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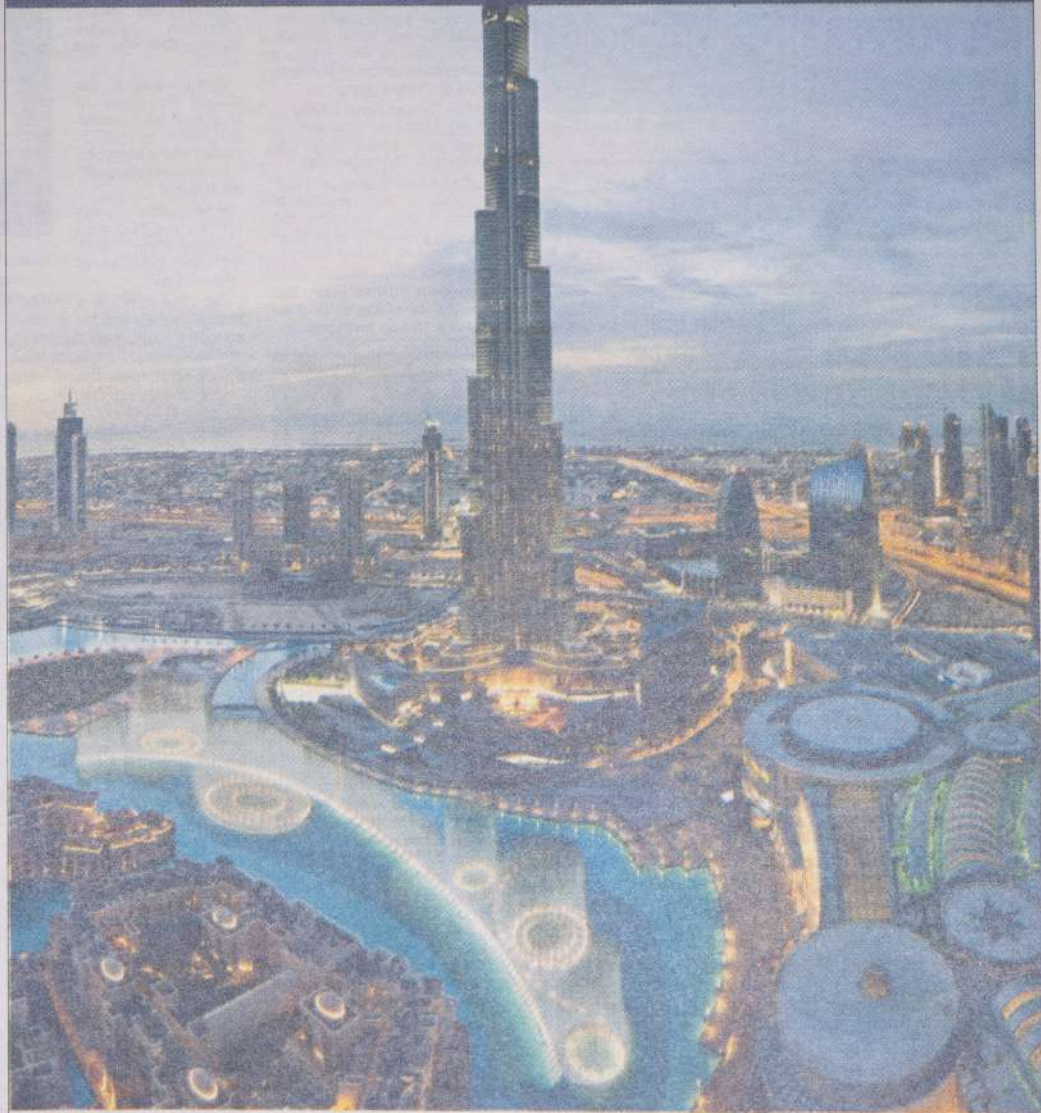

FROM FRONT PAGE occurring in other pastoralist areas of the country." Traditionally Rinderpest vaccination has been carried by the Government Veterinary Services.

