**CHILDREN KILLED AND INJURED IN ZANZIBAR 'FUN-FAIR' HORROR**

Dar es Salaam:

The Spice Islands of Zanzibar have been confronted with a double tragedy when 13 people were killed and several injured, maimed or disabled in two separate accidents, both of which could have been averted.

In the second accident which took place during the Idd-ul-Fitr celebrations seven children were killed on the spot at the Uhuru Recreation ground when the miniature electric toy train caught on fire after being derailed.

A further 30 other children were injured some seriously as a result of the blaze and a stampede that followed.

The accident is understood to have been caused by some children who crossed the track and one was hit by the train when it went off the rails and caught fire.

There were about 10,000 people waiting on the grounds mostly to see the trains before the accident.

Treatment of the injured at the 11 Lenin hospital was unusually slow because there was a further delay when the ambulance taking the injured was involved in a traffic accident.

The Uhuru Recreational Centre in Zanzibar and a similar one in Pemba were visited by the Japanese after the revolution.

They are open on weekends and public holidays and virtually all the sets including miniature cars and cars are run on electricity.

When the Island's foreign exchange "coffers" were very low, imported children's goods - mainly from Britain - were available at the shops in the centre.

The earlier incident resulted in the deaths of 13 children.

COAST FARMERS SHOULD IMPROVE CROP HUSBANDARY AND LEARN ...

# How To 'Double Your Money ...'

**NEW WEALTH FROM CASSAVA, CASHEW NUTS, COCO-NUTS, HYBRID MAIZE, CITRUS AND 'COCOA'**

A tremendous potential exists for farmers at the coast, and many more could become wealthier if only they would adopt more "with it" farming methods instead of continuing in the old ways, writes Neta Peal.

Considerable assistance from government is available, while demand for many cash crops both by local and export markets is much greater than the supply.

Much more land could be cultivated in the coast province if only farmers would wake up to the tremendous opportunities that await them.

It is understood that the province covers an area of about 83,000 sq kms, of which only about 4,200 sq kms are under cultivation. A further 9,000 sq kms are suitable for cultivation.

This means that only about 20 per cent of available arable land is presently under cultivation in the coast province.

Under an Integrated Agricultural Development Project (Phase 2) farmers in the province can obtain credit in terms of inputs for growing both cash and food crops, seeds and seedlings of improved varieties giving much higher yields are available.

Unknown to many is that the Ministry of Agriculture has a Coast Agricultural Research Station at Mtwapa, Kilifi,

offering "free" advice to farmers. There is also a standing invitation by Christopher Warui, who is in charge, for farmers to drop in at any time to discuss farming, pests and management problems.

Annually, they hold a Field Day so that farmers can see for themselves the results of experiments being carried out - all to give them higher yields and greater profitability.

In an interview, Christopher Warui said: "Unfortunately, many farmers are not yet aware of the potential that exists, and are still using traditional methods and varieties for growing crops, particularly for food."

Yields could be doubled if only they would use recommended varieties and methods

of cultivating their plots.

One example is maize. Most farmers are not planting in lines and continue using local varieties with poor yields of only between 8-10 bags per hectare. By using Coast Composite, and growing it in the recommended manner their yields would double.

**Recommended Seeds**  
Seeds are readily available from the Kenya Farmers' Association (Co-operative) Ltd., while offices of the Ministry of Agriculture, or its extension staff, will be glad to advise on the best way to grow it.

The research station has also experimented with the inter-

cropping of cow peas with maize. It found that if you plant two rows of cow peas between a row of maize that a substantial yield from both can be obtained.

A big bonanza for farmers is that the research station is offering 'free of charge' to farmers, two varieties of cassava which are disease free.

There is a tremendous market for cotton both here and overseas. The research station finds that with proper pest control, yields of between 900 to 1,000 kgs per hectare can be achieved, compared to what local farmers have been

## HUGE AMERICAN AID PACKAGE FOR AFRICA

KENYA is among one of the major recipients of United States integrated foreign assistance budget programme for Africa, the US Deputy Assistant Secretary of State for

African Affairs Mr. Frank Wisner has said in Washington D.C.

Mr. Wisner was speaking to a group of African journalists visiting the United States when he met them on Thursday at the US State Department in Washington D.C.

"Kenya continues to be among the strongest friend of the West in sub Sahara Africa and one of our most consistent allies," he said.

According to the State Department statistics the US current administration has budgeted for 1,083 million dollars towards its aid package to Africa during the fiscal year 1983.

Other African countries which stand to benefit from this aid programme include Liberia, Somalia, Zimbabwe, Zambia, Zaire, Botswana, Senegal, Niger and Sudan.

Kenya will receive about 64.5 million dollars for various programmes which the United States government is funding in the country.

