HARD-UP COUNCIL BUILDS UP 'BIG DEBTS'

HARD-UP Municipal Council of Mombasa is faced with an outstanding public debt amounting to nearly Kshs. 100 million. This bill, which is expected to soar up dramatically by the end of the current year, accounts for the Council's financial and internal loans to the Mombasa Municipal Council in respect of a number of capital projects which have either been completed or are being undertaken by the Municipal Council.

External loans extended to the Council amount to Kenya Shillings 78,014,400/- while internal loans amount to K.Shs. 21,985,600. Loan charges are in the region of Kshs 9,074,400.

Among the Council's major sources have been the Local Government Loans Authority, Industrial Assurance Company, the Bank of India, the National Housing Corporation, and Barclays Bank of Kenya.

Use of capital expenditure on projects such as the construction and extensions of health centres, sewerage and drainage systems, tenant purchase and rental housing schemes, a new fire station and the construction and extension of markets in the municipality of Mombasa.

Other projects include the installation of parking meters and street lights, the construction of new classrooms and the supply of furniture to primary schools and the installation of a computer system at the Town Hall.

The Municipal Council of Mombasa owes the National Housing Corporation Kshs.— KShs. 3,000/- and the Local Government Loans Authority Kshs. 8,078,180/-.

LOAN CHARGES

The Council further owes the National Government Loans Authority and Prudential Assurance Limited Kshs.— KShs. 500/- Local Government Loans Authority and the Bank of India Kshs. 2,798,600/- and the National Housing Corporation and Barclays Bank of Kenya Kshs. 573,600/-.

Loan charges for all these items amount to Kshs. 7,129,200/-. Loans from the National Housing Corporation have been extended towards the Changamwe tenant purchase, rental and owner-occupied housing schemes, Kisauni public rental houses including the service schemes, Port Moresby estate, Buxton and Victoria houses, Majengo housing scheme and the Jomo Kenyatta Flats.

Local Government Loans Authority funds have been used for the construction and extensions of health centres, sewerage and Drainage systems, public conveniences, municipal

AIR TANZANIA BUILDS UP MID-EAST MARKETS

AIR Tanzania Corporation's marketing directorate seems to have struck a diamond mine on its Muscat-Dubai routes. The airline is only accepting bookings for October onwards as all flights this month are full.

ATC's commercial director Frank Makwaia told COASTWEEK that the airline was gauging passenger traffic with a view to ascertaining the need for fielding bi-weekly flights.

An ATC boeing 737 aircraft touched down at Dubai Airport on September 4, 1982 signalling a new era in Tanzania-United Arab Emirates UAE Air Travel. The 106 seater aircraft left Dar

es Salaam via Djibouti and Muscat, but on its way it took the same route and dropped off some passengers at Zanzibar.

The seating configuration of the airline's two boeing's — Ngorongoro and Serengeti has been increased to 110 (with no first class) to accommodate the nine return charter flights ferrying Muslim Pilgrims to Jeddah, Saudi Arabia.

At a reception held in Dubai to honour the maiden flight, ATC's customer Sales Manager, Mr. Jacob Mwakilingi said that the two areas had a great market as there were some 85,000 Tanzanians and their relatives residing in the UAE and about 160,000 in the Sultanate of Oman whose capital is Muscat. A marketing survey carried out by the airline shows that the demand can only be met by running two flights a week.

There are also many Tanzanians working in other Gulf States including Saudi Arabia and Mr. Makwaia pointed out that the airline was deeply studying the Jeddah market. But the commercial director quipped that ATC was in no hurry to extend its routes.

It seems that no further action will be taken until October 14 when the last flight from Jeddah will have been completed.

Mr. Makwaia stressed that the visa documents of the passengers were carefully scrutinised to avoid deportations, but he could not comment on some of the

More Housing For Mombasa

MUNICIPAL COUNCIL PLANS SHS. 144 HOUSING SCHEME

NETA PEAL reports

GOOD news for home-hunters is that the Mombasa Municipal Council — which has been handicapped by lack of finance, may be able to embark upon housing schemes costing around KE7.2 million if approval from the Ministry of Local Government is obtained.

Two financiers have been found who are willing to develop housing schemes if the necessary approval is received.

It is understood that already the Mombasa municipal Council has given a very definite 'yes'.

One of the proposed schemes is for one-hundred high class maisonettes, for which the Commissioner of Lands has been approached for land at Nyali, and 46 medium-cost bungalows at Changamwe, costing around KE3.6 million to build.

Another scheme, which will cost about KE4.2 million, is for about 176 medium cost flats and 94 medium/high cost bungalows at Kisauni near the VOK station, also 204 low cost bungalows at Mtopanga on the Old Malindi Road.

Due to lack of funds, the council has not been able to put up any public rental housing units for about 5 years. Prior to that it had been working on a target of housing 3,000 families a year.

With the growth of Mombasa there has been a dire shortage of housing, particularly for the low and middle income groups.

Building activity over recent years has placed more emphasis on office space, than on new homes.

However, private housing schemes have endeavoured to alleviate the situation, while the Kenya Ports Authority is involved in a massive exercise to house their employees.

Parastatals, particularly the KPA, have many schemes underway. The KPA has a very large project of flats and shops on Dedan Kimathi Road, near Pandya Memorial Clinic, which is nearing completion. It also has other schemes, now in the planning stage, for Shimani. There are also three projected housing schemes for Makupa.

