Mrs. Ngui, who is a teacher at the Aga Khan Primary School in Mombasa, has after diagnosis by Doctors at Kenyatta National Hospital and Mombasa hospitals been unanimously confirmed to be suffering from an advanced rheumatic heart disease which has damaged her aortic valve and can only be treated by repairing the valve or replacing it.

Her problem was noted in 1982 but it became acute last year after she delivered her first baby.

Mr. Nassir on launching the fund of which he is patron said the Mombasa Kanu Branch was committed to helping the heart patient but at the same time called on individuals, private companies and charitable organisations to

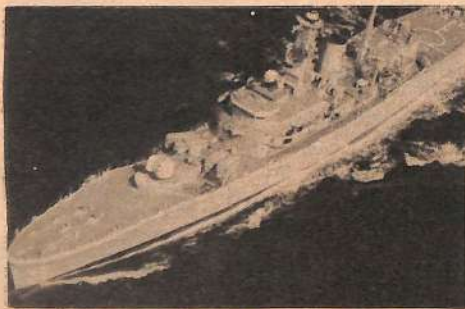
The ships are stationed in the Indian Ocean for six months and the visit to Mombasa is the half way stage in their deployment.

SUNNY 'OPEN' DAY AT DOBIE'S

MANY leading personalities in the business and tourist sector were among over five hundred visitors to D. T. Dobie's Mombasa Showroom during its first 'open day' on Saturday interested in seeing its comprehensive range of imported and locally assembled vehicles, writes Neta Peal.

Among the visitors were the Mayor of Mombasa, Coun. Ahmed Mwidani, and several councillors, also the chairman and general secretary of the Matatu Vehicle Owners' Association, as well as several from AVA interested in observing the response to vehicles they had assembled at Mombasa.

Throughout the morning the sales staff were bombarded with questions, the centre of attraction being the new Nissan Sunny Station Wagon.

D. T. Dobie recently took delivery of 160 of them.

Said Jimmy G. Mwangi, Sales Manager 'many revealed they were unaware they were now available for sale in Mombasa'. The Sunny Station Wagon, which is assembled by AVA, Miritini, was described as 'fantastic'.

It is economical to run, giving fourteen kms to one litre of petrol, and has a spacious and well appointed interior.

The paintwork was also much admired, particularly as it contains rust-proofing - a very necessary requirement at the Coast.

Refreshments were provided throughout the morning. Also a continuous Video show with four safari rallies being screened.

Great interest was shown in the Datsun 1200 Pick-Up which gives 15 kms to one litre of petrol, an added attraction being that a Nissan G L 600 generator was being offered as a prize for whoever guesses the correct number of balloons with which it is filled.

This competition continues at the Mombasa Show where the D. T. Dobie stand will be displaying a comprehensive range of vehicles.

The Nissan Cabstar was another big attraction.

It is very versatile and can be used for tourist transfers, or as a Matatu with seating for twenty-five passengers, or have a truck bodyfitted.

Optional extras include an overdrive, exhaust braking system and a wide cab.

It has proved very successful in Africa, particularly in Zimbabwe and Kenya.

D.T. Dobie have already sold quite a number to the tourist trade, mainly as airport transfer vehicles, their largest customer in that market being UTC.

The Chairman of the Matatu Vehicle Owners' Association, Mombasa, Johna Njunge, and general secretary, Mohamed

Omar Athman, said that many of their members had been planning to buy new vehicles, but had to postpone doing so because insurance premiums had more than trebled.

They were also badly hit by the cost of repairs to vehicles damaged while operating over Mombasa's pot-holed roads, as well as by the PSV Licence.

They said the association is appealing to President Moi to review the recent increases in insurance premiums 'which are killing us'.

It was pointed out that this additional cost means Matatu operators are having to work faster so as to find the additional money to pay these crippling premiums.

'GOOD SERVICE'

They were offering a cheap and frequent transport service to wananchi but were faced with mounting problems.

They praised the good service received from D.T. Dobie which includes introducing members interested in purchasing new vehicles to finance houses.

Said Mr. Mwangi, sales manager 'the response to our "Open Day" has been very encouraging. Undoubtedly, the scene-stealer was the Nissan Sunny Station Wagon, which has received some very flattering comments'.

Interest was also shown in the locally fabricated ambulances, the specialised work being undertaken by Specialised Fibreglass of Nairobi.

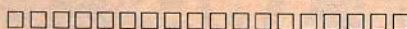
It is the main franchise holder for Mercedes Benz and Nissan. Most of its customers are tour operators and individuals.

To familiarise herself with the BALAIR operation, Scholastica visited Basle and Zurich, Switzerland.

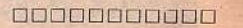
She was later appointed Assistant to UTC's Station Representative in charge of these aircraft while at Mombasa.

Fantasy Comes To The Silver Screen

FANTASY comes out tops at Mombasa cinemas this week - you can take your pick of Ghosts that go 'boop' in the night, or a little Orphan Annie of the forests, who can 'speak' to wild animals. Both offerings have much to divert one's attention from real life (which is why most of us throng to the big screen, anyway!)

Opening at the Kenya cinema this evening for a five-day run is *Sheena Queen of the Jungle* - a great attraction as it was entirely filmed on location in Kenya.

Starring lovely Tanya Roberts as 'Sheena' it is the story of a young girl orphaned in the jungle of a mythical African country.

Here she is nursed and raised by a mystical Shaman or 'witch doctor' - pleasingly portrayed by the alluring Princess Elizabeth of Toro, an elderly wise woman who teaches her several skills

including that of controlling and talking to wild animals of the jungle.

She grows up amongst the Zambuli tribe and when Shaman dies she assumes the mystery woman's role.

But, with Shaman's death, the jungle paradise is threatened when a political coup brings into power a new ruler.

And now Sheena has to fight

for her survival and that of her people.

Indeed, she mobilises lions and elephants and other beasts to protect the tribe.

FAR-FETCHED BATTLE

If you find Sheena's warfare a bit far-fetched perhaps you can sit back and spend your time identifying those familiar faces of local actors and locations in the movie. It's worth your money.

Continuing to 'sell-out' audiences at the Lotus cinema is *Ghost busters* one of the most successful films released from Hollywood this season.

It concerns a tongue-in-cheek adventure of three young U.S. scientists who attempt to corner the market on capturing ghosts.

Bill Murray, Dan Akroyd and Harold Ramis are the trio who are tempted to 'advertise' for ghosts after their university grant into 'paranormal investigation' is suddenly withdrawn.

Scientifically cynical they try to foist the myth of ghosts and spirits onto a gullible public - when the 'real' ghosts and spirits decide to show them a thing or two...

LIFE-AFTER-DEATH

You don't have to believe in life-after-death to enjoy this epic - although it does help to leave a few corners open.

Ghost Busters is not always a laugh-a-minute: the humour lies in the strictly straight-faced delivery of the lines.

The climax may send a few shivers down some spines: But this one is quite definitely different - the verdict is yours.

BRIEFS

WUNDANYI (KNA) The fight against dysentery and vomiting diseases in Mbololo location in Taita Taveta District has been intensified with more than a 100 latrines and 230 refuse pits dug this month. Water supply sources have also been protected from contamination in the project area covering about 2,900 people.

MOMBASA (KNA) — K.A.N.U. Mombasa has donated Shs. 10,000/- towards the national afforestation programme. The money was handed to the Mombasa DC Mr. Eliza Guantai by the District Branch Chairman Mr. Shariff Nassir during a leaders meeting held at the town hall.

VOI (KNA) — Game Rangers have unearthed two automatic rifles and 29 rounds of ammunition at a cattle boma near Bachuma in Voi Division of Taita-Taveta District. The rangers under the command of the Assistant Warden of the Anti-poaching Unit based at Manmani, Mr. Hiram Njoroge also arrested two poachers.

WUNDANYI (KNA) — Fifteen drums of traditional liquor have been seized by the police and over 20 people arrested when a combined squad of administration and the regular police raided several brewing dens in Mwatate Sisal Estate of Taita Taveta District.

'Men Fighting Against Devastating Prejudice'

Since those early days at Phoenix, Laurel has been appearing with a theatre company in Washington, D.C. Dr. Sloper will be played by Kenneth Mason and Morris Townsend by Rory Mooney, in James Ward's production.

From a Victorian setting to a modern drawing-room comedy is the next step at Phoenix, and on Friday the 4th October, *The Grass Is Greener* by Hugh and Margaret Williams will take the stage.

One of the most charming comedies to appear since the war, *The Grass Is Greener* is set in one of the stately homes of England, which is invaded by an American tourist.

It was a tempestuous period in both their lives, as they hurled witty insults from one to the other, with no quarter asked and none given.

ON A DAY's visit to Kilindini Harbour on Saturday was the m.v. *Levante Express* which left Naples on July 31 loaded with twelve million dollars worth of donated gifts following an appeal by the Italian Red Cross to help specific countries in Africa.

There are fifteen ports of call during her 80-day voyage around Africa. So far these have included Port Suda, Assab, Djibouti, Mogadishu and Kenya.

