Week, events for which were organised by a committee comprising officers from the Ministry of Tourism, MCTA, KABC, KATO and Kenya Airways at the coast.

The Deputy PC conveyed apologies from the Provincial Commissioner, Mr Simeon Mung'ala who, due to a prior engagement, was unable to attend.

The PC, in a speech read by his Deputy, thanked all concerned in the tourist industry for making Kenya one of the most popular tourist destinations in the world.

Referring to the adverse effects which the Gulf War had had on tourism generally, the PC said 'in efforts to return to a stable growth path, African countries should address themselves to the continuity of peace and stability worldwide, not only as a pre-requisite of African tourism development but also to promote international understanding'.

Towards this end, he said 'I wish to commend H.E. The President, Hon. Daniel arap Moi, for his tireless efforts of

championing the cause of maintaining and restoring peace in Africa.

Referring to the benefits derived from tourism, the PC said that 'during 1990, 80,000 tourists visited Kenya of which 60 per cent landed in the coast province. This had earned the country KShs 10.7 billion in foreign exchange.

The PC was also happy to note that one million tourists are expected during 1991.

He went on 'the industry has also generated employment to the tune of 110,000 directly employed in the industry, while another 50,000 derive employment indirectly from multiplier effects generated by tourism income'.

Declared the PC 'taking this trend into account it is quite clear that tourism will continue to play an important role in the

development of Kenya's economy'.

By the way, Gallery Masha'Allah also wash and repair all hand-knotted rugs and carpets.

To get to them turn into the road called Ndia Kuu just before Mombasa Club and opposite Fort Jesus. About 300 meters along on your right you'll find the Gallery. Note too their telephone numbers 226615 and 229148.

Even as we went out under the Afghani Tent Door Hanging we had to turn round to make one last glimpse of the Hand-knotted oriental carpets.

OVERHEAD FANS AVAILABLE FROM CHANDULAL BROTHERS

The original models are back, that is, overhead fans, for they cover a vast area with a mild yet cool breeze, as opposed to the directional gust from pedestal and table types.

But they are updated in that they are of the latest streamline fashion. The diameter is 56".

They are reasonably priced, too, surprisingly.

Chandulal Brothers (corner Old Kilindini Road-Samburu Road, with a wooden facade) and Manish General Agencies (actually in Samburu Road as you're facing Central Police Station) are both direct importers of these overhead fans, but they will welcome individual buyers as well as the trade sector.

The ceiling fans themselves are made by Crompton Greaves, whose apt company slogan is "Buy Crompton Greaves—Buy the Best".

Crompton Greaves is a member of the Hawker Siddeley Group—United Kingdom (If you're wondering whether that is the aeroplane group, you're right!)

but the fans are made in India under licence and strict quality control. Their control matches the British Standard Specification.

As it is as warm in India as here in Mombasa the fans suit our coastal region, and some up-country areas. Even in office blocks in Nairobi, especially in concrete buildings, where day-time heat is retained, the installation of fans is a must for good conditions.

Good employers know that being on the ceiling these fans keep the whole group of workers cool.

Individually Crompton Greaves ceiling fans sell for K.Shs. 1,250/-, but they are cheaper to traders who buy in bulk.

At present there is a lot of construction going on and both the Chandulal Brothers and Manish General Agencies suggest that fans be incorporated in the building process, or architects make allowances for internal wiring.

He would soon travel to Zanzibar to also explore the possibility of using Twarab talents in his prospective films.



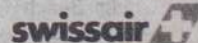

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Our Heritage of Faith...

HOW MANY SEEDS are there on a maize cob? What would your answer be?

Recently I estimated that one cob consisted of about 600 seeds; amazing, when you think that it all started with a single seed! And that there may be several cobs on the plant.

Would the seed survive to produce a harvest if it is planted on a pathway where people walk? — or in shallow soil over a rock? — or surrounded by weeds?

No, to get a harvest we need a good depth of fertile soil, as well as sunshine, along with regular watering and weeding.

