30 PER CENT PROFIT ON COST

"300 MILLION WATER LOSS"

Mombasa office of the Ministry of Water Development allegedly incurred a loss of KShs. 300 million through irregular awarding of tenders, purchases of stores, equipment and through mismanagement of funds allocated to Mombasa and Water Supply projects in the province.

One of the biggest scandals in the Coast involving a government Ministry, the Mombasa office is alleged to have 'mismanaged and overspent' a total of KShs. 333,092,242 in a series of financial transactions including some 18 contracts of civil engineering works commissioned by the Ministry for various water projects in the province.

Details of this latest multi-million shillings scandal appear in the 1980-81 Public Accounts Report issued by the Auditor-General in Nairobi.

Management over control of government funds allocated to the Ministry's Mombasa office is blamed for unauthorized expenditure of KShs. 1,000,000 in respect of the construction of river intake and dam works at Baricho.

Delays in the completion of the contract, is alleged to have contributed to the escalation of the project.

Failure by the Ministry to pay the contractor's bills led to the termination of the project last year, which only cost four and a half months when the Ministry paid the outstanding amount owed to the contractor.

By September last year about of the project is reported to have cost up from the contract cost of KShs. 115,198,451 to KShs. 212,262,873, reflecting an expenditure of KShs. 100,000,000 despite the fact the project had not been completed and the likely date of its completion could not be determined.

also been reported involving 10 contracts awarded for a total value of KShs. 369,612,747/40.

The Ministry went on to pay KShs. 450,923,757/04 to various contractors leading to unauthorized overexpenditure of KShs. 81,311,009/64 on all the ten contracts awarded.

In another case of "gross financial misconduct," five contracts relating to Mombasa and Coast Water Supply projects were allegedly not awarded to the lowest tenderers and resulted in the Ministry paying KShs. 126,493,201/66 more to the highest bidder which could have been avoided if the lowest contractor's tenders had been accepted.

It is alleged that no specific reasons were given as to why the lowest tenders were rejected and Government auditors have reportedly been unable to ascertain whether due regard was given to economy and proper utilization of Government funds in awarding these contracts to tenderers whose quotations were not the lowest.

'OVER-EXPENDITURE'

In the purchase of vehicles and equipment, the Mombasa office is alleged to have spent KShs. 12 million for purchases which were not covered in the original contract values of two projects and without following the proper government financial procedures. This figure is said to include a sum of KShs. 3,417,171/30, which was described as "30 per cent profit on cost."

Among the items covered by this expenditure were four vehicles purchased in December 1980 and earth moving equipment including caterpillars and cranes valued at KShs. 4,638,100 purchased in February 1981.

The purchase of these vehicles and equipment is reported to have increased by far the original values of the contracts and the equipment was produced without seeking authority from the Treasury as required by government financial regulations.

Apparently there have been no explanations why the need for these vehicles and equipment was not foreseen and provision for their cost included in the original contracts.

It is further claimed that none of the 30 contracts (including 18 for various projects at the Coast) awarded by the Ministry of Water Development during 1980/81 was countersigned by the Permanent Secretary to the Treasury.

These contracts allegedly carried out without taking into account the availability of Government funds to finance them.

Further reports indicate that a total sum of KShs. 81,247/60 drawn out as temporary imprest has not been accounted at the Mombasa office.

At the same time loans of KShs. 25,690,280 and KShs. 28,917,500 incurred on Mzima Marere Pipelines have not been paid back despite becoming due in 1979.

President Moi Visits Sheikh Khalifa Bin Zayed Secondary

IT was a very proud moment for Kenya when President Moi symbolically laid the foundation stone of the Shs 40 million Sheikh Khalifa bin Zayed Secondary and Technical School - a gift to the people of Mombasa from the Crown Prince of Abu Dhabi, HH Sheikh Khalifa bin Zayed al Nahiyani, who is also Deputy Commander of the Armed Forces of the United Arab Emirates.

The school, which will accommodate between 900 and 1200 students from all over Kenya irrespective of race, tribe or creed, is expected to be completed by January next year, and will be the first of its kind in the coast province.

