# Kenya - Home For Luxury Cruise Ships

INTERNATIONAL AIRPORT AND A MODERN HARBOUR PROVIDE PRIME LOCATION

LUXURY CRUISE SHIPS are a familiar sight in Mombasa's world-famous Kilindini Port, and this profitable tourist traffic is expected to expand dramatically in the next few years.

Determined efforts are now being made by Kenya Government, Tour Industry, and senior Port officials to encourage international cruise shipping lines to establish base operations in Mombasa for 'Indian Ocean' and 'Safari Holiday' cruises.

During the forthcoming 'High Season' for overseas visitors in Kenya it is confirmed that one medium-size luxury cruise liner will be based off Mombasa, and half-a-dozen other large passenger ships will be calling on Kenya early in 1991.

Mombasa's strategic location in the Indian Ocean, and its superb holiday facilities, with fascinating connections to such exotic islands as Zanzibar, Sey-

## MORE FACILITIES, BETTER ROADS, PROMISES MAYOR

THE MAYOR, Councillor Ahmed Mwidani, has assured the people of Mombasa that money raised through the service charge is being properly spent with the approval of the Minister concerned, as required by the Act.

This was conveyed in a speech read on his behalf by the Deputy Mayor, Councillor Abubaker Kibarawa, Guest of Honour, at the fifth General Meeting of the

Mombasa and Coast Tourist Association held at Hotel Inter-Continental, Mombasa.

Other good news imparted by the Mayor was that the Council is spending Shs 20 million for the repair, re-carpeting and construction of 23 kms of roads in the Municipality during the present financial year, and that repairs will continue as and when finance allows.

'To-date' he said 'the council has spent a total of Shs 32 million

on roads, representing about 33 per cent of the service charge collected since the inception of the Act on November 25 1988'.

Here the Mayor took the opportunity of appealing 'to people of this town to continue supporting the council by paying their service charge, this being

the surest way of bringing about change for the better'.

He also advised that the council has purchased nine fire engines at a cost of Shs 72 million, also seven side loaders for refuse collection, two tractors with trailers, one cesspit emptier and one wheel at a cost of Shs 15 million.

The Mayor noted that 'this is just about 50 per cent of the total refuse collection vehicles required by the council'. Adding 'it is hoped that the remaining equipment will be acquired soon'.

He was 'confident that from now on there will be a big change in the cleanliness of the town'.

The Mayor went on to reveal that Mombasa is experiencing a high rate of industrial development which had brought with it a related expansion of population now approaching half a million'.

He explained 'being a local authority we play a complementary role to Central Government of assisting in the development of the urban and pre-urban areas through proper and controlled planning'.

'Through the Municipal administration we are able to

# Superb Clothes Design!

THE BOMBOLULU Workshop for the Physically Handicapped is going from strength to strength as revealed by its latest fashion show at Mombasa's Hotel Inter-Continental.

It had been arranged by the Mombasa and Coast Tourist Association and took place during a dinner party following its fifth General Meeting there.

Bombolulu's latest range of fashionwear is very trendy and was shown by some dished models. The compere was Shameem Ebrahimji, Bombolulu's new Sales Manager who is looking after all local marketing.

Their fashionwear, as usual, was enhanced by some exciting jewellery which they make and for which Bombolulu is now famous.

Its new leather section, producing mainly handbags and belts, is doing well and has just attracted an order from America worth Shs 160,000/- for leather necklaces adorned with brass and copper.

It is to the USA that most of their exports go.

Its new wood section is doing so well that demand is higher than what they can presently produce.

Since August there has been a considerable increase in the number of tourists visiting the Bombolulu workshop, four kms north of Nyali bridge on the Malindi road, which may be partly due to brochures in English and German which it has been distributing to all hotels.

As well, many tour operators are including Bombolulu in their day tours of interesting places with the result that local sales are now considerably higher than exports.

Hubert Seifert, the energetic and dedicated Administrator of APDK's Bombolulu Workshop and Port Reitz Polio Clinic, also revealed that from this month 'we shall be employing our own models full time, for Bombolulu has bookings to stage fashion shows at ten beach hotels each month.'

Speaking at the dinner party Mr H. Hafidh, a member of the Bombolulu Sub-Committee and Vice-Chairman, APDK, coast branch, said "the purpose of these fashion shows is also to project an awareness of the disabled who with a little help can become self-reliant and useful members of the society. In the past many without any training had to rely on begging to survive."

