**Police seize copies of newspaper**

KENYAN officers at Kenyatta International Conference Centre seized thousands of copies of the Coastweek newspaper following protests by

Israelis over reports entitled "The agony of Beirut".  
An authoritative source told the Nation that the Israelis complained to authorities yesterday morning that the reports and pictures would disrupt peace at the ongoing International Telecommunications Union conference.  
The seized edition of the paper was dated September 24-30. Thousands of copies had been lying at both the Press room and near the registration desk of the ITU the whole of last week.  
The Israelis alleged that Arabs had been involved in the production of the issue, the source said. The copies were being distributed freely though a copy sells for 1.95. This is said to have caused suspicion among the Israelis, the source said.

## Refuting Myths Of 'Arab' Involvement

THERE IS no truth in allegations that "Arabs" were involved in the production of the COASTWEEK issue dated September 24-30, 1982, which contained a photo essay entitled "The Agony of Beirut" contributed by Nairobi-based international news agency press reporter Mohamed Amr of "Camerapix".  
The allegations were carried in a front-page report of the Daily Nation of Tuesday, October 12, 1982.  
The relevant facts relating to the "seizure" of copies of COASTWEEK by security officers at the Kenyatta International Conference Centre are as follows:  
• A representative of the International Telecommunications Union Secretariat in Nairobi purchased 2,500 copies of the COASTWEEK issue dated September 24-30, 1982, at the full price of Shs 1.95 per copy, for distribution to delegates attending the ITU conference, because that issue carried a particularly attractive, five-page special report in four-colours about the current ITU Conference.  
• The ITU Secretariat was completely unaware of the remaining editorial content in that issue of COASTWEEK, nor was it their concern, other than a front-page report which detailed the arrival in Nairobi of leading ITU delegates.  
• It is a regular and normal procedure for companies, societies, associations and individuals to purchase extra copies of COASTWEEK at the full retail price when special reports or supplements feature their activities and progress.  
• COASTWEEK has been unable to establish "who" complained to "which" authorities, but has no hesitation in agreeing that if such editorial material was considered "controversial" or "offensive" and a cause for unnecessary diversion during discussions of a non-political nature at an international conference, it should be withdrawn.  
• COASTWEEK has no ideological or political axes to grind, the issues and disputes of the Middle East will not be featured in the newspaper columns of Mombasa and Nairobi — the report and photographs were featured because they were an "exclusive" contribution from an award-winning correspondent well-known to Kenyan readers for his often dramatic coverage of the world trouble spots.

# Four Great Years' Of Nyayo Era

## ANNIVERSARY CELEBRATIONS

KENYANS have this week been marking with pride and appreciation the fourth anniversary of the Nyayo golden era under the wise and dynamic leadership of President Daniel Arap Moi.  
This brief period in the post independence history of Kenya has been climaxed by President Moi's successful conclusion of term of office as the Chairman of the Organisation for African Unity through which President Moi has emerged as one of the most forceful spokesmen for the Third World in the international scene.  
In between his jet-set Harambee meetings and state functions, President Moi has been able to visit many overseas countries in Europe, America, Far Asia and some African countries, which included his major and historical address to the 36th session of the UN General Assembly in New York and the Commonwealth executive session in Melbourne, Australia, where on both occasions President Moi condemned the South Africa's apartheid system and declaring that there should be no compromise with the racist regime, and re-iterated his call for total sanctions against South Africa.  
**'LANDSLIDE' SUPPORT**  
On the home front, the four years period has seen President Moi at his busiest.  
Enjoying landslide support from his people since the early days when he assumed "interim power" he has taken wide-ranging steps to stamp out corruption and smuggling, and kept up to his promise for an equal share of the national

cake among his countrymen.  
Summing up the situation prevailing in the country following the August disturbances, President Moi said last week during a dinner party hosted in honour of the visiting Aga Khan: "The recent disturbances have not in any way diverted our people from the cause of peace, love and unity. Instead, the incident has served to enrich the character

and vitality of our nationhood. This country remains stable and united".  
Indeed, under his leadership, the will to make Kenya great has been revived, releasing a new spirit of national and personal pride among Kenyans who have vowed in the recent country-wide loyalty demonstrations to protect and safeguard the constitutional and democratic principles upon which the nation was founded.

