After a long string of hits in 1977-1978, Vinod was Amitabh Bachchan's direct competitor in the superstar sweepstakes.

He shocked filmdom and the

Nonchalantly, he determinedly embarked on a quest for spiritual fulfillment.

After all, a few years earlier, he had already worked the rare alchemy that let him manage the difficult crossover from 'villain'

Vinod Khanna, who has died aged 70, on 27th April, 2017, belonged to the second wave of Punjabi heroes who ruled Bollywood - known as "Partition Punjabi".

His family hailed from Peshawar in Pakistan and had moved to India in 1947 when the country was divided.

The heroes on screen then were all swashbuckling heroes known for their strapping good looks, cultivated on screen mannerisms and individual

He embodied all that but also brought all the panache of 1970s cinema to his acting.

A student of Mumbai's elite Sydenham College, he found acting more exciting than his family business and signed on Sunil Dutt's home production

Designed as a launch pad for Sunil's brother, Som Dutt, Man Ka Meet, ironically, made stars of its moon-faced heroine Leena Chandarvarkar and its tall and hunky anti-hero, Vinod Khanna.

Film writer Jal Arjun Singh points out that "Khanna's villainy was impressive as it combined his dashing looks with an edgy dangerous menace that made him impressive on screen. He was better at playing villain parts than the conventional Bollywood hero", says Singh.

If Dharmendra was the original 'beefcake of Bollywood' in the 1970s, the 1980s was dominated by the figure of Amitabh Bachchan's "angry young man"

The Actor Who Renounced Success

But Mr. Singh says there was a time when Bollywood watchers "predicted that Khanna was a threat to superstar Bachchan's

The two acted in a number of films together

As a villain whose handsome face hid ugly designs and deeds. Vinod was lapped up by the audience.

But few producers had the confidence to let a major film ride on his brawny shoulders.

He had to pair with starlets like Bindu (Nateeja) and Bharati (Hum Tum Aur Woh); or be the unwanted hypotenuse in many a triangular tango (Aan Milo Sajna, Ek Haseena Do Deewane) where all he was required to do was sneer and exude charisma.

As a blackguard, Vinod was most memorable playing the dacoit in Mera Gaon Mera Desh

Sporting a huge black tilak, a crumpled dhotl and bloodshot eyes, Vinod matched he-man Dharmendra shoulder to shoulder.

A section of the audience was convinced that second leads Laxmi Chhaya and Vinod Khanna had stolen the thunder in this horses-and-bullets megahit.

Not content with being a sought-after model of male

nastiness, Vinod yearned for

Debutant director Gulzar provided the much-needed breakthrough, giving Vinod the role of a soul-troubled street desperado in his *Mere Apne*

The audience enjoyed the sparring between Vinod and Shatrughan Sinha as rival street gang leaders.

Vinod capably blended toughness with sensitivity (his character was jilted by his airlfriend).

He began his transition to hero roles in right earnest.

Guizar's songless Achanak (1973) saw Vinod retain the audience's sympathy despite playing a man who murders his adulterous wife.

Vinod was still the toughle in his films but the roles were increasingly lined with romantic hues, like 1974's Imtihaan (where he successfully reprised the role played by Sidney Poiter in To Sir With Love) and Haath Ki Safaai.

The mid-1970s was a heady phase for Vinod.

He formed a thumping box-office team with Amitabh.

The two heroes delivered five huge successes together - Hera Pheri (1976), Khoon Pasina (1977), Amar Akbar Anthony (1977) Parvarish (1977) and Mugaddar Ka Sikander (1978).

The larkiness inherent in these films ensured a high entertainment quotient.

In Amar Akbar Anthony, one of Bollywood's biggest hits ever, a scene has Khanna beating Bachchan to a pulp and carting him over his shoulders.

It left many fans of the superstar

"It was inconceivable for me to imagine my hero getting beaten Even by his elder brother in the film, "writes Diptakirti Chaudhuri in a book on Bollywood.

Vinod was even pitched as Amitabh's contender for the top spot after he fuelled successes on his own steam like Raj Sippy's

Thankfully, the actor also attempted risky, offbeat roles.

Vinod won raives for his mature and complex performance as a murder suspect in Aruna Vikas' small budget sleeper success, Shaque (1976).