Mr. Wisner said that the present American administration has been pursuing an active policy towards Africa in order to meet the various needs and offer solutions to numerous

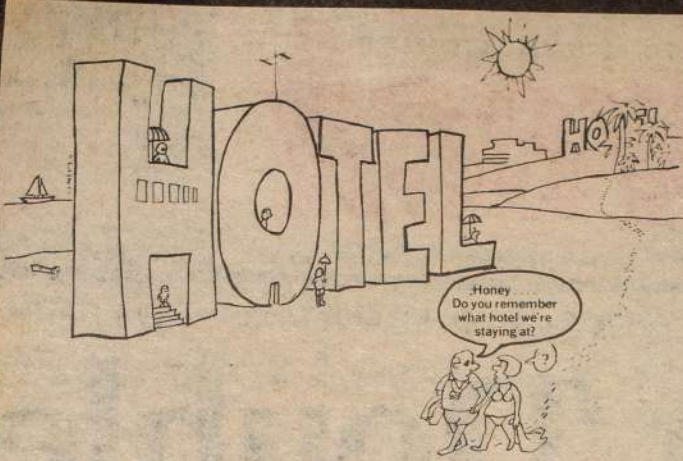

problems now confronting the African continent. "We are encouraged by growing awareness among African countries that an improved economic policy climate combined with increased trade and investment from our part is the real key to economic growth in the continent."

He expressed hope that a negotiated solution to the dangerous conflicts of southern Africa will soon be achieved in conformity to the wishes of the parties concerned.

Answering a question Wisner denied that the US foreign policy towards Africa was shifting from the development field to the military field.

"The US has no ambition to become the major supplier in Africa. We seek to be a reliable partner, sympathetic and helpful to Africa and its peoples."

Mr. Wisner added that the US economic programmes are meant to encourage and support the self help efforts of African countries and are designed to complement the much larger resources provided by multilateral institutions as well as the economic stabilization programmes of the International Monetary Fund.

"It is our judgement that economic policy-making in a number of African countries is at a watershed and is in balance rests our shared hopes for a brighter economic future and our interest in the growing participation in African development," he concluded.

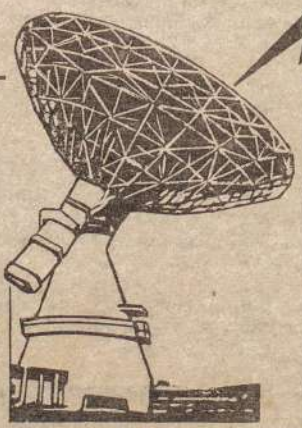

getting of between 300-500 kgs per hectare.

Seeds are available from the Cotton and Seed Marketing Board. The research station is only too happy to advise farmers on what to spray on the cotton crop to keep pests at bay.

There is also a good potential for grape growing at the Coast. Several individuals have successfully established vineyards. At Taita, the Research Station has carried out experiments on suitable varieties to grow in the province, and four are now being recommended. As a consequence, planting material is available to farmers at, or through, the Research Station at Thika.

The Mtwapa research station is also carrying out experiments on growing cocoa on the Kenya Coast, which has proved to be a very good cash crop in West Africa. The experiment started last year with the introduction of a variety of cocoa trees to observe the growing process. Said Mr. Warui "they are doing well, and we are very hopeful."

These experiments with cocoa are being carried out at the Matuga Research Station as well.

There is also a big demand for more cashew nuts by both local and export markets.

Explained Mr. Warui "the problem is that many trees only give a low yield. The research station has been conducting experiments and have already selected some high yielding

trees which give up to 20 kgs per tree annually. This compares to an average yield of 5 kgs of cashewnuts per tree.

These high yielding trees have been placed in an orchard at the research station, the seeds from which are now available to farmers.

## Demonstration Plot

Demonstration plots of "well managed cashew nut orchards" have also been established various parts of the province to show what can be achieved.

The research station has also a complex where jersey cows

are grazed under shady cashew nut trees, with the result that yields of both milk and nut have increased.

Those interested in growing coconuts will be happy to hear that seedlings of high yields palm trees can be obtained for only Shs 3 each from the Mtwapa Research Station.

Said Mr. Warui "with good management it is possible to double the yield of nuts. While the average harvest is around 30 per tree a year, a high yielding tree produces up to 60 nuts annually.

The main problem concerning palm trees is one of management. Many leave orchards unattended, yet by using manure and controlling the rhinoceros beetle, yields can be improved.

The availability of good planting material has been the main snag in growing more citrus at the coast, it seems.

Here Mr. Warui mentioned that the research station's nursery is offering citrus grafted seedlings to interested farmers. There are two recommended varieties of sweet orange — the Washington Naval and Valencia Late. These grow particularly well on the south coast due to the rainfall being much higher. A seedling costs only Shs. 5, which is a very good buy.