However, for this project it was agreed that the vaccination should be carried out by private veterinarians on behalf of the government.

The project was funded by Pan African Rinderpest Campaign (PARC) - Kenya under the program known as Emergency Programme for the Eradication of Rinderpest in Kenya (EPERK).

The personnel consisted of four veterinarians, eight animal health assistants, 16 ear-Bothers and 20 animal handlers.

In every team there was a staff member from the District Veterinary Office.

The projects were Herculean tasks as the areas covered were remote.

Some of the hard tasks involved transport of ice into the bush.

No refrigerator could be placed in one area as there was constant movement in the field.

Every night had to have a new camp site.

A five-ton truck and three four-wheel drive vehicles

were used throughout the campaigns.

About 490,000 cattle in Tana River and 300,000 in Kwale Districts were vaccinated against the disease during the campaigns.

The "Cattle Plague" is now history just like Small Pox in humans.

A veterinarian further explained the disease outbreak:

"Rinderpest is an acute febrile highly contagious viral disease primarily of cattle and buffalo but natural infection has been proved in other domestic ruminants.

"The clinical signs inflammation, haemorrhages, erosions and necrosis of mucus membranes of the digestive tract.

"Morbidity rates approach 100 per cent and mortality may exceed 90 per cent in susceptible cattle.

"The disease is transmitted naturally by direct contact between infected and susceptible animals.

Thirty Two Years Ago

Coastweek, October 28 - November 01, 1980:

A big welcome awaited the first direct British Airways charter flight from the U.K. into Moi International Airport, Mombasa. The Boeing 707 with a capacity for 190 passengers would be the forerunner of once weekly flights to Mombasa throughout the year.

At the same time more charter flights were being spearheaded by Sir Freddie Laker and Peter Drew of Wings and Owners Services Limited between U.K. and Kenya.

Subject to approval by the authorities, this would bring in a 345-seater wide-bodied DC10 aircraft from Manchester/Gatwick to Mombasa and Ceylon on alternating weeks.

Election Campaign was hotting up with politicians going all out to woo the voters for the 1979 all-K.A.N.U. general elections.

Mombasa Businessman G. B. Siddiqui ventured into a small scale ship breaking industry in Mombasa. The only one of its kind on the East African coast, they had broken their first vessel at the yard being the Greek flagship *m.v. Benaco*, which had been purchased by two Mombasa businessmen M. Kassim and Virchand Malde at a cost of K.Shs. 180,000/=.

Pandya Building on Digo Road was knocked down to pave way for Kenya National Assurance's eight-storey Bima House which would cost K.Shs. 25 million.

Khalid G. Shapi was appointed Tours Manager, Coast by United Touring Company.

Flying 'First' And 'Economy' Have Both Changed And Improved Over The Years

The second of the precious moments from my travelling similar to the first one as it was also in an aircraft but this was on a more personal basis but eventually turned out to have been a widespread concern to air travellers.

Airlines are currently trying to outdo themselves in terms of the comfort levels that they offer to passengers.

Less than ten years ago, the difference in service between the front end of the plane and the back end was very marked.

Let us look at developments over time First the front end of the plane which most times included first class and business class especially for intercontinental flights.

The service in first class was almost four star in terms of the cuisine. The number of cabin crew dedicated to serving the few seats at the front were the same as the number dedicated to serving the whole of the back end which probably had ten times the number of people.

This state of affairs continued till the economies in the so called first world began to suffer and companies, which were the main suppliers of passengers in the front end, began to review their travel costs and almost completely removed first class travel from their budgets and drastically reduced those who could travel in business class.

The changes that emerged in the fight to retain passengers and fill planes was that first class was removed from most inter-

continental flights and an upgraded business class was installed. The next stage of battle was to outdo each other so the configuration of the individual space of the passenger began to change.

Entertainment offerings also changed with personal screens appearing on seat stalks instead of having the communal screens at intervals in the consoles above the seating.

Whilst all this was going on at the front end of the plane the back end was also evolving.

