

The first big jumbo jet opening up the 'high' se-ason arrived at Mombasa International Airport early Saturday morning on a direct flight from Frankfurt with 495 holidaymakers from Tourist-ik Union International subsidiary companies on

board.

TUI is the largest European tour operator, and these weekly flights by Condor Boeing 747s will continue throughout the high season, and be supplemented by a 180 seater Kenya Airways charter flight Frankfurd. Nairobi/Mombasa from December 22 until April 1979.





THE LAST HOURS IN MOMBASA

MR MAHIHU, YOU WERE perhaps one of the closest people to the late President Mzee Jomo Kenyatta, both in your official capacity as the Coast Provincial Commissioner, and also as a long-time personal friend of Mzee and his immediate family. Could you recall in your own words the last 24 hours of the late President at the Coast and in Mombasa?

IT IS DIFFICULT to really give you the details of the events that took place on August 22. I would say that we should start on Tuesday the 21st. This was the day the President met with Kenya's Ambassadors from all parts of the world who represent the Republic abroad. They had an appointment with him in the normal way. We arrived at State House and prepared for the President to meet them, to have a chat, and give them lunch. Mzee and the Ambassadors arrived about 11 o'clock on Monday. I went across for a chat there. We waited upstairs for him in his room, and he came down at around quarter past. Mzee greeted the Dean of the Ambassadors and then we shook hands with (Foreign Minister) Dr. Waiyaki, (Miss) Margaret (Kenyatta), and (breeign Attairs Permanent Sec-Waiyaki, (Miss) Margaret (Kenyatta), and (Foreign Attairs Permanent Sec-

retary) Mr Nicholas Ng'ang'a, and posed for for a photograph with everybody. After that we all moved off for the lunch. Mzee had invited all the Ambassadors to come with him to Msambweni after the lunch, as we had arranged a programme of ngomas and dancers at Msambweni village.

During lunch Mzee had a brief discussion with the Ambassadors and told them how he felt about them and after lunch we all proceeded to Msambweni Village. We left State House about three o'clock. Mzee had rested a bit after lunch, and we arrived at Msambweni around four o'clock. There was a main dias, a small one, where we sat. There was the President, Mama Ngina Kemyatta, Mr Mbiyu Koinange, the Minister of State, and Dr Waiyaki. The five of us were sitting on the dias, while all the Ambassadors and V.I.P.s had chairs around both sides of the dias. The programme went on upto six o'clock at Msambweni, and then we all drove back upto Mombasa, reaching State House at seven o'clock. After we normally finish the work at seven o'clock. After we normally finish the work at seven o'clock. After we normally finish the work at seven eigen to my house and the President goes upstairs to have a rest. We departed this evening in the normal way and were going to meet again at the dancing at ten o'clock in the evening. I went upto my house and then the Minister of State rang me up and said "I am going to Nairobi, this is just to remind you to carry out the programme for the President, as I shall myself be away." So I said "Fair enough". He had told me during the day that he was going up, so I went back to State House at ten o'clock, and so at 10.15 I rang the President and he said "Well you continue with the dancing and if I feel like it I shall come, otherwise you just carry on". At that time Dr Mwangola (personal physician to the President) was around, we had a chat with him, and then we went to the dancing. We also had Mr Robert Matano (Minister for Local Government) with us, who had come to see the President about some appointment for the Miji Kenda elders. So we went to the Hinipiar and we had the dancing and all the teams, three teams actually, performed on that evening.

NO he didn't come down. There was myself, and we just carried on with the programme. After we finished the dancing we went back and the dancers went home. Normally after the dancing is finished we return to our resiences. Then, of course, about three o'clock in the morning... that was when I was rung and I was told that there was a problem.

Who phoned you?

