## Swedish Consul

THE SWEDISH GOVERNMENT has confirmed the appointment of Mr N. Ingvar Hellman as the new Swedish Honorary Consul for the Coastal Province.

Mr Hellman, who is a Swedish national and married, replaces Mr John Morgan Davies, who retired last year.

The appointment of Mr Hellman indicates a change in philosophy of Swedish representation in Mombasa in as far as most previous Consuls have been Britain and related to the shipping industry.

With less number of Swedish ships visiting Mombasa and a growing number of Swedish tourists coming into Kenya the importance of the consulate for the tourist industry will grow.

This will be emphasized by the opening of Kenya Airways direct flight from Stockholm to Mombasa on November 1st 1991.

Mr Hellman is General Manager for the Mombasa branch of Tour Africa Safaris linked with Head Office in Nairobi and the new Consulate located in Tour Africa Safaris office on the ground floor of Social Security House at Hamah Road.

## Fresh Lobster, Crabs And Succulent Prawns

THERE ARE FRESH lobsters galore, as well as prawns, crabs and other seafood at the Dhov Terrace Restaurant which has just re-opened at Mombasa's Hotel Inter-Continental.

Situated just a few yards from the sea and surrounded by palm trees, this open-sided restaurant, with marine door, makes an excellent venue in which to enjoy a feast of succulent sea food.

About 100 kgs are delivered straight from the ocean each day and also include prawns king, queen, jumbo and giant size.

A novel idea is that you can select what you would like to eat from the vast display of seafood in the restaurant.

At a Jambo Punch Party to mark its re-opening hotel guests witnessed the arrival of 25 kgs of live lobsters from Lamu. The previous day 50 kgs had been delivered there.

The 'Nahoda' of the Dhov Terrace Restaurant, Raphael Laika, weighs what you select which is charged accordingly. He then asks how you would like it cooked. At the open kitchen on the far side of the restaurant you can watch this being done.

Said Paul Jones, Executive Chef 'it can be boiled, fried, poached, grilled. All are served with exotic sauces including lemon or garlic butter, pilli-pilli, sweet and sour, or whatever diners would like'.

There are also Specialities of the Day. On re-opening day this included a Fish Chowder, Bouchees filled with mixed sailfish in a cream and

vermouth sauce, this being served with baked potatoes and garden fresh vegetables. For dessert there was a coconut filled with pineapple and coconut ice cream laced with Jamaican rum.

Also on the seafood buffet are a selection of hors d'oeuvre in attractive ceramic sea snail and clam shells. They include snails in a vinaigrette marinade, a terraine of baracuda stuffed with baby narrow; marinated red snapper; smoked tuna; seafood salad and oysters.

Said the Executive Chef 'occasionally we shall be including fresh water fish, that is, trout, Naivasha Black Bass, Tilapia and, possibly, some Nile Perch.

There is also a section for salads, and a limited dessert buffet.

The Executive Chef revealed that the greatest demand is for grilled lobster and prawns, also deep fried calamari and added 'we try and cater for everyone's tastes'.

With considerable experience in the catering industry, Paul Jones knows a thing or two about the culinary arts having worked in top hotels which

has included London's famous Ritz where his steak and kidney puddings, with oysters, were a great favourite with the Queen Mother.

He has helped prepare banquets for royalty and famous people from all over the world.

The Dhov Terrace Restaurant is open each night of the week from 7.30-10.30 p.m. with the exception of Tuesdays.

# ROYAL PALM TREES PARADE FOR DIANI

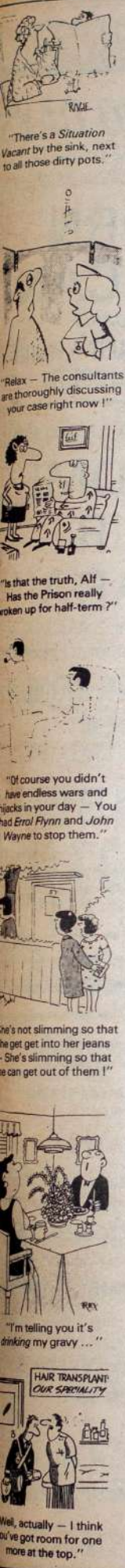

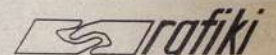

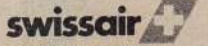

Said Ferial with a laugh 'I am now much busier than before the accident. It's great to be home and among family and friends again'. Adding 'God has saved my life because he wants me to carry on, and do a little more'.

This already includes organising a Celebrity Walk in aid of the Port Reitz School for the Physically Handlapped which takes place on November 16.

Another fund raising event will be at Fort Jesus where a top actor,

Sunil Dutt from India, has been invited to be guest of honour, the money raised going towards providing a workshop at Shanzu for handicapped Girl Guides where they can receive career training after leaving school. Ferial is chairman of the Girl Guides Association, Mombasa.

