She was accompanied by her three cats.


Helen came to Kenya with her husband, the late Wing Commander Peter Shaw following his retirement from the Royal Air Force after the second world

There is also an irrigation project at Garissa which is producing a variety of good quality vegetables some being supplied to refugee camps in the North Eastern Province.



Having felt the need of organising a Mini Camp for Eyes and Dental check up of the Somali refugees at Utange Camp in order to minimise demands for such treatment requests, the Branch Secretary, Mrs K a A Molu contacted Mr Ali Raza Karim the proprietor of Kenya Optical Company and Dr (Mrs). Lata Magon (Dentist) to request them to volunteer their services on a convenient day.

Both of them responded

Both of them responded positively and the Mini Camp was set up on Sunday. The team conducted the Eyes and Dental check-ups from 10.30 a.m. to 1.00 p.m. under the banner of the Lions Club of Mombasa Island.

The Chairman Mr Al-Noor Jivan and Mr Abid Vejlani also joined.

Mr Ali Raza Karim single handed checked about 120 eye cases and provided 75 cases with reading spectacles and about 10 cases were given bi-tocal spectacles.

'Spectacles Given Free'

The spectacles were provided free of charge by courtesy of Lions Club.

Lions Club has pledged to transport them to and from Malindi, and surgery and hospitalisation will be free of charge.

Three cases needed special glasses which Mr Ali Raza Karim undertook to make the spectacles for them free of charge.

There was one case requiring an glasses and eye drops which ere provided by Mr Ali Raza.

Two cases were found to be requiring Comial Transplant and such operation cannot be done in Mombasa. The only place known to be competent for such surgery is the P.C.E.A. Hospital at Kikuyu near Nairobi. Efforts are being made to contact Doctor Wood to take

these cases.

Dr (Mrs) Lata Magon carried oput the dental checking single handed and managed to examine at least 150 cases. In absence of facilities at the camp no treatment could be provided.

However, Dr (Mrs) Magon pledged to attend to the cases at her own surgery free of charge.

In the meantime the negative

In the meantime she prescribed anti-biotics for the patients to take prior to seeing her at the surgery which the Branch Secretary of Kenya Red Cross Society will arrange systematically.





NATIONAL HOSPITAL INSURANCE **FUND FINANCE MOMBASA TALKS**

A VERY IMPORTANT three-day workshop organised by the National Hospital Insurance Fund and Kenya Health Care Financing Project brought together at Mombasa's Hotel Inter-Continental 23 participants to deliberate upon the present and future role of NHIF in health

Participants, who in one way or another are affected by NHIF, included representatives from the Kenya Federation of Employers, insurance industry, Kenya Medical Association, Church Health Association of Kenya also the Ministers of Finance and Health.

It was the first time for such a cross-section of the community affected to have seen invited to air their views on the NHIF and to make suggestions as to its future direction. NHIF recognises that such dialogue is necessary.

Draft recommendations covered three areas: 'who should be covered by NHIF and what kind of benefits should be given now and in the future, also what sort of relationship NHIF should have with the

providers of health care — doctors, hospitals and various health facilities in the country'.

These recommendations are subject to further analysis to determine what the cost impact would be on NHIF, as well as the impact on its various

NHIF, which is basically a social insurance organisation, will be considering these

to seeing that they are realistic and feasible and do not go against the basic reason why the Fund was established.

the Fund was established.

At the workshop were Mr Manasses Mulli, NHIF Director, Dr Daniel Kraushaar, Head of a US Government funded project supporting the development and expansion of NHIF, also Okudo Akumu, a specialist in health insurance.

Among those presenting a paper were Dr Joseph Alouch Chairman of the Kenya Medical Association and Charles C Stover from Management Sciences for Health Boston, USA, a non-profit institution.

Declared Mr Akumu 'I like this hotel and its very friendly atmosphere. We have all been impressed by its architectural style and the rooms are excellent'.



Mtwapa Fishing Report 1990-1991 SEASON

The 1990/91 Fishing Season at Mtwapa turned out to be a record one for the total weight recorded(18,132 kgs.) and also the best year we have had for marlin - a total of 44 were weighed in. The sailfish score was much the same as

and also the best year we have had for marlin - a total of 44 were weighed in The salifish score was much the same as the season before but the average weight dropped from 29 kgs. to 25.5 kgs. It was the same with the striped marlin where the average weight dropped drastically from 60 kgs. to 43 kgs.

The best fish of the season was a black marlin of 203 kgs. caught by Roland Wudenigg fishing on "Vuma" Roland's fish was only 500 grams short of the Kenya record, but could not have been claimed anynow due to 1 G.F.A rule infringements. It was also the largest marlin we have weighed in since 1982. We did not record any blue marlin, and the best stripey was a 67.2 kgs. fish caught by Matthias Meyer from "Maverick". Gotz Bless (a regular visitor from Germany) caught the heaviest sailfish - this weighed in at 50 kgs. and was caught from "Oona". There were not many shark and most of them were small. However, Gerhard Schleicher got one of 103 kgs. while drift fishing on "Samuke".