In an interview, Mr. S. Kiaye, Chief Planning Officer, Mombasa Municipal Council, said he thought that building activity was about the same as last year.

APPLICATIONS

At the moment they are receiving many more applications from individuals to build temporary low cost Swahili style houses, than for more conventional homes.

Mr. Kiaye pointed out that considerable building activity is to take place at Mombasa, which includes Bima Towers, Law Courts and the Bank of India.

More Government office blocks are going up, while

opposite Ralli House, Nyerere Avenue, a 12-storey block of shops, offices and flats is being built.

Two new hotels in the Municipality are proposed — one being near Serengeti Beach Hotel and the other near the Reef Hotel.

On the question of town

planning and parking problems in the town, Mr. Kiaye mentioned that council is insisting that new office blocks have underground parking to ease congestion along busy roads. It is also insisting that no building development takes place in areas demarcated as open spaces in the town.

'Moi School' Progress

MOMBASA (K.N.A.) — The Moi High School at Kasigau in Taita Taveta District initiated by the President himself when he visited the District early last year is growing very rapidly, the District Commissioner's annual report for 1981 just released has said.

The school started with an injection of the President's own donation of Shs. 50,000 had its first form one selection last year and now has four classrooms ready for use.

The D.C.'s report also added that there was an injection of Shs. 70,000 from the rural development funds to the school and soon it will be a full fledged secondary school.

Meanwhile, the Ministry of Higher Education has posted two trained teachers to the school. In its report for 1981, the Coast Provincial Higher Education Office said arrangements to meet the expansion at the school in terms of staffing and other amenities were being looked into as they arose.



UNION WARNS OVER WAGE SCALES

MOMBASA (K.N.A.) — The First National Union of Kenya Branch Secretary of the Kenya Union of Commerce, Food and Allied Workers Mr. Mwanza Warrakah has called upon employers to stick to the minimum contained in the new (general) order 1982 and the workers their housing allowance separate from their salaries.

Denying a report in the local daily that the new wages were inclusive of housing allowance, Warrakah said no employer should follow this in the Kenya Gazette dated 20 August clearly stated in addition to the minimum monthly wages prescribed in the first and second schedule shall be paid housing allowance equal to 15 per cent of the basic minimum wage.

Mr. Warrakah said that employers who have not paid this with effect from 1st August must pay immediately warning that his union "shall not entertain any excuses in the matter of workers whose law is concerned."

In the meantime, Warrakah has backed the Kenya Kazi Commission for advising the new order. He said the company had already paid its workers the housing allowance without delay.

He appealed to the employers to follow the example to avoid industrial unrest.

Female Mobster Takes On The Mighty Mafia

A FEMALE MOBSTER is upon Mombasa's movie-land! She is a tough broad who doesn't think twice about standing firm against a small army of hit-men and is a "woman" enough to put her life on the line for a little boy as a mob chase her across a shadowy urban landscape. This is *Gloria* a hard-edged entertainment opening on Monday at Naaz Cinema starring *Genia Rowlands* as a tough, shrewd and bold surrogate mother of a would-be gangland victim in pursuit of danger.

The story starts out with a rub-out. A nervous accountant who has been juggling the mob's books and is hiding with his family in a seedy Bronx apartment house, deposits his seven-year-old son and a mysterious ledger to their neighbour Gloria moments before the staccato sound of machine gun fire echoes through their building — leaving the boy an orphan and at the sole care and protection of Gloria.

Now they want the kid dead, too and only Gloria stands defiantly with feet apart, one hand on her hip, the other holding a gun — between him and the killers. Sporting her short skirt, padded shoulders and dangling cigarette, Gloria dodges avenging hit men through the streets of Manhattan, in the suspenseful tradition of the great gangsters movies. Moving from one apartment to another, they manage to out-race the underworld through the streets of New York, escape a subway

ambush and finally Gloria levels the hit squad in a seedy tenement for the sake of Kid's safety.

Gloria is sure to get a big hand from the female members of the Mombasa audience as she gets tough, gets even, and beats the mob at their own game — even if the only reason for her triumph in the traditionally all male bastion of "tough loner against the world" is explained by the fact that she was a member of the "family" once herself and knows how they operate.

PROMOTING INTRA- AFRICA AIR TRAVEL

TO promote intra-African trade and tourism the African Airlines Association AFRAA is to hold an African Airlines Tariff Conference in Nairobi this month, writes *Aussie Walker*.

The traffic director of the association, Mr. El Amin Zarroug said that although there has been a fare hiking on the trans-Atlantic routes, the association in collaboration with governments of member of states of the association, is very seriously considering the creation of low tariffs to promote traffic inter-Africa.

He explained that after experiencing international inflation and escalating prices of fuel, increasing maintenance costs, the association considered it fitting to rationalise tariffs within as well as to and from Africa.

CONFERENCE

Mr. Zarroug said that a diplomatic conference of African governments had already endorsed the idea of setting up the tariff conference which he said would work out plans to rationalise within the

network of the association.

He said however that although the idea was endorsed and adopted, there were member states which had not ratified the conference convention. He said that if the conference becomes active it will rationalise the tariffs which would be an advantage to travellers within to and from Africa.

He hoped those member states who had not ratified the conference would do so after the Nairobi meeting in September since its outcome would certainly be of an advantage to the promotion of trade and tourism in Africa.

Mr. Asare Kwatia, the Association's financial director said that African Airlines were currently faced by the problem of global recession and increasing operating costs which he said greatly affected the growth of aviation in Africa.

