President Moi Opens 'Jua Kali' Exhibition

GOVERNMENT AIMS TO BOOST INFORMAL SECTOR EMPLOYMENT

HUNDREDS OF THOUSANDS of widely cheering KANU supporters have given His Excellency President Daniel Arap Moi a thunderous welcome to Mombasa Island during his current Coast visit.

One of the main purposes of the President's Mombasa journey is to underline the importance that the KANU Government gives to encouraging support for the 'Jua Kali' (local artisan) sector—which have been holding a three-day exhibition generously sponsored by B.A.T. (Kenya) Limited at the Mombasa Municipal Stadium.

A Government News Agency report on the 'Jua Kali' exhibition explains that Kenya's labourforce is expected to rise from the current 8.6 million to 10.6 million by 1993.

About five million school-leavers will have to be provided with jobs. This means that about 900,000 new jobs per annum will have to be created in the next ten years.

Sessional paper number one of 1986 on Economic Management for Renewed Growth describes the activities of the informal sector as, dynamic area, "that creates jobs at low-cost and caters for the needs

Drip-Irrigation With Tonika Ventures

TONIKA VENTURES in Ratna Square is a Company that "puts its money where its mouth is".

They do not simply give the hard-sell technique, with glossy brochures full of impressive pictures of what can be achieved with irrigation elsewhere, Tonika Ventures Limited (TVL) have established a small shamba at Ratna Square to prove exactly how their system can work here on the Coast.

In a space of less than a quarter-acre, TVL installed their flexible irrigation system and planted out typical fruit and vegetable crops. The irrigation system includes reserve water tank, booster pump to push the water through the system with adequate pressure, in-line capacitor with timing clock, to measure the quantity of water used and to set the sprinkling time, which then turns off the water automatically, filter, fertiliser pump, which pushes fertiliser into the watering system at a pre-regulated dosage, and main pipe, which goes along the length of the shamba, with gate valves to smaller pipes for the sprinklers or drip-irrigation pipes. By this method individual sprinklers can be activated according to need.

Excluding the booster pump, which will vary in price according to the capacity required, the approximate cost of this irrigation

system for the quarter-acre shamba is 30,000/-.

On looking round the shamba the advantages of this system

are obvious.

The crops are all flourishing; TVL were particularly pleased with the White Squash (like courgettes but very pale green), which had begun to produce squash for picking within four weeks from planting and had been very productive with very many flowers and fruits.

The tomatoes are nearly ready for picking, after 10 weeks. TVL planted both East African variety and Israeli variety and both types are heavily laden with fruit in up to five steps per plant (the layers of fruit).

The tomatoes are a very good size and the round Israeli variety are as big as apples, TVL did, of course, use fertiliser in the system to achieve this astounding productivity, but assure us that the increased tonnage makes it well worth while.

Also nearly ready for picking are the sweet melons. The area planted with melons is a mass of verdant leaves and yellow flowers, which is the first indicator of a good crop of fruit.

Underneath this greenery, lay many, many melons, almost one on top of the other, so good is the productivity. Again the melons have taken only 10 weeks from planting to picking.

The rows of aubergines (egg-plants) and sweet peppers are just beginning to fruit, but they also look set to produce good crops. TVL will be keeping a record of the tonnage of fruit picked, to demonstrate exactly what can be achieved over this acreage with the irrigation

system. They welcome visitors to come and look at the shamba and the system in action.

Apart from the high productivity, the drip irrigation system reduces weeds and the associated labour of weeding.

As the water only drips into the soil around the root of the plant, that is the only place where weeds can grow and it is easy to keep them at bay.

FERTILISER

The watering system is also very easy to control, with all the work done at the booster pump unit, by setting the timing of the watering and the fertiliser dosage, then the relevant gate valves to the drip-lines or sprinklers are simply opened and the system regulates itself.

No need to depend on staff and all control is quick and easy.

The system can be designed to fit the individuals needs, so if you want to start with a small area as a test and then extend later, that can easily be accommodated.

Also the piping can easily be removed for storage when not in use, or can be taken from one area under irrigation to another, so it is very flexible.

The irrigation system from Tonika Ventures Limited will help you to control your crops and to increase productivity.

Workload is reduced, but with a constant supply of water, crops can be planted two-three times a year and with regulated fertilisation, the crop tonnage is high.

TVL are pleased to give free advice and design a system specifically to meet your needs. Either they can install, or they will demonstrate how it is done and you can arrange for the installation of the system.