Jesus told a parable to teach us the importance of applying God's word to our lives.

'A farmer went out to sow his seeds...some fell on the path... some on a rock...some among thorns...still some fell on good soil and yielded a crop...' (Luke

8:4-8).

Afterwards his disciples asked what the parable meant. Jesus replied:

'The seed is the word of God'. He went on to explain what when this word comes to us sometimes the devil snatches it away before it takes root-like the seed on the path; snatched up by birds.

Other times the word is received gladly but does not take root: like the seed in the shallow soil - in times of testing that person will fall away.

The seed that fell among thorns is like those who hear but life's worries, riches and pleasures prevent them from maturing.

'But the seed on good soil stands for those with a noble and good heart, who hear the word, retain it, and by preserving produce a crop'.

While we give thanks to God for his year's harvest, let us remember that the fruit of the Spirit is needed just as much.

Let us aim to let God's Spirit produce this fruit in our lives— 'Love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control' (Galatians 5:22).

'Crooked Waiters'

I AM A MALINDI resident who visited Mombasa this week to show some friends from Holland the sites of Fort Jesus and Old Town.

It was very interesting but the visit was spoiled by the now notorious and mercenary attitude of certain hotel and restaurant waiters in Mombasa.

At a town hotel for lunch the waiter brought us a piece of paper on which he had written Shs 340/- for a round of six beers and a soda!

When we asked for an official receipt the figure came to Shs 230/- . We asked to see the manager but the waiter said, "Sorry, I must have brought you the bill for the wrong table".

That evening we enjoyed a good meal and drinks at a very exclusive Mombasa restaurant, where we encountered almost a repeat exercise of the lunchtime corruption.

The waiter had written down on a piece of paper Shs 1400/-, and when we asked for the official receipt the figure was down to Shs 1,100/- . He refunded the Shs 300/- from his own pocket and said "Sorry, my mistake!"

However, this time we managed to get hold of the manager and registered an official protest at this thieving behaviour and we were assured that "action will be taken".

I am sorry that inflation is officially running at 21 per cent (although I think it is probably much higher for some income groups in Kenya) nevertheless this does not give a few corrupt waiters in Mombasa the right to fuel this sad economic trend by stealing from customers and patrons.

I hope this letter will result in everyone being more careful when it comes to paying the bills at Mombasa hotels and restaurants. "Ashamed", MALINDI.

TODAY HARDLY A DAY passes without the public media informing us that a person or a sect or a group of people has been refused entrance to or ejected from a mosque or a church or any place dedicated to the worship of God.

Ignorance and prejudice have made us absolutely intolerant to the meaning that the other draws from the same or similar Books we read.

God established in His Last Revelation to Mankind, the Qu'ran, the principle of freedom of worship in a public mosque or place dedicated to the worship of God. In Al-Baqara 114, interpreted in English, God says:-

"And who is more unjust than he who forbids that in places for the worship of God, God's name should be celebrated—whose zeal is (in fact) to ruin them? It was not fitting that such should themselves enter them except in fear. For them there is nothing but disgrace in this world, and in the world to come, an exceeding torment".

God sent this revelation when the Arab Pagans of Mecca tried to shut out Prophet Muhammad (PBUH) and his followers from the Ka'ba, the first House of God, the universal place of divine worship to Muslims.

The sanctity and the very existence of the Ka'ba (place of worship for God) and unity of Muslims (Faith, here Islam) were saved and maintained.

It also served as a warning to the pagans and a forerunner to the faithful that in the nearest future God will empower his prophet(s) and followers to conduct prayers in and sanctify all places of worship.

Al Baqara 114, and indeed the whole Qur'an, is applicable today, and everyday, to us as it did to those who lived before and during the life of Muhammad Mustafa (PBUH).

Physically the prophets of God may not be with us today, the

revelations they sent to us, by God's will, and their expository lifestyles, reign supreme; again even if some of us are far away from Mecca or Jerusalem.

