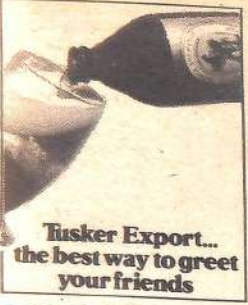

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COUNCIL BUDGET STILL IN 'DEFICIT'

GRAY PHOMBEAH reporting: THE hard-up Municipal Council of Mombasa was K.Shs. 43 million in the red last year. And the estimated deficit for this year is expected to reach new heights of K.Shs. 25.7 million by June, the chairman of the Finance and General Purposes Committee, Councillor M.S. Mwamawila has warned the council. Addressing a special budget meeting of the Mombasa Municipal Council, Councillor Mwamawila said that the council has been operating a deficit budget for the last three years. This, he said, had been occasioned by rising inflation coupled by added services in the form of primary education, health care and the population explosion in Mombasa while sources of revenue remained static.

SCHOOL FEES He said the council had been losing K.Shs. 7.5 million shillings a year since the government withdrawal of grants for C.P.T. drugs, dressings and the loss of school fees in the municipality.

Unveiling a catalogue of financial woes facing the council, Councillor Mwamawila said that the council will not be able to balance the 1985/86 budget without a drastic review of fees, charges and house rents, while identifying and implementing new sources of income in the next financial year.

According to councillor Mwamawila, several capital projects amounting to K.Shs. 48 million could not be completed last year due to lack of funds and a similar fate awaits projects proposed for 1985.

Presenting the council budget between January and June this year, the councillor said that capital projects for this period will require more than K.Shs. 307 million to implement.

EXTERNAL FINANCE Finances for most of these projects, he said, are expected to come from external sources while the council anticipate to provide only about K.Shs. 18 million from its own resources.

World Champions Battle For Safari Rally Honours

SAFARI! The single word that sets all of Kenya alight, bringing a million fans out to line the route of 5,000 kilometres. on roads designed to batter crews and cars into submission. At exactly 10.00 a.m. on Thursday 4th April, President Arap Moi will flag off the leading car, and as Hannu Mikkola and Arne Hertz ease their Audi Quattro down the red and white start ramp, the 1985 Marlboro Safari Rally will be under way. This year the entry list sparkles with names. There are five former World Champions, five Safari winners, 27 works cars in six teams, a dazzling display of machinery ranging from factory entered and serviced Audis, Peugeots, Lancias and Nissans, down to locally

prepared pick-ups. The run out of Nairobi is terrifying, steering the car through a narrow tunnel of waving, screaming dancing

fans, completely carried away with Safari Fever. With this in mind, Mike Doughty's schedule allows a generous 60 minutes to cover the 72 kilometers to Kajiado.

At that point, the cars leave tarmac, turn onto the plains and the race is on. Every driver will have one thing in mind; to get up in front ahead of the billowing dust, conscious that the pace will break several cars. A long climb onto the shoulder of Kilimanjaro then down towards the sisal fields of Taveta, where the route turns east. The 148 kilometers from Iotokitok to Bura is classified as a transport section, to be covered in 64 minutes. Whether they clean it or not all cars will want service before Bura, the start of the Taita Hills. This section has been the test laboratory for the works teams this year, and the cars have been raced up this section until they break or the mechanics are satisfied they have got it right. With engines at full bore, heaters on to dissipate the heat, the crews will be working in temperatures of around 120 degrees F. The 66 kilometers section demands an average speed of 81 kph, which will raise the eyebrows of anyone who has driven through the Taitas. After three kilometers on the flat the cars climb the endless hairpin bends to Mgange, then out along Wesu ridge and a long drive to join the tarmac at Dembwa; a road race to Wundanyi, to the delight of the Lancia's and Opels, then down the north face with shear drops of hundreds of feet be-

Minister Warns Currency Cheats

FOREIGN EXCHANGE SWINDLERS EXPOSED

THE MINISTER FOR Tourism and Wildlife, Andrew Omanga, has said that he is "confident that Kenya has the potential of making tourism the money spinner of all time, and the number one foreign exchange earner", adding "all that we need is a concerted effort and co-operation of all people involved in the tourism industry".

It was the first time for the new Minister For Tourism and Wildlife to address members of the Mombasa and Coast Tourist Association.

He was the guest speaker at its Annual General Meeting held in the recently opened air-conditioned conference room at Bamburi Beach Hotel. The meeting attracted a record attendance.

Among the guests were: Permanent Secretary, Minister

for Tourism and Wildlife, S. Shitemi; Provincial Commissioner, Coast, Mohammed Yusuf Haji; Director of Tourism, D. Musila; Onyango Were, Minister of Tourism Licensing Officer; Johnstone Okutoyi, K.A. Manager Passenger Sales; Vipin Rajani, K.A. Manager, Kenya; and the Deputy Mayor of Malindi Shadrack Kambi.

Continuing the Minister said "we note with satisfaction that Kenya is one of the few developing countries which had the early foresight of developing tourism into a foreign exchange earner".

"With the experience we have had, it is even more important that we improve on the promotion of the tourism industry so as to be able to compensate for the shortfall of our import earnings".

"In effect, this means that we must step up more aggressive campaigns and other promotional activities both at home and abroad, particularly in the new markets of the Middle and Far East, also in our domestic market."

Here the Minister expressed concern over the fact that "we are still not receiving in this country the total foreign exchange earnings that we earn abroad through tourism."

He went on "the problem of foreign exchange swindling is still very much with us and I am appealing to all of you in the industry to endeavour to show your total commitment to this country by exposing all those who are involved in depriving Kenya of the foreign exchange earnings that are so badly needed for developing other sectors of our economy".

Said the Minister "let all members of this association declare total war on this deadly disease and endeavour to get rid of it from our members

Observing that 225 pupils were undertaking Islamic Studies at the Centre, Mr. Abed called for more to enrol so that the three teachers were made full use of.

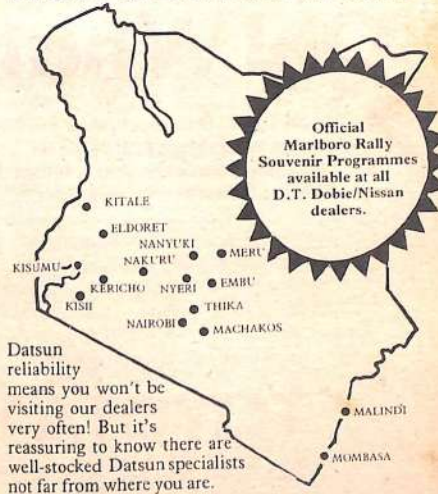
The envoy called on Muslims to continue praying for peace

and the public in general".

Adding "the best way of going about this is to give government every possible co-operation in the field of tourism, for without this misunderstandings will creep in to spoil an otherwise very healthy relationship".

He revealed that in recognition of the important role the coast plays in tourism, the Ministry was posting a Tourist Officer to Malindi as part of our government development policy on district focus".

Referring to the association's representations to him on the question of more charter flights the Minister said:

"I want to assure you that government shall continue to grant charter operation rights to all those who meet the laid

down requirements without, at the same time, under-cutting the interests of our own national airline."

He went on "although some of your members would like the government to be more liberal in this regard than it

has been before, we must be mindful of other government priorities and interests that shall not be compromised by agreeing to grant charter rights to some applicants.

"The Government will, therefore, continue to review these matters from time to time".

Adding "we are all members of the same family, and your needs are of great interest to my Ministry. Therefore, we expect all concerned to develop an understanding attitude towards government policy on these matters".

Continuing the Minister was happy to note that "since June last year, the Coast has continued to enjoy high season occupancies.

### 'DOMESTIC TOURISM'

Consequently, he said "the Coast may be setting the pace to end the long standing problem of seasonability that has beset the industry year after year."

However, he added "we should not lose sight of the importance of nursing and developing domestic tourism".

Although two successful national seminars had come up with recommendations on ways and means of developing domestic tourism, the Minister noted "we have not seen any tangible, positive, results yet".

Said the Minister "I strongly feel that the tourism industry in this country which has evolved over a period of time for the sole purpose of catering for the foreign visitor must of necessity adjust in order to be able to accommodate and cater for the local population and look upon them as equally important as the foreign visitor.

The success of this new development calls for a drastic and positive change of attitude by all serving in the industry. In addition, members of this association should join hands with government in promoting domestic tourism."

"This means", said the Minister, "you should set aside funds for promotion, prepare specific and relevant promotional brochures as well as come up with cheap package tours that should appeal to this new market segment.

The marketing technique applied in foreign and domestic tourism, particularly on rates, ought to be very much the same. Kenya, as a domestic market, should be given similar treatment with any other coun-

try that is a major provider of tourists for Kenya."

Here the Minister said "we are not for a moment losing sight of the importance of foreign currency to our all economy".

The Minister assured the C.T.A. "that we are committed to continue doing our part within the financial constraints of the Government".

### 'MORE PROMOTION'

Therefore, he said "I expect all members of the association to participate actively in one way or the other in the tourism promotional activities in conjunction with the Ministry".

For example, he said "I expect you to go out on promotional trips abroad, that you let us know what we may collaborate with in all our joint promotional efforts".

In her opening address, M.C.T.A. Chairman, Mrs. Lorna Hayes, who had just been elected for the 19th year of the "association does all it can to keep standards high".

However, she observed "we must not be complacent and expect more and more tourists to fall out of the sky. We have to continue promoting to increase our numbers. Cheaper air fares with direct flights to the Coast is the main way of encouraging more tourists to visit us".

She was happy to report "the 1984/1985 season had been much better than the previous four years, which were closing to say the least."

In December, various reports indicated occupancies were the same level as in 1980 - very best ever and record season".

The aim is, said the chairman "to keep these figures high for a longer period of time instead of just a few, for we can't have any tourist concern - by tour operator, restaurant, aircraft, company etc. financially on short seasons".

They cannot, nor can shops, tradesmen, professions and businesses, many of which are affected by tourism in different degrees.

She noted, there is an optimism around. Therefore, we encourage it with all might so that we can meet targets recently given to Ministers of Tourism - 1.5 million tourists a year by 1990.

### 'AIR CHARTERS'

Said the chairman "if we achieved we will obviously have levelled off the high and low seasons and have visitors the year round, including domestic tourism from within our borders and from the countries nearby".

The chairman then outlined what the MACTA considers to be the main problems facing the tourist industry at the moment.

### More Direct and Cheap Flights

To help achieve the target of one million tourists a year by 1988, and so level off the seasons, a cheaper fare direct to Mombasa from Europe, particularly from the United Kingdom is needed.

In addition more seats within the Nairobi/Mombasa/Malindi sectors in Kenya Airways

"There neighbour who has three rights upon you is the one who is a Muslim and a relative. The neighbour having two rights is either a non-Muslim relative or a non-relative Muslim.

"The neighbour having one right is the one who is neither a Muslim nor a relative. Still he has got all the claims of neighbourhood rights upon you."

Again Prophet Mohamed (s.a.w.) has said: "He from me who sleeps content while his neighbour hungry".

Al-Imam Zainul Abidin ibne-Husein has said: "are your duties towards your neighbour: Protect his respect when he is absent; help him when he is with any injustice."

