## A RECORD YEAR FOR TEA EXPORT VIA MOMBASA!

THE HALF YEARLY EXPORT figures released by the Customs and Excise Department gives all the indications that 1990 will be yet another record year for Kenya tea exports following an equally very encouraging production performance during the period.

The January-June production of 108,012,757 Kgs. was higher by 20.5 per cent from the 89,632,644 Kgs., produced during the same period in 1989.

The recorded exports of 89,643,808 Kgs. is higher by 15.4 per cent from the 77,692,900 Kgs. exported the same period in 1989, and going by previous experience the total 1990 exports could easily exceed the 180 million Kgs. limit.

The foreign exchange realisation from the exports was KShs. 3,578,078,949 which gave an

unit value of KShs. 39.91 per Kg. Earnings from exports in the comparable period in 1989 was KShs. 2,232,437,548 with unit value of KShs. 28.73.

The difference the very favourable market conditions prevailing in the first half of the year as prices remained firm.

### MAJOR DESTINATIONS

Major destinations for the Kenya tea exports remained taking 37,721,552 Kgs. or 42 per cent of total exports. Pakistan, the second important market for Kenya tea absorbed 25,262,750 Kgs. or some 28.2 per cent.

Other markets showed consistent support with a strong showing by Egypt and the U.S.S.R. which is a new entrant into the Kenya market.

Meanwhile, the East African Tea Trade Association (EATTA) will organise a Tea Seminar for the management and staff of member companies from October 25-27, 1990 at the Whitesands, Mombasa.

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# POLIO-PLUS CAMPAIGN IS SETTING SIGHTS ON NOV.4

THE COAST POLIO Plus Committee had a very successful First Immunization Day of the Three Planned for this year on October 7 1990. This activity was planned for at all the Immunization Centres of the Municipal Council, 16 in number within the District of Mombasa and three KEPI centres.

A spokesman told COASTWEEK "Thus in all 19 Immunization centres simultaneously offered immunization from 9.00 a.m. to 12 noon. The entire activity was organized by the Coast Polio Plus Committee and such an activity has never been done before in Kenya.

"Thus it is History and the results are being anxiously awaited by the KEPI Manager Dr Richard Sang who gave his blessings and requested the Immunization Days strategy to be documented for records and for others to emulate".

At each centre two vaccinators were enrolled who were in charge of vaccinating. They made sure that vaccines were available at each centre. Syringe and needles were sterilized and the centres were well prepared. The vaccinators were supervised by Sister Hellen Nyaga.

To update the vaccinators a seminar was also organized by the Coast Polio Plus Committee when a team of KEPI management unit consisting of Dr Richard Sang, Mr Kamau, Mr Kiare and Mr Harold Kodo assisted by Coast Paediatrician and Rotarian Kanti Chudasama addressed them on all the vaccine preventable diseases, techniques of Cold Chain, immunization policies and this was greatly appreciated by all the vaccinators who attended.

### VOLUNTEERS

This brought the workers in the field who are carrying out the task of immunization closer to those who are managing and laying down the policies. Also during question time many doubts were cleared.

Rotarian Vijay Talwar organized all the volunteers required to man the Immunization Centres. It was for the first time that Interactors, Rotaractors, Inner-wheelers and Rotarians totalling about 100 offered voluntary service and turned up at the centres.

The centres were well organized and managed and the mothers who turned up in large numbers were comfortably looked after and taken care of. Past District Governor Jayanti Rajani, who is also the National Polio Plus Chairman was overwhelmed by the organization and went round to all the centres visiting mothers and babies.

### ISLAND CENTRES

He congratulated the Coast Polio Plus Chairman Nandu Acharya and Project Director Varinder Sur for planning and implementing the first ever Immunization Day in Kenya and hoped that this will be done all over the country through Rotary and other service organizations who are welcome to join hands so that KEPI can be assisted to achieve its objective of having a Polio free Kenya by the year 2000.

The second Immunization Day is scheduled for November 4 1990 again at all the 19 centres:

Mombasa Island: Mwembe Tayari, Majengo, Mvita, Makupa, Old Town, Tudor. Mombasa North: Kongowa, Kisauni,

Bamburi, Utange. Mombasa South: Shika Adabu, Mtongwe, Likoni and Mombasa West: Magongo, Chaani, Kwa Jomvu, Mikindani, Jomvukuu.