Although we only landed one good sized marlin, there were signs of an increase in the presence of the larger blacks. Certainly there were more about than in the past few seasons. Wilfried Wegner, one of our most regular clients, who fishes every season on "Samvuke" paid two visits to Kenya during the season. He had the fortune to hook a large black on both visits, but the misfortune to lose them both. The first one was in early December - it was sighted by the "Samvuke" crew swimming right by the boat and only a few hundred metres from the reef. A large bonito was already out as live bait (with a double hook for kingfish) - within minutes the bait was taken - the line was freespooled for a long time, and eventually the fish was struck. The huge black piled out of the water and made many speciacular jumps. It was fought for just on an hour before the 24 kg. line parted (unfortunately it had been badly damaged during the fight) This fish was estimated at well over 200 kgs. but Wilfried tried again at the end of March, and hooked into another (estimated at 150 kilos) but sadly it came off the hook on the third jump! The "Samvuke" crew witnessed another hour long fight with a black—this was a fish of about 70 kgs. that was fought by Karl Manhard on 8 kg. tackle. Unfortunately.

when all things seem to be going the way of the angler the line popped for no apparent reason. That's fishing!

These were the ones that got away but there were also a lot that came into the boat. Quite a few new Mtwapa records were set including one new Kenya record - a 24.5 kg. yellowfin taken by Karl Manhard on 8 kg. line. Karl also landed the best kingfish ever weighed in at Mtwapa - a beautiful one of 31 kgs. taken on 15 kgs. tackle. This fish unfortunately could not be claimed as a Kenya record since the rod was passed to the angler. Dirk Kappenberg, fishing on "Oona" caught the largest rainbow runner (7 kgs.) that we have recorded, and Gunter Seipp boated a Shiku Shangu of 9.3 kgs. - also the largest ever for our Mtwapa base. Amongst the other species of fish, Ferdinand Matt had the best karambesi - a 35 kg. fish taken from "Maverick", while Wilfried Wegner (fishing on "Samvuke") weighed in the largest

Cobia (black runner) - a 37.2 kg specimen.

Our boats had a lot of success in competitions. This started with "Buccaneer" (Jeff Pereira, Kit Pereira) winning the B.A.T. Competition at Bahari Club in January with a striped marlin. The following weekend the same team took the two day CMC Competition (also held at Bahari Club) with two striped marlin and as sallish. In this competition Sigi Finimento, fishing on "Raha" with Sammy Mucheri, came third with a fine sailfish of 38 kgs

"Raha" was again successful in the Bahari Club's Century Automobile Tournament when Ahmed Ali Jiwaji and

Ron weighed in a striped mariin of 52 kilos to take first place, while Jeff Pereira, Hakim Bhaijee and Walter de Souza took third place in the Freight Forwarders Competition fishing on "Sasumai"

Up at Mharani Club, Kilifi, our boats also had a lot of success. The Delamere Competition was won by Karl Manhard on "Vuma" with a black marlin of 80 2 kgs. taken on 15 kg. line a really superb effort. "Samvuke" fished by Gunter Seipp, Kenneth Adcock and James Adcock gained third position despite battling heavy seas on the first day of

Gunter Seipp, Kenneth Adcock and James Adcock gained third position despite battling heavy seas on the first day of the tournament on the way from Mitwapa to Kilifi. Gunter caught a small black of 47 kgs. (which incidentally jumped into the boat and out again) and Kenneth Adcock a sailfish on the second day.

The Kilifi International Classic held on the 16th and 17th March drew a large entry. "Samvuke" (Reinhold Kahl, Heinrich Schmitt and James Adcock) managed to get in the frame again with a small striped marlin caught by Reinhold that was enough for second place overall. "Raha" also did well with the ladies team of Moo Harris and Anita Taylor. The best yellowfin of the competition (19.5 kgs.) was caught by Anita. While we don't go to competitions to win prizes, we feel that the Mnarani Fishing Club should be highly commended for organising two first class fishing competitions with fantastic prizes and a really delightful venue at Mason's boatyard. We will all certainly be back next season!

Our two local competitions were very successful but unfortunately the fish were most uncooperative. The Mtwapa Cup (sponsored again by Gunter Seipp) and held on the 20th and 21st January was won by. "Jicho" fished by Norbert Nagengast. Over the two days he weighed in a sail and numerous bonito to edge out second placed "Adnan" (Nic de Souza, Dick Chater and Farouk) who landed a 32 kg. stripey and some dorado. Dick (besides catching the marlin) also landed the largest dorado. (9.3 kgs.) to win the beautiful Dorado Trophy (presented by Richard Joanno). Third place went to Jorg Klebba and Manfred Fricke fishing on "Oona" with a good sized king and some bonito. This competition turned out to be a bit of a "bonito bonanza" so in future competitions we will be using a different points system:




