Naftali Mwaura NAIROBI (Xinhua) -- Kenya is finalizing plans to host an inaugural blue economy summit in Nairobi next week amid expectations it will chart a new roadmap in tapping water resources to drive growth.

MOMBASA (Xinhua) -- Kenya has embarked on a project to refurbish and upgrade the country's second largest airport to attract more international flights.

James Macharia, cabinet secretary at the ministry of transport, said Tuesday the seven billion shilling (about 69 million U.S. dollars)

The east African nation will spend an estimated 750 million shillings (about 7.5 million U.S. dollars) to host the conference that will be attended by presidents, ministers, industry executives, scientists and green

campaigners. Juma hailed financial contribution from Kenya's bilateral partners and the local private sector to support the summit.

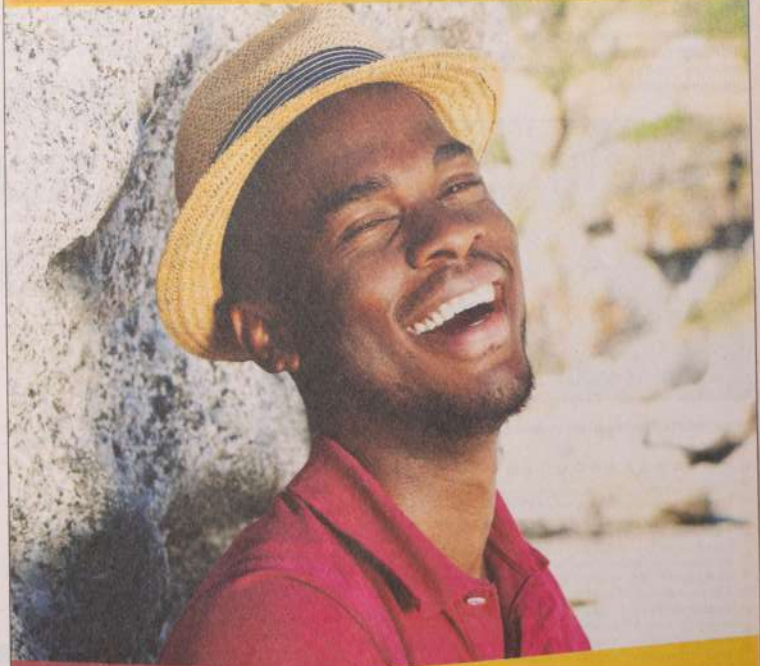

Fifty-three-year-old Salma Baig slipped away quietly, without much fuss on October 19, 1995. Many know her by her stage name, Baby Naaz, writes V GANGADHAR.

So impressive and spontaneous was her performance in Raj Kapoor's *Boot Polish* that, even after she grew up, got married and became a mother, she was still known as Baby Naaz.

Her role in *Boot Polish*, released in the early 1950s, won several international awards and brought fresh acclaim to the R K banner.

In 1995, she won a special jury mention at the Cannes Film Festival for her role in the film.

Naaz had a good thing in *Boot Polish*, a credible storyline, excellent technical effects, wonderful performances by veteran David, Master Rattan, catchy music - *John chacha, tum kitne ache, Nanhe munhe bache teri mutti mein kya hain and Lapak japak*... and then, of course, her own performance.

Normally, child artistes in Hindi films are, kindly put, a pain.

They are excessively coy, nauseatingly smart, or plain wooden.

Naaz was none of them in *Boot Polish*.

Her frock was torn and dirty, her face was always smudged, she looked emaciated as she followed elder brother Rattan Kumar everywhere, while John Chacha (uncle) exhorted them to find dignity in poverty and suffering.

Their performances brought tears to one's eyes.

Boot Polish was Naaz's 10th or 12th film.

No one knows how she got the role.

According to her actor-husband, Subbiraj, actress Nargis once spotted Naaz doing a show and was highly impressed.

She recommended the child to Raj Kapoor, who was equally impressed and cast her in *Boot Polish*.

The rest is history.

In an interview with magazine Stardust (year unknown), the actress spoke of a rather unhappy childhood.

Naaz tried to commit suicide twice when she was merely 10 years old.

Her attempts to jump in a well were quashed by an observant ayah (nanny).