"Once again gifts will be given to babies receiving vaccinations and mothers will qualify for Raffles to be drawn for every 25 babies vaccinated," added the spokesman.

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## EXPANSION AND MODERNISATION OF TELEPHONE SERVICE IN MOMBASA CENTRAL

Installation of a 10,000 line digital exchange in Mombasa has been in progress for sometime now. The exchange will be commissioned sometimes towards the end of this year.

Apart from replacing old equipment the new exchange will provide additional subscriber capacity which will reduce the waiting list around Mombasa Central exchange.

The new system will facilitate the introduction of subscriber supplementary services such as abbreviated dialling, call transfer, three party conference call and call waiting among others.

All subscribers with telephone numbers in the series 2XXXX will be transferred to the new equipment. In many cases, these subscribers will have the current telephone numbers pre-fixed by the digit '2'. Thus telephone number 2XXXX becomes 22XXXX. However, in other cases due to modernisation reasons the numbers will change completely.

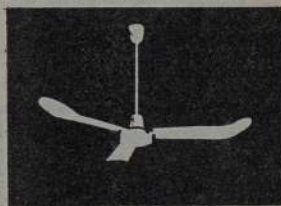
Details of the exact change-over date and all relevant information will be communicated to the affected subscribers individually and to all our esteemed customers in general.

## MOMBASA TEACHER SHINES AT SARIT CENTRE RANGOLI EXHIBIT

**MOMBASA TEACHER** Mrs Vibha Shah and her Rang Rekha Group of volunteer artists are the talk of the Kenya capital as thousands of visitors flock to the Sarit Centre to view their colourful wildlife Rangoli.

Months of preliminary studies and sketches were finally translated after a further 2,500 hours of backbreaking work into a colourful Rangoli opened just before Diwali by Dr Njoroge Mungai, Minister for Environment and Natural Resources.

The Rangoli, an ancient Indian artform using coloured powders is to raise funds for the cause of wildlife conservation. Mrs Vibha Shah received a great deal of support and inspiration for her project from the East African Wildlife Society and another Mombasa resident, the world-famous 'rhino-man' Michael Werikhe.

Mrs Shah teaches at the Aga Khan Kenya Secondary School, in Mombasa.

The Rangoli is the largest ever created in Nairobi and details the endangered species of wildlife and flora related to a map of Kenya.

The centrepiece of the Rang Rekha Group's work is a lifelike reproduction of President Moi burning the ivory to alert the international community to the depredations of poachers.

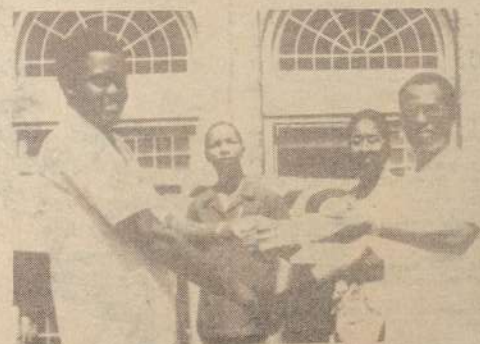

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# Italian Shipper Into Mombasa

ONE OF THE LARGEST shipping lines plying the Indian Ocean, Ignazio Messina Line, has decided to make Mombasa the home port for its operations in the Eastern African region.

The line, which recently underwent a restyling of its operations in Eastern Africa, has also decided to make the port of Djibouti the home port from which transhipment of all cargo destined for the Gulf, Middle East and the Indian sub-continent will take place.

Speaking in Mombasa on board the line's newest and most modern of the three mother ships that will call in Mombasa every fortnight, the representative for Eastern

Africa Captain Piero Pastorino and the Managing Director of Marship Limited, the local agents, Captain Michele Eposito said Mombasa had been decided over other ports due to its modern and efficient service that has a well developed road and rail linkage with the hinterlands.