His lovemaking scenes with Shabana Azmi were considered bold for the times and created a

In Gulzar's Meera (1979) In Guizar's Meera (1979), Vinod brought alive the frustration of an essentially decent man unable to reconcile himself to his wife Meera's devotion to a force bigger than

Khanna was a hunk with dreamy eyes and the combination of his muscularity and good looks helped him race

the marquee in Bollywood.

Even as Main Tulsi Tere Angan Ki and Muqaddar Ka Sikander light up the marquee, Vinod found himself questioning the cossamer nature of worldly

It shored his resolve to join his guru Raineesh's ashram

Neither the runaway success of his starrer *Qurbani* (1980) nor his early 1970s marriage to Geetanjali (which ended in a divorce) stopped Vinod from setting off on a spiritual odyssey

In the early 1980s, Vinod followed Rajneesh to Oregon, where he busied himself with

The tabloids called him "Sexy Sanyasi", referring to an ascetic follower of Hinduism.

Zeenat Aman and Vinod Khanna in Qurbani (1980).

"Sure, it is easy to latch onto one thing, to be and do that all your life - but within you is a voice saying there must be something more to life. I look for that something more."

Kenya Bixa Farmers 'Optimistic Of Finding Well Paying Markets For Produce' In Chinese Market

NAIROBI (Xinhua) -- The plant with beautiful red flowers, somewhat shiny green leaves and brown pods with tiny red seeds stands out on various farms at the Coast in Kenya.

The export crop, known as sa, has been grown in the agen for years and farmers the because of its economic enefits, with some growing it of over fen acres.

Over the years, farmers have een selling their produce to rokers and to a single company in the region, which processes and exports the high-value

eminder will be dearly missed. eminder's 82 years epitoied a life very well lived. with the new market, our earnings grow," Michael Kasonga, a bixa farmer, said Monday.

Kasonga noted that the beauty of bixa farming is that if is not labour-intensive, and the crop is also pest-resistant and requires little fertilizer.

*From my five acres, I harvest up to 200,000kg of bixa annually and sell at between 0.68 dollars and 0.83 dollars a kilo, normally according to the quality of the crop," he said.

"After harvesting the seeds, "After harvesting the seeds, we keep the produce in a dark store so that it can mature. Thereafter, we remove it and winnow it to separate the seeds from the pods before delivering it to the factory," explained Kasonga, adding the crop at the Coast is called mrangi (colour).

Kasonga said he loves the crop because in the initial stages, one can intercrop it with others including vegetables and maize.

"Inormally plant it with maize or traditional vegetables, then harvest the fast-maturing crops and leave bixa. I would then prune it as it continues to produce," he said.

South Sudan Urges Investors To Tap 70 Percent Of Unexplored Oil Sector

JUBA South Sudan (Xinhua) -- South Sudan on Wednesday said 70 percent of its country's oil producing fields have remained unexplored and urged international energy companies to explore them in a bid to spur the country's economic revival.

Ezekiel Lul Gatkuoth, minister of petroleum said that despite Africa's youngest country only exploring 30 percent of its oil fields, he is optimistic that by the end of the year, the country will restore production to the level before the civil war.

"By the end of Dec. 31, 2018 we must go back to what we used to produce, which is 290,000 barrels per day before the war broke out in mid-December 2013," Gatkuoth told a three-day energy forum in Juba.

He said the government has signed exploration agreements with three international oil and service companies as part of plans to boost the production so as to actieve a win-win partnership between the government and the oil companies.

"We have been working closely with our partners to realize the resumption in block 1, 2 and 4. We really thank them for their opportunity that they are providing to the people of South Sudan," the minister said.

Gatkuoth revealed that Juba and Khartoum are working jointly to rehabilitate the Unity Power Plant in order to increase oil production as soon as possible.

Azharia Abdalla, Sudan's petroleum minister said that President Bashir's government is committed to supporting President Salva Klir's administration to expand its oil exportation to the world market.

SOUTH SUDAN AND SOUTH AFRICA SIGN ON 'OIL' DEAL

JUBA South Sudan (Xinhua) — South Sudan's petroleum ministry has signed an agreement with South Africa that will allow the Johannesburg-based state-owned oil company to invest in energy sector in Juba.

Ezekiel Lul Gatkuoth, South Sudan's petroleum minister, sald the agreement which he signed with visiting. South African counterpart Jeff Radabe, will allow the two countries to work jointly in the country's oil industry and gas to improve the economy.

