ENTERTAINING GUESTS WITH 'PWANI' WINES ...

YOU'RE ENTERTAINING IN these days of shortages of money, and shortage of beer so we've combined a visit to Pwani Wines and Spirits Merchants Limited and a look at one of Marguerite Patten's books and have come up with some suggestions.

Jayshree, the woman behind Pwani Wines, has just returned from the vineyards of South Africa and Australia, so wines it will be this time.

She suggests the not too expensive pineapple product "Vin D'Ananas" (Dry White full bottle 52/95) or Vin D'Ananas (Sparkling, half bottle 28/90).

Or try Rumanian Riesling on their Pinot Noir Murfaltar.

Good value in wines not bottled here are Chianti Colli Senesi (Red); and Vernaccia di San Gimignano (white)—the latter from Italy's famous San Gimignano Valley.

To save, instead of the usual red wine with meats and white

with fish and poultry, give the guests a good welcome—just as they enter the door and forget about the formalities at meal time.

On the market at the moment are very cheap citrus and golden passion so you can spend a little more on the white wine that you would normally as a kind of compensation.

Below is the Mombasa version of Punch—2 lemons, 2 oranges, or three of those small 50 cent ones, a Big Breakfast cup of water, 3 dessert-spoons of sugar (or if you can't get it use Sweetex, or Hermasetis or Canderial mixed with a little hot water), ice cubes, two bottles Pwani Wines Rocamar White (Spanish), Pwani Wines miniature bottle of 3 Barrels Brandy.

Decoration: Cucumber slices, orange slices, sprigs of mint (optional).

Parse the rind from the lemons and oranges very thinly. Squeeze out the juice and put aside. Simmer the peel you've pared in the water for about five minutes to get a rich tangy flavour. At this juncture you can add the artificial sweetener and boil together,

or, if real sugar add it after the five minutes' simmering. Strain and allow to cool, then blend with the squeezed out fruit juices.

Put the ice into a serving bowl add the fruit mixture, Rocamar and three Barrels brandy. Stir gently to mix then decorate with the cucumber, orange slices and mint if used, and the glass rim should be dipped in pink sugar.

There is now enough to make 16 glasses, or eight thirsty people (guests).

Jayshree also recommends "Cocktails of the Zodiac", which, coincidentally, this month makes use of Passion (and we suggest the golden passion):

2 parts Gilbey's Gin, half part Fresh Double Cream, three parts Passion Fruit Juice, Crushed Ice.

Shake the Gin, Passion Fruit and Cream. Pour into a glass filled with crushed ice. Decorate with a white franjipani and serve with straws.

His own telephone is No. 494965. "He's my right hand", says his father, and this one (nudging his second son) is my left hand.

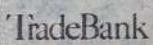

OFFICERS OF THE Mombasa and Coast Tourist Association on paying a courtesy call on the new District Commissioner, Mr J.K. N'gino, found him to be a 'Man of Action' and chairman of many important district committees dealing with issues about which the tourism industry is concerned.

He is also a Nominated Member of the Mombasa Municipal Council.

After being given details of issues about which MCTA is most concerned, the DC promised to investigate with a view to action being taken and advise the association accordingly.

Declared the DC 'I am an implementer'. He immediately responded to a suggestion that his office should be represented on the MCTA committee by appointing Mr A.R.C. Nzano, District Environment Officer.

Said the DC who is chairman of the District Development Committee (DDC) 'I am delighted to hear that there is an organisation such as yours, and thank you for your concern over the tourists coming to Kenya, most of whom come to the Coast'.

Adding 'we are also concerned Tourism is Kenya's Number One earner of foreign exchange and it is government's wish to help promote it'.

He told MCTA 'the issues you have raised are already under discussion on our various committees and I would like to assure you that as Chairman of the DDC that I am also concerned and would like to see 'tourism grow'.

