FOUR MAJOR SCHEMES COSTING Shs.150 MILLION IN

# Port Housing Development

PART OF FIVE-YEAR Shs. 715 M. PLAN

FOUR MAJOR Kenya Ports Authority Housing Projects involving over Kshs 150 million are expected to be completed by the end of this year, a KPA official has confirmed in Mombasa this week. This expenditure is part of the five-year development plan amounting to Kshs 715 million which also cover the construction of new berths at the port and the acquisition of port equipment at the Mombasa's "gateway to East Africa".

Under the 1979-1983 development plan running concurrently with the third National Development Plan, three other housing projects have already been completed. They include an estate for junior staff comprising 18 blocks of six flats with a shopping centre and a nursery school at Mbaraka, 12 maisonettes for senior staff and another estate of 181 flats and a shopping centre for senior staff at Kilindini.

Currently under construction are 138 units costing Kshs 60 million at Kizingo area expected to be ready in December.

The demolition of smaller houses has given way to the construction of 234 modern houses, a shopping centre and recreational facilities at the Shimanzi estate at a cost of Kshs 51 million which are expected to be completed by the end of this year.

Another demolition of old houses at Makupa Corofani will also give way to 340 modern flats estimated to cost several million shillings and are expected to be ready by the end of this year.

At Makupa Asian, the Kenya Ports Authority is involved in the construction of 360 modern flats scheduled to be ready in December.

The cost of this housing venture is estimated to run into the region of several millions of shillings.

staff are presently housed in KPA property following the completion of previous projects under the same development plan.

Some 44 per cent of the estimated cost of the total development amounting to Kshs 715 million is being met from local KPA sources while foreign exchange or off-shore funding account for 56 per cent of the total expenditure.

Traditional foreign financiers to the Kenya Ports Authority have been the International Bank of Reconstruction and Development, the Canadian International Development Agency and the World Bank who both have in the past been funding most of the major capital projects undertaken by the port.

It is anticipated that half of the KPA staff of 4,200 will have been housed by the port body at the end of the current development plan in 1983.

## NOTICE TO THE PUBLIC

Dredging for widening and deepening of the entrance channel to the Port of Mombasa will be resumed on September 10, 1982, and continue for a period of approximately three months. During that period underwater blasting operations will be carried out on a 24-hour basis.

Divers and swimmers are hereby warned not to swim within one mile of such operations.

Warning of blasting will be given by the following:

1. Exhibition of red flag on the drilling barge will indicate that preparations for blasting are in hand.
2. Three blasts of 5 seconds each on a siren, accompanied by a flashing red light at night, will indicate that the detonation of explosives is imminent.
3. Detonation will occur three minutes after the siren warning.

THE Coastal Provincial Commissioner Mr. Luka Daudi Galgalo has disclosed that the Lamu Disaster Fund has so far received Kshs 2,436,615 in cash donations from various districts in the Province.

More than 145 houses out of 329 destroyed by fire in May have been rebuilt and handed over to their owners, Mr. Galgalo told COASTWEEK.

Kwale, Kilifi and Tana River, Talia Taveta and Mombasa donated a total of Kshs 1,831,358 while Lamu donations amounted to Kshs 605,257.

Among the items of foodstuffs donated and shipped to Lamu to help the victims included 1,463 bags and 791 bales of posho, 147 bales of Ngano, 254 bags of rice (including a further consignment of 50 bales and 200 kgs) wholemaize (10 bags and 180 kgs), khunde (19 1/2 bags), milk (183 bags and 12 cartons), salt (16 bags and 33 cartons), sugar (25 bags), coconut (16 bags), and tea (22 bags and 21 cartons).

Twenty bags of dates, seven bags of oranges, 16 cartons of "See-Tops" and six debes of oil were also ferried to Lamu during the four months exercise.

Household ware included 309 eating utensils, eight cartons cooking utensils and 23 cartons of washing and bathing soap.

Lamu victims also received 26 tents, 300 blankets, 115 cartons and 98 bags of assorted clothes, two cartons of shoes, 12 beds and 29 mattresses.

### CONSTRUCTION AID

Major shipment of construction materials were 110 tons of iron sheets, 113 tons of timber, 20 tons of cement and 143 bags of assorted nails.

Other smaller items included kettles, mugs, cups, jugs, bowls, plates, towels and chairs.

Mr. Galgalo assured Wananichi that "every cent has been accounted for" and added that the fund was still open for further donations.

"We shall continue with the exercise until every victim has been rehabilitated and relieved from the immense suffering which had been brought about by the fire disaster."

Fatima is really lucky, for this is something her counterparts in Europe cannot do unless they travel thousands of miles to reach safari country.

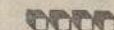

## Slave Breeding And Bondage!

**THE DATE 1840.** The place is a slave breeding plantation in Louisiana. And now the slave system that has kept a large segment of the United States population in bondage is beginning to show cracks with tragic consequences! This is the story unfolding in *Mandingo* opening at Kenya Cinema on Monday a story of a slave owner, his son, their favourite fighting slave, his sexual-love affair with another slave, the sons wife and her sexually perverted nature.

In the end it is the sons growing love for his slave mistress that brings the story to its violent, tragic conclusion.

Maxwell (**James Mason**) and his son Hammond (**Perry King**) are the owners of the infamous Falconhurst plantation that exists only for breeding humans as if they were guinea pigs. Amid this misery and suffering, enters real-life ex-boxer Ken Norton as Mede a mandingo slave bought at a slave market auction by Hammond and a shy, beautiful slave-girl Ellen (**Brenda Sykes**). Life at the Falconhurst will never be the same again!