Gifts for Kenya, Uganda, Ruanda and Southern Sudan were offloaded at Kilindini on Saturday.

The names of the many donors, who included Fiat, Guicci & the Italian Government appeared on a banner draped across the side of the ship.

They had all responded to an appeal on radio, television and in the press to help countries in Africa, particularly those

which had been badly affected by drought.

The idea of raising and filling a ship with aid for Africa was born when the President of the Italian Red Cross, Sig-

nora Maria Pia Fanfani visited Ethiopia and Djibouti with gifts at the end of last year.

She felt such a project would also give her the opportunity of seeing for herself the conditions under which many people are present living, following last year's devastating drought, and to determine what extra help is required.

For this Red Cross 'Africa' project, the *Levante Express* was named by Signora Fanfani 'Nave Della Pace', the 'Ship of Peace'.

Her husband, Signore Amintore Fanfani, is President of the Italian Senate and one of the major figures in the leading Christian Democratic party. On five occasions he has been Prime Minister of Italy.

In a Cessna 550 Executive Jet, Signora Fanfani accompanied by an Italian TV team has been visiting each country selected for aid to present gifts for distribution by either the local Red Cross Society or Italian Missionaries.

In Kenya she spent a few days in Nairobi where she met several ministers as well as President Moi at State House, Nakuru.

On Saturday morning, accompanied by the Italian Ambassador to Kenya, Gian Luigi Valenza, she flew to Wamba, Northern Kenya, where the Consolata Sisters have a Mission. Here people are still suffering from the effects of drought.

All their cattle had died, and the Sisters were helping them to buy a few goats. There remains a great need for water there.

Early Saturday afternoon Signora Fanfani flew into Moi International Airport to be warmly welcomed by the Provincial Commissioner, Coast, Mohammed Yusuf Haji; District Commissioner, Mombasa, Elijah Guantai; Airport Manager, E.N. Nyarangi; the Procurator from the Comboni Missionaries, Nairobi, Benito Ricci; Antonio Farci from the San Marco Project, Mombasa, and Paulo Rosso, Manager, Franco-Rosso International.

In the vip lounge, Signora Fanfani signed the Visitors' Book and then in a motorcade led by a police car went direct to Kilindini Harbour to hand over gifts to Italian Missionaries in Kenya.

CAPTAIN CRISMAN

Waiting to welcome the President of the Italian Red Cross on board m.v. *Levante Express* were Captain R. Crisman, also many port officials including Philip Okundi, Managing Director, Kenya Ports Authority; Aggrey Amon, Ag. Managing Director, Kenya Cargo Handling Services; John A. Akali, Deputy Managing Director, Kenya Ports Authority.

On Saturday, 24th August the 24,200 ton Panama flag bulk carrier *Ariadne* on charter to Mediterranean Shipping Company (MSC) grounded on coral off No.3 berth in Mogadiscio Harbour.

The Murri tugs *Bison I* and *I believe Barbara* proceeded to her aid; the vessel was reported to have a heavy list and containers were slipping overboard.

MARINE CASUALTY

The vessel was due Mombasa on Wednesday to discharge 3700 tons mainly containerised cargo and early next month was due to straggle loading for the U.K. and N.W. Continent from Mombasa.

Another marine casualty which has been in port over two weeks and was towed in by the Murri tug *Barbara* is the Greek owned *Kyriaki* at 'B' anchorage with serious engine trouble affecting the vessel's crankshaft. Apparently Owners have abandoned the voyage so the question is what happens to the 12,500 tons bagged Rice she has on board for Douala, West Africa?

Perhaps this will have to be transhipped or vessel and cargo towed to its destination.

Signora Fanfani was also greeted by Fiorella Mariana, a niece of Roberto Rossellini, a famous film producer and husband of Ingrid Bergman. Fiorella is directing a documentary film about Italy's Red Cross 'Around Africa' project.

Unloaded from the *Levante Express* for Kenya were two Fiat Landrovers; one tractor; two prefabricated mobile dispensaries; two prefabricated schools complete with air conditioning and a generator to also run the refrigerator and lights; six containers packed with rice, oil, medicines, tissues, dresses, shoes, sugar, blankets, baby food, soap, agricultural implements, typewriters and sewing machines.

There were also four additional containers with rice, oil and medicines.

Some of these gifts went to the Consolata Sisters who have thirty missions in Kenya, including one at Wamba, and other gifts to Comboni Missionaries who have twenty-two missions mainly in the northern and western parts of Kenya, with about eighty sisters running schools and hospitals.

Both were delighted with this help from the Italian Red Cross.

Said Sister Anna Lucia from the Consolata Sisters, Nairobi, 'we are most grateful to all

the donors and the Italian Red Cross for these gifts which will be distributed to various missions according to their needs'.

She assured the donors that the gifts would be put to the utmost use in areas where they are most required.

Also unloaded from the 'Ship of Peace' at Kilindini were gifts for Southern Sudan which included trucks, a workshop and printing press, also foodstuffs. For Ruanda were six trucks and for Uganda blankets and tissues.

Gifts for Uganda and Ruanda were going to the Red Cross for distribution in those countries.

SIGNORA FANFANI

Signora Fanfani spent the night at Leopard Beach Hotel on the South Coast, leaving early Sunday morning with the Italian Ambassador accompanying her by air to the Uganda border.

After presenting gifts to the Red Cross in that country, Signora Fanfani flew on to Dar es Salaam to hand over gifts which had arrived on the *Levante Express* for Tanzania.

She revealed that she is already thinking of organising another 'Ship of Peace' next year bearing gifts for orphaned or abandoned children. The voyage will be 'Around Africa' again.

The *Levante Express* built in 1978 belongs to Adriatica Venice. It is a modern, fully automated Ro-Ro container ship equipped with two cranes each capable of lifting 38 tons.

Unusual Sight In Kilindini - A Self-Propelled Oil Drilling Ship

BY KIND invitation of Ken Given, Mombasa based Administrator of Western Off shore Drilling Exploration Company and the Master Captain 'Nick' Griffith, I had the opportunity of a visit and a guided tour of the U.S. flag *Western Offshore No. IX* at M.1. buoys where she has been for the last two months. This composite built vessel, one third of which was originally an oil tanker, is one of the largest, if not the largest, self propelled oil drill ship afloat.

She was built and adapted in Japan by Mitsubishi Shipbuilding Company in 1977 and has already spent much time in Venezuelan and Chinese waters.

Her drilling pylon amidships is 274 ft. high, the vessel's beam is 92 ft. and she is propelled by six turbo charged diesel electric engines driving twin screws. She has eight large anchors to keep her in position when drilling.

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SHIPPING with JOHN WALTERS

Kilindini this past week has had variable traffic figures ranging from four vessels to nine vessels at the alongside berths.

The *Bastion I* which has been at the buoys for several months now has undergone a change in her colour scheme - her hull which was grey has now been repainted black as a result her appearance has improved.

Murri Intentional who own *Bastion I* continues to have a busy time with marine casualties.

The landing craft *Citadel Mogadiscio* after her cargo lightening operation on the grounded bulker *Sea King No.1* which refloated on 16th August without apparent damage and the vessel entered Mogadiscio under her own power.

The Royal Navy are enjoying their first visit to Mombasa since May this year when the last three ship squadron was in port. Now in port on a two and a half week visit is the Type 42 class destroyer *HMS Exeter*, the Leander Class Frigate *HMS Charybdis* which last called in 1976, and thirdly the Royal Fleet Auxiliary tanker *Bayleaf (A109)*.

The ships experienced exceptionally heavy weather coming from the North which delayed the *Bayleaf* by 24 hours; she did not arrive until last Saturday morning and berthed immediately at Shimanzi Oil Jetty for bunkers before moving off to the buoys.

HMS Exeter and *HMS Charybdis* both berthed at Mbaraki Wharf and last weekend *HMS Exeter* moved off the Wharf into Kilindini No. 13 berth in order to facilitate some engine repairs and change of parts necessitating use of quayside cranes.

She has since moved back to Mbaraki on successful completion of the repairs.

Another Naval vessel our old friend and regular caller, the *USNS Wilkes*, the Naval oceanographic survey ship, has been on a short visit berthing at her usual buoy moorings.

'MERCY VOYAGE'

Last weekend on a 24 hr call was the Italian Ro Ro vessel *Levante Express* also known as the *Nave della Pace* or ship of peace which she has written across her hull.

She is on a mercy voyage sponsored by charitable organisations and the Italian Government to a number of African ports discharging Red Cross and aid cargo. She had already called at Red Sea Ports and was bound for Dar es Salaam, Nacala, Maputo thence West Africa.

We may well see the return of *Levante Express* at the end of the year in a different guise when she becomes a fleet unit of a leading liner company in the East African trade.

