INDIAN HOUSE CROW REMAINS A MENACE!

NOBODY can deny that the Indian House Crow has become a real menace in Mombasa, and every effort should be made to eradicate this highly intelligent and successful bird, and for this reason the authorities are now offering to pay five shillings for every dead crow.

This might encourage a few more people to build a proper crow-trap, the plans of which can probably be obtained from

Recently I had occasion to take some visitors to see a local trap, and we were appalled to see several dead and dying crows in the trap which had no shade or water or food; they had starved to death slowly !

About four crows should al-ways remain in the trap in order to lure others to enter and feed. When the numbers build up, the surplus crows must be caught and removed.

caught and removed.

To avoid un-necessary stress this can best be done at night when they are roosting. They can be put in a large bag which when placed over the exhaust pipe of a running car engine, will gas them painlessly.

The bodies could then be taken to the Coast Provincial Veterinary Officer where (if lucky), Shs. 51- per bird will be paid over!

the Municipal ouncil Public Health Department, or the Crow Control Committee. Several coast hotels now have these traps on their premises, and there is also one at Likoni, one at the Bamburi Na-ture Trail, and one at the Mam-ba Village Crocodile Farm.

I trust that animal welfare organisations will take action on this matter. Nobody likes crows, but that is no excuse to cause them un-necessary suffering.

The traps can be built quite cheaply of local materials, but the most important factor is that the trap MUST be regularly serviced. This means that fresh water and food bait must be replaced daily and a little shade provided.