All buildings, following an Arabic style of architecture, will be painted "white". It is understood that about 70 per cent of the work is already finished. Most of the buildings are linked by a series of covered walkways so that no students need get wet when it rains.

It has a most beautiful mosque, with minaret, which can accommodate some 1200 muslims from inside and outside the school. It will be the largest at the coast, and has a mezzanine prayer area for girls.

The entrance to the mosque will have a geometric Arab style door. The Mahrab (Qibla) as is customary, faces north towards Mecca. Three onion-domed cupolas with windows give added natural light to the interior. There are also large ablution areas. Outside will be a landscape courtyard where prayers can be said on hot days.

MULTI-PURPOSE

A very large multi-purpose assembly hall to seat some 900 students has a stage and projection facilities for the showing of films.

Apart from the 24 classrooms, where girls and boys will be taught separately, there are chemistry, biology and physics laboratories, as

well as automotive, electrical and carpentry workshops.

Recreational facilities are being provided include soccer, hockey, volleyball and netball.

The campus has separate boarding accommodation for 200 boys and 100 girls with dining and common rooms, kitchens and laundries. There is also a dining pavilion and tuck shop thoughtfully provided for day pupils. A large library is situated next to the mosque.

A curriculum for the school has been laid down by Kenya's Ministry of Education, while one for Islamic studies has been drawn up by learned Muslims educationists in Kenya.

LABORATORIES

The Ministry of Education has also advised on equipment for the laboratories, as well as on the size of classrooms and the maximum number of students each will take.

The administration buildings include offices for the Principal and school secretary, as well as a teachers common room and secretariat. There is also accommodation for teachers, and a spacious house for the principal.

Built on 40 acres of land allocated by the Kenya Government and adjacent to the Mombasa Industrial Training Centre, Bamburi Road, the school is being administered by the Board of Trustees - six from Abu Dhabi and five from Kenya.

The Kenyan trustees are Sheriff Nassir, MP for Mombasa Central; Said Hemed, MP for Mombasa North; Rajab Sumba Mayor of Mombasa; Kherrmohamed Ali, a prominent businessman, and Ahmed Abdulla, Deputy Governor of the Central Bank of Kenya.

Chairman is Dr. Ezzeddin Ibrahim, Cultural Advisor to the President of the United Arab Emirates, while the

deputy chairman is the Mayor of Mombasa, Dr. Ezzeddin is also President of the U.A.E University.

Plans for the school were drawn up by Sir Alexander Gibbs and Partners, while the contractors are Mistry Velji Shamji and Co. Ltd.

With a shortage of secondary vocational schools at the coast, the Sheikh Khalifa bin Zayed Secondary and Technical School will fill a most urgent need, and is most impressive

contribution towards the development of the Kenya nation.

ADVANTAGES

It will also enable students while at secondary school to combine their academic studies with career training, thus giving them a great advantage over many others who on leaving secondary schools often find themselves ill equipped to compete on the labour market against hundreds of job seekers.

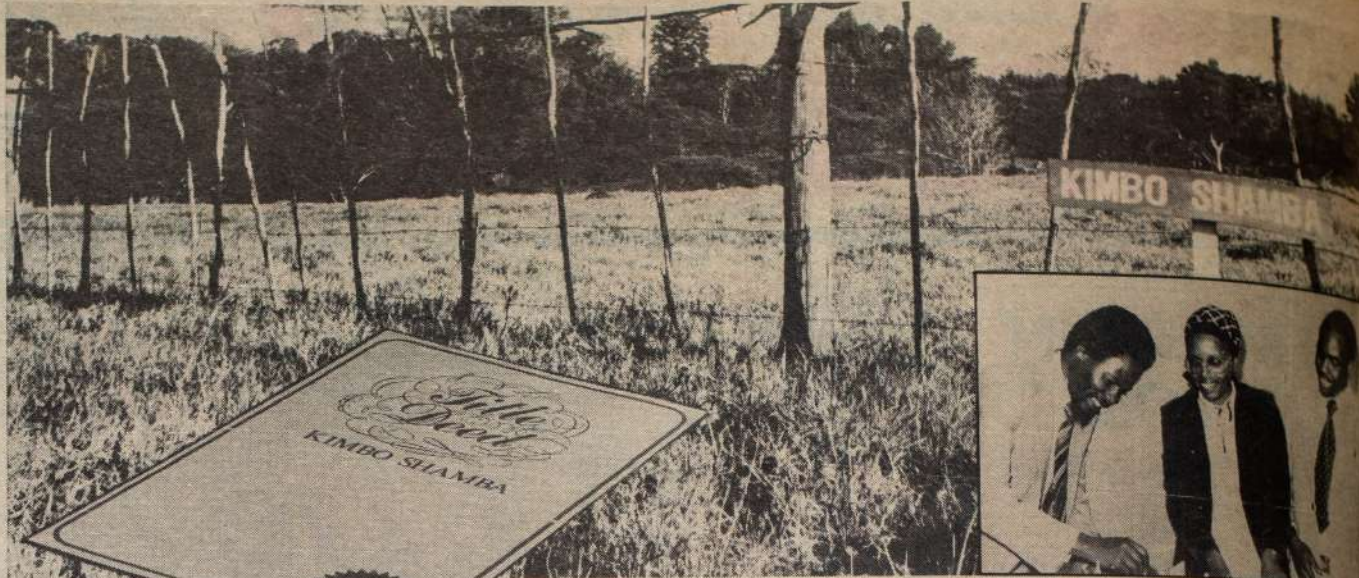

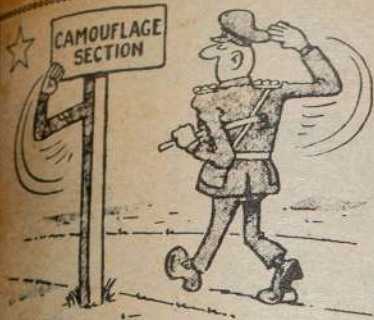

AIR TANZANIA MAKES A BOLD MOVE INTO THE MIDDLE EAST

AN Air Tanzania Corporation ATC Boeing 737 aircraft is expected to touch down tomorrow at Dubai International Airport on its maiden flight to the United Arab Emirates UAE. The fully booked 110 passenger flight will leave Dar es Salaam at 9 a.m. E.A. time and will arrive at Dubai at 6.30 p.m. UAE time after stop-overs in Djibouti and Muscat, the Sultanate of Oman.

After spending the night at Dubai, it will leave on Sunday at 11 a.m. UAE time and return to Dar es Salaam via Muscat, Djibouti and Zanzibar where a lot of passengers — mainly ex-Zanzibaris of Omani and Arab origin will disembark.

The past two flights to Muscat have been fully booked with many passengers either being forced to travel first class or to postpone their travel by a further week.

One wonders what will happen when passenger traffic starts "catching up" from Dubai, for travel agents from Dubai and Muscat feel that ATC may have

to operate bi-weekly flights to these two sectors as the two Boeings SERENGETI and KILIMANJARO are their largest capacity aircraft on their 11 aircraft fleet.

ATC has a sole monopoly on the Muscat sector following the withdrawal of Somali Airlines flights on this route, but she will have to compete from this week onwards with Pakistan International Airlines PIA on the Dubai sector. ATC however cannot pick passengers from Muscat to Dubai as she has no traffic rights on this route.

Exploitation at the Kiwira coalfields in Tukuyu, Southern Tanzania, has begun following the signing of a 750 million shillings (Dollars 82 million) agreement between Tanzania and The People's Republic of China.

Pulp And Paper

The Agreement entails the exploitation of the Mine and the building of an access road and bridge over the Kiwira River which links the Mine and Tukuyu-Kyela Road.

Reserves at the Mine are understood to be around 50 million tonnes and by 1986 it is expected to cater for industrial projects within the area including the giant Mufindi Pulp and Paper Mill, tea and tobacco curing and will offer a suitable substitute for tree felling. It is also expected to avail 1,120 people of work.

Geological surveys began way back in 1975 following the availability of a 525 million shillings (Dollars 58 million) interest free loan by the Chinese Government. Samples of coal were "tripped" over by Chinese workers constructing the 1,860 kms Tanzania Zambia Railway from Dar es Salaam to Kapin Mposhi.

