## Rally Says 'Hang Them'

Kenyan working and studying in the Arab Gulf States have unanimously expressed their support and confidence in the leadership of President Daniel Arap Moi, his Government and the Ruling Party (KANU) and urged all Kenyans to "hang the plotters in public" at a rally in support of President Moi.

The resolution was passed in Abu Dhabi where nearly 60 Kenya nationals from Dubai, Sharjah, Ajman, Qatar, Bahrain, Kuwait and Oman had congregated to express their support for the leadership of their President and Government. They paid glowing tribute to their General Mulinge and Commander Mohammed, other senior army and police officers and all loyal troops for taking prompt action towards the restoration of law and order in the country.

He called on Kenyans as a whole to isolate the propagandists and hired demagogues who want to please their masters by subverting the legitimate and constitutional government of the people of Kenya in order to serve their own masters. He said Kenyans after President Kenyatta were lucky to have President Moi who had freshly forged National Unity and offered a more and better presentation of all Kenyans.

# President Moi To Open Coast Show

### HUGE CROWDS WELCOME PRESIDENT TO MOMBASA

PRESIDENT Moi who arrived in Mombasa on Monday is expected to open the Mombasa National Show. Over 300,000 people are expected to visit the four-day show which opens its gates today and show officials are optimistic that the figure should reach 100,000 mark tomorrow.

Arriving on Monday afternoon, a jovial President Moi was accorded a rousing welcome by Mombasa residents. Marked with the usual Coast pageantry thousands of people defied a brief and heavy

downpour, and then the scorching sun to show their love and loyalty to the President — and said it with placards, flags and traditional ngomas.

The sun shone brightly as the

President rode into town to the throb of drum beats and a chanting crowd waving flags, placards and tree leaves.

He was met by a large group of local leaders who included the Coast Provincial Commissioner Mr. Daudi Luka Galgalo, the Mayor Councillor Rajab Sumba and the assistant Minister for Labour Mr. Shariff Nassir.

Marking the 80th anniversary of the Agricultural Society of Kenya, the Mombasa Show is expected to be the biggest ever. All exhibitors had completed their final touches to their stands yesterday before the show opened today.

This year's response from exhibitors was reported to have been extremely good leading to more than 20 new exhibitors taking up stands at the show-ground.

A new development has been the participation of three foreign exhibitors for the first time in the history of the Mombasa Show.

They are the Beacon Shipping Line of Britain who will be displaying containerized cargo, the Japanese Trade Centre and the Carnival Turbo Circus from Turkey.

#### U.S. NAVY VISIT

An added attraction is the participation of the officers from the US Navy ship USS Coronada in the arena events. USS Coronada arrived in Mombasa last week for a ten day stay in Mombasa bringing ashore 500 sailors.

New local exhibitors include the Ministry of Energy, the Mount Kenya Textiles of Nanyuki and the Salvation Army.

All District stands were reported to have completed the final touches to their stands by last week.

The main centre of attraction in the government stands section was expected to be the

enlarged stand of the Provincial Agricultural Office which will be displaying a variety of crops including soya, millet and horticultural crops at their stand, with emphasis on the techniques of how to increase production of food and cash crops.

Anticipating a bumper attendance during this year's show, over 200 parking bays have been installed at the Show

Mombasa branch and Diani Agency.

Addressing them, Mr. Gecaga said "The opening of this Agency is further testimony of CBA's confidence in the future of Kenya which remains undiminished by the recent unfortunate, but ephemeral, disturbances of August 1."

He went on "Even though the

# Development Is Paramount

AT A RECENT conference organised by the United Nations Conference on Trade and Development UNCTAD in Geneva the point was highlighted that port development was paramount as this could save up to 40 per cent of shipping costs by congestion and promoting efficiency.

Port congestion surcharges in many parts of the world frequently equal some 10 to 25 per cent of freight on all cargo thus underscoring what can happen in cases of under-development of ports.

Although not specifically stated I consider the same degree of priority must also be applied to inland facilities such as transport, road and rail.

There is inclined to be too much of a tendency in developing countries to call for or start up a National Line or other such moves for prestige purposes instead of getting their priorities right and to have the proper shore based (mainly) facilities first.

One commendable feature about Mombasa has been the far sightedness of K.P.A. with its developments in line with the advance of containerisation.

A type of vessel rarely seen in Mombasa arrived at the buoys for a six day stay last week for the repairs and stores, she was an L.P.G. (liquid petroleum gas) carrier *Discaria* on long term bareboat charter to E and O who are, therefore, also manning the vessel.

Flying the Liberian flag built in 1969 and of 14,800 tons, she had brought a cargo of ammonia to the fertiliser plant at Tanga.

Unfortunately five Tanzanian managed to stow away on the vessel who were promptly returned to Tanzania on her arrival at Mombasa, so their sea voyage was short-lived. *Discaria* was due to sail on Wednesday.

Commenting further on the subject of crude oil imports, the tanker *Diana Prosperity* on charter to Shell, was due yesterday with 60,000 tons for E.A.O.R., which should ease the situation.

The Beacon container vessel *Barrister* now a regular container vessel calling at Mombasa, managed by the Harrison Line, arrived on Monday to discharge one of the largest, if not the largest number, of TEU containers, namely 410 loaded at Antwerp, Hamburg and Felixstowe for Mombasa discharge.

The newly built Japanese flag *Klarodyn* an unusual name for Japanese vessel, of 2,500 tons gross called at Mombasa last week for bunkers and water.

The vessel had run aground a month or two ago on the Somali Coast and towed to Mogadiscio after being salvaged by the local towage and salvage firm Murri International.

She was loaded with an aid cargo of foodstuffs for Somalia and Mozambique at the time.

She cleared Mombasa for Mozambique after her short call to discharge the remains of her cargo. Fortunately her grounding damage was not such as to cause the voyage to

be abandoned. The Lykes Lines from the Gulf are presently transporting several bulk cargoes.

The Airne Lines at No. 11 berth is discharging 1,000 tons of bulk Wheat, the *Frontier* Lykes arrived on Monday with 7,000 tons bagged Rice and on the 1st September the *Call Banker* is due with 5,000 tons bulk wheat.

All three parcels, destined for Kenya. The 26 year old *Copano* registered *Agia Marina* which spent some time at Mombasa waiting to discharge 2,000 tons Salt from the Red Sea berth at the end of last week and was due to complete on No. 7 this week.

The *Intra Traveller* which has been the current largest Cement loader at Mombasa destined for Jeddah was, as surmised, built originally for the Haisa Line, Bremen in 1956 as the *Drachstein*.

She subsequently passed to Greek ownership and became the *Thariseos* before she hoisted the Panamanian flag under her present owners. She is presently operated and managed by a UK based Company who manage other vessels.

The cattle carrier *Lemba* has made a return visit to Mombasa this week to load 500 tons for Saudi Arabia. Of 900 tons she is a real veteran being 31 years of age.

A famed landmark in the port and a constant reminder of the defunct Ken-Ren fertilizer plant has been the large boiler on the quayside of No. 7N which has reclined there for the past 45 years.

Happily it was removed on Monday by the port lifting crane, but to where!

# GANG RAIDS BRICK AND TILES

EARLY one morning this week about 2 a.m. a gang of four men, two of whom were dressed in army uniform, one in police uniform and one in administrative police uniform, went to the Mombasa Bricks and Tiles factory at Fort Reitz.

They questioned the two factory guards saying they were looking for a Mkamba employee "who had murdered a woman".

They asked the guards to take them to where the night shift workers were. They were then shown into the factory to where the night workers were on duty.

Immediately they pulled out firearms including one sub-machine-gun and a revolver and ordered everyone to lie down.

They then tied everyone up including the two guards.

Later they located gas welding equipment from the workshop and broke into the main safe from which they stole Shs 8,500.

They ransacked the rest of the factory and stole various other property, still unenumerated, and left after about two hours occupation.

At about 5 a.m. one of the employees managed to free himself and the others and made his way to the Manager's house some distance away. The manager pressed his Motorola Radio Alarm and K.K. Guards arrived at his house in three minutes.

The Police 999 also arrived 15 minutes later and a sweep of the area was started. So far no one has been apprehended.

The factory owners have now decided to install the Motorola radio alarm system in the factory and to reinforce their guards with those of a reputable security company.

## Amitabh Bachan Playing Homage

THE STEREOTYPE Hindu film hero *Amitabh Bachchan* pays another homage to the big screen — and as early as 10 a.m. in *Kaalia* opening on Sunday at Kenya Cinema. Needless to say, he is no born criminal, but one who has fallen victim to circumstances beyond his control and must now resort to crime in order to the Hindu legend of heroism.

And for *Kaalia* (*Amitabh*), there is still good reason why he should turn to crime.

The death of his brother leaves him an easy prey to super villain *Sahni Seth* (*Amjad Khan*) who easily converts him into a polished criminal. And from there on the good-bad hero *Kaalia* is a wanted criminal as he continues to amass wealth through his nefarious activities.

The story of *Kaalia* is simple. *Kallu* as his name was, is an innocent boy, and becomes a hard-core criminal overnight

This happens because *Sahni*, a mill owner, where *Kallu's* brother worked, lost his two hands in an industrial accident, asks him to help with some money. He refuses to pay and instead comments "I'd rather give money to pros because they would work for me, but what of your brother?"

A disappointed *Kallu* returns home only to find his brother died due to lack of medical care.

He changes his life to crime in order to support his sister-in-law and niece.

It was back to school last weekend for several of Mombasa's Motor Sport enthusiasts when Mike Doughty ran his navigation course. The second of a series, the two day course was intended to get rally crews to drive faster with greater safety.

Mike Doughty has taken part in 17 Safari Rallies, and has been the man in the second seat for Shekhar Mehta when the team achieved the incredible three-in-a-row hat trick.

At the beginning of the two hour classroom session at the Little Theatre Club, Mike explained the reason for the adoption of pace notes, used by works teams in the safari and other World Championship events when crews can practice in advance.

"Pace notes" said Doughty "appear complicated at first sight and difficult to interpret but they allow the driver to achieve the speeds that will give him a chance to win. The driver is totally relaxed as he knows exactly what will be coming up next and how he should tackle each particular hazard."

### 'TOTAL TRUST'

He warned the participants that there would be no instant improvement in their performance, but after some 1,000 km. of rallying on pace notes, the crew would be travelling 5 per cent faster. After 3,000 kms of pace notes, the driver would have developed a total trust in the navigators instructions, allowing him to concentrate entirely on his part of the job in hand, and improvements of up to 20 per cent in speed would be possible.

# MIKE DOUGHTY ON USING 'PACE NOTES'

Since the Safari is mainly a test of crews ability to survive a four day ordeal, the chances of winning must be related to the amount of rest they can have. He compared figures for the winning car which had 45 hours of rest with 54 hours driving, while the last finisher had 21 hours rest with 74 hours driving.

He warned participants that the average driver insisted on being treated like a tin god who needed to be stroked, pampered, passed food, cigarettes and information for days on end. The lowly navigator was expected to keep his place in the hundred of pages of notes and produce, without a seconds delay, facts like how late were they at the last control, how early at the next service point, and had he confirmed the drivers room at the next rest control? Minor chores include changing punctured wheels, pushing in mud, running the finances and producing clean handkerchiefs for the important one to polish his glasses.

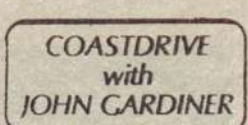
Mike Doughty advised anyone taking up navigation for fame and fortune to look elsewhere; Shekhar Mehta was now an international known personality while M.D. remained a shadowy figure half seen through a spray of champagne.

He pointed out that pace notes demanded total

concentration from both driver and navigator as an error in calling would result in a crash at very high speed.

Most crews prepare their own symbols and notation so it was obvious that pace notes in the wrong hands could be dangerous.

For the 1983 event, Safari Rally Limited would offer pace notes to entrants, and this was the prime reason for his navigational courses. The notes



would become the only sensible way to tackle the Safari, the conventional route book requires much slower speeds, so the enormous financial outlay necessary would be better used in entering the National Championship Rallies.

Doughty then compared two systems of pace notes, one based on numbers which vary from 6 — max speed, to 1 — dead slow; this he termed the "old Doughty method"

The more efficient "Shekhar system" used symbols to describe the road; and although each navigator might vary the symbols to suit himself, the

notes could be used by anyone conversant with pace notes.

The symbols for both systems and typical lines of notes were demonstrated on the black board. Mike Kirkland alternated with Doughty to explain his own preferences in notes. He recalled his introduction to pace notes; after three Safaris with the issued route, book he switched to pace notes prepared by Sandro Munari which gave him an increase of 20 per cent in speed.

Kirkland urged rally crews to adopt a goal, either to beat a particular crew or achieve a position on the roads by the end of the first leg.

He stressed the importance of pace notes at night, in dust or mist when the driver must maintain high speed without waiting for each feature of the road to appear in front of the car.

On Sunday morning the course moved out to Shimo-la-Tewa, where pace notes had been prepared for a four kilometer circuit.

### 'THE HAZARDS'

After a few minutes to decipher the symbols, each navigator drove around the circuit with Doughty calling the hazards and explaining the reasons behind what appeared at first to be burst of garbled words.

Next loop had Mike behind

the wheel, while the trainee read the notes, and being told off for his errors.

After several people had gone through the ordeal, they were practising on their own, and gradually the system began to make sense.

With a break for a curry lunch and a much needed drink the practicals went on until 4p.m. by this time Mike Doughty was beginning to visibly wilt.

The navigational courses will continue, in different parts of the country, and Mombasa Motor Club will run a second class at a later date.

M.M.C. will prepare both pace notes and descriptive notes for short sections near Mombasa which will give drivers and navigators the chance to practise using these forms. All Championship events will use descriptive route notes, with the intention of getting crews used to them and, at the same time driving at greater speed and with more safety.

With the wider spread of prize money in the 1983 Marlboro Safari Rally, drivers at the bottom have an incentive to improve their performance.

Any driver who has between 3 and 15 seeding points can win Shs 5,000 by being the best performer in one leg of the Safari, with prizes for Shs 2,500 Shs 1,250, and Shs 1,000 for the next three positions.

Crews with seeding points between 15 - 50 have prizes of Shs 7,500, Shs 5,000, Shs 2,500 and Shs 1,000 per leg to air for.

The Motor Sport organisers from the Safari down to club training rally level are keen to see an improvement in rally performance and this can only be achieved by taking part in

the smaller events like the Jambos and the Safari.

Next weekend, M.M.C. has a championship Automobile the Nguu Tala track, with practice and the competition events confined to the September 5. Scouting will be between 8.30 and 10.30 a.m. With both cars and motorcycles taking part there will be plenty of action for entrants and spectators.

The weekend of September 5 is the 1st Jamba Hotels 100 sponsored by the Malindi group.

### 'TWO LEGS'

M.M.C. has a block book at two Jamba Hotels entrants for this popular event should contact Secretary as soon as possible.

The rally will be run in legs of approximately 100 km. lengths, first on Saturday start and finish at the Marlin Hotel. Leg two Sunday morning runs from Blue Marlin to Sekeles Watamu including as a pleasant sight seeing through Sokoke forest.

Jamba Hotels deal in members will include barbecue dinner and drinks and breakfast and a curry at the finish, all for a small low 1800 = per head.