Against grim background of slavery, brothel fights, murder and the hanging of rebel slaves, an illicit and ill fated foursome love affair blossoms. Ignoring his newly wed wife Blanche (**Susan George**). Hammond starts a serious affair with Ellen while later Blanche seeks solace in Mede.

### 'Slave System'

An uprising against Falconhurst white masters is put down with the help of Mede and the loyal slaves. But the hangings that follow its collapse now put into question the whole slave system. Both women become

pregnant from their "Zebra" affairs and as ill fate would have it both infants die even before they begin to live. Ellen has a miscarriage after a fight with Blanche and Blanche's baby is left to bleed to death in order to hide its colour.

Hammond goes berserk when he finds out the baby was black disowning Blanche and denouncing Ellen. In a violent and tragic climax, he faces Mede at gunpoint, leading to a bloodbath that does not even spare his old father Maxell.

The carnage around him signals the end of a cruel and brutalizing world that made victims of both master and slave.

Directed by Richard Fleischer with Ralph Serpe as executive producer, "Mandingo" based on the popular novel by Kyle Onstott, has had a mixture of reactions during its marathon run in Nairobi. Having had its fair share of acclaim and resentment elsewhere, it remains to stunningly crippling and savage portrayal of the slave trade's brutality and tragedy on the big screen 140 years after the American Civil War brought it to an end.

Opening on Monday at Naaz Cinema after *Prom Night* (today and tomorrow) is *Absence of Malice* starring **Paul Newman** and **Sally Field**. This is a story about an explosive front page headline story that triggers off a bitter hunt for revenge.

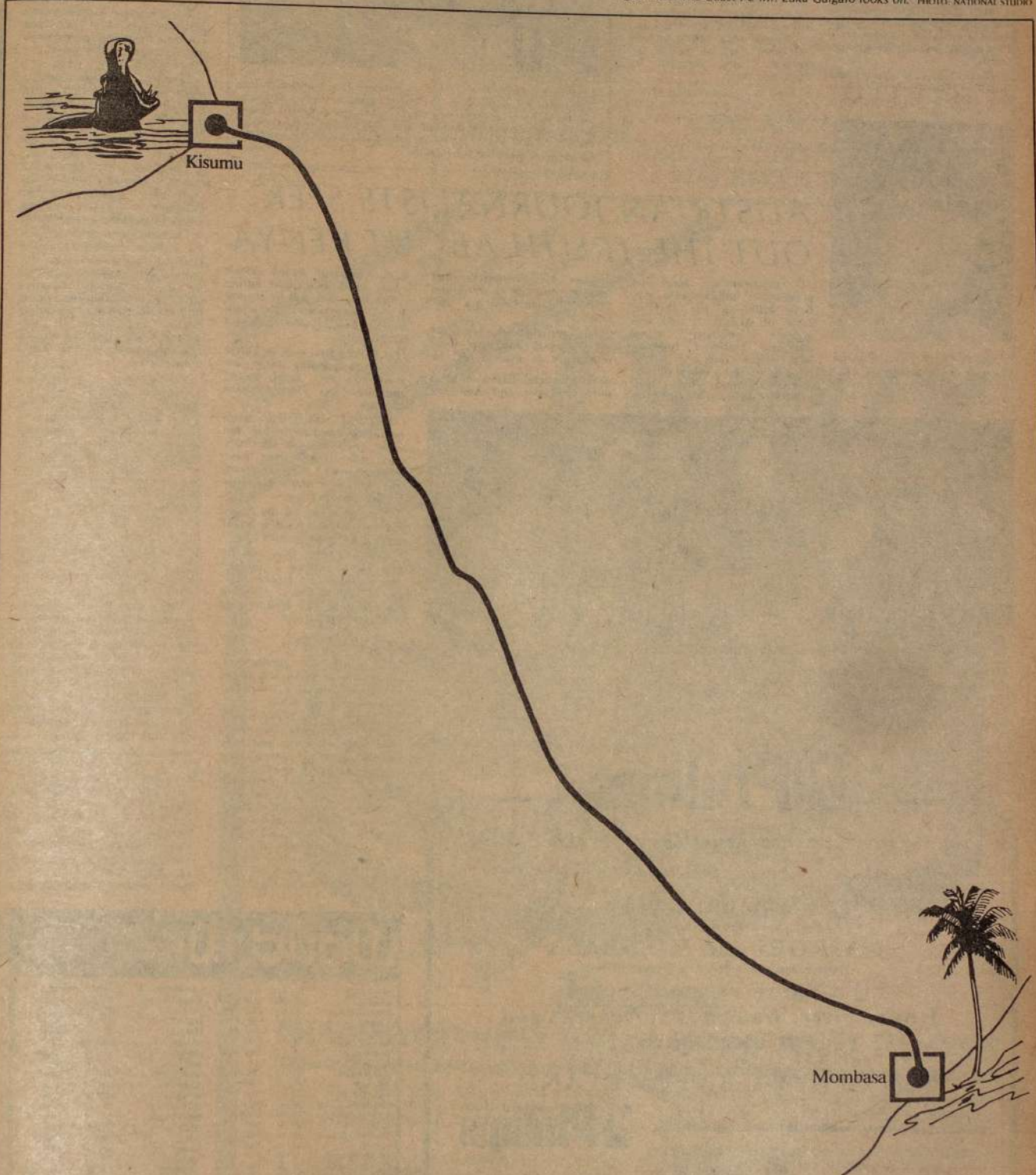

"We always knew the Datsun was a very economical vehicle, but were still surprised to find that we arrived in Mombasa on that one tank of fuel. In fact, we even had half a gallon left over! You must agree that's amazing economy for a 2.2 litre diesel engine."