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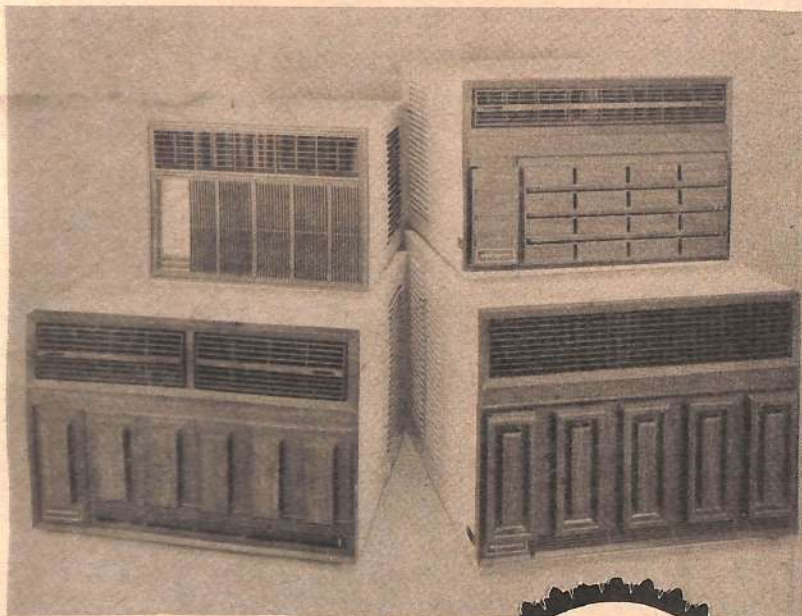


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Tour Minister Meets With The South Coast Hoteliers

DEVELOPMENTS taking place on Kenya's South Coast, and problems with which the hotel industry there is faced, were outlined to the Minister of Tourism & Wildlife, Andrew Omanga, during a dinner party at Leopard Beach Hotel, Diani, hosted by the Kenya Association of Hotelkeepers and Caterers', Coast, on Monday. It attracted a 100 per cent turnout of South Coast hoteliers. Other guests included the Senior Tourist Officer, John Maliti; District Commissioner, Kwale, Ali Sheikh, and several officers from government including the Kenya Police.

The chairman of KAHK (Coast), Joshua Mwendwa, told the Minister that Diani Beach was perhaps one of the best on the Kenya coast, and was now well known all over the world.

A lot of development had taken place in the last few years with bed capacities being increased in some existing hotels, new hotels being built, while others are in the pipeline.

He revealed that a 200-bed hotel at Msambweni would soon be completed. In addition, many self-catering units had been built at Diani, Msambweni and Shimoni.

'However, as in many other parts of the Coast, the pace of development had outstripped that of the infrastructure'.

Declared the chairman 'this trend is causing a lot of concern to hoteliers, and constitutes a threat to the industry'.

He told the Minister 'only this morning several hoteliers were complaining about only getting a trickle of water from their taps'.

RIGGEST PROBLEM

'This is one of the biggest problems we have on the South Coast'. Adding 'we are given to understand that the underground supply of water here is very good, but that a more effective system is needed to pump it out'.

Due to an uneven flow of electricity, many appliances, including air conditioners, were

this had become a very expensive exercise. Three trips to Rome cost around Shs. 9,000/-.

As many Italians made holiday bookings at short notice, they find it is impossible to obtain a visa in time so, therefore, go elsewhere.

Continued the Chairman 'we understand that visas can be obtained at the airport on arrival in Kenya. Each takes approximately fifteen minutes to issue.

'For about 400 people who may be arriving by charter during the high season this would take a whole day.'

he asked the Minister if such visas could be made easier to obtain.

On the question of security, he said that 'Diani is one of the few places where you have armed police patrolling the beach and tourist roads, he thanked the District Commissioner and his team for making this possible'.

HIGH SEASON

Said the Chairman 'Diani enjoyed a very peaceful high season, also Malindi where extra police had been stationed'. He hoped that such security arrangements may continue.

Turning to the question of water supplies for Malindi and the North Coast, the chairman said that the silting of the Sabaki River had caused a very serious problem earlier this year.

Pumps could not function and there had been no water for a week or more.

He asked the Minister if something could be done as this was not the first time for this to have occurred.

On the question of 'charters', the chairman said he had heard

that around seventeen could be coming to Mombasa during the high tourist season this year.

He told Mr. Omanga 'this was made possible with help from your Ministry'. He pointed out that 'statistics reveal we are unable to fill hotel beds at the coast without extra charters.'

Declared the chairman 'we need more charters flying to Mombasa throughout the year'.

On the question of the 'training levy', he said that some hoteliers send some of their middle-management employees to Europe for further training.

In other industries employers are compensated for such expenditure, but not in Kenya's hotel industry.

On the question of fish, the chairman said that many hotels are having problems in obtaining fresh sea food. They were using Lake Victoria fish as this was more readily available.

He said that at Shs. 20/- a kg it is very expensive to buy fish from the sea, while a lobster is Shs. 80/- a kg.

He concluded by assuring the Minister of 'maximum co-operation from hoteliers'. Said the chairman 'we will do everything possible to make your Ministry a great success'.

Addressing guests, the District Commissioner, Kwale, Ali Sheikh, described Joshua Mwendwa as a 'very effective co-ordinator of the activities of south coast hotels, to whom we refer if we have any problems concerning the hotel industry'.

He said he was very pleased with the progress being made in promotion tourism to the south coast'. Adding 'hoteliers are doing a very good job in keeping tourists happy when they are here'.

On the question of security he said 'we have done our best to see that it is effective'.

He went on to reveal that government, through the District Commissioner, is trying to establish a botanical garden in the area. Its establishment had reached an advanced stage'.

Said the District Commissioner 'we hope, with the support of hotels, that this project will succeed'.

He also announced that in January there would be an Harambee Dance to assist the disabled in the Kwale area. The Ministry of Culture & Social Services is training some in different trades. Afterwards they would need some tools.

As it was not possible to supply these to everyone with the limited funds available, he appealed to hoteliers for their assistance in making the dance a great success.

The District Commissioner told the Minister that he receives 'very good co-operation from all hotels on the south coast, and that civil servants would continue helping them as much as possible'.

In reply, the Minister thanked all those involved in the hotel industry for the efforts they make towards the development of tourism.

He said he had recently met the hotelkeepers association in Nairobi to thank them on behalf of government for what they had done during a very important period, i.e. that of the UN Women's Decade and Eucharist Conferences.

Declared the Minister 'we were able to show the world what Kenya can do'.

North Coast Operators Discuss New Ways To 'Improve' Malindi ...

IF THE Ministry of Transport and Communication does decide to extend the facilities at Malindi Airport, it is understood from official sources it will not be for large wide-bodied aircraft nor to make Malindi a 'third' international airport in Kenya.

Committee members of the Mombasa and Coast Tourist Association meeting at the Oceanic Hotel recently heard that 'depending on the availability of aircraft Kenya Airways would be using either DC9s or another similar type and size of aircraft which would need only a small extension to the existing runway'.

For some time the Association has been pressing for such an extension to be carried out.

It is also strongly felt that the buildings are in urgent need of extensive improvement to handle the number of passengers arriving and departing there. A more adequate number of seats is also required, before the next 'high' tourist season.

Unkempt buildings, broken pavements and dirty Tusk Arches (much photographed by tourists) on Mombasa Island were also discussed at this MCTA meeting.

Members wondered what action can be taken by the authorities concerned to persuade landlords to paint their properties so as to smarten up the town before the coming high tourist season.

It was reported that the Council is slowly re-carpeting many roads, and is doing what it can with its limited financial resources.

It was also felt that some attention should be given to broken pavements which, in some cases, are extremely dangerous.

The crippling increase in insurance premiums affecting all passenger carrying vehicles was discussed.

It was reported that tour operators, particularly those with large fleets of vehicles have only two courses left open to them - either to reduce their fleets or increase mileage charges which will undoubtedly lead to a reduction in business.

Members heads that the Kenya Association of Tour Operators had made representations to the Kenya Council of Ministers concerned about the devastating affect these increases will have on the tourist industry.

The Chairman, Mrs. Lorna Hayes, reported that again no licence for a charter operation from England direct to Mombasa had been granted.

CAB had approved licences for charters from Paris, Vienna, Germany and Italy. During the coming winter season more charters would be flying into Mombasa each week.

'AIR CHARTERS'

Members were puzzled as to why a charter aircraft was not being allowed from the UK where there is a big potential tourist market for Kenya.

A charter meant that many more tourists would be attracted to Kenya as a 'package holiday' is then much cheaper.

It was suggested that a 'more open door policy on only then would Kenya be able to achieve her target of one million tourists a year by 1988.

The meeting was also of the opinion that there should be a 'Left Luggage Office' at Moi ported that the original one had been closed for security reasons.

The MCTA is asking the air-

port authorities to consider re-opening such an office and that adequate security be provided.

One member said how appalled he had been at the lack of supervision on boats plying between Manda and Lamu Islands. There had been forty passengers on one designed to carry twenty with only ten life-jackets to be seen. The sea can be quite rough at times.

It was pointed out that all passenger-carrying boats should have a notice stating the maximum number it is licensed to carry.

The proposed Seminar to discuss why there continues to be many empty hotel beds along the Kenya Coast is now planned to take place towards the end of October.