"Do not remain on to detect his faults; on any chance, you happen to do any wrong, in spite with him a noble life be highest Islamic ethical code."

The Holy Quran, Chapter: 4 Verse 36: "good to the neighbour your relative and to the neighbour who is not your relative."

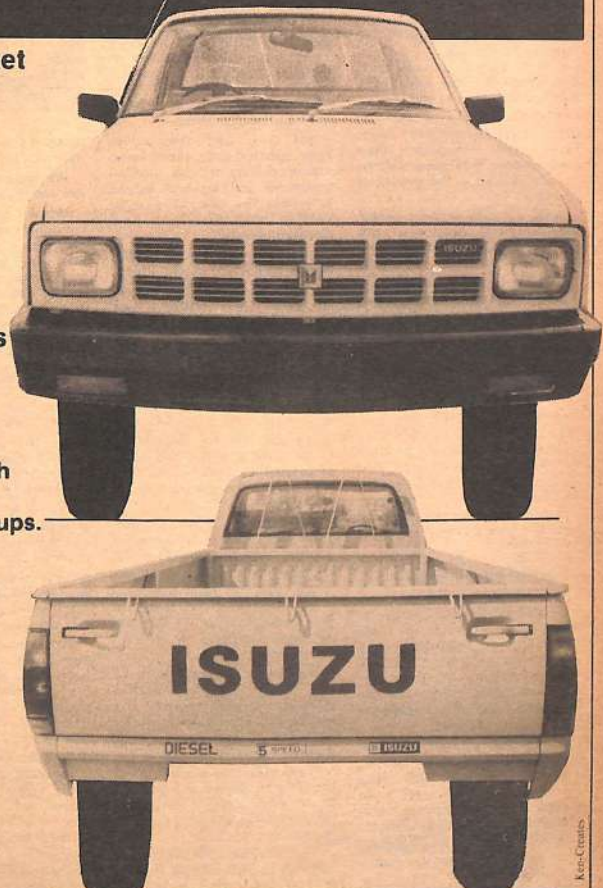

# Africa - And The Politics

## of Famine Relief

I'D LIKE to talk to you today about the famine in Africa and my upcoming trip to several sub-Saharan countries.

It used to be said that Americans didn't care about Africa or anything that happened there.

No one can say that now: not after we saw the incredible humanitarian outpouring in America over the last few months.

Since October, when the first film from Ethiopia was broadcast, Americans have, from their own pockets, donated more than 70 million dollars to feed the starving.

Children and school teachers parents and veterans corporations and churches - from every corner of American life the contributions have poured.

Sandra Nathan of Brooksville, Florida, donated her life savings to care for Ethiopian relief.

Sandra is six and her savings came to five dollars, while Lauhoff Grain of Danville, Illinois, organized a nine-company group to deliver a million meals of emergency food to Ethiopian children.

More than a hundred American Voluntary Organizations - among them Catholic Relief Services, Care, Lutheran World Relief and Save the Children - have joined in this mission of mercy.

I've been told that while I'm in Sudan a chartered 747 carrying 240,000 pounds of medicine and foods will land in Khartoum.

The plane will come from *Americares* (a voluntary relief organisation - that last year won the President's Volunteer Action Award).

Its cargo will be bound for the people of Eritrea and Tigre Provinces in Ethiopia.

This will be the first of an entirely voluntary and private American mercy-lift to those provinces.

But it's not just Americans who've rallied to feed the starving. From Britain, Germany, France, Canada, from throughout the free world have come similar gifts of the heart.

And the people of the free world haven't stopped there. Last year, through their governments, they gave millions of tons of food to the people of Africa.

And as with private giving, the American people in this also led the way, accounting for more than half of the donations.

Most of this private and public attention has been focused on Ethiopia. And you can see why.

Of the 20 million Africans who we expect may be in danger of starving at one time or another over the year, more than seven million are Ethiopian.

Famine has been so devastating in Ethiopia in part because the Government has used it as an instrument of war in Eritrea and Tigre.

And with decent people all over the world this is of great concern to us.

### DEATH RATES

In late December and early January the death rates in the refugee camps on the Sudan-Ethiopia border were among the highest in medical history, rivaling those on the Cambodia-Thai border in the late 1970s, or in the Ukraine in 1933.

We began airlifts to the camps just before Christmas, when it became clear that the United Nations agency in charge was becoming overwhelmed.

We sent a team of doctors and engineers into camps in early January.

They took water tanks, medi-

cine, shelter and blankets, as well as food to the refugees. They saved thousands of lives.

The President and I are particularly concerned about reports of Ethiopian government and rebel obstruction of free world relief efforts in Ethiopia itself.

You've probably seen a number of the charges, and they're shocking.

Food for starving millions still takes a back seat to military cargo when authorities decide the order in which ships can dock in the ports of Ethiopia.

The Government controls about 6,000 trucks. It's put only about five percent of these into getting food from the docks to the feeding centers.

But, of course, in September it spent tens of millions of dollars on its tenth anniversary celebration.

Many refugees prefer to trek long distances to camps in Sudan rather than risk showing up at feeding stations in Ethiopia, where too many have been beaten and humiliated and where others have been drafted or packed off to the southern plains as part of the government's politically motivated campaign to move a million and a half people from the Northern highlands.

But, from our point of view, the most serious abuse of human rights has been the government's refusal to allow relief agencies safe passage to take food into areas of Eritrea and Tigre not under its control.

Equally shocking has been the Soviet response: The Soviets were fully capable of putting a 1,000 million dollars worth of military hardware and nearly 20,000 Cuban troops into Ethiopia between November 1977 and March 1978.

