various books but, he added 'the ones we know of number over 120 and we are still finding new ones. 'Around the Tana Delta' he revealed 'there are some 15 sites, some much larger than Jumba in Kilifi District.'

ENTERTAINMENT of guests is one of the outstanding moral qualities. The nations who possess a larger share of this moral quality take pride in it and it's justified that they should feel proud.

It is said that among the numerous moral instructions given by the holy Prophet Muhammad (S.A.W.) to his beloved daughter Fatima, one was to this effect: *It is necessary for a person who believe in God and the last day to keep his guests dear to his heart.*

Islam safeguarded the personality of a new visitor or a guest and explicitly says that he is not a burden on the family (that is host), but he has come a long with his own sustenance and he is a blessing which is brought to the family.

The holy Prophet has said: *A guest is a guide who leads to the path of paradise.* And again he says *When God wishes to do good to a family he sends a gift to it. That gift is a guest who comes with his sustenance and carries away the sins of the family. A guest never comes to the family except that he brings his sustenance with himself.*

The holy Prophet took a special interest in showing hospitality to others and entertaining them. Hospitality was shown to all guests, irrespective of their creed and all of them, whether Jew or Christians, were afforded due to respect and entertainment.

This good treatment made many of unbelievers embrace Islam. Even his companions followed the same steps and at times they went hungry themselves but entertaining their guests properly.

Once the holy Prophet was approached by a man who complained about hunger. He sent someone to his house to bring food for that man, but

He then turned his face to those present and said, *who from amongst you is prepared to entertain this guest tonight?*

One of his companions called Sayyidina Ali stood and replied: *O Prophet I take the responsibility of this task.*

Then he held the hand of that man and took him to his house. He asked his wife, Lady Fatima *how much food do you have in the house?* She replied: *Only a small quantity of food is available which will suffice our children.*

Sayyidina Ali said: *We must prefer to our guest to ourselves and our children.* Fatima made the children to sleep and her husband carried the food to the guest and put out the lamp on the pretext on setting it right.

In the darkness they all together sat down and began eating. Actually the companion was not eating. He just gave an impression to the guest that he too was busy eating. The guest ate to his satisfaction.

Well, Islam has prescribed some special rules and manners regarding the entertainment of guests. The Prophet said: *The host should begin eating first and should finish it last of all so that the guests may eat with complete freedom and get satisfied.*

Busy Period For Port Handling Bulk Cargo

SEVERAL THOUSAND tons of various cargo are expected at the port of Mombasa in the next fortnight as over 44 ships are listed to dock within the period.

According to the Kenya Ports Authority's list of expected vessels in 14 days released today, two of the vessels are expected to take advantage of the dry dock facilities within the port area to mount some repairs.

M.V. Tabora, on charter by the Kenya National Shipping

Line Limited, docked mid-week at the container terminal with 506 containers to discharge and 456 others to load while m.v. Aliadrinki also berthed to discharge 750 tons of wheat flour and load 5,700 tons of cowpeas and cotton seed cake at the general cargo area.

The Kanu party newspapers, the Kenya Times is to receive a total of 296 tons of rolled paper (news print) from the ship m.v. Arktis Bay.

Among the cargo to be loaded are soda ash, cattle, camels, hay, cement and several items of agricultural produce.

Cargo to be discharged includes 10,000 tons of bulk wheat from aboard m.v. Yarab, heavy machinery, coils, lubricating oil, motor cars, jute, steel pipes, frozen fish, frozen meat and 10,000 tons of sugar from m.v. Almalik.

Meanwhile, m.v. al Johia continues to discharge her 14000 tons of bulk wheat which is simultaneously being bagged for loading on to railway wagons and lorries.

Also still loading her 14000 tons of Hourspur in the port is m.v. Net Sarat.

m.v. Leone is still at berth loading a large volume of 14000 tons of soda ash.