However, she does not intend to stop there, and is already

endeavouring to establish a Mombasa Spinal Association the main purpose of which is to get those in wheel chairs going out more and becoming more active in the community.

Said Ferial 'I cannot understand why people in wheelchairs should be shut away, for they too would like to go out and visit restaurants, hotels, and theatres.'

Ferial is also now running her late husband's company, D.J. Lowe. She said 'I am going to look after the export of tea and keep my husband's name going'. She also aims at eventually attending the weekly tea auctions at Mombasa.

She said that 'D.J. Lowe will be the first tea company in Mombasa to be run by a woman and that, quite probably, she will be the only female tea buyer in Africa'.

During the party it was revealed that Captain John J. Schuler, Commander of USS Pyro, comes from Allentown, Pennsylvania, USA, where the American Consul, Mombasa, Don Stader, also hails from.

In an interview, Captain Schuler explained that USS Pyro is a 'combat logistics force ship carrying ammunition for the navy.

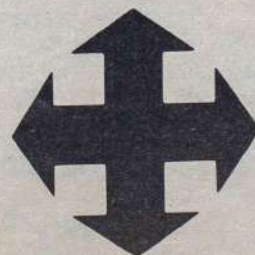

**'OIL SPILL CLEARANCE' TALKS HOSTED AT NYALI BEACH HOTEL**

**A WEEK LONG 'Oil Spill Clearance'** conference has been taking place at Nyali Beach Hotel bringing together 18 delegates from Zimbabwe, Tanzania, Egypt, Cyprus, Spain, Texas (USA) and Kenya.

It was the first time for the Oil Spill Service Centre, Southampton, UK, to hold such a conference in Africa. It was led by Robin Perry, General Manager, the Course Director being Chris Morris, Training Manager.

Among the six trainers was David Oland, an Assistant Training Officer who has lived in Kenya for 18 years. His late father, Ben Oland, being owner and General Manager of Mombasa's Coraldene Hotel.

The Oil Spill Service Centre, covering four acres and with 65,000 sq ft of warehousing, is situated on the banks of the River Itchen, Southampton.

It represents the world's largest stock pile of oil spill equipment and is the only organisation that has a worldwide response to oil spills

wherever they may occur.

The Centre is funded by 14 major companies, including Shell, BP, Texaco, which can call upon their services in times of emergency.

In addition, the Centre has a very large training school at which courses, primarily at Southampton, take place throughout the year.

**TRAINING UNIT**

During the winter months the training unit goes overseas and this was its first visit to Africa and marked the start of their overseas tour which continues on to Galveston (Texas) and Singapore.

They return to the UK for Christmas. The tour then continues to Australia and the Middle East.

The majority of those attending the conferences at Mombasa stayed at Nyali Beach Hotel. Declared Chris Morris 'we all loved this hotel'.

In an interview Mr Morris said 'there is nothing new about getting rid of oil spills. The need

is to be ready for oil spills of any dimension and have well thought out contingency plans in the event of oil coming ashore'.

He went on 'there are times, perhaps, when plans are not too detailed. Then you have to fight the oil spill as it happens, rather than to any laid down plans'.

'What we have been trying to do this week', he explained 'is to advise delegates that they must do their pre-planning. They must determine sensitive areas, what needs to be protected and how they can do this.'

Also what equipment is required to protect sensitive areas in their particular parts of the world so that they can have an immediate response to any emergency that might arise'.

The 'End of Conference' dinner at Nyali Beach Hotel fell on Monday, the chief guest being Captain Andronicus Ketoyo, delegates and guests, Chris Morris said 'this is a very special day in Kenya and I would ask all of you to join me in a toast to President Moi'.

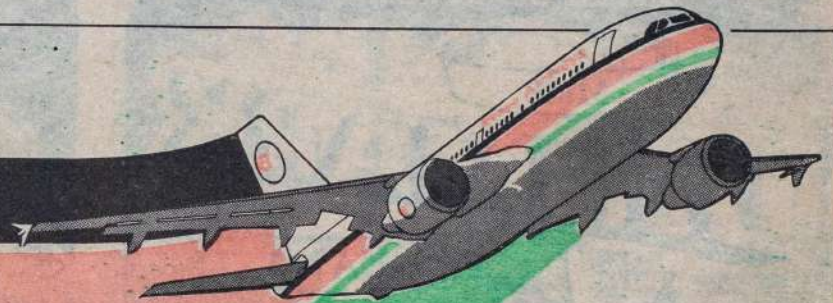

THE SPEED AT which the roads were being repaired some time back has really gone down.

It is an open secret that everyone who was involved in the repair work was trying to make the roads passable before the Mombasa ASK show when it was understood that the town would receive some important visitors.

Since the end of the show, the work has slowed down to such an extent that people are left wondering whether those involved in the decision to repair the roads were serious in their intention.