Figures compiled by the Kenya Association of Hotelkeepers and Caterers show that the average bed occupancy figure at the coast during 1984 was 60.88 per cent compared to 66.63 per cent in 1981.

Said the chairman 'while the 1985 figures have gone up a little, there are still many empty beds throughout the year, yet CAB continues to turn down applications by British tour operators to bring a charter direct to Mombasa'.

TOUR SEMINAR

She went on 'there is a need for us to do something about tourism at the coast'.

'Such a seminar is necessary so that people in Nairobi are aware of what is happening here, and that several hotels are not financially sound at all'.

The Chairman reported that one north coast hotelier had counted 50 hawkers on the beach outside his hotel in one day. All were unlicensed and selling all kinds of things, while some were dealing in foreign currency.

It was suggested that a meeting of north coast hoteliers with government representatives was necessary to discuss the situation and determine how it can be controlled.

It was generally felt that there should be stiffer punishment for illegal money changers. Members were puzzled on hearing that no case had been brought before the courts for some time.

Security at Malindi was reported as 'good' with only one case occurring during the past two months. On an harambee basis Malindi has built ten houses for extra police to be stationed there to give more security to the town.

It was also suggested that a few houses be built so that extra police can be stationed at Watamu.

There was also a call for an improved service at the Likoni Ferry, with a clamp down on queue jumping and harassment by beggars.

It was suggested that some Administrative Police be stationed there. A letter to this effect is being sent to the District Commissioner, Mombasa.

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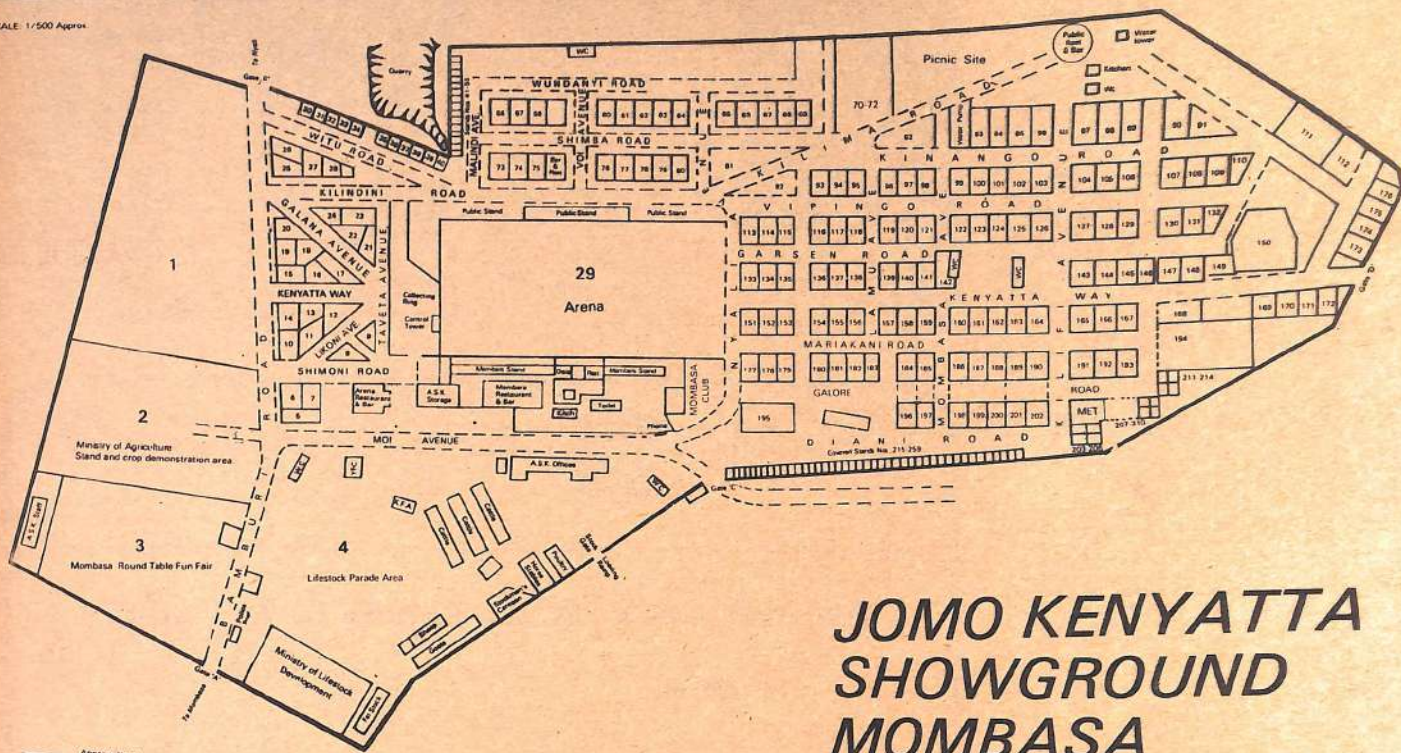
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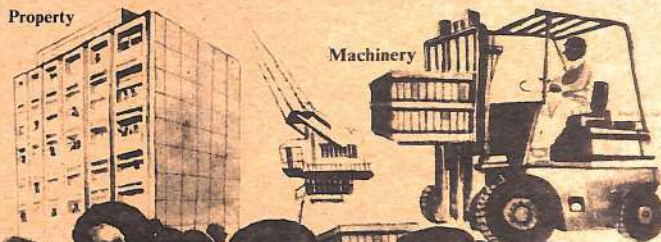

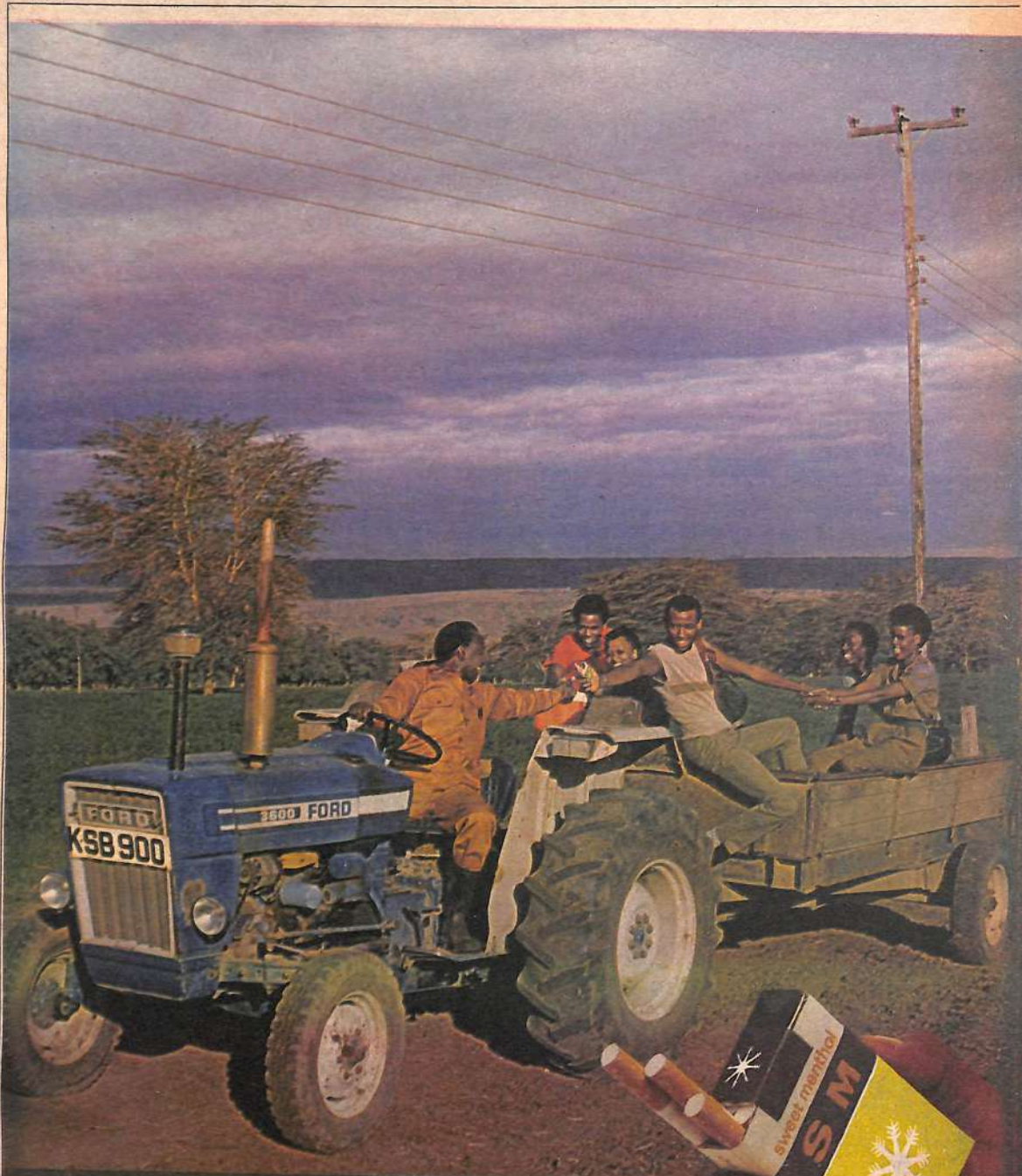

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Good Farmers Can Learn A Lot More When They Visit The Livestock Stands

AT THE MINISTRY of Agriculture and Livestock's stand at the Mombasa Show, farmers can pick up many tips on how to improve their farming techniques, and thus become wealthier.