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# TOP-QUALITY FURNITURE

Turning out "top quality" furniture in the carpentry workshop of APDK's Likoni Rehabilitation Centre are 17 handicapped young men and much of what they have made graces some of the Coast's most prestigious hotels.

It is a project assisted by the German Volunteer Service members of which have trained these physically handicapped people into becoming skilled wage-earning craftsmen instead of being forced to beg on the streets for a living.

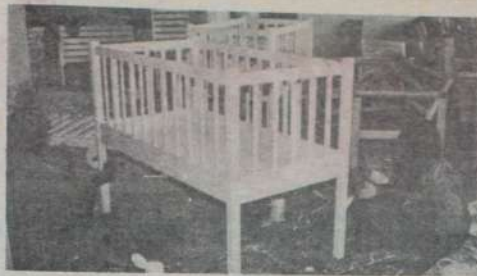
There has also been a great deal of help from service clubs and organisations both here and abroad to help the project expand.

Today, these carpenters are earning over Shs 600 a month.

In addition, there are fourteen handicapped trainees there on a two year carpentry course at the end of which they sit a Government trade test.

## HIGHLY TRAINED

Unfortunately, there is still a great reluctance on the part of employers to take on a disabled person, although he may be highly trained.

Consequently, trainees have difficulty in finding jobs when they leave. Of the seven who graduated last year, only four have managed to find carpentry jobs so far.

Government has been approached for help.

With hotel development considerably reduced compared to previous years and a consequent drop in orders, the centre finds itself working at only about 50 per cent capacity and is looking

for support from companies and individuals in the community.

The Centre has now established a presence at Barclays Bank and Afro-Meat, both in Nkrumah Road, which many people visit. It has desks there on which are pictures of the furniture it produces to create a greater awareness among the general public of what is being undertaken there.

## MANY NEW ITEMS

The Centre offers a comprehensive range of furniture for the bedroom, dining room, nursery and garden, also for the office, and recently introduced many new items which include coffee bean tables.

Furniture can also be made to your own design. Just take a picture, or a sketch along, for them to copy.

Horst Kundinger has been its administrator for the past three years, while Hans Schubert is the centre's technical adviser. Both are from the German Volunteer Service and are doing a great service by helping the community in this way.

The centre also has ten non-handicapped employees including Aloys Musaki who is the Sales and Purchasing Manager there.

# ERROL ON FOOD

It has always seemed a pity to me that prawns should have become universally associated with that ubiquitous start to a meal, smothered in pinkish mayonnaise. The prawn cocktail is in danger of becoming boring (it has already been pronounced NAFF — today's equivalent of non-U in a recent survey of such things) and appears on every menu from Lamu to Diani monotonously.

It is the same in England from a Trattoria in Edinburgh to a five star hotel in Bournemouth including motorway restaurants in between. There are after all many other far more delicious ways of beginning a meal with prawns than draped in a mixture of tomato sauce and mayonnaise — which when one gets to the shredded lettuce, is what most prawn cocktails boil down to if my readers will pardon the inappropriate metaphor.

Once upon a time Mombasa Club used to serve Youngs potted shrimps on their menu which were delicious, almost irresistible in fact. Alas these are but a memory but potted shrimps and prawns are simple enough to make at home.

Here is how, plus some interesting alternatives to prawn cocktail. All are chilled first courses (except the bisque) which will happily double as a light luncheon dish.

## POTTED PRAWNS

- 2 lbs fresh shrimps or prawns
  - 1/2 butter
  - 1/2 bay leaf
  - 1/8 tbs mace
  - ground black pepper
- Bring a large pan of seawater to the boil and throw the

prawns in. Bring back to the boil and cook for one minute; drain at once and shell when cool. Melt butter in a bowl standing over a pan of simmering water. Add the bay leaf and mace (or nutmeg if mace is not available) and leave for five minutes stirring now and then. Then stir in the prawns and coarsely ground black pepper and leave for ten minutes sitting occasionally. Remove the bay leaf. Lift the shrimps into suitable china dishes which they fill nicely.

