

MY MINISTRY HAS nothing to hide about the perennial shortage of water at the coast, particularly Mombasa town and its environs, namely, the south coast and the north coast.

It is in record that last month It is in record that last month and to be exact on Saturday, October 26, 1991, I attended a leaders' meeting held at Myita grounds here in Mombasa and I explained at length the cause of lack of adequate supply of water in the coast region.

The water problem at the coast.

In the coast region.

The water problem at the coast, as I have said severally in the past, is mainly that of the demand outstripping the supply.

The National Water Conservation and Pipeline Corporation who are the undertakers of water supplies in this region, provide water to about 1.7 million people living in an area estimated at 5,700 square kilometers.

The figure excludes those

The figure excludes those people going to the area for short stay including tourists whose numbers vary from month to

The area covered stretches from the Kenya-Tanzania border in the south to Malindi and the Sabaki river in the north and Includes Mombasa and its interior.

Narrow strips of land are also fed with water as the main pipelines cut across Kwale, Mombasa, Kilifi and Taita Taveta

water within this vast area is estimated at 200,000 cubic metres (tonnes) per day of which Mombasa town and its immediate suburbs require nearly 125,000 cubic metres

The water problem at the Coast is that of demand outstripping supply

(tonnes) per day.

(tonnes) per day.

Baricho pumping station and Mzima pipeline which are the main contributors of water going to the coast region produce a total of 85,000 cubic metres (tonnes) per day which is not adequate for the demand of Mombasa town and its neighbourhood in the south and in the north. in the north.

The same two resources of water also feed the narrow strips of land already mentioned where the pipelines traverse Mombasa, Kilifi and Taita Taveta Districts.

in this connection only about a half of the total production reaches Mombasa in a day, hence the constant lack of water at times in the Island.

Toensure that all areas at least get water, rationing is done at strategic reservoirs along the Mzima and Sabaki pipelines.

The last main water supply to be constructed at the coast is the Sabaki pipeline in the 1978-1982 period. The other two sources of Marere and Mzima pipelines were developed some decades ago.

decades ago.

However, as I have said in the past, these three sources have remained as the sole source of water for all these years despite tripling of population figures and massive development in the construction sector.

Despite running the old installations, the Corporation has endeavoured to keep them going while looking for ways of setting up new bulk supply systems to reduce the heavy deficit of water in the short run and also developing other large sources that are capable of meeting the demand for the next two decades.

As I have mentioned in the past, the World Bank has agreed to finance major works on some

will be spent on the rehabilitation of some weak parts of the pipeline so as to ensure durability and reliability.

With the same funds, the Corporation will also be able to commission preparation of a detailed engineering design for the intake of the second Mzima

Other major works under the same funding will entail improvement of distribution net work for Mombasa and

improvement of metering and billing system to enhance efficiency in revenue collection for the continued operation and maintenance of the water

systems.

There is also an on-going development of improving the current distribution system for Malindiarea which is anticipated to cope up with fast development, particularly in Casuarina and Watamu areas.

The funds for this project have been acquired and construction work is expected to start early

In addition, two large diameter boreholes are being worked on and will be ready within the next six months. Once these projects are completed, a substantial amount of water which was going to Malindi from Sabaid pipeline will now be diverted to Mombasa.

The measurement

The measures I have outlined above are all geared towards providing a short-term relief and also prepare for the also prepare for the development of the second Mzima pipeline.

It is expected that all in all, there will be an increase of 40,000 cubic metres (tonnes) of water per day from the Sabaki pipeline.

The consumers on their part, should meet their financial obligations for payment for the water consumed as these funds are applied towards the continued operation and maintenance of the water systems.

systems. In particular, I wish to appeal to the major consumers and government departments and ministries to pay their long standing arrears running to millions of shillings to help the Corporation meet its financial obligations, particularly for purchase of chemicals and electricity. electricity

The Municipality of Mombasa and the Coastal region is working on plans to install individual meters to the consumers occupying council houses so that consumers make direct payment to the

The Government is fully aware of the economic potential of the coast region to the country and Iwould, therefore, like to assure the industry and all the consumers that steps as outlined are being taken to redress the current shortages.

However, until the implementation of the short term measures enumerated above, the current demand cannot be met.

cannot be met.

Our efforts will be geared towards ensuring that the current productions are maintained with minimal interruptions and that the water available will be shared as equitably as possible.

The consumers should bear with us while this is on-going as the exercise is likely to take some

The Municipality on their part should pay for the arrears on these accounts so that the consumers will not in future suffer for punitive disconnections while they have already paid for their water together with their monthly house rents.

Finally, consumers who do not meet their monthly water rates will continue to be disconnected in order to recover the amounts

Owed.

This action should not be viewed as tack of concern on the part of the Corporation for their consumers, but rather the Corporation hands are tied and services will suffer if the funds are not forthcoming.

are not forthcoming.

We appeal to the consumers to understand the problems at hand and seek assistance from the regional office when localised problems occur as the water available is not adequate and hence there will always be unsatisfied demand all round.

unsatisfied demand all round.
As a follow-up on the steps to improve the supply of water during the current peak period, the Ministry has already despatched four water tankers to be on standby so as to cope up with the smooth provision of water during major breakdowns and shortages of water within the distribution areas.