"What we have signed this morning is a cooperation deal between our two national oil companies and the funding will come from the Central Energy Fund of South Africa," Gatkuoth told journalists in Juba.

Mombasa-Nairobi SGR Service Boost Kenya-China Ties

NAIROBI (Xinhua) — Chinese embassy has held an interactive session with local employees of the Standard Gauge Railway (SGR) commuter train as part of a series of activities to mark the 55th anniversary since the establishment of diplomatic ties between China and Kenya.

Li Xuhang, charge d'affaires at the Chinese Embassy in Kenya and senior executives from the Africa Star Railway Operation Company that operates the SGR passenger service, joined dozens of local employees for a bonding session to strengthen friendship and cross-

"You are not only the witness of the development of China-Kenya relations and co-operation but also the builders of our shared future," Li told local SGR workers adding that Kenyan staff accounts for 72.7 percent of all the SGR commuter service workforce.

Li said the modern commuter train dubbed Madaraka Express that operates along the 480 km Mombasa-Nairobi Standard Gauge Railway has been at the forefront of cementing China-Kenya fruitful co-operation.

"In the new era, the SGR will set an example for building a China-Africa community of shared future,"

"I believe that with the joint efforts of Chinese and Kenyan staff, the SGR will continue to be a shining landmark for China-Kenya friendship and co-

The SGR commuter train has ferried 2.12 million passengers since its launch and is credited for revolutionizing transport and commerce in Kenya.

Li Qiang, Chairman of Africa Star Railway Operation Company Limited said its localization program has focused on skills upgrade of Kenyan employees to enhance their competence.

"By professional training and skills competition, we have steadily promoted localization and rapidly nurtured groups of Kenyan SGR operation professionals," he said

"These initiatives are only the first steps in the company's efforts to integrate employees, promote localization, strengthen corporate culture and enhance company development," he added.

Vinod Khanna, who has died aged 70, on 27th April, 2017, belonged to the second wave of Punjabi heroes who ruled Bollywood - known as "Partition Punjabis".

His family halled from Peshawar in Pakistan and had moved to India in 1947 when the country was divided.

The heroes on screen then were all swashbuckling heroes known for their strapping good looks, cultivated on screen mannerisms and individual

brought all the panache of 1970s cinema to his acting.

A student of Mumbai's elite Sydenham College, he found acting more exciting than his family business and signed on Sunif Dutt's home production Man Ka Meet (1968) as his

Designed as a launch pad for Sunil's brother, Som Dutt, Man Ka Meet, Ironically, made stars of its moon-faced heroine Leena Chandarvarkar and its tall and hunky anti-hero, Vinod Khanna

Film writer Jai Arjun Singh points out that "Khanna's villainy was impressive as it combined his dashing looks with an edgy dangerous menace that made him impressive on screen. He was better at playing villain parts than the conventional Bollywood hero", says Singh.

If Dharmendra was the original "beefcake of Bollywood" in the 1970s, the 1980s was dominated by the figure of Amitabh Bachchan's "angry young man".

But Mr. Singh says there was a time when Bollywood watchers "predicted that Khanna was a threat to superstar Bachchan's popularity".

The two acted in a number of films together.

As a villain whose handsome face hid ugly designs and deeds. Vinod was lapped up by the audience.

But few producers had the confidence to let a major film ride on his brawny shoulders.

He had to pair with starlets like Bindu (Nateeja) and Bharati (Hum Tum Aur Woh); or be the unwanted hypotenuse in many a triangular tango (Aan Milo Sajna, Ek Haseena Do Deewane) where all he was required to do was sneer and

As a blackguard, Vinod was most memorable playing the dacoit in Mera Gaon Mera Desh

Sporting a huge black tilak, a crumpled dhoti and bloodshot eyes, Vinod matched he-man Dharmendra shoulder

A section of the audience was convinced that second leads Laxmi Chhaya and Vinod Khanna had stolen the thunder in this horses-and-bullets megahit.

Not content with being

Debutant director Guizar provided the much-needed breakthrough, giving Vinod the role of a soul-troubled street desperado in his *Mere Apne*

The audience enjoyed the sparring between Vinod and Shatrughan Sinha as rival street gang leaders.

Vinod capably blended toughness with sensitivity (his character was jilted by his girlfriend).

He began his transition to hero roles in right earnest.

