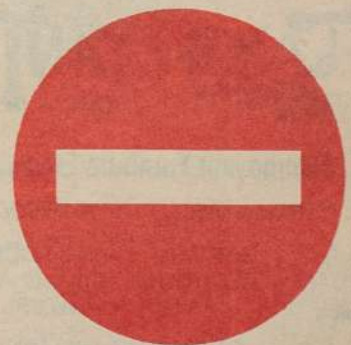

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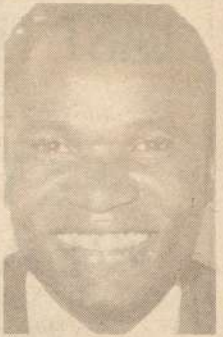

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The Black Consciousness Movement

RIVERBEND which starts on Sunday at Lotus Cinema is set during the height of the Black Consciousness movements which invoked the black power slogans. It was also a period that saw the burning and destruction of cities in the industrial Northern United States.

The setting is in Georgia, United States of America, in 1966. The town of Riverbend is a compartmentalized city. The

respect for blacks whom he frequently refers to as negroes, the loathed word by the blacks. He kills or orders their killing over flimsy excuses.

The film sets off by Jake shooting down a limping and harmless black. And although everybody else wonders why he did it, Jake has the audacity of saying that he was "resisting arrest".

In the meantime, an army deserter, Major Quinton (Steve James), has arrived in the town to seek refuge. He lands in a house owned by one Elizabeth Bell (Margaret Avery). They

strike a friendship and after a time, Quinton hatches a plan from here on how to take over the town.

He therefore trains a group of black youths resident in the town. This he does in an isolated camp in the nearby bush. After the training and just before the commencement of the mission, Quinton cautions them against certain acts.

Killing, for instance, should be a last resort. Any act of violence must be extremely necessary. Even the sheriff should not be touched. And to prove the seriousness of this, he reprimands the adventurous Tony (Julius Tennon) when he orders the sheriff and the mayor to have a duel.

Riverbend is an emotional motion picture which most Kenyan theatre-goers can

identify with. It is also reminiscent of a few years ago South Africa where leaders were

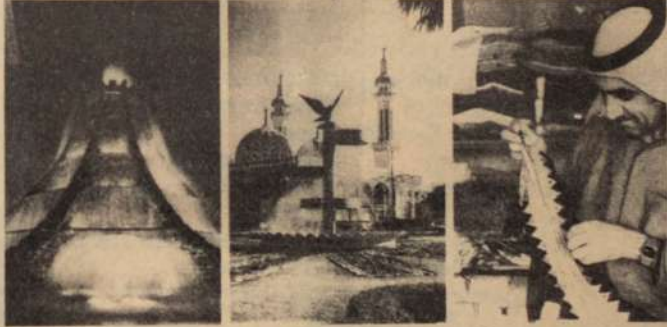

Finance Minister Lashes Out At Abyssmal Parastatal Controllers

THE TANZANIA MINISTER FOR FINANCE, Steve Kibona told accountants from the country's various parastatals and government institutions that the reason why the government always found itself in budget shortfalls is that most accountants are buying too much irrespective of the revenue earned by their respective organisations.

The Minister said this when closing a week long seminar for government accountants that was held last week at the Arusha International Conference Centre. He termed this practice of spending beyond one's means as unprofessional and said it should stop immediately.

The right manner to handle undue deficits, he said, would be to send flash messages to his Ministry of any imminent shortfalls or of prevalent deficits.

The Finance Minister also desired the practice by Government accountants of issuing

cheques that subsequently bounce and said that such employees would now be treated sternly to an extent that they would also be declared redundant.

According to Kibona, his Ministry has already sent a circular to all banks with instructions that no cheques should be cashed for account in the red until the Ministry gives its consent.

Formerly Government Institutions used to arrange overdraft facilities that allowed uncontrolled expenditure that eventually had to be met by the treasury.