Experiments have also been carried out on mangoes and they can now recommend three varieties for growing in the coast province. These are the Ngowe, Boribo and Apple. Seedlings are available from

nurseries attached to research stations at Mtwapa and Matuga

They also offer "free" plant protection advice covering pests and diseases in citrus and mangoes.

It is at Lamu and Malindi where most mangoes are grown and the research station has a nursery at Mpekoni, Lamu, where seedlings can be obtained for not only mango, but coconut and citrus trees.

The Mtwapa research station also keeps a herd of grade Jersey cows, the milk yield from which is much higher than from the local variety.

They sometimes have some available for sale to farmers, and those interested should apply through their District Agricultural Offices.

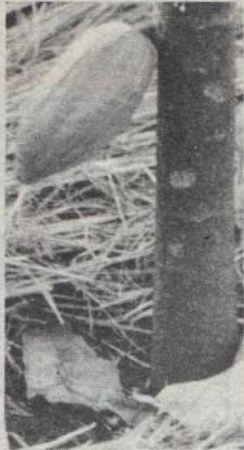
The Mtwapa Research Station which covers 600 acres was established in 1958 and is staffed by 20 research officers and 100 employees. A Ministry of Agriculture farm training centre is based there which offers training to farmers and extension workers.

It has sub-stations at Malindi and Lamu, while some of its experimental plots are at Taita/Taveta and Ngao.

## Richer Harvests

Christopher Warui holds a BSc Degree in Agriculture obtained at Makerere University College, and a MSc Degree in Applied Entomology from Imperial College of Science and Technology, UK.

Many of the results of research undertaken in the Coast Province can be seen at the Ministry of Agriculture's demonstration plot at the Mombasa Show which are all to help farmers reap much richer harvests.

## Tanzanian Witnesses Off To 'Hi-Jack' Trial

TWENTY FOUR Tanzanians will give evidence in a British Court on the case involving the hijacking of an Air Tanzania Corporation Boeing 737 in late February by five Tanzanians. A Police spokesman would not state who the 24 are but invariably include Captain Deo Mazula who piloted the plane literally single-handed during the two-day drama, first to Oscar Mwamaja who was shot in the waist by a stray bullet and other crew members.

The British Government will meet all the expenses of the witnesses and the exercise is seen as trying to woo the five youths in understanding the seriousness of the offence and to change their pleas to "guilty".

The accused — Yassin Mamba, Moses Mamba, Mohamed Tahir Abdallah Ali and Mohamed ali pleaded not "guilty" when the case was moved to an Essex High Court close to Gatwick Airport North of London where the hijackers gave up to British authorities.

The aircraft was hijacked while on a local flight between Mwanza and Kilimanjaro Airport and after "hopping" at airports in Nairobi, Jeddah and Athens it landed at Gatwick.

Delving into crime at the National Assembly, the Minister for Home Affairs, Brigadier Muhidin Kimario surprised attentive members of parliament when he narrated that property and funds worth nearly 20 million US Dollar (183.1 M/=) was stolen from Parastatal Organisation and government departments during 1981/1982 as opposed to 6.6 million US Dollars (62.06 M/=) the previous financial year. He attributed this anomaly to a great weakness in the control of public property and the lust by greedy individuals to accumulate quick money.

The irony of it all, is that of the 81.1 Million shillings stolen this financial year, only 786,000/= was recovered while 3.1 million shillings was recovered out of the 32 million shillings stolen during 1980/81, in Parastatals. Theft in the government totalled 102 million shillings during 1981/82 as opposed to 30 million shillings the previous year.

in six 'dying from drink' and about three others totally blinded after consuming industrial spirit popularly known as Ngwira or Maziko Saa Nane, six others being treated at the VI Lenin Hospital are understood to be in a grave condition.

The incident occurred at a notorious drinking spot - Mlandege where some 15 people were having a "Boozing Spree".

truth?" he asked of Jesus.

