Minister Magugu Assures Improved Airline Services

MOBASA (KNA) The Minister for Transport and Communications Mr. Arthur Magugu has said that the problems afflicting Kenya Airways are mainly human and can be solved by all the groups involved in the sector coming together to sort them out.

Mr Magugu said this when he addressed tour operators and government officers who are closely associated with the running of the air services who were jointly discussing minutes of recommendations arrived at by a working committee charged with seeking viable means of improving passenger handling methods by Kenya Airways.

The Minister was accompanied by the Assistant Minister for Transport and Communications Mr. Matero Keriri, the permanent secretary Mr. P. Wambura, the director of Aerodromes Mr. S. S. Lessrma, and the managing director of Kenya Airways Mr. Richard Nyaga.

He said that the Airways was faced with scarcity of funds and added that where automation was not possible they would continue with manual operations but would make the best of it.

He called on all the various groups concerned in the operations of the national carrier to stop throwing blame on each other reminding them that they were all complimentary to one another.

He however reiterated the need for staff manning the various stations in the air industry to be presentable and referred to a complaint that was carried in the press recently about the "dirty state of the Mombasa booking office."

The Minister said that constructive criticism was welcome since it would help highlight problem areas for acting upon.

The Minister promised that his Ministry in close collaboration with all other departments and bodies that were charged with the effective running of the air services would strive to achieve better results and urged officers to constantly review the progress of the services.

Some of the recommendations that were arrived at were the installation of extra weighing machines to ease the processing of passengers at the departure and arrival terminals.

It was also realised that there

was a need to re-organise shifts to ease the current congestion. The director of Aerodromes also informed the Minister that spare parts for the luggage conveyor belt which was currently operating below capacity has been ordered and it would be re-installed to full capacity as soon as they arrived.

The Minister asked the director of Aerodromes and the Kenya Airways managing director to look into ways of forming an organised body of porters like in all other Airports to avoid the harassment that passengers were receiving at the hands of 'self style porters' who turned up at the airport but were unregistered.

Uganda Trouble Hurts Mombasa

RWANDA CARGO IS RE-ROUTED THROUGH TANZANIA

THE LANDLOCKED COUNTRY of Rwanda, its main import cargo pipeline cut off by the Ugandan war, has begun to re-route its goods stranded in Mombasa through Tanzania to Kigali. Burundi, also landlocked, is expected to take similar action. More than 100 trucks carrying Rwandese goods are expected to begin crossing into Tanzania over the weekend, a spokesman for the state-owned Societe De Transport International Au Rwanda (STIR) told Coastweek.

The trucks, loaded with more than 2,500 tons of essential goods in short supply in Rwanda, are being re-routed from Mombasa, Nairobi and Malaba.

The spokesman said that the

trucks, ferrying fuel, food-stuff and raw materials, will

enter Tanzania through Taveta and Namanga, and proceed to Kigali through the northern part of Tanzania.

"We already have a pile-up of goods destined for Rwanda which may take one month and half to clear from Mombasa," he said.

The Ugandan war, pitting the government forces against the National Resistance Movement, has cost the Rwandese government over two million shillings in waiting charges, the spokesman said.

He said the new Tanzanian route will also cost the state-owned firm an extra expenditure of Kshs. 300,000/- in fuel consumption for the trucks.

According to the spokesman for the Burundi state-owned transport firm Otrabu, negotiations are continuing in Dar-Es-Salaam between the governments of Burundi and Tanzania to allow Burundi to transport its goods through Tanzania.

BURUNDI TRUCKS

"We hope to start ferrying our goods through Tanzania soon," he said.

More than 60 trucks loaded with goods for Burundi are stranded in Mombasa, Nairobi and Malaba, he said.

The goods in Mombasa include 12 containers and four others trapped in Uganda.

He said that about 2,000 tons of goods and more than 300,000 litres of fuel oil have not reached Burundi since the fresh out-break of civil war in Uganda.

Other trucks, owned by private transport firms and carrying goods to Rwanda, Burundi and

Zaire, are also reportedly stranded in Kenya or trapped in the war-torn Uganda.

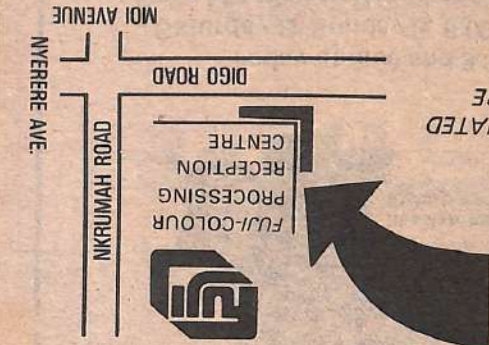

Susan [Madonna] happens to be a girl who gets what she wants, living off her wits and any rich guy ready to hop into bed with her.