M.V. *Jolly Rubino* arrived three days ahead of schedule and was able to load all its 100 containers in a record time of about a half a day leaving before midnight. She has a capacity for 1,550 containers well positioned at the deck, middle deck and twin deck, according to the Captain Cossu Alfredo.

She joins two other "Jollies", m.v. *Jolly Turchese* and m.v. *Jolly Smer Ido*, all named after the precious stones of ruby, turquoise and emerald. The three are now the biggest ro-ro ship which call at Mombasa.

From Europe, the ports of call are: Marseilles, La Spezia, Naples, Jeddah, Djibouti, Mogadishu, Mombasa and Dar-es-Salaam.

Captain Eposito said Mombasa has become a mother port because the three ships are also called mother ships. The mother port will henceforth tranship to feeder ports.

The occasion has also witnessed the presentation of the certificate of first call to the port of Mombasa by ship by the Kenya Ports Authority to the master of the ship.

The presentation to Captain Alfredo was made by the KPA's marketing and public relations manager Mr Alex Kabuga who was accompanied by the container operations manager Mr Francis Bwango and zonal manager Mr Abdalla Karama.

Captain Alfredo thanked port workers for the excellent service they rendered to the ship. He said the speeded turn-round time "is both a surprise and a good message I am carrying back with me."

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# K.A.T.O. TO DISCUS 'AIR CHARTER' RATES

A REQUEST that the Civil Aviation Board adjust air charter rates in line with European seasons is being made to the next meeting of the Kenya Association of Tour Operators in Nairobi by its Coast Sub-Committee.

This is deemed necessary as there are very strict laws in Europe whereby rates cannot

be adjusted on an on-going basis.

Little known is that KATO has a very strong Coast Sub-Committee. It was Samuel Mwaura, the new chairman of KATO and his sub-committee who supported the idea of it being formed being aware of the fact that of the number of tourists coming to Kenya most stay at the coast.

Mr Mwaura is Managing Director of the Abercrombie and Kent group of companies.

Major companies are represented on the Coast sub-committee. Chairman is Karl-Heinz Straus Managing Director of Pollman's Tours and Safaris, while the secretary is Aunali Kanji of Abercrombie and Kent, a Director responsible for coastal operations.

Following the recent increase in the price of fuel, members discussed and approved 'Coast Road Excursion and Safari prices' with effect from November 1. Air safari rate increases are also being considered.

To bring about uniformity, it

has been recommended that KATO membership should be compulsory for tour operators.

The Coast Sub-Committee has also suggested that now that the new ferries have arrived at Likoni the old ones be transferred to Kilifi which is still experiencing problems with its present equipment.

It has also pointed out that roads in Amboseli-Mara and Taveta need urgent attention.

### M.C.T.A. MEETINGS

At its last meeting on October 4 it was agreed to invite the MCTA Chairman to meetings, while a KATO member will likewise attend MCTA committee meetings.

Many KATO members are also members of MCTA.

The Tourist Officer, Coast, is also being invited along.

KATO has the full blessing of the Ministry of Tourism and Wildlife Service.

The Coast Sub-Committee acts as a forum for Mombasa based operators through which to channel their specific problems,

requirements and recommendations to KATO in Nairobi.

One has been the need for government to give them advance notice of any increase in operating costs so they no longer have to suffer the consequence of big financial losses.

Many have contracts with overseas tour operators that cannot be varied until they expire a few months hence. It is only when new contracts are drawn up that such increases can be reflected.

One of the objects of the association is to provide a voice for the tour operating sector and tourist trade in its dealings with government ministries and other professions and trades connected with travel and tourism.

The association also aims at encouraging the advancement of tourism within Kenya and to improve the standard of service offered by Kenyan tour operators.

So as to uphold business ethics of members a sub-committee has been formed on which the Licencing Officer of the Ministry of Tourism and Wildlife is represented.

With the casino being so close to the restaurant many guests delayed their departure by stopping for a while to try their luck on the gaming tables.

Phase 2 of developments there include renovating the casino and giving it a new bar. It offers five roulette, three black jack and three pooton tables, as well as 35 slot machines.