Individual ramekins are the most convenient. Then add enough of the butter to come to the level of the prawns. Cool then chill and refrigerate. Serve within two days with thinly sliced brown bread and butter or toast. If kept longer than two days seal with another layer of butter and they should keep for a fortnight in the refrigerator or longer still in the freezer. Serves 4.

Again instead of a rich mayonnaise which does nothing for an avocado except make it richer than it already is, try a Blue cheese dressing with prawns instead.

## AVACADO AND PRAWNS WITH BLUE CHEESE DRESSING

- 6 ozs shelled prawns
- 2 avocado pears

- 4 tbs oil
- 1 1/2 tsp lemon juice
- 1/2 tsp mustard
- salt and pepper
- 1 oz blue cheese

Boil the prawns until pink in sea water for preference. They will only take a minute or two. Remember overcooking make them rubbery.

Mix the oil, lemon juice and seasonings together then cream in the crumbled blue cheese with a fork. Check seasoning. Add the cooled prawns to this. Chill.

When ready to serve halve the avocado pears in the usual way and fill with the dressed prawns. Sprinkle with paprika and serve. Serves 4.

## PRAWN BISQUE

- 8 ozs peeled prawns
- 1 oz butter
- 1 oz flour
- 3/4 pint milk
- 2 tbs white wine
- salt and pepper
- Paprika
- 2 tbs cream and one egg yolk

If the prawns are frozen defrost at room temperature. If fresh boil in sea-water and remove shells. Place the prawns milk, butter, flour and wine in the liquidiser and blend until the prawns are in small pieces. Pour into a saucepan and cook, stirring with a wooden spoon,

until the soup thickens. Simmer for three minutes. Season to taste.

Combine cream and egg yolk. Stir in heating gently without allowing to boil or it will curdle. Check seasoning and serve.

## ICED PRAWN CURRY

- 8 ozs long grained rice
- hard boiled egg
- 8 ozs cooked peeled prawns
- chopped parsley

## THE SAUCE

- 1 small onion finely chopped
- 2 tbs curry powder
- 8 oz can of peeled tomatoes
- 1 tbs mango chutney
- (dash of tabasco sauce)
- 2 tbs cream
- 1 oz butter
- 1 tsp flour
- 1/2 tsp salt
- 1 tsp sugar
- 1/4 pin mayonnaise (Hellmans)
- juice of half lemon.

To prepare the sauce saute the onion gently in butter until soft. Stir in the flour and curry powder. Then add tomatoes, salt, sugar and chutney and bring to the boil. Cover with a lid and simmer for 30 minutes.

Draw off the heat and pass the sauce through a sieve. Blend with mayonnaise add tabasco sauce, cream and lemon juice.

Stir in the cooked prawns and chill until ready to serve. The boiled rice should be dressed with French dressing and when ready to serve spoon the curried prawns onto this garnish with hard boiled chopped egg and scatter with chopped parsley. Serves 4.



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# Reading Up Many More Millions ...

FOUR hundred new reference books worth about £800 have been presented by the British Council to the fast growing Government Training Institute at Mombasa.

They are part of the Shs. Two million worth of books which the British Council has so far donated to various educational institutions in Kenya this year.

Those going to the GTI deal mainly with accountancy, management and secretarial work, and had been selected by the Institute as being the most useful for their needs.

They were presented by Derrick Aspinall, the British Council's representative in Kenya, and received by Wilson Ndetei, under-secretary in the Directorate of Personnel Management on behalf of Mr. A. K. Kandie, Permanent Secretary.

With this gift came an assurance from Mr. Aspinall that the "Books Presentation Programme" would continue at a higher rate but focusing specifically on the tertiary level and on "in-service" training.

There was also an assurance that the Technical Co-operation Training Programme between Kenya and the UK will continue, and is expected to increase. The intake from Kenya under this programme is one of the highest in the world, covering roughly about 350 students a year.