The investment is relatively modest and cash will start flowing in from four-five weeks after planting.

PHOTO-COPYING

It's worth a visit to Maherali's to see red photocopying. (You can have black and white too, of course) Anyway, all they do is insert the cartridge of your choice.

Photocopy reductions and enlargements are from 50 per cent to 200 per cent.

Normally, when photocopying from a book there are lines in the margins, but on this machine in Maherali's they are eliminated. The book or part thereof which you copy can thus be re-bound without the showing of the border usually created by the photocopier.

Also, should you wish to copy two facing pages, this new machine can do them simultaneously. Cuts down time by half, of course.

The last point, very much in favour of Maherali's machine, is that it can copy onto Manila (coloured cardboard) sheets.

So it's the most up-to-date in town....

Maherali also introduce spiral binding and laminating (the latter as big as A-4) into their new look shop. Worth a visit—and what's more, the metered parking lasts a full hour.

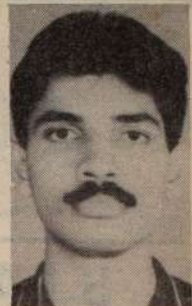

The papers have been handed over to the Rotaract Club of Shanzu for marking. The results will be given out by November 3 1990.

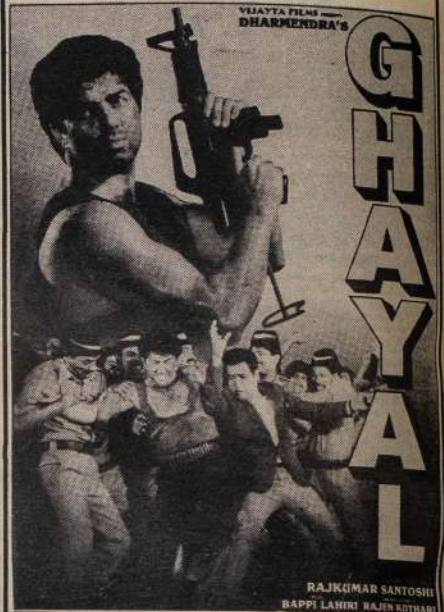

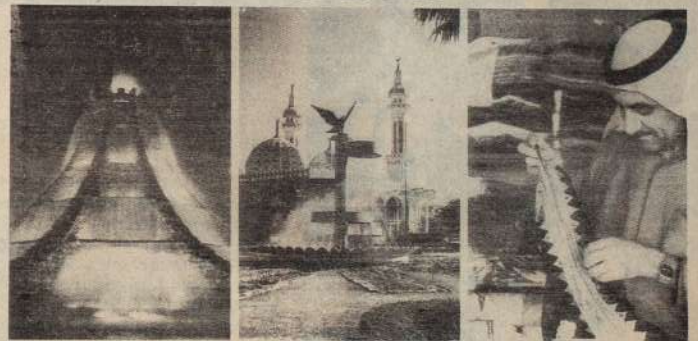

LOOKING AROUND ANY VILLAGE, town or city in Kenya, no one can overlook the mushrooming of the Informal Sector. It is becoming impossible to deny that the Jua Kali entrepreneur is one of the single most important sectors in the future development and economic growth of this country.

One of the financial avenues available to the Jua Kali entrepreneur is the KIE Informal Sector Loans Programme, which was established two years ago to effectively promote the very small businessmen and women operating in the Informal Sector of the economy.

This programme has already

provided credit to over 800 Jua Kali borrowers in 18 stations around the country and is quickly expanding its activities to provide a faster and more flexible facility for a growing number of entrepreneurs.

Although the main thrust of the Informal Sector Programme is the provision of credit, it offers its clients much more than just a loan.

Because many Jua Kali artisans are not familiar with the principles of business management, KIE provides a solid network of financial advice and individual support to the clients throughout their involvement with the

Informal Sector Programme. What people get, therefore, is a certain degree of "credit education" as well as the more tangible financial benefits of receiving a loan.

PROMISING RESULTS

In just two years of operation, the Informal Sector Programme has had a very positive impact on the businesses it has promoted. Sales of KIE-assisted clients have increased at a rate of 35 per cent per year, employment opportunities were created at an average of two jobs per business per year, and the asset base of the businesses has increased by an average of 65 per cent. These

are very promising results which have given KIE renewed vigour for its future activities in the Informal Sector.