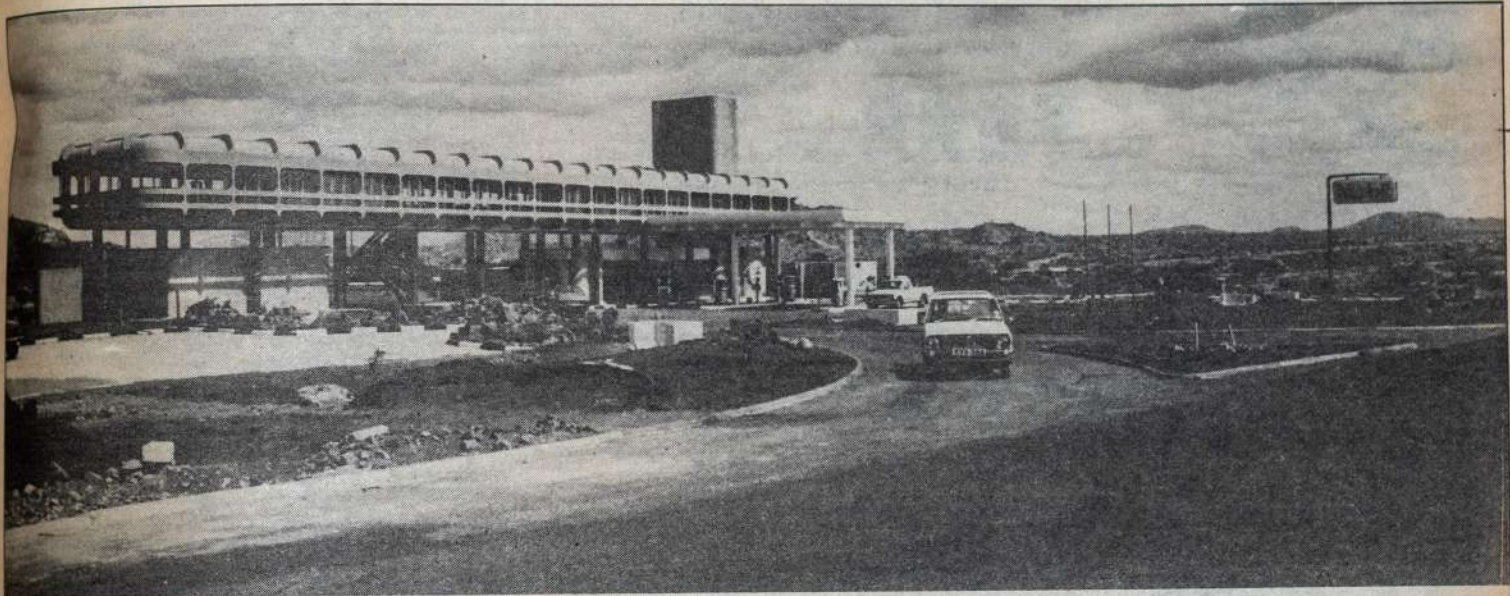

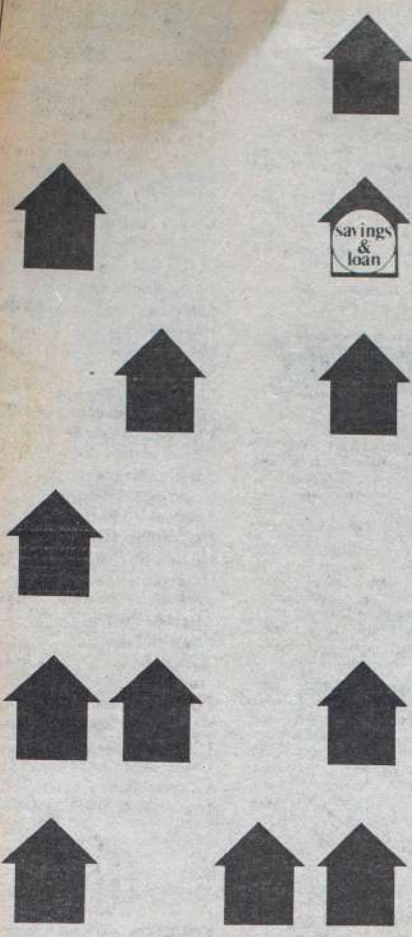

# This Surely Is A Port Record

WHAT MUST surely constitute a bulk cargo all the time record working at Mbaraki Wharf involved the bulk carrier *Daimar* which sailed on July 21 at 11.30 a.m. having discharged 15,500 tons Swazi coal in 6 1/2 days and subsequently loaded 14,000 tons clinker in 3 days — 29,500 tons out and in within 9 1/2 days. Certainly a fine achievement and congratulations to all concerned at Bamburi Cement on whose account these two parcels were worked.

Still on the subject of Mbaraki Wharf, a newcomer to tie up on July 19th for a 4 day stay was the 24,000 deadweight ton cement tanker *Helvetia* which had arrived from Spain to load some 10,000 tons of bulk cement for Mauritius.

Built in Bulgaria in 1980 this modern bulk carrier is under the command of Captain J. Stingl, a popular Master in the cement fleet.

Having six holds, she is easily identified by her unique Swedish design 600 tons per hour Siwertell vertical screw unloader representing the first unit to be supplied by the Swedish manufacturer for ocean carrier operation.

**COAL CARGOES**  
It is fitted amid ship on a gantry crane rail mounted extending to all hatches Whilst of no assistance in loading cement, this item of equipment will be of immense use for discharging coal cargoes should *Helvetia* be handling this traffic in the future. This fine looking vessel on her first visit is over 10,000 larger than the *Elbia* which at present has been the largest carrier.