In thanking the British Council, Mr. Ndetei said that the Government of Kenya appreciates the help being given, for it indicates the British Government's concern over the need for more trained personnel in Kenya, and of giving them the necessary professional knowledge. Declared Mr. Ndetei, "We hope this will not be the

last of such donations."

The GTI at Mombasa has embarked on a sizeable expansion programme.

Said Mr. S. J. Giira Cerere, its Principal, "Our first priority is to expand."

At the moment 210 students are accommodated there from all over Kenya. The figure is expected to increase to 500 when facilities are available.

A new block is presently being built for lecturers and administrative staff. During the present financial year, dormitory accommodation will be extended by the addition of 200 single cubicles, plus a few staff-houses, while next year the tuition block is being enlarged by the addition of nine classrooms.

A larger library is being built, while future plans include a conference complex which will be integrated with a tourist hotel yet to be developed near Ambalal House.

The GTI is fully government maintained, and the 210 students are civil servants or from local authorities taking up to one year courses there, four of which relate to accountancy, and one to secretarial subjects.

In addition, evening classes which are open to all, are held there. Such are their popularity that there are between 400-500 students attending, interested in working towards public examinations in accountancy and secretarial work.

The Institute, through its full-time and evening courses, trains personnel from central government, local authorities, parastatal organisations and the business community.

Mr. Ndetei mentioned the need

for a continuous supply of manpower to the various government ministries, noting that they received a lot of support from the British Council through various training programmes to supplement the work the Kenya Government is doing in the training field.

He emphasised the fact that "training in middle management is most important, and that GTI as well as KIA play a major role in assisting Kenyans to train in areas where this is most needed."

There are four Government training establishments in Kenya, the senior one being the Kenya Institute of Administration (formerly Jeanes School) GTIs are at Maseno and Mombasa, and there is a government secretarial training college in Nairobi.

Mr. Aspinall was on a four-day familiarisation tour at the Coast, during which he also presented books to the Mombasa Polytechnic and Teachers' Training College at Shanzu. He was also "taking a look at the contribution the British Council is making to the Adult Literacy Campaign and Adult Education Service, as well

as reviewing their services in Mombasa."

Mr. Aspinall and his wife Maureen were married only a few weeks ago. The staff of the British Council, Mombasa, took the opportunity of presenting them with a decoratively carved wooden chest as a wedding gift.

Peter Hilken, Director of the British Council, Mombasa, told the Principal of the GTI that they were also concerned with "quality" of books donated, as well as "quantity". He said "a close relationship with the Institute is important as the British Council can help in the training of library assistants as well as in the supply of books, which the Institute itself can select as those most suitable for their needs."

## Mvita PTA Charity Walking

MOMBASA District Commissioner Mr. Issac Lukalo is scheduled to flag off a charity walk on October 24 organized by the Mvita Primary School Parents Association in aid of their Harambee project at the school. Kshs 700,000 is expected to be collected from the walk towards the construction of 4 classrooms for the school. An appeal for sponsors has already been by the School's Parents Association.

Something Of A Freak Show

MOMBASA'S TOURIST colony has something new to offer the current season's overseas safari-goer. No game-viewing minibuses are required for the in-door game park as no large herds of animals are anticipated. Indeed game-watchers with telephoto lenses at the ready, are in for some disappointment.

Its all happening at Kenya Cinema *The Elephant Man* a sad story of a deformed man, in constant pain and suffering from an incurable disease, harassed by hostile strangers, and who is destined for a very short life.

The film is based on the book "The Elephant Man and other Reminiscences" by Sir Frederick Treves published in 1923 and depicts the life of *John Merrick* who suffered from a mysterious disease which left him hideously deformed with an enlarged, mis-shapen head and a distended frontal bone which almost closed one eye and had a trunk like appearance. He also had ugly skin tumours

hanging from his back, his right arm was like a club and his feet were unrecognizable.

Thank heavens, only a couple of scenes in the film show *The Elephant Man's* appalling deformity in full - but nevertheless his predicament, pain and suffering, is never in doubt.