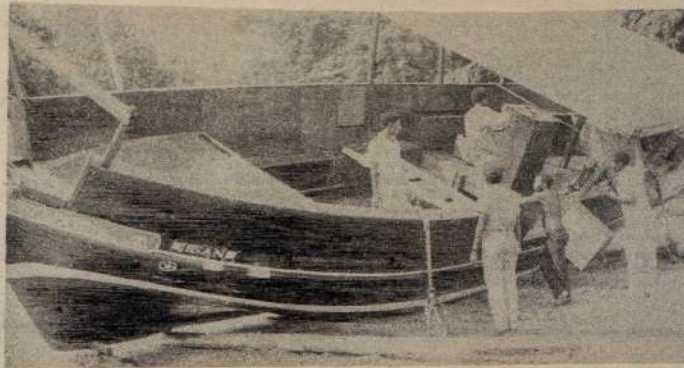

teristics of the small scale enterprise on economic growth for it "conserves scarce foreign exchange, requires very little capital to create jobs, relies primarily on family savings, often provides its own skill training at no cost to the government, and is a prime training ground for future African entrepreneurs".

"Above all, the informal sector offers an unmatched potential as a source of new jobs for the expanding labour-force, while the self-employed and small scale enterprises represent the major part of business activity in market towns and smaller urban centres".

Despite the potential that 'Jua Kali' artisans offer in the economic growth of this nation, particularly in creating employment to the growing number of the country's job seekers, they suffer from a negative public image.

And this is what the display of their ware at the Mombasa Municipal Stadium, on November 1-3 hopes to correct.

Jointly sponsored by the Government and the B.A.T. company, the exhibition has attracted over 300 artisans drawn mainly from furniture makers, tailors, car-repairers, black smiths, welders, jewellers, wood carvers, and manufacturers of leather products and handicrafts, among other trades.

The exhibition is estimated to cost over KShs. two million. The B.A.T. are meeting 60 per cent of the bill.

Mr James Philip Mutiso who is in charge of Jua Kali in the Technical Training and Applied Technology Ministry says a new era has dawned for Jua Kali artisans in the Coast Province.

Sheds have been completed at Voi, Kaloleni (Giriama), Kilifi and Garsen townships, while those in Mombasa town are under construction at Shimanzi.

These sheds are intended to provide central workshops facilities in future and regulate the price structures for local artisans who are currently being overcharged by private workshops.

It is also hoped that the district development committees will award tenders to local artisans taking the example of Mombasa district which has done so.

Talking to 15 local journalists who conducted a ten days tour of the province to gather

information on the activities of the informal sector, the Provincial Commissioner, Mr Simon Mung'alla said there was need to enhance the image and prestige of this sector.

He noted that next to agriculture "Jua Kali" was the largest single employer in the economy which was seen as the surest way of striking a balance in the rural and urban development.

Similar sentiments were expressed by the Lamu D.C. Mr John Makumi, who said that three different sites have been identified in the district for construction of Jua Kali sheds.

Artisans from Lamu will exhibit jewellery, shoes and decorated coastal "mvuli" doors which have won many hearts in our country. Mr Makumi had many seasoned artisans who might come up with a few surprises during the exhibition.

TOYOTA Vehicles Still Remain Most Popular Sales On Local Market

RECENTLY RELEASED new vehicles sales figures for the first nine months of this year indicates that Toyota vehicles continue to be the most popular make in Kenya.

In a total market of just under 9,900 new vehicles sales this year Toyota has sold an impressive 1,927 units, representing approximately one in every five sales or 20 per cent of the new vehicle market.

The total market has remained the same size as in 1989. The forecast does not show any growth.

Nissan continue to chase Toyota in second place, though their market share for 1990 is one percentage point down compared to the 1989 nine month figure.

Isuzu claim third place with a constant 16 per cent market share, with Peugeot dropping down to fourth, with a 15 per cent market share compared to 19 per cent last year.

Even though most models,

with few exceptions like the popular Toyota Corolla 1300, are readily available, sales figures are expected to decline as credit facilities become harder to find.

The popular market leaders in the very competitive saloon car sector are, by order of sales, Peugeot, Toyota Corolla and Nissan Sunny.

The one ton pick-up sector, the largest sector in the Kenyan market, representing 24 per cent in every four sales, continues to be the battle ground of those two giants, the Toyota Hilux and the Peugeot 504 pick-up.

TOYOTA HILUX

With 913 Toyota Hilux sales and 570 Peugeot pick-up sales being recorded in the first nine months, these two makes corner over 60 per cent of one-ton pick-up sales. Other contestants in their class include Nissan, Isuzu, Mitsubishi and Mazda.