Gulzar's songless Achanak (1973) saw Vinod retain the audience's sympathy despite playing a man who murders his adulterous wife.

Vinod was still the toughle in his films but the roles were increasingly lined with romantic hues, like 1974's *Imtihaan* (where he successfully reprised the role played by Sidney Poiter in *To Sir With Love*) and *Haath* Ki Safaai.

The mid-1970s was a heady phase for Vinod.

He formed a thumping box-office team with Amitabh.

The two heroes delivered five huge successes together - Hera Pheri (1976), Khoon Pasina (1977), Amar Akbar Anthony (1977) Parvarish (1977) and Mugaddar Ka Sikander (1978)

The larkiness inherent in these films ensured a high entertainment quotient.

In Amar Akbar Anthony, one of Bollywood's biggest hits ever, a scene has Khanna beating Bachchan to a pulp and carting him over his shoulders.

It left many fans of the superstar

"It was inconceivable for me to imagine my hero getting beaten. Even by his elder brother in the film, "writes Diptakirti Chaudhuri, Vinod was even pitched as Amitabh's contender for the top spot after he fuelled successes on his own steamlike Raj Sippy's Inkaar (1977), a slick kidnap

Thankfully, the actor also attempted risky, offbeat roles.

Vinod won raves for his mature and complex performance as a

His lovemaking scenes with Shabana Azmi were considered bold for the times and created a

In Gulzar's Meera (1979) In Guizar's Meeta (1979), Vinod brought alive the frustration of an essentially decent man unable to reconcile himself to his wife Meera's devotion to a force bigger than

Khanna was a hunk with dreamy eyes and the combination of his muscularity and good looks helped him race

He did action, thrillers, romances and, for a while, ruled the marquee in Bollywood.

Even as *Main Tulsi Tere*Angan Ki and *Muqaddar Ka*Sikander light up the marquee,
Vinod found himself questioning the gossamer nature of worldly

It shored his resolve to join his guru Rajneesh's ashram

Neither the runaway success of his starrer *Qurbani* (1980) nor his early 1970s marriage to Geetanjal (which ended in a divorce) stopped Vinod from setting off on a spiritual odyssey.

In the early 1980s, Vinod followed Rajneesh to Oregon, where he busied himself with

The tabloids called him "Sexy Sanyasi", referring to an ascetic follower of Hinduism.

"I am, I guess, a human being who does what feels right to him



at the time, does what he really wants to do," he once told a journalist who asked him whether

"Sure, it is easy to latch onto one thing, to be and do that all your life - but within you is a voice saying there must be something more to life. I look for that something more."

NAIROBI (Xinhua) -- The plant with beautiful red flowers, somewhat shiny green leaves and brown pods with tiny red seeds stands out on various farms at the Coast in Kenya.

Kasonga noted that the beauty of bixa farming is that it is not labour-intensive, and the crop is also pest-resistant and requires little fertilizer.

"From my five acres, I harvest up to 200,000kg of bixa annually and sell at between 0.68 dollars and 0.83 dollars a kilo, normally according to the quality of the crop," he said.

"After harvesting the seeds, we keep the produce in a dark store so that it can mature. Thereafter, we remove it and winnow it to separate the seeds from the pods before delivering it to the factory," explained Kasonga, adding the crop at the

Coast is called mrangi (colour).

Kasonga said he loves the crop because in the initial stages, one can intercrop it with others including vegetables and maize.

"Inormally plant it with maize or traditional vegetables, then harvest the fast-maturing crops and leave bixa. I would then prune it as it continues to produce," he said.

Azharia Abdalla, Sudan's petroleum minister said ti President Bashir's government is committed to support President Salva Klir's administration to expand its exportation to the world market.



Kenyan Fish Production Likely Remain Steady At 160,000 Metric Tons In 2018

NAIROBI (Xinhua) -- Kenya's fish production in 2018 is projected to hit 160,000 metric tons, same as last year, the industry said on Monday.

Beth Wagude, CEO of Kenya Fish Processors and Exporters Association told Xinhua in Nairobit that production will remain the same as last year due to lack of new investments in financing and expértise in the fisheries sectors.

"The bulk of the production will be from inland waters such as Lake Victoria." Wagude said during the Blue Economy Conference underway in Nairobi.