Yet they and their allies have donated only about seven million dollars in food, medical equipment and logistical support to relieve the drive - ten per cent of what Americans have donated privately.

You know, there's a familiar pattern to Soviet behaviour here.

In the past decade Moscow provided less than one percent of Africa's foreign economic aid and rarely participated in humanitarian relief.

It did, however, provide or sell 75 percent of Africa's weapons.

We call on the Soviets to be as serious about the relief of famine in Ethiopia as they were about the conduct of the war there.

We call on them to turn away from the instruments of conflict and towards the saving of lives.

We call on the Ethiopian government and the rebels to grant safe passage to convoys of mercy taking food into Eritrea and Tigre.

But - and I want this to be very clear - as bad as the situation in Ethiopia is, it's just part of a much broader emergency that has engulfed most of sub-Saharan Africa.

From Mali and Mauritania in the west to Sudan and Somalia in the east, a great curtain of famine has now descended over Africa.

Look at the countries I'll be visiting: In Sudan more than 4.5 million risk starvation. In Niger it's 2.6 million. In Mali 2 million.

Each of these countries has done magnificent work in response to this crisis. Sudan, for example, has set a standard of mercy for the world.

With millions of their own in desperate need, the Sudanese people have given shelter to hundreds of thousands of refugees.

Niger has shown how brave people can, even in a drought, learn about new crops that will keep their need for outside help to a minimum.

### BEST RECORDS

And I've got to add that Niger's leadership has one of the best records for economic reform in Africa.

And Mali is - even in the drought - starting down the road to economic reforms that could lead to producing all the food it needs in just a few years.

The President and I want to focus attention on drought and starvation throughout Africa, not just in one country.

It's a crisis that will be with us at least until the November harvest. And in a broader



the bad, he would be guilty of capitalist "hoarding."

If he were to sell some of that store to buy a plot or make some other investment in the productivity of his farm, he would be guilty of "capitalist accumulation."

And if he wished to sell his harvest to any but the government grain dealer at any but the government price, he would be "guilty of capitalist exploitation."

And these kind of policies are not unique to Ethiopia.

In country after country, farmers have been for years required to sell their crops through the inefficient and often corrupt state-owned grain dealerships at the state-set prices which have been everywhere far below market prices.

In one country, high taxes and below-market prices for crops have been calculated as taking as much as 90 percent of the farmer's potential earnings - a pretty high tax rate.

That's why sub-Saharan Africa is the only region of the world in which per capital

substantial maize surplus for export.

In the last few months, the United States established a special program to help African countries reform their economies to increase agricultural production.

Seventy-five million dollars is dedicated this year to that program. We will continue this effort next year.

And later this year we're going to bring food aid into the drive. We're going to call it *Food For Progress*.

Financial aid, food aid - we're going to target some of each to countries that are moving down the road to open agricultural markets.

In addition to this new attitude about the open market, there's one other reason to hope that we might ultimately solve the long-term problem of hunger in Africa.

Agricultural research has recently produced drought resistant sorghums that could double current yields, even in dry years, and more productive varieties of yams, corn and peanuts -

**UNITED STATES Vice President George Bush recently addressed the 'National Press Club' in Washington, D.C., on the subject of U.S. Aid to Africa, and his intentions of speaking to the U.N.-sponsored 'World Donors' Conference in Geneva, one week before embarking on a round trip through the Sudan, Niger and Mali. The following is the full text of his remarks.**

food production has dropped in the past two decades - 20 percent in 20 years.

In the early 1960s, when much of Africa became independent, the continent produced 95 percent of the food it consumed. Today it doesn't even come close.

On my trip I'll be talking with the leaders I meet about just what they're doing to open the markets of their countries to let their farm economies breathe.

And in Sudan, Mali and Niger, I know they're all doing something.

The failures of the socialist flirtations of the past two decades have become so enormous that not only Sudan, Niger and Mali but about half the countries of the continent have started on the journey to open and free agricultural markets.

Some have already seen results. The removal of price controls in Somalia, for example, led to a 40 percent increase in sorghum and banana production.

And the year after Malawi let prices rise by half, maize production there doubled.

By 1983, a hard year for much of African agriculture, Malawi had accumulated a

important food and cash crops for millions of Africans.

Let me give you an idea of what these miracle crops can mean. If Sudanese farmers come to use the new sorghum hybrids for just one-quarter of the sorghum they grow, Sudan will be able to feed itself.

Research has also found ways to stop and even reverse the expansion of the desert. It's as simple as planting the right trees and other kinds of ground cover.

But here, again, you can see why policy changes are so important.

If a farmer has to give the state most of what he makes, he's not going to want to take a chance on an unfamiliar strain of grain or on any improvement in seeds or tools or practices.

And he's not going to want to buy trees.

### EXHAUSTION

He'll just get what he can for today and live on a shorter and shorter string until disaster hits or his land has been exhausted and he picks up and moves to the city.

You can see this happening in the way the land has been worked harder and harder over the years.

At the time most of Africa became independent, African farmers left fields fallow for about 20 years at a stretch. Today they're down to five years. No wonder the desert is advancing.

After my visit to Sudan, Mali and Niger, I will fly to Geneva and on the President's behalf address a United Nations conference of the nations that are donating food, medicine and other aid in the current emergency.

In the last fiscal year, the nations of the free world together provided over 2.5 million tons of food to Africa.

### UNITED NATIONS

This year the United States alone will make available 3.3 million tons, assuming Congress passes the 235 million dollar supplemental appropriation the President requested in January as part of his African hunger initiative.

That initiative is in part a 1.100 million dollar package of food medicine and other aid to meet the current crisis.

We believe that our 3.2 million tons of food will more than meet half of Africa's need this year.