'Let me assure you' he added 'that we shall try our level best to ensure that tourists are treated properly and well so that when they return home they can tell their families and friends that Kenya is a very good country for an enjoyable holiday'.

The DC told MCTA 'I entirely agree with you that for a tourist to be happy water must be available at all times and there must be security as well as other essential services'.

He heard that earlier this year some tourists had ended their holiday abruptly on finding insufficient water at their hotels on the north coast. Said the MCTA chairman 'it is ruining the holiday of many'.

The DC mentioned that 'government has formed a District Water Board of which I am chairman. This question of water at Mombasa will be discussed there, as well as on the District Development Committee'.

'Water Must Be Made Available At All Times ...'

The MCTA chairman, Zul Hanunani, told the DC that the Regional Manager, Coast of the National Water Conservation and Pipeline Corporation, Mr P.G. Munoru, had been invited to their last committee meeting to explain what is being done to alleviate the present shortage of water.

He went on 'we are all aware that the demand is greater than the present supply and that it will take about ten years to meet it. However, we feel this should be treated with much greater urgency so as to ease the present situation. Many hotels and restaurants are having to buy supplies from outside, while many householders are without water in their taps most of the day. Some have no water at all for quite a time. Toilets remain unflushed and standards of hygiene are dropping'.

'PEAK SEASON'

He went on 'November is the start of the 'peak' tourist season which is expected to be very good. Tourists are paying thousands of shillings for a holiday here. If they do not have enough water for their needs, some are demanding to be compensated'.

There is also a water problem on the south coast.

The DC was also briefed about plans being made at the Coast to mark African Tourism Week (September 23-28).

Said the MCTA chairman 'it is hoped that the Mombasa Municipal Council might paint

the Tusk Arches for the occasion, and mentioned that paint had been donated to the Municipal Council some time ago for this purpose'. Adding 'these tasks which are photographed by thousands of tourists should be properly maintained by the Council'.

He told the DC that the Kenya Association of Hotel-keepers' and Caterers', Kenya Association of Tour Operators and MCTA are organising a luncheon for the tourism industry in Nairobi to mark World Tourism Day on September 27, while at Mombasa MCTA is planning a cocktail party at Fort Jesus Museum.

The MCTA chairman also asked if the shortages of essential commodities including cooking oil, sugar, flour, butter, kimbo and maize meal could be investigated as these frequent shortages are creating many problems not only for the hotel industry, but wananchi'.

The DC replied that the District Essential Commodities Committee would be meeting on September 23 and these matters would be discussed with a view to seeing that more supplies are available.

The continued harassment of tourists by beach boys was also raised. Said the MCTA chairman 'tourists cannot walk even 100 yards along a beach without being accosted by them selling woodcarvings, jewellery, tours etc'.

Most are doing this illegally and the fines imposed by courts are so low they are not acting

MALINDI 'SECURITY PROBLEMS' SERIOUS

THE RAPIDLY INCREASING crime rate in Malindi was not only to be deplored but should be stamped out as quickly as possible. Of late the number of incidents of this nature were becoming alarming in frequency and in violence.

This warning was issued by Mr Lacy Menyhart the chairman of the Mombasa Coast Tourist Association (MCTA) Chapter in Malindi.

Speaking at a recent MCTA meeting in Mombasa Mr Menyhart deplored the upsurge in crime and warned that it could have far reaching effects on the tourist industry if not checked as quickly as possible.

He attributed some of the possible causes as being the side effects created by speed and ease of access to Malindi which the opening of the new bridge presented to criminal elements from Mombasa.

as a deterrent. Stiffer fines were called for.

It was also claimed that some are being licensed to trade on the beach by the Mombasa Municipal Council.

Handicraft Villages had been planned in which beach boys could sell their wares, giving them an alternative sales point. They would not be deprived of a living, but could no longer continue with their business on the beach.

The association also paid a courtesy call on the new OCPD Urban Police, Mr J. Kinysia, and expressed its concern about security at the coast following a number of recent robberies and continued harassment of tourists by beach boys.