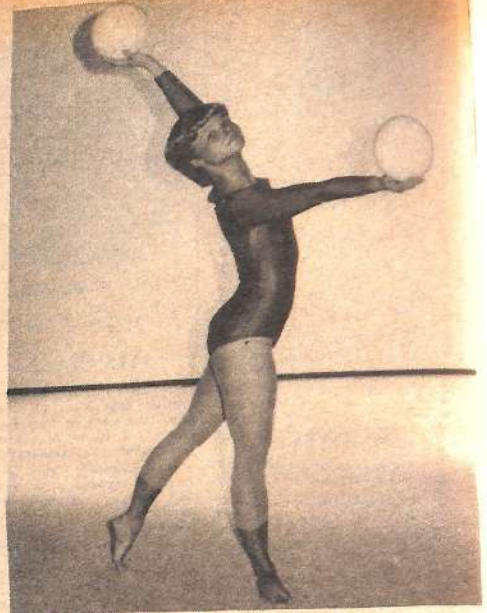
This romantic escapade takes an intriguing turn when Susan trades her eye-catching jacket for a pair of boots, and Roberta sneaks behind and buys the jacket.

T.V. Programme Told The Truth From Kilifi ...

ALLOW ME this opportunity to record my appreciation on the superb job the Voice of Kenya, T.V. team in Mombasa did on Thursday 12 September 1985 at around 8.00 p.m. in screening a progressive farmer near Kilifi town in the Coast Province.

I was particularly impressed by the commentator who took pains to dispel the stereotype of the coastal folk as being lazy and good-for-nothing.

Those of us who viewed this programme were impressed by this small progressive coastal farmer who kept grade cows which provided him with a lot

of milk, both for selling and for domestic consumption.

Moreover, this same farmer was inculcating in his own children that spirit of self-reliance by encouraging them to grow crops on their small plots.

This, indeed, is a commendable example which all people, not only those from the coastal region, ought to emulate.

Unfortunately, there are still some people (thank God the percentage is dwindling) who still enjoy stereotyping the coastal teltow as lazy.

Indeed, we all know that there are often ulterior motives.

Some highly placed persons use the bogey of alleged coastal laziness as an excuse to deny or by-pass some deserving coastal employee his rightful opportunity in promotion or other advancement at work.

This denies coastal people that rare opportunity to fully participate in nation-building.

In fact, it appears that a few officials have neglected to use the funds allocated to projects in that province and when questioned always blame the victim with the convenient story of alleged lack of interest among coastal folks!

In my ten years as a Lecturer up here, first at Nairobi and now at Kenyatta University, I have travelled extensively and thus have criss-crossed the Republic, up and down.

In these itineraries, I have seen progressive and hardworking communities.

But I have also seen unprogressive and lazy communities elsewhere who have shacks for dwellings. Certainly the coastal region does not hold a monopoly in this category of underdevelopment.

In fact, an up-country friend of mine remarked to me the other day that the easiest way to measure slackness was to use the barometer of the famine relief.

Certainly, the Coast Province does not head the list of regions receiving famine relief in the Republic!

In any case, the Thursday coverage was praiseworthy and I hope more educative programmes of that nature will be screened again in future.

Such programmes could help educate the doubting Thomases and see that the so-called slackness of the coastal folks was as great a myth as the alleged laziness of the "natives" in colonial times.

Harambee For Bomu Primary

THERE WILL be a Harambee meeting at Bomu Primary School on 3rd November, 1985 to raise funds for Standard 8 classes, Home Science Room and a Workshop.

Bomu Primary School, which is in Port Reitz Ward has 31 classrooms with a pupils population of 1,600 children. Every year the School receives about

500 applications for Standard one places. Currently, the School is operating on 2 shifts system. The first shift started from 8.00 a.m. to 12 noon and the second shift started from 12 noon to 4.30 p.m.

The School is at the moment experiencing an acute shortage of classroom facilities and with the introduction of 8 year primary education, the situation is greatly aggravated.

Bomu Port Reitz Ward is thickly populated and the majority of the residents are living on bear subsistence. Although the parents in the Ward have raised 346,900/- towards the construction of three additional classrooms at the School, nearly 750,000/- are required for the construction of four Std. 8 classrooms, one Home Science room and a Workshop.

It has been decided to hold a Harambee meeting on 3rd November, 1985 at the School compound to raise funds for the construction of the Physical facilities required. Mr. Ismail Yunis, the Secretary General of Dock Workers' Union has kindly consented to be the Guest of Honour during the Harambee meeting and will lay the foundation stone for the Standard 8 classrooms on that day.