Bombolulu, he continued, has proved a very successful scheme for the handicapped and needs continued public support so that it can continue to grow and offer training and employment opportunities to even more physically handicapped people.

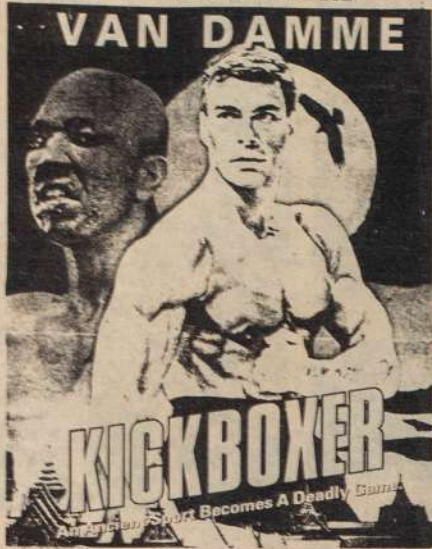

## BIG WEDDING FOR TRUPTI AND ANWAR

NEARLY 400 guests of all races and religions witnessed the colourful two-hour long traditional Hindu wedding ceremony of Trupti, daughter of Mr and Mrs Dashrath Prabhulal Derashri and Anwar, son of Mr and Mrs. Fazal Hussein at Mombasa's Patel Samaj on September 29.

It was also an indication of how love can transcend religious barriers—for Anwar is a Muslim. Trupti recently joined Pollman's Tours and Safaris as Network Computer Supervisor, and is brilliant at her work. In fact, she married her former boss for Anwar is a partner in Cybernetics for whom she worked for one year.

Trupti holds a diploma in Systems Design and Computer Programming from Electronic Data Processing Institute at Mombasa where she studied for two years.

AFTER 22 years of producing musical concerts and shows in Mombasa, Fr. Eddie Corcoran will see the final curtain come down on October 14 when his *Swinging Islanders* have their last night of their final show: *African Jigsaw*.

Fr. Eddie's first shows were produced by a mixed choir of boys from St. Mary's Seminary, Kwale, and girls from Star of the Sea Secondary School, Mombasa.

These lasted from 1968 to 1972 when Fr. Eddie was transferred to St. George's High School, Girama. In 1973, however, the Star of the Sea girls asked him to start a new choir with them on their own, and so *The Swinging Islanders* was born.

This choir continued to produce concerts each year until in 1976 they took a deep breath and launched forth into the world of *Musicals*, starting with *Joseph and the Amazing Technicolour Dreamcoat*.

This was met with such encouraging applause and write-ups that the venture continued with such rousing successes as *The Mikado*, *Smike*, *The Sound of Music* and *Fiddler on the Roof*.

Mombasa audiences warmed to these youngsters with their own brand of charm which was contagious and left their listeners with music in their ears and hearts. Their very enthusiasm and "attack" more than made up for their lack of professionalism.

In 1980 Fr. Eddie went to the Holy Ghost Fathers' Generalate in Rome for a stint in administration, but was back in 1983. He was approached by some of his past "Stars" who wanted to restart the choir.

The set, designed by Shafiq Anjarwalla, is attractive and behind the stage Dick Chatur

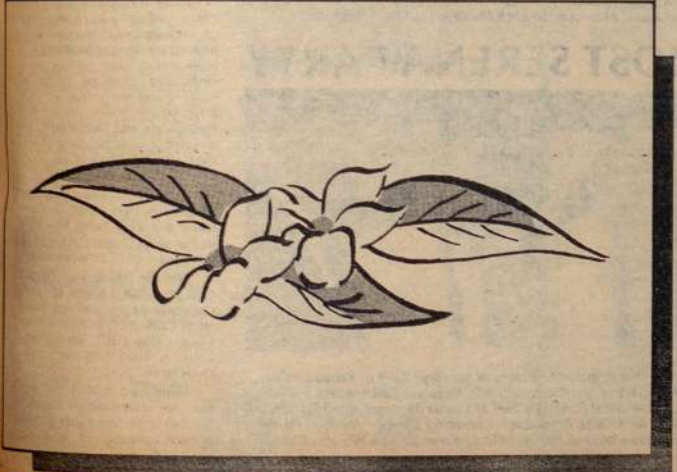
(lights) and Trevor Owen (Stage Manager) keep things going at a smart pace.