TO counteract any fears that prospective holidaymakers may have following the abortive coup of August 1, and any adverse publicity given overseas, Meridian together with African Tours and Hotels, have sponsored a group of four journalists and two tour operators on a week's visit here

Early October, they will be bringing to Kenya a 250/300 strong group from Schwarzkopf one of the leading manufacturers of hairdressing products in the world.

They will be staying at Jadini and Africana Sea Lodge where hairdressing demonstrations are to be held.

It is African Tours and Hotels which look after Meridian's ground arrangements, and three from Schwarzkopf have already arrived to finalise arrangements for this very big promotion which is being combined with a "mini" holiday for its clients.

Recently, a group of hoteliers from African Tours and Hotels led by its managing director, Richard Maina, visited Austria on a sales promotion drive at the invitation of Meridian.

## DATELINE: DAR ES SALAAM Tanzania Fishing Corporation Gets 'Kiss-Of-Life' Gift

THE STATE-OWNED Tanzania Fishing Corporation TAFIC has given a "kiss of life" last week through the donation of a multi-purpose fishing trawler from the Japanese Government. The vessel which is equipped with processing, grading and freezing equipment will greatly assist in preserving sea loach, prawns through supplying the corporations other vessels with fuel, fresh water and ice. It will also collect prawns from remote areas and transport it to bases.

The Japanese Government's assistance is also bent on covering fleet management and maintenance of the vessel for the next two years.

Tanzania has also signed a technical co-operation pact with Indonesia for supplying highly trained personnel to the Tanzanian Railways Corporation (Marine Services) and the Tanzania Harbours Authority. A number of Indonesian engineers and pilots are currently plying vessels belonging to the railways along Lakes Tanganyika and Victoria.

Tanzania is to receive some 2.3 million shillings from the United Nations Fund for population activities (UNFPA) for a Nation-wide campaign aimed at educating the people on the importance of recording deaths and births. It will include the distribution of placards, booklets and radio programmes.

Meanwhile fourteen Tanzanian workers left for Sweden to familiarise themselves with the organisation of study groups, for imparting workers education at their places or work. This is part of an exchange programme between the Union of Tanzania workers Juwata and the Swedish Government.

Squatter areas in Tanzania's urban areas have increased from 750,000 to 900,000 over the past eight year. Some 10,000 squatters were up in towns in 1980.

The Minister for Lands, Housing and Urban Development, Mr. Mustafa Nyang'anyi told an inaugural meeting of the architectural association of Tanzania in Dar es Salaam that 45 per cent of Housing Development in Dar es Salaam sheltering 60 per cent of the city's one million population were squatters.

An International convention on the cashewnut industry is being held in Dar es Salaam. It is being attended by representatives from eight international organisation involved in the import and export of the cashewnut trade.

An Air Tanzania Corporation ATC Boeing 737 has landed at Dubai International Airport

heralding a new era in Arab Air travel.

The fully loaded 737 capacity aircraft returned to Dar es Salaam on Monday dropping off a number of passengers picked at Dubai and Muscat.

Although ATC did not services to Dubai in 1980 it was only as a transit stop to Bombay then using services leased by George Airways Caledonian Airline and Sabena Sabena's charter subsidiary. This time, the aircraft was donning ATC's white and blue colours.

### MUSCAT AIRPORT

Under this scheme the passenger either stop over at Muscat Airport when he is permitted a six hour stay or at Dubai Airport when he has a 20 hour lay over and do very good duty free shopping if he has sufficient foreign exchange and has a ticket sent to him at the airport. This saves a lot of time through not applying to the Central Bank and prevents sponsor from having to show his bank balance and other assets if the FTA was effective from Dar es Salaam.

During this month and early October, the Boeing will have a seating capacity of 100 passengers as approved by the but no First Class due to the ferrying of 99 Muslim pilgrims to Jeddah enroute for pilgrimage to Mecca and Medina.

Some 660 passengers from the mainland and 130 from Zanzibar have each been given 11,000 shillings in foreign exchange during their two week stay in Saudi Arabia.

The first phase of the 3 year Zanzibar Town master plan will begin later this year and end in 1986. It will cost 52.6 million shillings. Completed by ten Chinese experts at a total cost of 15 million shillings. The plan recommends the Zanzibar Government buy the town to cover about 136 hectares and to accommodate 300,000 people to be built in four phases. At the moment, Zanzibar town has a population of 126,000 people and occupies 1,850 hectares.

The town centres forming an 'L' shape will accommodate the Administrative Centre, commercial centre and the experts suggests that the old town and 16 historical structures be preserved. The master plan is also expected to solve many problems confronting the town: mushrooming of squatters, floods on depression and allowing the creation of a sewerage system.

# SUGGESTIONS OVER 'RATES'

I have been a rate-prayer in Mombasa for 22 years and as such have a personal interest in this problem of rates on Agricultural Land in Mombasa into which, I understand, His Excellency the President had directed an enquiry.

I sent a letter, to the Provincial Director of Agriculture, and have since been visited by himself and other officials, they informed me that a meeting is to be held next week with the District Commissioner as Chairman.

I have ventured to express some ideas about rates in general, but also with regard to agricultural land, and hope they might stimulate constructive thinking before the meeting and so lead to useful discussion.

I have therefore drafted the following suggestions on Rates:

- The present Mombasa Municipal Rating systems starts off on the wrong foot by being based on "unimproved site values", surely this colonial relic should be buried and forgotten!

- There is no value in an unimproved site, except perhaps to a naturalist studying birds or weeds. Value accrues from development from occupation and it is this occupation which attracts the municipal services for which rates are paid.