Prizes will include weekends at Jamba Hotels. A training rally is planned for Sunday October 17, followed two weeks later, Forestone Malindi. National Rally Championship will start and finish Mombasa International

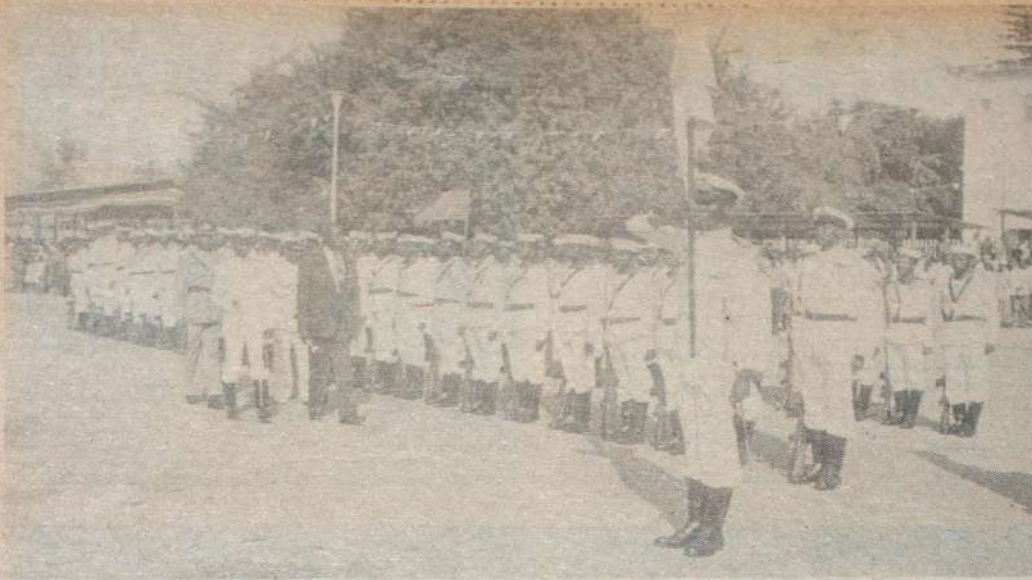

in the cabinet, in the Parliament and in the local authorities.

They pointed out that the Wananchi could now oppose any candidate at elections and for the first time in Kenya's election history even Ministers are voted out of office by a common ballot.

They said "those who plotted to overthrow the Government aimed at destroying peoples unity, Kenya's peace and stability and enormous development in Kenya had achieved since independence and also deprive Kenyans of their god-fearing President Moi".

The meeting has also called on KANU National delegates conference to adopt a straight

forward and open step towards the exposure of double-faced leaders who are like the "innocent flower but the serpent under it" in order to clear the ruling party of what the Waswahili people say "Kikulacho Kinguoni Mwako".

They said it was high time those type of leaders be removed from office by a vote of no confidence.

At the end of the meeting Mrs Amina Seif Bondeni Mombasa, said:

"We Kenyans have no problem with President Moi, neither his government, which is the peoples government and that all Kenyans are free to elect their own leaders without the use of a gun, we would appeal to all Kenya women "akina mama" to maintain their support to President Moi.

A former Kenya seaman, Mr. Otieno Pail who hails from Kisumu said, "I am a Luo, and I feel President Moi took sympathetic and humanitarian steps to Jaramogi Odinga and also other leaders like Shikuku, Makanyonge, Achieng Oneko and many others in order to give them another chance to work for the whole country along with other Kenyans, and we cannot forget the new approach of offering equal services to all Kenyans at all levels".

### 'PRIDE IN US ALL'

One Mohammed Said from Malindi, commented: "Kenyans should honour President Moi for his good work since the good name Kenya receives is a pride in us all".

Peter Munyasia, who hails from Machakos and is a former seaman, said "we are proud of Major Mulinge and other loyal troops for safeguarding Kenya's constitution".

Another coast man, Ali Salim Mansur of Kibokoni Mombasa said, "we are ready to resist any attempts against our President since we have elected him by a common ballot and he has a mandate of all Kenyans.

# Finland's Mining Engineers To Join Search For Gold

THE GOVERNMENT-owned State Mining Corporation STAMICO has signed a joint deal with three mining companies for the exploitation of gold deposits located in Kahawa in Western Tanzania. A five-man delegation headed by the Minister for Minerals, Mr Jackson Makwita who had discussions with a fourth Finnish company — Ikon Ab — over prospecting industrial minerals. These include Katin, Mawalla and

The three companies Outokumpu — the Finnish State owned company and fundfund and Kone Corporation, both private owned enterprises will form a joint company with Stamico to prospect for gold in the area. The set-up of the Kahawa Gold Mine is being worked out.

Gold exploration at Bulankhulu Gold Mine in Kahama District has been going on for the past three years and initial studies has shown that the mine could go into production with about 3,000 kgs worth 300 million shillings. This follows a feasibility report by the Kone Corporation.

Kone and Stamico are also involved in the exploitation of phosphates at Minjingu near Arusha. The £25.5 million project will produce about 165,000 tons of phosphate a year for over ten years.

The Finnish Government has also pledged to supply railway wagons for ferrying phosphates from Minjingu to the Tanga-based Fertiliser Company TFC while the mine has received eight 32-tonner trucks for ferrying the phosphates which will be used as major input at the TFC.

The Arab Bank for Economic Development BADEA is to give a 90 million shillings loan to Tanzania for purchasing raw materials and spare parts for on going projects in the industrial sector.

Consumers of local alcoholic spirits-brandy, whisky, gin and Konyagi may be in for some good news. Production at the Dar es Salaam based Tanzania Distilleries Limited is to increase production from 110,000 to 240,000 crates thanks to a 60 million shillings expansion programme.

But one wonders how the state-owned company can increase production when the existing capacity is not fully exhausted due to a shortage of raw materials.

The company exports some of its brands to Rwanda and Burundi and has received enquiries from Mozambique, Nigeria and Ghana, but one wonders how these will be met this year with an allocation of 2.5 million shillings in foreign exchange as opposed to 10.3 million shillings two years ago.

In Zanzibar, the 66 million shillings clove distillery plant was commissioned at Wawi some 32 kms from Pemba. The plant was constructed by French firm technical expert and technology TECOTEX.

The plant which can consume up to 3,000 tonnes of clove stems a year will produce 150 tonnes of clove stem oil, which is an input for producing pharmaceuticals, perfumes and in the food industry. Most of it will be exported to Japan, the United States and Western Europe.

### TECHNOLOGY

Tecotex which specialises in exporting technology to the Third World has signed an agreement to establish workshops in Zanzibar and Pemba. The French Government has given their Zanzibar counterparts 230 million French Francs some 230 millions shillings which constitutes 85 per cent of the project. The balance will be met by local funds.

The phase I of the project

entails the construction of a central workshop in Zanzibar capable of holding up to 100 vehicles at a time. The workshop will be able to repair up to 20 light and six heavy duty vehicles a day.

Twelve seamen have been extradited from the "Sisal Trader" vessel following abortive attempts to flee from Dar es Salaam. The seamen were discovered aboard two sister vessels "Cotton Trader" and "Cotton Trader" which was heading for the Red Sea Ports.

Two distinguished Tanzanians have been elected to attend two International Bodies. The Director of the Tanzania Scientific Research Council UTAFITI has been elected Vice-President of the State-based International Foundation for Science.

While one of Tanzania's African Lawyers Mr. Mawalla of Mushi has been elected a member of the national Commission of Inquiry (C) a non-governmental organisation having consultative status with UNESCO.

Mr Mawalla who is also Advocate with the High Court of Kenya is Deputy Treasurer general of the International Union of Lawyers.

### OPTOMETRIST

African Optometrist Dr. M. Chabbar has presented his glasses to the African Association of Tanzania members who suffer from Photophobia. Dr Chabbar, a retired Primary School teacher runs the charitable organisation "New Eyes for the Blind" which receives special frames from International Charitable Organisations mainly America Agencies.

A World Tourism WTO conference on the formation of domestic policies has opened at the Mexican seaside resort of Acapulco and Tanzania will be represented by a 10-member delegation led by the Minister for Tourism Mr. M. Mwingi.

The Acapulco Conference being preceded by a meeting of the African Trade Commission in Harare, Zimbabwe and is a follow-up to the 1980 WTO conference in Manila, Philippines. The WTO has its secretariat in Madrid, Spain, the world's largest receiver of tourist traffic.

A number of Dar es Salaam residents have of late been cheated by agents brandishing copies of the Bible and masquerading clergymen with promises the share holder will receive superabundant dividends from the "initial capital" after the game.

**LOWEST GROWTH RATE IN 35 YEARS**

Two of the latest international economic analyses make particularly sombre reading for most of the Third World of the developing countries.

According to a General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade GAT study the vast majority of these nations — those without oil resources — last year registered their lowest growth rate for 35 years.

In its annual report the United Nations Conference on Trade and Development UNCTAD spelled this out in even starker terms. It said the fact that these countries had achieved an increase of only 1.5 per cent in their gross domestic product last year meant that the development process had virtually come to a halt in the Third World.