I was phoned by a Doctor This Doctor told me "I have been told to go to State House, how do I get in ?". And I told him "If you have been told to go to State House was shown to straight there and I shall meet you there." Sefore I left my house I rang State House and I was able to speak with Mama Ngina Kenyata direct in the bedroom and she told me "Yes, you had better come quickly." Then I ran like mad. When I arrived there I round that the Doctor who had spoken with me had already arrived and was giving oxygen to Mzee. He said he thought he needed a bit more oxygen, so I went and found some oxygen I think I found from the Aga Khan Hospital. At that time I had met the Doctor who had called at the gate, and then we went in one car and brought more oxygen But in fact we never used it I was driving myself and we brought it in and then we all left the car with the tube of oxygen and we rushed upto the bedroom. We found that this Doctor took him off and he touched Mzee's Chest, twice, by hand not by machine. Just like that, and like that And he histened to his heart and keye, by hand not by machine. What about all the other doctors present, did they also believe the President was now dead? Or they had not until this point?

NO, they thought they were keeping him alive with massage because they have had the same experience before. This other doctor, when he arrived, he touched him and listened to him. "Gentlemen," he said, "the President is no more," and he couldn't talk again. Mama Ngina of course was by the bedside and she asked me in Kikuyu,"what is he talking about" then she. you know she screamed terribly. then I got hold of her and said, "look Mama," I told her. "take a rest" and she rested. Then no more problems. Maybe ten minutes after the whole shock got out of our feelings and then you know I had to decide what to do and then it occured in my mind that Mzee's death, surely it is very serious and therefore I had to inform Mr. Moi and Mr. Geoffrey Karithi, (Head of Civil Service). Those are the two people I got first then I knew Mr. Kibaki, was around. I had seen him two days before so I rang him up and he was terribly asleep and he couldn't wake up quickly. Eventually he got up and he went back to sleep. Then I rang him up for a second time and I said, "Mawai, what are you doing." I said, "you know things are very bad. Shall I send my car?" He said "No, no don't send your car, I am coming. And he arrived at 6 O'clock in the morning after dawn and when he came you know! fear he did not understand. I understood that because I did not tell him more. The man I told very clearly was Karithi because we normally talk a lot even on the telephone on subjects which are very sensitive but we have our own code so we would discuss on a subject not mentioning the name and he would understand and I told him what had happened. He understood completely. Moi was a bit reluctant, but he also got the message no not reluctant, he didn't quit get the message but he guessed because he said yes. New ships acquired

TWO new 20,000 ton fast freighters, the sister ships Tabora and Tagama (pictured), have been acquired by the West German East African Line D.O.A.L. for use on their regular liner service linking East Africa with ports in Europe. Both ships are specially designed for East African conditions with multi-purpose cargo facilities, including up to 400 20-foot containers. They also carry 16-ton cranes and a single 180-ton jumbo derrick for extra-heavy lifts. Both vessels are rated for up to 18.9 knots full speed and are already in service on their way to East Africa.

Premium Bonds Your best bet!

HAVE YOU ever dreamed of being able to gamble without losing your stake money? Now you can do so with the launching this month of the Premium Bond scheme by the Kenya Post Office Savings Bank

From November 1, bonds have been on sale bonds have been on sale at all the main Post Offices and at branches of the major banks. Each bond costs ten shillings and bears a number. Three months' after a bond is bought it goes into the monthly draw and stands a chance of winning a prize.

First prize each month is Shs. 50,000 and there are over 2,000 other prizes ranging from Shs. 10,000 to Shs. 10. After a bond has been held for at least three months, the holder can surrender it and receive his more. it and receive his money

Where does the prize money come from? The money used to buy bonds is a loan to the Pos office Savings Bank, who ch in turn lends it to the Government. A rate of interest is paid for the use of the money, but in stead of paying it in small amounts to indivdual bondholders, put into prize fund.

Out of this, the lucky winners receive their prizes after the bonds have been drawn each month.

Such a scheme has been in operation in the U.K. for twenty years, and large sums of money have been raised for the Government to spend on capital projects. At the same time thousands of bondholders have won prizes.

It is hoped that the scheme will have similar sucess in Kenya raising money for development purposes. If more saving can be generated by this method, the rate of eco-nomic development can be increased and the raibe increased and the reliance on foreign aid will be reduced.

be reduced.

