



Kenya's First Arterial Switch Open Heart Surgery

The MEAK heart team from the U.K. and the doctors at Kenyatta National Hospital made history on 19th of May by carrying out a rare and complicated open heart procedure on a 6-month old boy, the first operation of its kind to take place in all of East Africa.

The boy came to the MEAK clinic in Nairobi from his home in Mombasa via Tanuja Walli, who runs the Paediatric Support

The boy, who had been blue since birth, would not have survived more than a few months without surgery.

MEAK consulting cardiologist, Dr. Aaron Bell, performed the echocardiogram and discovered a very complex form of trans-position of the great artery's, with a large hole (VSD), and severe obstruction to the outlet of the

It was imperative that the boy have surgery in order to survive but the necessary procedure, an 'arterial switch', had never before been performed in Kenya and this was a particularly complex situation.

"His case was so difficult that even surgeons in a fully equipped modern environment would potentially struggle with the case.

*After discussions with the team re decided that the best option as to proceed with the arterial

switch, closure of the VSD and resection of the sub arterial obstruction", says Dr. Bell.

The child was born with his great arteries the wrong way around.

The logical treatment is to disconnect them and reconnect them the right way which is a highly intricate advanced procedure.

"It's a big technical challenge even if done in London, the fact that it was done in Kenya was a significant achieve-ment for the team and is a testament to the professional skill of all involved.

"The most rewarding aspect is that the patient can now look forward to a long and healthy life", says Mr.

Local surgeon, Dr. James Munene, who is head of cardiac surgery at Kenyatta National Hospital, was delighted to have been able to participate in this groundbreaking procedure and was first assistant on the case.

The operation took 4 hours and the patient was on bypass for a total of 130 minutes.

The child came through surgery incredibly well and is making a smooth post operative recovery.

In 2007 the youngest child ever to receive open heart surgery in Kenya was operated on by the MEAK team and local surgeons, when a 3-day old baby received a correction for pulmonary atresia and was coined 'Baby Lucky' by the local press.

MEAK,

stands for Medical and Educa-tional Aid to Kenya, is an NGO which was founded in the UK sixteen years ago by Dee and Mike Belliere.

The organisation mainly focuses their efforts on bringing in volunteer medical teams from the U.K. to carry out cardiac, the O.K. to carry our cardad, thoracic and orthopaedic surgery, as well as working with local teams to perform ophthalmic surgery in the remote areas of Kenya.

This heart trip marks the teams' 13th mission at Kenyatta Hospital and is compiled of a team of 17 doctors nurses, perfusionists and a physiotherapist from U.K.

The eight-day mission commenced on the 16th of May and completes on the 24th, by which time they anticipate completing approximately 2 dozen surgical procedures.

In total the team has screened over 2,000 children with heart problems and have completed nearly 300 operations.

MEAK will be returning to KNH in the autumn of 2009. The organisation also has chapters in Kenya and the United States.

Next Weekend: 'To Hell's Gate On A Wheelbarrow

Kenya Wildlife Service have launched a unique wheelbarrow race to raise funds for community outreach programmes in Naivasha.

The "To Hell's Gate On A Wheelbarrow" event to be held in Hell's Gate National Park on Saturday June 6, 2009 seeks to raise funds for education about the conservation of the Naivasha

The event is an open family outing that involves a team of two people, with one pushing the other in a souped-up wheelbarrow in a tricky 5-km terrain.

Speaking at the launch, Hells Gate National Park Senior Warden Nelly Palmeris said 68-square km park faces a number of challenges key among them hosting over 67,000 wild animals, of which 90 per cent live on private land outside the park.

With less than 10 per cent of these animals permanently based in the protected area, there is increased illegal game meat trade, human encroachment and loss of habitat, conflict in land use, land sub-division and fencing and human-wildlife

She added: "Hells Gate National Park is unique because at least 90 per cent of wildlife in Naivasha live on people's private land and ranches, it is vital that KWS works with the surrounding communities whose land is critical to the survival of wildlife.

She said the proceeds from the event would also be used to support alternative ways of earning a living, including bee keeping and recycling of waste

A number of corporates, including KenGen, Safaricom, Crayfish Camp, and Oserian Flowers have sponsored participants in the event.





Last week we considered that the uptake of bio fuels would be very slow.

We have a closer look at the so-called second generation bio tuels which though exciting will take even longer to come to market.

market.
This development is exciting and will certainly generate a lot of debate before we settle on what types will be considered as being carbon negative - that is that their use will positively reduce the world's inventory of green house gases.

Second-generation bio a tuel is the term used to refer to the next generation of tuels, which are not produced from plants that are part of the tood chain.

They are produced from a large base of biomass materials, including waste from urban, forestry, and agricultural sources as well as municipal solid waste.

First-generation bio fuels or agro fuels are produced from sugar-rich crops such as corn, sugar cane, and wheat.

Second generation bio fuels can be produced from the nonsucrose and non-starch parts of plants, which are often left in the field after harvesting, crushing, or milling.

FOREST BIO-MASS

These include bagasse, con stover, wheat straw, and richalls.

Other materials that can be used to produce second generation bio fuels are residual forest biomass such as cuttings, tree limbs, seeds, sawdust and bark.

The key component of these fuels is cellulose hence the term cellulosic fuels.