The tourist company favourites, the Toyota Hi-Ace and the Nissan E23 continue to dominate the minibus sector with the recently introduced new Hi-Ace increasing its market share up from 30 per cent in 1989 to over 35 per cent this year.

Land Rover and Toyota Land-Cruiser continue to slog it out in the heavy 4x4 sector, with the former picking up most of the Government business and the Land-Cruiser winning more and more friends in the private sector.

The heavy commercial vehicle sector appears to be having a hard time this year with sales remaining static. The only growth area appears to be in the 9-15 ton G.V.W. sector where sales have increased by over 300 trucks. This was mainly due to a severe drop in the six-nine ton G.V.W. sector.

Fuso-Mitsubishi trucks have become very popular with their share of truck sales going on from 25 per cent in 1989 to over 23 per cent. Isuzu continue to be market leaders in the truck market.

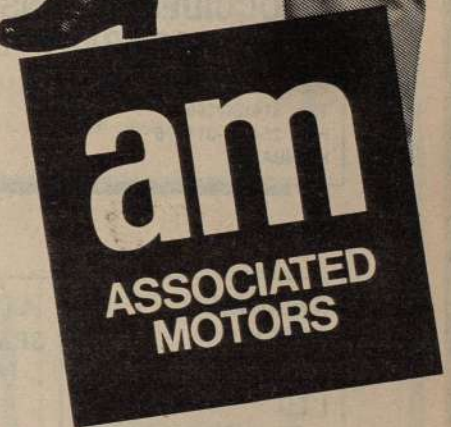

KENIA — Ankerplatz für Luxuskreuzfahrtschiffe

LUXUS-Kreuzfahrtschiffe sind kein ungewohnter Anblick im weltberühmten Kilindi-Hafen von Mombasa, und diese einträgliche Branche des Tourismus soll in den nächsten Jahren noch weiter ausgebaut werden.

Die kenianische Regierung, Reiseveranstalter, Reisebüros und die Hafenbehörde unterstützen alle Anstrengungen, um die internationalen Kreuzfahrtschiff-Linien zu veranlassen, ihre Basisstation in Mombasa einzurichten für kombinierten Safari-Urlaub und Kreuzfahrten im Indischen Ozean.

Der vorne offene Aufenthaltsraum und die Jungle Bar, hoch oben in den Bäumen, sind ideal zur Wildbeobachtung.

Größere und kleinere Elefantenherden verweilen oft stunden-

lang vor der Lodge. Auch sie werden freundlich bewirtet. Zuckerrohr wird am Rande der Wasserstelle wie eine Hecke in die Erde gesteckt und von den Elefanten geräuschvoll geknackt, zerkleinert und genüsslich gekaut. Die kleinsten Elefanten müssen erst noch lernen, wie man das Zuckerrohr in mundgerechte Stücke zerteilt. Es ist ein Vergnügen, ihnen zuzusehen, wenn ihnen bei dieser Tätigkeit einmal der Rüssel oder ein Bein im Weg ist und sie das Zuckerrohr zwischendurch als Spielzeug benutzen. Anschließend gehen sie zum Bach zum Trinken, dann zum Schlammbad, wo sie sich wohligh wälzen und gegenseitig besprühen.

Gleich daneben stehen ein paar Felsen verschiedener Größen und Formen. Diese benutzen sie als Reibsteine oder "Kratzbürsten" gegen Juckreiz am ganzen Körper. Am großen Felsen wird der Rücken gekratzt, am mittleren der Hals. Auf den kleinen sitzen sie, rutschen hin und her, um sich auch am Bauch zu kratzen.

Dieses ergötzliche Schauspiel können die Touristen von einem sicheren Logenplatz in der Dschungelbar hoch oben in den Bäumen genießen.

Die Lodge liegt im Shimba Hills Nationalreservat und ist in einer Autostunde von Mombasa aus zu erreichen. He also presented a cheque of Shs 200,000/- as a contribution from the school as they felt they must also be joint contributors.

He further announced a donation of Shs 100,000/- from the British High Commission in materials, Shs 180,000/- of materials from the Local DDC and Shs 30,000/- worth of cement from the Bamburi Portland Cement Company. The rest of the cost shall be met by the Rotary Club of Bahari.

Mrs. Kili from the Provincial Education Office also praised the club for initiating this project and emphasized that in the 8-4-4 system a workshop for vocational training is a must so that children are trained and when they leave school can carry out useful vocational jobs.