There will be talks on every aspect of farming, as well as demonstrations on the correct way of planting and caring for crops including cotton, maize and cassava.

In an interview the Provincial Director of Agriculture, Coast, Mr. S. M. Gacheru, said that 'cotton is a good cash crop, but not enough is grown to meet demand. However, being very susceptible to disease, it does need extra care and attention'.

He explained 'at the moment we are not a big producer of cotton at the Coast. Of around 9,000 hectares, about half is grown on the Bura & Hola Schemes, Tana River, and the rest in other districts.

Its quality is among the best in the world, and there are markets for what is grown both here and overseas.

Continuing Mr. Gacheru said 'although the rains have been quite good, they are less than last year. However, this had not adversely affected crops. There had, in fact, been an increase in food crops over the past year, including maize, beans, simsim, cassava and other vegetables'.

Mr. Gacheru spoke of the big potential that exists for agriculture at the coast. There was also arable land waiting to be developed.

Said the provincial Director of Agriculture 'the Coast Province covers an area of some 800,000 sq kms. of which 60% is range land, while 30% is arable land around the Coastal Strip and Taita.

It is here that about 70% of the people live, utilising only about 20% of this land.

Around 10% remains to be developed with tree crops, i.e. cashew and coconuts, as well as bixa, fruit and vegetables. He added 'we are trying to get farmers to take more land and to balance what they grow between food and cash crops.

He also mentioned the big potential there is at the Coast for citrus, particularly now that new varieties of orange have been introduced which are sweeter and can also be used for processing.

Big Future For Citrus Exporters

There is a big future for citrus fruits both on export and local markets, as well as for processing.

Asked about the frequent glut of good quality pineapples, mangoes and citrus at Malindi, he said this comes about as they usually ripen about the same time, and because of the lack of a proper marketing organisation.

Said the Provincial Director of Agriculture 'we are trying to help the farmer by putting forward proposals concerning the organisation of marketing, which will include grading centres with a view to increasing exports and boosting up-country markets.

The possibility of establishing a processing factory at Malindi has been mooted for some time. Said the Provincial Director of Agriculture 'there has been a lot of interest, but unfortunately nothing has materialised so far'.

There had been quite a few people looking at the possibilities of starting such a factory at Malindi around which so many

mangoes, pineapples and citrus grow.

He also mentioned that with a trend away from artificial colourants in food, the market for Bixa, where there had been some decline, is now more buoyant.

He revealed that in Kwale

and Lamu there were some 5,000 hectares growing Bixa.

The Ministry was also pushing for the establishment of proper

Bixa plantations so that it can be grown on a large scale, rather than having more scattered small scale farms around. There is now an increasing demand for bixa. As far as prices to farmers are concerned, he mentioned that annually in October these are reviewed.

Declared the Provincial Director of Agriculture 'at the moment the demand for Bixa is greater than the supply'.

He also mentioned that they could be sending much more fruit abroad, including the Middle East, but they had to be graded properly.

Said the Provincial Director of Agriculture 'there is so much potential at the Coast and we are trying to help farmers to grow more, and to see that all they produce is sold'.

He also mentioned that table grapes had been found to grow well at the Coast. He revealed that research was being undertaken into the growing of grapes, as well as cherries, at the Coast.

He appealed to farmers not to miss the opportunity of visiting the Ministry's stand at the Mombasa Show where there is much to interest them.

Any car found within the Showground without authority will be towed away to Nyali Police Station from where the owner may reclaim it. It is an offence to park unauthorised vehicles in the Showground.

Please enter and leave the Showground through the right Gate and Park in the right Car Park only.

The facilities will include the press office complete with typewriters, telephone extension and VIP interview areas.

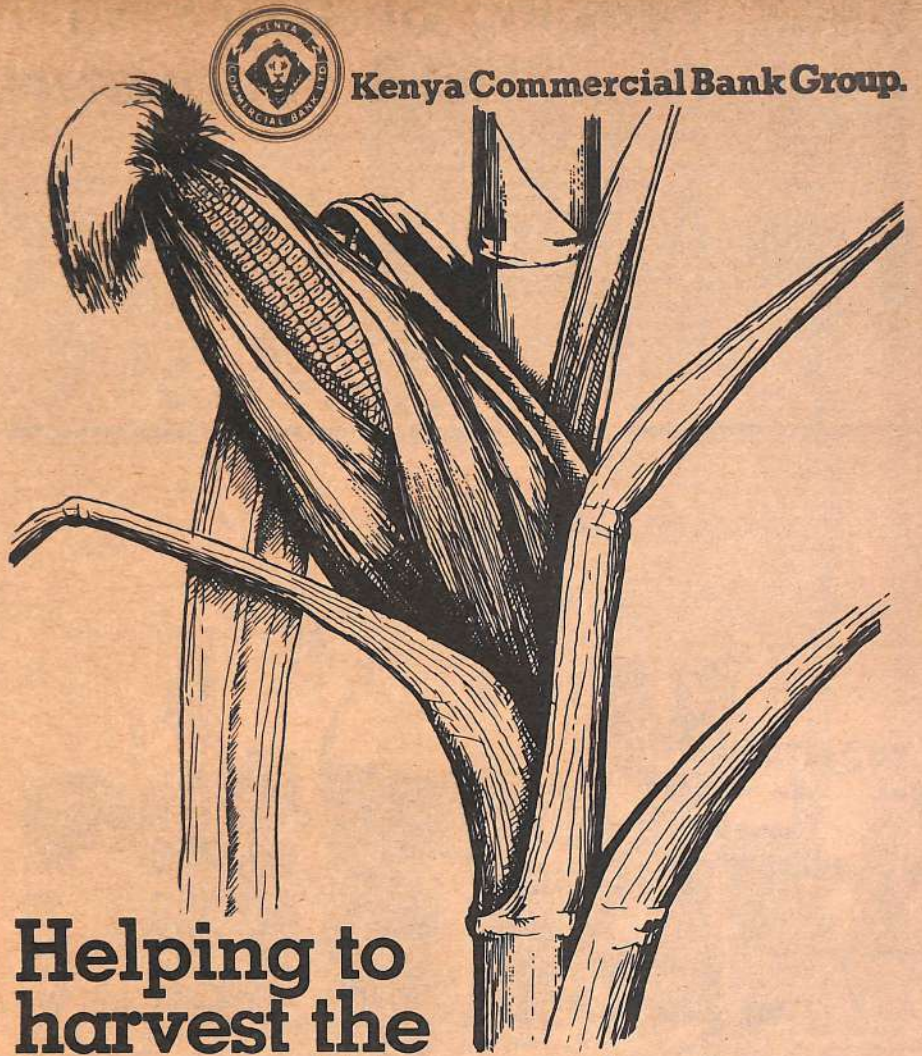
For the first time, any press officer needing to interview a prominent personality connected with the show committee or the ASK in general shall seek assistance of the committee.

The members of this committee come from the three main national newspapers and the ministry of Information and Broadcasting.

All the local bureau chiefs of the Kenya Times, the Standard and daily nation are members and apart from the show chairman himself, the rest are from the ministry.



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Coast Province covers about 83,600 Sq. Km. out of which 560 Sq. Km. is water and 83,040 Sq. Km. is land. About 5% is high potential land receiving over 980 mm of precipitation year.

Another 10% is medium potential land receiving between 735 mm to 980mm of rainfall per year. The rest is low potential land receiving less than 735mm per annum and is only suitable for ranching and irrigated agriculture.

The rainfall in most parts of the Province is poorly distributed. The soils are varied ranging from sandy deposits at the sea followed by coastal to heavy black cotton soils.

The population as per 1979 census stands at about 1.3 million (estimate for 1984 1.5 million). 70% of the population is to be found in the 30% of the land that falls within the medium and high potential zones. Popu-

lation densities in these areas are high and result in high pressure on agricultural land.

Over 60% of the total land in Coast Province is potentially range land and the land with good to marginal cropping potential occupies about 34%.

A little more than one third of the potential available range land is currently exploited for ranching operations.

Most of the cropping is confined to about 14% of the potentially arable land.

A very significant irrigation potential exists along the lower Tana River, the Sabaki and

around Lake Chala and Jipe in Taveta. Only a little of this potential has so far been exploited.

The total number of holding in the Province is estimated to be around 45,000 with average size ranging from 2 hectares in Wundanyi to 10 hectares in Kwale District. This excludes the range land farming and pastoralists.

The farming system is predominantly subsistence oriented small holder agriculture characterised by tree crop mixed with food crops and vegetables.