I therefore appeal to Coast-week readers to contribute generously towards this worthy cause and crossed cheques should be drawn in the name of Bomu School Fund, P.O. Box 93208, Mombasa.

On behalf of Bomu Primary School, the Parents Association, the School Committee and on my own behalf, I thank readers in advance for your anticipated contribution towards building a better tomorrow in the spirit of our beloved President, His Excellency, Daniel T. Arap Moi of love, peace and unity.

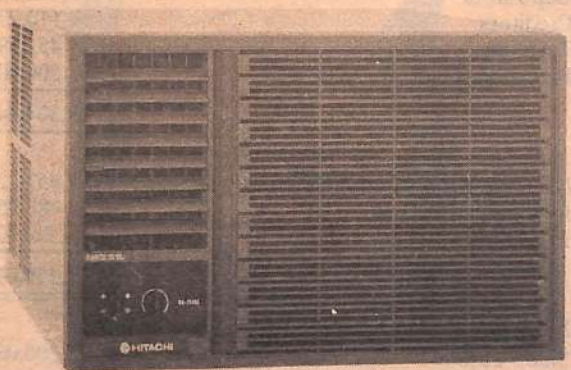

'Mogadishu Disaster' May Have The Most Horrendous Repercussions

THE STRANDING and after effects of the disaster which struck the Mediterranean Shipping Company's chartered container vessel *Ariadne* at Mogadiscio will surely go down in Maritime history as one of horrendous proportions and with repercussions probably unequalled amongst casualties affecting general cargo ships over recent years. The vessel is now broken in two, the poisonous and explosive chemicals are creating a serious danger to life and to the environment in the port of Mogadiscio.

Facilities are such at Mogadiscio that the required salvage and safeguard operations are unavailable or severely limited. The vessel's hull is breaking up and there is risk of 600 tons fuel oil escaping with virtually no equipment to contain such a spillage.

The gravity of the situation is such that a United Nations Environmental team has arrived in Somalia to assess the danger and make recommendations.

The *Ariadne* was originally due Mombasa on 26th August, she became a casualty in Mogadiscio on the 24th August. Her Mombasa discharge cargo totalled 3700 tons in containers much of which has doubtless been written off or naturally affected by the casualty.

She also has a considerable import tonnage for Dar-es-Salaam.

Two Shell tanker sisters of mature years have been in port this week discharging at Shimanzi Oil Jetty. They are the

Dutch flag *Acifa* with Aviation Fuel and Gas Oil, the *Acmaea* with white oil. These tankers are two of a large class built in the late nineteen fifties the majority of which have already found their way to the breakers' yard.

A unit of the Royal Omani Navy the *Al Mabroukah* is due for a five day visit next Wednesday. I believe this will be mainly for repairs and routine maintenance by African Marine & General Eng. Co. (AMGECO) who normally attend to the Sultanate's Navy.

BULK WHEAT CARGO

An old timer discharging 20,000 tons bulk Wheat all this week at No.5 berth is the American flag converted T2 tanker *Aero*. She must have recently changed hands as I cannot find her name in *Lloyds*. She must be about 40 years old and dating back to the years

when this class of oil tanker was mass produced in the United States during the second world war.

To add some colour to the vessel her superstructure is painted light blue which has always been the standard livery of Mobil tankers deck housing.

The German owned Vanuatu flag, *Klaus Leonhardt* finally arrived Mombasa on 1st October where she berthed at Number one to discharge 20,000 bags of Sugar destined for Uganda and loaded at Antwerp.

Fertiliser continues to be imported in large parcels. On Tuesday the Lykes Line vessel *Joseph Lykes* is due to discharge some 9000 tons in bulk from the U.S. Gulf. The Hungarian flag *Csokonai* slipped back to the 3rd October on her arrival date and she should now be in port discharging 10500 tons bagged Fertiliser prior to back loading 6500 tons bulk Soda Ash.

Minister Urges Industrialists To Aim For Overseas Export Market

THE MINISTER for Industries and Trade, Basil Mramba this week urged private industrialists producing non-traditional commodities to launch an aggressive export drive so as to obtain foreign exchange to sustain the flow of imported inputs for their industries. The minister said that private initiatives in exporting more was called for and said it was an irony for firms in the country to ask the Bank of Tanzania for large foreign exchange allocations for importation of raw materials when the capability to generate the foreign exchange lied within the firms' capabilities.

On the railways sector, some improvements in transport movements have been recorded. The Tanzania Railways Corporation (TRC) is reported to have transported some 588,000 tonnes of goods by rail in the initial half of this year which marks a 13 per cent increase over the same period last year.