Increased fuel prices, costs of borrowing money for renewing fleet operation and other problems had adversely affected operations.

He said that because of the

size of African Airlines, and the need for importation of technology, and the cost of maintenance outside Africa it had become obvious that African Airlines were finding it difficult and expensive to compete with other international airlines.

Mr. Kassa Eskender, the Association's Technical Director said that to cut down costs, AFRAA is planning to up grade the maintenance facilities of member airlines within Africa so that all maintenance work could be executed cheaply within the continent.

A committee manned by senior engineering experts is working out plans to implement the idea.

NEW AIRCRAFT

The plans included the establishment of a technical pool for spares, standardising specification of new aircraft, licence procedures, joint fuel purchase and joint insurance.

The Secretary General of AFRAA, Col Semret Medhane, summed up the case of air transport in Africa by saying that measures are being undertaken in an attempt to improve the relative cost structure and competitiveness of Africa Airlines.

He said that without co-operation the majority of African Airlines are likely to be a burden on the national economies of their countries.

Hence consultations to co-ordinate and co-operate in all fields such as traffic rights for development routes and transfer of funds earned by an African Airline in another African country, are necessary among airlines and government if Africa is to succeed in developing its air transports services.

DATELINE: DAR ES SALAAM Norway To Finance New Dry-Dock Repair Facility

THE NORWEGIAN International Development Agency NORAD is to grant the Tanzania Harbours Authority some 4.6 million shillings for launching a training programme. The THA and a Norwegian firm — Mantra A/S will manage the programme. The repairing of vessels at the shipyard in Dar es Salaam and would also facilitate the procurement of tools and building materials for the construction of a new lighter.

NORAD is financing the expansion of the dry-docking facilities at the Dar es Salaam Port to enable building small sea craft and service vessels up to 1,500 tonnes dead weight.

Meanwhile the former Cargo vessel, *M.V. Jitegeme* began its maiden voyage to the Reunion Islands along the Indian Ocean under its new name *M.V. Rukwa*. The vessel owned by the newly formed Tanzania Ocean Shipping Corporation has been named after one of Tanzania mainland's southern regions.

This is the first time in two years that the vessel is leaving for a foreign port to collect goods, for it was last in Beira, Mozambique in late 1980 awaiting to collect cargo from Malawi for Europe under its old name *Lord Rajpar*.

It was then owned by a private Dar-es-Salaam based company Tanzania Cold Motors who purchased it from the Tanzania Investment Bank TIB following the dissolution of the defunct Eastern African Shipping Line.

The Government impounded the vessel following a court injunction in Sofala, Mozambique and owner and managing director of the Tanzania Cold Motors, Mr. Akberali Rajpar has been in preventive detention since January 10, 1981 in connection with the purchase of the vessel.

The vessel left in September last year for Hamburg, West Germany to undergo major repairs and returned in March this year. It is reliably learnt that a Geneva-based company has chartered the vessel.

First phase costs for constructing a railway line to span across Tanzania, Uganda, Burundi and Rwanda have been estimated at dollars 2 billion (19.8 billion shillings). This is one of several projects to be undertaken by the Kagera River Basin Development Programme.

The initial work includes surveys along areas the rail will pass through and experts from the Italian Company — Technital and the Austrian Firm — have arrived in Kigali to undertake this exercise. Italy, Austria and the United Nations Development Programme UNDP are some of the financiers of this project.

Four European countries have also shown an interest in financing the Hydro-electricity Project along the rich Rusumo Falls which borders Tanzania and Rwanda. But officials of the Kagera River Basin Development Authority noted that it was too premature to name the countries as they have yet to continue their research on this project.

There was good news for three of the country's major areas. Power supply in the country's third largest town — Mwanza returned to normality following the arrival of lubricants for its generators at the main power station.

The 132-kilovolt transmission line from Moshi to Arusha was commissioned last week. The 69 million shillings 70 km line will greatly relieve the overloaded power carrier between the two northern Tanzanian towns.

While construction of the 220 kv transmission line from the 200 megawatt Kidatu Hydro-electric station to the two billion shillings (dollars 210 million) Mufindi Pulp and Paper Mill in Southern

Tanzania is nearing completion some 245 of the 280 km route line has been completed.

The Spice Islands of Zanzibar are wide open to all foreigners as long as they complied with the country's customs and immigration regulations, the Minister for Home Affairs, Brigadier Muhiddin Kimario noted last week.

Brig Kimario told a press conference that reports by the British News Agency Reuters that Tanzania had barred foreigners from visiting Zanzibar unless they were on Government business were "baseless and lies".

It seems that the reports stem from a rescheduling of Air Tanzania flights to accommodate the nine charter flights ferrying Muslim Pilgrims to Jeddah, Saudi Arabia. Towns like Zanzibar, Arusha and Moshi which use the boeing services have been temporarily affected.

But they come in the wake of a call by the Vice President, Mr. Aboud Jumbe to sell Zanzibar's tourist attractions abroad through expensive publicity. He urged tourist officials to write features and prepare brochures which should be posted at the country's diplomatic missions and tourist offices abroad.

The Vice-President also called on the Tanzania Tourist Corporation TTC in running its hotels smoothly. Mr. Jumbe noted that services at TTC owned hotels had deteriorated considerably adding that there was a danger of tourists being discouraged to visit Tanzania as a result of this anomaly.