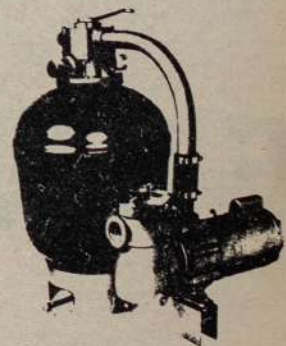

WIE AUF EINEM fliegenden Teppich, aber nicht über, sondern unter dem Indischen Ozean, schwebt Maja Riedl - Direktorin von Scuba Diving Kenya Ltd. - auf einem riesigen Walhai durch die Gewässer von Watamu.

Zusammen mit ihrem Mann Lorenz führt sie dieses beliebte Taucher-Zentrum, das von vielen Taucherguppen aus U.S.A., Großbritannien und Europa besucht wird.

Die beiden haben auch die Verhaltensweise von Walhaien und Teufelsrochen erforscht und dabei mindestens 500 Fotos aufgenommen. "Wir wissen jetzt genau, wann sie zum Spielen aufgelegt sind und wann nicht," sagt Lorenz.

Walhaie können 10 bis 15 m lang werden. Beim Betrachten der Fotos, auf denen Maja einen Walhai am Maul und der Rückenflosse festhält, rufen viele Besucher überrascht aus: "Das sieht ja nach einer Liebeserklärung aus!" Wenn man dann Maja ohne die Taucherausrüstung sieht, kann

ihre Freunde geworden sind. Sie waren sehr bestürzt, als sie kürzlich feststellen mußten, daß zwei Teufelsrochen starben, als sie sich in den Netzen verfangen, die von den Fischern zum Fangen von Haien ausgelegt worden waren.

Maja kommt aus der Schweiz, Lorenz aus Bayern. In Deutschland wurde er zum Tauchlehrer ausgebildet und erforschte seit 1954 als Taucher deutsche Seen, den Atlantischen Ozean und das Mittelmeer.

Seit 16 Jahren taucht er im Indischen Ozean. In Kenia begann er als Tauchlehrer im Watamu Beach Hotel des African Safari Clubs, dann führte er während zwei Jahren das Wassersportzentrum im Seahorse, Kilifi.

1981 kehrte er nach Watamu zurück, um seine eigene Tauchschule zu eröffnen, die ständig wächst und nun über Ausrüstungen für 120 Taucher und 7 Boote verfügt.

Lorenz ist der Ansicht, daß die besten Tauchergünde Kenias in Watamu zu finden sind, wo von Oktober bis Ende Dezember das Wasser am klarsten ist und die beste Sicht bietet. Die größten Fische sind gewöhnlich von Mitte Januar bis Mitte Februar zu sehen.

Wer dort Tauchunterricht nimmt, kann den Kurs mit einem Zertifikat von Scuba Diving Kenya Limited abschließen oder nach den Bestimmungen von Padi, Nauti, Vit, Mas und Bsac.

Scuba Diving Kenya Ltd. hat

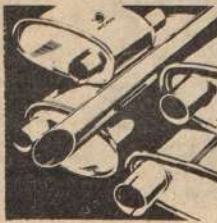

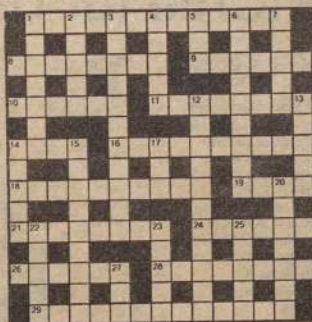

What lures a 23 old woman to the tension-filled tracks of rallying? "Its the excitement and involvement in a fast-paced event," Mair responds. A navigator must make instant decisions based on split-second calculations.

During the occasional maintenance stops the hectic pace continues. She works under constant pressure with never a moment to spare.

The dynamic redhead waited several years for her lucky break into the profession. A thoughtful tip from girlfriend Lynn Marote alerted her that the driver for Kilimanjaro Mineral Waters, Robert Linck, needed a navigator.