Tazara transported more than 33,000 tonnes of copper since March as opposed to 22,000 tonnes during the previous six months. An official attending a Tazara Board meeting in Dar es Salaam noted that the situation will improve next month with the arrival of two locomotive engines to strengthen the low power of the locos. The remaining 14 will arrive next year bringing the total number of engines to 96.

The Iringa Region Agricultural Development Project (IRADEF) is to receive 42.1 million shillings aid from the European Economic Community. Sectors which will benefit from this aid include Livestock Keeping, Agriculture and Feeder Roads.

Shinyanga region leaders and officials of the state-owned Livestock Development Authority (LIDA) were given a surprise jolt by President Nyerere when he inspected construction on a meat canning plant in the town.

Foundation Stone

Mwalimu Nyerere who laid the Plant's foundation stone in 1975 told the leaders that he was not satisfied with the various reasons advanced by the officials for delaying the project scheduled for completion in 1978. "What did you call me here for?" he asked, adding that there was no development since he laid the foundation stone.

The Shinyanga plant together with a similar proposed unit in

Mbeva and the renovation of the Kawe plant in Dar es Salaam under the umbrella of Tanganyika Factors Limited launched through UNCTAD World Bank loans in 1975.

Construction is being done by one of the Country's building contractors — Construction. One reason understood for the delayed construction is a backlog in payments by UNCTAD Contractors.

Two conservation experts expressed concern over the deteriorating of building structures at the coastal town of Bagamoyo in Dar es Salaam.

The Director of Antiquities Mr. A. Mturi, noted that the town's conservation work has been deteriorating for the last 60 years and the need for conservation action is urgent. Samahani Kelele added that no action is taken since some of the buildings dating back to the 13 century will collapse.

The Kaole ruins, 100 kms from the town is crumbling due to poor communication. Banditry is barring tourists from visiting the place. Bagamoyo originally Bagamoyo (Down Your Heart) was a starting point of the early slave traders and British explorers and missionaries messrs David Livingstone, Stanley and John Speke.

Roman Catholicism was introduced in Tanzania in 1880 the same town which was the Capital of Tanzania was land during the German Colonial era when it was known as German East Africa. Bagamoyo is also famous for its well-brass-studded Arab divas who plundering forced the Government to pass a law preserving these historical items.

The British Government has donated books worth 42,000 shillings to the Ministry of National Education for the Country's Teacher Training Colleges (Colleges of Teacher Education) Under a Teacher British Cooperation education, 37 Tanzanian teachers are attending courses in Britain while British teachers are studying various educational institutions.

More Diplomas

President Nyerere in capacity as Chancellor of University of Dar es Salaam awarded degrees and diplomas to 1,025 graduates. These included 755 with first class 114 Advanced Diploma Masters Degrees and 15 of Philosophy degrees.

Earlier in the week University's Governing Council promoted 15 academic associate professorships and professors. These include Tanzanians, five Indians, Briton and one American.

The World Bank has granted Tanzania 21 million dollars for the rehabilitation and sewerage sanitation and sewage disposal of the Dar es Salaam Council. An independent management is to be established to implement the project. A branch of the Tanzania Commonwealth Society has been opened in the town.

Tanzania will exhibit glass frames, handloom woven, canned fruits, water tap shoe eyelets and copper Rural Development Fair Exhibition at Harare Zimbabwe, next month. Articles and hand made items will also be on display.

Chinese experts have drawn a new master plan for Zanzibar Town. The plan was shown to the Vice President Mr. Aboud Jumbe, who is the President of Zanzibar.

MILLIONS TO RURAL PROJECTS

The United States is to donate Shs. 44 million (U.S. dollars 4 million) to assist Kenya's national rural health and family planning project, it has been confirmed by the U.S. Embassy in Nairobi.

This aid is part of a program funded jointly by the Ministry of Health, the International Development Association, UNICEF, UNFPA, and the aid agencies of Denmark, Sweden and the United Kingdom.

Taken together the joint donor contribution will total Shs. 674 million (U.S. 61.3 million)

The Government of Kenya will provide Shs. 148 million of the total contribution.

Mr. Harris Mule, Permanent Secretary, Ministry of Finance, signed for the Government of Kenya and Charge d'Affairs Robert G. Houdek and USAID Director, Allison B. Herrick signed for the United States.