There may exist differences between one individual and another, or between one group and another as to the nature of God or the proper mode of worship, but no test can be laid down, nor can one individual or sect or group of people exclude another.

So long as a person enters reverently and does nothing outwardly to cause offence to other worshippers, he has a right to go and worship in a public place set apart for God's worship. For God knows what we know not. Wa-salaam.

enabled African Tourism Week to be such a success.

The Provincial Tourist Officer, Sam Okungu, said 'we in the tourist industry at the coast have reason to rejoice because of our achievements and of helping make African Tourism Week such a success'.

'We in the Ministry of Tourism are very grateful to the industry'.

He urged everyone to help maintain the momentum of tourism growth, adding 'with the stability we have in this country the sky is the limit'.

we witnessed an increase in tourism with most hotels achieving between 80-100 per cent bed occupancy during July and August. He revealed that bookings for hotels and lodges also look very good for the coming winter season.

GEDENKFEIER FÜR DAN TRENCH — PIONIER DER HOTELINDUSTRIE AN DER SÜDKÜSTE

DIE überkonfessionelle Kapelle St. Stephens auf dem Gelände der Africana Sea Lodge war Mitte August voll besetzt mit Freunden aller Rassen und Klassen, die an der Gedenkfeier für Daniel Power le Poer Trench — einer der frühen Pioniere der kenianischen Hotelindustrie — teilnahmen.

Dan Trench wurde 1919 in Nyeri geboren und starb am 4. Juli 1991, nachdem er den größten Teil seines Lebens in Jadini, Diani, verbracht hatte. Er hinterläßt drei Kinder — Ian, Chris und Sarah — und vier Enkel. Seine Eltern Maxie und Nelly le Poer Trench bauten in den dreißiger Jahren das Jadini. Es lag damals im Küstenwald, in welchem Löwen, Büffel, Leoparden, Antilopen und Kolobusaffen wohnten.

1969 wurde Jadini an einen Mr. Robinson verkauft und 1970 von Alliance Hotels erworben. Seit 1970 konnte sich das Jadini Beach Hotel einer der höchsten Belegungsquoten an der kenianischen Küste rühmen. Es wurde ständig beliebter und mehrmals erweitert. Dan Trench war stets an der Weiterentwicklung interessiert, vor allem am Umbau für Shs 60 Millionen. Er starb nur wenige Wochen vor dessen Abschluß.

1970 hatte das Jadini 60 Betten; 1991 wurde die Bettenzahl auf 334 erhöht. Alliance Hotels kaufte angrenzendes Land von der le Poer Trench Familie und von anderen Leuten, um darauf die 316 Betten Africana Sea Lodge zu bauen, die 1978 eröffnet wurde. Alliance Hotels baute eine Kapelle auf dem Grundstück zum Gedenken an Maxie und Nelly le Poer

Trench, die Gründer des Jadini Hotels. Maxie und Nelly starben ein Jahr nacheinander 1968 und 1969. Ihre Asche wurde auf dem Gelände von Jadini verstreut, das sie so liebten.

Nach dem Danksagungs-Gottesdienst für Dan Trench Mitte August wurde eine zweite Tafel an der Kapellentür enthüllt mit einer Inschrift zum Gedenken an Daniel P. le Poer Trench 1919 — 1991 von Jadini. Anschließend fuhr die Familie mit einem Boot aufs Meer hinaus.

Jadini entstand aus den Namen der drei Kinder von Maxie und Nelly — Jack, Ann und Dan. An der Danksagung nahmen folgende Familienmitglieder teil: Mrs. Sarah Moller (Tochter) und Karen (3 Jahre) aus Nairobi; Jack Trench (Bruder) und seine Frau Dorothy; Mrs. Nancy Wise (Schwester); Chris Trench (Sohn) und Kathleen Bonham (Kusine).