The story kicks off when a young brilliant surgeon show a group of doctors a truly astonishing and horrible sight of a man condemned to a life of a freak in a circus side-show. It is the start of a long relationship between doctor Treves played by *Anthony Hopkins* and *The Elephant Man* John Merrick played by *John Hurt* in their struggle for

latter's rehabilitation, pitted against many obstacles and hostility from fellow doctors and the owner of the circus owner.

And when years of filth are washed from the Elephant Man's grotesque body his enormous courage and quiet dignity enables him to find some enjoyment in his last few years.

Is *The Elephant Man* a horror film or a love story? The verdict is, of course, is yours!

At Naaz Cinema, *Roger Moore* as James Bond 007 returns in *Moonraker* the eleventh in the 007 adventure series that claims to begin where other Bonds end.

Bond's mission is to save the earth from a master plan to eliminate human life from a space station by propelling the globes of poison gas into the atmosphere.

## DATELINE: DAR ES SALAAM

### TANZANIAN ISMAILIS LOOKING FORWARD TO AGA KHAN VISIT

THE LEADER of the 20 million Shia Imami Muslim sect - Prince Karim Aga Khan will visit Tanzania from November 21, to meet his followers. His eight day tour is part of a series of visits to coincide with the Silver Jubilee of his accession to the 'Imamat'. This is the Aga Khan's first visit to Tanzania in 12 years and he will visit Dodoma, Moshi and Mwanza.

The Aga Khan will however be meeting fewer Ismailis, as many of them have emigrated mainly to Canada and Pakistan.

The Ismaili Community have played a prominent role in the educational and social welfare arena before Independence and in the immediate post-uhuru era.

Most of the non-government schools in the urban areas and dispensaries were established by the Community and one of the Country's largest private hospitals is the Dar es Salaam based Aga Khan Hospital.

Built to cater for a population of about 200,000 people in 1964. The Hospital is very busy grappling even with workers of state-owned enterprises.

Under a new world-wide health programme initiated by the Aga Khan, the Hospital's services are to be expanded, health services to be extended up-country and some of the existing dispensaries are to have their status elevated to hospitals.

The Aga Khan's economic wing - The Industrial Promotion Services (IPS) is also one of the four in Africa with well established factories in Dar es Salaam, Tanga and Moshi. The others are in Kenya, Zaire and the Ivory Coast.

It was during his last trip in October 1970 that he attended with his younger brother, Prince Amyn, the official inauguration of the 11-storeyed IPS building in Dar es Salaam by President Nyerere.

Shortages of rice and other foods should be alleviated next year, thanks to a 6 million dollars grant from Japan for the purchase of rice, fertiliser and agricultural chemicals. Some 3.5 million dollars will be used for importing 7,100 tons of rice and the rest will be used for importing the inputs.

### STEEL PLANT

A West German firm - "Lurgi" will undertake a ten-month feasibility study of Tanzania's proposed iron and steel plants. The Vienna-based UNIDO will finance the 413,000 dollars studies aimed at providing data for Tanzania to be self-sufficient in steel.

The studies will indicate the cost of the plant which will most probably be located near the Liganga iron ore deposits and the Mchuchuma coal deposits in Southern Tanzania. Feasibility studies on the economic viability of the two areas were completed in 1978.

West Germany will supply the Tanzania-Zambia Railway Authority (TAZARA) with 14 diesel electric locomotives and 16 engines under a 24 million

during the past month. Users of Saloons already gripped with a shortage of tyres are in for a dilemma as their "bald" tyres run out.

The Minister of National Education, Mrs. Tabitha Swale, has stressed the importance of using English only for all subjects except Kiswahili, in secondary schools.

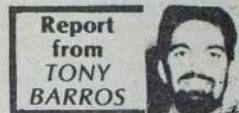
The concern was voiced by the Minister following complaints by teachers of the students' inability to comprehend some of the lessons conducted in English. The teachers state that they are forced to use Kiswahili to make the children get the message.