- It may be objected that the values meant is the "market" value, that is, a sale value. But for a sale there has to be a willing seller as well as a willing buyer. Is it to be presumed that we all wish to sell our home and then to buy others at inflated values? Surely not, for a stable town life depends on a permanent property-owning body of citizens. This needful stability is the very reason for the existence of the Housing Finance Corporation. Good citizens, owner-occupiers, wish to stay, and are as perfectly willing to pay for municipal services as they are for water and electricity, but the rates must be raised on a sane economic basis.

- Rates therefore should be based on the annual value, or rental value, and not on a sale value, in the same way as Income Tax is based not on capital but on annual income. It is the services to occupants that are provided by rates. In most countries the rates bill is

served on the occupier not the owner, and

- In difficult cases such as agricultural land, the annual value should be assessed by the Government. Agricultural Officers who already know the merits and the capabilities of the many types of soil in their area. This method is much more likely to ensure the carrying out of His Excellency's recent directive that justice must be done, than attempting to assess values from a map in an office!

## PORT CARGO MOVEMENTS

THE dry General Cargo handled at the Port of Mombasa during August, 1982 has shown an improvement as compared to the preceding month of July.

The August performance was approximately 190,078 dead-weight tonnes comprised of 117,254 tonnes of imports and 72,824 tonnes of exports.

This performance reflected a rise of 18,861 tonnes compared against July when the port handled a total of approximately 171,217 tonnes made up of 92,474 tonnes of imports and 74,743 tonnes of exports.

The throughput for the month under review was, however, a decline as compared against the corresponding month of August in 1981 during which the port handled 199,095 tonnes comprised of 146,141 tonnes of imports and 52,954 tonnes of exports. This was higher by 9,017 tonnes.

During the month of August 66 general cargo ships called at the Port.

## 'MOKOWE SUB-POST OFFICES'

MALINDI (K.N.A.) — Mpekotoni and Mokowe Sub Post Offices in Lamu will soon be upgraded to departmental status to give the wananchi of the area full postal services. The pledge was given by the Kenya Posts and Telecommunication Corporation chairman Mr Dawson Mlamba when he toured the area. He added that his corporation would look into the possibility of improving telephone services in Mokowe.

## New Container Break-Through

ANOTHER PORT has achieved a new container handling record this time Dubai, U.A.E. in the Arabian Gulf which discharged 751 boxes ex the Japanese Kawasaki Line container vessel Shokawa Maru in 10 hours alongside the berth. Each container gantry crane discharged 42 containers per hour. As soon as the Mombasa Container Terminal has similar cranes installed at the end of this year then there is no reason why our port should not be capable of attaining similar high speed moves.

A Chinese vessel, the first to visit Kilindini for some time, spent five days discharging at the buoys. She was the eight year old 9800 tons gross Da Li which sailed on September 4th. All vessels of the Chinese Republic are state-owned and have grey hulls, yellow funnel, with a red band on which is Chinese lettering.

It was refreshing to see a Belgian C.M.B. vessel in port again for the first time this year. She was the 20,600 ton dead-weight container carrier Quellin built in 1977 which arrived last weekend to discharge containers, the vessel being on a round voyage charter to Beacon, the British Shipping Lines container consortium.

With her deep orange coloured hull and yellow funnel she stood out well alongside No. 18 berth. Her sister ship Van Dyck visited Mombasa at the end of last year.

A large shipment of bulk wheat is due in port next Wednesday with the arrival of the 26,600 d.w. tons Olympic Harmony — Liberian flag built in 1963.

This shipment loaded at Baton Rouge in the U.S. Gulf amounts to 24,500 tons and is being imported by the Kenya Government. Mitchell Cotts Kenya Ltd., are agents for the vessel.

Also due next week is the Indian flag vessel Rishi Valmiki with 7,500 tons bagged sugar, presumably for Kenya although I thought Kenya already was producing sufficient sugar to satisfy her own needs.

**'Off-Shore Supply Ship'**  
An offshore supply vessel, the Dutch flag Smit Lloyd 50, one of the large fleet of similar vessels which service oil drilling rigs throughout the world, has recently been in port for a few days to discharge some pipes and to take on bunkers and stores.

## SHIPPING with JOHN WALTERS

The Rafaela finally moved last week with the aid of three tugs to the Seco repair yard to make her seaworthy before she is finally towed away to the scrapyard.

Large shipments of Ugandan Coffee are presently moving to the United States with the regular Lines lifting their parcels. Vessels which have benefited from this boom have been Lykes Lines Ameri Lykes, Moore McCann's Mormacsaga and P and O Stratheden.

Port of registry Manila indicates the Philippine flag which is not often to be seen in Kilindini. However, at No. 18 berth the 10,000 ton deadweight Salvia Star with the Philippine flag flying from her stern is discharging a further parcel of fertiliser from the Far East and is due to sail next Wednesday on completion. She was built in Japan in 1974.

# The Snows Of Kilimanjaro ...

This one year old Kilimanjaro Buffalo Lodge - the nearest to Mt. Kilimanjaro in Amboseli Park - being just 10 kms. away from its base - is extending, yet again, writes NETA PEAL.

A contract has just been signed and work commences immediately on building 14 more marula-roofed rondavels which will not only have 'Mini' bars, but also hot and cold water showers, but fireplaces as well.

Fireplaces have only gone into public areas and four more in December.

These extensions, providing an additional 28 beds, are expected to be ready by November 1. The Lodge will then be able to accommodate a total of 122 guests.

A new and larger restaurant, equipped with round tables, each with its own sunken barbeque pits, opens in December.

A nine-hole golf course will be ready by Christmas, while next year there will be two tennis courts, also horses and donkeys for those who wish to go riding.