Ebenfalls anwesend waren, ausser vielen Freunden und Bekannten, Management und Personal von Alliance Hotels und von Nomads. Der Gedenk-Gottesdienst wurde von Kaplan Richard Diamond von der Seemannsmission gehalten.

Dan Trench erhielt seine Schulbildung im Loreto Convent, in der Kenton und Prince of Wales School in Kenia. Dann kehrte er nach Seremai auf die Kaffeefarm in Nyeri zurück. Als der Krieg ausbrach, wurde er der KAR Nachschub und Transport Division zugeteilt. Mitte der vierziger Jahre wurde er wegen einer schweren zerebralen Malaria aus dem Dienst entlassen. Ende der vierziger Jahre ging er nach Jadini, um den Eltern im Hotel zu helfen, das er bis 1969 leitete, als es an Mr. Robinson verkauft wurde. Dann lebte er auf einem Campingplatz nebenan bis zu seinem Tode.

In einem Interview sagte Danc Schwester Mrs. Nancy (Ann) Wise: "Mein Vater wurde 1914 von der britischen Regierung nach Kenia geschickt als Berater für Kaffeebau. Meine Mutter und ich folgten ihm 1915. 1923 waren wir eine der ersten Familien, die Urlaub an der Küste verbrachten. Wir wohnten in einem Haus, das der Kirchenmission in Freretown, Mombasa, gehörte. 1934 fand mein Onkel ein Grundstück an der Diani Beach. Es war wunderschön, mitten im Küstenwald. Wir kauften bald darauf das angrenzende Grundstück. Wir mußten uns unseren Weg durch den Busch hacken. Unser Ferienhaus hatte drei Zimmer und eine Veranda mit zwei Umkleidekabinen für Knaben und Mädchen."

Das einzige andere Hotel in Diani war damals das "Two Fishes". 1969 wurde das Jadini an einen Mr. Robinson verkauft und 1970 von Alliance Hotels erworben.

Dreißeig neuen Zimmer ersetzen einige sehr alte Räume, so daß das Jadini nun über insgesamt 172 klimatisierte Zimmer verfügt, alle mit Miniatur, Radio und Telefon mit Direktwahl. Alle bereits bestehenden Zimmer, einschließlich die Badezimmer, wurden komplett renoviert.

MARKTSZENEN

Der Speisesaal und die Aufenthaltsräume sind jetzt viel näher am Meer. Das "Ocean Restaurant" mit Schiebefenstern auf drei Seiten bietet eine herrliche Panoramansicht auf den Strand und den Ozean. Die attraktiven Wandgemälde mit afrikanischen Marktszenen und wilden Tieren stammen von Peter Pakara.

Ebenfalls im "Ocean Restaurant" kann man eine neue Art von Wandgemälden bewundern, entwickelt von Duri Sheikh, einer Architektin in Mombasa, die Wandmalerei als Hobby betreibt. Auf der Terrasse werden leichte Gerichte und Snacks serviert.

Das Hummer Restaurant im Freien ist attraktiver geworden, serviert tagsüber Getränke am Pool und abends Cocktails, die bei Sonnenuntergang besonders beliebt sind.

Der auf der einen Seite offene Speisesaal und die Bar liegen über dem neuen Wassersportzentrum, das Tauchen, Surfen und Hochseesifchen arrangiert.

BILLARDZIMMER

Demnächst wird auch die klimatisierte Piano Bar eröffnet, tagsüber ein ruhiger Ort zum Lesen und Schreiben. Darüber befindet sich ein Billardzimmer mit Meersicht.

Die Gäste können an der baumbestandenen Strandpromenade flanieren. Neu ist auch die Einkaufsarkade mit interessanten Läden und einigen Büros.

Überdies hat das Jadini klimatisierte Tagungsräume, und das "Jambo Village", wo man im Freien sitzen und köstliche panafrikanische Küche genießen kann, ist immer gut besucht.

"Viele Freunde kamen auf Besuch. Wir kauften weiteres Land und unser Ferienhaus, genannt Jadini, war nicht nur bei Gästen aus Kenia, sondern auch aus England und Südafrika sehr beliebt. Manche buchten ein bestimmtes Cottage ein Jahr im voraus."