According to the Minister, banks that still honour such transactions will now be doing so at their own risk because his Ministry has absolved itself of any liability to this effect.

The Minister accentuated the crucial role that government accountants has towards the national aim of budget deficits and plugging out of an external debt dependent budget.

He cited that the country's 1990-91 budget has a deficit of about 60 billion shillings and that when local avenues were sought to fill in the gap, only 1.2 billion shillings could be ratified.

Under the present system, most supplies are procured by the central government stores which then distributes them to the needy government institutions. The aim of this central buying is to ensure that proper goods are bought by the central stores and that goods are not over-priced.

However the function of the central stores has proved questionable and many feel that private organisations of the government should be permitted to buy directly from the suppliers.

The central stores buying system is time consuming and at times uneconomical and because the stores has to cater for the requirements of many public firms it orders in lump sums with shortages arising. The goods are required by many firms and big pile-ups if firms do not need the items.

High Invoicing to Government

On the other side however, leaving the buying to individual firms would leave the government vulnerable to high invoicing but if the present measures of restricting spending are implemented correctly then the firms will have an automatic internal control that will control expenditure.

It is for this reason that many think that government firms should be allowed autonomy. The theory is, spend within your means to earn projected revenue.

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

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Mombasas Altstadt unter Denkmalschutz

NACHDEM DIE historische Altstadt von Mombasa viele Jahre lang vernachlässigt worden ist, gibt es nun ein Restaurierungsprogramm, ähnlich wie das zur Zeit in Lamu durchgeführte Konservierungsprojekt.

Der willkürliche Abbruch wichtiger, alter Gebäude wird damit unverzüglich gestoppt. Reparaturen oder Erweiterungen der Häuser sollen gemäß den aufgestellten Richtlinien erfolgen, um den Charakter der Altstadt zu bewahren. Dabei wird auch der Zustand der Straßen, die Errichtung öffentlicher Plätze und Anlagen berücksichtigt.

Das von UNESCO gesponsorte Team, Donatella Procesi und Joe King, hat den Restaurierungsplan für die Altstadt ausgearbeitet und dem Stadtplanungsbüro den bezüglichen Bericht mit Zeichnungen und Plänen der Gebäude sowie mit Restaurierungs- und Verbesserungsvorschlägen übergeben.

Eine Reihe von Seminaren wurde im Fort Jesus Mitte Juli abgehalten, um den Bewohnern

Fotos und Illustrationen zu besichtigen.

Die geschützte Zone ist der eigentliche Stadtkern am Südostende der Altstadt, umfaßt rund 31 Hektar und entspricht ziemlich genau dem Stadtgebiet, das innerhalb von den Portugiesen errichteten Mauer lag. Heute sind nur noch geringe Spuren dieser Stadtmauer zu finden.

Wegen ihrer historischen Bedeutung wurden noch einige weitere Gebiete wie Piggot Place,

Treasury Square, das alte Gerichtsgebäude und das Fort Jesus in das Konservierungsprojekt miteingeschlossen.

Obwohl sich 1989 rund 500.000 Touristen an der kenianischen Küste aufhielten, haben nur 103.919 (26 Prozent) das Fort Jesus besucht. Darüber hinaus verzeichnete das Fort 104.294 einheimische Besucher.

Die Altstadt wird von den

unregelmäßig. Manche dieser Häuser haben geschnitzte Türen, daneben ebenfalls Barazas, Außentreppe, wenn die Gebäude später aufgestockt wurden, und wunderschöne Balkone, die Geländer aus Holz geschnitten oder kunstvolle Schmiedearbeit.

Auf einem Bummel durch die Altstadt von Mombasa sieht man viele interessante alte Gebäude, darunter auch Zeugen einer deutschen Vergangenheit.

