after 'GULF WAR' CRISIS IT LOOKS LIKE ...

THE MOTHER OF FOUR SEASONS!

MOMBASA'S HOTEL Inter-Continental is enjoying a very high occupancy which is expected to continue until March, writes Neta Peal.

This was revealed by the Resident Manager, Mr Antoine Sayegh, who explained 'while the last high season was ruined because of the Gulf War—those who did not take a holiday during January, February and March are doing so now in order to those who normally take a vacation at this time of year.

However, I gather, nothing so far has materialised.

He pointed out that the Japanese are generally big spenders when they come here, and not so budget conscious.

They were being encouraged by their government to take holidays abroad and were flocking to Europe and other destinations in the Far East.

Said Mr Sayegh 'those who have been to Europe many times would now like to go elsewhere and Kenya with her quality hotels is well equipped to receive them'.

Continuing he said 'the French market is picking up, but that as far as South Africa is concerned while there have been many promises about

Consequently, flights from Europe are arriving full and hotels are heavily booked.

Hotel accommodation at the coast is stretched to the limit as a result of which Malindi holiday homes are unprofitable. Many cottages along the Kenya Coast that used to be rented out on a monthly basis are now offering nightly rates in order to accommodate the overflow from hotels.

He continued 'the Gulf War ended at a time when Kenya's tourist season was just starting.

To begin with we had a lot of management from the basic tourism market in Kenya, our low season rates are attracting many from Europe who had postponed their holiday because of the war'.

Other contributory factors to the present tourism boom is that the British market is now very strong due to big promotions here, while this year the Spanish market has come up strongly which, we believe, will continue during the winter season due to the continuing interest in this area.

Said Mr Sayegh 'all hotels are now enjoying high occupancies and we foresee this continuing through into November, with possibly a slight dip in October'.

As far as the Japanese market is concerned he said he had been advertising in one of its magazines we had been hoping for some encouraging signs.

However, the big problem is that of getting here'. Adding that he had been talking of Kenya introducing a service to the Far East which would undoubtedly open up this potentially big market.

Four-Month Plan To Repair Roads

GOVERNMENT AND COUNCIL ARE WORKING TOGETHER

SERIOUSLY CONCERNED ABOUT THE present state of the roads in Mombasa, as well as the adverse effect they may have on Kenya's presently thriving tourist industry—the Kenya Association of Tour Operators, Coast, was prompted to call a meeting with the Deputy Municipal Engineer, Mr Kagambi, to find out more about plans for their repair.

The meeting, under the chairmanship of Karl Heinz Straus, was also attended by the Chairman of the Mombasa and Coast Tourist Association Zul Harunani.

The Deputy Municipal Engineer gave details of the roads which the Mombasa Municipal Council plan to repair in three different phases at an estimated cost of KShs 50 million

It was agreed that tour operators should advise the

council what roads are mostly used by tourists and which are in a bad condition. The meeting urged that these be given priority in phase three of the planning.

Another meeting took place on August 9, this time with Mr N.N. Gekonge, Provincial Works Officer, Coast, Ministry of Public Works, which is responsible for trunk roads in Mombasa.

He informed KATO and MCTA that these trunk roads will be repaired within the next four months. It will also include the south coast road from the Mombasa Municipal and Kwale Council border to Kwale junction

Mr Gekonge also confirmed that the present repairs being carried out by Crescent Construction will be in three phases—the final one being to remove all unevenness on trunk roads.

Members were also assured that the Causeway leading to and from Moi International Airport is being repaired to a very high standard so as to last for a longer period.

It was suggested to Mr Gekonge that if lorries with heavy loads could be provided with a separate lane it would ensure a smoother flow of traffic on the Causeway.

PHILIPS MEDICAL Systems, of The Netherlands, have donated a Shs. 25 million CT Scanner to the National Museums of Kenya.

The donation of the scanner was announced by the Museum's chairman, Dr Richard Leakey, during the launching of the Museum's Indigenous Agricultural Knowledge Programme, a unique project to initiate scientific research and natural resources management of traditional and modern agricultural systems in Kenya.

Also present at the press conference were Philips Medical Systems Netherlands regional manager, Mr Raymond Mathay; Philips Medical Systems Kenya general manager, Mr Eckhard Schuetze; Philips Kenyan chairman and managing director Mr Frits Stroeken; National Museums of Kenya director, Dr Mohammed Isahakia; and Dr. L. Jan Slikkerveer, of Leiden University in The Netherlands.