This grant will strengthen the program of information and education on population and family planning at the National Council on Population and Development in the Ministry of Home Affairs.

USAID will fund some expenses of the Council and cover information and education activities on family life education.

The agreement signed in Nairobi this week is part of an overall U.S. development assistance program to Kenya that will total more than Shs. 590 million (U.S. Dollars 53.6 million) this year.

'Drought Fear'

VOI (K.N.A.) — Over 27,000 heads of cattle in the 13 operational ranches in Taveta District are threatened by a severe drought if rains fail to come soon. A survey carried has showed that most of the ranches especially those on the South Western part of the District which had adequate pastures following the May/April rains have been nearly turned into semi deserts after the current dry spell which began early June.

BRITISH COUNCIL DEVELOPMENT AID

MOMBASA (K.N.A.) — The British Council will continue operating with the Kenya Government in various fields of Development, the councils representative in the country, Mr. Derrick Aspinall, has said. Mr. Aspinall gave the pledge during the official opening of a week-long teaching aid in service course for Primary School teachers in Mombasa.

'Beware Of Those Cut-Rate Freight'

THE SHIPPERS Council of Singapore has issued a stern warning to its members to select their carrying vessels carefully and to weigh the advantages between freight savings against risk of unreliability.

The same warning can well apply to East Africa where exporters can be won over through being enticed by tantalising low rates of freight only to find out subsequently that the carrying vessel should have been scrapped years ago, and that if the shippers cargo does fortuitously reach the destination the ship has called at umpteen ports with the voyage time drastically extended, and likely damage to the cargo.

It frequently pays to ship your cargo with regular liner companies in well founded ships, even if a little extra has to be paid by way of freight.

Of the world's merchant fleets by flag Greece heads the list followed by Russia, Liberia, Panama, Japan and the United Kingdom. Those are the top six placings.

Both Panama and Liberia are flags of convenience or also known as free flags so, in fact, the actual ownership of vessels flying those flags are more often than not U.S.A. Greece or Far East interests.

The number of laid up vessels worldwide is on the increase. In August the number was 987 which was 126 more than in July, and represent a 100 per cent increase compared to August 1981.

Large tonnages of bulk fertilisers continue to be worked in Kilindini, the Greek vessel *Katerina* completed discharge at No 1 berth on Monday whilst the other current Greek discharger *Dimitris* was due to complete at No 8 berth yesterday.

Due yesterday was the 8 year old Philippine flag *Salvia Star* bringing another 9,000 tons this consignment in bags. On Sunday the *Altair* is due with another 1,000 tons in bags.

The damage to cargo in the German owned, Cyprian flag, vessel *Hilda Wesch* discharging at No. 10 was found to be not so serious after all.

The vessel was carrying a considerable tonnage of aid cargo for Burundi including powdered milk and bulgar wheat, when fire was discovered as she was nearing the South African coast but was soon extinguished. She sailed on Tuesday after discharging all damaged and undamaged cargo.

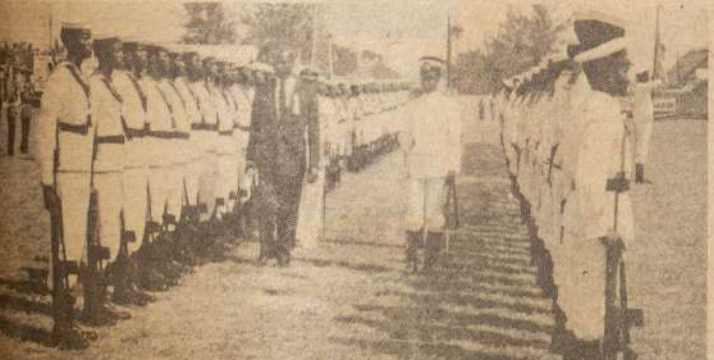

ERROL ON FOOD

AS Jane Grigson, the eminent cookery writer and author of *The Mushroom Feast* observes, the word *Quiche* is overused these days. It should really be kept for open tarts originating (it is widely thought) from the Eastern part of France.