The Lodge has three bars, two of which are very cosy places at night with wood fires in circular fireplaces. One is elevated and overlooks a salt lick which is attractive to an increasing number of animals, while another is in a game room where a variety of spectacular wildlife films are shown.

There is also a circular sunken swimming pool surrounded by comfy sunbeds on Mt. Kilimanjaro, and for those returning from a bumpy safari, there is a sauna and hot tubs and pains just melt away. There is an adjacent bar and comfortable rest areas.

The Lodge has a fully equipped multi-purpose conference hall to seat between 20 and 50 people.

Bunches of banana and orange trees have been planted on this site and experiments are being made in growing citrus fruit as well. It has an aviary where some animals are kept, and a game of chase is played. There is also a vehicle maintenance base with fully qualified mechanics in charge.

The Lodge has developed an atmosphere and charm of its own and a great extent on this attention that guests are given in management and service out of their way to ensure 'Female Influence'.

Part of this is due to the personality generated by its Executive Manager, Dublin-born Jane Karongo, who has had considerable experience in the hotel and catering industry. He worked for Hilton International in eight countries of the world and was Deputy General Manager of the Nairobi Hilton Hotel for two years.

As far as the female influence goes, Kilimanjaro Buffalo Lodge has women on its management team. Nairobi born Tazim Ramji, Food & Beverage Manager who trained for three years at the International Hotel School in Norwich, UK, graduating with a Higher National Diploma in hotelkeeping and catering management. When she returned to Kenya, Tazim was dismayed to find that no-one seemed to want a female manager. So for a time, she worked as a part-time cashier at a coffee shop in Nairobi. Shortly after joining Bamburi Beach Hotel as an Assistant Food & Beverage Manager, came the offer of a job at Kilimanjaro Buffalo. Now Tazim is really happy.

She has a very special feeling for this Lodge for her father, Bahadur Ramji, was one of its early founders. Two years before it opened he and his wife were killed in a plane crash while flying from Nairobi to the Lodge for a site meeting.

Tazim knows the area well, having visited it with her parents many times.

She has a remarkable knack of making guests feel really at home.

Executive Chef is Jane Karongo, 24 from Kiambu, whose food is really tasty.

Cooking is done on charcoal and wood fires and they specialise in barbecued fare.

Jane does a delicious Chicken Tika which is first marinated in yogurt, fresh dhanian and chillies plus turmeric for colouring. It is then charcoal grilled and served with a superb tamarind sauce.

Jane has her own herb garden and is already famous for the good pasta and lasagne she makes.

Jane started her career in the hotel industry as a Block Hotels trainee at Nairobi's New Stanley. It was they who sponsored her for a year's cookery course at Utali College. Later, Jane joined Alliance Hotels, working as a cook, then sous chef at Jacaranda Hotel. After graduating from a six months advanced course in cookery at Utali she was promoted to chef.

She has been at Kilimanjaro Buffalo Lodge since November, and describes her job as 'great fun'.

While at school she was a member of the wildlife clubs of Kenya, and Amboseli happens to be her favourite game park in the Country.

Then there is Kenya-born Tamsin Corcoran, Restaurant Hostess, who not only greets all the guests but ensures they enjoy their meal in maximum comfort. In the evenings there is a wood fire in the cavernous fireplace making the restaurant a very cosy place to be for a relaxed meal by candlelight. Particularly noticeable here is the sparkling glassware, as well as the attentive, courteous service.

**'Wildlife Safaris'**

After taking a Cordon Bleu and French language course in Nairobi, Tamsin decided she would like to make a career in the hotel industry. She joined Kilimanjaro Buffalo nine months ago as a management trainee, and is enjoying every minute of it. She is very knowledgeable on wildlife, having been on safaris all over Kenya since she was a small child.

Although her work keeps her very busy, when she finds time, Tamsin is off on game drives

around Amboseli where there is a plethora of wildlife to see.

She is also a budding artist and paints landscapes and sunsets, which Tamsin said had not gone much further than adorning her bedroom walls. She also enjoys swimming and riding, and her ambition one day is to have her own game lodge or tented camp.

A very important person in the establishment is Ainea Lugose, the Maitre-de-Hotel.

It was he who trained eight of the restaurant waiters from scratch, for they had previously been working as labourers on the site. They were among the 36 who were offered jobs after the Lodge had been built to save them from becoming unemployed.

Ainea said that this gesture by management had made the local people 'very happy'.

He started his career in the hotel and catering industry as a cook with the Mandarin Restaurant, Nairobi, and was with them for five years, during which time he also worked as a bar and restaurant waiter. He then joined the Nairobi Hilton as a waiter, leaving them as a senior captain 9 1/2 years later. During this time he was twice sponsored by the Hilton Group for courses in service organisation at Utali college.

He joined Kilimanjaro Buffalo Lodge in 1981. It was the first time for Ainea to be in a game park, and initially he missed Nairobi and was scared of the wildlife around him. Now he finds it an ideal place to be with no pollution and magnificent views of Mt. Kilimanjaro which he finds most inspiring. In fact, he aims to climb it one day. Ainea has also learned much about the local people and their

customs, and through his contact with guests from all over the world, can now speak a little German, French and Italian.

His ambition is to open a restaurant of his own one day in a rural area.

Service is of a very high standard, and much credit for this goes to Ainea.

Amos Mdivo, a Kamba, who was site supervisor when the Lodge was being built is now its Chief Administrative Supervisor.

He revealed that the Lodge had been so named because of the great number of buffalo present in the area. However, a hunting camp, which had been there for about three years from 1973 had frightened many of them away. Now they are returning, attracted by the natural salt lick they find at the Lodge.