The tonnage was however below the earmarked 616,000 tonnes set for the same period.

During the same period, the corporation transported some 2 million passengers which marked an increase of about 6 per cent over the same period last year. The revenue realised over the first six months is some 565 million shillings whilst for the whole year, revenue projection has been put at Shs. 1,245 million to be got from moving an envisaged passenger target of 4.5 million, 1.2 million tonnes of cargo, 172,000 heads of cattle and through sales from the railway corporation's canteens and hotels.

The corporation is presently facing a shortage of spare parts and tyres and the non-availability of shunting engines is affecting its operations.

Report From MUNIR DAYA



In Dar es Salaam the Norwegian state owned oil company (STATOIL) has opened an office to be jointly used by the Tanzania Petroleum Development Corporation (TPDC) for oil exploration in the country.

The office which is equipped with computer facilities for seismic data processing, interpretation and evaluation is reported to have the largest computing capacity presently available in Tanzania.

STATOIL PLANS

The STATOIL company plans to prospect for oil in the country and hopes to conclude a production sharing agreement if results prove positive.

The company has executed several evaluation and technical studies related to petroleum exploration in Tanzania and has

also assisted the TPDC in following up and carrying out various drilling and other exploration operations.

The opening of the new office is in line with a five year petroleum sector programme which was launched in 1983 through the Norwegian Agency for Development (NORAD) with a total budget of 88 million shillings.

An Australian company has also begun oil exploration in the Coast Region and some 180 million shillings are expected to be spent for this project.

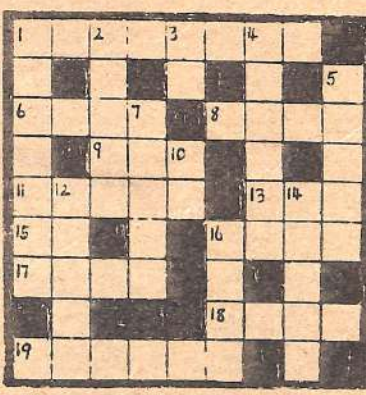

NACHDEM IN KENIA bedeutende Projekte in Gang gesetzt worden sind, um verschiedene bedrohte Tierarten, allen vora die Nashörner, zu retten, erfolgte nun ein weiterer Hilferuf zur Rettung der Altstadt von Mombasa.

"Mji wa Kale", die meilenlange Häuserfront am Indischen Ozean beim Alten Hafen wird von den Brandungswellen ständig bespült und beschädigt. Die Wände werden auf der Höhe des Meeresspiegels vom Wasser, durch den Gezeitenwechsel und die starken Monsunwinde immer in Bewegung gehalten, langsam aber sicher weggespült und bröckeln allmählich ab.

"Jedes einzelne dieser alten Gebäude ist in Gefahr, in absehbarer Zukunft zusammenzubrechen, wenn diese Zerstörung nicht aufgehalten wird," sagte Mr. Juma Kibwana, Vize-Vorstand des Altstadtbezirks.

Mehr als zwanzig Häuser sind stark betroffen, und ihre über 26,000 Bewohner müssen nachts zusehen, wie ihre Heimstätten langsam zerfallen. Durch den unaufräumligen Wellenschlag sind gefährliche Risse in den Mauern und Fundamenten entstanden.

Die Schäden sind deutlich zu sehen an den Gebäuden vom Fort Jesus bis zum Alten Hafen und weiter den Creek hinauf bis zur Allidina Visram Schule.

Gefährdet sind einige altehrwürdige, enge Gassen, der alte Dhauhafen, das 400 Jahre alte Fort Jesus, Moscheen und andere historische Gebäude, die von der Geschichte und Entwicklung von "Mji wa Kale" in der Altstadt Zeugnis ablegen.

Gemäß einem vom Ministerium für öffentliche Bauten im Jahre 1981 herausgegebenen Bericht betreffend eine wissenschaftliche Studie greift die Erosion durch das Wasser immer rascher um sich. Es gibt zwar keine Statistik darüber, wieviel Grund in den letzten hundert Jahren weggeschwungen worden ist, aber es ist erwiesen, daß immer mehr Land im Meer vedlrorenght.

Auch Mr. Omar Bwana, der Kurator des Fort Jesus, ist der Ansicht, daß "Mji wa Kale" vom Meer gefährdet ist: "Obwohl die Altstadt während mehrerer Hundert Jahre den Attacken der Wellen standgehalten hat, könnte es in den nächsten zehn Jahren schon passieren, daß wir unser altüberliefertes Erbe verlieren."