In the interview, the actress had recounted her emotional state at the time, "My ayah used to tell me stories about how people ended their lives by jumping into this well.

"So, one day when I was all alone at home, I ran to the well. Somehow, my ayah who spotted me, ran after me and brought me home. She was the only one who cared for me."

The young girl debuted on stage when she was four, and in films when she was eight.

Naaz was born into a family obsessed with showbiz.

Her father, Mirza Dawood Baig, was an unsuccessful story writer and somehow over time, Naaz became the only earning member of the family.

In the same interview, she said, "I wanted to study, but unfortunately I had no time to breathe and had to forget about school.

"I left studies, for my mother didn't stop accepting films on my behalf and my father stopped working.

"My mother was too used to making money out of me and didn't want to forgo this easy life.

"She wanted me to work for her comforts and I was both too young and in awe of my parents to refuse!"

She became the highest paid child artiste and worked in around 120 films.

But her reality was that she was being neglected by her parents who were constantly fighting with each other.

Sometimes, after coming home from the day's shoot, she would fall asleep without having dinner.

By the time she turned 12, her parents separated and Naaz had to stay with her mother, who remarried when Naaz was 16 years old.

Raj Kapoor wanted to send Naaz to a Swiss finishing school for five years, intending to launch her under his banner after she returned.

But Naaz recalled that her mother had wanted to go along with her to Switzerland too, and turned down the offer when she realised that would not be possible.

At the age of six or eight, she was taken to the studios daily where her mother coaxed producers and directors to give her a chance.

And however she got the role, it was with *Boot Polish* that she became a celebrity, even beyond Indian borders, and the first choice as child artiste.

Besides her iconic role as Belu in *Boot Polish* (1954), film buffs may remember Kumari Naaz as the younger version of Parvati in

Devdas (1955), as Raaj Kumar's younger sister Munnii in *Dil Apna Aur Preet Parai* (1960) and a young dancer in *Mujhe Jeene Do* (1963).

Like Tabassum, Daisy Irani and other famous child artistes, Naaz did not make it as a heroine.

It could be because there was no one to advise her how to pick roles.

And her mother was excessively eager to make Naaz a heroine.

She dressed her daughter in loose, grown-up garments, cake her face with heavy makeup and try and pass her off as a woman.

The play worked with some producers, but Naaz was the ultimate sufferer.

But that she was excellent as a child artiste there is no doubt.

She worked with leading directors in outstanding films.

These included Hrishikesh Mukherjee's *Musafir*, KA Abbas' *Munna* and the Nargis-Balraj Sahni starrer, *Lajwanti*.

She played the heroine in about 30 eminently forgettable films.

But her roles, in *Nadershaan* with Feroz Khan, *Lambe Haat* with Mehmod, *Rocket Girl* with Sudesh Kumar and *Gangu* with Chandrashekhar did not challenge her undoubted talent, only her drawing power.

She also starred in *Mera Ghar*

While the twosome were alone, Subbiraj applied the tikka (vermillion) signifying a married woman on her forehead and told her, "If you could follow me till here, you should marry me."

Their marriage stood the test of time.

Naaz continued to work after marriage but family came first.

She was never pushy and, in an industry known for its cut-

Naaz was a strong actress who, from a young age, not only handled emotional and comedic scenes, with ease, but also danced effortlessly in front of the camera.

However, despite all her talents, she kept playing supporting characters even in the later films of the 1970s.

Naaz had an exquisite voice and spoke beautifully.

Not many are aware that she transitioned into a second career as a dubbing artiste.

As her screen career floundered, she became a top dubbing artiste, lending her voice to all top stars, including actress Sridevi in her early Hindi hits of the 1980s.

It was a far cry from the status she enjoyed during her early years in Hindi cinema.

And then, one day, Naaz complained of stomach pain and slight difficulty in swallowing.

Sonography revealed a tumour, which had spread all over the liver.

Surgery and chemotherapy were ruled out and she tried Japanese therapy to reduce the pain.

"We did everything to make her life easy and the pain bearable," recalls Subbiraj.

"I took her to visit our guruji in Delhi. She was exhausted, but exhilarated by the trip"

On October 16, 1995, Baby Naaz began slipping.