At Geneva I will ask the rest of the world to match our food donations ton for ton, that is to bring their combined donations up to the same level as ours.

If we are successful in the appeal, governments around the globe will pledge this year (on top of what they're already giving) another million tons of food for Africa.

A few moments ago, I spoke of how Americans, on their own, have rallied to help starving Africa.

It's part of that old American tradition of helping neighbours.

And it's really more than an American tradition. It's a tradition among free people everywhere.

It's why so much has come from this side of the "Iron Curtain" to meet this crisis and so little from the other.

I'm sure that if the Soviet people knew about the suffering in Ethiopia that they, too, would respond with generous hearts. But they're not free to know, or to respond.

There's a lesson about freedom that runs all through this question of the famine.

### CATASTROPHE

Why has agriculture lagged in Africa? Because, in large measure, farmers were denied freedom.

Why did the world's appreciation of the enormity of the crisis lag?

Because the press in Africa was, in large measure, denied freedom - particularly in Ethiopia.

And thank God for Mohammed Amin and Michael Burke of the BBC. Thousands owe their lives to the courage, diligence and skill of these two reporters.

And finally this catastrophe - that freedom could first have prevented and then have kept from growing so desperate - overwhelmed Africa.

And who was it who came with food and medicines and love?

Not the enslaved, but united together, the free people and the free nations of the earth.

Here I should also stress one thing and that is love: Always love developed after marriage but not before it as many people observe it, remember the

wife is the centre of activity, she is the one who brings happiness in the whole family.

Marriage is designed to achieve lasting happiness in the life of wife and husband for the sake of their sons, and daughters to become the good fathers and mothers of tomorrow.

Let us protect them in all means.

It is urged in the Islamic Law that every - capable man (financially) should marry except for health reasons.

The reason behind marriage is to prevent man from sin, and promote the virtues of discipline and self control.

I also should blame the parents of daughters if not all but most of them demand sums of money as dowry, infact they don't think about the economic situation that is facing the world right now.

Some of them may demand over 30,000/- for their daughter. Now let us imagine is it possible for middleman who is earning less than 2000/- a month to get married if this is the fixed dowry?

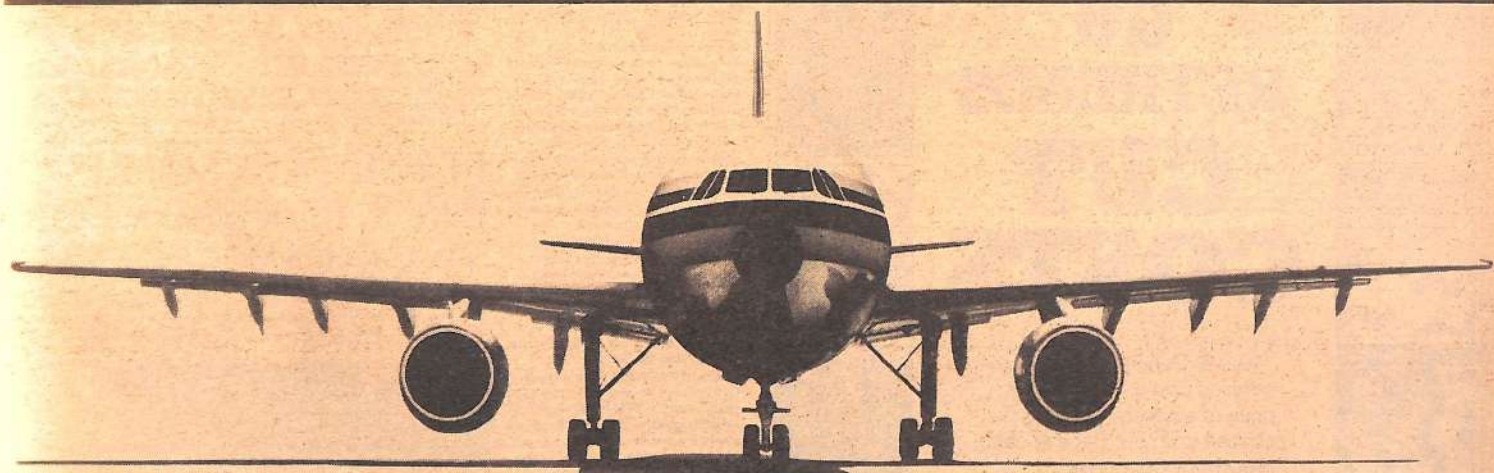
Therefore I'm asking you as parents and guardians to take this appeal into account, which step will help many un-married youngsters.

# Grain And Fertiliser Charters To Off-Load Bulk Cargoes In April

AS PREDICTED the grain and fertiliser charters, after a lull of a week or two, will be arriving at Mombasa again starting early April. The U.S. flag *Liger*, an ex tanker built in 1945, is due tomorrow with 20,000 tons bulk Maize. This veteran started her life 40 years ago as a tanker and her original forward and after sector remains. A cargo section was built in Germany and inserted in 1962.

On Sunday the 17,000 d.w. ton Philippine flag bulker *Pacific City* is due with almost 15,000 tons bulk Wheat whilst on Monday 1st April the 27,000 d.w. ton Greek owned *Polychronis* is due with 20,600 tons bulk Wheat. Over 5 days therefore the Port Authority will have over 55,000 tons of bulk grain to handle.

On 4th April a Mexican vessel the *Nauticas Mexico*

is due with 10,400 tons bulk Fertiliser. I cannot remember a Mexican vessel calling at the port before; according to my records she is also a training ship presumably for merchant navy cadets and is only 3 years old so could be an interesting vessel.

Kilindini has experienced easier conditions this week in fact on Tuesday there were seven empty berths.