Eine Gruppe von Studenten an der Universität Nairobi hat in ihrem 1981 erstellten Bericht in dieser Beziehung auf ein weiteres Problem hingewiesen. Sie warnte vor den Einflüssen und Auswirkungen des Fortschritts und der Weiterentwicklung, die die Kultur und Traditionen der Einwohner der Altstadt verdrängen könnten.

Man sollte deshalb versuchen, den Charakter der Altstadt zu bewahren, neue Bautätigkeiten zu kontrollieren und sie mit den Überlieferungen aus alten Zeiten in Einklang bringen.

Der Bericht aus dem Jahre 1981 empfahl eine Seemauer oder einen Damm, dessen Errichtung sich auf etwa Kshs 10 Millionen belaufen würde. Wegen Geldmangel wurde das Projekt auf unbestimmte Zeiten verschoben.

Das Komitee für die Entwicklung des Mombasa Distrikt hofft, daß sich die kenianische Regierung an die Vereinten Nationen wendet, z.B. an UNEP (Umweltschutzprogramm), um einen finanziellen Beitrag zur Rettung der Altstadt zu erhalten.

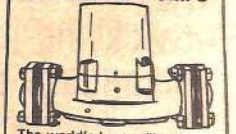

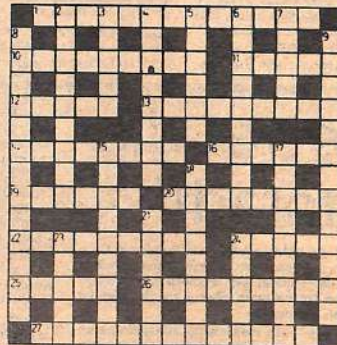

It will also be arranging special events such as open tournaments, exhibitions, 'mix-ins' and video shows of professionals in action.

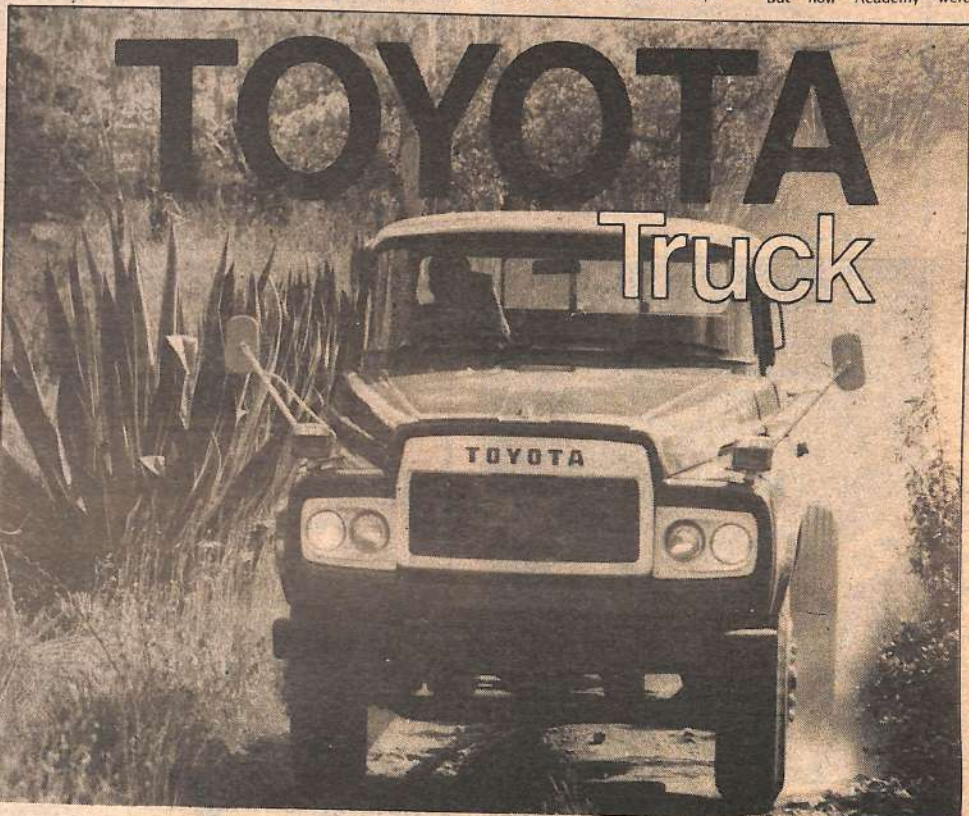

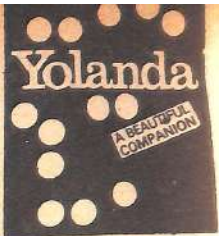