Second-generation fuels car also be produced from other carbon-rich waste materials such as municipal solid waste.

In this case, only the nonrecyclable and non-reusable portion of urban waste is

This waste is currently consigned to landfill.

There are three primary benefits of second-generation bio fuels.

The first benefit is that secondgeneration bio fuels reduce

greenhouse gas (GHGs) emissions by using waste materials and residues that would otherwise decompose into methane when taken to land fills.

Methane is a greenhouse gas



that is 21 times more harmful than carbon dioxide.

These bio fuels further contribute to reducing GHGs by replacing gasoline that is produced from petroleum.

Cellulosic ethanol has the potential to reduce GHGs by up to eighty per cent compared to gasoline.

The second benefit is that by diversifying our energy sources, second-generation bio fuels reduce our dependence on petroleum as our main source of energy.

The third benefit that would be difficult to sell in current day Kenya is that second-generation bio fuels reduce and ultimately eliminate the use of landfill for many waste materials by converting them into fuel for our cars.

There are two ways of producing second generation bio fuels. They can be produced by either biological technologies using enzymes or else through the use of chemical technology.

Enzyme technologies seek to recover and ferment sugars that are found in tree and plant materials.

These technologies target forest biomass, particularly less-costly forestry residues, including those produced by saw and paper mills.

The challenge of this approach is its ability to recover sugars in these so called lingo-cellulosic materials

The sugars are contained in complex plant cell structures and it is hard to break down these

lingo-cellulosic materials since nature engineered them to last-which is exactly why we use wood to build houses and other things that we want to last.

These technologies aim at recovering the sugars using engineered enzymes to break down the tree and plant material, after which it is possible process it into glucose and then ethanol.

The design and testing of these new enzymes is still at an early stage.

Current chemical technologies use heat to convert carbon-rich materials into gas.

This gas is then purified so it can be transformed into alcohols such as methanol and ethanol.

It is also possible to produce other fuels, such as synthetic diesel, synthetic gasoline as well as chemical products.

The technology currently available allows the use of mixed raw materials that may contain impurities, such as end-wastes that would otherwise be land-filled.

There are many researchers who are currently working toward developing technologies for producing relulosic ethanol on a commercial scale

None have yet arrived at the commercial production possibilities

Government mandates for renewable fuels are the main driver behind the global growth in demand for second-generation fuels.

Commercial production of second generation bio fuels is still a long way away and it is likely that Government subsidised production will be around for a long time before conversion to commercial.

There is also some work being done on genetically modifying wood and wood products so that

the lingo-cellulosic material can be easily broken down in order to simply the production processes. Other areas of intervention include using nanotechnology to redesign micro processes tat will lead to better extraction.

As it stands there is still quite a bit of work to be done before second generation bio fuels become our every day fuel but we should all come out in support of such programmes as they represent the future of fuels in this world especially with the dwindling stocks of trucks.

As Kachumbari says, green does not come cheap.

The cover material combined with a vent system ensures that no smell emanates from the toile the carbon from these additives and the hot atmosphere break down the faeces so, over a period, this human waste

After a year's use, the toilet is closed for the following year to allow for the biological reaction to be completed.

The residue is an odourless, dry coarse powder which can be returned to the earth to enrich

Every toilet is duplicated, so after the first one is shut down,

In the intervening year in the closed down toilet, the biological reaction is concluded and the waste ends up as natural

Recycling: Managing waste in a responsible way is a key issue in the whole design.

There will be a recycling shed for handling and grading of all the camp waste.

As far as possible, waste will be re-used on site and any surplus will be disposed of to responsible handlers for re-use

Aluminium cans, for example

Auminium cans, for example, are turned into attractive items by associations such as Bombalulu Disabled Peoples' Centre, and there is a women's organisation which uses waste plastic to make lovely kikapus, sunhals and other items.

Contaminated waste from the clinic will be separately treated and destroyed in an incinerator.

"As well, a central lised drinking water purifying system with several water points will do away with the need for all those plastic bottles" says Mr. Taibali.

Top Soil Protection and Soil Stabilisation: The conventional method for stabilising sloping ground is to build retaining walls

in concrete and masonny but at Miritini the 'green' concept this team is using is a special type of grass which has many unique qualities and which supports the earth equally effectively.

Vetifer grass, known as 'the living wall', has a very dense,

Vetiter grass, known as 'the living wall', has a very dense, strong and deep root network, which binds into the ground down to around three metres, preventing rilling, gullying and tunnelling. It also grows very fast so, planted as a hedge, the roots hold the soil and it becomes as good as a concrete retainingwall.

SCOUTING IN KENYA

The first scout troop was formed in Nairobi in Purnwani, in 1910. In 1925 the first Eldoret troop was registered followed by the first Kijabe (Kenton College) troop in 1926.

At this time the troops were mainly composed of Europeans and Asians. The first African troop was formed at Alliance Boys High School under the name First Kikuyu Troop in 1927.

in 1973 Kenya hosted the 24th World Scout Conference, in 1982 the Africa Regional Office of the World Scout Bureau was transferred from Accra, Ghana to Kenya.

In 1990 scouting was made available to young people without discrimination on the basis of gender. Today there are 300,000 scouts and 20,000 scout leaders in Kenya. 'Kenya was the first country in Africa to slart the Scout movement'.