### Tanzanian President Rules Out Any 'Nationalising' Of Private Property

THE TANZANIA PRESIDENT, Ali Hassan Mwinyi has reiterated that the country will not nationalise private industries, schools, hospitals or houses because such take overs hampered the development of private institutions and dampened the business acumen of potential entrepreneurs.

The President said this when addressing members of the Asian Community after a charity walk for a hospital project whereby more than 60 million is expected to be collected with the President personally sponsored to the value of about 20 million shillings.

President Mwinyi emphasised that private industries should be working with the National interest in mind and said that the Government wants to cooperate with the people in the development process.

#### HUGE PROFITS

He said schools or hospitals should however not be built for the use by secluded classes of people or be built for the purpose of making huge profits because education and health services are such that the interest of the common man had to be kept at the forefront.

He stressed that such public services should be enjoyed by many people even if it meant that profits were minimised.

The President's speech was well received by the Asians,

many of whom were highly affected by the spate of nationalisation in the early years of the 1967 proclaimed policy of socialism and self reliance.

Meanwhile according to recent statistics, about 52 youths out of every 100 who flee rural villages are doing so in fear of tax collectors who harass them.

A Dar based Sociologist said that the rude tax collectors have been harassing and intimidating people in the rural areas to the extent that they seek refuge in urban areas.

In the same analysis, the researchers found that about 40 per cent of the youths running to the towns are aged above 18 years and want to be

independent of their parents.

Of the entire Tanzania population of about 23.5 million about 9.6 million constitute an active force of the age ranging from 16 to 65 years.

The exodus of youths from the rural areas mainly consists of such active force and although Tanzania upholds the principal that work is a measure of human dignity, the potential labour force has been generally neglected with poor terms and petty wages compared to the high price consumer price index.

Moreover manpower, planning systems in the country have tended to favour training, allocating and utilising post secondary and graduates to Government and other public firms.

As a result there has been a vacuum at macro level in terms of planning to provide a viable economic environment to school leavers to earn their living to earn their living by having good jobs.

At Africans Sea Lodge accommodation is in makuti (palm-frond) roofed conditioning. It is the only hotel on the Kenya coast to have its own chapel which is inter-denominational.

It also makes a wonderfully rustic venue for weddings and many have taken place there with the honeymoon being spent in an Alliance Hotel.

At Jadini, all rooms are air conditioned with telephone and piped music. Most are sea facing. Big developments are planned for next year.

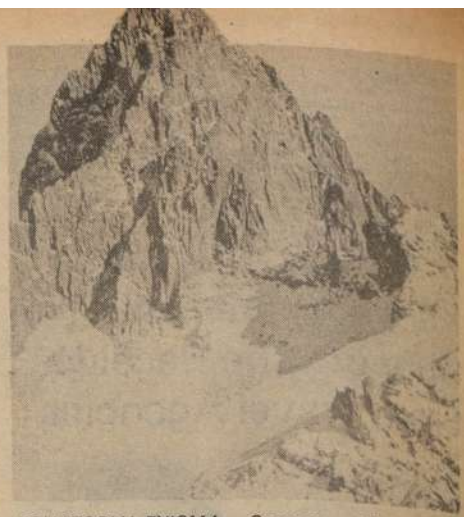
All hotels have beautiful gardens which include some very old baobab trees.