Amos has been at Kilimanjaro Buffalo for seven years and says there are no mosquitos, for there are no swamps around.

He asserts that Ernest Hemingway wrote his famous book 'The Snows of Kilimanjaro' in a tent just 2 kms away from this Lodge. Those wishing to climb Mt. Kilimanjaro used to use the hunting camp as their base, and he says that the Lodge hopes to accommodate such climbing groups once Tanzania opens her borders again.

Amos also mentioned that all fruit and vegetables supplied to the Lodge come from Maasai and Kikuyu farms just outside Amboseli Park. He also points out that guests at the Lodge not only have Amboseli for safaris, but Tsavo game Parks as well.

There is a plethora of game in Amboseli Park and only recently lions, elephants, wildebeest, giraffes, zebras as well as many of the smaller animals were seen - including a leopard.

Kilimanjaro Buffalo representing an investment of Shs. 25 million, is owned by Mr. N. Muri, and when fully developed will be one of the largest lodges in Kenya. Its aim is not only to attract guests who stay for one night while on safari, but those who wish to combine a relaxing holiday in an atmosphere of great tranquility and splendour, surrounded by game and recreational facilities.

Such is its popularity that already the Lodge is almost fully booked for Christmas.

## ERROL ON FOOD

The word *Charlotte* covers two varieties of dessert, one made from sponge fingers, jelly and cream which is served chilled, the other from bread and fruit usually apples. Savoury charlottes are also made using cheese.

Charlotte Russe is prepared with Bavarian cream, set in a plain round mould lined round the sides and across the bottom with sponge fingers and turned out when chilled; it should be served on a round dish covered with a pristine white napkin, or tied with a ribbon for festive occasions.

Apple Charlotte which seems to have been the first of this kind is more homely fare, it has buttered slices of bread and in contrast is usually served hot. Apple is the classic filling but quinces, plums, rhubarb, pears, apricots or peaches may also be used with

great success.

The secret is to see that the consistency of the fruits is kept very stiff because if too liquid they would soften the bread lining of the mould and it would disintegrate when turned out.

The one thing both charlottes have in common is their exterior form. Apple Charlotte was invented long before Charlotte Russe which was created by Cere and to which he had given the name Charlotte Parisienne originally, he says he had the idea while starting up his own establishment, the first Charlotte Russe to make its appearance was at the tables of ministers of security and foreign ministers.

"I sent them all ready to serve along with the orders for pastry sweets which were placed with me by the great royal houses." Where, when or how the Russe crept in never seems to have been recorded. One does turn either out with slightly trembling fingers, the trick with the hot Charlotte is to allow it to rest between 5 and 8 minutes before turning it out but even so one needs a will of iron to do it swiftly and surely and for preference two oven

gloves to cope with the hot dish.

#### APPLE CHARLOTTE

Line the bottom and sides of a Charlotte mould (a soufflé dish will do) with slices of bread, crusts removed, dipped in melted butter. For the sides, the slices should be exactly of the same height as the mould. Fill this with apples prepared in the following manner.

Slice 12 apples which have first been peeled and quartered. Put these in a heavy sauté pan with 3 tbs of butter. When heated add 2 large tbs of castor sugar a pinch of cinnamon and a little lemon rind. Cool the apples over a hot flame, stirring constantly with a spatula.

When the preparation is considerably thickened add 3-4 tbs of apricot jam. Fill the bread-lined mould with this being careful to fill right up to the top. Place slices of bread dipped in butter on the top. Bake in the oven at a good heat, (350F) for 35 to 40 minutes. Let the Charlotte rest a few minutes before turning it out so that the apple settles. Turn out on a round dish. Serve with Apricot sauce and cream handed separately.

#### CHARLOTTE ROUSSE

For this buy the savoy sponge fingers from your local bakery but always buy an extra packet over and above what you think you will need as this will depend on the dish you are using and the precise quantity is difficult to assess.

It is really maddening to discover when you come to make it that you are short of one or two sponge fingers to complete the circle.

- 1/2 pint of whipped cream
- 1 egg white
- 3 ozs sugar
- 1 heaped tbs of gelatine
- savoy fingers
- 1/2 pint sweet white wine

Pack a Charlotte mould or tin so that the savoy fingers line the sides, standing up quite close together. Dissolve the gelatine in the hot wine, it will soften more quickly if soaked in a little cold water first. Cool.

Beat the cream and the egg white separately until stiff. Stir into the whipped cream and fold in the egg white. As soon as this mixture starts to set pour into the lined mould. Leave to set in a cool place.

When ready to serve turn out onto a suitable dish, either covered with a napkin or tie the pudding with a ribbon around it if serving for a party.

#### BOMBE ROYALE

This is not exactly a Charlotte but a festive pudding on the same theme.

- 1 swiss roll
- 4 egg yolks
- 18 fluid ozs of milk
- 3 1/2 ozs powdered gelatine,
- 5 fluid ozs double cream
- a good dash of rum

Line a pudding basin or suitable mould with greaseproof paper leaving a little protruding above the edge to make unmoulding easier. Cut the swiss roll into slices and use to line the dish against paper. Dissolve gelatine in a little hot water.

Whisk the egg yolks with the sugar, milk and vanilla pod in a double pan until thick and frothy. Whisk in the gelatine continue whisking until cool. Remove vanilla pod. Whip the cream and fold into the egg mixture together with a dash of rum.

Carefully pile the mixture into the lined pudding basin and out in the coldest part of the refrigerator to set. Unmould carefully.

A fresh fruit salad goes beautifully with this but it is just as good and as festive on its own.