Catering in the back end was improved especially after the no frills airlines came in and began to take away the economy class passengers from the more established airlines.

The next improvements that followed were that the seats were improved and the leg room available were increased.

Goodie bags were introduced though very basic compared with the deluxe versions offered at the front end of the plane.

The biggest change however was the introduction on audio-video on demand or in short AVOD. This is where each passenger has access to their own screen. Most screens are touch screen or console operated or both.

One is able to stop and start their own movie, music and games at whatever point they wish. This gives flexibility to every passenger to do what they wish ... and herein starts the problem.

The AVOD systems have games in them. A lot are easier to play with touch screen operation rather than the console

that has buttons where one has to learn and remember the functions.

On one of the flights Kachumbari was on, an argument ensued in business class when a passenger who was trying to sleep could not do so as he was being disturbed by the incessant and hard tapping on the AVOD screen by a passenger in the seat behind.

Touch screens should normally

be touched and they respond. Some of the passengers who were suffering silently decided to also speak out.

The problem was worse in the back since the screen was fixed on the back of the seat and the jabbing was transmitted directly to the head rest area of that seat and was relatively loud compared to the front end where the screen was mounted in a separate panel that separated the seats.

To cut a long story short, it took all the persuasive powers of the captain of the flight to regroup the passengers who wanted to play games into common areas in the plane so that they would not disturb other passengers.

It took almost an hour to sort the matter out and eventually the passengers all went back to doing whatever they wanted to do for the rest of the long haul flight that was to last for nearly thirteen hours.

So while the airlines are hooking up all sorts of mod cons into the aircraft so as to improve passenger comfort, offer options and improve customer experience so that they remain loyal, care has to be taken that these actions do not in themselves create other issues that could end up destroying the customer experience.

AVOD is certainly one that must be handled with care going into the future and perhaps the luxury of touch screen is one that may have to be sacrificed in order to retain peace in the aircraft.

As Kachumbari says, not all change is for the better.

The founder was a man called Moyo who used to work for the Mombasa estate who during spare time used to go through the thick jungle on foot and fish from the cliffs.

He told some of his friends that this place was a treasure trove and this is how fishing at Vuma started.

The pioneers included: Murohammed Chin, Osman Kana, Alimohamed Sidik, Haji Kibale, Omar Kitale, Kassam Kana, Gulab Khan, Mohamed Kana, Halibhai, Hussein Mawji, Murohammed Ramzan, Ali Sidik Kana, Suleman Darji,

Solalla Hassan Taunus, Murohammed Osman Khan, Ebrahim Kana, Jeevanjee Hassanali, Esmail Jeegar, Esmail Bali, Osman Tabji, Adam Studio, Osman Kafi, Ali Elias,

Abu Kharwo, Abid Kapacee Kana, Noorbhai, Shabbir Kana, Silu Haji Osman, Murohammed Kashmiri, Daniel Dooza, Periera, Harry, Callus, Isakala Bawazir,

In those days these brave fishermen used to go to Vuma by bus and walk five kilometers

through the sisal plantation and the jungle full of wild animals and snakes to reach the cliffs which are about thirty feet from the water.

Fishing off the cliffs was equally difficult and dangerous as it is open Indian ocean and completely dark at night and one had to use torches.

The local Giriamas also used to fish at Vuma namely Simba,

Munaver Mawji, Salim Khakhu, Gulam Bhanji, Amir, Mohamed Hema, Asger Tony, Mahmood Fazal, Riaz Bhanji, Yahya Hassanali, Abbass, Rohit Bhagani, Shebe,

Shamshu Hassanali, Simba Kana, Osman Kana, Mahmood M Jaffer, Abdul Kanji, Sidik Yusuf, Abdul Saloo, Yakub

nuddin visited the Vuma cliffs a fishing programme organized by Firoz Photowalla. Alihusein Namajee, Mehrali Billantri and Mukarram Tajbhai and his first description of the place was:

"It is most a beautiful place and the scenery is great"

The fish were in abundance upto mid nineties but at present the fishing has declined the main reason being fishermen from Pemba putting ring nets miles long which destroy the coral reef off Vuma which is where the fish breed.