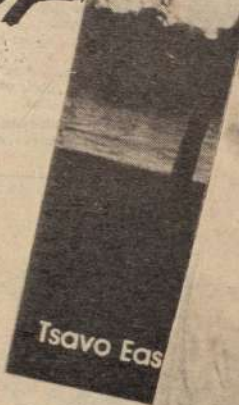




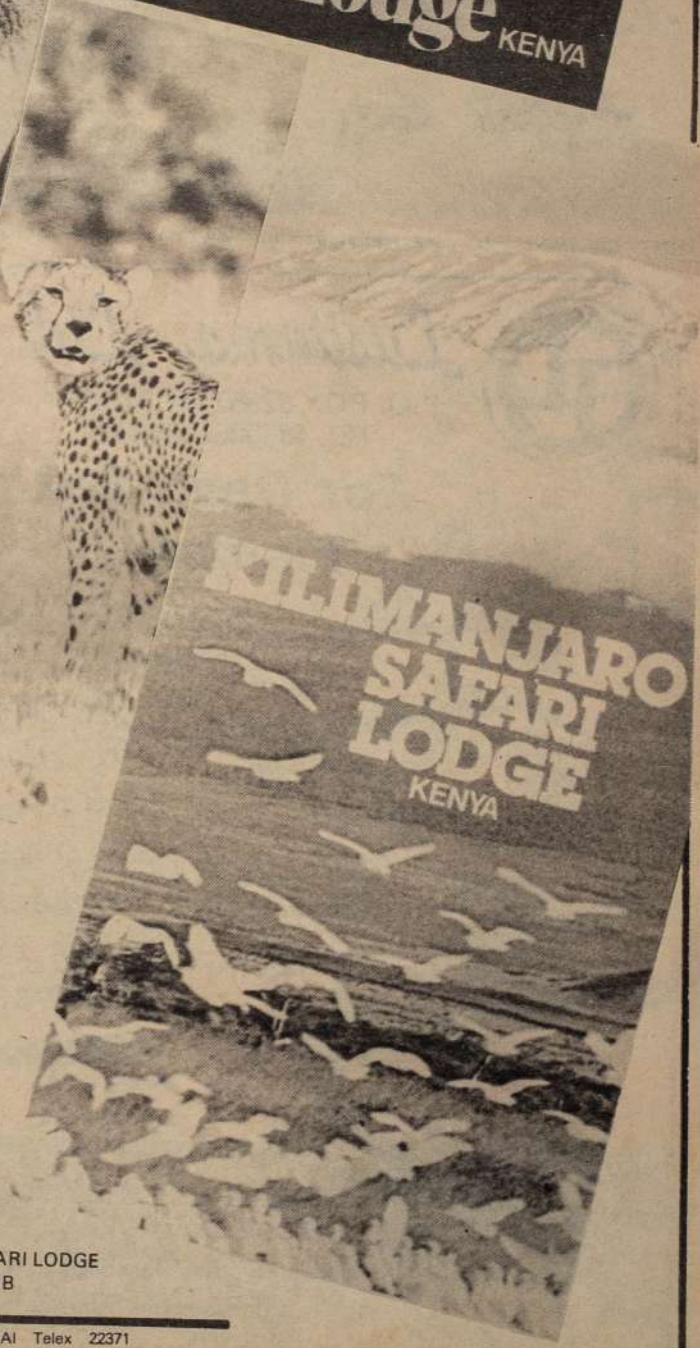

Kenya is an Independent Republic within the Commonwealth, a member of the United Nations Organisation of African Nations. It covers 585,000 square kilometres and lies astride the Equator bordering Somalia to the north-west, Uganda to the west and Tanzania to the south. The population is about 20 million. The capital is Nairobi with a population of about one million. Other major towns include Mombasa (pop; about 420,000), Kisumu (pop; about 420,000), Nakuru, Meru, Eldoret.

**ENTRY FORMALITIES:**

Valid passport and visas for everyone, with the exception of citizens of most Commonwealth and certain other countries with which Kenya has reciprocal waiver arrangements. The Commonwealth exceptions are Australia, Nigeria and Sri Lanka. Citizens of the United Kingdom or India, Bangladesh or Pakistani origin require visas as to do all arrivals from South Africa.

**CUSTOMS:**

A reasonable volume of personal effects can be freely imported together with cameras and any amount of film. But be prepared to provide refundable deposits for the temporary importation of radios, tape-recorders, video and movie-equipment. Banned imports are agricultural and horti-

cultural produce and pets. Firearms can only be imported with a permit.

**CREDIT CARDS:**

American Express, Diners Club, Visa and other well known cards are widely accepted in Nairobi, Mombasa and throughout Kenya.

**AIRPORTS:**

Kenya has two international airports: Jomo Kenyatta in Nairobi and Moi in Mombasa. Scheduled services from all major cities worldwide.

**CURRENCY REGULATIONS:**

No import or export of Kenya currency is allowed. Any amount of foreign currency may be brought in but must be changed at banks or licensed exchange facilities at main hotels and the exchange noted on a currency declaration form issued on arrival. Visitors should avoid 'street changers' and transact all currency dealings through official dealers. It is an offence to

deface or damage Kenya currency.

Any surplus Kenya notes can be changed for foreign currency at banks at the two international airports which maintain a 24-hour service.