Subbiraj, who was shooting in Jammu, rushed back to Bombay.

But she quietly drifted away in her sleep three days later, on October 19.

And though all of Bollywood did not appreciate the fact, the industry had lost a very talented artiste.

Mere Bachchay and *Dekha Pyar Tumhara* opposite Raj Kapoor's cousin, up-and-coming hero Subbiraj Kumar.

The two acted together in *Mera Ghar Mere Bachchay* (1960) and *Dekha Pyar Tumhara* (1963).

They fell in love and, after a five-year courtship, were married in 1965, despite some initial opposition from their families and the industry.

But finally, while shooting for *Dekha Pyar Tumhara*, Naaz and the other members of her family trailed Subbiraj into a temple located inside the Pratapgad fort.

throat competition, never sought favours from producers and directors.

Soon, she matured into a character actress and bagged good roles in films like *Bahu Begum*, *Kati Patang* and *Sachcha Joota* (where she played Rajesh Khanna's crippled sister).

Occasionally, Naaz did feel her talent had been ill-used by the industry.

As a result, she became more family-oriented.

**Tanzanians close FOREX shops
suspect money laundering**

NAIROBI SALAAM Tanzania (Xinhua) -- Bank of Tanzania (BOT) has move to shut down foreign exchange shops in the country's northern region after it followed suspicions on money laundering and associated illegal transactions.

BOT Governor Florens Luoga said in a statement that investigations involving various government organs are underway and that those implicated to be involved in "dirty money" will be prosecuted.

They will be charged in courts and at the same time have their licenses revoked," the central bank governor said.

Luoga said the closure of foreign exchange outlets in northern Tanzania by inspections was part of a countrywide crackdown against masterminds of syndicates behind money laundering and those operating without licenses.

He said the central bank has suspended issuance of licenses to run bureaux de change and that it would resume after new regulations that would plug loopholes for illegal money transactions are put in place.

**Kenya shilling ending streak
against the United States dollar**

NAIROBI (Xinhua) -- After a week of downward trend against the U.S. dollar and hitting a 10-month low of 103.5, the Kenyan shilling surged on Tuesday, boosted by increased inflows.

The currency traded against the dollar at an average of 102.60 on Tuesday. The surge was attributed to an increase in foreign currency inflows from the diaspora and horticulture exports.

An increase in foreign currency inflows gave the local unit some reprieve to see it end stronger," analysts at the Commercial Bank of Africa said in a brief.

However, even as the shilling gains, the bank noted that its outlook remains negative in short-term, mainly due to increased dollar demand by importers as the festive season beckons.

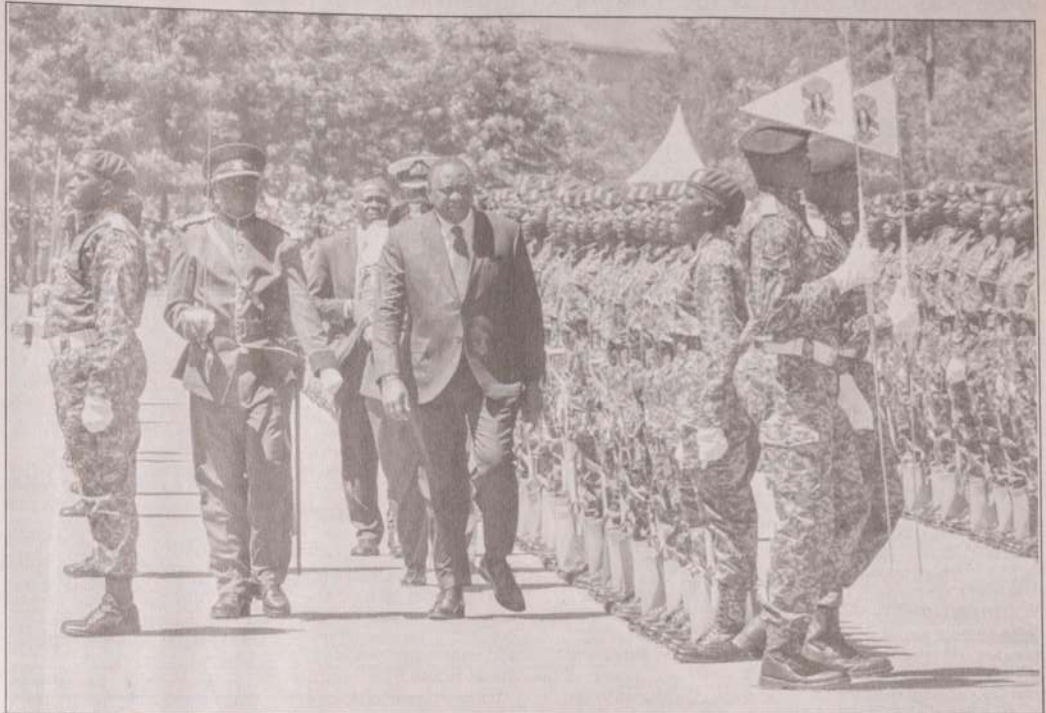
**World Bank confirms Uganda's
growth rebounds to 6.1 percent**