As an Englishwoman myself I regret to point out that one of the ruinations of the *Quiche* has been wrought by my countrymen. One cannot even blame the Common Market, it has come about because the fine French concept of a *quiche* has been spoiled by the substitution of milk for cream and the unnecessary addition of heavy, floury sauces.

One wonders if this can be put down to a sense of economy — as opposed to meanness. The filling is meant to be a concoction of cream and eggs which when baked forms a delicious savoury

custard. Although the crispness, lightness and richness of the *Quiche* is not always easy to obtain it should at least be aimed for.

Quiches are best served warm rather than hot or cold and need little more than a green salad as accompaniment.

Free-baking the pastry case will help achieve crispness. The combination of eggs and cream will do the rest. The seasoning and filling ingredients are left to the imagination of the cook but should not be difficult to vary.

The exception that proves the rule is *quiche* of mushrooms and tinned mussels — a celebratory dish — the recipe for which was bestowed upon me by a French Girl many years ago. In spite of the fact that the filling does contain flour and is not a custard at all, the result is lightness itself. Mushrooms and onions also make a delicious filling; prawns and mushrooms work well too while crab *quiche* is perhaps one of the most delicious of all.

TARTE AUX MOULES BRIGITTE

This is a very good first course but it is rich, make sure that whatever follows is simple,

plain grilled fish or steak and green salad is ideal.

PASTRY

- 8 ozs plain flour
- 1 tsp icing sugar
- a good pinch of salt
- 5 ozs softened butter
- 1 egg yolk
- iced water.

Sift flour, icing sugar and salt into a mixing bowl. Rub in butter with finger tips until it resembles breadcrumbs. Mix with the egg yolk adding enough chilled water to form a dough.

Form into a ball, cover in plastic and chill in the refrigerator for half an hour. Roll out to line a flan tin or quiche tin. Bake blind (prick with a fork or weight with foil and dried beans) in a hot oven for about 20 minutes.

FILLING

- 1 tin mussels
- 2 ozs butter
- 1 tbs scant flour
- 2 tbs milk
- 1/2 pint cream
- dash of Tabasco Sauce
- 8 ozs sliced mushrooms
- Salt and pepper
- Melt 1 oz butter and blend in

the flour. Stir in the liquor from the mussels, then add the milk and cream stirring all the time. Season to taste then add a dash of tabasco, then the strained mussels and lastly the mushrooms which you have cooked lightly in the remaining butter.

Check the seasoning. Just before serving pour the sauce into the pastry shell, heat through and serve at once. Serves 6.

MUSHROOMS AND ONION QUICHE PASTRY

- 4 ozs plain flour
- Finch of salt
- 2 ozs butter
- 1 egg yolk

Combine flour and salt, add the fat and rub in as usual. The mixture should resemble fine breadcrumbs. Add egg yolk plus a little chilled water to form a dough. Allow to stand in the fridge for half an hour before rolling out. Line a flan tin — 8-10 inches with a removable base.

Prick with a fork or weight with foil and dried beans. Bake for 10-15 minutes in a hot oven until firm and lightly coloured.

FILLING

- 8 ozs mushrooms sliced
- 4 ozs onion chopped
- 2 cloves garlic chopped
- 2 ozs butter
- salt, pepper and grated nutmeg to season
- 3 egg yolks
- 1/2 pint cream
- 1 heaped tbs chopped parsley

In a frying pan, cook the mushrooms, onion and garlic in the butter for about ten minutes until all their juices have almost evaporated. Season and then spread evenly over the base of the pre-cooked pastry case. Mix eggs yolks, cream and parsley and pour over the mushroom mixture.

Bake in a moderately hot oven for 30 to 40 minutes until the custard is just firm and golden on top.

PROBABLY the only African to have established a wind-surfing centre on the Kenya coast is Twahir Abdi from Ishakani in the Lamu Archipelago, writes Neta Peal.

The Man of the Sea Wind-surfing Centre is based at Whispering Palms Hotel, Kikambala, and its fleet of eight windsurfers is soon to be complemented by four new ones from Italy.

Twahir, who has just returned from a three-month visit to the USA where he visited many windsurfing clinics there, also plans to open a scuba diving school — with equipment for 14 divers, in October.

He plans to teach scuba divers at the hotel and then take them to Mtwapa where they can dive from a boat outside the reef while on the return journey back to Whispering Palms.