The event that runs until Wednesday was convened by Kenya and co-hosted by Canada and Japan and has attracted over 11.000 delegates from 180 countries including heads of states and government. Wagude added that due to low production, the country is a net importer of fish.

She noted that cage farming where cages are put in lakes and dams is now the fastest growing sector of the fishing industry.

The CEO said that the marine fisheries sector

remains largely untapped as the country produced 8,000 metric tons against a potential of 350,000 metric tons.

Wagude said that the intergovernmental body Indian Ocean Tuna Commission has allowed Kenya to have 72 fishing vessels along its Indian Ocean Coastline.

"However, Kenya currently only has three vessels at the Indian Oceans due to high cost of trawlers," she said.

Wagude revealed that the government has licensed a number of foreign vessels to fish on its exclusive economic zone that extends 200 nautical miles from the shoreline.

In order to expand the fishing processing industry Wagude said that Kenya has put in place a law to require that 30 percent of all fish captured in the oceans are processed locally but the law is yet to be fully operationalized.

VIBRANT AQUACULTURE WILL HELP BOOST 'FOOD SECURITY' IN AFRICA

NAIROBI (Xinhua) -- Robust aquaculture in Africa is key to alleviating hunger and malnutrition amid declining crop yield linked to climate change and shrinking arable land, a senior UN Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO) official said on Tuesday.

Manuel Barange, director of fisheries and aquaculture department at FAO, said during the inaugural Blue Economy Summit underway in Nairobi that incentivizing African small-holder farmers to engage in fish farming will boost food security and their incomes.

"Small-scale fisheries play a vital role in securing nutritious food and incomes for low income groups. It can be scaled up in Africa but there should be supportive policies and infrastructure," said Barange.

Barange noted that fisheries

and aquaculture are a critical component of the blue economy whose growth could contribute to food security and shared prosperity in Africa.

The FAO official said that aquaculture in Africa has potential for growth subject to state

The FAO official said that aquaculture in Africa has potential for growth subject to state incentives to ensure small-holder farmers have access to fingerlings, capital, storage facilities and markets. "For small-scale fisheries sector to work, governments must streamline the value chains to minimize post-harvest losses," said Barange, adding that demand for fish has gone up across Africa as communities diversify dietary habits. Barange said that FAO and partners have supported the establishment of dozens of fresh water hatcheries across the East African region that have transformed livelihood of small-holder farmers.

Jackline Uku, a researcher with Kenya Marine and Fisheries Research Institute, said that aquaculture has gained traction in Sub-Saharan African region as an alternative to food crops given its enormous nutritional and financial benefits.

'DRAGON' SEIZE TONS OF DRUGS FROM DHOW ON 'HASH HIGHWAY'



HMS 'Dragon', a Royal Navy Type 45 Destroyer, has interdicted 3048kg of hashish from a dhow acting suspiciously in the Indian Ocean, along an area known as 'The Hash Highway.' Royal Naval and Royal Marine boarding teams searched the vessel, in which they found false compartments where 148 bags of narcotics were stashed. The warship was operating as direct support to CTF150, the CMF's counter terrorism and narcotics smuggling task force, commanded by Commodore Hassan Alsharani of the Royal Saudi Navy. RSN Forces assumed command of CTF150 in August of this year and ships acting in direct support to their maritime security operations have seized over 10, 500kg of hashish in this time. Kenyans Cash in on E-Shops Black Friday Sales

NAIROBI (Xinhua) — Kenyans love to shop, and they also love bargains as they seek to make the most out of their shopping experience.

Hundreds of items are up for grabs on the e-shops currently that have joined the rest of the world in offering Black Friday

Mobile phones, TV sets, shoes, jackets, handbags, maize flour, tooth paste, margarine, cooking oil, dresses and furniture are among products that have been put on sale on the e-shops, some at more than half-prices.

And Kenyans are cashing in on the sale: that have been running since the start of the month, but whose climax is Black Friday.

Black Friday, initially done only in the U.S. but has spread across the world, is regarded as the first day of the Christmas shopping season, on which retailers make special offers.

Following chatter on social media last Thursday, Susan Mutua, an insurance sales agent in Nairobi, saw a number of citizens talking about the e-shops sales.

She visited one of the e-shops and could not believe her eyes when she saw that a 2kg packet of maize flour was going for 21 shillings (0.20 U.S. dollars), down from 0.89 dollars.

A nice dress that goes for 34 dollars was elling at 17.6 dollars.