Kiswahili is used as a medium of instruction in Primary Schools and although English is taught as a second language, the emphasis is not sufficient to pave the way for a smooth transition for Secondary School education. The students have difficulty grappling with the sudden change as they use either Kiswahili or their vernaculars in their homes.

### U.S. TRAVELS

Twenty-five senior government officials from Dar es Salaam and up-country have arrived in the United States to attend a five weeks executive development course. They are sponsored by the United States Aid for International Development (USAID).

The officials will study ways of improving the effectiveness and efficiency of their organisations and how to increase productivity in the rural areas. They will also study management of agriculture and co-operatives in the rural areas of the U.S.A.

Nine of the engines will be supplied under a 6.5 million dollars grant to Tanzania and a 6.5 million dollars loan to Zambia by West Germany. The remaining 8.6 million dollars for purchasing the five locomotives will be secured through a loan to the Zambian Government from the West German Bank for Reconstruction (KfW).

The 16 engines will be delivered in four equal instalments effective next January, bringing TAZARA's engine fleet when two such Agreements materialise, to 36 - 6 short of the Authority's ability to operate smoothly. A similar Agreement for supplying 16 engines was negotiated and six of these were delivered last month.

But there was bad news for motor vehicles owners. The Arusha based General Tyre EA Ltd. is to close down this week for a minimum of three months due to acute shortage of raw materials.

The factory which is owned by National Development Corporation and the American multinational - General Tyre, has been manufacturing tyres for trucks

As a frequent visitor to Malindi I regret to note that the upkeep and maintenance of roads and public places is deteriorating yearly.

**'B.P.' Drastically Reduces Its Fleet**

WHAT HAS BEEN termed as "one of the blackest days in British Shipping" has resulted from last week's announcement by B.P. (British Petroleum) that approximately one-third of their tanker fleet will be up for disposal with a loss of over 1200 jobs. The operation is expected to be completed by next May.

Apparently the fleet has been making losses of millions of pounds per year in an extremely sluggish market with falling rates and a heavy overtonnage situation in the world tanker market - in fact an oil company spokesman has voiced the opinion that presently half the world's tanker capacity is surplus.

Amongst the BP tankers on the sale market are the 69,000 d.w. tons British Centaur, British Commerce and British Commodore which have been regular carriers over the years of crude oil for E.A.O.R. Mombasa refinery.

Another sad occasion involving the complete disappearance of the red ensign on a regular basis from Kilindini, was the recent announcement that the well known and popular Strath "E" Class, namely Strathesk, Strathedon, Stratherror and Strathewe are to be sold en bloc to Greeks.

These fine looking British cargo liners only 45 years old have served the East Africa/U.S.A. trade for some years now but the worldwide container revolution has now outlived their usefulness.

P and O are not however giving up the U.S.A. trade built up over the past 5 years but the trade will be serviced by the tortoise-like Beacon (British Container Lines) Service with containers only transhipped at Marseilles into Nedlloyd vessels to the U.S.A.

This will be an equally reliable and more frequent service than the hitherto direct service but as I say the P and O vessels will be sadly missed in Mombasa and the disappearance of yet another conventional line.

An arrival at Mbaraki Wharf was effected with precision timing last Sunday morning as HMAS Adelaide edged

alongside at the scheduled 1000 hours with the Australian High Commissioner, Mr. A. G. White, and other officials waiting to greet her it was unfortunate that her arrival heralded a heavy shower of rain although of short duration.

The Indian sugar discharger Rishi Valmia continues to discharge her bagged sugar direct into road transport alongside number 3 berth built in 1968 as the Shinkai Maru, she is easily identified as a product of a Japanese shipyard with her standard Japanese design of heavy lift derricks amidships which is probably little used except for new ownership. She is expected in complete discharge tomorrow.

The arrested Saudi vessel Fateh Al Khair is slowly but surely discharging her cargo of mangrove poles at number 7 north and it will be interesting to see what destiny awaits the vessel on completion of discharge.