Although it anticipates some quickening of growth during this year and the next, the UNCTAD document warns that some of these nations' most serious economic problems are likely to worsen.

The GATT study shows that the overall current account deficit of the oil-importing developing countries widened from \$64 billion to an unprecedented \$83 billion last year. At the same time, as their exports continued to fall their terms of trade deteriorated for the fourth year running.

Meanwhile, the GATT study points out that the current account deficit of the oil-importing developing nations has risen almost eight-fold since 1973 — a period that coincides with the meteoric increases in oil prices imposed by the 13-nation cartel, the Organisation of Petroleum-Exporting Countries (OPEC).

This phenomenon was all the more worrying because it had come about despite a marked restriction or even a reduction in imports by many of these victims of the so-called energy crisis.

The UNCTAD report also links the Third World's current economic malaise with the soaring cost of oil and the ensuing global recession.

Thus, says the UNCTAD document, the Third World is facing its gravest economic crisis since the great depression of the inter-war years.

It is not "simply a set of poor growth figures for one or two years", but the "progressive alteration of the international environment in ways that narrow the range of feasible policies open to developing countries".

The report suggests that Third World Nations could alleviate the situation by trading more amongst themselves and by cutting their military spending. But most observers agree that it is the projected global negotiations on economic problems which offer the best hope of overcoming the crisis.

Apart from the harbour and a few factories in Mombasa, the Coastal area is one mass of economic misery compounded by a frustrating dearth of job opportunities, and therefore tourism comes in as a salvation to this economic imbalance.



Exploring underwater wonders off the Kenya North Coast reefs ...

# Down In The Deep

If you fancy doing some underwater exploration "James Bond" style, then Seafarer's Hotel, Watamu, is the place to be for Lorenz Riedl, popularly known as "Lenz" has an underwater scooter based there for exploring the Vuma and Mida Creek caves.

The scooter is probably the only one of its kind on the Kenya Coast and Lenz, who holds an international diving licence, runs the Scuba Diving Centre there.

He is one of the most experienced divers on the Kenya Coast.

Lenz hails from Bavaria and has been diving for 23 years in areas which have included the Red Sea, Atlantic, Mediterranean, north and east seas.

He has been a diving teacher for 16 years, and has been diving along the Kenya coast for 8 years now.

He runs the largest diving centre on Kenya's north coast, which can fully equip fifty scuba divers at a time. In addition, he has three compressors, two special diving boats and underwater cameras, for Lenz takes some of the most beautiful underwater photographs to be found.

He not only teaches scuba diving, but is attracting many diving clubs from Switzerland, France, Nigeria, Germany, Austria and the UK some of whom keep returning year after year.

According to Lenz, the best place for diving is in Watamu area because of the coral caves. There are also some super underwater islands and many colourful fish.

There is a canyon on the north reef of the outside with black coral which is really quite fantastic.

He said that visitors find the diving full of adventure with manta ray, whale shark and lots of turtle around.

In fact, Lenz sometimes hitches a lift on the turtle's back when in not too much hurry to reach land again.

He also organises excursions to underwater caves at Mida Creek and Vuma. At the former live many large grouper which are protected by the Kenya Government. Said Lenz, their habitat can only be reached on a neap tide at high water, which means they can only be visited about four days in a month.

The Vuma Caves are huge and deep, and are part of an overhanging cliff where there is no reef. It is the only one of its kind on the Kenya Coast. However, said Lenz "they are only for very experienced