They suggested a much stiffer fine for beach and street boys, and claimed that some are actually licensed to trade on the beach.

The also asked if the opening of Handicraft Villages on the north and south coast might be speeded up so that beach boys could be moved there and then stopped from carrying on any business on the beach.

They also suggested that the police force is provided with sufficient transport to deal with emergency calls when robberies are taking place. In some cases those seeking help are asking to provide transport causing delay in apprehending the criminals.

'IDENTITY CARD'

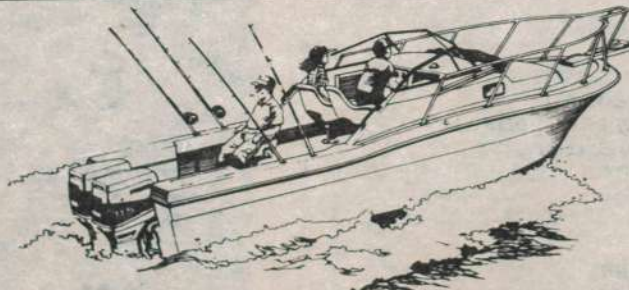
The association also mentioned the growing concern in the tourism industry about the Tiwi area which is in urgent need of more security.

The OCPD noted that the Tiwi area on the south coast comes within the jurisdiction of the Provincial Police Officer, but promised to convey the association's concern to him.

The picking up by the police of tourists not in possession of a passport at night was also discussed. The OCPD considered it would be acceptable if hotels could issue them with some document confirming they were staying with them.

The OCPD was shown an identity card which had been forged. It was made out to a woman, but the picture affixed was that of a man!

In the MCTA delegation, led by the chairman, Zul Hanunani, were the First Deputy Chairman, Mrs Lorna Hayes; Second Deputy Chairman, Nourudin Tejar; Mrs D. Nzioka, Executive Officer and committee members Mrs Rahab Mwendwa; N. Balala, Jackson Kieya and Neta Peal, the MCTA's Hon PRO.

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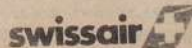

The name *La Terrazza* comes from the fact that it is built on a terrace on the cliff-top overlooking the mouth of Kilindini Harbour. The setting has been utilised to maximum advantage; the well-established Frangipani and Coconut trees form an integral part of the restaurant, which is cleverly laid out on two levels creating a feeling of privacy despite the spaciousness. Diners are protected from the wind by enormous sliding glass windows and from the inclement weather by pergola roofing.

This makes for the perfect place to enjoy lunch al-fresco, cooled by the sea breezes and shaded from the hot Mombasa sun. *La Terrazza* now opens for lunch, as well as the *a la carte* special 'Businessman's Lunch' menu is offered. This ensures that lunch need not take too long — unless you want it to!

Executive Chef Giuliano Zannette demonstrates the value of his 20+ years of experience with a well thought out and creative Italian Menu. He has made best use of the local ingredients, preparing the dishes in Italian and International style to a very high standard.

I had heard that *La Terrazza* was excellent for pizzas and home-made pastas, but the first time we went there, I wanted Seafood and that was so good that I still have not eaten a pizza there, but I am very reliably informed that they are the best in town.

For those who wish to enjoy a top class dinner, *La Terrazza* offers a selection of dishes to please every taste and appetite. For Starters the meat dishes are

DRIED BEEF, PARMA HAM AND MELON

typically Italian with items such as Parma Ham and melon and a platter of salamis and dried beef.

The seafood dishes offer some imaginative ways of preparing the local fresh seafood—the Lobster and avocado in saffron sauce was excellent.

Vegetarians are catered for throughout the menu, the vegetarian in our group was delighted with the grilled oyster mushrooms—in fact we all enjoyed them as the portion was too big for her!

The soups are more International but one dinner at the table chose the Chef's answer to bouillabaisse and said it was one of the best fish soups he had ever eaten.