A smart looking smaller class of No. 7 berth is the 3 year old Dutch vessel *Christina Smits* which has been discharging some 1200 tons general cargo from Bombay and loading 1000 tons bagged Soda Ash for Lagos/Apapa in West Africa.

**KENYA RAILWAYS**  
This vessel owned by General Shipping & Chartering Services, Rotterdam is one of several modern sister ships built for these owners, several of which have called at Mombasa over the past year with railway coaches for Kenya Railways.

The vessels have twin yellow funnels set aft, deck cranes and bright green hulls with the vessels always spotlessly clean. The *Christina Smits* is due to sail today.

The grey hulled oil supply vessels the *Osa Leopard* and *Osa Jaguar* have been much in evidence over the past week entering and leaving the port; they are evidently employed in the current wave of offshore oil prospecting.

The Zanzibar cargo/passenger vessel *Maendeleo* has been in Mombasa for several weeks now undergoing painting and repairs by AMGECO in between loading some cargo alongside. At time of writing she is still at Mtongwe waiting for cargo at her own convenience and was expected to sail on Tuesday.

**SURPLUS TONNAGE**  
She has, meantime, received a fresh coat of paint and looks unusually trim. Unlike her normal unkept appearance it would be refreshing to see her maintain her new looks at least for some months - not too difficult with regular upkeep and touching up of the paintwork.

Vessels laid up world wide showed a small decrease on the 1st March when the figure was 1306 alongside 1324 vessels on the 1st February.

Much of this number is made up of tankers of which there is an enormous surplus tonnage estimated at over one million deadweight tons so the rate of scrapping must be accelerated to achieve something approaching normal healthy trading conditions coupled with a reduced hazard to tankers trading in the Gulf area.

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## GERMAN TOURISTS DISEMBARK ON RUSSIAN CRUISE VESSEL

TO CELEBRATE the arrival at Mombasa of the luxury cruise ship *m.s. Ivan Franko* presently sailing around the world in 99 days, Jahn Reisen, a tour operator in West Germany which is sending an increasing number of tourists to Kenya, hosted a 'Get Together Cocktail Party' in the ship's spacious music lounge on the evening following her arrival on March 28.

There was also entertainment by Russian and German artists on board.

One hundred and fifty guests were invited. They included the Minister for Tourism and Wildlife, Andrew Omanga, the Provincial Commissioner Coast, Mohammed Yusuf Haji. Officers from the Immigration and Customs Departments, members of the tourist industry including hoteliers and tour operators, also A T & H which have been handling Jahn Reisen's ground arrangements since it started sending tourists here five years ago.

The *Ivan Franko* belongs to the Black Sea Shipping Company, Odessa, and is on a full "charter" to Jahn Reisen.

This Tour Operator has two other Russian ships on charter for cruising in the Mediterranean to Italy and Spain.

The 19,860 ton *Ivan Franko* is the largest, and this was the first time for her to call at Mombasa. She is on a special world cruise arriving at Mombasa with 472 of Jahn Reisen's clients on board.

The ship remains here until March 31 during which time most will be going on safaris with A T & H and U T C all over Kenya as well as on city and dhow tours.

A special LTS charter flight from Germany arrives at Moi International Airport on Sunday morning with 173 passengers who are embarking on the *Ivan Franko* for the last leg of her cruise to Tanzania Colombo-Bombay-Yemen-Jordan and Egypt arriving back in Italy towards the end of April.

They were taken on a City to see something of historic and modern Mombasa before joining the ship due to sail for Tanzania that evening.

Meanwhile, 187 left the ship at Mombasa to return by air to Germany.

In an interview Miguel

Sperber Jahn Reisen's Resident Manager said 'we hope that the *Ivan Franko* will be calling at Mombasa again next year'. It is a one class luxury ship with a Russian captain and crew. All cabins are air-conditioned. There are also VIP and family suites with bedroom, lounge, kitchen with fridge and colour TV.

**MILLION TOURISTS**  
Jahn Reisen, although only five years old has experienced phenomenal growth, now handling around one million tourists a year.

It was bought in April 1982 by LTU, a privately owned charter airline based at Dusseldorf and now has two sister companies - Meiers Welt Reisen and Transair. LTU also has a

sister company - LTS. At the moment a LTU LTS charter arrive at Moi International Airport, Mombasa every Saturday morning.

Mr. Sperber revealed during the 1985-1986 Winter Season there will not only be LTU and LTS charter arrivals each week, but also an additional LTS flight on Mondays.

He explained 'we have created our programme in Kenya with more hotels and allocations for us anticipate bringing to Kenya next year 250 holidaymakers a week compared with 180 at the moment'.

Said Mr. Sperber 'Holidays to Kenya are selling very well and it is now our most popular long-haul destination'.

side the right hand door. Service will be available and necessary at Chelembwa, after which the crews have an all tarmac rest period. The route as originally planned took them into the Sagalla Hills but the 1984 rains put paid to that scheme.

Now it's tarmac all the way to Mariakani, where the faster cars will have created themselves a handsome slice of service time.

The last section into Mombasa is a standard 110 kilometers loop through Gotani, Kaloleni, along the main murrum road towards Kilifi until the crossroads at Kisoeni, with passage control and shaky wooden bridge.

The next 10 kilometers are no place for the weak hearted; along the pipe line road that ignores contours so that each brow has the crew floating in their harness, each drift squashes them down in their seats.

Last year one blind brow put paid to the hopes of a Mombasa team, but this year the police will be keeping an eye on things.

After the bends and hills of Mbuyuni and Mereni, the cars turn towards the sea and tackle the 20 kilometer slalom run that MMC calls home; Nguu Tatu.

This is where the Kirklinds, Horsey and Vitullis come into their own and win back a vital minute or two.