## SHIPPING with JOHN WALTERS

Stingl for inviting me on board *Helvetia*.

The fire ravaged *Judith II* which entered port on Wednesday of last week under tow of *Bateleur* was carrying a cargo of salt, cement and steel when fire broke out when she was North of the Comoro Island.

Her midship section was completely gutted and the appearance of the ship bears ample evidence of this. Tug and tow took some 3 1/2 days to reach Mombasa.

Whilst cargo from the two forward hatches was discharged in the Comores, from her trim she could have had cargo in her two after hatches. Future plans for *Judith II* presently at Divecon's yard, are yet undecided.

The latest tonnage figures of vessels laid up worldwide through lack of employment is 861 vessels — the highest ever recorded. Almost half this figure is accounted for by tankers.

Over the past week or so the

occupancy of the berth... berths can hardly have reached an acceptable level with an average of 6 vacant berths... given K.P.A. the opportunity to accelerate even further... present work between 18 and 18 berths to improve... container facilities and work seems to be proceeding well.

A new vessel to use the container berth was the eagerly awaited latest addition to the W.E.C. service, namely the 8800 dwt RoLo vessel *Del Mar* built in Spain last year and a good example of modernized multi purpose vessels equipped with a stern ramp and two 30 ton deck cranes — the only facility missing was side doors!

Her cellular capacity is between 400 and 500 TEU's dependent on the nature of cargo being stowed. The sustaining she is not dependent on shore cranes.

### IMPRESSIVE SHIP

The W.E.C. Representative in Mombasa invited me to have a look at the vessel and she could not fail to be impressed with her compact and well designed features fulfilling the needs of the eighties. During her 5 day stay in Mombasa she handled approximately 300 containers.

Alongside Mbaraki Wharf this week has been a remarkably smart, well maintained vessel of 24 years old. She is the green hulled M.V. *Macca* of 8,600 tons gross, loading 12,000 tons cement for Jeddah.

Registered in Jeddah, she has only recently been taken over by her new Owners, Her Managers are based in Hong Kong. Built in West Germany, to an almost standard German design of that period, her previous name was *Sophia II*.

# LESS CARGO MOVES THROUGH KILINDINI

The total dry general cargo handled at the port of Mombasa in the first half of 1982 was approximately 1,174,732 deadweight tonnes.

The dry general imports accounted for 763,728 tonnes and the exports made up the other 411,044 tonnes.

The performance over this period was a decline when compared to the same period last year when the port handled 1,250,191 tonnes, comprised of 863,823 tonnes of imports and 386,368 tonnes of exports.

This decline reflected a fall in throughput of six per cent of 75,459 tonnes.

### MORE EXPORTS

The imports handled through June last year have shown a decline of 100,095 tonnes which is 11.6 per cent. However, there was an improvement on the exports throughput in the first six months this year in comparison to similar period in 1981.

The exports handled this year

were 24,636 tonnes or 6.4 per cent higher as compared against the first half of last year.

The container traffic has on the other hand shown a big improvement over the first six months of the year during which period, an approximation of 26,810 twenty foot equivalent units (TEU's) were handled compared to 18,516 TEU's handled through June in 1981.

The difference reflects 8,294 TEU's or 44.8 per cent more of the container traffic handled this year than last year.

During June this year the port handled approximately 175,535 tonnes of dry general cargo, composed of 111,207 tonnes of imports and 64,328 tonnes of exports.

In June 1981 the performance was 221,171 tonnes — 159,000 tonnes being imports and 61,171 tonnes of exports.

Thus there is a decline in the throughput of June this year compared to in 1981, reflecting a fall of 45,636 tonnes or 20.6 per cent.

# ERROL ON FOOD

## Sunshine Days Are For Picnics

"Seating themselves on the green sward, they eat while the corks fly and there is talk, laughter and merriment, and perfect freedom, for the universe is their drawing room and the sun their lamp. Besides they have an appetite, Nature's special gift, which lends to such a meal a vivacity unknown indoors, however beautiful the surroundings. Brilliant Savarin"

The sea and the sunshine and empty beaches of white sand are perfect settings for picnics and beach barbecues; July August and September being the long summer holidays for children, make the greater part of these months a time for outdoor jaunts for the family almost a way of life...

They can last all day and can range from the elegant to the down to earth. Ants have no trouble in locating either variety but despite the threat of invasions of "dudus" and the unattractive idea of sand in the sandwiches everything tastes better when eaten out of doors somehow.

Once at the picnic site the organiser should be able to relax and enjoy the fruits of his labour and a successful picnic does take organising ability if it is to be the carefree happy occasion that the word "picnic" conjures up.