Mr Ravasio, General Manager, International Casinos, Mombasa, has been working in Africa for the past 25 years, starting in Nigeria, West Africa where he was managing casinos and restaurants. He has been with the International Casino group in Kenya for six-and-a-half years starting in Nairobi and two years ago was sent to Mombasa to look after developments here.

Their safari ended with three relaxing nights at Diani Reef Grand Hotel which they described as 'magnificent'.

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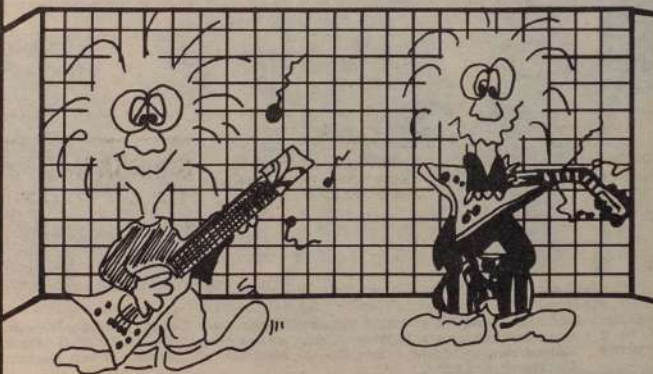
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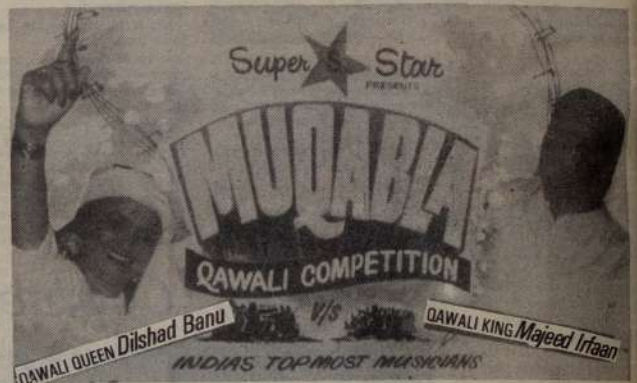

Die Reptilien sind nicht in engen Käfigen oder Glaskästen gehalten, sondern in hübsch gestalteten, zementierten Gruben in einer attraktiven Gartenanlage. Zusätzlich zu den etwa zwanzig Schlangensorten gibt es dort Wasser- und Landschildkröten, Echsen und ein paar Krokodile zu sehen.

## BAMBURI NATURE TRAIL:

Wenn Sie an der Nordküste von Mombasa wohnen, brauchen Sie nicht weit zu gehen, um wilde Tiere in ihrer natürlichen Umgebung zu beobachten. ## LAMU:

Abseits der Zivilisation ist diese Insel, mit dem Flugzeug von Mombasa oder Malindi aus zu erreichen, vielleicht die einzige noch unverdorben Küstenstadt, die die Sitten und Gebräuche aus dem Mittelalter beibehalten hat. Die Straßen wurden so eng gebaut, daß nur Kamele und Esel zirkulieren können. Auch heute verkehren keine Autos in Lamu. Die alten überhängenden Steinhäuser mit dicken Mauern und schweren, geschnitzten Holztüren vermitteln einen Hauch von 1001 Nacht, wenn man den Männern in ihren weißen, wellenden Gewändern und den Frauen in schwarzen Umhängen begegnet.

Wandern Sie am Morgen durch die engen Gassen, betrachten Sie das zweihundert Jahre alte Fort (jetzt als Gefängnis benützt), bestaunen Sie die schwedischen, englischen und arabischen Kanonen an der Promenade am Meer.

Einige ausnehmend schöne Kunstwerke und Schnitzereien sind im Lamu-Museum ausgestellt.

Mittagessen in der Peadley's Inn (Spezialität Meeresfrüchte) oder im Peponi Hotel an der Shellabucht. Am Nachmittag ist ein Bootsausflug zur Manda-Insel zu empfehlen. Besichtigung der

bestehend aus 35 ha Wald, einer ganzen Menge wilder Tiere, 120 verschiedenen Vogelarten, Tilapia-Fischen in jeder Größe und einer kleinen Krokodil-versuchsfarm.