Users of toilet paper will be relieved to know that stocks of the items are due to arrive in the country very shortly to alleviate the current acute shortage. Although the Ministry of Industry would not state from which neighbouring country the goods are to be brought from, it seems Kenya is the probable exporter.

It was also good news for Tanzania Airlines which has received from Mozambique the Airport in north Mozambique. February was the first time prosecutor Michael Mwangi the London Old Bailey Criminal Court.

The 87 passengers and crew were told to follow the instructions to blow this plane up. They have pleaded not guilty to charges of hijacking.

Captain Deshpande co-pilot Oscar Mwangi now an instructor pilot and the only person on board during the 50-hour flight hostess Khan and 24 people who were evidence in the London court.

But in Mwanza, involving four persons in the hijacking case heard as the case in court sent to the director of investigation in Dar es Salaam on a mission from Dar es Salaam to Nairobi, Jeddah, and Standstead.

TIME FOR NEW ARAB STRATEGY

THE Organisation of Islamic Conference in Niamey have lambasted both, the Soviet Union and the United States for their hypocrisy in international affairs.

The Soviet condemn the Israeli invasion of Lebanon and occupation of other Arab countries, but go on to invade and occupy Afghanistan and

continue to fight the Afghan resistance with all their might killing thousands of brave people struggling for their country's liberation.

They show no sign of a let-up and no intention that they might someday be willing to negotiate about possible withdrawal.

On the other hand the U.S.

strongly denounces the Soviet occupation of Afghanistan and the imposition of martial law in Poland — a blessing compared with Israeli atrocities in the Arab world — but refrains from calling on Israel to withdraw from the occupied territories in the Arab states.

Worse it is giving Israel precious taxpayer's money to enable it to maintain its stranglehold on the occupied lands, plenty of superior armaments to control the air and battlefields of the region and limitless political support to confound the rest of the world at the U.N.

Do fathers have complete authority over their daughters? Whether the permission of the father is needed in the marriage of a girl who marries for the first time?

According to Islam, both the son and the daughter, are independent, as far as economics is concerned.

Sons, when they have reached puberty and are fully in possession of mind and mature, are free to make their own choice in marriage.

But in the case of daughters, it is different. If a daughter was once married and is at present a widow, nobody has a right to interfere in her affairs and she is like a son.

But if she is a virgin and is going to enter into a marriage contract with a man for the first time, what situation arises? What does Islam say then?

The father does not have absolute authority over her and cannot give her in marriage to anybody he likes without the daughter's desire and consent.

If the father refrains from giving his approval for no reasonable cause, his right is forfeited and then the daughter may have a complete freedom in choosing her husband.

The Holy Prophet himself gave away several daughters in marriage. He never deprived them of their right to choose their husbands.

On the occasion when Ali the Abi Talib presented himself to the Holy Prophet to ask for the hand of Fatima Az-Zahra (a.s.), the Holy Prophet said, "Several persons

have come to me to ask for the hand of Az-Zahra (a.s.) but by the displeasure of her countenance she has refused them. Now I shall inform her of your request."

The Holy Prophet went to his daughter and put the matter before her. Fatima Az-Zahra (a.s.) did not turn her face away in disapproval this time, and by keeping silent and undisturbed, expressed her consent.

The Holy Prophet, came away from Az-Zahra reciting Takbir (Allahu Akbar - Allah is Great).

Islam did the greatest service to the female sex, not only by depriving fathers of their absolute authority. It gave complete freedom; it gave individually, an independence of thought, an opinion, and formally acknowledged their natural rights.

Still the respect for fathers and husbands continue. The foundations of family life were not wrecked. It did not make women despite having husbands, being mothers and bringing up children.

Islam did not provide the means for such social gatherings where bachelors and women-chasers go to hunt out their victims free of cost.

in an interview. Mr Ngare told the KNA that so far his office was receiving all necessary co-operation. He said over 240 seamen have been registered and they were still queuing for the exercise. The registration of seamen by the Ministry rather than the Seamen Union was ordered recently by the Labour Minister Mr Titus Mbatia and took effect from August 31.

Mr Ngare said all shipping agents were cooperating adding that he had a meeting with the secretary of the shipping representatives chapter of the Federation Of Kenya employers Capt K J Trayner who gave assurance to this effect.

He said the registered seamen were then sent to needy employers in three per vacancy and the shipping officer had recruited 27 employees.

Explaining the procedure Mr Ngare said the Government's merchant shipping superintendent Capt. little perused the conditions and terms of employment after the recruitment to make sure the merchant shipping act was complied with.

On the reports from the Cotu Secretary General that the ministerial action was politically motivated, the labour officer said the exercise was aimed at protecting the seamen and hoped the Union will see the reasons later if not now.

Meanwhile the shipping office is still inundated with seamen job seekers and several hundreds of them stay on from morning to evening.

Mr Ngare explained that it was better to wait there as the seamen were already used to the office rather than the labour one which had no space.

Prior to attending the Nairobi Show, Hanomag have invited the African delegates to a three day planning Conference at the Mt. Kenya Safari Club.

Commenting recently on Hanomag's performance in Africa, Mr. Dade said, "Sales of Hanomag units outside Germany accounted for 75 per cent of our total 1981 sales. These export sales represented a 40 per cent increase over 1980.

Of all export regions, outstanding results were achieved in Africa, the Middle East and Far East."

Organizer of the Hanomag Conference is Mr. F. Pitkin who was formerly based in Nairobi, Hanomag's Sales Director for Exports in Africa, the Middle and Far East.