By Christmas he hopes to introduce some Top Cat and Hobby Cats for sailing.

Twahir's aim is also to see a windsurfing section as part of the Kenya Olympics team. He is giving special training to his windsurfing instructor, Ali Juma, whom he considers excellent material for such a team. Twahir points out that there are several other outstanding windsurfers on the Kenya coast.

He intends contacting the

Olympics Committee in Kenya to see if there is any possibility of a windsurfing team being formed.

'NATIONAL CLUB'

Twahir also feels that with windsurfing becoming such a popular water sport in Kenya, that a branch of an international windsurfing club should be formed so that our windsurfers have the opportunity of competing internationally.

He is trying to get more Kenyans interested in this water

sport by offering attractive and reasonable prices to those who wish to learn. But Twahir warned that they must first be good swimmers.

His father was both a fisherman and farmer with Twahir, as his customary, giving a helping hand. Twahir was in the USA from 1976-81 studying agriculture where he became interested in windsurfing. It is in America that he first met his wife, Laurie, a trained nurse who is presently specialising in pediatrics.

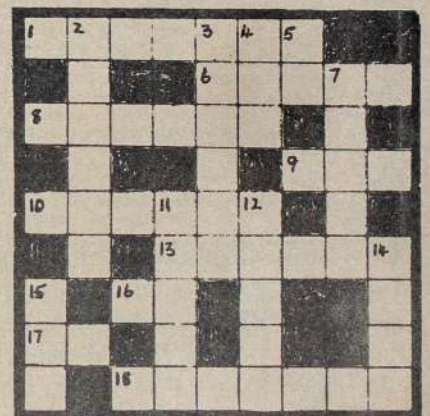

Welcome Return Of Renate And Joerg Schmekel

ENJOYING their holiday in Kenya at Whispering Palms Hotel, Kikambala, are Joerg and Renate Schmekel from Germany.

Joerg has been in a wheelchair for 22 years following a diving accident in Italy. He and his wife, Renate, were responsible for organising a gift of 21 wheelchairs to the APDK's coast branch last year which came as a blessing in disguise for handicapped people on the Kenya coast who do not have the means to buy such an

"aid" themselves.

Joerg is an auditor and works for Stiftung Rehabilitation, Heidelberg, Germany. It is the largest vocational training centre in the world catering for 1700 disabled people between the ages of 18-45 years. It offers training in 32 different professions and trades including mechanical engineering, electronics and data processing.

After qualifying and obtaining diplomas, 86 per cent go directly into jobs.

Here, many people who became disabled through accidents or other causes and are unable to carry on with their careers are re-trained for more suitable work.

Joerg described it as "a private centre, which is run on public money".

In 1980 a group of German tourists, all of whom were teachers from an academic and vocational training centre for 800 disabled children, spent a holiday in Kenya during which they visited the APDK's polio clinic at Port Reitz and the Likoni Rehabilitation Centre.

On their return to Germany they decided to help the APDK and so set up an association known as Polio Aid — Kenya.

They told their students all about their visit showing films of what the APDK is doing for young handicapped people at the coast. Such was the feeling generated that the children immediately decided to send some of their toys to the polio clinic at Port Reitz.

Said Joerg "it was then the International Year for the Disabled, and when I heard what these teachers and their children were doing I felt I should do something myself to help those in need overseas."

Such was the overwhelming response to Joerg's appeal for wheelchairs no longer being used that 21 were donated in a period of five weeks, most coming from health insurance companies.

Said Joerg with a laugh "I was inundated with wheelchairs until I had to call a halt, for the big problem was in getting them all to Mombasa."

Out of several people approached it was *Condor*, a subsidiary of Lufthansa Airline that agreed to transport them to Kenya — offering their services free of charge on hearing for whom they were destined.

Said Joerg "two German mechanic worked on them for a week seeing that they were in tip top shape, giving their services free of charge."

They were flown to Mombasa last year, and *Condor* also offered journalists seats on the aircraft to cover the presentation of these wheelchairs to the polio clinic so that people in Germany could see that they had arrived in Kenya.

Touristik Union International TUI is the largest tour operator in Europe, dealing with over two million tourists a year, and *Condor* is the air-charter company it uses to fly their tourists here.