KAMPALA Uganda (Xinhua) -- Uganda's real gross domestic product (GDP) growth has rebounded to 6.1 percent in the 2017-18 financial year, up from the previous one's 3.9 percent, the World Bank said in an update released on Tuesday.

The bank, in its 12th Uganda Economic Update, said the recovery is stronger than the 5.5 percent that was projected in the previous Economic Update, which was released in May 2018.

The recovery is attributed to a rebound in food crop production and an unexpected and sudden pickup in private sector credit in the second half of the 2017-18 financial year, which ended on June 30.

Grasshoppers: Ugandans Gourmands Turn To Insect Delicacy

KAMPALA Uganda (Xinhua) -- It is that time of the year when Ugandans get to enjoy the nutritious insect snack locally known as Nsenene, the local name for grasshoppers, which arrive in large swarms every November-December.

In Makindye, a Kampala suburb, the night is lit up by strong lights, almost after every 100 meters.

Groups of men have set up traps for the grasshoppers which they will later sell in sacks to traders.

The traders in turn sell to vendors who clean them and supply customers in different markets around the capital Kampala.

As one moves along the city roads, men both young and old are seen carrying big buckets of the fried delicacy while calling out:

"Nsenene, these ones are fresh."

Both pedestrians and motorists stop by the roadsides to buy the snack, which is commonly sold in packs of 1.3 U.S. dollars each.

At certain locations in the city center, the sweet aroma attracts you to women frying the Nsenene in deep oil.

Arnold Makubuya, a grasshopper trapper in Kampala, said for one to get a good harvest, they need iron sheets, bulbs of about 200 watts and well cleaned empty oil drums.

"You get three strong bulbs depending on the size of your area and raise them up to about 10 meters high.

"You then spread out iron sheets vertically on built-up pieces of wood while slanting into the empty oil drums," Makubuya told Xinhua in an interview.

He said the grasshoppers are attracted by the strong light and once they get tired of flying around, they fall onto the iron sheets and slide into the drums.

"Near the traps, you must light up some pieces of wood which produce smoke that goes up and chokes the insects, forcing them to fall into the traps," Makubuya said.



Delicious 'Nsenene'

As the insects gather in the drums, the trapper pours them into sacks to prevent them from flying away.

It is these sacks that are taken to the market and sold to vendors.

Sometimes the wholesale buyers are waiting with their trucks once the sacks accumulate, they ferry them away.

George Zziwa, a wholesale dealer, said they buy a sack at about 50 dollars or even less, depending on the day's catch.

"So far they are still a little bit scarce because the season has just set in. Our colleagues from Masaka (in central Uganda) and Kabarole district (in western region) are making good cash.

"We hope to make more in December," Zziwa told Xinhua.

According to Zziwa, the dealers in western and central regions are buying a 30kg sack of grasshoppers at about 25 dollars and selling it at close to 80 dollars.

Esther Arinaitwe, who describes herself as a devoted addict of grasshoppers, said on a good day she can consume a half kilo of the snack.

"I like preparing them myself.

"After buying the fresh grasshoppers from the market, I wash them in warm water before putting on the frying pan.