ISLAMU WAKANYWA hata katika vitabu vidogodogo kama hidayatul atfal kujishabihisha na makafiri katika mambo yasiyokhusika nao (yaani ambayo hakuna afanyae illa wao) kwa sababu ya neno lake mtume S.A.W. aliosema: "Mwenye kujishabihisha na watu basi nae huwa katika wao". Hivi ni kusema kwamba mwenye kujishabihisha na Islamu huwa miongoni mwa Islamu na mwenye kujishabihisha na makafiri huwa miongoni mwa makafiri.

Haya ni katika mambo ya kilimwengu, je iwapo kujishabihisha huko ni katika mambo ya dini? Bila shaka ubaya wake ni mkubwa zaidi.

Mambo yafanyikayo katika kupamba maarusi kwa vao na mila ya kinasara yana ukhusiyano fulani na ukristo. Ndiipo wao wenyewe wakawa huzieka na kuzihifadhi nguzo zile apambiwazo mwanamke katika harusi siku ya kufa akapabwa kwa nguzo hizo.

Kabla ya kuja adhana (Mwadhini) Mtume S.A.W. alikuwa akitafuta ndio ya kuwakusanya Islamu wakati wa sala. Akapawa shauri kupiga kengele, akasema: "La, hayo ni ya manasara" Akapawa shauri la kupiga barugumu, akasema: "La, hayo ni ya mayahudi". Akapawa shauri kukoka moto ili kila atakaona muanga wake ujwe kuwa wakati wa sala umetika, akasema: "La, hilo ni la majusi". Ndiipo baadhiya masahaba walipo oteshwa adhana hii tujuyayo ambayo haikushabihisha na watu wa dini nyengine.

Na kama tujuyayo kuna Nyakati Maalumu ambazo Islamu wakatazwa kuswali katika nyakati hizo, kama mwanzo wa kutoka jua na kabla ya kumalizika kutwa jua, kwa sababu ya kutahadhari na kuchelea na kujishabihisha na makafiri amba hufanya ibada zao katika nyakati hizo.

Haifai kabisa kupima maovu kipimo cha "lipo lililo ovu zaidi" Dogo huweza kuleta madhara makubwa ambayo hayakutarajiwa dhambi zake zikawa kubwa kuliko ila lionekano lo kuwa ni kubwa. Na ovu dogo haliitwi dogo lile iwapo mtu limempitia mara moja kwa kupigwa kumbo za shetani.

Lakini mwenye kudumu na kuendelea kufanya ovu lolote hata ikawa dogo namna gani, hukumu yake katika sharia ni kama afanyae kubwa.

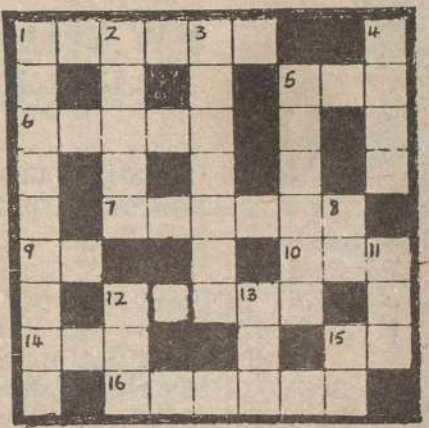

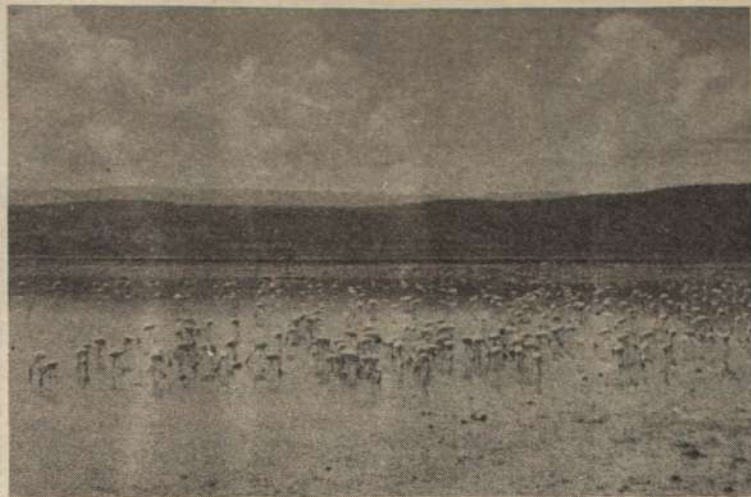

## FLAMINGOES FLY HOME ...

LAKE Nakuru Lodge, the tourists' "viewpoint" for the world famous flamingoes, has now opened an office in Mombasa to give the Coast travellers easy access to Kenya's biggest birds' sanctuary.

Mr. Alfayo Onyango, General Manager of the Lodge, told Coastweek "Our new office will make it easy for Coast Tour

Operators and Travel Agents to reach us, unlike in the past when they had to make long distance telephone calls to our offices in Nairobi and Nakuru to make their bookings."

The opening of the new office also coincides with the return of the flamingoes, which had deserted Lake Nakuru in the past few years.

"The Lake has turned 'pink' again", says Mr. Onyango, adding that the whole Lake now is covered with thousands of the white/pink birds.

The disappearance and re-appearance of the flamingoes still remains a mystery.

Government authorities suggest that the birds had deserted the Lake in 1975-76 because of sudden rise of the water-level which resulted in a great reduction of the green-blue algae (*spirulina platensis*) on which the birds feed.

### ORNITHOLOGIST

This view has been backed by Dr. John Dittammie, an American ornithologist studying bird life at the Lake, but Kenyan sceptics still believe that the birds left the Lake because of pollution.

Until recently, contaminated drainage water from Nakuru town was allowed to empty into the Lake.