Long lining by trawlers is another reason for the decline as these trawlers just fish four to five miles off shore.

Some divers also used to dive at Vuma with their harpoon guns and used to bag a lot of big fish during the day time.

Lorenz Riedl one of the top divers, Conway Plough, Peter Phillips, Ian Grossert, Pierconti and the Jennings family all used to dive at Vuma and from the photos Lorenz Riedl showed me it was really a treasure.

The remarkable thing is even at the lowest tide you can not see the bottom at Vuma and the rock formation seems like this place centuries ago must have been under water and it is reclaimed land from the sea.

Some of most notable catches that I remember have included:

- grouper caught in the early sixties weighing 800 lbs,
- Black Marlin weighing 365 lbs caught by Osman Punda and Abid Kapacee on handline the only fishermen to have caught a marlin from the shore,
- large sailfish caught by Ahmed Karama,
- grouper weighing 180 lbs caught by Firoz Photowalla,

Abdul Gani Osman and Alihusein Namajee,

• Karambesi weighing 58 kgs caught and a kingfish weighing 45 kgs by Firoz Photowalla.

• Barracuda weighing 35 kgs caught by Salim Kamani

• grouper caught by Amir Khan weighing 100 kgs,

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waves which used to hit right on the top it was very risky but the rewards were worth it.

At present Vuma is a different picture of what it used to be the jungle has been completely cleared with the erection of a cement factory who now own the land and the road leading to the Vuma cliffs is very good and one can even go even in a small car.

There were all species of fish at Vuma Red snappers, Kole Kole, Karambesi, King fish, Wahoo, Baracudda, Cobia, different kind of snappers, Garfish, sand sharks,

Large stingrays and Manta ray and during the months of April to July the yearly migration of Australian runner (Tokazi) and Sheepshead (Tatau) were caught by the hundreds.

One had to brave those heavy winds and rain and of course the

For those people who have never been to Vuma its worth seeing and on a lucky day you can see big sea turtles, Sharks, Manta rays and dolphins right on the surface.

A good place for your next picnic but make sure you take a permit from Corrugated Sheets Miritini.

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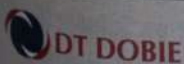

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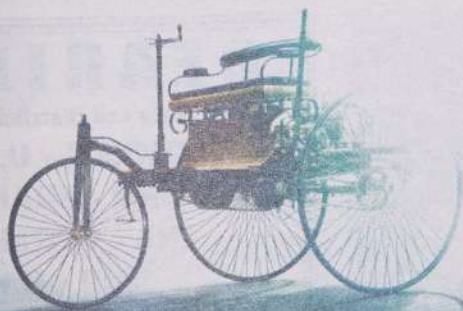
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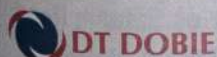

out early Friday morning to capture on film as many animals, birds and plants as they could. They were also required to collect items such as an acacia leaf and an ostrich feather.

Kenya Whale Sharks - Biggest Fish On Earth

Whale sharks are the biggest fish that live in the great oceans of the world writes

Patricia Hughes Scott.

Big and beautiful, harmless and curious, these magnificent creatures are found in the warm waters of the Indian Ocean, off the south coast of Mombasa.

And now visitors can see them, photograph them, and - for the brave - swim with them.

Nearly three quarters of the earth's surface is covered with water and the masters of the vast, oceanic spaces of our planet are the many types of whales and dolphins, including whale sharks.

Whale sharks have been known to dive to nearly a depth of nearly 2 km into the ocean depths and stay there for up to 13 hours - and amazingly they can come up fast without getting the dreadful 'bends', (that is nitrogen bubbles in the blood) which human divers do if they surface too quickly, because they have gills through which they breathe.

Because they had virtually few natural enemies, whale sharks had no fear and, being unafraid, they had no instinctive flight response.