I make sure the fire is not so much lest they get burnt. Grasshoppers produce their own fats so the only thing I add in there are the onions," Arinaitwe said.

The frying goes on for about 20 minutes before the snack is ready to be eaten.

Joseph Mulema, another city dweller, said he likes the

grasshoppers accompanied with a bottle of beer.

"I like eating them while sitting out with friends in the evening.

"They go well with a bottle of beer, just as you would eat

roasted ground nuts," he added.

A story is told how men had tricked women into not eating the delicacy.

It was a high-held superstition in Uganda that

women would become barren if they ever ate the grasshoppers.

But with modernity setting in both men and women alike line up for them either in markets or at roadsides.

NEW EDIBLE 'CRICKET' SPECIES DISCOVERED IN KENYAN FARMS

SHARM EL-SHEIKH, Egypt (Xinhua) — Researchers said on Wednesday that they have discovered a new edible cricket with great promise for human consumption with mass production.

This new edible cricket can be an alternative protein ingredient, said Tanga Mbi, a scientist of the International Center of Insect Physiology and Ecology (ICIPE) during the 14th meeting of Convention on Biological Diversity held in Egypt.

"There is no available scientific information of this new species now, because it is erroneously recognized as Acheta domestica, a different cricket species," Mbi explained to Xinhua, adding that they are actually named "Scapsipedus icipe" in farms across Kenya.

He said that their study focuses on the species' habitat, molecular and morphological characterization, and acoustic behavior including male's call and courtship song, current distribution in Kenya and nutritional profile.

Mbi said that the discovery is important as it will

enable the development of rearing techniques and ultimately the effective incorporation of the species as a component in food and feed.

He revealed that Scapsipedus icipe, which is commonly found around the buildings and fields, is characterized by a distinctive yellow band between the eyes.

This is different from other species within the genus Scapsipedus by a characteristic call and territorial nature of its males.

"So far, the studies have established the best rearing conditions under different temperatures for Scapsipedus icipe and we are also advancing research on the nutritional quality and safety of the insect species," Mbi noted.

Through the project, scientists are also looking at the risk factors associated with the insect-based feeds along the food chain and their mitigation strategies.

They will conduct research to support the policies for promotion of safe, sustainable and cost-effective use of insect in the feed sector in the continent.

Graffiti - A Great Feature of Matatus Is Being Replaced Gradually With Simple Caricatures

We have now had a week of the work being undertaken to normalise the matatu and boda boda service industry so let us take stock of what has been achieved in that time.

Let us also remember that the increased presence of enforcement agencies on the road meant that other areas that needed enforcement were not to be forgotten.

Normal motorists were also under scrutiny and many were caught napping in the belief that the focus would be on public service vehicles rather than on private vehicles and general road use as well.

The week has seen a large number of arrests and arraignment in court.

The numbers are in excess of eleven thousand and most have been the users of public service vehicles and normal motorists rather than the operators of the public service vehicles.

Typical offences were not using seat belts, crossing the road at the wrong place or under dangerous circumstances or conditions.

Other offences included speeding, defective vehicles and non-functioning items as well as lack of documentation such as licenses, insurances and so forth.

With this expected avalanche of cases appearing in court, the Judiciary were not left behind in their planning.

They added additional payment methods and also set up additional payment points so that once one was fined then the courts time was released for the next case as the court orderlies ensured that the fine was paid.

If not then one was brought quickly back and given the standard custodial sentence and taken away.

By adding these measures, the courts were able to handle double the number of cases that it would normally handle.

As we had said in an earlier article and on many occasions over the last decade or more, enforcing of vehicle standards

and getting compliance to the paperwork is only the tip of the iceberg in terms of improving the safety of our roads.

So far we are seeing the fourteen seater matatus with the solid yellow line draped around the middle as opposed to the dotted yellow line of before.

The graffiti that has been a great feature of matatus is being replaced gradually with simple caricatures and scenes on the bodywork of matatus.

The obvious wish in doing this was that one would be able to tell from a fair distance as to whether the vehicle approaching was a matatu and prepare themselves.

This rule was to benefit the cops and make it easier for them to do the work. Unfortunately this would make the matatus easier to spot.

The rule is being followed and almost all fourteen seater matatus have the solid yellow line around them.