NATIONAL MUSEUMS

Mr Stroeken explained Philips Medical Systems of The Netherlands would deliver the CT Scanner at the National Museum's Nairobi headquarters while Philips Medical Systems Kenya would install it and train Museum staff and maintain the highly sophisticated X-Ray equipment.

The Indigenous Agricultural Knowledge Programme is executed under the auspices of the World Decade for Cultural Development of UNESCO as a five year project and implemented within the framework of the scientific Kenyan and Netherlands Co-operation established in 1988, between the National Museums of Kenya and Leiden University.

The CT Scanner has multipurpose utilisation for medical, physical palaeo-botanical, soil sampling, faunal, floral and

One of the wheels had come out of the axle and the mkokoteni was pitched to one side.

They do not have jacks, spare wheels or such similar comforts that are normally found in the raw material from which they are made.

The people who were associated with the trip were sitting by the road side waiting for someone to give a hand.

I left them continuing their wait and snarling up the traffic that had been reduced to single lane.

As Kachumbari says, its all in the transport game!

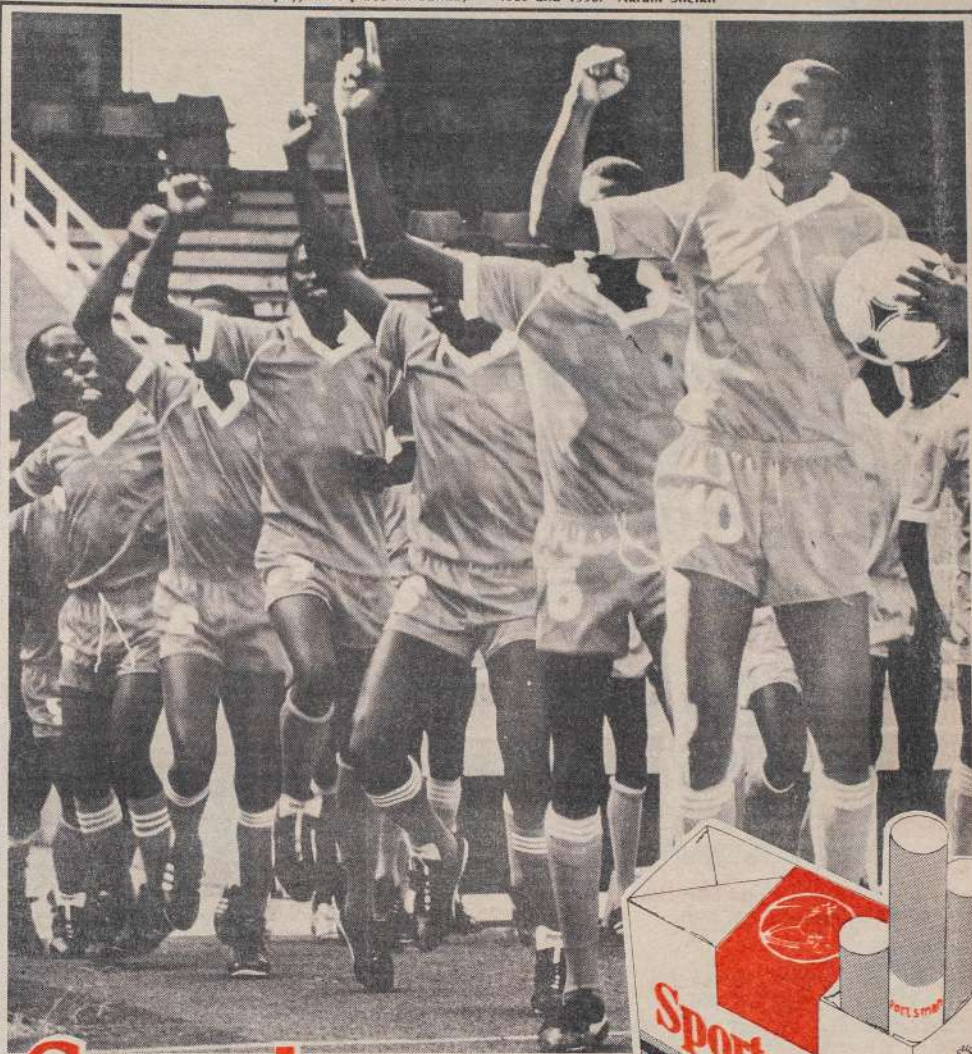