**TELEPHONE AND TELEX:**

Kenya has an excellent internal and external communications

system. International STD has been installed and direct dialling on telex to most international centres is available on a 24-hour basis except where stated.

**LANGUAGE:**

Kiswahili is the *lingua franca*, a phonetic language, formed out of Bantu and Arabic, and spoken nationwide. English is the official language.

**HEALTH ADVICE:**

Certificates of inoculation against Yellow Fever and Cholera are advisable though not mandatory, except in some instances as, for example, arrival from the Far East (Cholera) and Central America (South, Central and West Africa (Yellow Fever)).

Malaria is endemic to certain areas of Kenya and all visitors should begin taking anti-malaria prophylactics two weeks before leaving for Kenya, throughout their stay and for a minimum of three weeks after returning. Many towns have good hospital care and Nairobi has excellent specialist facilities.

There are chemists (drug stores) in all major centres but any visitors requiring special and

continuing medication should bring sufficient to cover the duration of their visit.

**TIPPING:**

Most hotels and restaurants include a service charge and tipping is not necessary except where exceptional service inspires a desire to show appreciation. However it is customary to tip for bar service (ten per cent).

**LIQUOR AND SPIRITS:**

Licensing hours are liberal. Local spirits and wines as well as imported brands are available. Beer is price controlled, wines and spirits are not. Kenya beer is a frequent winner of international brewing awards for light lagers.

**DUTY FREE GOODS:**

Visitors are restricted to duty free items of 200 cigarettes or 50 cigars and one litre bottle of spirits.

**DEPARTURE TAX:**

On departure from Kenya, an Airport Tax of U.S. Dollars 20.00 a person is payable in foreign currency.

Mombasa is the Principal Port of East Africa, what facilities are available for Cruise Ship Tourism?

The Port of Mombasa which is managed by the Kenya Ports Authority is no stranger to Passenger Ships since Berths One and Two were used extensively in the past by Passenger Liners connecting Kenya to Europe and India.

However, the development of Air transport killed that business some 30 years ago. Now the phenomenon of Cruise Ships has replaced the age of Passenger Ships as such.

What was good about the Port of Mombasa in those days is good for the Cruise Ships of today: a natural sheltered harbour and an efficiently run Port operated by Professionals with modern equipment thus according excellent services.

Does KPA have any future plans for a Cruise Ship Terminal or similar facilities?

There are plans to eventually put up a fully fledged Cruise Ship Passenger Terminal at the Port of Mombasa when a certain level of Cruise Traffic is attained.

At the moment, Berths 1 and 2 have been set aside for visiting Cruise Ships. The whole area adjacent to these Berths has been cleared up and made clean and tidy.

We have embarked on arrangements to provide improved Passenger handling facilities and services; for example: Special Dedicated Covered Gangways, Waiting and Restrooms, Mobile Shops selling Duty-Free Goods and Handicrafts, Mobile Post Office and Telecommunication Centre that can be brought alongside Cruise Ships.

Perhaps of more immediate importance are the proposals we are working on to develop

Mombasa Old Port for medium sized Cruise vessels.

Passengers would come ashore in the Old Town almost under the shadow of Fort Jesus which offers a unique environment of tremendous touristic appeal.

We believe that this Unique Package will be of great interest and will encourage Cruise Ships of the 'adventure' or 'expedition'

Committee we have had six Cruise Ships calling at our Port in the first quarter of this year - this is the highest number of Cruise Vessels to call in a similar period in the history of the Port.

The Cruise Ship Facilitation Committee of which I am the Chairman, was formed late last year with the aim of facilitating Cruise Ships calling at the Port and providing a touristic backup for Cruise Ship Traffic in an effort to develop Cruise Ship Tourism in our country.

The number of Cruise Ships calling at the Port this year is expected to rise to 20 or more.

By the end of this year we estimate to have four medium sized Cruise Ships home-ported here for some months serving the East African Coast and the Islands of the Indian Ocean.

This is the kind of business we aim to encourage as it is a particularly valuable contribution to Kenya's overall tourist industry.

What is the attraction of Kenya and Mombasa to Operators of Cruise Ships?

How many Cruise Ships are at present visiting Mombasa and are any based here?

Owing largely to the efforts of the Cruise Ship Facilitation

The Port of Mombasa is a unique Cruise Ship destination because it offers what people in the Marketing World call a USP - a Unique Selling Proposition - The Safari and Cruise Package.