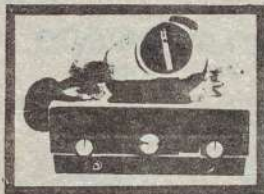
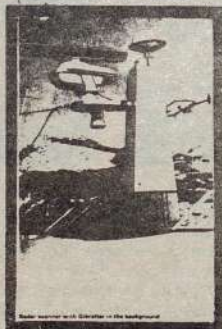

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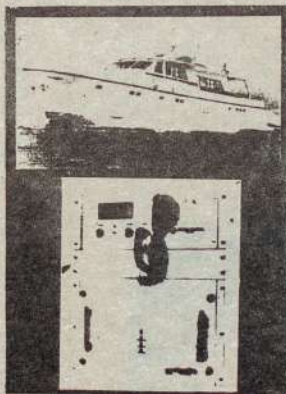

FOUR years of Nyayo leadership finds Kenya a united, peaceful and lovely country with a thriving democracy.

Despite the shame and suffering brought about by the traumatic events that took place in Nairobi and Nanyuki in the early hours of August 1 the country has come out magnificently unscathed with its character and vitality of its nationhood intact and its commitment towards the cause of peace, love and unity revitalized.

With the events of that bloody Sunday behind them, this years Nyayo anniversary assumes a more significant meaning to all wananchi who have wholeheartedly embraced the Nyayo philosophy and have enjoyed continued peace, stability and prosperity under the wise and dynamic leadership of President Moi.

After serving faithfully and loyally during the Kenyatta era spanning 15 years, the hour of Moi to steer the nation towards further development and prosperity arrived when the late President Jomo Kenyatta died peacefully in his sleep at State House Mombasa in August 1978.

President Moi then ushered in a new era in the history of Kenya and guided his people to relative further prosperity with a thriving tourist trade and a healthy market in tea and coffee.

Children Home at Bamburi.

The President also conducted Harambee meetings all over the country — one of which helped raise about 20 million towards the disabled of Kenya. And despite his tight schedule at home, President Moi visited many overseas countries in Europe, America, Far Asia and some African countries.

After many years of standing in for the late Mzee Jomo Kenyatta at OAU summits, last year saw President Moi assuming the tough job of being the new OAU chairman at the Organisation's summit conference in Nairobi last July.

Since then President Moi has effectively spoke for the whole of Africa, strove for peace among its nations and helped to advance the liberation struggle in Southern Africa.

He emerged as the key man whose personal views and ability were geared to solving numerous problems facing the continent.

On the international scene, President Daniel Arap Moi has attended a number of international forums of the United Nations, its agencies and other international organisations to present a collective position on African affairs as well as other international matters.

With this shining international posture to his credit and the record of progress and prosperity, the country has attained since Independence, Kenya under Moi's leadership is expected to play a major role in spearheading progress in solving outstanding conflicts and problems in Africa such as the decolonisation of Namibia, the removal of apartheid system in South Africa, and the implementation of the Lagos Plan of Action for economic development of Africa.

At home, the prevailing social and economic situation points towards a united land of hope, peace, stability and proletarian prosperity, for many years to come.

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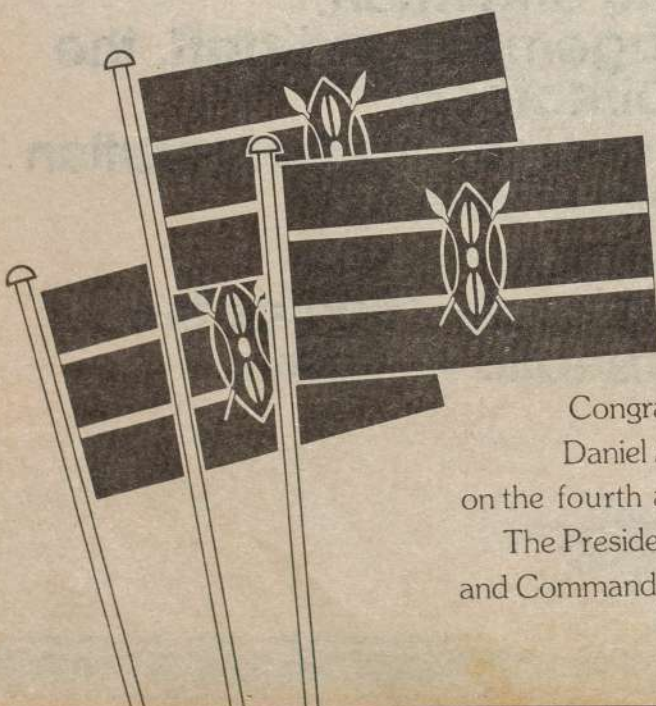