My favourite section of the menu is the Seafood Specialities, there is a wide choice of both plain chargrilled and "saucy" fish and seafood.

This time I tried the Crab meat flambee with pernod and served with pilau rice, which was delicious, as was the Red Snapper fillet in terragon sauce, which I had last time.

The most exotic-looking dish was served at the next table, with all kinds of crustacean and fish arrayed on a large copper platter, curiosity got the better of me and for purposes of this article, I asked the diners to comment.

They said it was the Mixed Grilled Seafood, which was served with garlic butter and a spicy sauce and declared the seafood excellent.

The men in our group ordered meat and both were very happy with their choices.

Indeed, I also tasted the Molo Lamb fillet in puff pastry, which was melt-in-the-mouth divine, and the T-bone steak with bearnaise sauce was both large and tender.

Chef Giuliano's special is a Fondue of beef, chicken, lamb and fish, which is perfect for a long lazy dinner.

All main dishes are served with seasonal vegetables, so the salads are exciting concoctions especially for those who would like one as a starter. Or you can compose a salad from the buffet.

DIFFERENT FLAVOURS ...

We had to take quite a break before we were able to move on to the delicious desserts. *La Terrazza* make their own ice-creams and sorbets in at least a dozen different fresh flavours, which are so good it is worth making a space for them.

es dann während genau neun Minuten gebraten und kurz stehengelassen, bevor es geschnitten wird.

Auf der neuen Speisekarte wurden die Gerichte von 49 auf 33 reduziert, damit man sich besser darauf konzentrieren kann, diese perfekt zuzubereiten.

ihre großen Beliebtheit beibehalten. Es sind dies: Rindsfilet Madagaskar, Chiesan Vasco da Gama und mariniertes Red Snapper. "Ich bin überzeugt, wenn sich die letzteren nicht mehr auf der Speisekarte befänden, würden sich viele Stammkunden beschweren," sagte Paul Jones lachend. "Sie passen auch sehr gut zu den neuen Gerichten wie Milkenpastete und mariniertes Schwarzer Barsch aus dem Naivashasee."

Die Filets werden 30 Minuten stehengelassen, dünn geschnitten und mit einer Garnitur serviert.

Jede Woche wird eine Sendung Barsche aus Naivasha ins Inter-Continental Hotel in Mombasa geliefert. Sie sind ähnlich wie Forellen.

Paul Jones ist seit anderthalb Jahren im Hotel Inter-Continental und hat unterdessen herausgefunden, was auf dem Markt erhältlich ist wie z. B. Milken aus Vipingo und Schwarzer Barsch aus dem Naivashasee. Er erhält Produkte aus ganz Kenia, muß aber oft etwas mehr bezahlen, um wirklich die beste Qualität zu erhalten, vor allem wenn die Ware rar ist.

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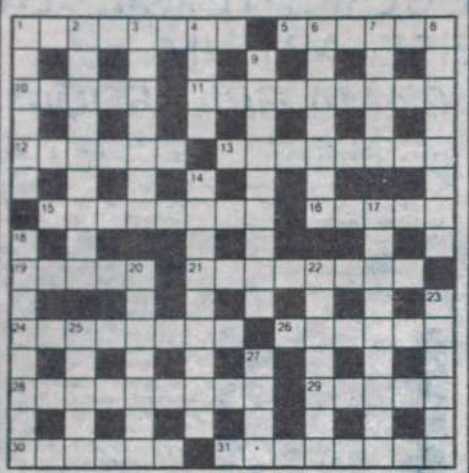

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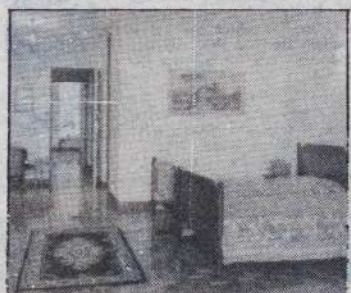