THE MOTOR INDUSTRY boffs

THE MOTOR INDUSTRY boffs in Kenya are quite correct in saying that given the "free" market situation in Kenya, the number of models that survive the race will be quite few.

That is to say that the market will rationalise itself over a period of time. This has effectively happened for the Kenyan vehicle market.

The key element in how the market forces in Kenya work is that there is very strong brand loyalty amongst most motorists.

Kachumbari tells me of a large number of people who have stuck to the same brand of vehicle ever since they were in a position to own one, either off their own bat or provided by the company.

The one model that seemed to be a common denominator was the Peugeot. I tend to agree with Kachumbari's findings since quite a few people i know have owned the same "find

hearted" marque.

I remember sitting with Kachumbari at the Kadogo Club one evening recently and we were discussing cars.

One of the fellows who has always owned one of these vehicles came into the bar.

As we sat there discussing cars, this fellow interjected three times to point out that one of his previous cars had just passed the road outside the Kadogo Club.

Kachumbari then decided to carry out a survey amongst a group of people who he knew had traditionally driven cars for a long time.

He found that most of them

a long time.

He found that most of them could still find the vehicles that they owned when they started working. Most of them stayed in Nairobi if that is where they were bought.

Other bought in the province.

obtes bought in the province also moved to Nairobi on the change of ownership. A large number ended up as the much loved and now threatened yellow line taxis.

What does all this mean to the Kenyan motorist? The main lesson is that cars do not die so easily in Kenya. The population of cars will grow continuously with very little waste.

Brand loyalty is encouraged since people can actually see for themselves over a very long period of time how robust a particular kind of vehicle is. Re-sale values and maintenance costs become very transparent to the consumer.

In other parts of the world and especially the European and American markets, the motorists values are different.

values are different.

The turnover of cars is quite high and they have a steep loss of re-sale value within the first two years of purchase.

After that the European models tend to keep a higher price than the equivalent Japanese or American marque.

Why this is a long to clear

Why this is so is not so clear but one is inclined to consider that the expression better the devil you know' has some effect on peoples choice of second hand vehicle.

Some of the older American models, especially the really large ones have a strange following in Europe.

Quite a few people have vintage cars which they cherish. These cars always seem to always appreciate in value.

appreciate in value.
Factors influencing the choice
of vehicle in the European and
American market are quite
complex and vehicle
manufacturers spend a lot of
money on market research just
to be sure that they will have
the right product available on
the market at the right time.

We are aware of most of the techniques used in this market research but one that Kachumbari told me! I found quite unusual and yet on further inquir turned out to be a very important piece of research.

How many of us will refuse a car because the colour is not right? In Kenya, very few since the number of colours available to the average motorist is limited.

One can have red, white, grey, shades of grey, tan, green, blue and that's about it. Any other colour is a special...and not to forget that one can also have some of those shades in metallic!

metallic!
Yet colour is such an important issue that most vehicle manufacturers have a whole series of meetings and get quite a lot of research done to be able to either predict or set the tastes of the buying public as far as automobile colours go!

This exercise is taking place all the time and just as fashion designers are quite

colour conscious or would use colour to create a particular theme so are car design groups. A whole lot of effort is geared to determining the colour of cars.

One would suggest that if I were willing to wait long enough, I could get a pink car from one of the vehicle assembly plants in Kenya. The demand is there especially in Mombasa.

There is also a demand for yellow. Think of the number of yellow taxis one would sell.

ellow taxis one would sell.

This must make it a possibility nee there could be enough emand to justify a run on yellow r pink vehicles.

on about choice is that Kenyan motorists are missing out on motoring pleasure. The current freed in vehicle production is in four distinct consumer bands.

The first is the "dudu" band where literally every manufacturer now has a shopping basket in their range. In Kenya is statisfied by the Peugeot 405-605, the Uhuru and the variety of mercs that are (available).

The other pretenders to this class are the Pajero and the Trooper in their various guises.

All other cars on the Kenya has the statisfied on their are a bog standard issue from their manufacturer based on rationalisation of the market. In the rest of the world litere basic bands exist but

In the rest of the world all three basic bands exist but there is this constant quest for performance and that is where we in Kenya lose out.

we in Kenya lose out.

A lot of cars currently on offer in the 1400 to 1800 cc. to cheackel are pushing out between 130 and 180 horsepower without turbocharging.

Very few ordinary vehicles in Kenya can do this and 1 do not see the franchise holders actually trying to dabble in this area.

A lot more attention is being paid to the environment and quite a few cars are now fitted with catalytic converters as a standard.

The level of passenger comfort is also incredibly high but I doubt that the Kenyan motorist is worried about that.

is worried about that.

So long as the car can last longer, requires little and cheap service, is reasonably economical on fuel and can be resold at a good value, who cares about anti brake lock systems, cat. converters, recyclable parts, four speaker, stereos, seats with lumbar and other special adjustments and so forth.

As Kachumbari says, the car that is made for Africa will not sell anywhere else in the world except perhaps.....somewhere like Africa!