Money must have been voted to carry out the work and once the decision to do the repairs was made, it was expected that the pace would not diminish.

One wonders whether the current lull in work is indicative of the standard of finish that we as road users shall expect?

The causeway repairs are going on in fits and starts. Kachumbari tells me that for a long time there were some stacks of road repair material that obstructed his way home from Changamwe.

In previous times the stacks were put there and within hours machinery had been brought in to spread and compact the material.

The fact that the stacks have stayed for so long without any attention (apart from a few vehicles that have nearly ended up on top of the stacks) must be a pointer to the fact that there is a problem with the continuation of the work.

Kachumbari tells me that there are some fiscal manoeuvres going on but that is an issue that only those involved can

comment.

In the meantime, motorists are still incurring heavy bills as a result of the state of some of the trunk roads that one cannot avoid if one is to continue their every day work.

Kachumbari tells me that after we had discussed the issue of

the town hall letting fares find their own levels, he did his own survey to find if there were any other deterrents to public transport.

He found that one of the other key issues is that of the state for repair of the roads.

Some time back, the local bus service withdrew their service from a portion of road that leads to Mtongwe.

After the road had been re-done the bus service and the matatus resumed their services in the area.

He also told me that the same treatment was meted out to the residents from the nether areas of Kwale and Shimba Hills.

After some extremely heavy rains, the roads become badly rutted that the bus company had to withdraw its vehicles.

In this instance it was two bus companies involved. The local council got it's act together and eventually the roads were repaired.

The two bus companies resumed their services and so did the matatus that had also withdrawn from the area.

What I was left wondering was why the various bus services that utilise the causeway did not withdraw their services when the causeway was at its worst.

All the buses and all the matatus were plying back and forth and even at the reduced speed and higher level of damage, they were still making money!

about the state of the roads.

All of the noise concerning road repairs has been about Recarpeting and not anything else.

Why is there no activity around grading of dirt or murrum roads. This is an area where the Town Hall has all the resources at their finger tips.

All it takes is a grader and one driver and maybe a banksman. The rest is fuel and some other minor consumables.

This cheap amount of public works would go a longer way than the expensive work that has been contracted out to recarpet the tarmac roads.

More wananchi would be served by the public transport and perhaps some more people might venture into those areas.

I am sure that the Mombasa Motor Club could then be tempted to use the road for their rallies. (Inside information has it that the road is Too Rough for rallying!!)

As Kachumbari says, people only like doing things for the public when they will get maximum exposure or brownie points.

Once the need vanishes, the propensity to work follows suit

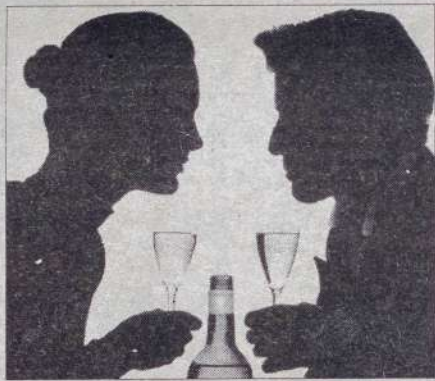

## Have You Ever Wondered About The 'Small Fort' Ruin ?

DRIVING FROM THE fourth Tee at the Mombasa Golf Club across the forbidding rocky inlet you can see to your left the remains of a small Fort. Several parts of the outer walls remain with gun embrasures. The wall on the landward side is curved and has two flat slabs like an inverted "V" which looks as though they formed the lintel of a door, now filled in. The floor area is about 15 metres and it was probably manned by about eight men.

It formed one of a series of small forts or redoubts which were so placed as to cover the entrances to Kilindini and Mombasa Harbours. They probably date from the mid 1600's when the Portuguese were naturally sensitive about Arab warships passing round to Kilindini to land troops. A large piece of stone was found nearby with an inscription in Portuguese. The writing, weather beaten and almost illegible bears the date 1677. One is unable to tell whether or not this was the date of completion of the Fort. The stone was placed for safety in the "Robing Room" at the Law Courts.

When Mombasa Island was covered by thick forest these Forts must have been lonely outposts as the main, albeit small, population lived in the area of today's Old Town. The ruins you see are those of Fort Sao Jose, also called by some the Chapel of Nossa Senhora das Mercedes. Another more likely site for a chapel would have been on the high ground backing the Golf Course where other remains have been found. Another of these redoubts is to be found near the sixth green.

The Fort of Sao Jose was destroyed by the flagship of Seif bin Sultan, the Imam of Muscat, during the great Siege of Fort Jesus. This ship, the Kaberas, ran aground on the reef below the fort but ended up with its bow guns trained on the walls. It was not long before the Fort was shattered and the soldiers made their escape after spiking their guns. The 19th Century writer Guillain names the ruins "Kaberas" after the Omani ship. Guillain was a French Naval Captain.