Picnic meals are best when they are full of little surprises; hard-boiled eggs are a must and ever popular but no matter how famished, there are few people who find curled up sandwiches appealing. Besides there are so many alternative dishes.

French bread cut as required and spread with a slice of coarse terrine, requiring no

messy buttering is practically a feast in itself. Or hunks of bread can be dipped into the brick-red juices of chilled minted tomatoes; salad Nicoise served in a large bowl provides tempting fare [again as a meal in itself] which will travel well and can be dressed on the spot.

Chilled calamari salad is cheap, easy and quick to make and especially appropriate by the sea.

### SOPHISTICATION

Prawns, boiled in sea water, frozen and allowed to defrost on the journey, eaten in the fingers, make a delicious starter with lemon or lime juice squeezed onto them.

Don't be afraid to introduce more sophisticated flavours to the young of your household; children are naturally curious and you would be surprised to learn that the first little taste of a new dish, may open up a whole new world of flavours leading to different countries and cultures even, far away, from cold sausages and bought potato chips. Deprived of the opportunity it may be years otherwise before children will venture beyond the well tried flavours of more ordinary family food.

### JACKIE'S MINT GARLIC TOMATOES

- 4 ripe tomatoes peeled
- 3 cloves garlic crushed
- 1 tsp salt
- 5 tsp salad oil
- 1 tbs water
- 3tbs vinegar
- 24 fresh mint leaves

After peeling the tomatoes by plunging in boiling water pack them into a screwtop glass jar. Make the dressing either by pounding the mint leaves with the crushed garlic or placing all the other ingredients in the blender and mixing thoroughly.

Pour over the tomatoes. Chill in the fridge for as long as you

like — minimally 3-4 hours. Shake the bottle from time to time. The marinating process can be hastened by putting in the deep freezer: this is really super for picnics because it is easy to make up larger quantities and being carried in a screw-top jar it is easy to handle.

Fork out the tomatoes or dip hunks of bread into the juice. There won't be any to take home.

### CALAMARI SALAD

This makes a wonderful hors d'oeuvre and since it should be served at room temperature it can be taken chilled from the fridge to arrive at the picnic spot ready to eat.

- 1 lb of small squid - frozen will do but preferably fresh
- 1 small onion chopped
- 4 tbs olive oil
- 2 cloves garlic
- freshly ground black pepper
- 1 tbs lemon juice
- 2 tbs freshly chopped parsley

If using frozen squid then allow to defrost completely. Clean as usual and discard the cellophane-like "bone" in the centre, pull the head away from the body and discard anything else in the sac.

Clean under a cold running tap. Slice into rings approximately 1/4 inch wide and chop tentacles into small lengths. Cook the onion gently in 3 tbs of olive oil and when it starts to change colour add the squid

and continue to cook for 10 minutes, stirring often. The squid will shrivel slightly and take on an exquisite shade of pale pink.

Add 2 tbs water, the crushed garlic and pepper. Cover the pan and steam gently for 10 minutes. By now the squid should be tender — the cooking will toughen them.

Leave to cool in the pan, then lift out squid with a slotted spoon. Stir in the remaining tablespoon of olive oil, lemon juice and chopped parsley. Serves 2 or 4 if other dishes accompany.

### TURKISH FISH

- 2 lb fish whole - mullet or rock cod
- 2 large onions sliced
- 2 cloves garlic crushed
- 14 oz tin of tomatoes drained
- chopped parsley
- 1 tbs tomato paste
- salt and black pepper
- black olives

Having scaled the whole fish (leave the head on) lay it on its side on both sides in oil until lightly coloured. Remove to plate.

Fry onions in the same oil till golden and soft, add the garlic and after a minute add the tomatoes and their juice. Some chopped parsley and the tomato paste diluted in the oil of water. Season to taste. Simmer well, bring to the boil and simmer for 10 minutes.

Place the fish in the sauce. Make sure it is covered and cook for a further 10-15 minutes adding a little water if necessary.

Add a dozen black olives towards the end of the cooking. Place the fish on a shallow serving dish, pour the sauce over. Cool. Then chill. Garnish with lemon slices and serve cold at the picnic.

## Barbecue Lunch In A Cool, Coral Cave

AN added attraction at Mombasa Beach Hotel is that you can enjoy an al-fresco barbecue lunch on the beach.

Food which is freshly charcoal grilled in the Robinson Crusoe style kitchen there includes king fish, tafi, also mshkaki from either beef lam or chicken. They are served with a salad, and costing only Shs 20 are probably the cheapest meal to be found on the beach.

Freddie Trumba, general manager, hopes to extend the a la carte menu soon with

the addition of other popular dishes such as Lamu curry, Beef Stroganoff and Pizza.

The emphasis is on "simple, yet tasty food."