The large scale farming

account for less than 5% of the arable land and is either mono-culture based or mixed crop/livestock enterprise combinations.

2.0 CROP PRODUCTION

The total area under cultivated crops is currently around 250,000 hectares. Both food crops, industrial crops and horticultural crops are grown.

2.1 Food Crops

Coast Province is a food deficit area. Currently local food grain consumption and most animal products exceed local production.

In absolute terms raising food production to at least meet the minimum internal consumption needs of the population is a major challenge for the Coast Province. Some of the major food crops grown are:-

(a) Maize

Maize is widely grown in the Province both as a cash crop and food crop. The acreage under improved maize varieties (Coast Composite and Katumani) is still low averaging 20% of the total maize acreage.

However, the adoption of the improved maize is expanding. In 1984 season the area under maize was about 60,000 hectares as compared to 41,000 hectares in 1983.

It is expected that a total of 65,000 hectares will be planted this year. In 1984 the total production was estimated at 600,000 bags.

(b) Rice

Rice is grown in the lower Tana Irrigation schemes and on valley bottoms. In 1984 a total of 4,570 hectares were grown with estimated production of 4,570 bags.

All the rice produced is consumed at the farm level.

(c) Pulses

The main pulses grown in the Province include cow peas, green grams, pigeon peas and beans.

The produce is almost invariably consumed at the farm level and local markets.

(d) Cassava

Cassava as a crop is grown both as cash crop and food crop. In 1984 the area under cassava was estimated to be 13,000 hectares.

The yields are rather low averaging about 10 tons per hectare as compared to potential yield of 40 tons per hectare.

Some of the cassava is sold to Tapioca Limited at Mazerah where it is converted to starch.

During Ramadhan cassava particularly varieties locally known as Kibandameno and Kaleso are a favourite dish.

2.2 HORTICULTURAL CROPS

Coast Province is an important tropical fruit growing area especially citrus, mangoes and pineapple.

The total area under horticultural crops is estimated to be 60,000 hectares.

Marketing remains a serious constraint to increased production and development. Seasonality and perishability of the produce present special problems in marketing and largely contribute to price fluctuations and wastage.

2.3 INDUSTRIAL CROPS

The total area estimated under industrial crops is about 145,000 hectares dominated principally by coconut and cashewnut.

Others include Bixa, Cotton, Sisal, Sugarcane and Coffee.

(a) Coconut

Coconut is by tradition an important multi-purpose crop. The area under coconut is about 38,000 hectares.

It is estimated that in total the coconut industry fetches about £5 million shillings.

Currently yields are low averaging 40 nuts per tree as compared to potential yield of 150 nuts per tree per year. The low management level contribute to the low yields.

(b) Cashewnuts:

This is a leading cash crop with stable market. Currently cashewnut covers about 29,500 hectares. During 1983/84 season a total of 18,500 metric tons were sold to National Cereals and Produce Board and realised about £3.5 million shillings as compared to about £2.0 in 1983/84 season. The cashewnuts are processed at the Cashewnut

Factory at Kilifi.

(c) Cotton:

Both rainfed and irrigated cotton is grown in the Province. The irrigated cotton is grown in Hola and Bura schemes as well as Taveta and along the lower Tana River.

The total area under cotton is about 5,000 hectares out of which half is irrigated.

In 1984 a total of 4,490 tons of cotton were sold and fetched about £1.0 million shillings.

(d) Bixa:

The area under Bixa is about 3,000 hectares. In 1984/85 season the National Cereals and Produce Board bought 31,608 tons of bixa and this fetched about Kshs. 7 million to the farmers as compared to Kshs. 5.7 million in 1983.

(E) Sugar Cane:

A total of 5,860 hectares were grown in Ramisi area in 1984. Out of this 3,760 hectares were grown in the nucleus of Associated Sugar Company Limited, and the rest was grown by out-growers.

In 1984, 7296 tons of white sugar were produced.

(f) Coffee:

About 570 hectares of coffee are grown in Wundanyi Division of Taita Taveta District.

During 1983/84 season a total of 512,280 Kg. of cherry were sold and the farmers were paid Kshs. 3,090,000.00.

Under small scale coffee improvement programme which started in 1979/80 season, a total loan of Kshs. 1,904,000 has been given for the renovation of coffee factories.

3. EXTENSION SERVICES

3.1 National Extension Project (T & V)

The National Extension Project was first introduced in Taita Taveta District in 1982/83 financial year. In 1983/84 financial year Kilifi District joined the programme.

Kwale and Lamu Districts were included in the programme during the 1984/85 financial year.

Under this extension system the frontline staff who are periodically trained visit farmers on routine basis.

During the visits they teach and demonstrate to the "contact farmers" the modern technology of agricultural production.

The staff are closely supervised in the duties.

Through this system increased yields have been realised. Maize yields have increased from 10 bags to 30 bags per hectare in areas covered, by farmers who follow the technical messages disseminated during the routine field visits. These technical messages include early land preparation, weeding, planting, and timely pest control regimes.

3.2 Land Development

(a) Agricultural Mechanisation Services

There are two A.M.S. Stations in Coast Province namely Mariakani and Garsen. These stations deal with Tractor Hire Service and heavy earthworks.

Farmers are able to hire tractors for land preparation through T.H.S. For earthworks such as dams, heavy machinery are used.

The stations also provide services such as firebreak construction, survey, and land levelling.

(b) Irrigation and Drainage:

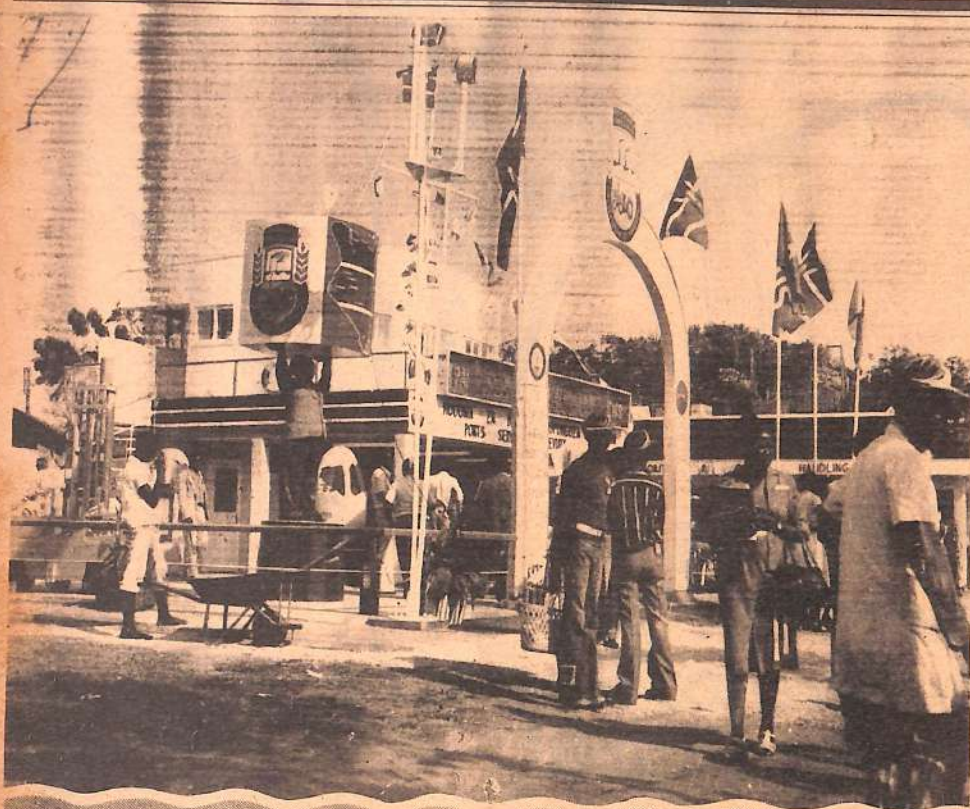
Over the last one year three small scale irrigation schemes have been rehabilitated in Taveta.

In Tana River two small scale irrigation schemes namely Mhazini and Hewani have been completed and are operational.

Plans are underway to complete three more. In these other small scale irrigation schemes have been rehabilitated through D. D. C. funds.

(c) Soil and Water Conservation:

Various projects have been embarked on in every district for this very important national

CMC heads the big drive on four wheels

Over the past decade, Kenya's motor market has changed radically. Lack of imported saloons, and the growth of local assembly, has turned the country into a nation of pick-up and four-wheel-drive specialists.

Vehicles that used to be reserved for the reserves now appear at both ends of the social spectrum. Sleepy-eyed housewives wheel their children to school in long-wheel-base safari cars, and elegantly-dressed couples arrive in four-wheel-drive at five star hotels.

Catering to Kenya's biggest

growth market, the vehicle distributors have on offer a wide range of "town and country" models, and, indeed, a new sport "quattrocross" has sprung up to mark the phenomenon. In this field, as throughout its operations, no company has been more successful than CMC (Kenya) Limited.

For a start, the company's roots lie in the ill-fated Tanganyika Groundnut Scheme, which required the importation of large numbers of Land-Rovers.