Eines Tages saß Nancy auf der Veranda um zwei Uhr früh, da es zu heiß war zum Schlafen, und sah eine dunklen Schatten herankommen. "Wem gehört denn dieser große Hund?" fragte sie, und erst als er an ihr vorbeiging, merkte sie, daß es ein Leopard war!

Eines Tages sah Nancy eine junge Antilope am Straßenrand, die ganz verwirrt versuchte, die Fahrbahn zu überqueren. Nancy stellte ihr Auto quer über den Weg, um dem Tier zu helfen. Die Autofahrer hinter ihr hupten ungeduldig, aber als sie sahen, wie die Antilope vor dem Auto über die Straße ging, klatschten sie in die Hände und riefen "Mzuri Sana!"

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IKRAM HASSAN DIED recently at the age of 73.

For many of the mourners present at the simple ceremony in Mombasa they were attending the burial of an elderly cleric of the Faith, one who had served his community well and faithfully for many years.

For those who knew him better, Ikram was even more than that. He was also Big Game Hunter extraordinary, a scholar to the end of his days and one of nature's rare gentlemen. It is a moving story that needs to be told.

Ikram was born into an educated Muslim family in Kenya in 1918, at the end of the First World War. His father Dr S.G. Hassan rose to be the Provincial Veterinary Officer of the Coast and held the post with distinction for many years till his retirement in 1952.

Ikram's brother the late Fez Hassan was a well known lawyer in Mombasa and an avid collector of rare books of Africana.

Hunter Ikram Hassan - A legend In His Own Quite Remarkable Lifetime !

Nurtured in this atmosphere of learning and respectability the young Ikram tried to study Law and then Veterinary sciences only to give up both as not quite to his likings.

But the disciplines of learning gave him a lifelong addiction to reading and his fund of general knowledge was truly impressive.

Somewhere in the late forties when the world was changing as fast as it is again today, Ikram found his African Hunting Safaris: a company for Big Game Hunting aimed mainly at the lucrative American market.

In those days, this was the preserve of White Hunters - an intrepid breed of professionals renowned for their courage, hunting skills and personal extravagances, all celebrated in

Hemingways novels and romanticised in Hollywood films.

It looked like a foolhardy challenge. But after the first few years of struggle, Ikram found his niche.

His safaris were meticulously planned, his knowledge of the country-side second to none and his personal charisma, quite unique. Ikram hid his steel under a modest, shy and gentle exterior.

He became an instant success with those who went with him. By the early sixties when Kenya was racing towards Uhuru, Ikram's fame and reputation had made him one of the most sought after Hunters in Africa.

His clients included Presidents of famous American corporations

and wealthy, self-made men for whom the adventure and the man leading it were as important as the elusive trophy itself. There were always two sides to this idyllic, overblown "Holiday".

First, the hunters camp pitched in the magical African night with its campfires, its green tents and the faraway cough of a lion hunting its prey in the heart of darkness.

Then, the next day with its long dusty drives, the walk through heavy thornbush with camouflaged all round where East, West, North and South all look the same and then, quite suddenly, the moment itself: that split second when man sees death in the form of a charging lion, a marauding buffalo or the snarling visage of a leopard just feet away.

A revelation of some kind can take place. Some call it the moment of truth. To have gone through such an experience was to venerate the man who had brought them to it and then taken them out alive and well.

Ikram Hassan, the brown hunter, was up there among the finest of such men. Leo Rothe, a frequent client wrote about Ikram in a book of African adventures calling him "A legend in his life time".

In his heyday Ikram was a handsome, tall, scholarly looking man who discoursed as easily about Big Game, Guns and Trackers as he did about Religion and Politics.

Since Adventure was a way of life, he walked continually with death and danger. Inevitably he had a number of close shaves himself, almost always resulting from a client's over-eagerness to "bag his trophy".