Michael Mayeku Warikhe ist in Mombasa geboren und entdeckte schon früh seine große Liebe zu den Reptilien. Er sammelte Schlangen und andere Kriechtiere, als er noch zur Schule ging. Während der Schullerferien half er im Schlangenpark in Nairobi, pflegte die kranken Tiere und reinigte die große Schlangengrube, in der sich über 20 verschiedene Arten von Reptilien aufhalten. Er lernte alles Wissenswerte über Schlangen vom damaligen Kurator Peter Narse und von Jackson Iha.

## SCHLANGENKUNDE

Michael beabsichtigt, die Universität zu besuchen, um Schlangenkunde zu studieren und sich in diesem Fach einen Titel zu erwerben.

Schon im Alter von 7 Jahren hielt Michael eine ganze Anzahl von Haustieren, Eidechsen, kleine Primaten, Vögel, Chamäleons und Schlangen. Während er die St. Charles Lwanga Schule in Mombasa besuchte, fing er in Changamwe viele Schlangen, die er im Schullaboratorium unterbrachte. Seine Tätigkeit weckte das Interesse seiner Mitschüler und er konnte ihnen erklären, daß die meisten Schlangen harmlos sind. Sie gründeten sogar einen Schlangenkлуб und Michael zeigte ihnen, wie man die Schlangen identifiziert und mit ihnen umgeht. Die Schlangen verhalten sich meistens friedlich und greifen nur an, wenn sie sich bedroht fühlen. Sie verwenden ihr Gift nicht zum Angriff, sondern zur Selbstverteidigung.

Michael möchte vor allem den Leuten in den ländlichen Gebieten helfen, ihre Angst vor den Schlangen zu überwinden, so daß sie nicht mehr alle Schlangen töten, denen sie begegnen. Die Reptilien spielen eine wichtige Rolle im Ökosystem, um das Ungeziefer und die Ratten und Mäuse in Schach zu halten.

Nach der Aktion zur Rettung der Nashörner möchte Michael den Wasserschildkröten helfen, obwohl sie unter Naturschutz stehen, werden sie oft gewildert an der Ostküste Afrikas. Vor allem die Weibchen und ihre Eier schweben an Land ständig in großer Gefahr.

# GRAND HOTEL NYALI BEACH

Die Umbauarbeiten am Nyali Beach Hotel konnten wie geplant zum größten Teil bis zum 1. August abgeschlossen werden und verleiht dem Hotel den würdigen Charakter eines Grand Hotels in seinem ursprünglichen eleganten Gestalt der vierziger Jahre.

Derzeitige Besitzer sind UTC und Kooni/Schweiz; das Management wurde Block Hotels übertragen.

Die gesamten Umbauarbeiten kosteten Shs 5 Millionen. Der Eingang wurde komplett neu gebaut mit vielen Säulen und Bögen im frühen architektonischen Stil Mombasa's.

Die neue Rezeption ist bereits in Funktion. Die Empfangshalle ist viel geräumiger als vorher. Sie hat einen beigen Marmorfußboden und ist mit dekorativen Messinglampen versehen, wie sie zu jener Zeit in der Eisenbahn verwendet wurden. Der Aufenthaltsraum, ebenfalls mit beigem Fußboden, ist mit weißen Möbeln mit weichen Kissen ausgestattet in italienischem Rosa, Weißrot und Grau.

Der Ocean View Speisesaal wurde umgebaut und präsentiert sich nun als gefälliges, intimes Restaurant "L'Orangerie". Die Terrasse wurde mit einbezogen und man kann dort im Freien essen mit Aussicht auf den Swimming Pool und auf das Meer.

Die Sonnenterrasse beim Pool wurde erweitert und führt zur neuen Poolbar mit Patio.

Unterhalb des Swimming Pools befindet sich die Einkaufskasse, wo man im neuen Pub auch einen Drink genehmigen kann. Es bestehen Pläne für eine Austerbar nebenan.

Sämtliche Renovierungen wurden innerhalb von 13 Wochen durchgeführt und termingerecht abgeschlossen. Unvollendet sind noch der Springbrunnen, die vorseitliche Bar und der Nachtclub "Blues", der nach seiner Eröffnung Mitte September dem Nachtleben Mombasa's neue Dimensionen bringen soll.

"Blues" wird auf zwei verschiedenen Ebenen gebaut und verfügt über etwa 140 Sitzplätze. Im oberen Stock ist ein Loch im Boden mit Spiegeln versehen, so daß man die Tanzfläche unterhalb beobachten kann. Der Nachtclub ist klimatisiert, hat einen blauen Parkettboden und die Wände und die Polstersessel sind mit blau-beigen Stoffen überzogen.

Vom oberen Stock hat man Zugang zur Freiluftterrasse, wo man frische Luft schnappen kann.

Die Firma Arterios hat den gediegenen Nachtclub entworfen und überhaut kein importiertes Material verwendet. Die Stoffe, der imitierte italienische Marmor und die Mangelorekachen sind in Kenia hergestellt.

Sagt General Manager Mr. Christopher Sebes: "Das Nyali Beach Hotel ist durch den Umbau eleganter und vornehmer geworden und kann nun mit den besten Häusern in Kenia und in anderen Ferienländern konkurrieren".

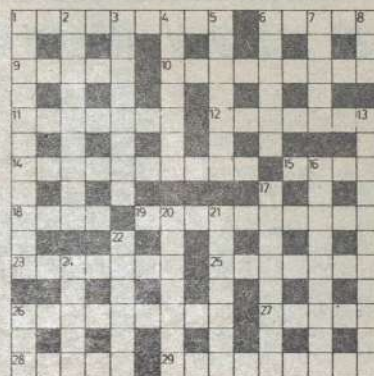