A visit to two other e-shops revealed even sweater and irresistible deals for the agent as a phone that she had wished to have was being sold at 147 dollars, down from 215 dollars.

"I went to my phone, transferred money from my bank account into my mobile money account and did shopping worth 205 dollars. Idefinitely bought the phone, flour, margarine, juice, cooking oil, a dress for myself and shoes for son," she said.

Tens of other Kenyans have gone through a similar experience in the last few days as the e-shops namely Masoko, Jumia and Killmall offer the Black Friday deals.

Competition has toughened among the three major e-shops in the east African nation, with each striving to offer irresistible deals. "Up to 85 percent drop in prices," one e-shop announced in an online advert.

While across the world Black Friday promotion is only a day, in Kenya, the online shops sweetened deals for consumers by offering over three weeks' shopping.

"This is a shopping season I usually wait with great interest because I have benefited from the bargains. Last year, I bought my flat-screen TV during the sale and this year, I have bought a microwave and a new phone," said Vincent Matiku, a journalist in Nairobi.

Lasr Thursday, college lecturer Ernest Manuyo bought a fridge from one of the online shops in a deal that lasted only 30 minutes. "I was lucky that I opened one of the sites, saw the deal and I had money in my mobile money account. I bought the gadget and told a friend who tried but found the sale over." he said.

Black Friday in the east African nation has now become one of the biggest pre-Christmas shopping seasons.

A survey by Picodi.com in Kenya shows that 48 percent of those who took part in

it knew what Black Friday is.

The survey revealed that 30 percent of Kenyans will shop in the Black Friday sales this year, a rise from 10.5 percent in 2017.

Bernard Mwaso, a consultant with Edell IT Solution, said that among the things fuelling Black Friday sales in Kenya are booming mobile money services, widespread use of internet, adoption of smartphones, great bargains, convenience and free delivery especially in Nairobi.

"The e-shops are offering Keryans just what they want, that is shopping and bargains, at their convenience and this is what is making Black Friday popular," said

He noted that merchants are using the Black Friday sales to clear their stocks, some that may be out of season, ahead of the Christmas season, when shopping booms.

There are some 40 million internet users in Kenya and a similar number of mobile money subscribers, according to data from the Communication Authority of Kenya.



came down on the inaugural Kenya International Sports Film Festival (KISFF) at the Aspire Centre, Westlands, where, in a red carpet black-tie event, winners in 14 different categories were awarded trophies.

In this festival, that's dubbed,
'a i for Kenya and a First for
Africa", Ethiopia and Japan
claimed first blood when they
took home three trophies each.
Ethiopia's feature film, I Won't
Bear No More won Best Cinematography, Best Editor and Best African Film.

Last Hold, from Japan, won Best Director and Best Feature Film. Wrestler, also from the same country, scooped Best Animation.

Acokoro and Imara spared Kenya the blushes. The former, by Ida Waringa, won Chairman's Award, Best Kenyan Story. The latter won Best Short

Montevideo, from Serbia, won two awards; Best Production and Best Screenplay, Feature Film.

Best Short Film went to, Are You Volleyball, from Iran; Best Sound, Feature Film to, Fan of Amoory, the UAE; Best Documentary was won by, Boston, from the USA; while Baokchambab, from Cambodia scooped the Jury's Special Award

Prior to the gala event - at the Louis Leakey Auditorium - more than 20 sports films and documentaries were screened which had been submitted from different parts of the world. Plus spread out in the four days of the festival were 10 panel discussions, which tackled different sports-related issues.

Speaking during the opening of the official opening festival on 22st November, the CAS of Sports, Culture and Heritage, Hon. Hassan Noor Hassan, commended the organisers of

Also in attendance during the opening was the CEO of Kenya Film Classification Board (KFCB) Dr. Ezekiel Mutua, dignitaries members of the diplomatic corps retired and active sports persons, film practitioners and enthusiasts and KISFF's secretariat and KISFF's brand ambassadors; legendary track athletes, Rose Tata Muya and Douglas Wakiihuri.

Apart from screening of films and documentaries, panel discussions also formed a sizable portion of the festival.

Journalism forms fundamental part of sports, because - as the mirror and because – as the mirror and (sometimes) moral compass of society - the fourth estate informs, educates and entertains. The first KISFF panel was on Sports Journalism in Kenya Moderated by Karluki Thige, the panellists were veteran journalists; Sammy Lui Larry Ngala and Topi Lyambila.