It's Business, Not Politics!

The Managing Director of Malaysian International Shipping Corporation (MISC) the highly successful national line of Malaysia said at a recent seminar that national fleets were often a disaster for all involved. He agreed that developing countries could engage in shipping effectively provided the venture was founded on business considerations and that political considerations which were frequently heard did not lead to decision making on ignored fundamental economic issues.

Prospects for success by a national line venturing into international trades are marginal at best in present market environment. He also was firmly of the opinion that any emerging national line should have the correct mixture of public and private sectors. All this adds up to sound shipping sense.

The Polish Ocean Lines have recently had a change of East African Representative based in Mombasa Mr. B. Zielinski, a firm friend of the Mombasa shipping community returns to Poland, whilst he is succeeded by Mr. Edward Bobrycki who is no stranger to East Africa having been the P.O.L. Representative some 5 years ago. A most enjoyable lunch party for shipping interests was held last week on board "Zygmunt III Waza" to mark the change of Representatives and the return of Edward Bobrycki was warmly welcomed.

The 14 years old Indian flag vessel "Rishi Valmiki" which is scheduled to arrive Mombasa this week with 7500 tons bagged sugar encountered some engine trouble in heavy seas off Crete in the Mediterranean and had to call for assistance. Fortunately, the vessel was able to effect her own repairs and she was able to resume her voyage. Hopefully her sugar cargo should be unaffected.

These days it is refreshing to hear of a large Shipping Group weathering the storm of recession. The German Africa Line, more popularly known as D.O.A.L. in this part of the world, has reported an increase in turnover of 16 per cent for 1981. The Chairman of the Line, Mrs. Von Rantau-Essberger has said that the good results for the past two years compensated for the Line's poor showing in 1979, she was expecting the Company to break even in 1982 and may make a small profit.

Maybe there is a financial advantage to take of Lankan registration. She is changing some 2500 tons from the Far East and loading 2500 tons for the Red Sea.

The BP tanker "British" which is on charter to the Ministry of Defence arrived on Sunday alongside the R.N. Fleet Auxiliary "Gull" at the buoys to support the R.N. Squadron presence.

The British Warship "HMS" engaged in the Falkland Islands campaign. Of 21000 ton weight tons she is one of a number of sister built in 1951. I noticed she was not painted with familiar BP tanker livery colours on this occasion.

The Mediterranean Shipping Company (MSC) the independent/outsider liner operator had four vessels in port last Sunday, the chartered Italian vessel "Tarpon" Santiago de Chile, charging at No. 5 due to arrive last Monday, the "Ida" at No. 1 North and Sandra 5 at No. 10, both discharging and the "Daniela" which had just arrived also to discharge some 1000 tons.

HARBOURS AUTHORITY TO AUCTION ZAMBIAN CARGO

THE Tanzania Harbours Authority (THA) is contemplating auctioning some 800 tons of goods worth millions of shillings which have been piled up at the Dar es Salaam port since 1975.

The goods owned by Tanzanian and Zambian importers include hoes, plough wheels, machinery and construction materials. Advertisements in Zambian and Tanzanian newspapers brought no customers.

Port Authorities could estimate the loss incurred as a result of the pile-up but hope to defray demurrage and custom costs through the auction.

The fuel problem in Zanzibar should be alleviated this month with the return from Mombasa of the Isle's tanker — "Ukombozi" which has been undergoing repairs at the Kenyan Port for the past two months.

But the Isle Government's other tanker — "Uhuru" will probably have to remain in the Malagasy Republic for a longer period following the detection of other mechanical problems.

Meanwhile representatives of the East African Inter-Governmental standing committee on shipping (ISCOS) and the East African

Pongezi kwa Rais Moi, kwa kuwatetea Madereva

RAIS WA Chama kinachotawala cha KANU, na Rais wa Taifa la Kenya Muheshimwa Daniel Arap Moi, Jumatatu iliyopita huko Wilaya ya Kiambu, alitoa mawaidha ya busara sana ambayo yanastahiki kuzingatiwa na kutekelezwa na kila mmoja weto wapo tunapenda amani na umoja udumu katika Taifa letu la Kenya. Rais Moi akihutubia umati mkubwa wa wakazi wa Kiambu na vitongoji vyake, aliwashutumua vikali maafisa ambao hudharau unadamu wa madereva yao kwa kutanya dharau ya kuwakumbuka wakati wa kuendelea na starehe zao.

Rais Moi alishangazwa na kuona afisa, anatoka kwenye gari kuanzia saa za jioni akaingia kwenye baa hadi saa nne za usiku na wakati wote huo huyo dereva maskini yumo ndani ya gari anamsubiri bosi wake amrudishe nyumbani. Rais akiwa na hamasa, alisema kwamba hawa madereva ni wanadamu. Wao wana mabibi nyumbani na baadhi yao pia wako na watoa. Mara madereva wamalirapo kazi yao, kama mfunyikazi yoyote hupenda kurudi nyumbani kama mzazi ili kuangalia hali ya watoto wake na kujumuka nao kazi wakati uliobakia. Na Rais akaonya kwamba kama mfunyikazi yoyote dereva lazima afanye kazi kwa masaa yale yale anayofanya kazi mfunyikazi mwengine yeyote. Yaani masaa ya kazi yakimalizika basi dereva naye yuko huru kwenda kuangalia shughuli zake nyingine.