Kisauni control is sited near the tanks, which means that cars will be in a hurry through the village and police have agreed to close this road to northbound cars while the rally is coming through.

Service crews will be busy all the way up the main Bamburi road so give them all the room they need.

Shortly after 4.30 p.m. the leading car is due at Bamburi Beach Hotel, where the cars go into Parc Ferme and the drivers head for showers, a meal and a few hours precious sleep. Tail enders will make the most of a hurried cup of coffee.

At 8.15 p.m., the Safari will get underway again as the cars are set off at two minute intervals, heading down the main road towards Nyali Bridge and Makupta causeway.

### MAGONGO ROAD

they avoid the Magongo Road by passing through the Mikindini landslide area, please note, open to competing cars ONLY.

Mazeras control is sited above the level crossing and here battle is joined once more. The road to Kinango included Mwachi River where the new bridge removes the organisers worry about flash floods and re-routes.

After Kinango the route heads north once more. 51 kilometers that can be race track or hippo-wallow.

The tarmac between Samburu and Buchuma allows more servicing, certainly the wiser crews will refuel and have the cars checked before tackling the 120 kilometer across the ranches to Mwatate.

This section has everything, deep sand and mud, trees and animals, the loop around Kasigau mountain has been regraded, replacing the many wash-aways with six inches of loose soil.

The sprint for the sisal with the naviga for ticking off the crossroads will be a corridor of red dust, and a ranchers efforts to improve one patch with a bulldozer has created a ripple that the French would be proud of the pitch and amplitude means coming to a halt or risking kidney failure.

Mainroad tarmac from Mwatate takes the safari past Voi petrol and Samusa Centre for a second time before the cars clock in at Irima.

This control marks the beginning of "Taita - Part Two", augmented by a joint over Ronge-Juu, where the slopes and sheer precipices would make a mountain goat nervous.

The nine kilometer climb with its many hairpins will tear up tyres and overheated engines will again keep crews eyes riveted to temperature and oil pressure gauges.

The leading car is due at Bura minutes after midnight, after which the rally moves out of Mombasa's control area.

### BUFFALO LODGE

A two and a half hour halt is planned at Kilimanjaro Buffalo Lodge, then on to Nairobi where the 1,600 kilometer first leg ends on Friday morning.

The second leg takes the cars into West ern Kenya with rest halt's at Kericho (Friday 8 p.m. - 11 p.m.), Kakamega (Saturday 2.30 a.m. - 6.45 a.m.), Eldoret (midday - 4 p.m.) and Nakuru (6 p.m. - 9 p.m.).

The cars get back to Nairobi just after midnight on Saturday, having driven a total of 3,600 kilometers.

The Third and final loop will be the downfall of cars and crews on their last legs, a thousand kilometers through Mau Narok, Rumiruti and around Mount Kenya.

On Monday afternoon the survivors will have a final rest near Utalii College, long enough for them to be put in to their correct order before

To guide you there are new signboards, illuminated at night, with rotating coloured lights, and, on top of the building, (the Slush side) there is a gigantic sign with a spotlight to draw your attention.

We first entered the shop this side and were pleasantly surprised to find some of the best bed linen seen recently, both imported and local. The

latter is of just as good a quality but cheaper. Both have a brand *Sleeping Beauty*.

Although modern, Shakoors don't appear to be metric yet, so all prices of the following sheets (bed-sheets) and other linen are in inches!!

Printed poplin sheets, size 60 X 90 are from only 150 — per pair. Discounts on some of the marked prices are more

all sizes.

And tropical-looking are the Spanish bedcovers with lacy fringe edging.

Mozzy-nets fit kiddie's cots - or double-sized beds.

Pretty imported towels are from China, from 60.—, size 30 X 90. Or a cuddley giant bath towel, 40 X 82 is reduced to 250.—.

From bedroom to kitchen-dining:

Shakoors have the right container for domestic storage-ware or deep freezers.

At last — non-breakable crockery. This is from *Arcopal*, and a good range too. Or what about fire-proof "Fire-King" — a few pieces in "gold" add the look of luxury.

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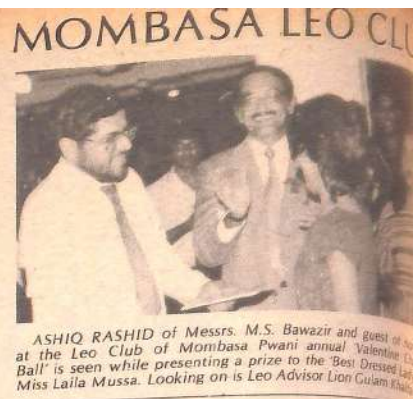

**Security:** This is a national problem. However, since Malindi and the South Coast have contributed financially for increased police patrols in both areas (in Malindi) by leasing a house for extra police to sleep in) the situation has been better on the beaches and main roads. However, in Malindi the rogues and thugs were moving to the towns - Malindi and Mombasa.

The Police force needs enlarging and given more vehicles. This has been discussed with Coast Provincial Commissioners and Principal Police Officers, not only for the protection of visitors, but residents as well.

REPORT From MUIR DAYA

THE IMPLEMENTATION of a water system improvement project in Dar es Salaam will commence in June this year. The money for the project, which runs to the tune of Shillings 65 million, has been granted through the Japanese International Cooperation Agency (JICA) in order to alleviate frequent water problems in the city.

Detailed designs of the project were made by Japanese Tokyo Engineering Consultants Company last month and the project is scheduled for completion by the end of this year.

The recurrent water problem in the city has led to many people suffering for days without a regular supply of water so have installed water reservoirs to store water.