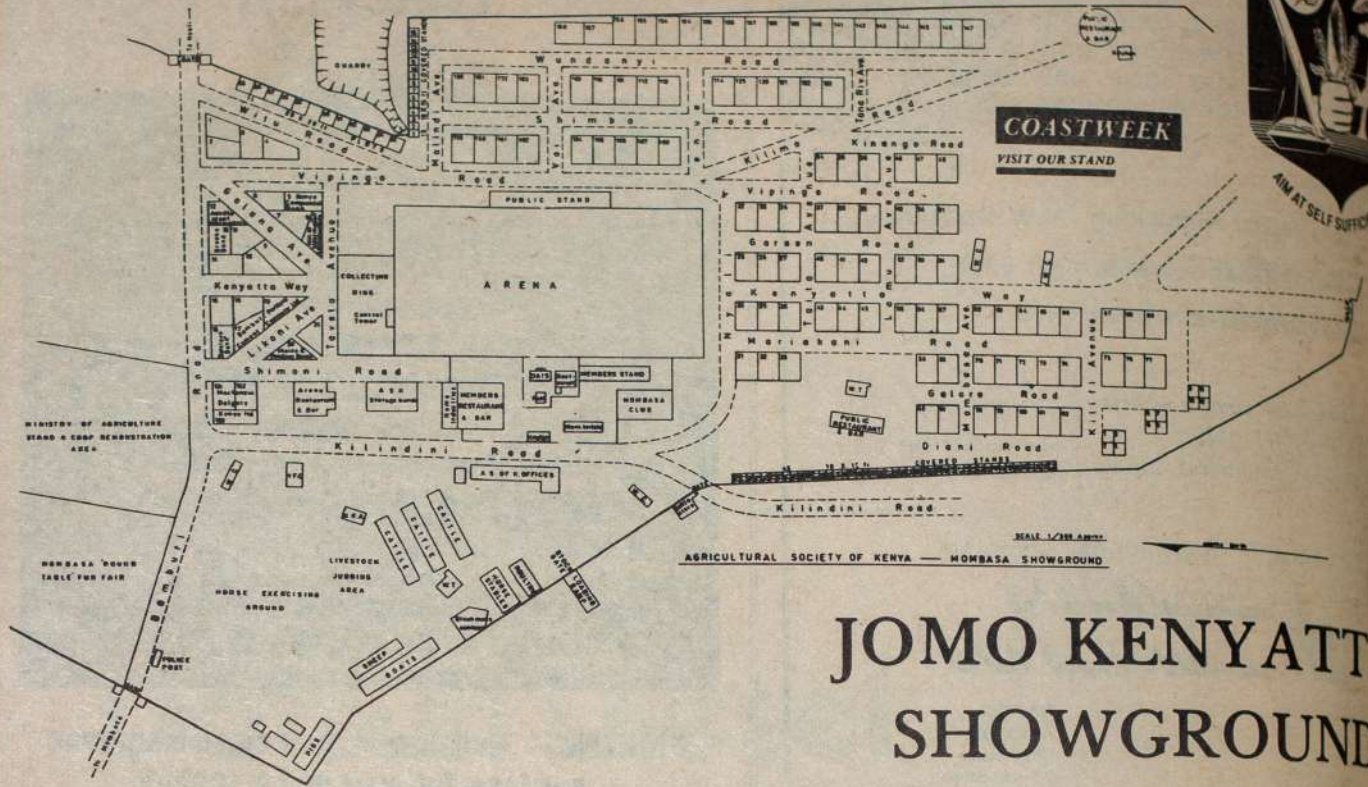

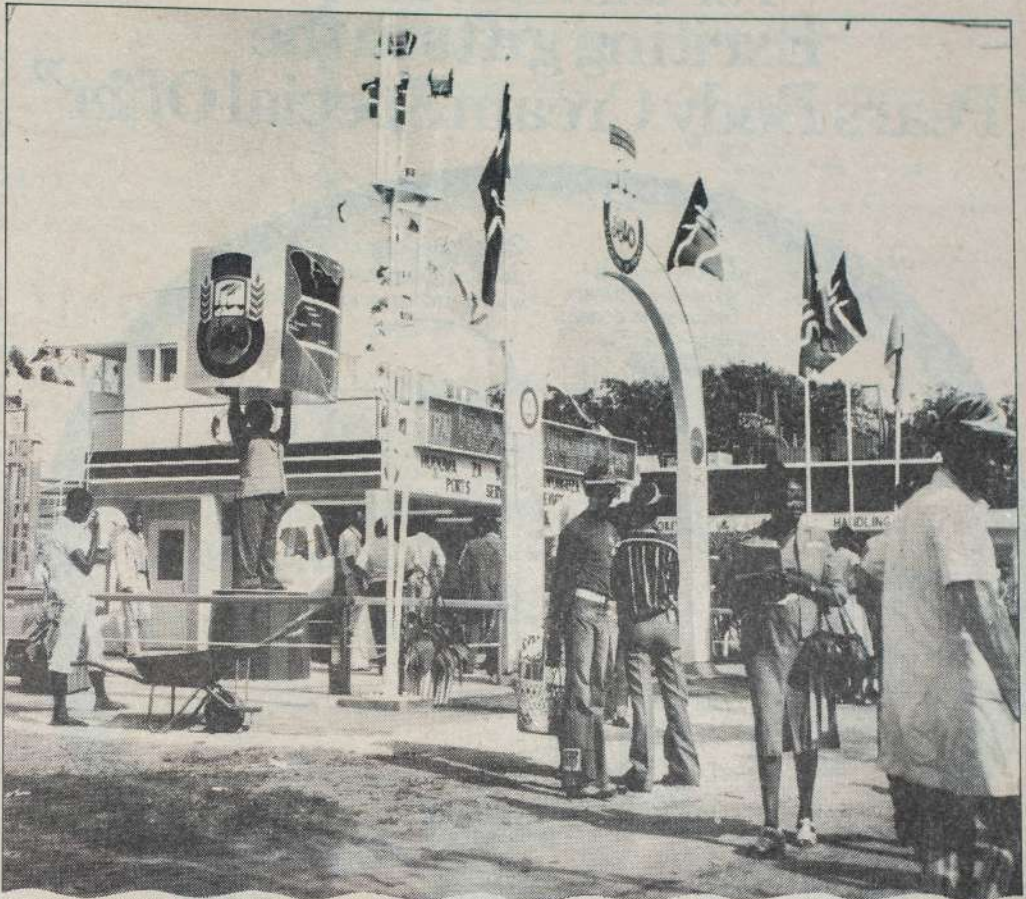

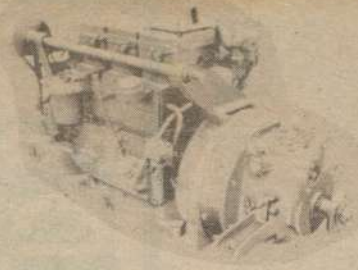

# CELEBRATING UNIQUE YEAR

1982 Mombasa National Show is just around the corner. The people from all walks of life in the Province have been gripped by the usual show fever. In addition the Districts are very busy preparing in order to display the best to the show patrons. The districts also are aiming at capturing "Daudi Galgalo Cup" for the best displayed district and the one that will be able to interpret the show theme properly.

This year will be a unique one in the History of Mombasa ASK Show. Under the leadership of the Coast Provincial Commissioner, the districts have been requested to expand their participation. So the districts are to organise themselves under the leadership of the District Commissioners. That way all the Ministers plus the private sector in each district will have a chance to show what they are capable of doing.

The Coast Province experienced an improved weather conditions particularly the long rains which in 1981 and 1982 came on time. Also due to increased producer prices farmers responded very positively to "Grow More Food Campaign" that has been going on in the province. Looking at the results of that campaign one sees a success story in all the districts.

Over 65,800 ha were planted with maize compared to only 41,700 ha planted in the previous year. The yield has been approximately 1,188,000 bags which is equivalent to 106,920 tons of grains. During the same period about 2,600 ha of rice were planted compared to about 1,400 ha in 1980. Pulses realised a total of 12850 ha yielding about 8,200 tons of beans. The province has also 8,320 ha of Cassava which produced 154,000 tons.

In addition to "Grow More Food Campaign" the district campaigned for "Food Crop Diversification Programme". A number of crops were emphasised viz sorghum, millet and sweet potatoes. All these crops covered an area of about 1,549 ha of these indigenous crops. To avert famine these crops must be encouraged and promoted. The district are all set to show their efforts towards this end.

The Coast Province does not have very many cash crops. However the available cash crops showed a marked improvement. The hectare under cotton rose from 8,500 ha in 1980 to 10,400 ha to date. This earned all the districts a total of Kshs 13 million. Simsim increased up to 8500 ha from 6,630 ha in the past year. Coffee production though not grown in all the districts increased to 98.14 tons and earned the farmers of Taita/Taveta Kshs 122,462. The total income from the coastal fruits was very substantial. Bananas, mangoes, oranges, and other citrus fruits, pineapples and other fruits brought to the Province more than KE10 million. The districts grew vegetables to the tune of 1,770 ha earning the farmers about KSh 2.1 million.

### DEVELOPMENTS

The Integrated Agriculture Developments Programme II which as one of the major activities was extended to cover all the districts in the Coast. This Particular programme covers about 25 Farmers Co-operative Societies and one Co-operative Union which is in Kilifi District. Although the programme continued to experience problems it is hoped that all the districts in the Province will fight to reduce these problems. The objective is to service the farmers more effectively so that more food



can be produced. Irrigation continued to play a major role in the Province. The lower Tana Valley Irrigation Project since its completion 6 years at a total cost of Kshs 20.7 million. Other schemes include Sabaki irrigation project and Taveta Irrigation Programme. After these schemes are operational it is envisaged that the Province will be growing in big proportions of the rice requirements and other types of food stuffs.

Self-sufficiency in food production is now complete unless a mention is made of soil and water conservation measures. The soil conservation week which was initiated and launched by H. E. President was highly successful with people from all walks of life taking part. During the year over 1,600 farmers were trained under this project. More than 20,021 metres of grass drains, 157 units of pits, 22,770 metres of furrows, 25,000 metres of tree line were constructed during the year. About 39,500 seedlings were raised and the farmer released 17,802 seedlings.

The efforts towards self-sufficiency in food production were possible through group extension methods. The number of women groups who participated increased from 225 to 291 with a total of 10,111 members. Rural youth groups also increased from 125 to 198 with 5,534 members in 1981/82. It is very evident that the Province has put a lot of efforts towards realising self-sufficiency in the food production. The show-goers will witness this effort by the districts.

## Easing Flow Of Traffic

ONCE again the highlights of the most talked of event in the country with us, the Coast ASK branch opens gates to welcome on August 26, 1982 in Mombasa being the side-show in Eastern and Central Africa has every one's eyes focussed in the years Mombasa National Show.

This year theme is "Aim At Self-sufficiency". The grass roots committee which is entrusted with the responsibility of collecting money has had a very elaborate and ambitious programme for this year. The yearly problems of congestion at the gates has been meticulously solved. With the help of the planning committee we have increased the entry points by 150 per cent. There is therefore going to be a very easy flow of traffic and entrance into the showground.

Some of the other events that will be seen in the Arena will include a silent drill by the Kenya Police, Acrobats, display of fish, grand parade of livestock Samosa and Mike Power the strongmen, mass ngomas, mass chess by schools children and team drill PE, by a primary school.

The Mombasa Motor Club will be bringing in a lot of riders



for their dare devil motor cycle events, and a group from Nairobi is expected to perform the famous Silh Danch the "Bhangra".

The Arena committee, as you will see, has put a lot of work in making the Arena events as exciting as possible. I can only assure all those who will come to the show that you will not be disappointed once you have seen the events.

# ENORMOUS POTENTIAL FOR AGRICULTURE AT COAST

COAST Province had a total of 16,000 high grade dairy cows, 763,483 beef cattle, 245,947 sheep, 781,206 goats, 617 pigs, 1,719 camels, 6,916 donkeys, 5,043 rabbits and 1,093,180 poultry. Dairy cows are concentrated on the high lands of Taita Hills, Kilifi, Malindi and Kwale. Few numbers of high grade cows can also be seen in Lamu Island, Lake Kenyatta Settlement Schemes and Vitu Division.

The Ministry of Livestock Development is however, charged with the responsibility of providing extension services to livestock producers with special emphasis on Improving Livestock Management practices.

The Ministry is also charged with the responsibility of initiating and implementing Livestock Development Programmes in high and low potential areas aimed at demonstrating better methods of production. Some of the objectives in an effort to attain self-sufficiency and a surplus for export market include:

- Education to small scale dairy farmers.
- Education to sheep and goats farmers.
- Poultry production.