Vor dem Fort Jesus stehen zwei Kanonen, die eine von dem Torpedoboot H.M.S. Pegasus, die andere von dem deutschen Kreuzer Königsberg. Während dem 1. Weltkrieg hatte die Königsberg die Aufgabe, den Indischen Ozean für Handelschiffe unsicher zu machen. Am 20. September 1914 beschoß und versenkte sie die Pegasus, die sich zwecks Reparatur im Hafen von Sansibar aufhielt.

Die Königsberg wurde dann von englischen Kriegsschiffen im Rufiji-Delta in Tansania während zehn Monaten blockiert, bis die Besatzung schließlich die Kanonen

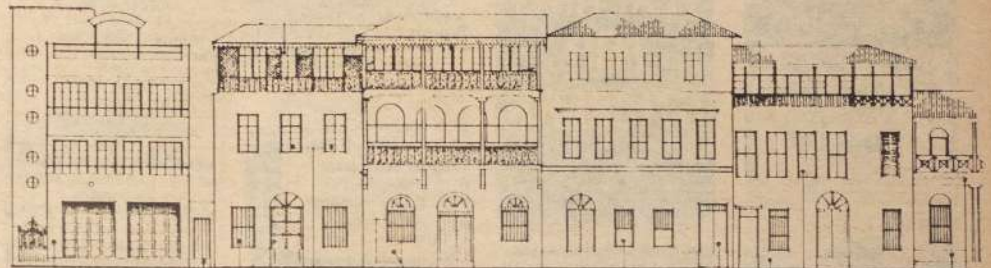
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Co., eine deutsche Import/Exportfirma. Ein Herr Hübner arbeitete hier als Kassierer für die Banken von Indien, China und Australien, deren Agentur seine Firma übernommen hatte. Er amtierte auch als deutscher Honorarkonsul. Die Zahl 1931 an der Fassade bedeutet das Jahr der Renovierung. Heute ist in diesem Haus eine Schnitzerei und Möbelwerkstatt.

Hinter dem Government Square (dem freien Platz beim Alten Dhauhafen) befindet sich das Leven House. Das eher unscheinbare Gebäude verdankt seine Bedeutung den berühmten Persönlichkeiten, die dort wohnten. Das Haus gehörte ursprünglich

der Altstadt Zweck und Ziel des Mombasa Konservierungsplanes zu erklären. Karten und Fotos der Region wurden gezeigt und die Bewohner aufgefordert, irgendwelche Fragen oder Bedenken zu äußern. Es wurde befürchtet, daß die Kosten für eine Restaurierung höher zu stehen kommen als ein Neubau.

In diesem Zusammenhang wurde jedoch darauf hingewiesen, daß eine Renovierung nach alten Methoden unter Verwendung traditioneller Baumaterialien - Korallenkalk anstatt Zement, Holzrahmen für die Fenster, anstelle der teuren importierten Stahlrahmen - gar nicht soviel kostet.

Einschränkungen bezüglich der Modernisierung im Innern der Gebäude gibt es kaum, solange die Fassade bestehen bleibt. Es ist zu hoffen, daß die Hausbesitzer in der Altstadt mit der Stadtverwaltung zusammenarbeiten und die Gebäude reparieren, um die Wohnverhältnisse für die Mieter zu verbessern.

Zur Zeit ist im Fort Jesus Museum unter den Arkaden eine Ausstellung mit Auszügen aus dem Konservierungsplan, mit

Touristen jeweils nur kurz besucht. Leider gibt es dort keine einladenden Plätze zum Verweilen. Eine Attraktion wären einige gute Restaurants, Straßencafés, Parkanlagen, kleine Hotels oder Pensionen, damit man auch mitten in der Altstadt essen oder wohnen könnte.

Heute gibt es 192 Suahelihäuser in der geschützten Zone. Ursprünglich waren sie aus Lehm und Flechtwerk gebaut mit Makutidach. Ihre Formen wurden auch später beibehalten, aber die Mauern sind aus Stein und die Dächer aus Wellblech. An den Fenstern sind vertikale Gitterstäbe, neben dem Eingang lange Steinbänke (Barazas).