Meanwhile, the Dar es Salaam Transport Association which conducts bus services in the city has been given a green light to purchase spares for some 200 ticket machines.

The Bank of Tanzania has allocated half a million shillings to the association for this purpose.

At present the Association issues printed tickets to commuters which is not only time-consuming but also raises problems in maintaining proper accounting records.

It is anticipated that the rehabilitation of the ticket machines will enable the association to effectively monitor the increase in revenue expected this year following the decision of the government to raise fares from the previous 1/50 to 1/4 - for adults and from 1/100 to 1/4 - for express buses.

In connection with spares for the articulated Ikarus buses from Hungary there has not been much progress because the Bank of Tanzania has not remitted nearly 56 million shillings to Hungary as loan proceeds for the buses procured in 1975 and 1980.

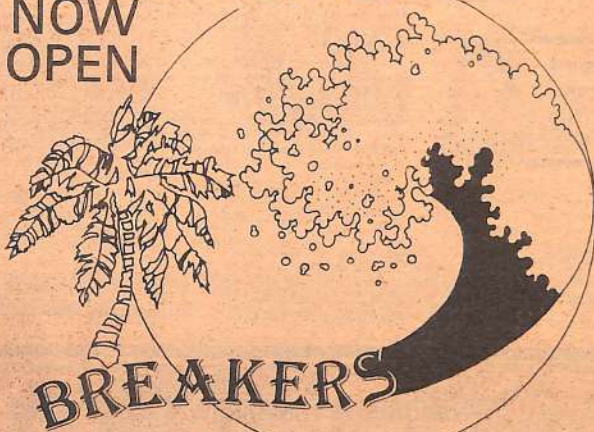

# Strandhotels helfen den Nashörnern

DEM einsamen Wanderer, der sich zur Zeit auf einem 1600 km langen Fußmarsch durch Ostafrika befindet, um dadurch Geldmittel für die Rettung der vom Aussterben bedrohten Schwarzen Nashörner oder Spitzmaulnashörner aufzubringen, haben verschiedene Strandhotels ihre Unterstützung zugesagt.

11 Hotels an der Küste haben sich verpflichtet, in den nächsten sechs Monaten mindestens Kshs. 50.000 beizusteuern durch die Einnahmen, die sie jede Woche aus ihren Vorführungen von Tierfilmen erhalten.

Zu diesen Hotels gehören: Nyalı Beach Hotel, Severin Sea Lodge und Serena Beach Hotel an der Nordküste, Hotel Tradewinds, Robinson Baobab, Shelly Beach Hotel, Jadini und Golden Beach Hotel an der Südküste sowie Lawfords und Sindbad Hotel in Malindi.

Weitere Hilfe für den Fonds "Rettet die Nashörner" wurde auch von den "Freunden des Fort Jesus" in Aussicht gestellt.

Michael Werikhe, der als Aufseher über die Wachmänner bei AVA arbeitet (wo die bekanntesten Automarken in Kenia zusammengebaut werden),

begann seine Fußwanderung anfangs Februar in Kampala. Er hat bereits eine lange Liste von Sponsoren, der immer neue Namen beigelegt werden, so daß er mit Kshs. 500.000 rechnet, die zum Schutz der bedrohten Nashörner eingesetzt werden können.

Es ist schon absurd zu denken, daß gemäß Fossilienbeweisen bereits vor 60 Millionen Jahren Nashörner in etwas ertümlicherer Form auf unserer Erde existierten und diese vorsintflutliche Tiergattung nun nach so vielen Jahren durch ihren einzigen Feind, den Menschen, vom Aussterben bedroht ist.

## Aphrodisiakum

Das Horn des Nashorns ist vor allem in Indien und im Fernen Osten sehr begehrt als Aphrodisiakum, obwohl die stimulierende sexuelle Wirkung medizinisch keinesfalls bestätigt ist. Es liegt wohl mehr an der phallischen Form des Horns, die zu diesem Aberglauben Anlaß gibt, und an der Einbildung, die schließlich auch zu einem Erfolg führen kann.

Im Jemen werden die geschnitzten Hörner als Dolchgriffe verwendet, und die kostbaren Waffen werden vom Vater an den Sohn weiter-

gegeben.

In Indien, Indonesien und Malaysia benutzt man die geschnitzten Hörner als Trinkbecher, in denen man jegliches beigemischte Gift sofort entdecken kann. Bei der kleinsten Giftmenge soll die Flüssigkeit zu sprudeln anfangen oder der Hornbecher einen Sprung erhalten.

Überdies findet das Hornpulver in asiatischen Ländern vielfach Verwendung als Medizin gegen unzählige Leiden, wie Malaria, hohes Fieber, Zahnschmerzen etc.

Aus diesen Gründen wurden die Nashörner über Jahrtausende von den Menschen rücksichtslos verfolgt, gejagt und gewildert, bis sie beinahe ausgerottet waren. Die Nachfrage nimmt ständig zu, die Hörner werden immer rarer und deshalb schon mit Gold aufgewogen oder sogar höher bewertet.

Schwarze oder Spitzmaulnashörner gibt es noch einige Tausend, vor allem in Sambia und Tansania, doch in Kenia ist diese Gattung in erschreckendem Masse bedroht. Der vor 50 Jahren noch beachtliche Bestand an Nashörnern ist heute zu 99 Prozent vor allem den Wilderern zum Opfer gefallen.

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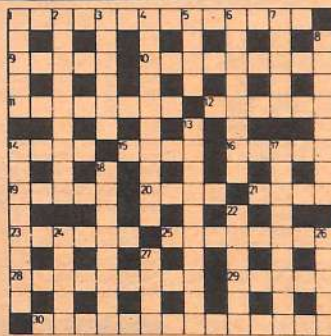