However the larger thirty two seater buses which are also supposed to comply with the same rules have not yet done so and looking at them around the country, it seems that they are developing their own way of complying without having to put a solid yellow line around the belly of the bus.

They are creating a kind of "Nike swoosh" on the two sides of the bus in a colour that is certainly not yellow but some whiter shade of pale, and then writing the name of the SACCO or franchise they belong to in the middle of the swoosh.

They seem to be filling a vacuum that has been created by the responsible

agencies who have not fully defined what compliance would look like.

They need to get very granular with what compliance would look like and do it quickly so that the operators can at least have time to comply with the expectations.

If this example is anything to go by then the agencies have designed to fail as the workarounds will settle in and then the operators will have an upper hand in that they will begin to call the shots where the find gaps in the legislation or rules and the agencies will follow.

As we move to get the hardware right — and this is a very visible manifestation of the battle that the agencies have started to fight — it is important that the Cabinet Secretaries who are involve in the inter-ministerial task force to already be working out how they will enforce the softer issues on road safety and begin to design the messaging that will go with the expectation.

This is the longer part of the change journey and it has to be properly and cleverly designed so it can last the long journey and also be adaptable as the changes designed could result in unexpected outcomes.

Some of those outcomes are already visible for the shorter journey.

Let us be in it for the long haul and be adaptable to changing methods as our population reacts — sometimes in ways we would least expect.

If necessary develop easy mechanisms that encourage participation

A total record total of 2,009 patients were screened in different disciplines.

• There were 874 eye patients screened.

Out of these, 35 patients were found with cataracts. 34 patients were transported at the end of the camp to the Lions Medical Centre where they were operated on, accommodated and provided food, given medicines and later transported back to their homes with all these costs catered for by Lions Club of Mombasa Pwani.

The 35th patient is a baby who is 2 years old and will be operated later on by Dr. Gokhale.

• 900 general medical cases were seen and given treatment.

The most common ailments found were upper respiratory tract infections, anaemia, skin conditions, worm infestations, as well as malnutrition, mainly attributable to poor nutritional and hygiene status.

Few cases of peptic ulcer disease and hypertension were also identified and treated.

• 80 Dental patients were screened with 40 teeth extractions carried out.

• 78 ENT patients were screened and treated.

• 30 patients were screened for diabetes.

• 25 Ultrasound Scans were done mainly abdomino-pelvic cases and some breast/peripheral vascular scans. Lion Dr. Farooqui advised that at least 30% ultrasounds that were carried out was suggestive of cancer that needed further review.

KENYA LAUNCH SMART NEW COAST GUARD SERVICE TO ENHANCE MARITIME SECURITY

MOMBASA (Xinhua) -- Kenyan President Uhuru Kenyatta on Monday launched Coast Guard Service to help enhance the east African nation's maritime security along the coastline.

Kenyatta said the Coast Guard Service shall, in cooperation with other national security organs, safeguard the country's territorial waters against dumping of harmful wastes and pollutants, search and rescue services, and the arrest of illegal fishermen.

"For too long we have experienced multiple problems with marine security including illegal, unreported and unregulated fishing by foreign trawlers, smuggling of contraband goods, degradation of marine ecosystems through discharge of oil, toxic waste dumping and the destruction of coral reefs and coastal forests," he said.

The president who spoke in the coastal city of Mombasa said the service will help increase efficiency in protection of maritime resources.

"It will enforce security, safety, and

protection of Kenya's maritime resources," he said, noting that apart from illegal fishing, Kenya faces other security concerns such as drug and human trafficking and transshipment of illegal arms which come through the sea because of lack of proper surveillance mechanisms.

The Kenyan leader directed that all gazetted fish landing sites at the coast, in lakes Victoria and Turkana and any other lakes or rivers in the country be recovered and secured by the end of March 2019.

Kenyatta who also witnessed the offloading of 150 tonnes of various types of fish worth 30 million shillings (about 300,000 U.S. dollars) noted that the country loses 100 million dollars annually through illegal fishing.

"The Coast Guard will ensure that our ocean will no longer be used by drug and human traffickers, illegal arms dealers and illegal fishing vessels.