The only drawback is that although the bondholder doesn't lose his money, its value may be reduced over a period of time through inflation. This is a small price to pay, however, for the chance to win a large prize and to contribute to nation building.

dingly.

which the nearby Game Sanctuary of Salt Lick is justly famous. But the mammoths are elusive whereas the Bread and Butter Pudding may be relied upon to be there. My family have always gone back for more so I was determined to learn the secret of its golden caramel toast and the first unforgettable mouthful. But not all guests approve of its appearance on the menu. One tourist, a school teacher, recently felt so incensed that so ple-blan a dish should be served in a hotel, he wrote a letter of complaint to the management but of course had not ventured so far as to taste til And after all, the proof of the pudding is in the eating. With the help of Taita Hills' young chef Obedo Ominde who obligingly showed

me each step in its preparation I offer you:

TAITA HILLS BREAD AND BUTTER PUDDING:

2 slices of toast cut into 4 triangles.

Scant tablespoons currants or raisins (optional) Melted butter approximately 2 tablespoons

1 pint of milk 2 tablespoons of white sugar 2 teaspoons of Vanilla essence 4 whole eggs.

2 teaspoons of Vanilla essence 4 whole eggs.
Dip the slices of toast on both sides in melted butter and place on the bottom of the prepared dish. Scatter the dried fruit on this. Next bring the milk to scalding point, add the vanilla essence, the sugar and the eggs and whisk thoroughly until blended. Pour into the bowl, The toast will float to the top. Now place the bowl in a shallow baking tin, half-filled with cold water and bake in a moderate oven (350 degrees) for approximately 45 minutes. Keep an eye on the pudding and when the top becomes golden reduce the heat to 300 degrees until firm. Serve luke warm, serves 4. Cream may be handed separately.

THE NEXT recipe is a special inclusion for the editor. The fact is that he happened to be the guinea-pig at my table when I first served this and in all innocence he praised it by asking for more. Both crab and avocado pears are readily available

in Mombasa at a reasonable price so that the exotic tone does not make it an expensive or complicated dish.

SUN PRINCESS SOUP 2 whole avocado pears, skinned 2 pints cool chicken broth Half pint fresh cream or 1 small tin double cream

Cayenne Pepper Dash of Worcester Sauce 4 tablespoons sherry (dry) The meat from 2 boiled crabs flaked

The meat from 2 boiled craos-flaked
Slice the avocado pears into the blender discarding the stones, Add a cup of cold chicken broth and blend. Add the rem-aining liquid to this thick puree plus the cream and blend. Add pepper, salt, cayenne and Wor-cester sauce to taste then stir in the sherry. Chill. You will find that the soup thickens consider-ably while in the refrigerator. Check the seasoning before adding the flaked crab-meat and serve after stirring in. Serves & NB: In very hot weather it pays to chill the bowls or serving bowl too as nothing is worse than cold soup which is not really chilled or hot soup which is only luke warm.

DAR ES SALAAM, THURSDAY

TANZANIA PAID more than 154 million shillings in port surcharge to Conference Lines for delaying ships at the Dar es Salaam port between January 1977 and June 1978.

Also people wondered whether they belonged to the American C.I.A. or the Russian K.G.B.
The visitors were part of a group of 30 Russian tourists brought down to Tanzania by 'Kearlines' the tours wing of Kearsley (T) Limited.

During their stay in Tanzania, they made a hectic tour of the city, viewed game at the Mikmin National Park some 300 Kms. west of Dar, and rounded up their stay with an evening a sort of cultural mosaic from the two countries.

But one wonders whether the 'Iron Curtain' has become ductile, for it is understood that 'Kearlines' are working on to bring another group of 25 early next year.





It is emphassised and clearly stated in the Muslim religion that these pilgrimages are undertaken only if one can afford it.

What sort of costs are you talking about?

What sort of costs are you talking about Well, Mecca Inter-Continental is giving Kenya Muslims a facility for 50 (fifty) per cent off the Government approved rates. 