PEGASUS KÖNIGSBERG

Die meisten der noch bestehenden 301 traditionellen Mombasa-Häuser wurden zwischen 1850 und 1930 von wohlhabenden arabischen, indischen oder Suaheli-Geschäftsleuten erbaut. Sie sind im allgemeinen zweistöckig und mit Wellblech gedeckt. Die Fassade ist einfach, aber elegant, die Maueroberfläche rau und

ausbaute und den Kreuzer sprengte. Die Kanonen von der Pegasus und von der Königsberg wurden geborgen, die Geschütze der letzteren auf Räder montiert und zur Verteidigung erfolgreich eingesetzt.

In der Mbarak Hinawy Road, die zum Alten Hafen führt, wurde 1878 das Arcaf Haus gegenüber von Anil's Arcade erbaut. An seiner Stelle stand früher ein schönes zweistöckiges Gebäude, in dem sich die deutsche Firma William Oswald und Co. als erste ausländische Handelsgesellschaft niederließ. Die deutschen Kaufleute kamen 1898 aus Sansibar nach Mombasa, exportierten Häute, Felle, Kautschuk, Bienenwachs, Chili und Kopra (getrocknetes Kokosnußfleisch) und importierten aus Hamburg Baumaterialien, Landwirtschafsmaschinen und Liköre.

In der Ndia Kuu sieht man auf der linken Straßenseite eine Tafel mit der Aufschrift "Bismarck Soccer Club". Das Lokal des Fußballclubs wurde damals wie heute auch für gesellige Anlässe benützt.

In der Thikastraße, vor der Einmündung in die Ndia Kuu, befand sich ursprünglich Hansing und

einer Mazruifamilie, die es an Leutnant Emery vom britischen Küstenwachtschiff HMS Leven vermietete, der von 1824-26 als Gesandter das Britische Protektorat vertrat.

Im Jahre 1844 wohnte dort der berühmte deutsche Missionar und Sprachforscher Dr. Ludwig Krapf. 1856 hielten sich die Forscher Sir Richard Burton und John Hanning Speke im Leven House auf vor ihrer Expedition ins Landesinnere auf der Suche nach der Quelle des Nils. 1883 logierte in diesen Räumen der Schotte Joseph Thomson, der sich als erster Europäer ins Masailand wagte. Um die Jahrhundertwende wurde das Leven House an die deutsche Handelsgesellschaft William Oswald und Co. verkauft, die das Gebäude umbaute und erweiterte.

MALARIAFIEBER

Eine Steintreppe, die "Leven Steps", führt hinab zu einem Landesteig, 1825 erbaut, damit die dort verankerte HMS Leven auf dem schnellsten Weg Sklaven abfangen und befreien konnte.

Von den "Leven Steps" hat man einen wunderschönen Ausblick über den Creek. Am anderen Ufer hinter den Zementsilos befinden sich eine Gedenkstätte für Dr. Krapf und die Gräber von Frau Krapf und ihrer neugeborenen Tochter, die beide wenige Monate nach Ankunft in Mombasa an Malariafieber starben.

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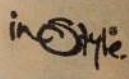
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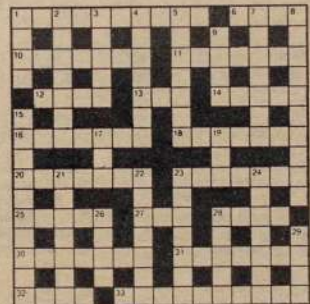

Tourist Officer Sam Okungu Happy At Coast Bookings

TOURISM is booming on the Kenya Coast during the present 'low' season and it is difficult to find an empty bed at beach hotels.

The Tourist Officer, Coast, Sam Okungu, said this when officially closing a five-day 'Action Centred Leadership' programme for Middle Management organised and conducted by the Kenya Institute of Management at Mombasa's Reef Hotel. It brought together 18 participants from member organisations in Nairobi and Mombasa including Kenya Ports Authority, steel companies, hotels, banks and Bamburi Portland Cement Company.