The partnership of Linck and Mair has been successful. The strains on both individuals are

great. They manage their cooperative duo because "we just got on well," Mair explains. A woman in this predominantly male sport might be fair game for discrimination. Mair cannot recall ever feeling at a disadvantage because of her

Zimbabwe challenge. This competition scheduled for August 16-19 is one segment of the African Rally Championships involving six host nations. Mair will be the only woman ever to represent Kenya in this rally. Financing

sex. Feminism and women's liberation are issues Mair has no strong views about. Overall, being a woman has presented

When this active woman is not navigating she is busy running her own interior decorating company. She is a third generation Kenyan who left her homeland only once, to pursue horseback riding instruction in the United Kingdom. That career offered few financial rewards, and so she gave it up after her father's death several years ago.

Her greatest dream is to win the Safari Rally. This ambitious goal may be unattainable she admits. Winners of this prestigious competition possess first-class skills and enormous financial backing. The next major rally in which she plans to compete is the

GOOD PUBLIC RELATIONS IS KEY ...

AUTOMOTIVE goods manufacturers tend to be very careful when they are involved in dealing with the public.

In the first instance, although they seem to a small number, they are chasing a relatively small number of people who have the wherewithal to play ball.

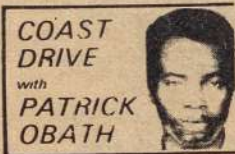
The situation is the same the world over. All that is different is that the economic powers of the public is very diverse and in some instances they have a rather better choice of vehicle and the manufacturer is also free to put together a vehicle to suit the pocket of its intended customer.

Beginning with one of the then cheaper vehicle the VW beetle. It was meant to be a people's car, hence the name Volks (folks or peoples) wagen (wagon or car).

The idea was to be build a

car that would get one from A to B without too much fuss. At the time that was launched that market had very little choice on which car was available - the economy dictated the choice.

There were other makes but a



lot of the people couldn't afford them.

In other country one fellow who was later knighted also had a brilliant idea and came up with his concept of the people's wagon.

Because of the market he was aiming at it couldn't be called anything similar to the Volks - so he chose something in keeping with the staid nature of the populace and called it a "Mini".

It was supposed to be able to take you round cheaply and have the maximum amount of space in it.

If you look at an original version of the vehicle you will understand why these pioneering mass availability vehicles were designed the way they were.

In the early days you just churned it out and people bought - quality was just beginning to set in.

As the years went by, people started getting choosy and the motor manufacturers had to start paying attention to the market demands.

High tech innovations very quickly began finding their way into cars. Extensive testing of new concepts was necessary prior to unleashing that technology on a more discerning public.

The game of perks and public image had began.

The thing is that it did not matter which part of the world you went to try and sell your product, it would not take very long before the local populace wised themselves up on what you had to offer and started exercising their choice on what type of vehicle to buy.

If the choice was limited then a good trade would establish itself in either stolen vehicles or illegally acquired ones (yes there is a difference in the two statements!)

Now the choice has been honed down such that some people will not even consider a car that has no airconditioning

Others will only consider it if it has a five speed gearbox and so forth and so on.

The manufacturer who can offer people the greatest degree of flexibility within their product range is bound to win a lot of customers.

The only thing one has to watch is that the components within that flexibility match each other and are complimentary in contributing towards a common goal - customer satisfaction.

The best thing that one gets when the goals do not match is a few irate drivers visiting

your workshop or sales office (this depends on whether the defect is noticed early or late).

If they are not satisfied they will start bad mouthing that particular brand, initially to their friends.

If they find other kith or kin who have had a similar problem they will then start putting pressure on the manufacturer either directly or through some authoritative magazine, radio programme or similar medium that will reach the widest public in a bid to embarrass the manufacturer into some kind of action.

Most manufacturers would respond when the pressure was applied by public media.

Kachumbari tells me a brand of petrol that was launched in Europe and some parts of the Far East.

The manufacturer made some fantastic claims about the fuel.

When things began to go wrong it took a bit of time for them to realise.

When they did they built up a mighty public relations campaign that those who had suffered from using that fuel had to take their hats off in admiration at the brilliant way in which that company repaired the damage that had been done to its reputation as a quality conscious supplier.

As Kachumbari says, in this day and age things will go wrong and when they do, the public relations is the key thing that will restore customer confidence in the product range.