Tables on the sand have shady makuti sun umbrellas, and if it gets too hot you can partake of your barbecue lunch in the Cavern which is cool being part of a natural coral cave.

There is also a well-stocked beach bar which glistens with a decor of colourful beer bottles. As well there are Giriama wall murals, traditional masks and hanging green coconuts.

The bar is open throughout the day, and the kitchen from midday until 2 p.m. Thereafter snacks are available from the Pool Terrace.

The Beach Bar and al-fresco "lounge" are open throughout the evening enabling disco fans to cool off in the ozone laden air. The Cavern at night is a very lively discomania scene with an electrifying swirl from all the latest lighting, sound and music, and making her debut there soon will be Kenya's first lady DJ.

The music-makers are Anwar's Disco, founded by Nairobi born Anwar Haq who has now been a DJ at major coast hotels since 1968 — the last four of which have been at Mombasa Beach Hotel.

He has also equipped the Cavern with some of the best star lighting in Mombasa, and has thousands of discs to meet all moods which include Blues, New Wave, Funky, Reggae and Rock.

It is one of the most popular discos on the coast, and Anwar attributes much of his popularity to the fact that he "plays for the people".

### Funky Music

As far as Mombasa is concerned Anwar finds funky music is still "in", while tourists have more of a preference for New Wave and "Pop". Anwar keeps abreast of the "Top of the Pops" in the USA and Europe and among his collection is "Illusion" which rated No. 1 on the charts in America and England only recently.

Anwar has helped popularise Reggae at the coast by holding Reggae competitions in the Cavern, the favourite music being that of Bob Marley and Eddy Grant.

EIN Mann mit großer Vorliebe für Schlangen ist Jackson Iha, ehemaliger Kurator des Schlangenshows in Nairobi. Gegenwärtig ist er jedoch schwer damit beschäftigt, seine Schlangenschau in Malindi, Watamu und Mombasa vorzuführen, die nicht nur unterhaltend, sondern gleichzeitig auch informativ ist.

Er hat eine Sammlung von über 100 Schlangen; einige davon hält er als Haustiere - wie die junge Python und ein paar Hausschlangen - die sich frei in der Umgebung bewegen können, wenn er daheim ist.

Jackson Iha befaßt sich seit 15 Jahren mit Schlangen und hat Tausende gefangen, ohne je von einer giftigen Schlange gebissen zu werden. Er spricht ganz begeistert über diese Reptilien.

### KRIECHTIERE

Er gibt jedoch zu, daß es einmal eine Zeit gab, wo er vor ihnen auch eine gewisse Scheu empfand. Als er jedoch David Mwanje's Schlangenschau in Gedi

sab, änderte sich seine Einstellung zu diesen Kriechtieren. Er ging damals noch zur Schule und wußte nicht, welchen Beruf er später einmal ergreifen sollte. Er erfuhr, daß David Mwanje Schlangen für den Export und er lernte auch den Zwischenhändler in diesem Geschäft kennen.

### NATIONALMUSEUM

Sagt Jackson: "Der Händler offerierte mir seine Unterstützung, um die Schule erfolgreich zu beenden. Dafür arbeitete ich in meiner Freizeit stundenweise für ihn. Er lehrte mich alles Wissenswerte über Schlangen und wie man mit ihnen umgeht".

Später arbeitete Jackson während 10 Jahren für das National-Museum von Kenia und wurde Kurator des Schlangenshows in Malindi und Watamu (einschließlich Jambo Hotels) und in 3 Hotels in Mombasa.

Dann beschloß er, sein eigenes Geschäft aufzuziehen. Nun zeigt er seine Schlangenschau in 5 Hotels in Malindi und Watamu (einschließlich Jambo Hotels) und in 3 Hotels in Mombasa.

Jackson erklärt bei der Vorführung jeweils dem staunenden Publikum die Lebensweise der Schlangen und ihre Freilebensbedingungen. Einige ziehen Mäuse vor, andere Ratteneier und Erdchren. Sie fressen einmal in der Woche, können aber bis zu 3 Monaten ohne Nahrung leben, wenn sie genug Wasser haben. Seine 4 m lange Python ist 15-19 Jahre alt und hat eine Lebenserwartung von etwa 40 Jahren. Sie wurde im Lawford's Hotel gefangen bewundert.

Jackson bestätigt, daß Schlangen nicht aggressiv sind, außer wenn sie glauben, angegriffen zu werden. Im allgemeinen meiden sie den Menschen und ergreifen vor ihm die Flucht.

### PUFFOTTER

Die Puffotter ist die gefährlichste. Sie ist nichts unterwags und ist sehr giftig. Sie kann 20-150 Junge auf einmal produzieren - deshalb gibt es auch so viele davon.