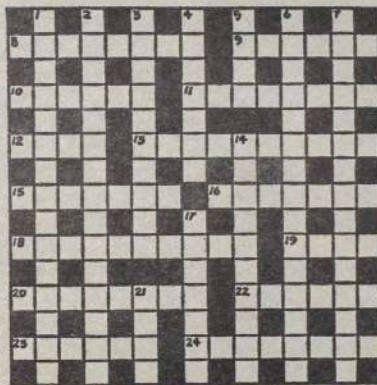

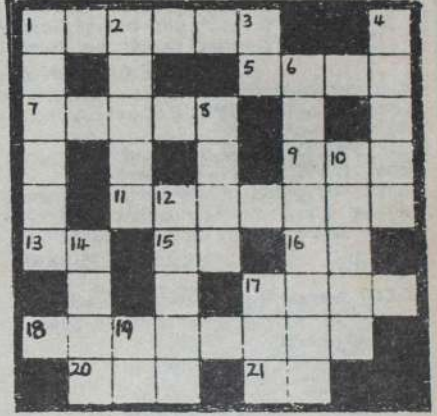

In the other semi Lalji beat Mohamed Sharif 4-1.

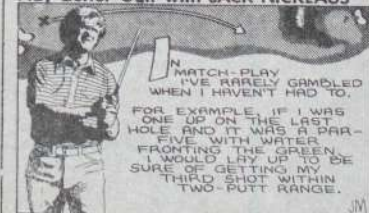
## Coast Hockey

Western Stars raised their hopes with a close 1-0 win over Black Panther last Sunday.

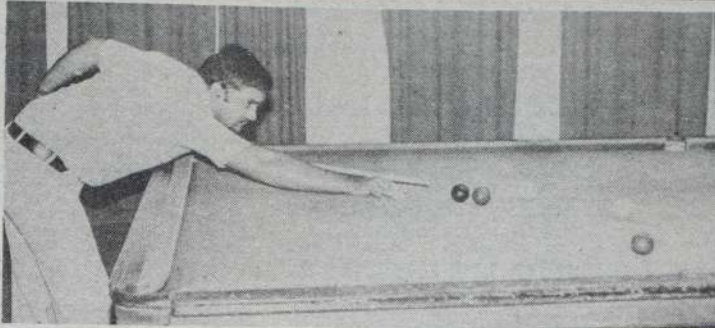
### LAKE WARRIORS

In 15 days fishing he landed no less than 4841 lbs. of fish, mostly the big Yellowfin Tuna that are currently running in the Pemba Channel. This is not all. In his six holidays at Shimoni, he has landed a grand total of 20,065 lbs. of fish, including 24 Marlin and one Broadbill Swordfish. This is approximately nine tons of fish!

I think there can be very few places in the world where an angler can get such consistently good results as Dieter has done here. Naturally, he has booked again for next year's fishing holiday.

### 'BEST EVER'

Yellowfin Tuna catches in the Pemba Channel this year have been the best ever recorded up to date, with fish not only more numerous than ever before, but also they are running much bigger this season, and whereas a fish of over 100 lbs was a rarity a few years ago, this year they are relatively common, and a number of fish in excess of 150

lbs. have been taken this year. Several Kenya records for Yellowfin Tuna are being claimed.

Mombasa businessman Peter Ruyseenaers boated a beautiful fish of 168 1/4 lbs. to claim the mens 50 lbs. line record, and Nairobi angler Peter Warner took one of 122 lbs. on a 30 lbs. line class record.

Best days fishing this season was a total of 1007 lbs. in one boat in a day!