Maafisa wenyewe vikubwa na daraja kubwa katika kazi zao, ni budi waitikie mwito huu wa Rais na bila ya kufikiria kwamba hadhi zao zimepunguzwa iwapo madereva hawatawapeleka wenyewe shughuli zao zisizokuwa za kikazi. Ukweli ni kwamba maafisa ambao kwa heshima ya kazi zao hubidi kupatiwa gari la serikali, petroli ya serikali na dereva wa serikali, kwa ajili ya kubudumia Taifa wengekuwa na shukurani za kutosah kwa serikali na raia wote kwa ujumla kwa heshima hiyo aliyopawa fedha za kuni gari hilo, na za kununulia petroli ya kuendesha gari hilo na fedha ya kulipa mshahara wa kuendesha gari hilo zatoka katika mfuko wa kodi. Raia ambaye hulipa kodi hiyo, yeye binafsi huenda kazini kwa basi, mataatu na katikati ya mwezi kwa magu.

Hata hivyo zingatia kubwa zaidi katika mawaidha ya Mtukufu Rais, mibali na kumtumisha dereva masaa baada ya kazi, hakuna haja ya kumfanya kibarua kuwa yeye ni mtu duni kwa ajili ya kazi yake anayofanya, maana kazi zote mbele ya macho ya serikali zina umhimu wa kazi katika maisha ya wanadamu na ndipo serikali ikalipa mshahara wa kila kibarua na pia kumlinga katika kazi yake.

Yaani vyeo vyetu visiwe ni leseni ya kukejeli wenzetu ambao hawana elimu kama zetu. Kazi ya kila mtu ni muhimu na kila mmoja anahitaji huduma kutoka kwa mwengine ndipo maisha yake yaweze kumwenda. Bila ya shaka funzo la Rais litazingatiwa kikamilifu kwa madhumuni ya kudumisha upendo na umoja. 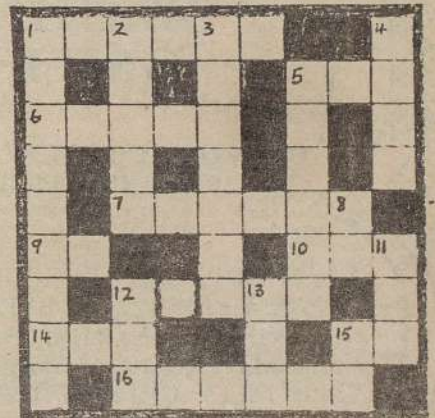

A NEW ART GALLERY OPENS IN MOMBASA

THE Coast has many talented artists — yet their work is rarely seen due to the lack of art gallery at Mombasa, for staging exhibitions is usually costly, unless a sponsor can be found.

Some hotels have helped by offering "free" wall space, but something "permanent" was urgently needed in the town.

Consequently, artists have been suffering due to these lack of facilities, finding it extremely difficult to make a living. Neither do they have the means to establish an art gallery themselves.

There also seems to be a general apathy at the Coast towards art. Much more art work could be introduced into offices, shops, hotels, airports and railway stations to make the country even more attractive.

Some African houses, along the coastal strip have wall murals outside. The idea is

on the walls, and makeka matting on the floor.

It is presently exhibiting an interesting range of work by nine Mombasa artists and two from up-country which is just a small indication of the talent around in Kenya.

About 150 guests attended its official opening among them being many members of the Consular Corps and leading personalities in the community.

Representing the Mayor of Mombasa, who sent his good wishes for its success, was Councillor Aisha Busaidy. It is in her ward that Mombasa's only art gallery is situated and she expressed her delight at

seeing so many important people at the opening. Coun. Busaidy hoped that the people of Mombasa would give it their support by buying some of the items exhibited to encourage local artists to do more.

Social Service

Said Coun. Busaidy, who is also chairman of the Council's housing and social service committee, "the Old Town is teaming with history and the scenery is such that I would love to paint it — if I could. Unfortunately, I am not an artist."

She thanked Andrew Hall for his efforts in establishing something so worthwhile and in declaring the Gallery Masha'allah officially open, wished it every success.

Andrew was born in Nakuru and educated in Nairobi. He never attended art classes and, initially, showed no great interest in it, although both his mother and sister paint.

It was when running a jewellery shop and designing some of the items himself that he discovered this "hidden talent". Said Andrew "I suddenly found I enjoyed drawing with a pencil, and painting with a brush." With it came a greater awareness of the sky, trees and beautiful scenery around him, also a dissatisfaction with his 8-5 job which had become dull.

He moved to the coast three years ago. Andrew loves the Old Town, the Swahili people, the sea and dhows. He paints in water colours, oil, acrylics and pencil of the scenes around him, and is now going into portraits inspired by the interesting faces of the coastal people.

Then, said Andrew "to my dismay, I found there was no outlet in Mombasa for selling my work, which meant having to go to Nairobi to do this."

He found other local artists faced with the same problem. Everyone agreed there was an urgent need for an art gallery, or centre, at Mombasa not only to generate more interest in art, but as a means of selling their work.

This feeling has been echoed by many leaders and art teachers in the town.

Management

Said Andrew "I felt something should be done, and so have given up the two front rooms of my house in the Old Town to accommodate such a gallery."

For a time, Andrew was managing Firmin's Gallery in Nairobi, and so knows a thing or two about their management.

Gallery Masha'alla is open

Said Andrew "two Swahili artists have already come along and will be showing their work here." He hopes others may follow suit.