That proved to be disastrous because humans over the ages seem to have seen everything on this planet as exploitable resources to fulfil the insatiable human appetite for materials and possessions.

As a result, many types of whale were hunted nearly to extinction.

Under international law, whale sharks are only given a secondary type of protection.

They are listed under CITES Appendix 11 which means that trade in whale sharks is allowed but must be monitored - easier said than done!

Whale sharks are not carnivorous, they live on the microscopic creatures which abound in the warm waters of the Indian Ocean.

Recognised as an indicator of a healthy marine eco-system, whale sharks are filter feeders; i.e. they cruise through the sea with open mouths, sieving plankton and other minute marine life through the massive fringe-like gill rakers in their mouths.

A few years ago after the El Nino tides, there was an influx of mantis shrimp, which produced a greatly increased number of whale sharks who came to feed on what was, to them, a delicacy.

Rare and beautiful creatures, the males can grow up to 18m in length and weigh up to 40 tons.

Whale sharks give birth to live young, who do not reach maturity until around 30 years of age, and both males and females can live to around 100.

Whale shark viewing is a relatively new tourist attraction, and whale sharks are perfect for a sea safari to view these great giants of the deep, as they present no danger, they are very beautiful to look at and to be with in the waters, although they are shy and can quite easily dive to get away if they feel they are being disturbed.

Whale Shark Viewing

Australians started the whale shark tourism attraction in 1990

and the first whale shark conference was held in Perth 2006.

This is now a 'big bucks' business - there they generate 45 million dollars yearly from whale shark viewing. Sixty per

cent never leave this area. And, a curious fact is - they are all young males.

To date, it is not certain where the mature females stay, or when or where the whale sharks mate.

It is a sad fact the whale sharks' friendly and inquisitive natures are taken advantage of.

Local fishermen kill them for their livers which, in a mature male, can weigh up to 400 kgs.

This is cut into strips and kept in bottles in the sun for a few weeks until it turns into oil, called 'sifa', which they use to preserve their wooden boats from ship worm.

The rest of the whale shark is wasted as they believe the meat is poisonous, and the tragedy of this is a synthetic oil has been manufactured which is equally as good, if not better, and which is relatively cheap to buy.

In Malindi, Pate island, local fishermen killed 4 whale sharks in one day; and this indiscriminate slaughter is affecting the number of whale sharks in these waters.

Trust statistics reveal that in the year 2000, nearly 40 whale sharks were seen in a period of 10 days; in 2009, 24 in 4 weeks; in 2010, only 12 were seen in a period of 3 weeks.

In 2008, 58 whale sharks were seen in a period of 10 days; in 2009, 24 in 4 weeks; in 2010, only 12 were seen in a period of 3 weeks.

Totally dedicated to saving the whale sharks, having a mine of statistics which he commits to memory, Volker's infectious enthusiasm and love for what he does charms and encourages his visitors to enjoy and wonder at their peep into the world of the ocean.

Joint initiatives are underway between the EAWST and the Fisheries Department of the Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries and other relevant bodies to encourage the local fishermen to use more environmentally friendly fishing methods, as these close meshed nets trap many creatures, including dolphins, who eventually drown, unable to free themselves.

Many turtles die this way off the coast of Kenya; it is estimated that at least 2 to 300 turtles are killed here every year - that's nearly one every day.

Three Environmentalists
Volker, a German Swede, who has lived in Kenya for over 20 years, and who has founded 16 dive schools, is a qualified pilot, and a dedicated ocean environmentalist and educationalist, leads a team of trustees and a wide network of helpers with his wife and partner, Nimu Njonjo.

Kenyan born Nimu gave up a lucrative career in the UK as a criminal lawyer to join Volker in his environmental projects.

Nimu is also a trained diver, and together they have made some remarkable DVDs - the beauty of which would encourage even the most timid to explore the world under the water.

Dr. Mpopi Nuwanyakpa of Heifer International, Cameroon, has made a very wise statement about environmental conservation. "Co-existence with animals is a biological obligation and not a privilege" he stated.