- Rabbit multiplication, Bee-keeping and production.
- Pig production.

## DAIRY INDUSTRY

Zero grazing is being encouraged on highly concentrated areas like the highlands of Kilifi, Kwale and Taita. More than 20 zero grazing units have been put up in the province under the National Dairy Development Project. Small scale dairy farmers are now able to see the feeding and other management practice in Taita, Kilifi and Kwale.

Integrated Agricultural Development Programme IADP is in full support of fodder bulking and multiplication at the farmers' level. Since inception of this project about two years ago, more than 50 farm demonstrations have been implemented. We hope to have more than double the production of milk from 250,000 litres to 500,000 litres and that of dairy cows from 16,000 to 24,000 by

the end of IADP project.

The Ministry cannot also forget to mention the Bull Schemes which are meant for the areas where A.I. does not exist/reach. The bulls upgrade the local Zebu for meat and milk as the area may dictate i.e. Ayrshire or Friesian while in the semi arid areas, we are wholly going for the beef breeds i.e. Sahiwal or Boran bulls.

## BEEF INDUSTRY

Coast Province has a total of 30 operating ranches at different capacities. Some of these ranches are presently operating at 80 per cent capacity while others are at about 10 per cent capacity because of poor water distribution or heavy bush density coupled with tsetse fly infestation. These ranches assume different status viz Private Company, Directed Agricultural Companies, Co-

operatives, Group, Partnership or Individual ranches.

There are a total of 57 identified ranches covering an area of approximately 1.7 million hectares and with closer to 80,000 head of cattle. Range Management Division of the Ministry of Livestock Development has and is still concentrating on exploiting the potential in the non-operating ranches and also increasing the existing stock in the operating ranches. This can only be accomplished by removing constraints such as provision of water and its even distribution, clearing of bush in those areas with heavy tsetse fly infestation, provision of immatures and checking on stock theft especially in Lamu District currently and a campaign to have the local people increase their equity contribution in the ranches where they are shareholders.

In order to diversify, the division is proposing to start mixed farming by introducing dual purpose breeds for milk and beef production. A pilot project is already in operation in Lualenyi Ranch where the milk is being sold to Salt Lick Lodge and a nearby Secondary School.

With introduction of marketing facilities the other ranches in Taita Taveta District can be incorporated into this scheme and can produce at least 3,000 litres of milk a day of assuming a herd of 100 head of milking cows per ranch. This can contribute remarkably to the School Milk Programme. Other areas of diversification is the introduction of small stock in the ranches. Ranch Development Plans worked by staff of Range Management have shown that the small stock can be profitable and will not have any adverse effect on the cattle. Already one of the ranches is specialising in this enterprise and has at present over 3,000 head of small stock. Other ranches which just started the introduction of the small stock about 2-3 years ago have built their herds to an average of 500 heads.

The Government is trying to remove some of the constraints I mentioned earlier. In response to the World Bank, it has now agreed to initially pay the cost for primary water sources installation and fire break construction in all the commercial ranches under the Livestock Development Project Phase I and II.

It has also been agreed that the Agricultural Finance Corporation should continue to finance the ranches using of Allotment as security until the process of security lease are completed. As a result of this, five ranches have already received loans in Tana River and Lamu Districts. Other have received loan efforts.

To date, ranches in Coast Province have received a total loan of approximately 42.8 million Kenya Shillings which has been used in water installation, steer purchases, fire-break construction, livestock facilities and operating capital. As a result, the ranches have had substantial sales. Records show that for the last year alone the range areas in the province sold a total of over 20,000 head of cattle which realised over 27 million Kenya shillings. They also realised 2 million shillings from sale of 18,000 head of small stock. Over half of the cattle sales came from the ranches already financed by the Livestock Development Credit.

I mentioned earlier the problem of low equity contribution. The division is trying the best it can to enlighten the shareholders of its importance and the adverse effects it can have on ranching as a business. This is not an easy task and it is my feeling that

these people who fail to see the enormous amount required should be got rid of from the business. It is difficult to operate a business with a 100 per cent borrowed funds. After all, one of the conditions are, it is to use 20 per cent in form of equity. Failure to do this will mean to financing hence the need to get rid of those that do not contribute the minimum required and insist other willing farmers.

## SHEEP AND GOATS

On sheep and goats, the Ministry of Livestock Development is giving special emphasis to breeding and multiplication of males of high genetic potential for upgrading the local stock and goats for meat production. Matuga Sheep and Goats Multiplication Centre with a target of 7,000 head of breeding stock has been established to cater for the projected future demand of the breeding males for upgrading purposes. Buchuma Research Station is also being developed as a breeding station, specializing in Galla bucks and Dorper rams for sale to farms.

## POULTRY RABBITS AND BEE-KEEPING

Other small livestock which can provide protein quickly and conveniently include rabbits and poultry. The National Poultry Development Programme implementation is in the Kikowani Farmers Co-operative Society. The pilot project is producing more than 20,000 eggs per month.

Cockerel exchange programme is also going on in Lamu District. The plans to spread it to other districts are on the pipeline. The estimated population of birds for commercial production is estimated at 450,000. Most of them come from Malindi District.

The rabbit population is estimated at 5,043. A total of 10 demonstrations have been implemented with the target groups being the 4-8 Clubs, Young Farmers Clubs and women groups. The rabbit production survey was done in Taita Taveta District in February, 1982. The initiation of rabbit development project in the Coast Province where organized marketing system is lacking. The rabbit meat which reaches the market in Mombasa fetches as much as KSh 15.50 per kilo.

On bee-keeping, a bee-keeping co-operative society has been registered in Taveta and it is our hope that production will be increased when honey refinery and a workshop are completed. The province has a big potential for bee-keeping especially within the ranches, settlement schemes and the hilly terrains which are not cultivatable.

## PIG INDUSTRY (Taita/Taveta District)

The pig breeding unit is expected to be supplying small scale producers with weaners for fattening and breeding as the need arises. The small scale pig producers will be encouraged to form a pig producers co-operative to streamline the marketing of pigs in the district. Formalization of pig slaughter slabs will be given special emphasis in promoting local consumption of pig meat in Taita Taveta District.

## ARTIFICIAL INSEMINATION

Artificial Insemination Service was started in the Coast Province in 1971 in Wundanyi Division entirely on Zebu cows. Its success can be gauged by the number of crosses and high grade cows in this division. Taita Taveta A.I. Scheme has only one A.I. Daily Run with an average of 500 insemination per month, majority being on trade cows which is very commendable as it

have occurred previously have been mild in nature and have been due to illegal movement of livestock. Vaccination is not compulsory but the farmers are always willing to vaccinate on veterinary advice.

### C.B.P.P.

Tana River and Lamu Districts are areas of maximum risk. These are quarantine areas but no cases or outbreaks have been reported for quite some time. The department has managed to control the disease through annual vaccination programme.

### C.C.P.P.

This is fairly common in goats and is the cause of quite a number of deaths. Vaccination is done though not very effective. Where possible, treatment is done.

### Tick-borne Disease

These are also very important and common in the province. East Coast Fever is the most important. It is endemic in some areas and causes quite a few deaths. Many dips sponsored by E.E.C. have been constructed and others are being constructed. This means to control the disease are available but the farmers do not always heed veterinary advice of regular dipping. The cattle should be dipped at least once a week and the dipwash should be at the correct strength. If not properly controlled, East Coast Fever can cause quite a high mortality, especially among dairy breeds.

### Rabies

Isolated cases reported in Taita Taveta and Kilifi District. Recent sporadic outbreaks accompanied by unfortunate human bites have been controlled through baitings, killing of stray dogs by shooting and vaccination. This is a deadly disease affecting both livestock and human beings and the Veterinary Department is always vigilant and always ready to control the disease whenever an outbreak occurs.

### Newcastle Disease

This disease can be deadly on unvaccinated poultry. Fortunately the department has succeeded in controlling it through regular vaccinations.

### Fowl Typhoid

Can cause a high mortality especially among chicks if control measures are not adhered to. An effective vaccine is available and regular vaccination is encouraged. The disease is under control.