Exkursion in die Unterwasserwelt

WENN Ihnen der Sinn nach einem Unterwasserabenteuer im James-Bond-Stil steht, fragen Sie im Seafarer's Hotel in Watamu nach Lorenz Riedl, besser bekannt unter dem Namen "Lenz", der mittels eines Unterwasser-Scooters Exkursionen durchführt, um die Höhlen im Vuma und im Mida Creek zu erforschen.

Dieser Scooter ist wohl der einzige seiner Art an der ganzen kenianischen Küste und Lenz, Inhaber einer internationalen Taucherlizenz, der erfahrenste Taucher in Kenia.

Lenz Riedl stammt aus Bayern, taucht seit 23 Jahren in den weltbekanntesten Tauchergründen im Roten Meer, im Atlantik, im Mittelmeer, in der Nord- und Ostsee. Seit 16 Jahren ist er Tauchlehrer und seit 8 Jahren hält er sich an der kenianischen Küste auf.

Ihm gehört die größte Taucherschule an der Nordküste mit 50 kompletten Taucherausrüstungen. Darüber hinaus besitzt er drei Kompressoren, zwei spezielle Taucherboote und Unterwasserkameras, denn Lenz ist bekannt für seine ausgezeichneten Unterwasseraufnahmen.

Er gibt nicht nur Tauchunterricht, ihn besuchen viele Taucherclubs aus der Schweiz, aus Frankreich, Deutschland, Osterreich, England und Nigeria, von denen einige jedes Jahr wiederkommen. Gemäß Lenz ist Watamu der beste Platz zum Tauchen mit seinen Korallenhöhlen,

märchenhaften Unterwasserzön und unzähligen bunten Tropenfischen. Am nördlichen Riff vor Watamu ist eine tiefe Schlucht und, sagt Lenz, letztes Jahr hat er mit seinen Leuten weiter draußen ein drittes Riff mit schwarzer Koralle entdeckt, das einfach phantastisch aussieht.

Die Taucher erleben auf ihren Ausflügen manches Abenteuer und begegnen Manta-Rochen, Walhaien und vielen Wasserschildkröten. Manchmal klettert Lenz, wenn er es nicht allzu eilig hat, auf den Rücken einer Schildkröte, um ihren "Taxidienst" zu benutzen.

Er organisiert auch Touren zu den Unterwassergrotten im Mida und im Vuma Creek. In den Höhlen im Mida Creek halten sich viele Grouper auf, die man aber nur bei Hochwasser in der Nippflut erreichen kann, also nur an vier Tagen im Monat.

Zu den Grotten werden die Leute per Unterwasser-Scooter gefahren, der drei Passagiere auf einmal befördern kann bei einer Geschwindigkeit von ungefähr 5 km/h. Die Vuma-Grotten sind groß und tief und sind Teil eines überhängenden Felsens, der nicht zum Riff gehört. Sie sind großartig und in

ihrer Art einmalig, sollten jedoch nur von sehr erfahrenen Tauchern besucht werden.

Lenz beklagt sich zusammen mit anderen Tauchern über die unzähligen Muscheln, die jeden Tag vom Meeresgrund verschwinden. Soviele wurden bereits in der Gegend zwischen dem Strand und dem Riff weggenommen, daß gewisse Stellen vollkommen abgegrast und kahl sind.

Lenz begann seine nasse Karriere als Rettungsschwimmer beim Roten Kreuz, während er noch zur Schule ging. Eine gründliche Ausbildung als Tauchlehrer erhielt er in Norddeutschland. Als dann unterrichtete er Leute von der Feuerwehr und vom Roten Kreuz im Tauchen; eine Zeitlang war er als Froschmann bei der Marine in der Nordsee.

SEAHORSE

1974 kam er nach Kenia, um für den African Safari Club zu arbeiten und lernte die ganze kenianische Küste kennen. Er leitete je ein Wassersportzentrum in Watamu, Mtwapa und Kilifi.

Später war er Partner im Seahorse in Kilifi und errichtete dort sein eigenes Wassersport-

zentrum. Lenz ist gegenwärtig für ein Jahr im Seafarer's, um die größte Taucherbasis an der kenianischen Küste aufzubauen, die vor allem als Anziehungspunkt für große Tauchergruppen aus aller Welt gelten soll.

Demnächst beginnt die Saison zum Hochseefischen. Muff Becker im Seafarer's ist bereit für das Stoßgeschäft, nachdem er seine bisherige Hochseeflotte — bestehend aus dem 12 m langen Katamaran "El Dorado" und der 8 m langen

Er wies darauf hin, daß 15 Prozent der in Kenia verzeichneten Anglerrekorde aus den Gewässern bei Watamu stammen, einschließlich einer ganzen Reihe von Afrikarekorden.

ERROL ON FOOD

PARTIES have tended to become, like fashion, much less formal in the last few years.

Mombasa, as far as its climate is concerned is perfect for party giving, especially "al fresco" gatherings which whether given by day or by night, lend themselves beautifully to chilled soups, ratatouille seafood risotto and fruits macerated in liquors where the whole social keynote is on informality.

Getting the ingredients one wants is the most difficult aspect of entertaining in Kenya at present — how can you serve risotto without rice?

But Mombasa has a better chance than Nairobi in many ways because of the wealth of varieties of fish and fruit available, it is worth battling through the basket carrying boys at the market, early in the morning to get the best vegetables. I long ago discovered that the line of least resistance was to give in, let someone carry my kikapu and then one is left in peace to select the herbs, vegetables and fruits one wants.