The panellists called on sports journalists to have more passion and drive, and decried the "brown envelope" syndrome; which means that stories are published or killed when cash exchange hands

"There were about 848 golfers when I started writing about golf but now we have more than 10,000. The reason I've been covering golf all these years is because of the passion that I have for the sport," Ngala told the audience. Ngala has been Kenya's go-to golf journalist for the past four decades.

Thige lamented that, in the audience, there were not as many sports journalists and journalism students, who missed the golden opportunity to glean oodles of knowledge from the veteran panellists.

On the second day of the festival, there was a clear amping up of issues as this panel tackled the current medical tackled the current medical science scourge that is plaguing Kenya sports. Drugs and Doping in Sports. This panel was moderated by Dr. Pramod Shah. The panellists were Sharad Rao, Dr. Muthoni Ntonjira, Douglas Wakilhuri, Wilfred Bungei and Barnabas Korir from Athletics Kenya.

orridors of justice. In 2012, he was appointed by President Mwai Kibaki as chair of the Judges and Magistrates Vetting Board. The panel and audience concurred that there needs to be more education and sensitisation of athletes, and that doping tests should be done on other sportspersons in other disciplines, and not just limited to track athletes who are generally perceived as the "usual perceived suspects".

The second panel on day two of the festival was on Parasports and Special Olympics. It was moderated by Douglas Sidalo, and the panellists were PS in the Ministry of Sports, Josephta Mukobe, Susan Masila, Henry Wanyoike and Mathews Munenye Mugenya.

Susan is the CEO of Special Olympics Kenya, Henry is a visually-impaired marathoner and Mathews is a former paralympian and founder of an organisation that identifies and nurtures parasports talent at the grassroots.

Mathews told the audience that the first Paralympic that Kenya participated in was in Heidelberg, Germany in 1972.

"In total, in Paralympics alone, Mathews said, "Kenya has won 42 medals since that debut more than fourly years ago; 16 gold, 15 silver and 11 bronze. Internationally, Kenya ranks among the top 10 countries."

among the top 10 countries."

On her part, Susan said that Special Olympics Kenya started participating in the world games in 1983, and has never missed any world game since. In the recent Summer Games in LA, California, the team bagged 11 individual gold medals, as well as team silver and bronze medals. In total, they hauled 40. medals. In total, they hauled 40 medals just from one game.

On day three of the festival, during the panel on Kenya Sports Administration and Financial Management, eminent panellist Dr. Abbas Gullet – who is the Dr. Abbas Gullet – who is the secretary general of the Kenya Red Cross Society, and has been instrumental in turning around its fortunes - challenged

sports federations and persons who want to get into sports management to have moral and financial probity.

"Any sporting association that is interested to benchmark, let them know that my doors are open. We need to have institutions that are well-managed and well-governed, and all the other things will fall into place," Dr. Gullet said.

Lady Justice Joyce Aluoch, who was in the audience, said that she supported threw the gauntlet at the door of sports bodies, telling them that they must raise the bar on matters of

Next in line was the panel on Sports Dispute Resolution and Sports Tribunal, Moderated by Isaya Evans, the panellists were lawyers John Ohaga, Mercy Okiro, Sharad Rao and Kihara Muruthi

"One of the things I found when I joined the tribunal was that the jurisdiction was relatively limited," Ohaga noted, "But as we have gone on, we have found that more sports people are bringing their disputes before the tribunal, notwithstanding the narrow powers the act gives us.

"A court is not supposed to interfere in the decision of the sports tribunal." Mercy pointed out. "But when a court opens up its doors to litigation, it becomes a Pandora's Box such that any other decisions that are made by the tribunal can be appealed or someone can get an injunction." someone can get an injunction

The last panel of the festival was on the future role of sports in Kenya and beyond. It was moderated by media personality, Julie Gichuru. The panellists were Dr. Auma Obama, Victor Muniafu, Maxwell Muniafu, Isaac Wanjohi and Irfan Karim, who is dynasty.

"I work with young people, between the ages of 4-25 years," Dr. Auma said, "The first pillar of our work is personality development and characterbeveropment and character-building, and our role is to teach young people to be responsible and be part of the decision-making process. The facilities of Sauth Kuuin Alego, Siaya County belong to the young people."