### Tick Control & Clinical Services.

There are 120 cattle dips covering Taita Taveta, Kilifi and Kwale Districts. All are operational. 98 per cent of these dips were assisted by E.E.C. The small scale farmers are the users of these dips. Tick-borne disease especially East Coast Fever have been controlled in certain areas in the Province.

E.E.C. also assisted building six veterinary clinical centres, namely Wundanyi, Taveta, Kwale, Kilifi, Hola and Mkowa in Lamu. Four of them are now operational except Hola which is about to start operating and Mkowa which is now under construction.

### Livestock Research

Livestock Research activities are going on at Bachuma Range Research Station, Mariakani Animal Production Station, Matuga Sheep and Goat Multiplication Station, Ukunda Veterinary Research Station and Mtwapa.

Bachuma Range Research Station has been a source of important information for the ranches. It is currently supplying improved males to small scale farmers and ranches. The main experiments are now on sheep, goats, cattle, Range Management Ecological Studies and Grazing Management Studies.

Other experiments on sheep and goats are done at Matuga. Mariakani and Mtwapa are dealing with dairy research while Ukunda Veterinary Research Station deals with Livestock diseases research.

compares well with average A.I. Runs up country. There are proposals to extend the services to Taveta and Voi Divisions due to public demand.

The A.I. Services have since been extended to Kwale, Mombasa and Kilifi A.I. Schemes between 1977 and 1978. The progress is slow but steady. The schemes record in average of 100 inseminations per month on average. The services are confined to the high potential areas covering Shimba Hills, Kilifi Southern Division and the Coastal Belt from Msambweni in Kwale to Gongoni in Kilifi District. The cattle dips built with the assistance from European Economic Community are mainly along the daily runs. Many more are still under construction in the northern areas of Kilifi. The World Bank and IADP Phase II has also financed the construction of roadside crushes which is still in progress. Lamu District has two static points at Witu and Kipini.

However to achieve self-sufficiency in milk production by upgrading the predominant Zebu cows through A.I. apart from the extension work going on by the field staff, since the cattle area communally grazed watered and dipped, there is need for bull castration at the dips along the daily run. Here the assistance and support of the Provincial Administration will be of great importance. This done together with control of various diseases to reduce calf mortality and trypanosomiasis, consumption with surplus for sale and in the long run raise their standard of living.

### ANIMAL DISEASES

The Veterinary Department in the Coast Province is mainly concerned with control and treatment.

### Trypanosomiasis

This is the commonest and the most important disease affecting livestock and especially cattle in Coast Province. It is endemic and controllable. Where farmers fail to effect prophylactic measures as advised by Veterinary Department, poor bodily condition and eventual deaths are expected.

The common drugs in use are:—Ninidium Bromide, Ethidium Bromide, Berenil, and Samarin.

The disease is important in that it retards growth and greatly interferes with weight gains. It also emaciation.

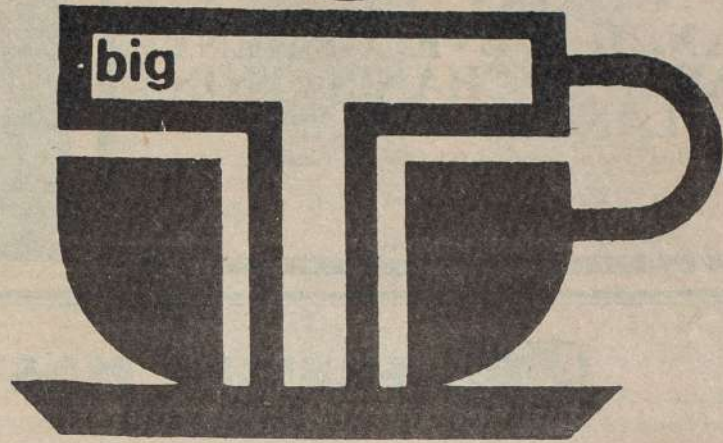

WATERZOOI is a Flemish dish which is sometimes referred to as to water-souchet or spelled "Waterzootji" and has some analogy with the Cotriade of the Breton fishermen, but which is solid food rather than a soup and is traditionally eaten with a spoon.

In Holland and Belgium it is

equivalent to a bouilliabaise but naturally saffron, garlic or tomatoes are omitted. Although it bears the name of a fish dish it is occasionally made with chicken instead.

The word itself means "water on the boil" and both chicken and fish lend themselves particularly to this delicate means of preparation. Fish and chicken are prepared on a vegetable base though these may vary; wine may be included but it is not detrimental when left out, the flavour is slightly altered but it is just as delicious and the broth is thickened with egg yolks and cream before serving.

Furthermore the resulting dish is splendidly practical because you have a soup and main course served in one fell swoop nor is it expensive to prepare.

Elegant enough for guests as well as simple enough for an everyday meal its pallid appearance reflects the delicacy of flavour. Any of the many palatable white fish available in Mombasa is suitable for use — try the inclusion of scampi or small langoustine too as a subtle change of flavour.

be set aside for another use. Remove the scard and skin and bones from the bird with a sharp knife. Cut the meat into 2 inch strips and inch wide.

Strain the entire contents of the pan through a fine sieve over a large heavy casserole, pressing down hard on the vegetables with a back of a spoon before discarding them.

Let the liquid rest for a few minutes, then skim again discarding as much fat from the surface as possible. Boil briskly uncovered until the liquor is reduced to 4 pints. Turn the heat to low. When the soup is barely simmering, beat the egg yolks and cream with a whisk or fork and pour it onto the soup in a thin stream, stirring all the while.

Add the strips of chicken and continue to stir the waterzooi until it thickens slightly and the chicken is heated through. Do not allow the soup to come anywhere near the boil or it will curdle. Add lemon juice to taste check seasoning.

Serve at once from the heated tureen to individual soup plates.

In this version wine and butter which are often included in the fish version is omitted —

but this is not in any way detrimental

### HUSS WATERZOOI

- 1 lb husk of the bone
- 2 pints water, plus more parsley stalks, peppercorns, salt and bay leaf
- 2 sticks celery chopped
- 1lb carrots cut in 2 inch strips
- 1 lb leeks cut in 2 inch strips
- 1/4 pint double cream
- 3 egg yolks
- 8 small new potatoes
- chopped parsley

Make a stock with the fish bone, herbs and peppercorns. Allow to simmer for 2 hours. Discard herbs and bones and put into the boiling water the fish cut in large pieces, leeks and celery. Cook on a low heat for 20 minutes.

Meanwhile whip together the cream and egg yolks and add yellow and thick to appearance. Boil the "little potatoes" separately so that all are ready together.

When the fish and vegetables are ready remove from the heat and stir in the cream. Transfer the potatoes to a warmed soup tureen with a hot butter, pour the fish and vegetables over these.

Scatter freshly chopped parsley over the top and serve at once. Soup plates are available for this dish. 2/3