The secret of relaxed enter-

taining is to prepare as much as possible in advance, keep the glasses topped up and concentrate on assembling rather than cooking food while guests are on the premises.

Fish soups lend themselves very well. They only need reheating when brought to the table and can be filled with so many goodies that they become a meal in themselves when served with chunks of hot French bread.

Fresh fruit is a winner, sliced oranges — all pith and pips removed chilled and laced with cointreau or gin believe it or not — is perfectly light after a hefty middle course.

Pineapple Imperial is another easy pudding that looks glamorous. Here are some ideas for an informal lunch, the recipes will serve 8 and as rice is available spasmodically have

included the seafood risotto for such occasion.

TOMATOES PROVENCALE

8 large tomatoes or 12 small salt
2 cloves of garlic chopped
2 tabs of chopped parsley
1 cup of breadcrumbs
1 tsp olive oil

Halve the tomatoes, salt lightly and sprinkle with chopped garlic and parsley. Add a few drops of olive oil. Grill until very brown — approximately 5 minutes. Serve at once.

SEAFOOD RISOTTO

This recipe is easily adjustable; let the contents depend entirely on what is available.

1 red and 1 green pepper
4 tbs olive oil
2 tbs vinegar
4 cups uncooked rice
a good pinch of saffron
2 bay leaves, 1 pinch of thyme
1 tbs of white fish
1/4 lb of other fish - lobster or prawns
some baby squid, cleaned and chopped in pieces
white wine
salt and black pepper
4 hardboiled eggs (3 chopped)
1 sliced for garnishing
4 slices fried bacon chopped in small pieces
1 lb peeled tomatoes quartered.

The day before required. Slice the peppers cover with oil and vinegar and leave overnight.

On the day required. Boil the rice with saffron in salted water (chicken stock is even better), 2 bay leaves and thyme. Boil, skin, bone and flake the fish. Stew the shellfish in white wine for no longer than five minutes. Combine all the ingredients and season to taste. Turn into an ovenproof dish. Serve hot. Decorate with sliced hardboiled eggs and chopped parsley.

BALKAN GREEN SOUP

2 cucumbers, washed but not peeled and roughly chopped
2 finely sliced onions
2 handfuls of watercress
2 small peeled chopped uncooked potatoes
1 oz butter
2 cups chicken stock
2 lumps sugar
2 pinches salt
2 1/2 pints milk
1/4 pint plain yoghurt

Fry all the vegetables gently in butter. When the onions are transparent and limp puree all the ingredients in a blender. Add cold milk to taste, depending on whether you want a thick or thin soup.

Chill and serve with a spoonfull of yoghurt in each bowl.

POUSSIN IN GINGER AND YOGHURT

Split as many baby chickens as you need along the backbone and marinate in yoghurt and sliced green ginger, lemon juice and freshly ground black pepper and salt for at least two hours.

They are very good eaten crispy so bake them in a hot oven for 1 1/2 to 2 hours depending on how well done you require them. Serve with a plain green salad.

It is the second wheelchair for this Rotary Club to have donated. In addition, as part of a Rotary District 113 project (covering 105 clubs in London) it also helped to provide a land-rover for this Port Reitz School.

Ted Kirtland and Ken Davies, a former Ag. Headmaster, have done much to promote the school among Rotarians in London.

Mr. Kirtland is a past-president of the Bethnal Green Rotary Club, and current chairman of its vocational services committee.

On one of his visits to Mombasa he made a cine film of the school which helped convince Rotary District 113 that it was a very worthwhile project to assist.

Edward and Amy visit the school whenever they return to Mombasa, often showing the children some their cine films and giving them sweets.

Ted is also chairman of the Tower Hamlets Society for the Mentally Handicapped which, after 31 years of existence, has just acquired its own premises. It was named the "Kirtland Centre" in acknowledgement of the dedicated work he has carried out for this society.

It is a socio/educational centre and is a new project being pioneered by a completely voluntary committee. In the evenings there are social programmes for the mentally handicapped so they can have some fun just as others do.

Robert Mbaru, headmaster of the Port Reitz School is thanking Mr. Kirtland and the Bethnal Green Rotary Club said how grateful they were for this gift, as they were in great

need of wheelchairs.

The school, the only one of its kind in the coast province has 126 students from all over Kenya between the ages of 6 1/2 to 18 years. All are boarders. It was established by the Methodist Church starting in a small way with only physically handicapped students in a church hall at Changamwe.

The school, which developed considerably in those days, now comes under the Ministry of Basic Education. Such is the high standard of education offered that its students have gone to university.

The school's secretary Dorca James, a former student there. With the help of Margaret Beetham (nee Bird) who had started the school in 1965 and through her hard work and dedication had seen it grow, Dorca was able to attend the Malaga High School, and then go on to take a secretarial course at the YWCA Vocational Training Centre, Likoni.

She was offered a job at the school as it was found that she had the highest qualifications compared to other non-handicapped applicants.

DISTRIBUTION

Mr. Kirtland accompanied by Nam Patel, chairman of the Rotary Club of Kilindini, who revealed had 15 wheelchairs available for distribution to those in need.

Last year, the club gave tricycles for handicapped people to the Kilifi Hospital, the Governor of District 920, Annel Silengwe, who is Chief Justice of Zambia, who is officially handing over to Mkomani Harambee Clinic the new sterilisation unit that the Rotary Club of Kilindini has provided at a cost of Shs. 250,000.