It will guard against exploitation of our natural resources by foreign countries and ensure that never again will a foreign vessel steal our fish," he said.

The president said the ocean is the emerging frontier for economic and social transformation of sea-facing states and reiterated that Kenya was well positioned to emulate other countries that had excelled in the utilization of maritime resources.

The Monday's launch of the coastguard service comes at a time that Kenya is preparing to host a blue economy conference slated for next week.

Tanzania Signs U.S. \$56 Million Dollars Loans Agreements To Support Development Projects

DAR ES SALAAM Tanzania (Xinhua) — The African Development Bank (AfDB) on Thursday signed three agreements amounting to 156 million U.S. dollars with the government of Tanzania to support major development projects, said a senior official.

Speaking shortly after the signing of the agreements in the commercial capital Dar es Salaam, Tanzania's Permanent Secretary in the Ministry of Finance and Planning, Dotto James, said the AfDB loans had favorable conditions.

He said out of the 156 million U.S. dollars loan, 123 million U.S. dollars were earmarked for the construction of the North-West

electricity transmission line, 13 million U.S. dollars for an initiative to prevent aflatoxins contamination in grains and 20 million U.S. dollars for the Global Agriculture and Food Security Program.

Alex Mubiru, the AfDB Country Manager, said the North-West power transmission line was intended to improve power supply in Kigoma region at lower energy production costs.

"This will relieve Tanzania Electric Supply Company of a financial burden of about 9.44 million U.S. dollars spent annually on running diesel power generators in Kigoma and Kasulu," said Mubiru.

This year, the AfDB has signed loan agreements amounting to 213.4 million U.S. dollars to support key projects in the nation.

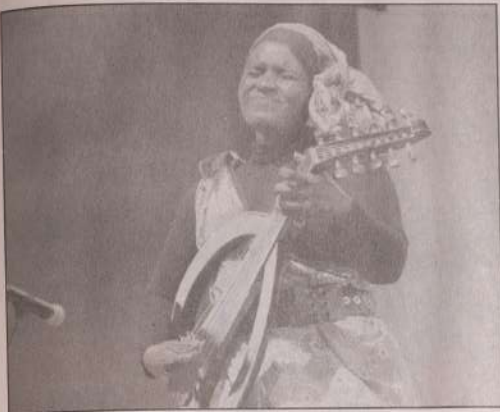

INTERNATIONAL CHILDREN'S DAY

NAIROBI (Xinhua) — Kenya marked the International Children's Day on Tuesday and reaffirmed commitment to boost access to education and social safety for children.

Amina Mohamed, cabinet secretary of the Education Ministry, said that robust policies are in place to promote universal school enrollment among children.

"We have already unveiled requisite measures to ensure every child has access to compulsory basic education," said Mohamed.

The theme of this year's International Children's Day called upon governments to ensure that all children could receive education and protection, and unlock their full potential.

Mohamed said Kenya has made targeted investments to ensure that empowerment of children is realized through life-long learning and access to critical services like health, shelter and proper nutrition.

"The government is paying particular attention to early childhood education to ensure it meets the physical and emotional needs of young ones. The ongoing curriculum reforms are geared towards boosting soft skills and cognitive abilities of children," said Mohamed.

She noted that Kenya is on the verge of achieving universal primary school enrollment thanks to abolition of tuition fees and other incentives such as free meals and text books for young learners.

The enactment of the country's children's act has strengthened protection of children against physical and emotional abuse from their parents, teachers and other caregivers, she added.

"Besides enacting a strong legislative framework, the government has partnered with key stakeholders to raise awareness on threats to child survival including sexual abuse, harmful cultural practices like early marriages and female genital cut as well as conscription into criminal gangs," said Mohamed.

The United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization (UNESCO) said in the 2019 Global Education Monitoring Report released on Tuesday that refugee school-age children in Africa are facing numerous challenges to access education.