He pointed out that only 1.7 million of an estimated 30 million life forms on earth have been identified.

At the rate the world is now losing its animal and plant species, hundreds of thousands would disappear without ever being catalogued, due to such causes as expanding human populations, crushing poverty, severe droughts, and deforestation.

The Philippines, the Seychelles, Madagascar, Tanzania's Mafia Island, Mozambique - all have very well developed whale shark viewing - and in Kenya? 'Yes you can!' - to paraphrase Barack Obama.

Kenya Whale Shark Trust

This Trust based in Diani is a research centre for collecting and analyzing data about the whale sharks, working with the wildlife authorities and other whale shark establishments around the world, as well as offering viewing safaris.

They regularly take out visitors to spot the whale sharks, for some just to look at and marvel, and for others to pop over the side of the boat and swim alongside these great creatures.

The Trust's microlite spotter plane (a contraption that looks like a bicycle with wing blades atop) scans the ocean to spot the whales from above and they are in radio contact with the boat, so visitors are almost 100 per cent assured of seeing these creatures in their natural surroundings.

Everybody remembers the first time they swam or dived with a whale shark, as it is unforgettable.

To get up close and personal to such a large and beautiful creature is an awesome, immensely humbling experience.

There is something magical about watching them move, the curve of their tail, the glint of their spots and the tiny yellow and blue fish that collect in the jet stream in front of their mouths.

With a graceful sweep of their bodies, they can disappear into the deep, taking with them their secrets.

Founded by Volker Bassen in 2005, the Whale Shark Trust is a registered and recognised establishment with a board of trustees. Every year they find out more about these creatures, and uncover fascinating facts.

They have established a satellite tracking system, and a harmless method of darting these creatures, so their migratory paths can be established.

A very interesting fact has recently emerged - it was believed these creatures only passed through these waters for a period of a few weeks once or twice a year, but it has now been established that whale sharks are resident off the coast of Diani throughout the year, and around

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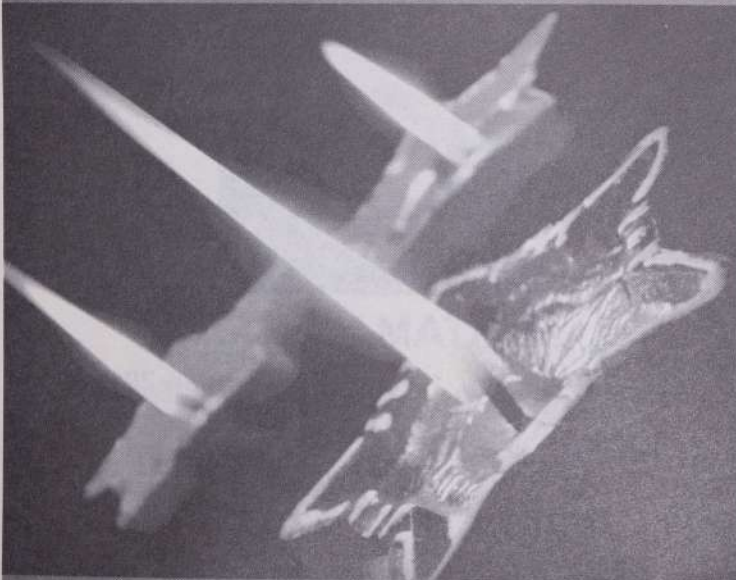

Guru Nanak Rally A Success For Samira

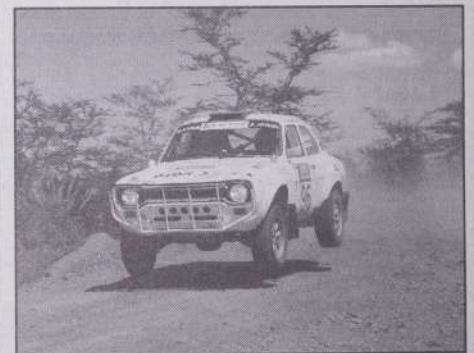