The Cooper Motor Corporation was founded to cope

with these, and has represented the marque ever since. Within a few years, East Africa became Land-Rover country, a name it has held despite the stiff competition in recent years from Japanese off-the-road vehicles.

So universal has the Land-Rover become that it is favoured by all three Governments for administrative and military use, and the travel world seems to refuse to accept the mental picture of "safari" without a Land-Rover in it.

The company has prospered by moving with the

times, an attitude highly visible in the success of the more recent horse from the same stable, the highly popular Range-Rover, and, due this year, the 110 Land-Rover.

The Range-Rover immediately found a niche in the market with its built-in ability to combine comfort and luxury with rugged off-the-road performance. CMC has recently introduced a four-door version, assembled — as are the other Land-Rover models — at Leyland's Thika plant.

The company is also con-

vinced that the latest in the range, the 110 Land-Rover, will be an instant success. It embodies the traditional Land-Rover rugged characteristics with Range-Rover speed and comfort, including a departure from the traditional Land-Rover leaf-spring suspension.

"I do not think it means the end of the old and much-loved Land-Rover," said Martin Forster, the Managing Director of CMC (Kenya) Limited, who has done so much to find markets for his range. "They have been in this country so long that every bush mechanic is familiar with them, and there are spare parts far and wide. They seem to go on for ever."

The 110 will have a public launch later this year, and provide such a radical departure from tradition that a competition version — the Land-Rover 90 — might well be seen in the rallying world.

CMC early in its history took over another franchise that has become a household name throughout the three East African countries — that of Leyland. The region's heavy transport industry, the vital link between traders in the three markets, would have been a meagre one without the rugged reliability of the pioneering Clydesdales, the Hippos and the Beavers.

As Leyland produced more and more models, CMC has placed them successfully throughout East Africa, both as goods and passenger carriers. Leyland buses for years ruled the roost as the almost-automatic choice of rural bus operators.

With the march of tarmac and the need for ruggedness has eased, and been replaced by driver and passenger comfort, and by reliability and economy of operation. CMC produced the Super Eland and the outstanding Landtrain to meet the challenges, and, indeed, the Landtrain figured recently in a major export order to Ethiopia.

Yet CMC would have found it difficult to survive in East Africa's highly-competitive motor market if it had restricted itself to the two British manufacturers. As Japanese technology advanced, its penetration into the local markets became inevitable, and CMC was quick to see its advantages.

Selecting, where possible, areas in the market which it had not covered with existing models, CMC picked the best of the Japanese vehicles to add to its range. Suzuki saloons and pick-ups; the Nissan range of trucks; the Mitsubishi L300 five-gear transporter and minibus.

The Suzuki range had an immediate impact with the small, tough and reliable SJ80. For almost the first time, the public had in its grasp a fun, 4WD vehicle that did not cost the earth, and that could double happily as a town car without a vast expenditure on petrol.

So successful and popular has it been that this year's Quattrocross Championships found the model taking not only first place but second and third positions as well.

With the quality of the marque assured by experience, CMC then introduced a large, more comfortable Suzuki, the SJ410 and called it the Sierra.

In conjunction with local glass-fibre cab manufacturers, who provided a variety of options for the public, CMC placed the Sierra high on the public's popularity poll.

It was faster, and more comfortable, than its "little brother", providing a happy compromise in price and durability between it and the Land-Rover range.

Following a similar policy, the Mombasa Show will see the introduction of an even more advanced Suzuki, the SJ413. Again, a little more power and even more expansive comfort and it follows that it will be called the Super Sierra.

It comes with a hard top and a wide and exciting list of accessories which have been offered as standard instead of optional. Perhaps most impressive to the fast-growing list of customers is the superb stereo system.

I don't know how they managed it," said Martin Forster, "but it would do credit to a professional studio. You seem to ride along on a cushion of music."

The Super Sierra, despite its luxury, has not lost its basic purpose as an off-the-road vehicle. It is strong as well as comfortable, and well qualifies for the many compliments its owners have bestowed on it.

Another exciting newcomer, this time from the Mitsubishi stable, is planned for later this year — the Mitsubishi Pajero.

This tough but luxurious addition to the East African four-wheel-drive market has three times successively won the 21-day, gruelling Paris-Dakar Rally. Because of the demand, it may well be some time before hesitating buyers see them other than as the radio-controlled models which introduced the marque in the recent Kenya Motor Show.

With typical "Africa hand" imperturbability, Martin Forster, a Kenyan, accepts the "corrugations" of the East African motor market as a challenge rather than a cause for complaint.

"You cannot fight certain factors," he believes. "You just have to make the best of them. There is usually a solution to problems if you look hard enough. Part of the answer is to scour the world for the best models for this market, and to offer the Kenya public the best that's available."

CMC's prime position in the market gives this statement the hallmark of truth.

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'Mamba Village' das Krokodildorf von Nyali

RUND UM DIE riesigen, menschenfressenden Krokodile vom Tana River, die nun friedlich im "Mamba Village" in Nyali leben und dort genau nach Plan für zahlreiche Nachwuchs sorgen, finden immer mehr gesellschaftliche Veranstaltungen statt.

Im Juli gab es eine Cocktail Party auf der Kaffee-Terrasse am beleuchteten Krokodilpfad, zu welcher viele führende Persönlichkeiten aus der Touristenindustrie an der Küste geladen waren.

Manche Krokodile staunten mit offenem Maul, als die leckeren Häppchen - Spezialitäten aus dem Mittleren Osten, hergestellt von Musa vom bekannten *Leban's Restaurant* - für die über 100 Gäste herangereicht wurden.

Bei dieser Gelegenheit wurde der neue "Night Trail" (etwa: Krokodilpfad bei Nacht) vorgestellt. Es ist ein neuer Abendausflug, organisiert vom "Mamba Village" für Touristen, die in ihren Hotels an der Nord- und Südküste abgeholt und später wieder zurückgebracht werden.

Bei der Ankunft im "Mamba Village" gibt es einen Willkommens-Drink, gefolgt von einem Videofilm über Krokodile, und um 19 Uhr findet die Fütterung der Raubtiere statt.

Dickinson, das weltbekannte Fotomodell aus Amerika, das von dem internationalen Fotografen Peter Beard in allen möglichen Posen mit den Krokodilen für Top-Magazine und Zeitschriften, einschließlich *Vogue*, aufgenommen wurde.

Er fand das "Mamba Village" die ideale Kulisse für ungewöhnliche Fotos, und Janet Dickinson

posierte nicht nur mit einem, sondern mit drei Krokodilen, die mit grimmigem Blick in die Welt schauten.

Vorher hatte Farm Manager Oded Lavi einen der Teiche mit den größten Krokodilen geleert und drei Riesenechsen, jedes etwa 5 m lang, herausgenommen. Er verarbeitete ihnen ein starkes Beruhigungsmittel, damit sich Janet ungefährdet mit ihnen fotografieren lassen konnte. Die Aufnahmen dauerten drei Stunden; die Wärter des "Mamba Village" ließen die Riesenechsen sicherheitsshalber die ganze Zeit nicht aus den Augen.

Als Peter Beard seine Arbeit beendet hatte, knipsten viele der Angestellten ein Erinnerungsfoto von ihren Kollegen mit den Krokodilen.

Zum Muttertag organisierte das "Mamba Village" ein spezielles Unterhaltungsprogramm mit Jazzmusik und Zauberkünster am Nachmittag für die ganze Familie und abends eine Modenschau.

SHLOMI RENOT

Die Idee zu diesem Krokodildorf in Mombasa stammt von Shlomi Renot, Assistant General Manager von Klal Tourist & Leisure Enterprises, Israel.

Er hat bei der Entwicklung ähnlicher Projekte in Nordamerika, Griechenland und Simbabwe mitgewirkt. Das "Mamba Village" in Mombasa betrachtet er jedoch als das gelungenste Werk wegen der wunderschön gestalteten Anlage, die in einem ausgedienten, als Schuttablageplatz benutzten Steinbruch in Nyali entstanden ist.

Die Krokodile fühlen sich offenbar im "Mamba Village" sehr wohl, denn sie haben seit der Eröffnung Ende letzten Jahres bereits an die 3000 Eier gelegt. Im Mai wurden zur

Geburt des 2500. Krokodilbabys eine Gruppe von 27 Vertretern von Kuoni Travel Ltd., England, die gerade auf Informationstour in Kenia weilten, eingeladen.

Als Geburtshelfer betätigte sich Thomas Andani, der das Ei sorgfältig öffnete, so daß das Baby herauskriechen konnte. Es wurde von Thomas gewaschen und den staunenden Zuschauern vorgestellt.

Eine Geburtshilfe ist in den meisten Fällen erforderlich, da die Eierschalen infolge der kalziumreichen Kost im "Mamba Village" zu hart sind, um von den kleinen Krokodilen allein aufgebrochen zu werden.