Mr Okungu also paid tribute to all involved in the tourist industry including hoteliers and tour operators for helping make possible such good results.

Of interest is the fact that of the tourists coming to Kenya between 60-70 per cent stay at the coast.

'Tourism' he said 'is not only Kenya's number one earner of foreign exchange but is a labour

intensive industry giving employment to well over 200,000 people.

Many more, including fishermen, farmers, wood-carvers etc. also benefit from it.

He went on to outline objectives of the Ministry of Tourism in promoting tourism, including domestic and cruise tourism, and mentioned that around 700,000 people now visited Kenya actually compared with about 10,000 people in 1967. It indicated the progress made.

As far as Domestic Tourism is concerned Mr Okungu pointed out that many countries in the developed world have more nationals holidaying within their countries than outside.

He suggested, as a means of helping promote domestic tourism in Kenya, that companies reward their employees with a holiday which they would treasure and remember for a long time.

He also urged participants of the KIM workshop to visit other parts of Kenya together with their families.

Adding I hope my friend Eric Mkiilo (Reef Hotel's Assistant General Manager) has helped you enjoy this hotel. It is one of our best hotels at the coast and I am not afraid to say that I really like the management because it is reaching out to the nationals—which is most important.

Here he mentioned 'there are some hotels where our own people are still not allowed in'.

NAIROBI RIOTS

The Reef is a good example of a Kenyan hotel.

Continuing, he said that at the moment we are having a problem in making some hotels and lodges understand who a 'tourist' is. He explained the Licensing Act authorises the Ministry of Tourism to license premises with more than five beds. Adding 'even if it is being frequented more by Africans it is still a tourist class hotel or lodge.

Referring to the recent short-lived riots in Nairobi, Mr Okungu said I am very proud that no such thing happened at the Coast.

Adding 'we have a stable

government and while I am denying there were some cancellations from tourists believe they are now coming back'.

During question time, Tourist Officer was asked if he felt the increased price of hotels would have an adverse effect on the promotion of domestic tourism. He replied that one way around this was to save money by taking a package holiday with a group of friends or colleagues.

Mr Okungu was also asked about race discrimination in hotels. He said that Kenya are not trained to discriminate. Adding I think it would be ridiculous for an African manager to discriminate against a fellow Kenyan. He added that in most cases it is hotel managers doing this who are sacked by their employers. He said their licences revoked by the Ministry. Happily however there are very few such cases.

PRIVATE SECTOR

He concluded 'we are trying to educate our own nationals to know what tourism is about'. Adding it is not going to sophisticated places but getting to know our own people.

He noted that the private sector had been very helpful and co-operative in promoting domestic tourism.

It is understood that the Ministry of Tourism, Wildlife will be holding its Domestic Tourism seminar Eden Roc Hotel, Malindi, September 6-9.

KIM's Action Centred Leadership programme was introduced in Kenya through KIM.

Today, KIM is fully responsible for running it.

Explained Muhoro Ndegwa, KIM's Training Co-ordinator, the aim of this programme is to develop managers to be 'results oriented'.

He noted that participants had enjoyed the facilities, peaceful atmosphere of the Reef Hotel, as well as evening entertainment which had included a fashion show.

One of the participants, Eric Mkiilo, the Reef hotel's Assistant General Manager, has returned the previous day from Switzerland where he had attended a Special Management course in Hotel House Management Administration at the prestigious School, Lausanne, sponsors the Reef Hotel.

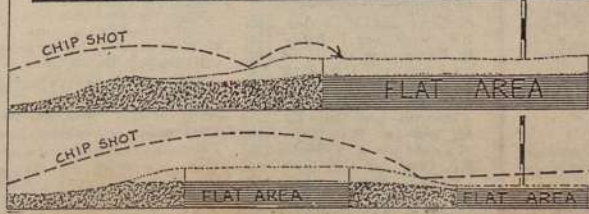