The Chairman Ajit Singh Bhogal in his address thanked all the donors who have been approached by the club members in providing assistance to the club to achieve this major activity.

He said that during the last six years of the existence of the club it has laid emphasis on choosing projects which can train the youth to acquire skills

The District Governor Sir Kailash Ramdane was greatly impressed by the project and said that vocation was the foundation of Rotary Activity.

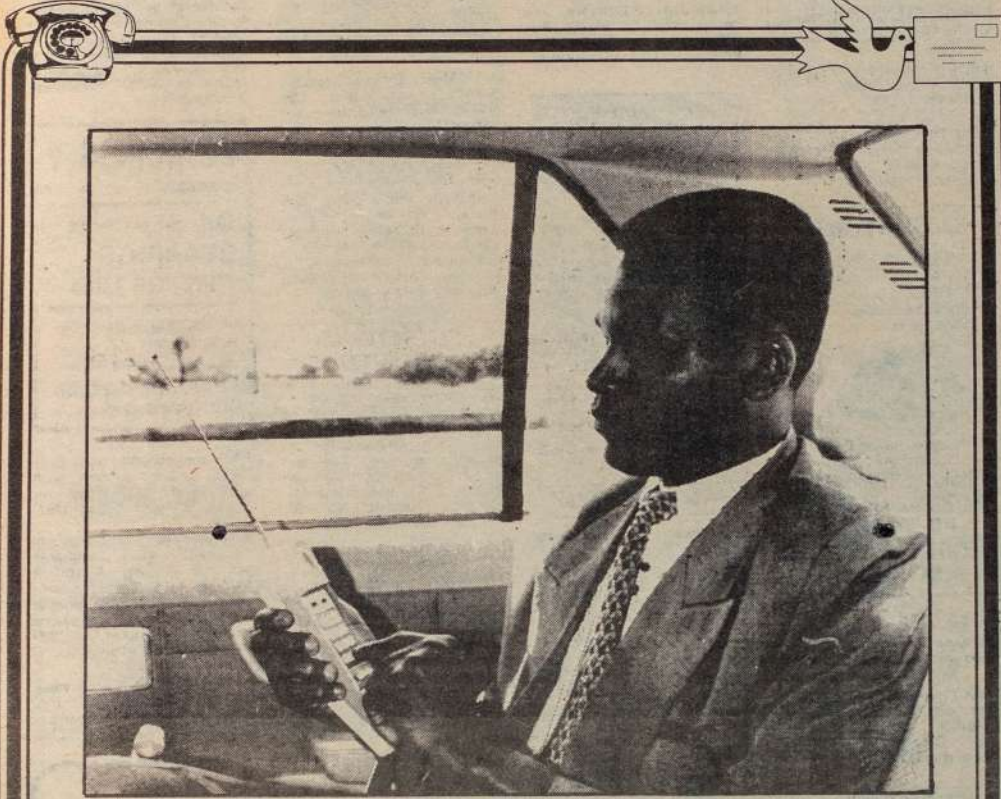
Membership in Rotary is through invitation depending on the vocation of the individual and Rotary International lays a great stress on vocational projects to better the lives of our youth.

Green Buffaloes have themselves to blame for trying to lead in early 1-0 lead. They involved in unnecessary fouling skills to the delight of the fans.

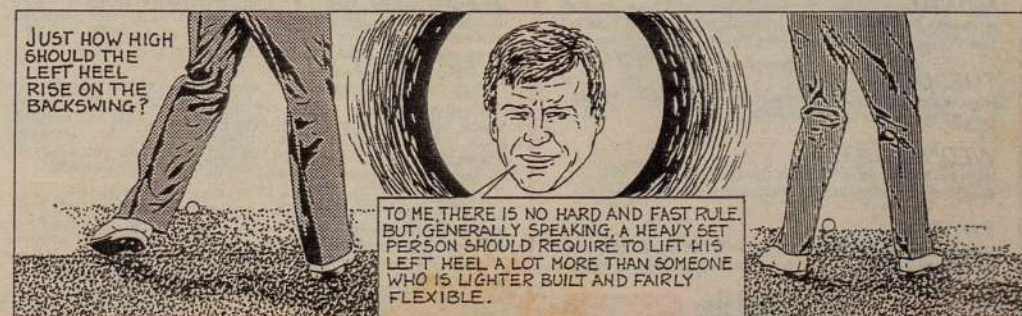