It is becoming almost a routine for passengers joining or leaving their Ship in Mombasa to spend a few days on Safari in our Game parks.

The Cruise Ship operators like this package because it is unique and helps to sell their cruises.

Indeed, no other country can

quite match this offering of a Safari and Cruise package.

There is another important factor and that is the growing interest in the Islands of the Indian Ocean from the Maldives to the Seychelles and Mauritius, Reunion, Madagascar, Comores and Zanzibar as a Cruise Ship

destination area.

There is much evidence showing that the traditional cruise destination of the Caribbean Sea has become overcrowded.

The Mediterranean and North Sea are fine in the summer months but as winter approaches a better place by far is the region of Eastern African and the Indian Ocean Islands.

Do you offer Special facilities for clearing Ships and passengers through Port formalities?

A year ago, and as I mentioned earlier on, we set up a special Facilitation Committee widely represented of all the interests involved in Government and Private sectors.

Already the Committee has had significant successes perhaps the fundamental one was that when a Cruise Ship arrives it must be given prompt and rapid attention.

Similarly, we have had marvelous cooperation from all Government Departments. For instance, Yellow Fever Vaccination is no longer a requirement except for passengers coming from those countries in Africa regarded as infected areas by WHO.

The Immigration have managed to clear hundreds of passengers in quite a short time.

In cases of big Ships with large numbers of passengers Immigration Officers fly to join the Ships at a previous Port and go through their formalities while at sea.

Customs too have changed their procedures. No longer are all the bars and liquor stores checked and sealed on the Ships

for the benefit of Cruise passengers.

What arrangements are made for passengers from distant countries joining or leaving Cruise Ships at Mombasa?

Here again Mombasa is exceptionally well placed to handle large numbers of passengers on what we call Air and Sea Interchange. The runway of Moi International Airport runs literally parallel to Kilindini Harbour and from Airport Terminal to a Cruise Ship at Berths 1 or 2 is less than 10km.

Charter Aircraft of Kenya Airways or other Carriers bring Cruise passengers from Europe and America either direct to Mombasa or in the case of Safari and Cruises via Nairobi.

Indeed our National Carrier (Kenya Airways) stands much to gain from Cruise Ship tourism on its long haul routes and on its local services.

Customs and Immigration are extremely cooperative on major Air and Sea Interchange arrangements where time is a crucial factor.

It is not unusual for arriving passengers to be cleared through the Airport without any formality direct to waiting Coaches while their baggage is taken by truck under Police escort without Customs Examination direct to the Ship and on to the Passenger Cabin.

Indeed there are not many places in the World where a Cruise Ship Air and Sea Interchange can be done so quickly and so efficiently.

What sort of itineraries can be offered for Cruise Ships operating out of Mombasa?

As I have already mentioned, we see Mombasa positioned as the premier Cruise Ship port serving those beautiful tropical islands of the Indian Ocean.

There is also scope for cruising along the East African Coast. Later this year, we expect a small luxury Cruise Ship with 100 passengers to call at Lamu on her way from the Suez Canal to Mombasa.

The combinations are almost infinite and I can see before long Cruise Ships home-ported in Mombasa offering a wide range of itineraries from one to three or four weeks.

How do costs compare for Ships operators as between Mombasa and say Mediterranean Ports?

I cannot give specific information on this as I do not have the figures. At the moment, however, we are reviewing our Port Charges for Cruise Ships with an aim of giving Concessional Rates for Cruise Ships calling at the Port of Mombasa.

This will undoubtedly assist in attracting more Cruise Ships to our Port.

Can very large Cruise Ships such as QEII and Canberra enter Kilindini Harbour and berth alongside?

Yes. These two rate among the top 10 of the worlds largest Cruise Ships. Their size prevents them coming alongside at Berth 1 and 2 normally used by visiting Cruise Ships.

During the previous calls of QEII to the Port of Mombasa special arrangements were made to have her berth at Mbaraki Wharf close to the lively scene of the busy Likoni Ferry and at the Port's Container Terminal and also at Berths 13 and 14.

Similarly arrangements have been made for the Caribarra on her previous calls. Incidentally, both QEII and Canberra will be re-visiting Mombasa next year and we look forward to receiving them at our Port.

Are there any special benefits for Cruise Ships visiting Mombasa Kenya?

Yes. The sun shines. The people smile and peace prevails.