Joerg and Renate are presently enjoying a TUI holiday which is being combined with a safari. Within a few days after their

arrival they were visiting the polio clinic and rehabilitation centre.

Said Joerg "we paid a personal visit to the polio clinic to see what other assistance it needs." Adding "we shall try and send them walking aids, books, clothes and water heaters."

Joerg and Renate noted the good work being undertaken there to rehabilitate young polio victims and to make them mobile again.

As far as the Likoni Centre is concerned, they said they had found it well organised, describing the design and finish of the furniture as "very good". However, they were dismayed to hear how difficult it is for trainees who have passed their government trade test to find jobs. They feel that something should be done to help these people, otherwise their training will be lost.

Despite being confined to a wheelchair, this does not prevent Joerg holidaying abroad. He and Renate are well seasoned travellers, and their

last holiday was spent touring around South America.

In 1972, Joerg took over the organisation of the *Stake Mandeville Games* for the paralysed which attracted thousands of competitors from 14 nations of the world to the centre in Heidelberg. He mentioned that *Stake Mandeville Para-Olympics* takes place in every Olympic Year and considerable enthusiasm is generated around them.

BERLIN BAZAAR

Joerg also revealed that through organising a bazaar some teachers in Berlin had raised Shs 50,000 to give a helping hand to the APDK and the work it is doing on the Kenya Coast.

It is TUI which recently introduced a "polio" program to cater for handicapped people in their holiday programmes. The first group to come to Kenya stayed at Oceanic Hotel, Bamburi, and had a wonderful time.

Die Sklavenglocke in Freretown

Er ist kaum zu übersehen, der Turm mit der Sklavenglocke in Freretown. Wenn man von Mombasa kommend die neue Nyalibridge überquert hat, steht der Torbogen als Wahrzeichen rechter Hand auf einer kleinen Anhöhe. Links befindet sich die Emmanuelkirche im gleichen architektonischen Stil.

Freretown wurde nach Sir Barthelemy Frere benannt, der vor über 100 Jahren mit dem Sultan von Sansibar Verhandlungen führte über die Einschränkung und spätere Abschaffung des Sklavenhandels in Ostafrika. Das Gelände in Freretown wurde 1874 der kirchlichen Missionsgesellschaft übergeben als Refugium für freigelassene Sklaven und ihre Familien.

Um die von den Dhaukapitänen ausgesandten Leute davon abzuhalten, in Freretown einzudringen und dort nach ihren entlaufenen Sklaven zu suchen, wurde die Glocke Tag und Nacht jede Stunde als Warnung geläutet.

Als Bischof Royston aus Mauritius 1878 Mombasa besuchte, erwähnte er in seinem Bericht, daß die Sklavenglocke in Freretown zu jeder Stunde ertönte.

Während vieler Jahre war der Turm ohne Glocke und es wurde angenommen, daß die verschwundene Sklavenglocke mit der am Westende der Emmanuelkirche hängenden Glocke identisch sei. Mit einer Inschrift aus dem Jahre 1896 versehen, kann es jedoch nicht die Glocke sein, die Bischof Royston auf seiner Reise 1878 gehört hatte.

STEINBOGEN
Auf einem Stadtplan von 1881 ist in Freretown ein Holzgerüst mit einer Glocke eingezeichnet, woraus man schließen kann, daß der Steinbogen damals noch nicht bestand.

Ob die Glocke gestohlen oder in die Kirche gebracht wurde, ist unbekannt. Letztes Jahr fanden die Museums-gesellschaft und die Freunde von Fort Jesus, daß der Turm ohne Glocke in seiner exponierten Lage höchst unvollständig

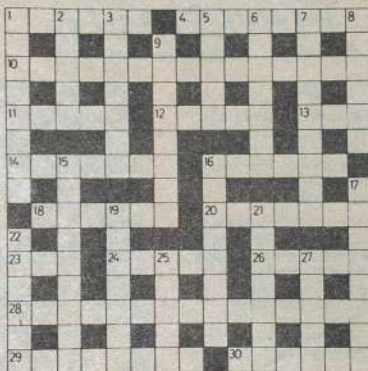