Die meisten gemeldeten Schlangentisse stammen von Puffottern. Sie können sich nur sehr langsam fortbewegen und man kann sie nicht sehen, wenn man nachts durch den Busch wandert. Sie zischen eine Warnung, beißen aber zu, wenn man ihnen zu nahe kommt. Jackson empfiehlt deshalb, nachts immer eine Taschenlampe mitzunehmen.

Er organisiert auch Schlangensafari- und führt die Leute in die Gegend am Sabaküttel, wo sie zusehen können, wie man Schlangen fängt. Die Gefangene wird dann ausgiebig studiert und dient als Anschauungsobjekt. Nach dem Studium wird sie wieder freigelassen, außer es war ein besonders seltenes Exemplar, das Jackson noch in seiner Sammlung fehlt.

## Die Kyengo Holzschnitzer

EINIGE unglaublich geschickte Kamba Holzschnitzer, die sich bereits einen guten Namen in Kenia und Uebersee geschaffen haben, sind an der Südküste zu finden. Die Kyengo Holzschnitzerindustrie hat ihren Hauptsitz und Ausstellungsraum auf dem Gelände des Robinson Baobab Hotels seit seiner Eröffnung und hat sich im Laufe der Jahre immer weiter entwickelt. Besucher sind zu jeder Tageszeit willkommen und können den Schnitzern bei der Arbeit zusehen.

Unter den 20 Holzschnitzern ist auch Stephen Sambi, der als der beste Schnitzer in ganz Kenia gilt. Sein Lehrer war der verstorbenen Mutisya Munge, der Gründer der Holzschnitzerindustrie in Kenia. Stephen ist bekannt geworden durch seine Mosaikfiguren in Lebensgröße, die in vielen angesehenen Reiseunternehmen, Fremdenverkehrsbüros, Restaurants und Museen in der Bundesrepublik aufgestellt sind.

Stephen und Mutisya stammen aus dem Machakos Distrikt sowie auch Michael K. Kyengo, der die Holzschnitzerindustrie an der Südküste

ansiedelte.

Ihre Schnitzereien sind in vielen Küstenhotels zu sehen, vor allem in der Africana Sea Lodge und im Jadini Beach Hotel, von Stehlampen über Mosaikfiguren bis zu den verschiedensten Tieren. Ein gefährlich aussehendes Krokodil steht auf dem Buffet-Tisch und ein Mediziner hängt über der Bar.

Gemäß Aussage von Michael ist die Holzschnitzerindustrie in Kenia in der Gegend von Wamunya bei Machakos um's Jahr 1918 entstanden, als Mutisya Munge Holzlöffel und Spazierstöcke für die Stammesältesten schnitzte. Heutzutage hat sich diese Industrie dermaßen entwickelt, daß Tausende in Kenia hergestellten Schnitzereien in alle Welt exportiert werden.

### Sambia und Malawi

Sie sind auch sehr begehrt von den Touristen als Andenken an ihre Ferien und als Geschenke für die Freunde zu Hause.

Michael Kyengo ist auf einer Farm aufgewachsen mitten unter vielen Holzschnitzern. Als er noch zur Schule ging,

besuchte er seine Freunde und es dauerte nicht lange, bis er mit ihrer Hilfe auch kleine Holztiere herstellte. Nach seinem Schulabschluss beschloß er, seine eigene Karriere in der Holzschnitzerei aufzubauen. Nach dem ihm durch den Verkauf seiner eigenen Schnitzereien genügend Geld zur Verfügung stand, reiste er nach Kitwe in Sambia und nach Blantyre in Malawi, wo das Holzschnitzergeschäft blühte.

Dort traf er viele alte Freunde aus der Gegend von Machakos, die auch in der Kunstszene Erfahrung sammeln wollten. Er verbrachte viele Jahre in Zetralrika und fand guten Absatz, die damals hauptsächlich aus Tieren bestanden.

Michael kam 1972 nach Kenia zurück und errichtete zusammen mit anderen Freunden den Schnitzereibetrieb beim Robinson Baobab Hotel. Heute exportieren sie Schnitzereien für über 10,000 Dollar pro Jahr, vor allem Tiere nach Deutschland und in die Schweiz.

The Malindi Rally is scheduled for the weekend of 14/15 August, and with only a fortnight to go, the weather has continued to be a major obstruction to the organisers.

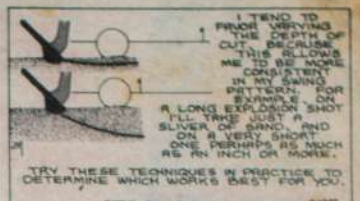

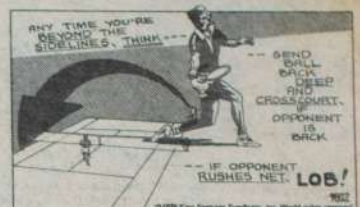