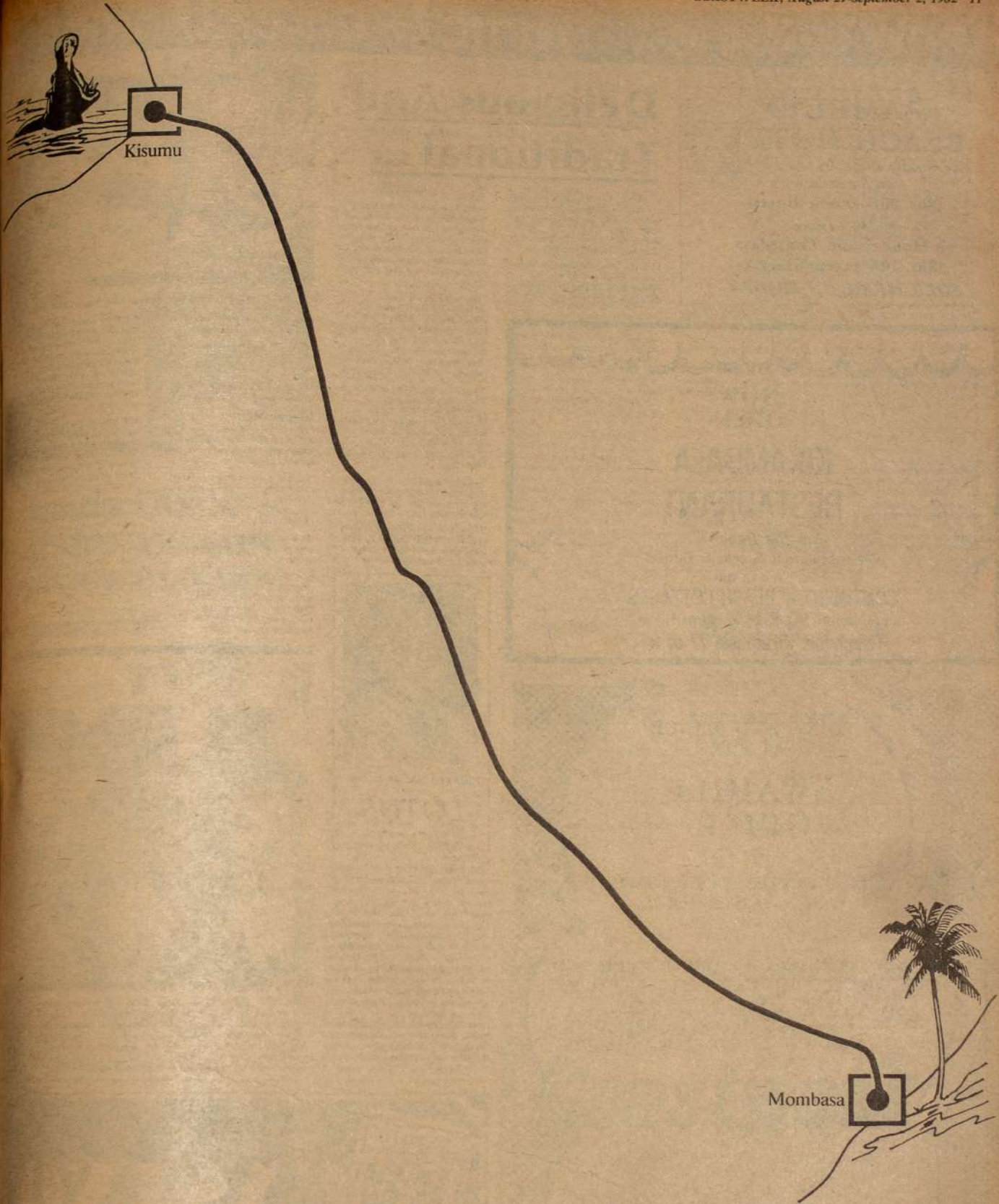

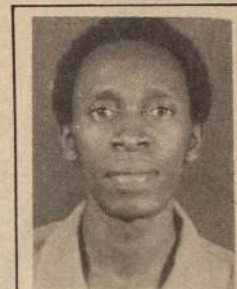

# MOMBASA SHOW 1982

VOM 26. bis 29. August findet auf dem Ausstellungsgelände in Nyali die 16. Mombasa Show statt. Veranstalter dieser Landwirtschaftsausstellung ist der Landwirtschaftsverband, der dieses Jahr das Jubiläum seines 80-jährigen Bestehens feiern kann. Um diesen Anlaß festlich zu begehen, wurden am 21. August in Ngũgũ-Tatu, einer von der Erosion stark betroffenen Gegend nördlich von Mombasa, während einer offiziellen Zeremonie 80 Bäume gepflanzt.

Der Weg zur Ausstellung ist in der ganzen Stadt gut markiert, so daß ihn jeder interessierte Besucher leicht finden kann. Von Mombasa herkommend, biegt man nach der neuen Nyali-Brücke rechts ab und folgt der neuen, breiten Straße, wo sich auf beiden Seiten und oft auch auf der Fahrbahn demonstrativ immer ein paar Ziegen aufhalten, wahrscheinlich um den Automobilisten deutlich zu zeigen, daß es hier entlang geht zur Landwirtschaftsausstellung.

Das Thema der Mombasa Show 1982 - heißt "Selbstversorgung anstreben". Die insgesamt 270 Stände in Nyali, 50 mehr als letztes Jahr, sollen jetzt auf seine Weise dieses Thema zum Ausdruck bringen.

Man erwartet über 200.000 Besucher, hauptsächlich einheimische Farmer und Geschäftsleute aus Nairobi und aus anderen Landesteilen. Man würde es auch sehr begrüßen, wenn sich viel mehr Touristen an der Ausstellung einfänden würden, wo sie sich richtig unter das Volk mischen können und einen aufschlußreichen Einblick erhalten mit vielen interessanten Anschauungsbeispielen quer durch Kenia's Landwirtschaft und Industrie.

Kenia ist wie die meisten Entwicklungsländer ein Agrarland. Der Export von Kaffee und Tee (an dritter Stelle steht immer noch der Tourismus, gefolgt von anderen Farmprodukten, bringt dem Land die bedeutendsten Deviseneinnahmen, die so dringend benötigt werden. Die Regierung empfiehlt nachdrücklich den intensiveren Anbau von Getreide und anderen landwirtschaftlichen Erzeugnissen, um möglichst bald das Ziel der Selbstversorgung mit Nahrungsmitteln zu erreichen.

Am Stand des Landwirtschaftsministeriums wird erklärt, daß die Versuchsstation in Mtwaya den Farmern unentgeltlich behilflich ist, ertragreichere Ernten zu erzielen. Gegenwärtig bringt eine Hektare nur etwa 500-600 kg Mais; durch veredeltes Saatgut sollte der Ertrag auf 2000 kg erhöht werden können und die Versuchsstation hat sich für Ende 1983 zum Ziel gesetzt, durch wirkungsvollere Düngemittel und gezielte Schädlingsbekämpfung pro Hektar 3000 kg Mais zu ernten.

### MANIOKWURZELN

Es wird auch angeregt, daß die Farmer nicht nur ihre Hauptnahrungsmittel Mais und Maniokwurzeln, sondern Hirse, Sorghum und Süßkartoffeln anpflanzen. Da diese Gemüsesorten bei den einheimischen Hausfrauen viel zu wenig bekannt sind, wird die Hauswirtschaftsabteilung an ihrem Stand zeigen, wie man daraus schmackhafte Gerichte zubereiten kann.

Gegenwärtig besteht eine große Nachfrage nach Baumwolle, auch für den Export. Leider wird in Kenia nicht genügend Baumwolle produziert, um diesen Bedarf zu decken, obwohl es erwiesen ist, daß man aus der in den Küstengebieten gut gedeihenden Sorte die besten Baumwollqualität Afrika's erhält.

Ein neuer Aussteller ist das Energieministerium, das sich auf regenerative Energie konzentriert. Die Erzeugung und Verwendung von Biogas wird ausführlich demonstriert. Windmühlen, die merkwürdigerweise an der windreichen Küste kaum zum Einsatz kommen, werden gezeigt und wärmstens empfohlen, ebenso mit Sonnenenergie angetriebene Pumpen.

Qualitätsmöbel, die von jugendlichen Behinderten in der Rehabilitations-Werkstatt in Likoni hergestellt werden, sind am Mackenzie-Stand ausgestellt, zusammen mit Handarbeiten aus Bombolulu, einem anderen Hilfswerk, wo Körperbehinderte handgearbeiteten Schmuck anfertigen, auf einer kleinen Farm Hühner züchten und Früchte und Gemüse produzieren, die sie zum Verkauf anbieten.

Das Rehabilitationscenter in Likoni wurde vor 10 Jahren gegründet und wird vom Deutschen Volontärdienst aktiv unterstützt. Helmut Günther fing 1972 mit 3 behinderten Lehrlingen an und bei seinem Weggang nach 4 Jahren

waren bereits deren 20 in der Schreinerei und 10 auf der Farm beschäftigt. Seit 3 Jahren sind Horst Kundinger als Administrator und Hans Schubert als Technischer Berater des Rehabilitationscenters vom Deutschen Volontärdienst eingesetzt.

Tatu on August 22 and spotted a school of killer whales. At 11.45a.m. they were one mile outside the Turning Buoy when between five and ten whales going south were within seventy five yards of them.

The crew had the whales in sight for about five minutes and the distinctive white markings were clearly visible.

We wonder if any of the seafarers have reported sightings in this area!