OVER THE Savannah the crimson sun is slowly setting beyond the horizon. The sky is changing from a yellow ochre to an amazing purple, displaying swiftly a whole range of breathtaking colours, turning into a dark violet.

The visitor is then escorted to his room over bridge-like walkways with bamboo railings, giving him the impression to arrive at a real African rondavel.

## 'In Towers Perched Atop Stilts'

His room — of course with private shower and toilet — is in a circular tower crowned with a thatched roof. Each tower contains four rooms on two storeys. In this complex of 40 towers the weary safari guest thinks to sleep in the middle of an African village safe from wild animals.

The towers are perched atop stilts, each of these heavy pillars measuring seven metres in height and covered with local marble. They can therefore easily take it when an elephant occasionally rubs his back on their round surface. The sleeping visitor — only a few metres

above the elephant's trunk — will not be disturbed; unless the grey giant beneath wakes him up by a loud trumpet blast.

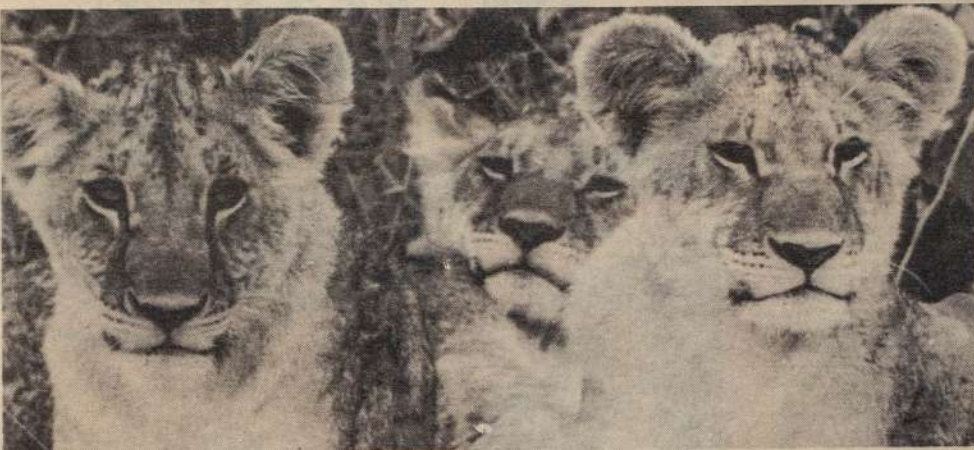

## 'Wealth Of Bird Life In Taitas'

GRAHAM MERCER, lately one of the East African Wildlife representatives in Tanzania, reports during a recent safari through Kenya:

TAITA Hills Sanctuary is one of the most promising wildlife preserves in Kenya or Tanzania, despite its relatively small size.

Situated on the southern slopes of the lovely Taita Hills, it has an interesting recent history; the British and German forces disputed the area during the First World War, and the young Scottish explorer Joseph Thomson crossed it in 1883 prior to his epic journey across Maasailand.

It also has a wealth of bird life, and a quite amazing animal population for such a limited area.

We saw 90 species of birds in one afternoon's drive and in two brief visits to the sanctuary we have seen three cheetahs (on one occasion two cheetahs were being chased away by three male lions), elephant, buffalo, bushbuck, Grant's Gazelle, giraffe, honey badger and many other animals.

Rhino are regularly seen and so are Lesser Kudu, and although leopard are not included on the sanctuary's list, I feel sure they exist and will soon feature at least occasionally, in the nightly game viewing at Salt Lick Lodge.

# Motorradfahrer aus Frankreich auf Afrika-Expedition

MIT CHAMPAGNER wurde der erfolgreiche Abschluß der ersten Ostafrika-Motorradexpedition, die im Reef Hotel in Mombasa zu Ende ging, gefeiert.

Eine Dinner Party im Ndege Grill, mit musikalischer Unterhaltung von Eddy Rimmer am Klavier, wurde vom Hotel arrangiert, um diese neue Dimension des Sporttourismus zu feiern. Das Reef Hotel ist auch der Initiator der beliebten Radrennen, die jährlich am Madaraka-Tag durchgeführt werden zur Förderung des Sports in Kenia.

Die acht französischen Motorradfahrer, darunter eine Dame, haben 4000 km in 12 Tagen zurückgelegt. Sie kamen durch Uganda, Ruanda und Tansania nach Kenia auf Honda und Kawasaki 250-600 cc Motorrädern.