Aus dem häßlichen, kahlen Steinbruch ist durch ein gezieltes Aufforstungsprogramm im Laufe der Jahre ein Erholungspark entstanden. Wo einst die Sonne unbarmherzig auf die Felsen brannte, wandelt man heute unter zwanzig Meter hohen Casuarinabäumen auf einem weichen Nadelteppich durch Wald, über Lichtungen, an Bächen entlang zu den mit Schilf und Seerosen bewachsenen Weihern.

Hier sieht man stattliche Elenantilopen, Oryx, Wasserbüffel, Warzenschweine, Waldschweine, Büffel, Meerkatzen und Paviane. Im Schildkrötengehege findet man eine der größten Arten der Welt, die bis zu 300 Jahre alt wird. In der Fischfarm werden jährlich über 35 Tonnen Tilapia in verschiedenen Tanks je nach der gewünschten Größe für den lokalen Markt produziert.

In einer Reihe von Gruben und Gehegen werden versuchsweise Krokodile gezüchtet.

Eine ganz besondere Attraktion sind die beiden Nilpferde SALLY und POTI, die jeden Nachmittag um vier Uhr zusammen mit vielen anderen Tieren am großen Teich gefüttert werden, wo man sie

## GEDI UND WATAMU:

Gedi liegt 90 km von Mombasa entfernt vor dem neuen Badoort Watamu mit modernen Strand-hotels und einem Marinepark. Die arabische Ruinenstadt aus dem 13. Jahrhundert wurde aus mysteriösen Gründen im 17. Jahrhundert verlassen und erst 1920 wiederentdeckt und ausgegraben. Die große Moschee mit 17 Säulen, der Sultanspalast, das Gefängnis, ein riesiges Säulengrab, mit der Jahreszahl 1399 versehen, und viele Mauerreste von Wohnhäusern weisen auf eine vormals blühende Stadt hin.

Chinesisches Porzellan aus der Ming Dynastie, Glas aus Persien und Karneolperlen aus Indien wurden in Gedi gefunden und sind heute im Museum zu bewundern.

Ein gutes Mittagessen erhalten Sie in einem der Strandhotels in Watamu.

Ein besonderes Erlebnis ist der Marinepark in Watamu, wo Sie einen Blick in die faszinierende, exotische Unterwasserwelt mit bizarren Korallenformationen und bunten Tropenfischen werfen können.

## MALINDI:

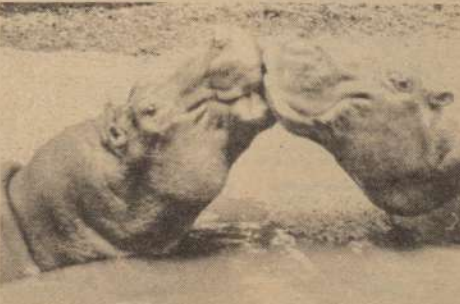

A LEADING MUSLIM Scholar, Sayyid Ahmed Sayyid Mohamed Adnan has passed away at his residence at Pumwani in Lamu last Saturday morning and was buried in the afternoon on the same day.

Sayyid Adnan's sudden death shocked Muslim worshippers who have been attending a week-long annual Lamu Maulidi. He gave his last speech on Wednesday at Swafaa Mosque.

Thousands of Muslims cancelled journey back to their destinations to attend the burial of the late prominent Muslim scholar at Mkomani Muslim Cemetery. It was estimated that more than 10,000 people attended the funeral.

Sayyid Adnan, popularly known as "Mwenye", was a famous scholar in the island, Mombasa, Kenya and other parts of East Africa.

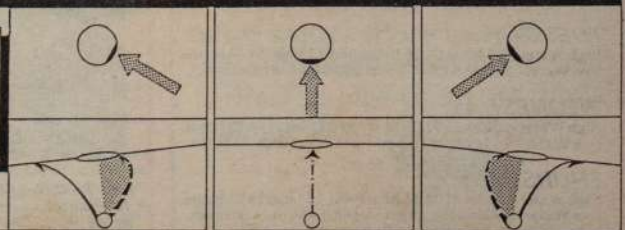

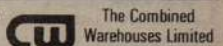
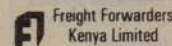