There was the memorable incident with a wounded buffalo. The animal had rushed off into deep bush. The client was told of the dangers that now loomed just ahead and advised to stay behind. He declined. There was no time for further discussion.

The buffalo had to be flushed out. In single file then, the tracker, Ikram and the client followed the bloodspoor. The buffalo, perfectly camouflaged lurked closer than they thought.

It burst upon them, huge, mad with rage and intent on revenge. The client fired, missed and took over. The unarmed tracker sprang aside.

The enraged animal caught Ikram and tossed him into the air. Miraculously he slipped off its horns and fell wounded to one side as the buffalo, confused by a torn coat sleeve blocking its vision pawed the earth bellowing with fury.

Somehow in that instant the

tracker handed back the fallen gun to Ikram and it all ended in a thunderclap as the shot found its mark. The murderous looking horns made a fine trophy.

Hunting in Kenya was always strictly controlled and heavily licenced, bringing in its fair share of foreign exchange. As his

fame spread, Ikram was asked to conduct safaris in the Sudan, Ethiopia and the jungles of India.

But when the ban on hunting came to Kenya in 1979, he hung up his guns. A unique way of life had ended and for many an era was over.

After his retirement from hunting safaris, Ikram looked at the prospect of converting big ranches into minigame parks. He and Leo Rothe hit on the idea of attracting Game to a

small natural saltlake in Taita. This was how the Saltlick Lodge in Taita was really born: from an idea nurtured by Ikram. Not being a businessman, the opportunity passed him by.

Others, more savvy in the ways of corporate finance and development turned it into the huge success that it is today.

Ikram moved on. With his sense of fairplay and natural friendliness, he got involved in social work and put into this, the same zest, honesty and good humour that he had into everything else in his life.

As the hunters image slipped from him that of the cleric and social worker took hold.

A characteristic Muslim cap replaced the hunter's hat. But the lean, striding figure was the same and instantly recognisable from a distance.

In their big country-house in Mombasa, life went on as it always had. Friends would come in and out. The kitchen never stopped serving.

Lights remained on till the small hours of the morning and, till recently, the front doors remained barely closed in an area where most neighbours now have iron grilles and dozing watchmen at their barred gates.

When the telephone rang it could as well be from town as from someone thousands of miles away simply wanting to inquire after an old friend.

When death came it was swift and unexpected, from a stomach ailment.

The day before he had been winning at cards with his wife, Ikram's memory lives on and will be cherished forever by those who know this fine Kenyan gentleman. K.S.

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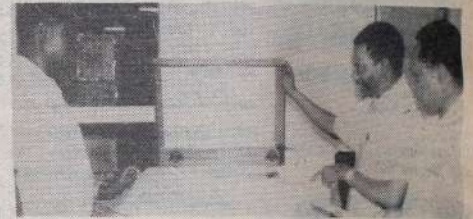

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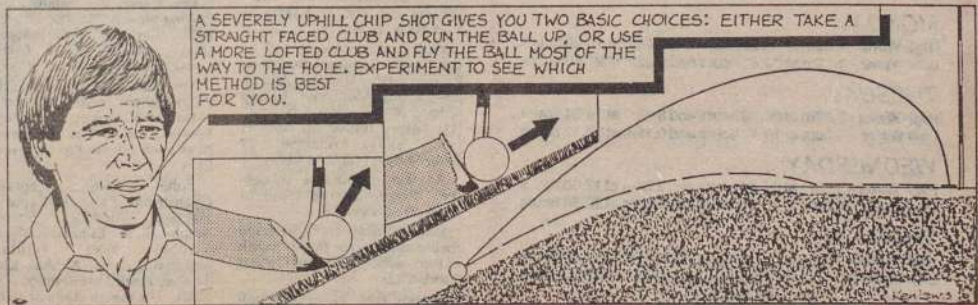
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TRUST BANK SUPPORT FOR MARALAL 'CAMEL DERBY'