Unter den Teilnehmern befand sich Joel Queirel, ein ehemaliger Moto Cross und Enduro Champion Rennfahrer aus Frankreich. Er hat mehrere Goldmedaillen an Weltmeisterschaften gewonnen und gehört zu den zehn besten Motorradrennfahrern der Welt. Er wurde begleitet von seinem Freund Gilles Mallet, Redakteur eines internationalen Motorradmagazins — eines von 14, die von der Lariviere Gruppe herausgegeben werden. Er wurde auf diese Expedition geschickt, um darüber zu schreiben.

Die Gruppe kam nach Kenia im Rahmen einer speziellen Pauschalreise (einschließlich Kenya Airways Flugticket aus Frankreich), die Martial Schmit, Managing Director von Euroafric Tours (K) Ltd, für Motorradfahrer offeriert. Seit einem Jahr besteht dieses Angebot, das auf diese Weise eine neue Art von Sporttourismus fördert — ein vielversprechender neuer Markt für Kenia.

Die erste Ostafrika-Expedition verlief so erfolgreich, daß eine weitere für nächstes Jahr geplant ist. Alle Teilnehmer der ersten Expedition haben bereits bestätigt, daß sie zurückkommen werden. Allerdings wird im nächsten Jahr die geplante Reise drei Wochen dauern, damit den Teilnehmern unterwegs mehr freie Zeit zur Verfügung steht.

Die Gruppe wurde eskortiert von zwei Mechanikern und zwei Begleitfahrzeugen, komplett mit Ersatzteilen und anderer Ausrüstung.

Martial Schmit erklärte: "Der schönste Moment war für uns, als wir im Reef Hotel ankamen. Eine erfrischende Dusche und eiskaltes Bier wurde von allen sehr geschätzt." Sie waren an diesem Tag 400 km von Amboseli via Taveta an die Küste gefahren.

In einem Interview im Reef Hotel bestätigte Herr Schmit, daß 80 Prozent seiner Kunden aus Frankreich kommen. Das Interesse wächst jedoch ständig und dehnt sich auf weitere Kreise aus, so daß ab Januar 1991 das Africa Travel Centre in London drei seiner Motorrad-Expeditionen nach Kenia verkaufen wird.

Die Gruppe aus Frankreich begann ihre Safari einen Tag nach Ankunft in Nairobi. Sie über-

nachteten unterwegs in Erstklasshotels und Lodgen. In den Nationalparks hatten sie genügend Zeit, um in einem Landrover auf Pirschfahrten zu gehen. In Masai Mara stiegen sie in der Olkuruk Lodge ab und konnten in diesem Park die Wanderung von Millionen Gnus und Zebras beobachten.

Überall wurden sie von den Einheimischen stets freundlich aufgenommen.

Was die Straßen betrifft, fanden sie ihren Zustand in Tansania am schlechtesten. In der Gegend von Mwanza hatte Gilles Mallet einen Unfall und brach sich den Fuß. Als er einem Radfahrer ausweichen wollte, kippte das Motorrad um und fiel auf seinen Fuß. Trotz seiner Verletzung fuhr er auf dem Motorrad 160 km bis nach Mwanza, wo der "Flying Doctor's Service" in Nairobi gerufen wurde — Euroafric Tours ist Mitglied dieses Rettungsdienstes und alle Kunden sind durch diese Versicherung gedeckt. Gilles wurde ins Nairobi Hospital geflogen. Als er Kenia verließ, war sein Fuß noch im Gips.

Martial Schmit lebt seit fünf Jahren in Nairobi. Früher war er dort als Sekretär in der französischen Botschaft tätig. Vor zwei Jahren gab er diesen Posten auf, um sein eigenes Geschäft aufzubauen. Als er auf dem Motorrad ostafrikanische Länder ersuchte, kam ihm die Idee, Motorrad-safaris zu organisieren.

Er erwartet nun eine Gruppe von 8 Teilnehmern in Kenia, die er persönlich zum Turkanasee begleiten wird.

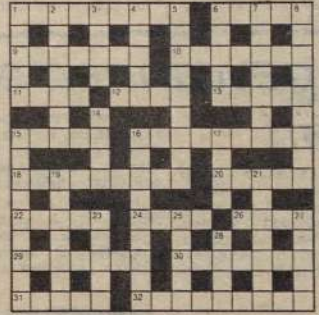