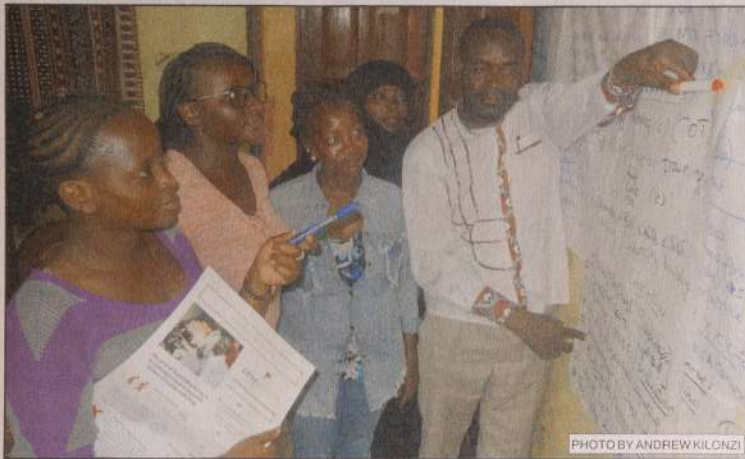

Kimanzi Upbeat Kenya Will Qualify for Under-23 Africa Nations Cup!

NAIROBI (Xinhua) — Kenya Under-23 head coach Francis Kimanzi has said his side the hard to qualify for the Olympics begins now, after they

defeated Mauritius 8-1 on aggregate.

Kimanzi, whose side beat Mauritius 3-1 on Sunday away in Port Luiz, wants his team to remain focused ahead of their next round of matches in

March, and asked Football Kenya Federation (FKF) to arrange international friendly matches for the team.

"The team now needs to play build up matches and remain focused for the task

ahead. It is a new challenge for us in age group competitions," Kimanzi said on Monday in Nairobi.

Kenya won the first-leg tie 5-0 in Nairobi to set them on their way to overall victory, but will have to wait until Wednesday to find out whether they will play Seychelles or Sudan in the second round.

That tie is finely poised after both sides played out a 1-1 draw in the Seychelles, with the return leg to take place in Sudan's capital Khartoum on Wednesday.

"Kenya has great quality but you have to build a foundation first before bringing more players into the team. For now, they have done the job and we wait for the second round," said Kimanzi.

The third round of qualifying will determine who qualifies for the 2019 Under-23 Africa Cup of Nations in Egypt, which itself acts as a qualifier for the 2020 Olympics, with the tournament's top three teams securing safe passage to Tokyo.

As hosts, Egypt's Young Pharaohs will be under pressure to qualify as one of the African representatives at the Games.

However, Kenya is also keen to ruffle feathers and break West Africa's dominance in the competition.

"After the CAF Executive Committee meeting, Egypt won the right to host the 2019 Africa Under-23 Cup of Nations, which qualifies for the Olympic Games," said a CAF statement on Monday.

Egypt replaces Zambia who pulled out after having previously been nominated to stage the competition, whose first edition took place in 2011.

Apologies to twenty golfers who had been annihilated last week in this column.

But do not start checking out the obituary pages as firstly these were basically just numbers, not any specified, named or identifiable individuals, secondly, and more importantly, the reports of their demise were highly exaggerated.

Although, and if truth be told, strictly there was not even a clear, categorical statement of their demise in the report, nor was there any intention to bump them off.

The massacre was the result

The killing field in question, thankfully only on paper and not in real life, was the field of participants in the Kenya Ports Authority Golf Day which was reported in this column as comprising 230 players, instead of the correct number 250, thereby pulling 20 players out of existence.

To make sure the error does not recur, let us get the real numbers established at the very outset for the Mayfair Insurance Golf Day, which followed the KPA competition at Nyalí Golf and Country Club, on Saturday 17th November 2018.

The number that made up the field for the day was 195, no more no less.

Once again to accommodate this large number, albeit reduced by 55 from the previous week's record number, the field was split into two sessions, starting at both tees, things had to get moving as soon as the day light permitted, the first flight taking off at 7 in the morning and the so called afternoon session actually beginning before noon.

As always, big numbers produce big scores but the number of good scores and the quality of golf that produced these big numbers for the Mayfair Insurance Golf Day was quite remarkable.

Statistics can sometimes illustrate a point better than words, so here it is, six top scores in the line up of a total of 9 main prizes were in the 40s.

Of the six, two were produced by sub par knocks of 70 gross, translating to 41 stableford points, by two of the lowest