Zu diesem freudigen Ereignis im Mai waren auch Shlomi Renot, der Initiator, sowie Shevach Gery, der Architekt des "Mamba Village", anwesend. Die Gebäude reflektieren den lokalen afrikanischen Baustil. Um die gewünschte Höhe zu erhalten, wurden die Makutidächer jedoch nach der Art der Pagoden im Fernen Osten übereinander geschichtet, so daß man sie schon von weitem sehen kann.

Wie Kobi Kagan, General Manager des "Mamba Village", erklärte, ist die Brutzeit der Krokodile für dieses Jahr vorbei und ein weiterer Krokodilbabyboom wird erst im nächsten Jahr erwartet.

Er wies ferner darauf hin, daß am Ende des Krokodilpfades zwei Kamele gehalten werden an einem wüstenähnlichen, wunderschönen Platz, wo demnächst ein Somalizeit aufgestellt und traditioneller Somalikkaffee serviert werden soll.

Die Besucher können dort einen Kamelritt unternehmen und Bilder knipsen.

In diesem Gebiet wird in den nächsten zwei bis drei Monaten auch ein Schlangenpark entstehen. Projektberater ist James Ashe von Watamu, der 1957 als Kurator für Schlangenkunde im Nationalmuseum in Nairobi tätig war. Seit 1981 hat er

seinen eigenen Schlangenpark in Watamu mit etwa 150 Kriechtieren.

Ebenfalls geplant für nächstes Jahr ist eine riesige Voliere für Tropenvögel. "Wir verfügen über ein geeignetes Terrain von 1 1/2 Acres mit vielen schattigen Bäumen. Wir beabsichtigen, ein Netz darüber zu spannen und verschiedene Vogelarten herumfliegen zu lassen.

KROKODILFARM

Im "Mamba Village" werden nicht nur die dort gelegten Eier ausgebrütet, die Population wird ständig zusätzlich erweitert durch junge Krokodile (im Alter zwischen vier Monaten und fünf Jahren) vom Tana River.

Ab Januar nächsten Jahres soll Touristen die Gelegenheit geboten werden, beim Einfangen der Krokodile dabei zu sein. Gleichzeitig werden in einem Gebiet von 300 km entlang dem Fluß von Hola bis Kipini Forschungsarbeiten über Krokodile durchgeführt, hauptsächlich um ihre Anzahl und ihre Lebensgewohnheiten zu studieren.

Die Überlebensrate der Krokodile in der Freiheit beträgt weniger als 2%, während sie auf der Krokodilfarm 85% erreicht.

Die Riesenechsen haben erstaunlich viele Feinde; vor allem die Eier werden von Monitor-eichhosen mit Vorliebe gefressen, die ganze Nester zerstören. Diese werden auch von den Dorfbewohnern vernichtet und die jungen Tiere oft von Raubvögeln und Menschen verletzt oder getötet.



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Mombasa Show 1985 ...

ALLE JAHRE wieder wird in Nyali am letzten Wochenende im August die Mombasa Show abgehalten, dieses Jahr vom 29. August bis zum 1. September. Die rund 200 Stände an der landwirtschaftlichen Ausstellung vermitteln einen interessanten Querschnitt mit Anschauungsbeispielen durch die Agrarprodukte und die Industrie-Erzeugnisse des Landes.

Der Weg zum Ausstellungsgelände ist in der ganzen Stadt gut markiert, so daß ihn jeder interessierte Besucher leicht finden kann.

Kenia ist wie die meisten Entwicklungsländer ein Agrarland. Der Export von Kaffee und Tee (an dritter Stelle steht der Tourismus), gefolgt von anderen Farmprodukten, bringt dem Land die bedeutendsten Deviseneinnahmen.

Ausstellungsobjekte sind unter anderem landwirtschaftliche Geräte und Maschinen, Traktoren und verschiedene in Kenia zusammengebaute Autos. Zur Auflockerung der Ausstellung, die jedes Jahr von

Präsident Daniel arap Moi persönlich eröffnet wird, findet in der Arena ein abwechslungsreiches Unterhaltungsprogramm statt.

Die kenianische Armee und die Polizei geben in ihren Vorstellungen lehrreiche und komische Beispiele der Verteidigung. Von Kenya Cargo Handling Services Ltd. wird eine elektrische/elektronische Kuh vorgeführt; verschiedene Kulturgruppen und Eingeborenenstämme Afrikas erscheinen in ihren bunten Kostümen; 120 Mädchen von der "Star of the Sea School" geben eine Parade; ein Polomatch wird mit Eseln von Lamu ausgetragen und als Torhüter sind Kamele von Garissa im Einsatz.

'Marschmusik'

In einer ganzen Reihe von Freiluft-Restaurants und Bars gibt es kleinere und größere Erfrischungen.

Asma Sons Specialise In Finest Fishing Equipment

ASMA Sons is run by Asma's four sons, and here we interviewed Murtaza. The shop, along Nehru Road (Majestic end and Tel. 311215), opened 25 years ago, but in a different line.

As Murtaza told us, they dealt in hardware and other items, but the demand inclined towards fishing equipment to such an extent that they decided to specialise in this.

Nearest "Home" this week is the Kenya Fisheries Research Institute, for you pass it on your right as you go to the far gate of the showground, Murtaza and one of his brothers have recently made some gigantic nets for this organisation.

(A different kind of net, and ready for collection by a south coast customer, is one for sardines).

Every year Asma Sons supplies most of the items for the Mombasa Show Fishing competition — so you can't get away from them!!

Tackle can come in all sizes, but an extreme is the fish-hooks — from the big one to catch a shark to the minute one aimed at Tafi.

We admit we did not realise how many different things can be used to catch fish, and all are available from Asma

Sons. There are lines, rods, guns, fishing trace wire (they make any size for anyone who wants it); then fishing floats — and the opposite — weights.

Next, there are artificial baits, fishing nets, prawn nets and Seine nets, the latter for heavy commercial small fish (like Dagaa).

If you want a loose fishing knife here they are in plenty, but the one we liked was the

And twines for fishing nets are from 2 ply to 132 ply ...

There are chains too of all gauges for tying anchors.

Some people like to use fishing tackle and components as decorations, and pretty indeed these are. Asma Sons' wares can be viewed, where they are put to such use, at Bamburi Beach Hotel, Nyali Beach, Mombasa Beach and Kiliguni Lodge.

Also decorative, and mostly used for making Makame, are enormous beads. Regular customers are the girls of the Burhaniya Finishing School. Anyone wanting to make a beaded curtain quickly might like to incorporate these too.

Still decorative are the miniature dhows, some of which have "sailed" away by plane as far as Switzerland and Germany.

On the practical side, those people repairing or maintaining boats appeared to be the main customers for overall materials, like the "Count Down" of Shimoni Reef, and while we were there a gentleman from distant Pemba came in too. In fact, Asma Sons has a constant stream of customers, so can afford to be cheap — compare their prices with town centre and you will be surprised.

IMPORTED CARPETS

Fishing-related are sailcloth, as used in dhows, Kafati cotton for mending holes, and buoys.

But Asma Sons still retain one old, popular line: carpets and linoleum, the latter coming direct to Kenya and them.

For the busy person who wants to take time off and browse on a Sunday morning (as we did) there's no place like Asma Sons.

SHOPPING with ELAINE

folded, floating one, the handle being of buoyant plastic.

A Diving Set (what a nice present at K.Shs. 500/—) consists of mask, snorkel, flippers, knife and torch.

Even the bright light from a pressure lamp lures fish. And here we saw those of "Anchor" brand.

One little room off the main shop is devoted to only two items, one of which is nails. The largest are reminiscent of crucifixion nails, but are used for odd rituals in Mombasa too, though their specific purpose is for dhows.

There is a whole range of anchors. Some are in stock, as we saw, but, again, any can be made to order. Orders come from all over the country and recently a lot went to Lamu.

Customers for assorted items come from as far away as Kisumu, but recently The Tana and Athi River Development Authority has taken a lot of equipment for its experimental work.

We saw one man who had come to stock his Kilifi shop, but Asma Sons is actually a retailer, so Murtaza stressed.

"As long as a piece of string" goes the saying, but at Asma Sons this applies to ropes too — and ropes there are made of nylon, sisal, coconut or manilla.

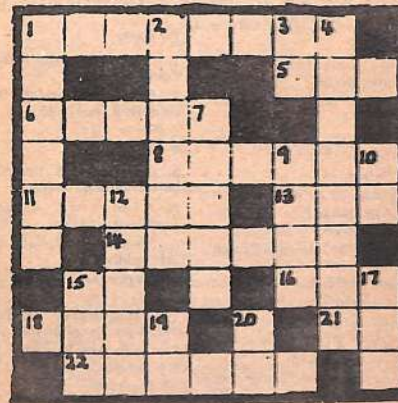

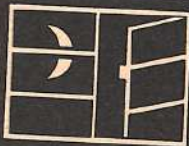

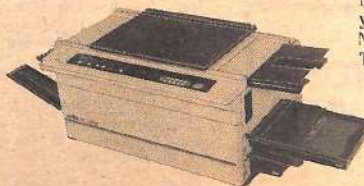
